BERLIN CLAIMS RUMANIANS ARE DEFEATED

GERMANY REPORTS FALKENHAYN AND MACKENZEN CROSS DANUBE TOGETHER

BERLIN CLAIMS JOINT ARMIES CROSS DANUBE

Report From Germany That Falkenhayn and Mackenzen have Linked up and are Now Near Bucharest.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Berlin, Nov. 27.—Von Falkenhayn's army, which drove the Rumanians out of the Jiul valley, has joined with Von Mackenzen's forces on the Dobrudja front and the combined armies have crossed the Danube into Rumania.

Von Mackenzen's forces are now on the outskirts of Alexandria, on the Vede River, forty-seven miles from Bucharest, the capital of Rumania. The Rumanians are retreating and are burning their towns and villages behind them.

Bulgarian Report.

Sofia, Nov. 27.—The reinforced Russian-Rumanian army on the Dobrudja front has failed in its purpose and the armies of the Central Powers have advanced along the entire front.

Rumanian Report.

Bucharest, Nov. 27.—The Rumanian armies are holding fast to their positions along the Alt River in Transylvania and are maintaining their ground against the enemy on the northern portion of this front.

BARGE DONALD D. SMASHED BY GALE

The coal barge Donald D., owned by the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company, which piled up on the rocks in Codfish Passage some time ago, is now reported to have broken up and that there is no chance of salvaging her. A surveyor from Vancouver was sent out to her some days ago and he reported that Bella Bella Indians had stripped the vessel of everything of value. The matter was referred to the provincial police. An expedition from Vancouver last Wednesday found that the recent gales had broken up the hulk.

BRITISH REPEL ENEMY ATTACK ON BEAUCOURT

Germans Attempt Surprise Attack In Heavy Storm—Berlin Claims Success—Attack on St. Mihiel.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 27.—The British forces holding the Allied lines between Hamel and Beaucourt, on the north bank of the Ancre, repelled a German attack. The enemy assumed the offensive at this point during severely stormy weather but the British were ready for them and brought machine gun batteries to play, forcing the enemy to retire to their trenches.

The German artillery is particularly active around Courcellette, north of Pozieres and at Le Buterne, while the British have carried out a heavy bombardment of Puisieux, north west of Miramont, which point is one of the great objectives of the drive along the Ancre.

Berlin Report.

Berlin reports that a raid on the British lines at Beaumont resulted in the capture of over a hundred and sixty British soldiers.

French Front.

Paris, Nov. 27.—There is considerable artillery activity in the neighborhood of Ablaincourt and Pressoire.

In the Champagne region, the Germans attacked but a terrific barrage of fire from the machine guns of the French drove them back.

Berlin Report.

Berlin states that, after a prolonged artillery preparation, the French last night made an assault upon St. Mihiel, on the Verdun front, but failed to carry this salient and were repulsed by the German troops.

GOVERNMENT WANTS ANOTHER EXTENSION

Ottawa, Nov. 22.—The Borden government has announced, via the ruby lips of the Hon. A. E. Kemp, that it will take another extension if it can get it. The stipulation is, however, that Parliament must be unanimous and that if the Opposition is reluctant about it the Government will go to the country, throwing the onus of a war-time election with a dull sickening thud on the wicked Grits.

When he made this announcement, having come straight with the dreadful news from a cabinet meeting at Ottawa to a Conservative ward association meeting in Toronto, Mr. Kemp registered extreme horror. As a register of extreme horror, Mr. Kemp is a false alarm. His performance lacks conviction. His touch is too heavy—like an elephant playing a piano.

Ostensibly Mr. Kemp was horrified at the possible infamy of the Grits in refusing to grant the Borden government another year's extension from October, 1917, in which to make their profiteering friends in the food and shell industries rich. What he really was horrified at—although of course he wouldn't admit it publicly—was the prospect of a general election that would turn the shilly-shallying Borden government out before its cold storage masters had squeezed the last dollar out of the Canadian people.

It is quite true that the Borden government is enjoying an extension right now at this moment of which eleven months is still unused, but that doesn't prevent Mr. Kemp reaching out for another. The honorable gentleman is guilty of talking with his mouth full. The answer to his protestations is, of course, "Get rid of what you've got first."

Just here the question arises, what is the Borden government doing with its present extension of power? Is it making good use of it? Has it done anything that would entitle the people of Canada to grant it another year of power—making altogether seven years at a stretch for a government that wasn't intrinsically worth three? And of those seven years, moreover, three, perhaps four, have been characterized by opportunities, by the way, of which the Borden government's friends have taken full advantage. Some of the shell profiteering companies actually showed nine hundred per cent. profit. Naturally the friends of the Borden government don't want it to abandon the trough while the gorging is good. Hence these outcries for another extension on top of the one that is already being so fully utilized.

The government's keenness on these extension movements has two main objects—exercise and more time. The object of the exercise is the same as the object of all these Swoboda movements—to remove the paunch, to reduce the swelling caused by the war profiteers so that it will not be observed by the public eye.

ALLIED THREAT TO OCCUPY THE CITY OF ATHENS

Du Fournet Makes Further Demands on Greek Government—Royalists Declare They Will Refuse.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Athens, Nov. 27.—Vice-Admiral Du Fournet, the commander of the Allied fleet in the Mediterranean, has demanded that the Greek government surrender ten batteries of mountain guns by December 1st, failing which, the Entente Allies will occupy the city of Athens.

The Royalists declare that they will make a complete refusal to comply with the Allied demand. The Royalist troops have also refused to evacuate Katerina, and Athens has been warned that unless an immediate order of evacuation is given, force will be used.

Russian Front.

Petrograd, Nov. 27.—Action on the Russian front is confined to artillery engagements and aeroplane operations.

Italian Front.

Rome, Nov. 27.—The Italians have successfully resisted Austrian aeroplane attacks and two planes were driven down.

The government reckons in two years that the war profits of their friends, which now cause an unsightly lump in the very middle of the body politic, can be shifted by way of taxes to the backs of the people, thus putting the hump where it belongs and at the same time relieving their profiteering friends of an all-too-obvious obesity. What this metaphor means to say is that in the long run the people pay the profiteers and that the Borden government trusts to the healing effects of time to make the people forget that they are being taxed to make the Borden government's friends and masters rich.

Time to forget. Yet, not that only, but time to sop up the rest of the gravy. "Let well enough alone"—that was the Tory slogan in 1911. In 1916 it still is "Let well enough alone" with this addition "and we'll get anything that's left."

Meanwhile, what reason can be urged why a government, which has not used one month of its present extension of a year, should be given another year's mortgage on the future? Has it made good with its present extension? What are the first fruits? Well, the very first fruit is Colonel Bruce's report on the rotten state of the Canadian Army Medical Service in Great Britain, loaded up as it is with income. (Continued on page three.)

VERY STRANGE

The strangest part of Sir George E. Foster's attack upon the people living in Prince Rupert is that the Minister of Trade and Commerce does not seem to realize that his statement casts a grave reflection upon himself in his official capacity and upon his department of the government.

By stating that the people are "hanging on by the skin of their teeth and by their toenails," the Minister of Trade and Commerce either admits that he is personally ignorant of the industrial development of this community, or that his department has left the community to stagnate, or get along the best way it knows how.

As Minister of Trade and Commerce, Sir George E. Foster should know more than a little of our rapidly growing fishing industry; of our huge salmon canning business; of the farming development in the valleys of our hinterland, and of our tremendous mining development. If he is ignorant of those things, he is no fit person to be Minister of Trade and Commerce of the Dominion of Canada.

"KNOCKING"

"Every knock is a boost," under certain circumstances and always provided that the person or city "knocked" has lasting good qualities. After reading the Monetary Times' report of Sir George Foster's speech on Prince Rupert, or rather on "Development and Production," with Prince Rupert as the text and example of what should not be, the average citizen here would naturally feel sore. When the soreness has worn off, however, one begins to realize that

Sir George gave Prince Rupert a whole lot of free advertising. This city has been "knocked" unmercifully. Its climate has been maligned; its location has been criticised; its sleeping drydock has been held up to scorn, and its present citizens have been described as parasites. Still, Prince Rupert is quite proud of itself and its citizens look to the future with equanimity.

The fact of the matter is that Prince Rupert has natural assets which must weather all "knocking," said "knocking" only serving to draw attention to these assets. If a city or an individual is to be put out of business by "knocking," that city or individual had never any good excuse for being in business. The terminal of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway will grow into one of Canada's most important cities, despite all the criticism which has been levelled at it. Many who heard Sir George Foster's speech had little interest in the city until they heard it slammed as a "town with a curse." A proportion of these people must be of an enquiring mind and, by applying their faculty for enquiry, they will find out the true facts about this young port of the north Pacific.

For the benefit of any such, we might advise them to ask a few of the citizens of Seattle what they think of the future of Prince Rupert. In the Washington city they would receive an entirely unbiased opinion, and they do not need to take the word of a Rupert citizen as to the future possibilities of their city.

Sir George Foster should really be thanked for having chosen Prince Rupert as his text, as he might just as well have chosen any other Cana-

FROM FAR AND NEAR

Nine men made a trip from Dordrecht in Holland, to Tampico, Mexico, in a 60-foot boat. They subsisted on shark for several days, their food running short.

Large shell orders have been placed with New Westminster and Vancouver firms.

It is reported that Sir Sam Hughes will open a business office in Ottawa. His new line of business is not stated.

Pte. Tom Jones, a Runcorn boy, has been decorated with the V. C. This gallant soldier captured 102 Germans single-handed.

The Montreal Star has started a campaign against a "potato combine." There are other combines which want looking after as well.

Sol. Ferretti, an Italian designer, has plans for the building of an entirely new type of battleship, which will resist a 15-inch shell and will be proof against aerial attack.

Maximilian Harden, the brilliant editor of the Die Zukunft, has a scheme by which the war will be ended by Christmas. He urges Germany to study the real aims of the Allies and to come into line with the political systems of western Europe.

Britain has stopped the export of copper to Denmark, Sweden and Norway and the smaller coins in those countries are now being made of iron.

New Zealand wool growers have agreed to sell the new season's wool clip to the Imperial government at prices considerably below those obtaining in 1915 and 1916.

petents, dope fiends and party hacks. The Canadian end is not much better in some places. A court martial has just investigated transactions at the base hospital in Toronto in which non-commissioned officers are said to have looted thousands of dollars worth of supplies. For this stupid blundering the hospital commandant, or whatever they call him, has been relieved of his job and transferred to an ornamental position where his fatheadedness can do no more harm.

The next of the first fruits is the recruiting muddle, the appointment of a non-partisan National Service Commission with eleven out of twelve Tory recruiting directors, the resignation of the chairman, Sir Thomas Tait, when he found that there wasn't enough non-partisanship to permit him to choose his own secretary, the selection of R. B. Bennett, as chairman—R. B. is so non-partisan that he thinks of God as a Tory—and the famous attempt to hand Sir Wilfrid Laurier a lemon, that is to say to hand him a full share of the blame while holding out on the glory, to which he was not entitled because up to that moment Sir Sam and his humble and inferior associates of the cabinet had conducted it as exclusively a Tory war. Whereat, as Mark Twain says, Yey all laughed except ye ladye Alice Dillbury, yat silly old thing.

These are the first fruits of the present extension and it rests with the people of Canada to say whether the Borden government ought to get another to do the same things with. There isn't much chance that they will do any better. You can't teach a six-year-old dog new tricks—even if you do extend him another twelve months. It goes without saying that the government doesn't want that other year to repent in—it has more pressing matters than repentance to get busy about.

There is no doubt in my mind that Mr. Kemp's horror was genuine enough. The trouble, as I said before, is that he wasn't at liberty to reveal the true object. Still, everybody knew it. So why dissemble? What Mr. Kemp was horrified at was not the prospect of a general election, but the prospect of what it would do to the Borden government. His horror was no doubt intensified by the thought of what general elections had done to Conservative governments in Manitoba and British Columbia. Mr. Kemp's horror and that of his colleagues is horror at the abyss into which they are due to plunge.

The people of Canada do not feel horror now at the prospect of a federal election such as they felt in 1914 or again in 1915, when the Germans still had the edge on the Allies and victory was

none too certain. Now that our ultimate triumph is assured, Canada turns with a lighter heart to its troubles at home and the chief trouble there, she finds, is the Borden government. What Canada will do to the Borden government when she gets the chance will be horrible enough, but that is no reason why Mr. Kemp should try to blame it on the Grits. Everybody wants to get at the Borden government—it doesn't seem to be a party question at all. In one sense it won't be an election, it will be a capital punishment. Instead of lingering on for a year from October, 1917, the Borden government ought to take the first chance to drop out with as little fuss as possible. The sooner it's over the sooner to sleep. No flowers.—H. F. G.
