

## THE CANADIANS MAKE BRILLIANT CAPTURE

FIERCE HAND TO HAND ENCOUNTERS MARK THE PROGRESS OF BRITISH ARMIES

THE ALLIES  
ARE STILL  
ADVANCINGThe Oppy Line is Pierced and in  
Alsace, French Take Many  
Prisoners in Second  
Line Trenches.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 30.—The British troops in a desperate attempt to turn the northern wing of the Drocourt-Queant line, have advanced on a front of nearly ten miles. The village of Arleux en Gohelle nine miles to the west of Douai has been captured.

## Counter Attacks.

Most violent fighting marked this battle, and the successive German counter attacks which were made with heavy sacrifices, failed to check the victorious advance of the British. Fierce encounters with the bayonet and the rifle butt were the order of the day. The British got close enough for hand to hand fighting. They sprang at the throats of their foes, and man to man, the Germans were no match. In further counter attacks, wave after wave of the grey coated enemy were shattered by the deadly British fire.

## Canadians Forward.

The Canadians in a brilliant assault captured an important village. Progress was made everywhere and the German line was again pierced. Several Wurtemberg divisions were literally cut to pieces. The battle is still in progress in an easterly direction from Vimy Ridge southward to the Scarpe River. The so-called Oppy Mericourt line which protects the Drocourt switch to the Hindenburg line has also been pierced.

## French Front.

Paris, April 30.—In Alsace, the French troops moved forward to the attack and carried the enemy's first line trenches completely on a wide front. In many places the second line trenches were also taken and over three thousand prisoners have already been counted.

## French Official.

Paris, April 30.—Heavy artillery fighting is in progress between St. Quentin and the Oise. Since April 16 we have taken 20,780 prisoners, 175 guns, 442 machine guns, and 119 trench mortars.

## HUNGER IN EUROPE

London, April 30.—All nations in Europe are feeling the pinch of hunger. Neutrals and belligerents in common are faced by a shortage of the necessities of life due to the blockades. All are taking stock of the visible supplies. Britain is on her honor not to eat too much, but if the system fails, rationing will be adopted.

CONSCRIPTION IS  
PASSED IN THE U. S.

Washington, April 30.—The volunteer amendment to President Wilson's bill for selective conscription was thrown out on the first vote of the House. The Selective Conscription Bill was passed by a large majority, both in Senate and in the House. The vote was 397 to 24. The raising of the war army by selective draft will now proceed in every state.

LEAGUE OF NEUTRALS  
AFTER THE WAR

Stockholm, April 30.—Knut Wallenberg, the famous banker and foreign minister, has a scheme for a league of neutrals, which with fresh armies and new weapons, may be in a position to impose its will, when the belligerents are exhausted by war. This pro-Ally minister in a Germanophile cabinet, has managed to maintain his country's neutrality.

## SOUTH AMERICA AND GERMANY

(Special to The Daily News.)

San Salvador, April 30.—Guatemala has broken off diplomatic relations with Germany, and the German minister has been handed his passports.

Rio de Janeiro, April 30.—The Brazilian Government has decided that, following the breaking off of diplomatic relations with Germany, all former German consuls must leave the country. The late German minister is leaving for Uruguay.

## PROTEST FROM SPAIN

(Special to The Daily News.)

Madrid, April 30.—The Spanish Government has sent another very strongly worded protest to Germany, following the news of attack by submarines on the Spanish steamer "Prana." The severance of diplomatic relations between Spain and Germany is considered probable.

## REPRISALS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, April 30.—Germany threatens reprisals if the French carry out their threat to have German prisoners on board every hospital ship to protect them against German torpedoes.

## WIRELESS PLANT FOUND

San Salvador, April 30.—A new and up-to-date wireless plant, complete in every particular has been found near the coast on a plantation owned by a German.

## BAKERS ON STRIKE

Chicago, April 30.—The bakers are on strike here. The city may be without its million loaves, which are required daily, until the strike is settled. A bread famine is feared. The strikers ask for an increase of three dollars a week, and shorter working hours.

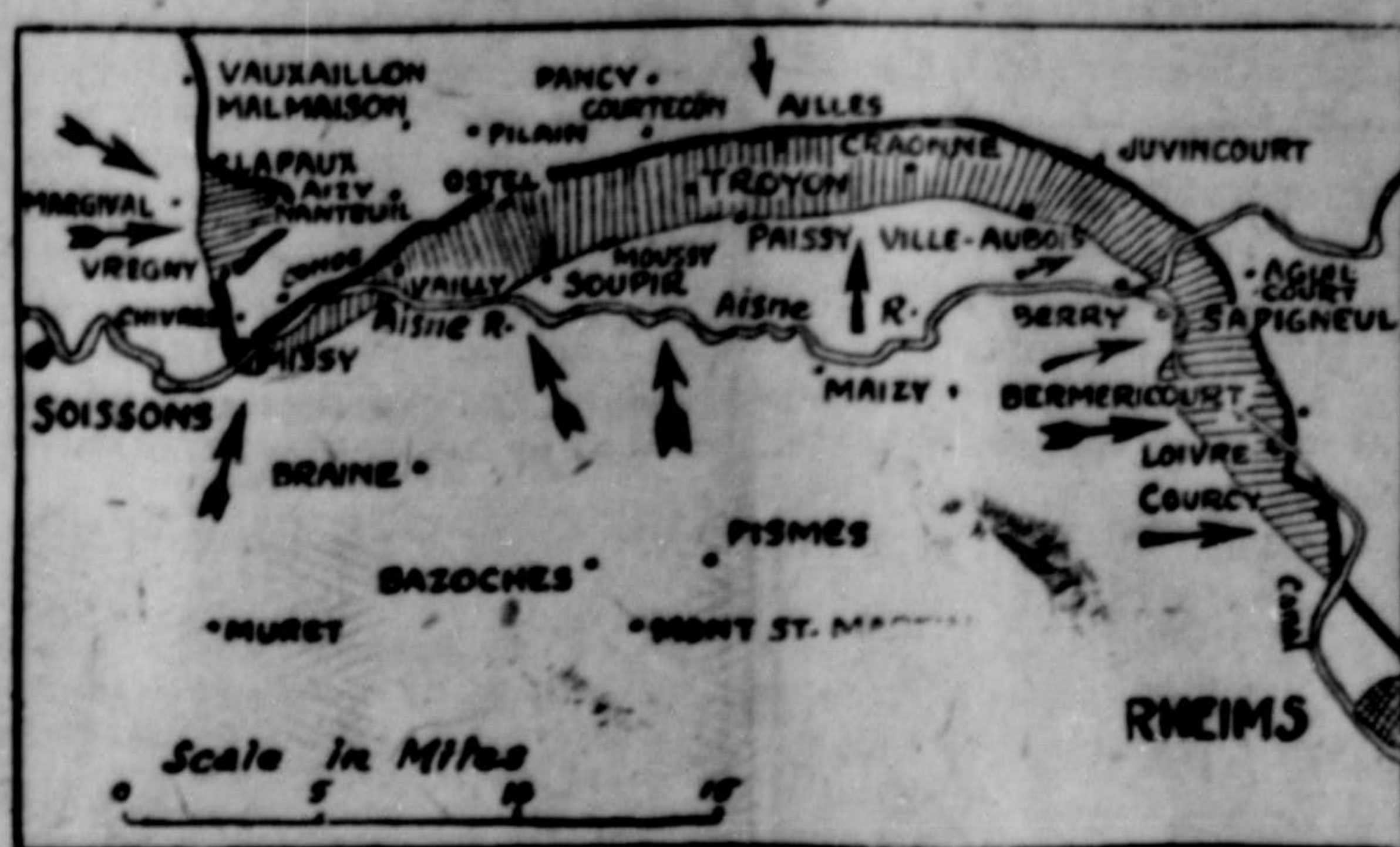

RUPERT OLD TIMER  
IS BADLY WOUNDED

The wounds sustained during the fighting at Vimy Ridge by Lt. E. O. Reitel are more serious than were at first reported. According to a cable received by Mrs. Reitel, who is presently living in Victoria, he was hit in both legs and has been removed from France to the 1st London General Hospital, Camberwell, where he is making satisfactory progress. It was previously stated that only a slight wound had been sustained in one leg.

Lieut. Reitel, it will be remembered, left Prince Rupert with the first contingent, as a private, and was later transferred to the Canadian Scottish with which unit he served in the attack on Festubert in the spring of 1915, when he was first wounded. He returned to the front only last November, and has been in charge of a machine gun section since that time.

## COMMISSION TO RUSSIA

Washington, April 28.—Elihu Root, former Secretary of State, after conferring early today with President Wilson and Secretary Lansing, formally accepted the chairmanship of the American Commission which will be sent to Russia.

Mr. Root spent an hour with the President at the White House discussing the Russian situation. The President outlined fully what he desires to accomplish.

The Commission will be composed of three or four advisory members and a staff of secretaries and assistants. It is expected to depart for Russia within a few days.

The needs of Russia as outlined to President Wilson are for political, financial, transportation and commercial advice and assistance.

BIG SHIPMENT OF FISH  
FOR THE OLD COUNTRY

A special train of fourteen cars loaded with fish has been made up for dispatch to the east, en route to the old country. It is reported that not only halibut this time is going east, but plaice, sole, cod, black and red, and all the other varieties caught by the trawler, are included in this shipment.

Trawling on this coast is just yet in its infancy, and as these vessels increase in number, as they assuredly will in the near future, trains of fish food similar to this one will for eastern parts be despatched more frequently.

## To Discuss Peace.

THE MACLEAN KILTIES'  
REGIMENTAL MAGAZINE

The News has received from Captain Percy F. Godenrath, of the 236th O. S. Battalion—New Brunswick Kilties—a copy of the first issue of that unit's paper. It will be remembered that when in France with the 16th Battalion the Prince Rupert man was editor of The Brazier, and now he is mainly responsible for a new publication for a regiment that is shortly to leave for the front. The Breath of The Heather is a sixteen page journal, with two splendid photographic supplements, one of Colonel Sir Fitzroy Donald Maclean, Chief of The Macleans of Duart, whose tartan the Kilties wear, and the other of Brigadier General Hugh H. MacLean, M. P., honorary colonel of the battalion. The literary contents feature a capital military novelette entitled "The Incompetent," by Sergt. T. J. Wren, a graduate of Mount Allison University, that is worthy of a standard magazine. There is a chronological history of the Kilties by the orderly room sergeant; a sketch of the honorary colonel of the regiment; an introduction by Lieut.-Col. Percy A. Guthrie, O.C. of the Kilties, who will be remembered in Prince Rupert, and a story on "C. E. F. Papers Published on Active Service," by Capt. Percy F. Godenrath. Under the caption "Ricochets by the Sniper" there is a page of humor relating to members of the Kilties. The illustrations include the two senior non-commissioned officers of the battalion and the Queen St. Barracks, Fredericton, built by the regulars in 1791. The Kilties also boast of having a family of fighters represented by three generations in its ranks.

HOME RULE AND THE  
IMPERIAL COUNCIL

Ottawa, April 24.—Fears are expressed here that Premier Borden, when titled and influential Organic Unioners like Milner and Curzon get at him, may promise first and think afterwards. The Organic Unioners have no particular goodwill toward Canadian Home Rule unless it can be pared down to fit in with the scheme of a centralized Downing Street government for the British Empire.

It is safe to say that ninety-nine per cent. of the Canadian people, regardless of party differences, are thoroughly in favor of the Home Rule we enjoy now and of the British Empire as it is constituted at present. The Organic Unioners want to stick the British Empire together with Imperial Councils and such, but the Canadian people are content to have it knit together as it is now by time and good will. This is the better way, but the Organic Unioners do not look at it in that light. Neither do a certain few Canadians who chase titles and borrow money in England. They want a consolidated Empire that will make their titles more significant and their borrowing operations more convenient. To these may be added a few more who suffer from megalomania, delusions of grandeur which only an Imperial Council will satisfy.

It is no great trouble to smell the Organic Unioners' plan. They want a centralized government for three reasons—to confirm class privileges in England, to inoculate the colonies with titles so that if the English aristocracy is ever expatriated it will feel at home in other parts of the Empire, and to shift a large part of Great Britain's war burden to the Overseas States, either in the shape of direct annual contributions to the Imperial Navy or as an Imperial tax which would be a first lien on Canada's assets until paid. There may be other reasons, but these are the chief ones. The Round Table crusaders, Mr. Lionel Curtis and his ilk, own up to all three.

Premier Borden may or may not approve of these schemes. If he does approve of them he differs from ninety-nine per cent. of the people who chose him as Prime Minister. The Home Rule our fathers won is good enough for us. Whether he approves or not Premier Borden certainly understands the Organic Unioners' schemes, and if he makes promises that Canada will help it will not be because his intelligence is dull, but because his spine is weak. It must be remembered that under the spell of greater minds than his own Premier Borden has done that very thing—promised first and repented afterwards. He did it some four years ago when he promised Winston Churchill three dreadnoughts which he couldn't deliver.

Premier Borden is a quick and pliant promiser and it sometimes happens that he promises more than the Canadian people will stand for. Just before the war broke out Premier Borden promised the British Government, off his own bat, that Canada would stand by the Mother Country in the war and Parliament was glad to ratify that promise. Later on, he promised five hundred thousand men—with a mental reservation—and Parliament was again happy to back him up. But the Premier mustn't think that he can swing Parliament by the tail like that all the time. This country is glad to implement his promises so far as helping the Mother Country in her mortal throes, but when it comes to promising our Home Rule away (Continued on page three.)

DISSATISFACTION WITH  
FISHERY REGULATIONS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Vancouver, April 30.—The salmon cannery in Vancouver say disaster threatens their business as a result of the new regulations. They are opposed to any change being made in the existing laws, and declare that a Royal Commission should be appointed before alterations are made in order to ascertain what are the proper requirements of the industry. They point to the fact that millions of dollars have been invested and that a thorough investigation should be made first. They allege that discrimination has been shown in favor of the halibut fisheries, and assert that the Government must take immediate action if the business is to be preserved.

Here in Prince Rupert considerable has been heard from the trollers, who under the new regulations, are to have close time of two days per week, the same as the net fishermen.

This they claim is unnecessary, as trolling is carried out in the open sea. The close time for the net fishermen in the rivers was put on to give the fish a chance to get up the rivers, but this cannot apply to trolling in the open waters.

GERMAN ROMANIAN  
ARE STILL MILITANT

London, April 30.—No sign of a chastened spirit is to be observed in the accounts of the speeches of the leaders of the German Agrarian Junker party. They still insist that Germany must have the French coal fields of Longwy and Briey. The Government is in a difficult position between the Socialists and the reactionaries. The Junkers believe that the submarines will win victory for the Huns, and oppose the return of any of the occupied territory.

## NO TRADING IN FUTURES

## AUSTRIAN PEACE MOVES

The part which Austria-Hungary is playing in reference to the so-called peace offers is a significant one. It is believed that the original offer originated in Vienna and was practically thrust upon the Kaiser by his allies, including Bulgaria and Turkey. In return for this assault upon his divine rights, the Kaiser, with the servile aid of Bethmann-Hollweg, concocted a peace missive so obtrusively offensive in style that he knew beforehand its fate would be instant rejection. Out of that rejection he hoped to reap some considerable profit in the "burning indignation" of every loyal German heart and a demonstration of his feeble allies of the impracticability of making terms with an implacable foe, while at the same time he hoped to cheer them by a series of submarine successes that would diminish or obliterate the repugnance which some decent people in Austria-Hungary appear to have displayed to the policy of indiscriminate murder and destruction. After less than three months the peace offer reappears, and a section of the German press gives its benediction to the effort of the Austrian Foreign Office. The "burning indignation" with which Germans were to keep themselves hot in their hatred of Great Britain and eager in their enthusiasm for the conduct of the war appears to have fizzled out, while the hope which the Kaiser evidently meant to destroy seems to be gushing again from the eager Austrian breast. As to the meaning of this remarkable movement there can be little doubt. The first offer was generally interpreted as a sign of weakness. The second is a signal of something like despair. It may not be the case that Germany is less resolute to fight to a finish, although her decreasing resources may be menacingly teaching her that the finish cannot in any event be long delayed. But her allies are in a more demoralized condition. The veil that hides the domestic situation in Austria does not prevent the

outside world from learning that neither the sentiments of the people nor the conditions under which they are compelled to live favor the protracted continuance of the war. Hunger may be more attached to the German cause, but it is by the force of self-interest—the Magyars' fear that defeat will spell the ruin of their political hegemony. Bulgaria is also the victim of her own fears, yet in spite of them—or perhaps because of the feeling that Ferdinand "the Fox" can be made the scapegoat for all their misdeeds—the temper of the people appears to be rising against the war-makers. In Turkey public opinion can scarcely be said to count. But what is more to the point, perhaps, the strain of the struggle has very evidently brought the Ottoman Empire to the final phase of its long contest with Christendom. There is still a kick left in it, but it can hardly be vigorous enough to overthrow anything that Great Britain and Russia have accomplished. A temperate survey of the situation as it can be perceived or deduced from the military and political facts affords a more than plausible explanation of the effort now being made to trick the Allies into a compromise peace. The offer is not a genuine one, because the Central Powers still withhold their terms, and insist that a Conference must precede any such disclosure. But the conditions which prompt the offer are genuine, for they are those in which many millions of people are finding their environment—an environment of want, sickness, hopelessness, and all the hideous cruelties and waste of a war from which the savour of triumph has long departed. The Central Powers are no longer fighting to win, but because the authors of the war are convinced that they dare not lose. If once the peoples could be made to realize that they are being made the tools of reactionaries there would be a sudden collapse. Who knows what the example of the Russian democracy may effect in enlightening its neighbors and undermining the moral bases from which Hohenzollerns and Hapsburgs have so long defied the spirit of the modern world.

## HOME RULE AND THE IMPERIAL COUNCIL

to the Organic Unioners, Premier Borden had better go slow. If he wants to have Canada behind him he would do well to remind the Organic Unioners that all the emendments Great Britain has made on our Home Rule since the war started were simply emergency measures of a highly temporary character, and were not to be construed as forming a habit.

Premier Borden has only to look at the London newspapers to learn what the Organic Unioners intend to do to him if they get the chance. Moreover Premier Borden will observe, if he has ordinary common sense, that the Organic Unioners are doing a lot of lying about it. Perhaps the biggest whopper is advertising it as a "colonial movement"—the heart cry of Canada and the Overseas States, not the rule of the Tory self-seekers in England. When the Organic Unioners are confronted with their falsehood they answer back, "Why, look what Canada herself has done to her Home Rule since the war started."

This may be true, but it doesn't mean that we are going to keep it up. We'll do anything when the house is on fire, but after the fire is over we're going to save as much of the furniture as we can. The very first thing we will do after the war is to get all the Home Rule back that we gave away under pressure of necessity. In short, Canadian Home Rule is not destroyed, it is only suspended. The Organic Unioners, likewise Premier Borden, would do well not to forget that.—H. F. Gadsby.

## URGES FREE WHEAT BY ACT OF PARLIAMENT

Ottawa, April 28.—A. K. Maclean, Liberal, Halifax, said in the House of Commons, after Sir Thomas White had delivered the Budget speech, that the Canadian people had been borrowing too much and paying too little. The expenses of government had been too high. If patronage and party considerations were disregarded the surplus applicable to war payments would exceed \$100,000,000.

Mr. Maclean criticized the Government for its proposal to introduce the highways bill again. This was a political dodge, because the \$10,000,000 it was proposed to spend could not be secured for that purpose otherwise under present conditions.

Dealing with the free wheat order-in-council, Mr. Maclean declared that free wheat should have been introduced as a budget measure. The order-in-council under the War Measures Act was only a temporary measure. It would expire when the war was over.

Sir Thomas White produced a legal opinion by the Deputy Minister of Justice to the effect that the order-in-council had all the permanency of an act of Parliament.

The other speakers were Dr. Michael Clark, Sir Herbert Ames and J. G. Turfitt, who moved an amendment to the effect that free wheat should be ratified by parliamentary enactment this session.

## TURKS ARE SMASHED BY GENERAL MAUDE

London, April 28.—An official statement received here today from General Maude, commanding the British forces in Mesopotamia, says the British have driven the Turks from the west bank of the Shatt-el-Adhem, to about 17 miles north of the junction with the Tigris. General Maude's total captures on Sunday and Monday in the vicinity of Iztabilat were 687 prisoners, 15 guns and large quantities of rifles and munitions.

Concerning the actions in the vicinity of Iztabilat, and on the right bank of the Tigris the statement says:

## Many Captures Made.

"The full list of our captures for the two days, including those already reported, is 20 officers, 667 men, one gun of 5.9 calibre, 14 Krupp guns, two machine guns, 1,740 rifles, a quantity of hand grenades, 200 rounds of gun ammunition, 540,000 rounds of rifle ammunition, four limbers, 240 trucks, one crane, with spare wheels, and other stores, and sixteen engines."

In a message on Tuesday evening, General Maude reports:

"After a night march we made a surprise attack on one division of the thirteenth Turkish army corps on the west bank of the Shatt-el-Adhem, about 7 miles north of its junction with the Tigris. The enemy was driven from his position and fell back on the second Turkish division of the same corps, about 10 miles further north. In this action 131 prisoners were taken, including four officers, many transport animals and camels."

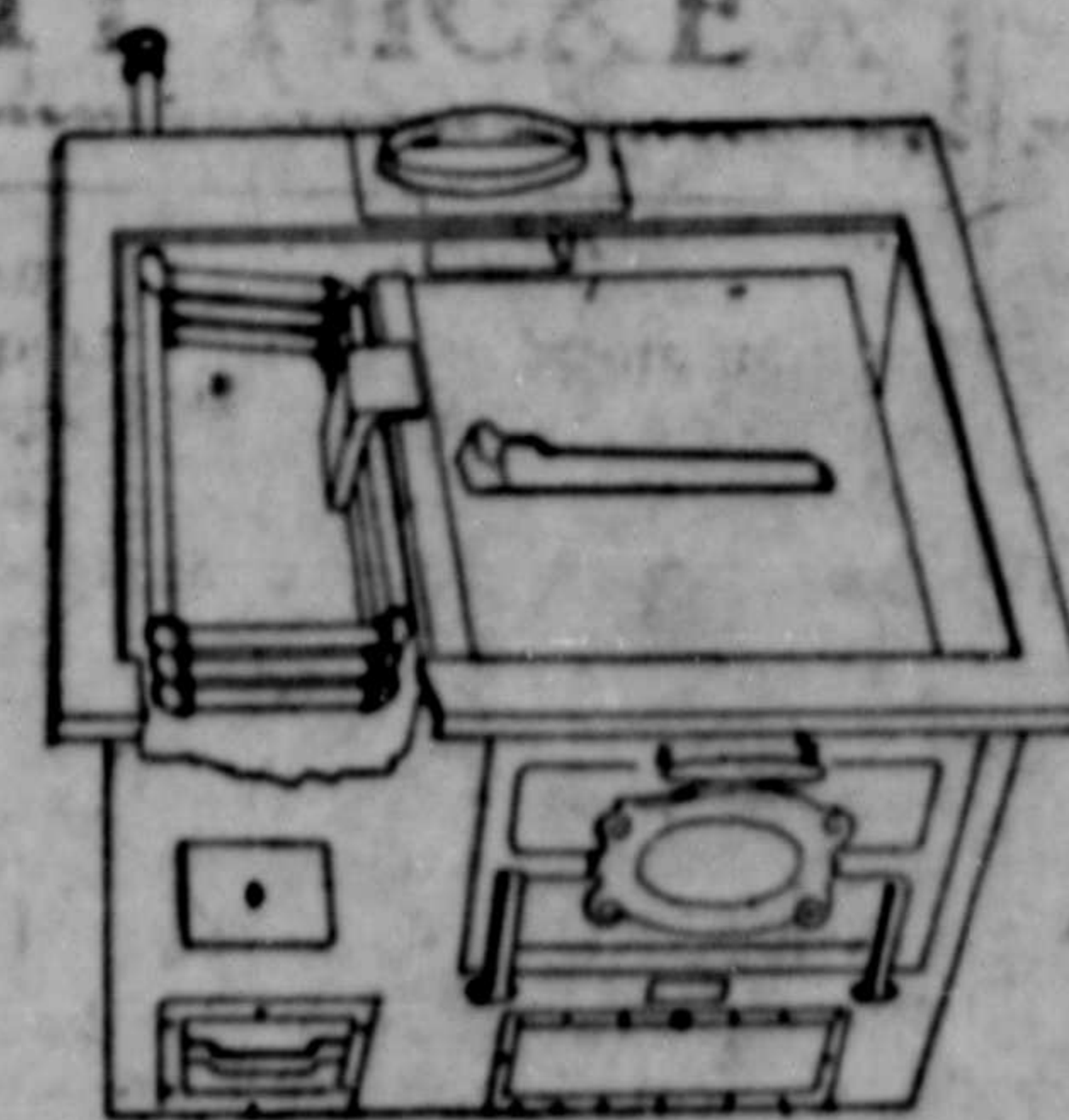
