CONTINUOUS PROGRESS MADE BY ITALIANS

VICTORIOUS ADVANCE TOWARDS TRIESTE NEVER CEASES — VIOLENT FIGHTING

THE ITALIAN DRIVE MEETS WITH SUCCESS

Fighting of Great Violence is in Progress — Austrians Are Compelled to Retire Under Pressure.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Rome, May 30.—The Italian troops in continuing their drive in the Plava Sector forced the Austrian forces into a small valley to the east of Gorizia. A hundred men were captured. Duino, which is the key city to Trentino, is now surrounded on two sides by General Cadorna's forces. The fighting, which is very bitter and of great violence, is continuing and the enemy forces have been forced to fall back before the relentless advance of the Italians.

LOSE INTEREST IN U-BOATS

London, May 30.—It is apparent that the Germans are losing interest in the submarine warfare. The latest reports on the operations of the underwater craft show a great falling off in the results.

MORE SHIPS SUNK

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, May 30.—The hospital ship *Dover Castle* was torpedoed in the Mediterranean on Sunday. Six persons are believed to have perished.
New York, May 30.—The French liner *Meuse* which left here on May 2nd with a full cargo, has been torpedoed.
Athens, May 30.—One hundred and two Greek vessels have been torpedoed by the Germans. Their total tonnage was three hundred thousand. Only one hundred and forty-nine vessels are now left under Greek ownership.

CONSCRIPTION IN U. S.

Washington, May 30.—Married men are eligible for conscription in the United States. Only those with actual dependents will be exempted in the American Selective Draft system.

MORE GERMAN PLOTS EXPOSED IN CONGRESS

(Special to The Daily News.)
Washington, May 30.—A campaign by the German propagandists to align the South and Central American countries against the United States was exposed by the State Department today. In the three southern republics, Argentina, Venezuela and Colombia the German propaganda assumed menacing proportions. Argentina has become a hotbed of pro-German and anti-American propagandists. Still another plot was revealed. The Germans had tried to embroil the United States with the Allies by violating foreign trading. Secretary Lansing asks for a restrictive act. Active alien enemies must be curbed.

CONSCRIPT LAND AND WEALTH TOO

Ottawa, May 29.—Liberalism made its appeal to the government in Parliament for a large conscriptive program in the cause of winning the war. Premier Borden's announcement that the flesh and blood of the nation was to be called to service is backed by the Liberal demand that accumulated wealth invested in mortgages and securities and that land held for unproductive and speculative purposes by railways and individuals, shall likewise be conscripted by adequate war taxation. Hon. George P. Graham, who led in the demand, made a strong case for the backing of Canada's soldier boys with "silver bullets." He pointed out that wealthy capitalists, with their money invested in mortgages and securities, escaped Sir Thomas White's war-time taxation by the Minister's failure to assess incomes; while the taxation of vacant land held for speculation would not alone add to the war treasury, but would also aid production and assist in solving the railway problem. But the plea found the Minister of Finance unresponsive.

Backing Hon. Mr. Graham's appeal came that of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. Dr. Pugsley, who called for public production of the figures of excessive war profits which were derived by firms and institutions trafficking in foodstuffs—"undue profits," as Sir Wilfrid Laurier feelingly described them, "out of the needs of the people, yes, out of the hunger of the people."

HAND-CAR ACCIDENT NEAR VAN ARSDOL

A distressing accident, terminating unfortunately with fatal results, occurred on Monday near Van Arsdol, when Mr. Eugene Riordan, the track watchman, was thrown off a hand-car. He fell over the embankment and was very seriously injured, his skull being fractured. He died three hours after the accident.

The body was brought in on last night's train, and the funeral service was held this morning in the Catholic Church by the Rev. Father Buoz. The interment will take place this afternoon at 4 o'clock.

COLOR RIOTS IN U. S.

East St. Louis, May 30.—Serious color riots have taken place here. The mob wrecked the meeting places of the negroes. Many negroes were injured, having received rough handling at the hands of the infuriated crowds.

HAZELTON MINING NOTES

The tunnel on the Indian group is now in 575 feet, and the face shows seven inches of clear ore and eighteen inches of mixed ore. When another 25 feet has been driven Superintendent Harris intends to begin shooting and prospecting various shoots of high-grade ore which shows in the workings.

Dominion geological survey work in this district during the present season will comprise a final survey of a small section having Hazelton as its centre. F. S. Falconer, a geologist of the survey branch of the mines department, with an assistant, is here to carry out the work.

"Billy" Steele, deputy mining recorder at Manson Creek, who has been at the coast all winter, seeking relief from a severe attack of rheumatism, is expected to return in a few days. In partnership with Jack Mullan, he has a profitable placer claim at Manson.

The miners working on the Comeau group, just south of town, have succeeded in tracing the vein a considerable distance down the hill, and have uncovered another nice showing of copper ore.—Omineca Miner.

STEWART NOTES

The launch *Narbothong*, Capt. H. K. Freeman, is now making weekly trips between Prince Rupert and Stewart, carrying mail, passengers and freight. The service is giving every satisfaction.

R. K. Neill, to whom the Bush property on Salmon River is under bond, arrived from the south last week, and proceeded to the claims. Work is going forward under Pat Daly, and it is reported that good ore has been struck in a cross-cut from the main drift.

Dr. Garter, who is interested with R. Martin in the Linderborg group at Seven Mile, on the Salmon River, arrived from Anyox in Capt. Frank McKinnon's launch *Impolla*.

W. Tonkin is working six men on his Fish Creek property.

The telegraph line between Maple Bay and Stewart is now in working order, the linemen having repaired the damage done by the heavy snowfalls of last winter.

The repairs to the Bear River bridge is progressing rapidly under charge of Foreman Frank Martin.

Quite a few bear around this spring, seven being killed during the past week.

Mrs. W. C. Cameron and daughter returned on the *Narbothong* after spending several weeks with friends in Prince Rupert.

The snow is going fast in the hills and the prospectors are getting to work again, four new arrivals are starting out on an extended trip this week.

Gardening is in full swing, a number of vacant lots have been put under cultivation in addition to the gardens usually planted, so the patriotic production of vegetables is being undertaken here as elsewhere.

NO SHIPBUILDING FOR PRINCE RUPERT

Mr. J. H. Pillsbury, superintendent of the drydock here, returned to town this morning. Mr. Hinton, of the G. T. P., whom Mr. Pillsbury accompanied to Victoria to interview Mr. Buchart regarding the securing of shipbuilding orders for the plant here, did not return to Prince Rupert, but is said to have gone East direct from Vancouver.

"There is little I can say," said Mr. Pillsbury this morning, "and that little is not encouraging." So it is evident that there is to be nothing doing at the ship-shed at Hays creek yet.

Mayor McCaffery, when interviewed this morning as to what further steps could be taken said: "Briefly, the situation is this, Mr. J. E. Merryfield wired us that Mr. Buchart was leaving for the coast with full power to contract for ships. We telegraphed the G. T. P. officials at Montreal and Winnipeg, which resulted in Mr. Hinton coming here, and proceeding to Victoria, accompanied by Mr. Pillsbury. The result of the interview by the G. T. P. officials with Mr. Buchart was most unsatisfactory. The conclusion came to by the G. T. P. officials is that there is no possible chance of procuring the building of a ship here. It is the opinion of the said officials that the building of all ships is arranged for in the south.

The G. T. P. have not said to us officially that they are prepared to build a ship. We have been advised by Mr. Hinton that it is useless to agitate. Considering these circumstances and the present status of the G. T. P. at Ottawa, I am of the opinion that we can do nothing."

Evidently the Government will do nothing, and the G. T. P. will not do anything. What are the people of Prince Rupert going to do? Are they going to accept the dictum of Mr. Hinton as final that "it is useless to agitate?"

ALLIES PREVENTED GERMAN RETREAT

The Hague, May 29.—A German officer, wounded in the fighting on Vimy Ridge, and now sent to replace an old *Landsturm* in command of the *Hindenburg Guard* on the Dutch border, declared that *Lundendorff* had intended retiring on the whole western line another fifty miles, but the attack on the turning points prevented this manoeuvre.

The *Vaderland* says the western offensive prevented the Germans from simply parading to Petrograd and capturing defenceless and disorganized Russian soldiery by the hundreds of thousands.

CONSCRIPTION BILL FOR CANADIANS

RUSSIA'S FORCES ARE BEING REORGANIZED

Petrograd, May 30.—Kerensky is forcing Russia into action. The new minister is staking all on his ability to reorganize the fighting forces of the army. It is believed that he will be successful yet, and his supporters hope that the minister will win out. Liquor must be abjured, otherwise Russia would be submerged in a pool of alcohol.

BRITISH ARTILLERY WITH THE ITALIANS

Rome, May 29.—The British artillery men with the Italian army brought with them not only guns and shells, but a full staff equipment. Their part in the fighting has been to intensify the bombardment on certain sectors of the line where the Austrian defences are unusually strong and well masked. Combined with the Italian batteries they shattered system after system of rock quarried stone, traversed trenches and formidable barriers of barbed wire, besides stripping the slopes of woods which screened the Austrian preparation. Their commanding officer says the men were undistressed by the heat and greatly interested in the new surroundings and getting on well with their Italian colleagues who furnish large numbers of soldiers able to speak English.

Tommy of course has already acquired some Italian. A group shopping beside the front were conducting negotiations with two words: "Quanto—How much," and "Troppo—Too much."

THE TARIFF DEBATE

Sir Thomas White's reply to Hon. Frank Oliver's proposal for a sweeping revision of the tariff in regard to foodstuffs, farm implements and other necessary materials was, in a few words, that as the tariff was the Government's main revenue producer it could not be radically reduced.

Tariff for revenue, however, is not and never was the fiscal creed of the Minister or the Government of which he is a member. That creed is tariff for protection, tariff for super-profits, tariff for the trusts and combines against the little fellow, tariff for "infant industries" like the one that paid 900 per cent. dividends a year or so ago, tariff for J. W. Flavell's company with its \$2,500,000 worth of packed food products in cold storage. The Government had scarcely begun to warm the treasury benches when it prepared to raise the wall of trade restrictions, thereby discharging the debt it owed to the big interests which financed it in the election. Then came the war with its fine, fat opportunity for a further hoist towards that beautiful ideal of "Haman's gallows" so picturesquely described by one of its foremost champions a year ago.

Canada has, we think, the highest tariff in the world. It levies upon everything from the infant's rattle to the centenarian's casket, and the country, therefore, is protected, or bled, from the cradle to the grave. As a logical sequence Canada is also the most trust-ridden country in the world and as a further sequence, equally logical and natural, it is the highest-priced country to live in on earth, not even excepting Germany, Austria or Great Britain at this moment in those commodities which are available for use. Sir Thomas White sought to frighten the low tariff advocates with the effigy of an income tax. Well, what of it? When Washington lowered the American tariff it resorted to an income tax and the public did not object, because the income tax is only one tax while tariff taxation is two and sometimes three—customs profit, manufacturer's

profit and manufacturer's super-profit.

The Canadian tariff is devised for the benefit mainly of the privileged interests east of the Great Lakes, because that is the centre of political power. It is a monstrous obstacle to the fullest and best development of the great producing areas of the Canadian West. It taxes the materials which enter into production while at the same time those who impose it and continue to raise it are howling for more production. Just as long as this western country is compelled to pay tribute to special privilege with its roots entrenched in the high protective system just so long will Canada's proper development be frustrated. When Sir Thomas White states that this form of taxation always will be the country's chief mainstay as a revenue-producer he is talking through his hat. He forgets that Canada, like the rest of the world, is being re-made, and this includes its fiscal policy and a few other barnacles it has been carrying.

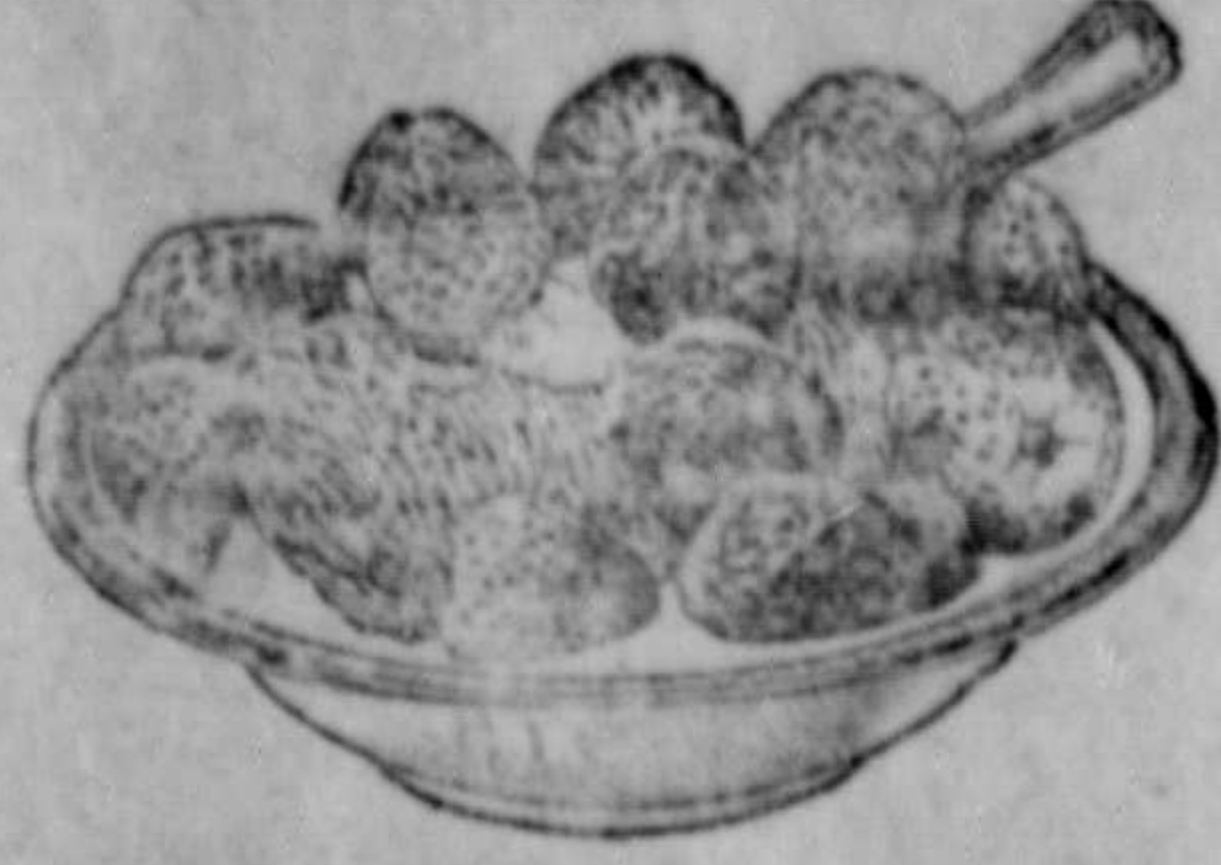
NOTES AND COMMENTS

Unless the labor trouble in the Crow's Nest Pass area is settled soon the fuel situation in the interior of this province as well as on the Prairies will become positively dangerous. It is high time the Government took over the mines as a measure of national safety. The country is at war and everything must give way to the exigencies of the conflict.

The nationalization of public utilities such as railroads is coming to Canada as surely as inscription came to it. Sir Thomas White himself forecasted this last year when he said the Dominion simply could not stand the financial drain involved in the subsidizing of bankrupt railroad corporations year after year.

The Borden Government will be on trial when it proceeds to set up a system of food control—on trial not only here but all over the world. If it appoints a board composed of political organizers, like the National Service Board, or handicaps the organization with instructions "not to be too hard" on this or that generous contributor to the party fund, it

will deserve to be kicked inconspicuously out of office. If a Canadian food control is to co-operate with Mr. Hoover he must not play party politics. That would disgust Hoover and disgrace Canada.

These be troublous times for King Karl of Austria and for the Kaiser too, according to all the information that is permitted to leak out from the dual monarchies. As for Mehmed Pasha, Ferdinand the Fox, and Constantine the Treacherous, they are keeping silent and wondering what the upshot is going to be.

In the beginning of the war Austria's big guns played an important part in reducing the fortresses of Belgium and France. Towards the end of the war British big guns with the Italian forces are playing a more important part in smashing the Austrian defences.

FISH TO BE CAUGHT NOW BY MACHINERY

A fishing machine has been constructed "that will prove a great benefit to the public in keeping up an ample supply of sea food at moderate cost." The inventor of this new machine is N. A. Lybeck, of 309 Broadway, New York, and, according to the inventor, the machinery used is capable of removing all the fish from 92,000,000 square feet of water per minute, by a combination of his new fishbone netting, searchlight, scoop, conveyor and speeder. Allowing 1,000 lbs. of fish to every 92,000,000 square feet of water, the inventor asserts that he will catch thirty tons an hour, or three hundred tons of fish in a ten-hour night's work by steady running.

SUFFERINGS OF JEWS ADMITTED BY GERMANS

London, May 29.—Interesting admissions from German sources of the horrors suffered in Jaffa by the Jews is given by the Foreign Office.

"The German Relief Society for Jews received the following telegram regarding the alleged persecution of the Jews in Palestine, spread abroad by the foreign press: 'In the district of Jaffa all towns have been evacuated for military reasons. Only farmers have been allowed to remain. From the town of Jaffa itself the inhabitants, including 7,000 Jews, who were obliged to emigrate, were lodged in the colony at Pet-ahtikwah, eighteen kilometres to the north. From this place they moved onward subsequently. Since means of transportation was lacking, only a few could carry their belongings with them. Here and there excesses took place. Much assistance, therefore, is required from Jewish relief societies.'

"The Turkish Commander-in-Chief at once tried to render help, and placed several thousands pounds of money at the disposal of the authorities. Further emigrations were postponed two days on account of the Passover. Jerusalem has not been evacuated."
