## Trade with Russia in Raw Materials and Manufactured

### Germans Evacuating Towns Given to Poles by Treaty; Fighting Continues on Shore of Caspian Sea.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)  
PARIS, Jan. 20.—Plans for the resumption of commercial relations between Russia and the Allies are being worked out. It is anticipated that the Bolshevik will permit the free exchange of manufactured goods and raw materials.  
BERLIN, Jan. 20.—The Poles have taken possession of Thorn in West Russia, which was given to Poland by treaty. The place was evacuated by Germany yesterday. Possession will be given of Bromberg, in the province of Posen on Jan. 23.  
LONDON, Jan. 20.—The Bolshevik outside of Krasnovodsk are under fire of the Caspian Sea fleet of General Denikine. The Bolsheviks have captured 35,000 prisoners but further advance of the Reds will prove difficult.

### FORESHORE QUESTION AGAIN IS DISCUSSED

Morgan Letters Brought Before Council—Foresshore Grant Hardly Municipal Matter.

Two letters from the J. R. Morgan Co., Ltd., one regarding the acceptance of city bonds in payment for street work and the other, asking to lease a site on the Cow Bay foreshore were again read at last night's council meeting. The first letter was referred to the Finance Committee and the other to the Board of Works.  
Alderman Rochester did not feel that the city was holding up the foreshore from incoming industries. It was the Provincial Government that was causing the delay. Although he was in favor of hanging on to any chances the city had of getting foreshore he thought the Morgan Co. should know that the city was not responsible for the delay.  
Alderman Casey did not see that this was business of the city. The provincial government was the custodian of the public foreshore and it was up to them to make these grants. It looked to him like an attempt on the part of the provincial government to throw the onus of delaying industry on the city.  
Alderman McLennan agreed with Alderman Casey that this was not a city matter. The city had control of only 200 feet of waterfront off Section 2 and could not make grants. He was in favor of maintaining any claim the city had for foreshore.

### GOOD YEAR IN CHURCH WORK

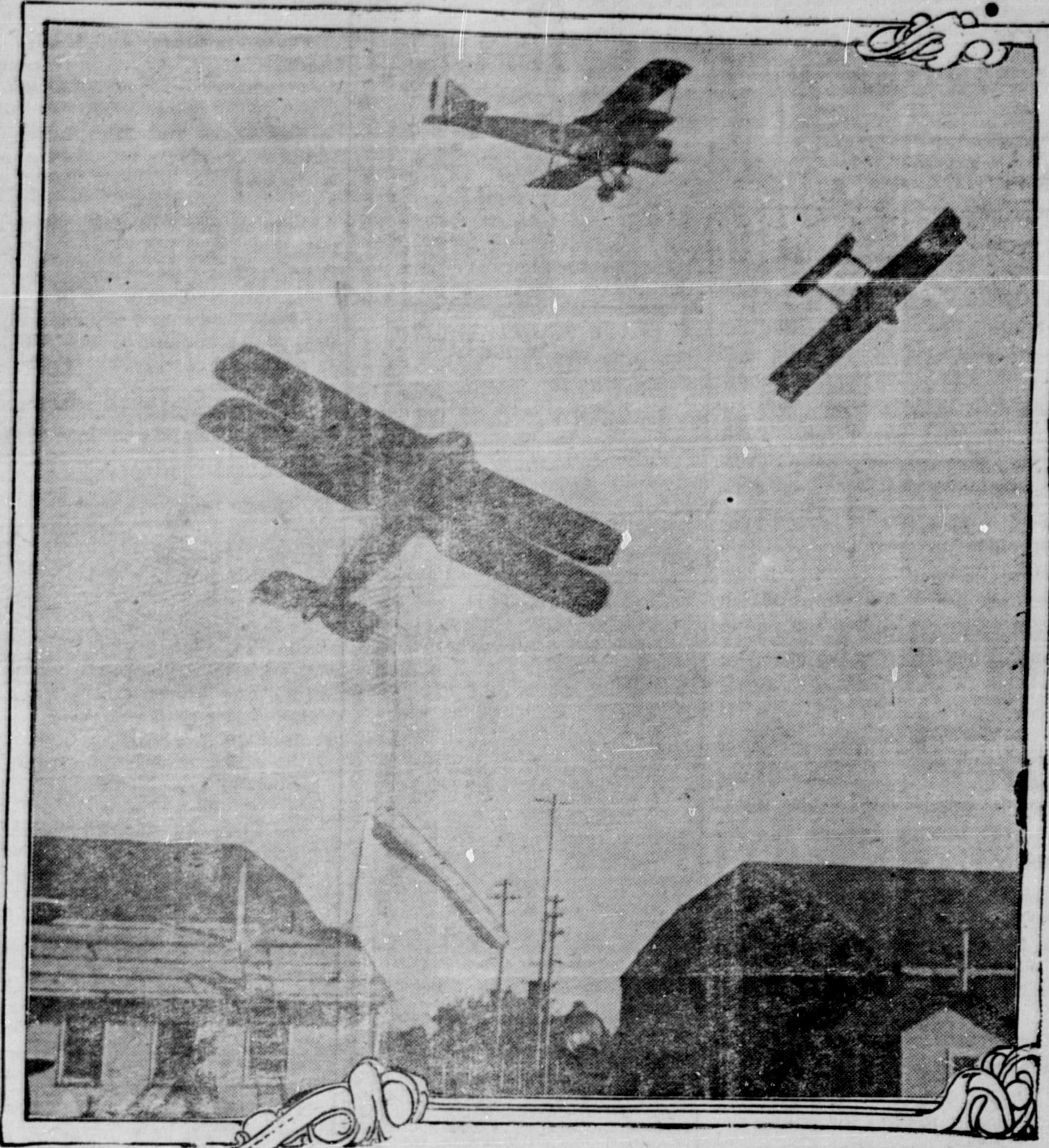
Anglican Vestry Meeting Has Nothing But Good Reports And Great Hopes.

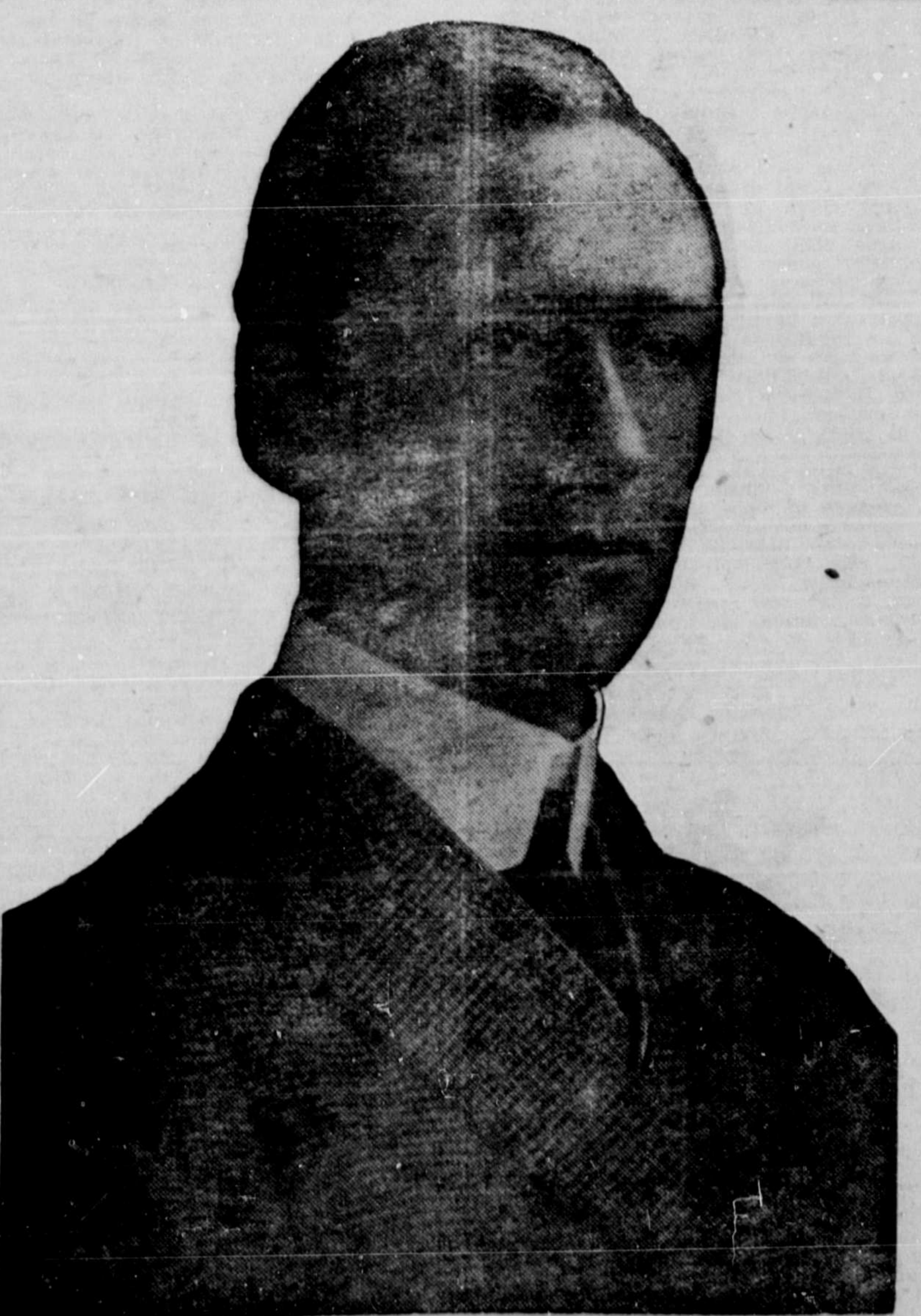

TERIJOKI, Finnish Russian Border, Jan. 20.—The United States Reds including the notorious anarchist Emma Goldman, were recently deported, entered Soviet Russia yesterday and were enthusiastically welcomed.

### MCCUTCHEON IS FINED HUNDRED

Pleads Not Guilty to Not Keeping Proper Record of Liquor Prescriptions.

W. J. McCutcheon, charged with not keeping a proper record of liquor prescriptions, plead guilty before Magistrate McMullin this morning and was fined \$100.50.  
L. W. Patmore appearing for the accused stated that he had spoken to another local druggist and he had said it was almost impossible to keep the record up to the minute and attend to business at the same time. The law in this respect was broken quite frequently.  
W. E. Williams, prosecutor, said that the law must be lived up to and it was not a difficult thing to do. If other local druggists broke the law, they would also find themselves in the Police Court some time.  
Magistrate McMullin concurred with W. E. Williams that the records must be kept strictly.

### SWANSON BAY LOGGER COMMITTED SUICIDE

Was Found Hanging From a Tree by a Cord; Insanity is Claimed by Witnesses.

The body of Julius Johnson, a Norwegian, was brought from Swanson Bay yesterday afternoon and is now at the B. C. Undertakers awaiting interment which will take place tomorrow. From the inquiry held by Coroner McMullin it appears that the deceased came to his death by suicide having hanged himself from the branch of a tree using a cord. He was working in a logging gang on Swindle Island and failing to turn up for dinner, search was made and he was found by a party before he had been dead an hour. He was said to have been somewhat stupid and insanity is attributed as the cause of his action. He had no effects and only paper was found on him giving his address as Lang, Saskatchewan. He was about 35 years of age.

### COMMITTEES ANNOUNCED FOR YEAR 1920

Mayor Makes Brief Address Outlining Duties; Urges Immediate Action of Finance Committee.

In opening the first meeting of the 1920 city council last night, Mayor McClymont briefly gave a review of the work that would be facing the different committees during the coming year. For the Board of Works there would be, among their problems, the building of the Morse Creek Bridge, sewerage improvement and extension and the question of permanent streets.  
The Public Utilities would find facing them the problem of extending the city's power plant. It is now almost taxed to capacity and new industries would probably want to come in that would desire power.  
The Finance Committee would have to give support to these various committees and expedite their plans. The mayor suggested a conference of the Finance Committee with the city bankers immediately in order to make arrangement for the carrying on of work under the by-laws pending the flotation of the bond issues.

Finance Committee—Aldermen Rochester, and McLennan and Mayor McClymont.

Better Housing Committee—Alderman Rochester, Alderman McLennan, City Clerk, City Treasurer and Building Inspector.  
Court of Revision—(Sitting on February 8)—Mayor McClymont, Alderman Rochester, Alderman McLennan, Alderman Casey, Alderman Perry and City Clerk (secretary).

**Financial Support for  
Symphony Concerts.**

The Prince Rupert Symphony Orchestra at its last Sunday evening concert found that the collection taken at the door did not pay the out of pocket expenses with the result that they had to take money from their general fund to provide for the deficit.

The members of the orchestra give their services without payment of any kind. In addition to this they pay a dollar each, membership dues with which they purchase music. They devote a great deal of time and energy to providing the very best class of music for the people of the city. It is very disappointing then to find that the people do not appreciate the concerts sufficient to pay a fair amount in the collection plate.

Plans have been made for several more concerts and the promoters hope that when the next opportunity comes the people who enjoy the music will be willing to pay the expenses.

**Get Empire Press  
To Visit This City.**

An Empire Press Conference is to be held in British Columbia next August. In order that a visit of the delegates to British Columbia may be assured it will soon be opportune for the Board of Trade or the City Council to take the matter up with the Dominion Government or other authority with a view to have them routed this way.

Last year we missed having a visit from an American organization because we did not move in time.

**Victoria Chooses  
Two Year Term.**

Victoria electors have asked by means of a plebiscite that the city be governed by a mayor and council of ten aldermen half of which will be elected each year for a term of two years. This is the plan adopted in school boards and it makes for continuity. Also it makes for independence as an alderman that has not to go to the electors each year does not have to be playing to the galleries so much, as it is said aldermen sometimes do.

**Trade Recognition  
Of Soviet Government.**

It seems as if the Allies are crawling down gracefully in their attitude toward Russia. While they have not recognized the Soviet Government they have withdrawn the blockade and are about to trade with that country.

So far as can be judged, the Soviet Government is in control in Russia and it has been the custom in the past to recognize the Government that is in control. The present action of the British Government is practically acknowledgement of the Russian Government although technically this has not been done.

**Separate Lockup  
Needed For Women.**

Ex-Alderman Kirkpatrick has secured statistics showing that during the past year no less than 39 women spent at least one night in the city jail. This is a large number and, in view of the frequency of women offenders having to be locked up, some proper accommodation should certainly be provided for them. It is understood that a committee of women is taking the matter up and that efforts will be made to secure a change.

## BIG INTERESTS LOOKING TO CANADA NOW

Toronto K. C. Returns From New York After Consulting With Many Capitalists.

American financial interests are at present taking a live interest in Canada, according to Dr. J. Murray Clark, K. C., who has returned after spending some weeks in New York, says the Financial Post of Toronto. But the regulating factor as to the amount of capital which will come to this country from the United States will, undoubtedly, be the attitude towards vested interests. Dr. Clark has been consulted by some of these big interests which are considering Canadian investments, on points of constitutional law bearing on private rights in relation to present and future investments here. He finds that the treatment of pioneer investors in Niagara enterprises, the attitude of the legislatures in regard to the status of mortgages and other evidences of legislative action of a confiscatory character, have had a far-reaching effect upon the views of people living under a constitution which absolutely protects the property of individual or corporation against confiscation without adequate compensation, and against taking property except by due process of law. However, he is convinced that at this time evidence of sincerity in giving reasonable protection to investors' rights in the future would do much to remove the hesitancy which now exists in regard to opportunities for investment in Canada.

So far as the general movement towards Bolshevism in the United States and Canada is concerned, Dr. Clark reports that the opinion of the American students of the situation is that the term of its popularity has not yet been run, and that it is still a serious menace. The steel strike is being successfully negotiated, and serious trouble in the coal fields has been avoided. But so long as unprincipled labor leaders can continue to make more money for themselves in Bolshevism circles than as officials of the old-fashioned unions, or by honest production, Bolshevism is a force which must be contended with, prominent business men believe. The death-blow of Bolshevism will be dealt by the labor people themselves when they realize, as they soon will, that they are being misled by selfish, self-serving demagogues.

## BIG INCREASE TIMBER SOLD

Hon. T. D. Pattullo Issues Statement Regarding Work of the Forestry Department For Past Year.

The value of Crown timber disposed of during the past year aggregates \$654,372.99 as against \$259,769.13 for 1916, \$483,281.50 for 1917 and \$380,408.33 for 1918, according to a statement issued by the Hon. T. D. Pattullo.

Vancouver and Island districts top the list at \$223,166.21; Fort George being second with \$134,650.33, and Prince Rupert a very close third with \$133,596.98.

The number of sales and the quantities involved is greater in every district than in any previous year. This increase is particularly noticed in the Upper Fraser River district, east of Prince George, where over 56,000,000 feet of saw timber, besides a considerable quantity of ties and cordwood were disposed of as against 11,000,000 feet sold last year.

A notable increase is shown also in the Upper Thompson River district, north of Kamloops, where some 16,000,000 feet of saw timber and 390,000 ties were sold, as compared with 12,000,000 feet and 78,000 ties last year.

The total number of sales for 1919 is 356, as against 133 in 1916; 255 in 1917 and 227 in 1918, while the area cruised for sales has increased from 23,314 acres in 1916 to 61,809 acres in 1919.

### Staff Reorganized.

This striking increase in timber sales, involving the cruising of a much larger area, entails much extra work on the part of the forestry and a re-organization has been effected to cope with the growing business of the Department. New men have been brought in from the ranks of the temporary staff and returned soldiers.

Over 4,000,000 lineal feet of piling was sold in 1919 as against 378,000 feet in 1918, and a large increase is also noted in the number of cords of shingle bolts and cordwood.

### Small Blocks Sold.

An important phase of the disposal of the Crown Timber stock is the sale by auction of small blocks and fractions adjacent to present operations, which would be wasted unless utilized immediately. Small logging units of mature or over-mature timber are also offered for sale as improvement cutting in the interest of the forest, while timber on agricultural land is also sold, so that the land may be opened up for settlement. In this work there is shown the closest co-operation between the Lands and Forest Branches of the Department.

In the Prince Rupert district there were 68 sales made, involving 12,607 acres. The number of board feet sold was 65,976,400 and the estimated revenue from the district was \$133,596.98.

## GOOD ADVERTISING FOR PRINCE RUPERT

Says Fish Industry Should Support 100,000 People and be Great Import and Export Centre.

In a beautifully printed and illustrated annotated timetable got out by the Grand Trunk Railway in honor of the visit of H. R. H. the Prince of Wales to Canada, mention is made of this city as follows:

"Prince Rupert, the Pacific coast terminal of the line, is a city which guards the finest natural harbor that man could wish for. Prince Rupert has one resource alone, the fishing industry, which will support, it is believed, a population of 100,000. From July 1, 1918, to June 30, 1919, 1,497 cars of fish, representing 32,000 tons, were carried from Prince Rupert by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. Prince Rupert will become one of the great export and import centres of the Dominion, and, being the nearest city to Alaska, will prove to be the real gateway to the north. The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, under an agreement with the Government of the Dominion of Canada, has constructed at Prince Rupert a dry dock capable of accommodating the largest ships on the Pacific Ocean and there is a shipbuilding and ship repairing plant now in operation in connection therewith."

## MANSON OPPOSED TO WALL ST. METHODS

Says Successful Action Against Shipbuilding Undertaking Would Be Severe Blow.

The Vancouver Sun just to hand says:

"Alex. M. Manson, M. L. A., against whom the main attack seems to be directed in the action started by Newman Erb, New York railway magnate, over the control of the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Company, stated last night to a representative of the Sun that he had nothing to say for publication with reference to the allegations of other directors. He commented, however, that whether Wall Street methods would be allowed in Canada was a point to be decided by the courts in the litigation now pending. J. L. Mullen, he said, was a Canadian business man willing to invest money in Canadian enterprises, and a successful action against an undertaking of this kind would be a severe blow to business encouragement in this country."

BIG POWER PLAN FOR PALESTINE

Norse Engineer Proposes Connect Mediterranean With Dead Sea by Tunnel.

CHRISTIANIA, Jan. 20.—A Norwegian engineer has devised a plan to provide water and electric power for Palestine at an initial cost of \$40,000,000. Albert Hjorth, of this city, proposes to utilize the variation of the level between the Mediterranean and Dead Sea and, by means of a tunnel, would carry water from the Mediterranean to the western slopes of the lower end of the Jordan Valley.

Below Sea Level. The surface of the Dead Sea is about 1,300 feet below sea level; that of the Sea of Galilee 650 feet below sea level.

Two Canals. Two canals would be built running parallel with the River Jordan and from these canals water would be distributed among the fields sloping toward the Jordan, sufficient, it is claimed, for the irrigation of many hundreds of thousands of acres.

An Expedition. Mr. Hjorth's plans have met with great sympathy among leading scientific authorities and practical engineers in Norway.
