British Parliament Faces Big Problems for Settlement

Opens Tomorrow With Labor and Irish in Opposition and With Home Rule, Mines and Railroads to Deal With.

Labor Now is Largest of Political Parties

Workers Backed by Viscount Haldane and Sir John Fisher on Platform of Nationalization and Restriction

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, February 9.—The British Parliament will reassemble tomorrow with several of the weightiest problems of construction still hanging over its head. The financial situation, the question of the nationalization of mines and railroads and the Irish problem, are three of the most important subjects with which the session is expected to grapple without delay.

The laborites promise to move an amendment to the address providing for the nationalization of mines, while the Irish Nationalist party expects to attack the government policy of repression which they blame for the Irish disorders.

The Home Rule Bill probably will be brought forward at an early date, the cabinet having overhauled it during the past week.

At a conference with Viscount French, Lord Lieutenant and Governor General for Ireland, the bill may prove very different from that expected. A proposal which is finding support in England is that it should be made an enabling bill, rather than one which would impose a new system upon Ireland, leaving it to the Irish people to decide by some form of referendum whether they will accept it and try to put it into effect.

Labor Ministry. Heavy clouds appear to be gathering behind the coalition government owing to the steadily increasing power of the Labor party. Some of the best informed politicians profess to see the handwriting on the wall that the formation of a new ministry by the laborites is only a question of time. George Nicoll Barnes and George H. Roberts, the last two labor ministers in the cabinet, have resigned, leaving the coalition government without any representation from the party, which has been elected by-election have indicated is now numerically the largest political organization in Great Britain.

Out for Labor. Meanwhile men of widely different types such as Viscount Haldane and Admiral Sir John Fisher have come out for labor, the nationalization of industry and opposition to armaments are two of the strongest planks in the labor platform.

David Lloyd George contemplates a bill giving miners a large share in the management of the mines, but last week he refused suggestion by representatives of the miners that he embody in the bill the recommendations of the Sankey Commission for a measure of nationalization.

BELLINGHAM BANKS BAN ALL CANADIAN SILVER CURRENCY

BELLINGHAM, Feb. 9.—The local banks announce that beginning today Canadian silver will be subject to the same rate discount as other Canadian currency. It is estimated that one-third of the silver in circulation in Bellingham is Canadian.

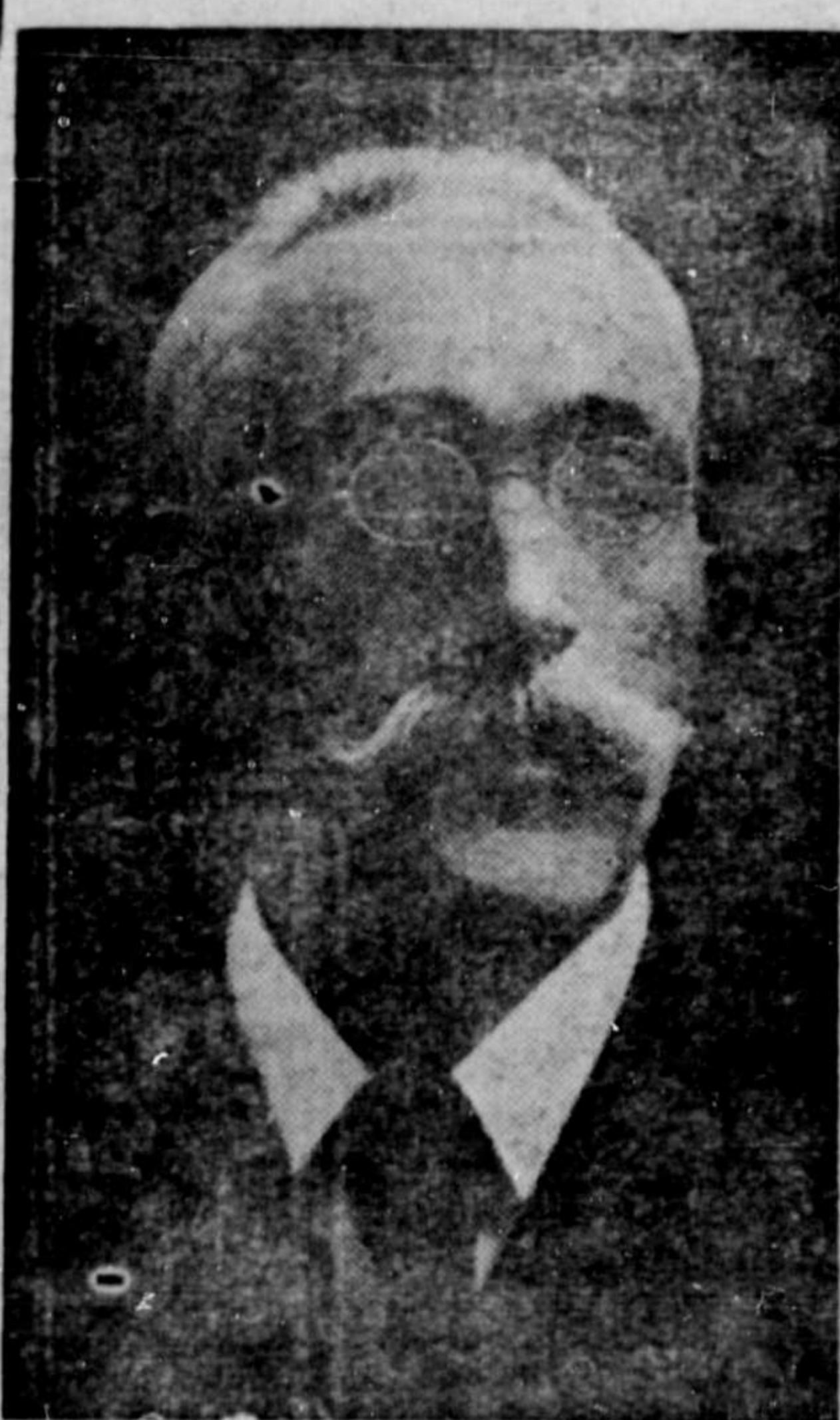

WOULD SMELT IRON ORE

Mr. Pauline addressed the Legislature last week on the subject of a smelter for British Columbia and dealt especially with the electric process. In the course of his remarks he said that magnetite ores were now being treated successfully by the new twentieth century process of electric smelting. Magnetite ores, without the admixture of other ores, also are being successfully reduced from their natural state to high-grade pig iron within the space of two hours. This ore, continued the speaker, is being taken by water from British Columbia to Seattle and there smelted by the Steel Smelters Company of that city. While these works are not yet complete, one furnace, said the member for Saanich, has been in successful operation for some time, and three others will soon be ready.

Mr. Pauline informed the House that he had visited the Seattle smelter; a few days ago and had seen for himself the quality of its product, which iron experts had agreed was first-class. He went on to cite a reference to British Columbia's iron development prospects, accredited to the editor of the Canadian Mining Journal, in which that eminent authority had expressed the views that if there existed a market British Columbia had all the necessary favorable outlook. And on the subject of markets Mr. Pauline relied upon the late William Blakemore for his data. Mr. Blakemore had been of the opinion that an iron and steel works on the Pacific Coast of British Columbia of sufficient scope and adaptability could secure for it-

VANCOUVER IS IN DISTRESS

Vessel Lost Rudder on Voyage to Queenstown from British Columbia.

HALIFAX, Feb. 9.—The Marine and Fisheries Department has received advices by radio from the Mauretania that the steamer Vancouver had lost her rudder and was in need of assistance in latitude 39 north longitude 58.30 west, approximately 410 miles from Halifax, and 100 miles south of the trans-Atlantic steamship lane.

The Vancouver is a French steamer which sailed from Vancouver on December 10 for Queenstown.

BOOMED FOR THE PRESIDENCY



Herbert Hoover's candidacy for President was brought to Washington and startled the political leaders of both parties. It aroused intense curiosity as to its backing and purpose, as well as focussing attention on the question of whether Mr. Hoover is a Republican or a Democrat, or if the movement back of him represents the boom of a new party which is aiming to make Mr. Hoover its head. Mr. Hoover's history has come up for consideration, and attention is called to the fact that he comes originally from California; that he chose to dwell for a long time in Europe; that he is generally regarded as a cosmopolitan rather than as a nationalist, and that discussion of him as a Presidential possibility without knowledge of his political affiliations is somewhat incongruous. His work in Belgium is accepted as showing remarkable efficiency and as his introduction to American affairs, from which he had long been separated.

ADMIRAL BOATS WILL CALL AT TOWN OF HYDER

Famous Blue Steamers to Ply up Portland Canal During Spring and Summer.

HYDER, Feb. 9.—Word has been received here to the effect that the Admiral line of Steamships will make calls here in the near future. It is possible also that they will call at one Canadian port.

With the certainty of great developments here and at Stewart this year, there should be plenty of business to make it worth while for several steamers to call at this port. People are enthusiastic over the proposed program of the green steamers.

GERMANS ARE RUNNING AWAY

Accused Men Leaving for Switzerland to Escape Liability Under Peace Treaty.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

GENEVA, Feb. 9.—Anxiety is growing in Swiss official quarters lest many Germans, accused by the Allies of war crimes enter Switzerland to escape liability under the Peace Treaty.

Vice-Admiral von Capelle, minister of the German navy, crossed the frontier yesterday; Baron von der Lancken, civil governor of Brussels during the German occupation, arrived in Switzerland from Munich and the former Crown Prince Ruprecht of Bavaria has been staying at Davos.

FINANCES OF COUNTRY ARE IN BAD SHAPE

Debt Increasing Rapidly and Interest Charges Amounting to Large Sum.

OTTAWA, Feb. 9.—According to the financial statement for the first ten months of the current fiscal year, Canada's funded debt has now reached the formidable total of \$2,447,542,908; gross debt \$3,323,087,801, and net debts \$1,900,146,168, the latter having increased by the startling total of \$62,015,109 during the month.

Of the total funded debt on which interest must be paid \$1,975,068,438 is payable in Canada, \$336,001,469 is payable in London and \$135,873,100 payable in New York. The difference between the net debt and the funded debt is represented partly by moneys still unexpended from the proceeds of the last Victory Loan and miscellaneous accounts to the credit of the Dominion.

At the outbreak of war the debt totalled about \$338,000,000 and at the end of the tenth month of the present fiscal year Canada spent a total of \$1,622,608,398 for war purposes. The borrowings as represented by funded debt, have therefore been \$486,510 in excess of war expenditures to date.

See Ourselves as Others See Us.

Sometimes it is a good thing to see ourselves as others see us. That we can do this week by reading the editorial in the Interior News in regard to the establishment of samplers for the mining industry, as suggested by the committee of the Board of Trade headed by J. B. Roerig. The editorial says:—

"That the Prince Rupert Board of Trade should get behind the miners in their request for assistance will be encouragement to the mining community and occasion no surprise from the general public, who are used to the spectacle of coast folks floundering around in support of one thing or another. Prince Rupert has jumped behind many projects, but not being quite sure where they were going to land in the first attempt they generally stopped after the first effort in case they bumped their nose. Then they got behind something else.

"In the worthy cause to which they are now committed, that of convincing the government that the time is ripe to establish ore sampling and purchasing plants, the general public will earnestly hope their enthusiasm will not be so short lived, and that their efforts will be lively to the successful accomplishment of their purpose. With the idea of a sampling works as a short-cut to the development of our mineral resources, the Interior News has always been an advocate, and we cannot commend too highly their desire for and action in assistance of mining, as manifested by the memorandum they have drawn up, and in support of which they are sending a delegation to Victoria."

Should Concentrate On One Plant.

"While the News (of Smithers) is in accord with the idea, it cannot approve of the locations suggested in the memorandum whereby samplers would be established at Stewart, Alice Arm and Prince Rupert. Why two for the upper coast to the neglect of lower Skeena and Omineca districts? And if we share with Stewart, what would Rupert do with one?

"It looks as though the memorandum was just a trifle reckless in this respect, and it is to be hoped that it will not endanger their whole case. For the coming summer at least, one plant of generous capacity located at Prince Rupert would serve well the needs of Stewart and this district.

"May they keep after that one.

"When he points to our necessity for purchasing manufactured copper in foreign markets from Canadian raw material, Mr. J. B. Roerig, who was prominently connected with the memorandum, plays a tune on the heartstrings of all true Canadians, which can have but one result.

Include Zinc In Refinery

"A similar situation exists in regard to zinc, of which there are large deposits at Hazelton, Smithers, and in the Owen Lake and White Sulphur districts which could be profitably mined were a home market available. Just now, and although Canada is a large consumer of zinc, she must go to the American markets for the bulk of the commercial product.

"The Silver Standard mine at Hazelton has shipped several cars of zinc ore, produced along with its silver-lead ores, to Oklahoma for treatment, owing to the absence of nearer markets. In this case the lengthy freight haul alone would constitute a good profit on the ore, and, therefore, in considering a refinery, it would appear that zinc should be regarded with copper."

ORE CARRIER FOR THE NORTH

Contract Let by Coastwise Steamship and Barge Co. for 220 Foot Freighter.

Word has been received here that a contract for a 2,350-ton steel steamship to be used in the ore-carrying and towing business between British Columbia and Puget Sound ports has been placed by Captain James Griffiths, of James Griffiths & Sons, managing owners of the Coastwise Steamship and Barge Company, with the shipbuilding firm of J. F. Duthie & Co., of Seattle.

The vessel, which is expected to be ready for delivery in June, will be 220 feet long, 40 feet beam and 21 feet depth. A towing machine similar to those now in use on the vessels engaged in towing the barges of the Coastwise Steamship and Barge Co., will be installed on the new craft. In type, the new vessel will follow the general lines and design of the company's steamer Amur, formerly of the C.P.R. fleet, the engines being placed aft. The vessel will have a speed of eleven knots and will have a lumber-carrying capacity of 1,500,000 feet.

Ore-carriers of the Coastwise Steamship and Barge Co., operate between Anyox, B.C., and Seattle and Tacoma.

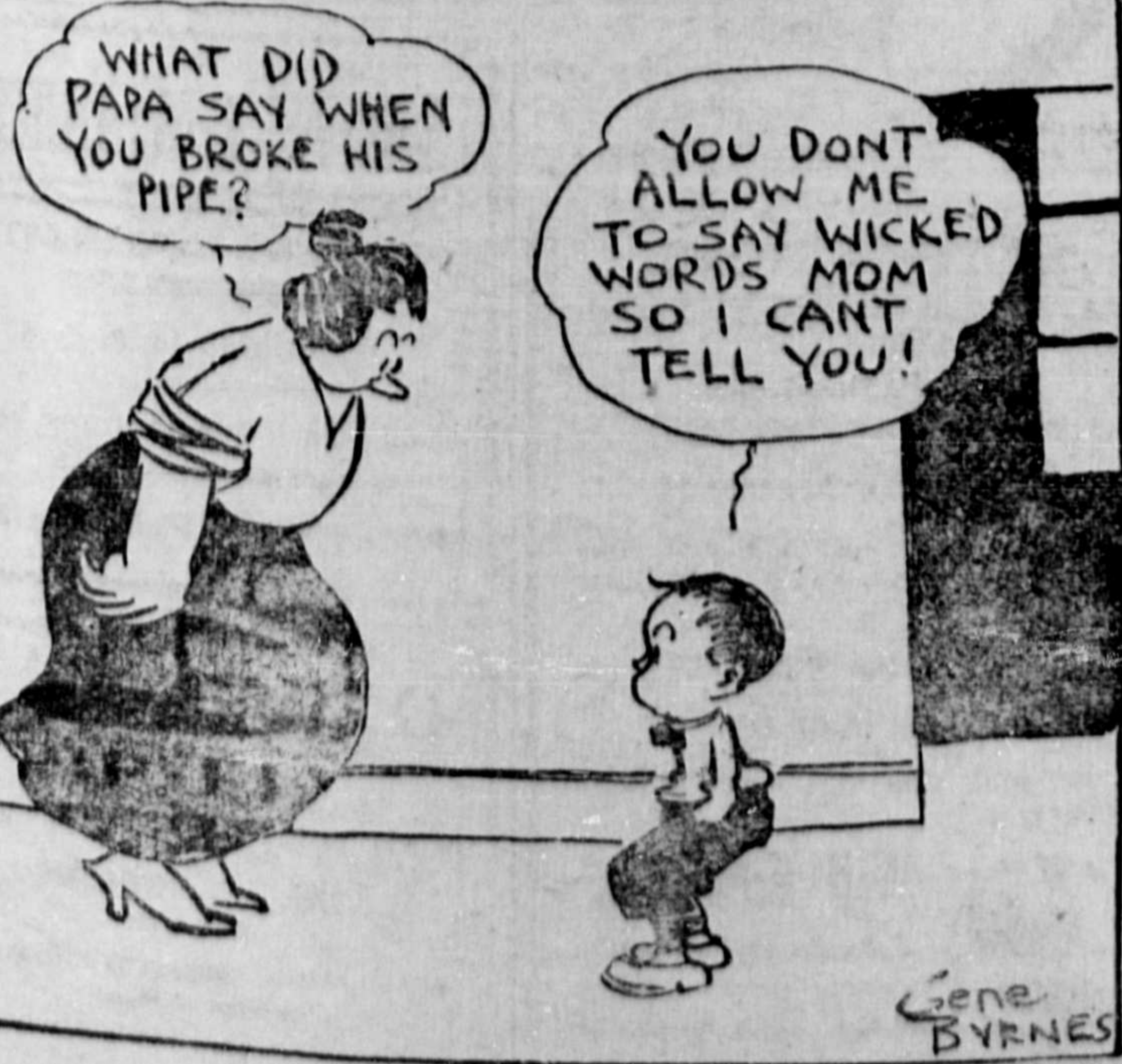

HYDRO ELECTRIC

In the Telkwa district there has been more development work than ever before. This has been all exploitation work but considerable production is looked for in 1920. The Skeena Mining and Milling company has purchased a site and will install a hydro-electric plant and 50 ton water concentrator on Hudson Bay Mountain, 12 miles from the town of Smithers. Work is continuing all winter on the Babine Bonanza, better known as "Cronin's Mine." This property is connected with the town of Telkwa, a distance of about 30 miles. Besides the regular mineral development the Telkwa Collieries are steadily mining coal at the Telkwa mines. This coal is improving in quality as depth is attained and a good quality of coal is now being mined. It is said there is enough in sight to supply all Northern B.C. if an emergency came.

MINES REPORT FOR OMINECA

Output Nearly as Great in 1919 as Before, Despite Lessened Copper Production.

TELKWA COLLIERIES PRODUCING STEADILY

J. D. Galloway, resident engineer for the interior mineral district, reports favorable progress in his district during 1919 and a total production nearly as large as that in 1918. The actual production of placer gold has decreased somewhat and, like other districts, the production of copper is also lower on account of the cessation of war activities. The most of the silver, lead and zinc in the district was produced by the Silver Standard mine at Hazelton. Fifteen hundred tons of coal were mined at Telkwa during the year.

The district is reported still in the prospect stage although several mines have been brought to the shipping class. It is expected that the great increase in population, due to land settlement, will add to the prospecting activity. During the past year the "boom" in the Stewart and Alice Arm districts has somewhat detracted from the interior district. Generally speaking, the future outlook is good and steady growth in the development and production of the district may be looked for.

Activity at Usk.

The town of Usk, situated 100 miles from here, was the scene of considerable mining activity during the year. A concentrating mill is now in operation for use in preparing gold and bornite for shipping. Copper values have also been brought to the surface although little shipment has yet been done. A power plant is now in course of construction on the completion of which development work will be enabled to go on with increased expedition. Silver and copper showings have been proved at Pacific along with lead and galena. Many trails have been made in the hills which make the problem of transportation of supplies much easier.

SILVER STANDARD

The only producing mine in the Hazelton district was the Silver Standard as the Roche de Boule, the big copper producer, was closed up all year. Development on the Standard during the year was very satisfactory and considerable ore has been steadily stopped during the period from the main vein with a considerable tonnage still in reserve. The Standard mill now treats 25 tons per day and is running well. During the winter, however, the water supply is frequently frozen up. An oil flotation plant is now being considered which would be more efficient and generally satisfactory.

K. L. Rauk, accompanied by his wife and two little girls, left on the Princess Beatrice for Vancouver last night. He is going to obtain medical treatment for the eldest girl and may go East. He will resume the printing business in the city on his return in a month or so.

C. C. Perry, Indian agent, spent the week-end at Usk and visited the Usk and Kitselas reserves. Mr. Perry is advising the Indians to keep away from town while the influenza epidemic is threatened here. Last year he had a number of bad cases on his hands.

Mr. and Mrs. D. A. Harris came down from Stewart on the Prince John yesterday afternoon.

BIG SHIPMENT OF ORE FROM PREMIER MINE

Steamer Prince John Brought 250 Tons and Will proceed to Tacoma After Call at Islands.

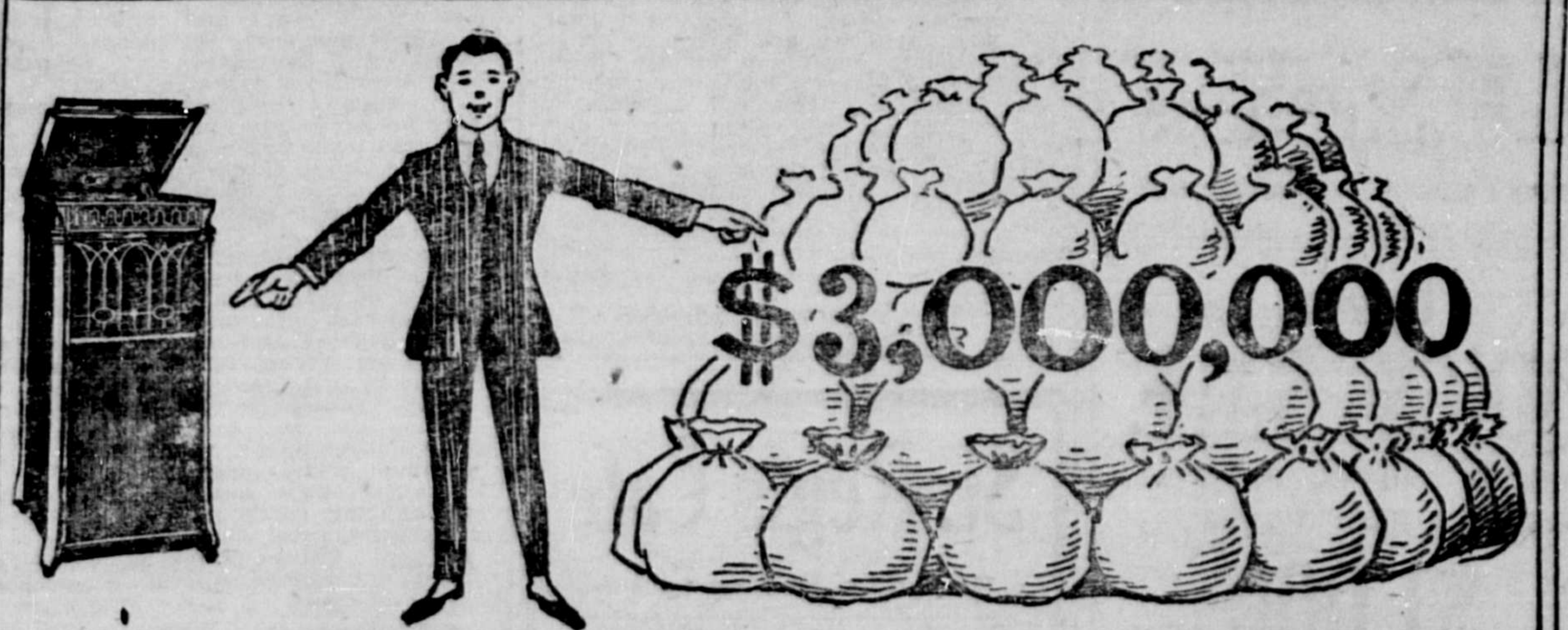

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be issued as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of the deceased to five years, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 24, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers raised; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may turn over claim whole of range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
