Irish Home Rule Bill Now Before People of Britain

Very Little Different from Outline made Before Christmas By Premier Lloyd George in House of Commons.

Two Parliaments for Five Years With Separate Courts

Reception of Proposals is not very Favorable; Belfast Paper Recognizes Good Features but others Oppose.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
LONDON, March 1.—Premier Lloyd George's new plan for settlement of the Home Rule question in Ireland has been before the British people. The official text of the bill laid before the House of Commons on Wednesday has been made public. It is practically identical in its larger phases with the plan given out last December.

Under the bill two parliaments are to be set up, each for a year term, the members to meet yearly and to be under the control of the Lord Lieutenant.

The southern parliament is to have 128 members. The northern parliament will have 52, representing the counties of Armagh, Londonderry, Fermanagh and Tyrone and the Boroughs of Londonderry and Belfast.

The southern section will be required to pay 56 per cent of the expenses.

The legal system is to be separate, separate supreme courts established for north and south.

Press Reception.
The press reception of the Home Rule Bill is rather mixed. Times recognizes the bill as based on sound principles within limits, but says that it conveys the impression that the framers lack the full courage of their convictions.

DUBLIN, March 1.—Freeman's Journal refers to the new Bill as "a proposal for the plunder and partition of Ireland," and characterizes it as "a thievish measure."

The reception of the Home Rule Bill here is generally unfavorable. Constitutionalists are not discussing it and are awaiting Horace Plunkett's announcement next Thursday regarding the United States opinion.

Favorable Comment.
Belfast, March 1.—Comment is made on the Irish Home Rule Bill by the Belfast Unionist Press. The Northern Whig said the Bill's recognition of the distinction between Ulster and the remainder of Ireland as a considerable step forward and says it is likely to influence any future legislative attempts in Ireland.

The Irish News condemns the measure as not having "a single redeeming feature."

GRAIN GROWERS EXTEND SCOPE

Company in British Columbia is Being Reorganized.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
VICTORIA, March 1.—The United Grain Growers of British Columbia, Ltd., are being reorganized and their powers extended. At a meeting of directors representing eight locals and 800 shareholders in all parts of the province, C. Rice Jones of Winnipeg, general manager of Grain Growers Ltd., laid before the British Columbia organization a plan whereby British Columbians can cooperate more in the control of the corporation.

The B. C. representation on the executive is being increased from one to three.

ASK TENDERS FOR GASOLINE BOATS

Fisheries Department Wishes to Charter Two for Season.

The Fisheries Department of the Dominion Government is asking tenders for the charter of two sixty-foot gasoline launches for use in the fisheries patrol service. One will be used in the Rivers Inlet vicinity and the other in Chatham Sound and the east coast of Queen Charlotte Islands. The boats should have a speed of ten miles and accommodation for two people other than the crew.

VETERAN PRIEST DIES AT EDMONTON

Father Julien Moulin was at Batoche During Riel Rebellion and Was Wounded.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
EDMONTON, March 1.—Rev. Julien Moulin, one of the pioneer missionaries of this district, is dead here today. Father Moulin was born in France 90 years ago and entered the oblate order and was ordained a priest in 1857. In 1858 he went to the Red-River settlement and since has done missionary work among the Indians and half breeds at Isle a La Crosse, Reindeer Lake and Batoche. He was at Batoche in 1885 when General Middleton went to quell the Riel Rebellion. His mission was in the centre of activities but instead of leaving he unflinchingly stayed with his work. He was accidentally wounded by a stray bullet during the hostilities.

BIG INCREASE IN CUSTOMS RECEIPTS

OTTAWA, March 1.—An increase of \$19,962,896 in customs receipts for the eleven months of the fiscal year ending yesterday was shown by customs department figures issued. The receipts for the eleven months totalled \$163,537,100, while last year was \$143,564,204. For February alone the increase was \$3,481,688.

HELGOLAND DISMANTLED

Was an Impregnable Barred Two Years Ago—Now Inoffensive.

BERLIN, March 1.—Heligoland, the fortress that two years ago was an impregnable barrier against the allied sea power, is today dismantled. Only a short time was needed to make it an inoffensive island.

United States Railways Are Returned to Former Owners; Wage Dispute to be Settled

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WASHINGTON, March 1.—President Wilson signed the Railway Bill Saturday evening on the eve of the return of the roads to their owners and to private operation. The railways passed back to private ownership at 12:1 a. m. this morning.

The White House also made public the text of a letter written by Mr. Wilson to representatives of the railroad brotherhoods, who had asked him to name a commission composed entirely of employers and employees' delegates to consider the wage demands. The president tells the union men that the Railroads Bill provides for a bi-partisan board to work on the wage question.

BOSTON, March 1.—The resumption of private control of railways in New England is accompanied by a curtailment of the service in order to expedite needed food and fuel deliveries.

NEW YORK, March 1.—The return of the railways to private control stimulated further buying of railway shares and similar offerings on the stock market.

Alex. Manson Asks Order For an Audit

Matter Adjourned One Day to Give Erb's Solicitor Opportunity to Oppose

(Special by Government wire.)
VANCOUVER, March 1.—A writ was issued this morning by A. M. Manson, a shareholder, against the Dry Dock Company asking an order forcing the officials to give A. P. Foster, auditor, access to the books, accounts and vouchers and to give explanations where necessary.

Immediate action is asked in the ex-parte application to Mr. Justice Macdonald but judgment was deferred one day so that Erb's solicitors could be given notice.

It was shown in the affidavit that the order in council was issued directing Mr. Foster to audit the books at a remuneration of \$30 daily, but on arrival at Prince Rupert he was refused access by direction of Erb and unable to make the audit. It was urged that the order in council should be obeyed. The auditors' fees are steadily amounting up.

The Judge refused to grant application ex-parte while litigation is pending although he saw no reason why the order in council should not be enforced, thus hence the adjournment.

MUTINY AMONG KOVNO TROOPS

Machine and Rifle Fire Centred on Parliament Buildings for 24 Hours.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

WARSAW, March 1.—Lithuanian troops mutinied in Kovno on February 21, besieged the Parliament Buildings for 24 hours to enforce the demands for back pay. The railway station and other parts of the city were subjected to artillery fire. The attackers continually fired upon the Parliament and other Government buildings with rifles and machine guns.

Loyal troops finally suppressed the mutiny, which report attributes to Bolshevism.

Military Plans Are Rudely Interfered With by Politicians

Sir Arthur Currie Tells of Reasons for Attack by Canadians on Passchendaele Ridge with its Awful Losses.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

OTTAWA, March 1.—The story of the attack of the Canadians on Passchendaele Ridge and particularly the reasons for that desperate and successful blow to the enemy's morale was told by General Sir Arthur Currie to the Old Comrades' Association of the Princess Pats at their annual dinner on Saturday.

General Currie said that while the wisdom of Passchendaele attack had been much debated and the battle actually cost the Canadians 17,000 casualties, it was necessary in order to establish the morale of the Allied troops and to silence the peace talk in the Allied countries in 1917, when the plans of Foch and Haig for the campaigns of 1917 were rudely interfered with by politicians.

10. Namu Area.

There is also a description of the areas in District 3.

JUVENILES APPEARED BEFORE JUDGE YOUNG

Boy Stole From Cabin at Seal Cove and was Let off on Suspended Sentence.

Elwood Bard, aged 16, appeared in the police court this morning, charged with stealing gas engine appliances and household goods from a cabin at Seal Cove. He was committed for trial before Judge Young where he was severely reprimanded and let out on suspended sentence.

The boy stated that he had gained his criminal notions from Bill Hart and other movie bad men. He was warned to keep away from the movies during his period of suspension and his father was put under a \$500 bond to see that the boy carried out the various terms of suspension. Two other lads, who bought the stolen goods unwittingly, were witnesses. They were also warned by the judge to steer clear of doubtful transactions.

KILLED IN ACCIDENT CAR STRUCK A TRAIN

VANCOUVER, March 1.—W. G. F. Goodwin, of Vancouver, was killed and John Hanbury, the well known lumberman, injured on Saturday in an accident when a B. C. Electric interurban train struck the auto in which they were driving to the city at Strathcona crossing.

LITHUANIANS REBELLED OVER MATTER OF PAY

Machine Guns and Artillery Used Against the Government Buildings.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

LONDON, March 1.—A wireless despatch from Warsaw under date of Saturday, says the recent revolt of Lithuanian troops at Kovno, occurred on February 22 when several units who had agitated for deferred pay were ordered to assemble and confer with Government representatives.

The men refused to obey orders on the advice of Bolsheviki agitators and directed a machine gun fire against the Government buildings throughout a day and night. At the same time the artillery bombarded the railway station and various parts of the town.

BIG CATCH OF HERRING IN B. C.

January of this Year Showed a Large Increase Over Last Season.

OTTAWA, Mar. 1.—Due mainly to the greatly increased catch of herring in British Columbia during January, the total value of the sea fish at the point of landing shows a great advance over the month of January, 1919.

The total value of the sea fish landed in Canada during January of the present year was \$962,840. In January, 1919, it was \$608,256.

Fishing operations on the Atlantic coast were interrupted by unusual cold and stormy weather. Herring were in great abundance in Nanaimo, Alberni and Clayoquot districts of British Columbia. The catch amounted to 360,000 cwt. against 75,200 cwt. for January, 1919.

About the same quantity of halibut was landed during January this year as in 1919.

Car Shortage Is General.

A. L. Hagar of the New England Fish Company has been telling the people of Vancouver of the difficulties of the fishing business. He says that there are no cars at Seattle or at Prince Rupert, and even at Vancouver a request for cars has to pass two separate commissions and then sometimes they cannot get them.

It will be some time before the railways have plenty of cars to keep them going. There is a shortage of everything, including food, clothing, houses and cars. All we have to do is to produce and wait for better times.

Labor Conscriptio Plan in Russia.

The labor conscription plan as outlined by Leon Trotzky and summarized in a press despatch received Saturday proved very interesting reading. Allowing for discrepancies which might creep in when making the summary and also in transmission, it seems clear that the Red Armies are to be set to work under military dictatorship, such as has never been even suggested in any of the British self-governing countries.

As a matter of fact freedom is not a thing that is granted, it is something that grows. A people must feel free and act free or there is no freedom. Changing a form of government is sometimes an aid to the development of a free spirit, but it is never an end and the degree of freedom of a people is not dependent upon it.

Will Not Believe Anything Told.

There is a section of the community that will not believe anything derogatory to the Soviet Government of Russia. They have made up their minds that the Soviet is all right and they absolutely refuse to see anything but perfection in it.

Unfortunately there is a lot of propaganda done on both sides. The propaganda system of the Soviet Government is a very complete one. It is hardly to be expected then that if the "perfect" Government employs propaganda the others should not.

It is difficult to believe, however, now that the war is over and things are settling down, that all the stories that come from Russia are propaganda. The report of the speech as telegraphed through from Winnipeg to the Daily News here on Saturday quoted the words of the Russian minister of war and bore all the earmarks of fact.

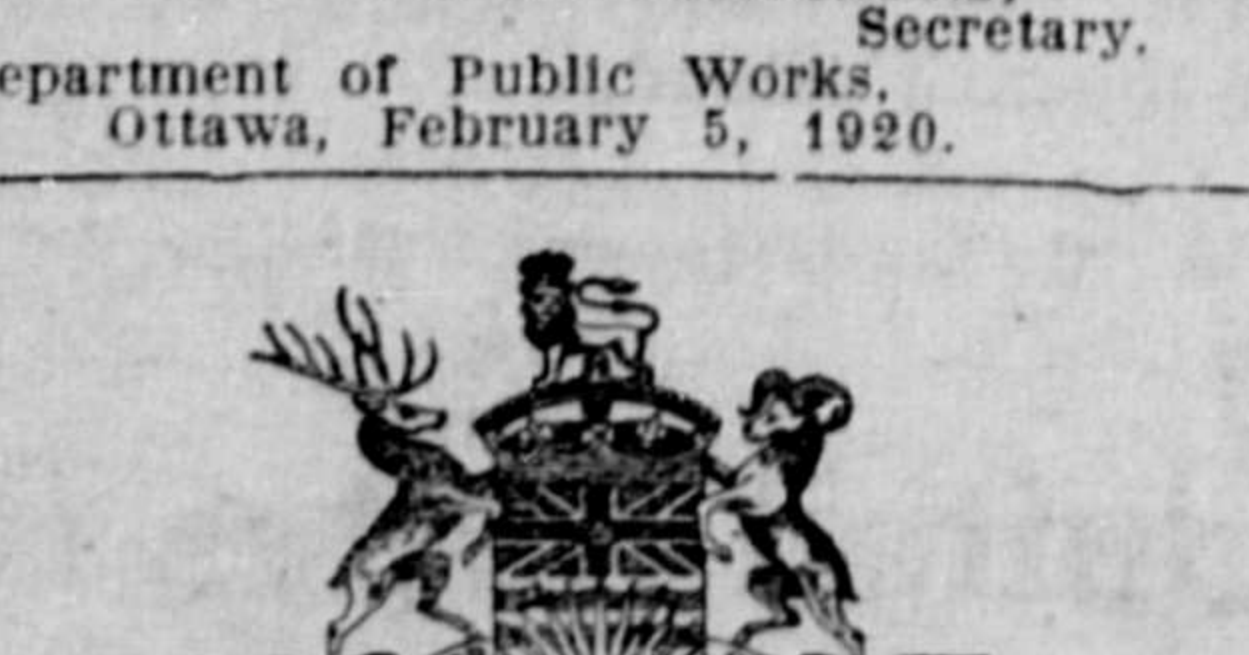

Tolls Montrealers of Land Settlement Areas to be Opened by Province.

CATTLE TO BE SOLD TO THE NEW SETTLERS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) MONTREAL, Feb. 28.—W. P. Hinton, vice-president and general manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, interviewed here today, stated that the Government of British Columbia is now about to open five new land settlement areas adjacent to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, in M. . . Trunk Pacific. Each of these areas will be approximately 50,000 acres situated in the Bulkley and Nechako valleys. It is estimated that these new districts will receive 20,000 new settlers during the present year, the bulk of them coming from the United States with a proportion from Southern Alberta, said Mr. Hinton. The British Columbia Government is also selling on easy terms some 3,800 head of cattle to new settlers along the Grand Trunk Pacific this year.

NEW ADRIATIC TREATY SOON

Proposal Before President Wilson to Start Over Again.

HAD NO INTENTION OF SLIGHTING STATES

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) LONDON, Feb. 28.—The Reply made by Premiers Lloyd George and Millerand to President Wilson's latest communication on the Adriatic question, repeats the assurance that the absence of an American representative had proved in practice an almost insurmountable obstacle to success of the negotiations. WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—The invitation of the British and French premiers to President Wilson to join them in a proposal to the Italian and Jugo-Slav Governments to negotiate a new Adriatic settlement on the basis of the withdrawal of all previous agreements, is now before the president and a reply is expected to be given within a few days.

NO PRICE SET FOR SUGAR BY AUTHORITY

Test Case to be Made to See if Control is of Value.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.) OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—For the specific purpose of proving whether or not activities of the Board of Commerce of Canada has been effective in keeping down excessive profits, the board has abolished its control of sugar and the fixed price of sixteen cents a pound at the refineries no longer obtains. The price was based on the cost of production.

TWENTY MILLION FOR SHIPBUILDING

Ballantyne Will Ask Parliament for Enough to Complete Government Program.

OTTAWA, March 1.—Hon. G. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine, stated that the Government would ask Parliament for a vote of \$20,000,000 to complete the Government mercantile marine shipbuilding program. The Government plan called for a total of 62 ships and of these 32 have already been launched.

WAUGH ON COMMISSION

OTTAWA, March 1.—It is understood that R. D. Waugh of Winnipeg has been named as Canada's representative on the Saar Valley Commission created by the treaty between the Allies and Germany.

HARRISON POSTMASTER

OTTAWA, March 1.—Assistant Postmaster Harrison of Vancouver has been appointed postmaster at that city, it is announced officially by Hon. Dr. Roche, chairman of the Civil Service Commission.

WEEKLY SERVICE TO STEWART AND TO MASSET INLET

Prince Albert and Prince John to Commence Frequent Trips This Week.

Owing to the early opening up of the camps and the steady movement of business to Stewart and Masset Inlet points the Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship Service will commence a regular weekly service to those points with the prince Albert and Prince John.

While Stewart is not really ready for the people who are coming, owing to the snow on the ground, people are flocking in to that mining camp and the G. T. P. are preparing to look after them. Commencing Thursday of this week the weekly service will open and continue right along.

At Masset Inlet there are at least eighty men working at Buckley Bay and the Prince Rupert Lumber Co. is just opening a camp with half a hundred men at Shannon Bay. Other camps are expected to open soon and the mills at Port Clements are cutting lumber. This is in addition to the fishing business which will open soon and the whaling at North Island.

WILL PROSECUTE OFFENDERS AGAINST PROHIBITION ACT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Persons violating the federal prohibition law will be prosecuted irrespective of any state statutes legalizing the sales of liquor.

TORONTO NEWSBOYS PLACE BAN ON ALL HEARST NEWSPAPERS

TORONTO, Feb. 28.—The news boys of this city have put the ban on all Hearst publications because of the "un-British" policy. They refuse to sell any of them in future.

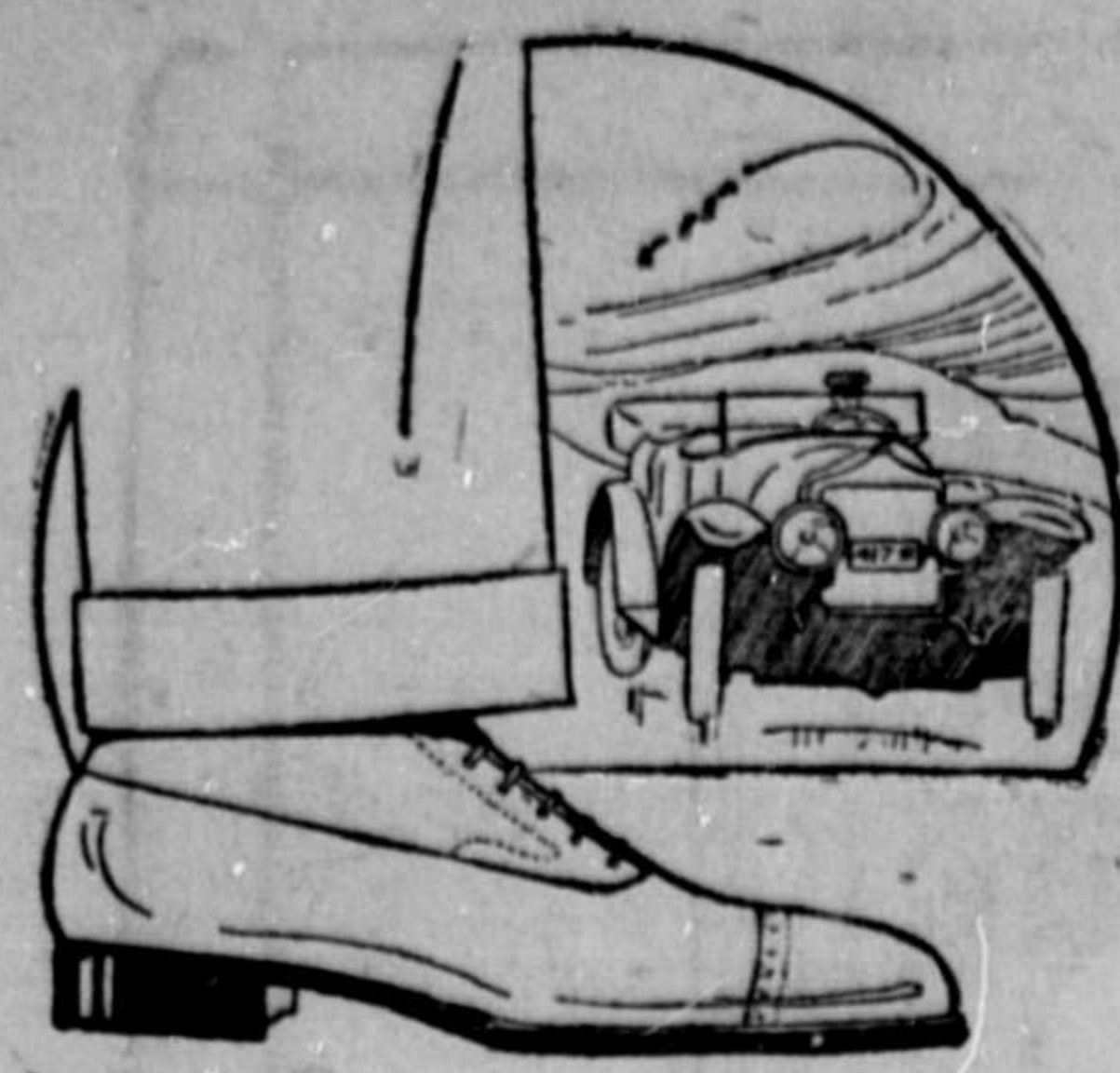

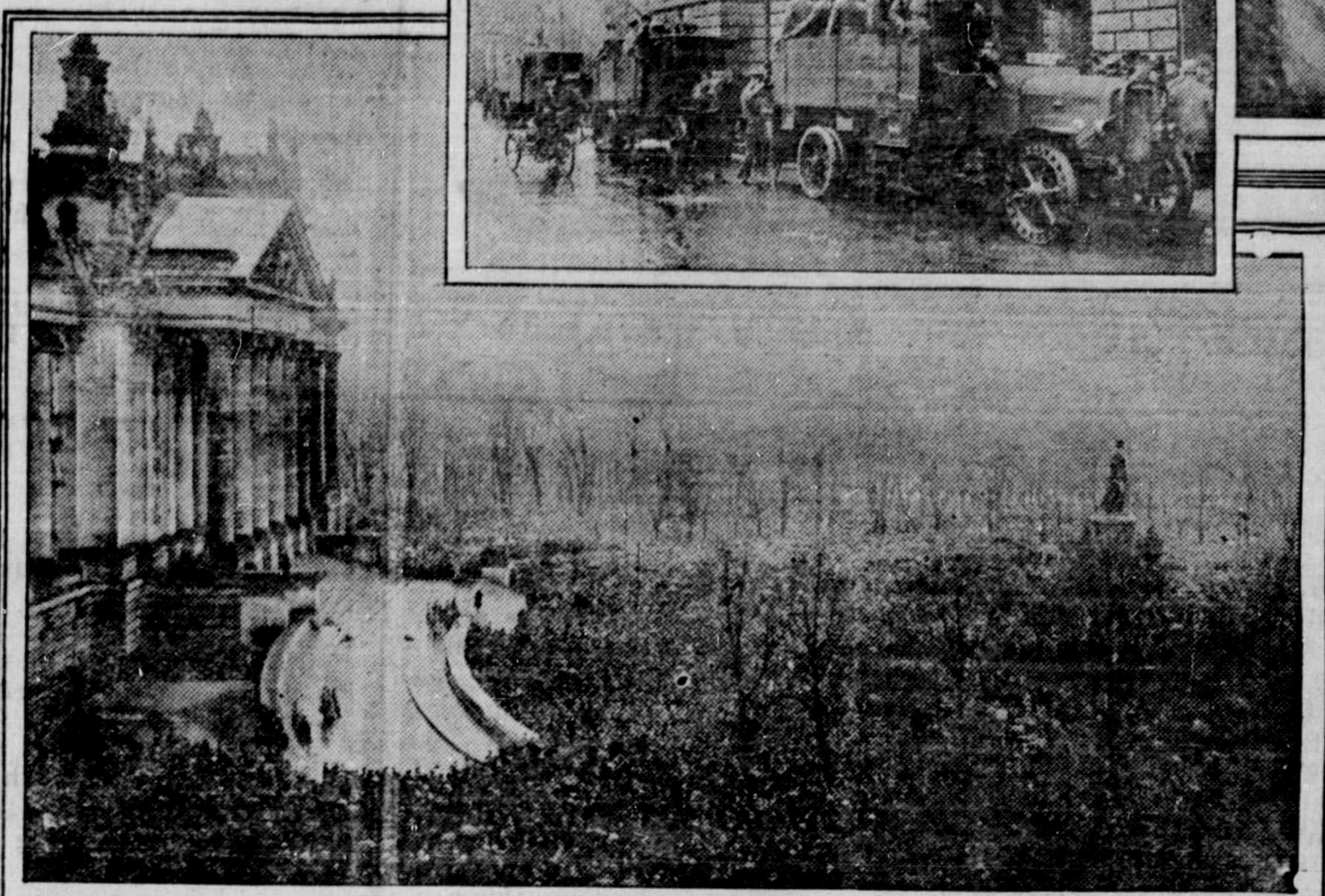

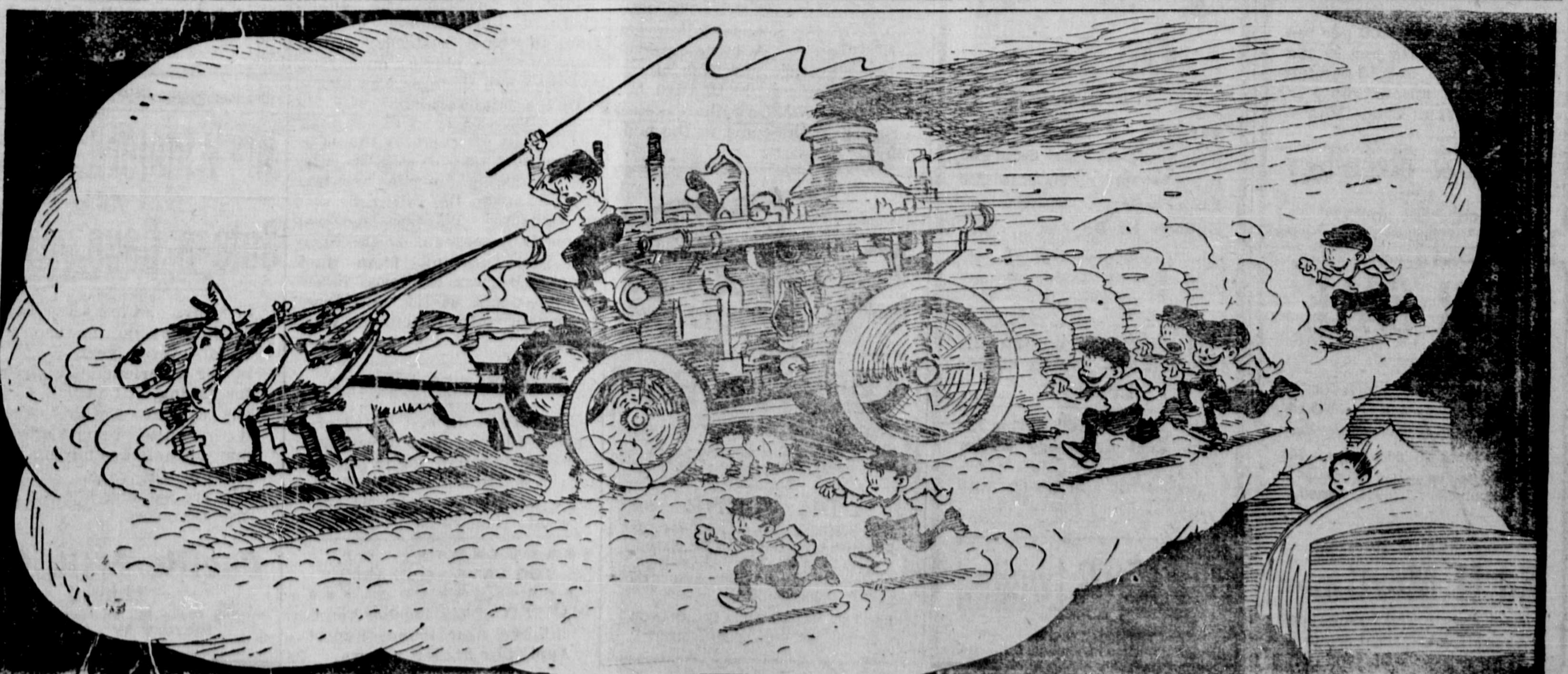
