## Bad Condition of Steamer Prince John Now in Port

### Chief Engineer Cochrane had Narrow Escape when Collision Occurred; Delay in Salvage would have meant Loss of Vessel

The steamer Prince John, a besotted drunk after a long debauch, the steamer Prince John came into the harbor last evening, dirty, evil smelling and with a decided list to port. While delapidated and in a state of disrepair, she came under her own power and like a drunkard, was still able to make a noise, for her siren shrilled out as clear and long as if she had made a triumphant entry. Eleven hours it took to cross Aliflor Bay to Prince Rupert harbor and her engines did not stop for several days under water.

As soon as the word got around that the vessel had made her berth No. 1, where she tied up, the objective of curious onlookers and many people went to take a look at the boat. The vessel was on the stern on the starboard side and directly in front of the wireless cabin, is the vessel when they collided. The vessel was patched up by the crew of the steamer with lumber so that she was seaworthy.

#### Close Call.

The crew from Captain Moorehouse down were a dirty and weary looking lot when they arrived, all with strange tales to tell of their experiences. Many of them lost their belongings, and, while standing by with the vessel, had to camp on shore.

#### Coated with Oil.

The vessel is coated with a thick coat of oil right up to the hull, showing that the only way the vessel had not sunk was the cabin on the deck where the pilot house officers' quarters are located. The furnishings and fittings of the passenger quarters were ruined. Ten thousand worth of sugar on board went into syrup and was ruined. Lumber floated out of the open hatches and the cement is a solid cake. Furniture, which comprised part of her cargo, has also been badly damaged. No. 1 shed was prepared to receive all the salvaged cargo and after discharging it the vessel is going on the dry dock for survey and estimate as to damage.

The Prince Rupert Dry Dock and Engineering Co. will also tender on the work.

LONDON, April 13.—The general strike called at Dublin as a protest against the imprisonment of political prisoners, who are on a hunger strike, began this morning. The attorney-general for Ireland, in reply to a question in the House of Commons, said that according to the latest information the strikers in Mountjoy prison at Dublin were all weak, some nearing the danger zone. The attorney-general added that they had all been forewarned of the consequences of their conduct.

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## Conviction of Duff Has Been Reversed

### Former Constable of this City is Now Out on Bail Awaiting Trial on Theft Charges in Connection with Liquor

That Simon V. Duff, ex-constable, who was committed to serve nine months at Okalla Prison Farm by Magistrate McMordie last February for offering to sell and exposing for sale intoxicating liquor, had been dismissed from this charge was the word received from the south in a telegram to L. W. Patmore this morning.

Stuart Henderson, K. C., of Victoria, has been working on the grounds of insufficient evidence for some time and has at last been able to secure acquittal for the prisoner. Duff still awaits trial on the theft charge and is out on \$1,000 of his own bail and two sureties of \$500 each. The theft charge will be heard at the next Supreme Court sittings, probably to be held in June.

CORK, April 13.—The inquest into the murder of Lord Mayor MacCurtain, which began a fortnight ago, but was adjourned over the Easter holidays, resumed, but again adjourned. Summonses calling for the attendance of Field Marshal Viscount French and Sir John Taylor, under-secretary to the Lord Lieutenant, were issued. The summonses are returnable next Saturday. They were issued following the presentation by the jury of a resolution saying: "Seeing that Dublin Castle authorities are said to be aware of the identity of murderers and the move inspiring the crime, we desire the attendance of the Lord Lieutenant and Sir John Taylor, under secretary."

Three operating mines in this British Columbia this season will represent three separate districts and make the towns of Stewart, Alice Arm and Atlin alike boom camps, said George A. Clothier, resident mining engineer, yesterday afternoon to a News representative.

In the Stewart and Alice Arm districts there are many mines under development and many of them show great promise. Nothing, however, can be said of these until they have been proven.

Other Properties. A lot of these companies will, no doubt, fall through on account of not having sufficient funds to carry out development work.

## TELEPHONE SWITCHBOARD TO BE BOUGHT

Recommendations of the Utilities Committee to This Effect Adopted Last Night.

A new switchboard costing \$3,597 f. o. b. Rochester, N. Y., is to be bought from the Stromberg-Carlson Co. for the city telephone department. By the time the switchboard reaches here it will cost \$5,106, including freight and duty. This decision was made at last night's meeting when the city council adopted the recommendation of the utilities committee. Ald. McLennan inquired if this could have been bought in Canada and was answered by Superintendent Duncan that the department had delayed the purchase two months to try to do so but without avail.

Three transformers costing \$873 each are also to be purchased for the light department to carry the extra 350 h. p. load to the sawmill at Seal Cove. These will be bought from the Maloney Co. through the agent, Frank Darling of Vancouver. The mill contract and other points were thoroughly discussed before the utilities committee report on this matter was adopted.

## COL. BARKER GETS ANOTHER DECORATION

Now Holds More Than Any Other Living British Airman.

TORONTO, April 12.—Lieut.-Col. Wm. G. Barker, V. C., D.S.O., has been awarded the second silver medal by the King of Italy for his wonderful and heroic fighting in October, 1918, in which he tackled sixty Huns singlehanded and shot down nine of them before he was brought down by enemy fire.

Col. Barker now holds more decorations than any other living British airman.

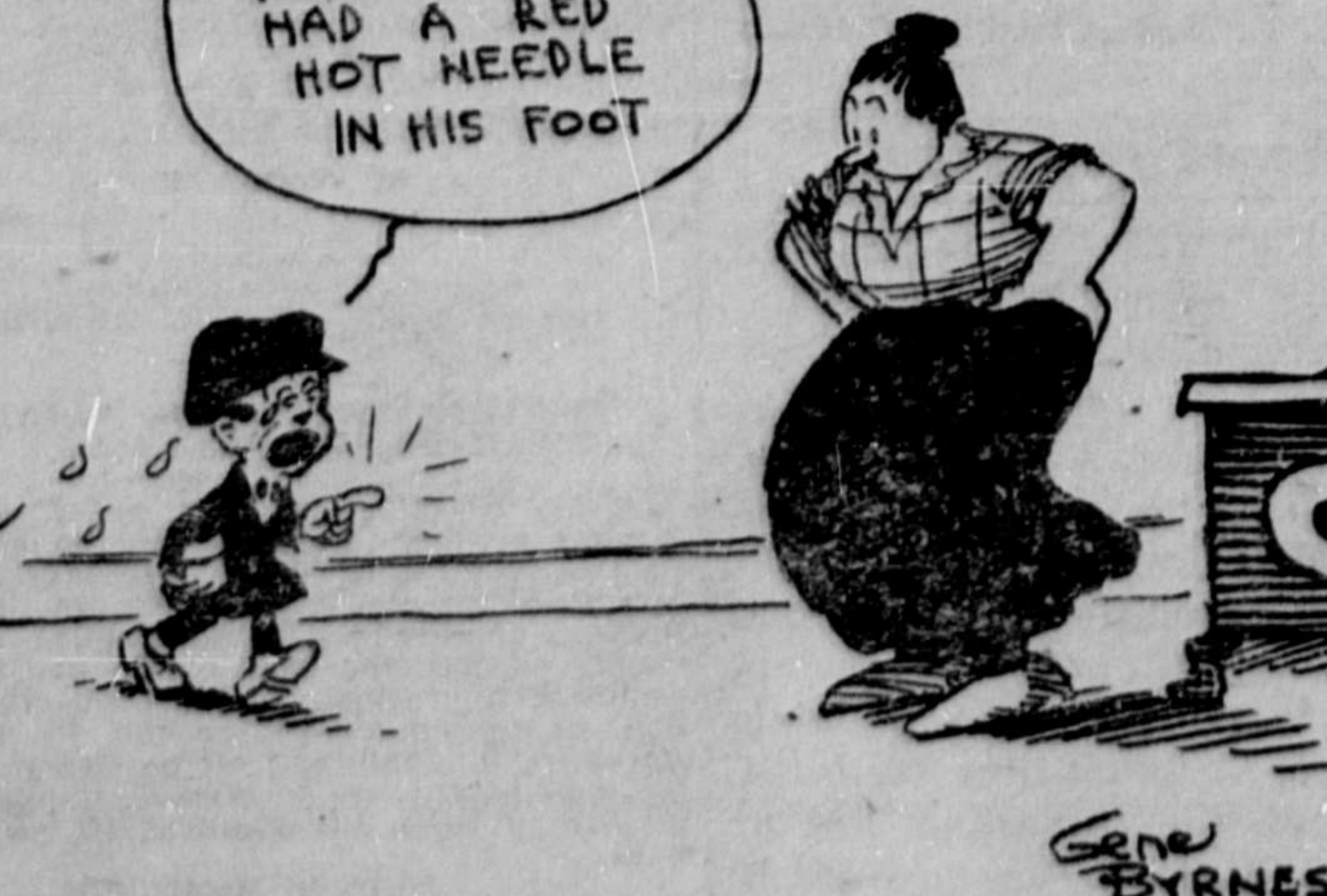

### In the Letter Box

#### CITY TRANSPORTATION

To the Editor.—We read with interest an item in your issue of Saturday last the 10th inst., during a conference between the Board of Trade and the City Works Committee, a statement made by the city engineer regarding the size of loads carried by the busses, etc. It seems worthy of note that the department responsible for the upkeep of roads should admit their neglect and failure to such an extent that the roads have been allowed to become in a condition unsafe for the traffic, which, we can safely say, is of much lower tonnage than the city's own fire department trucks, which are very necessary vehicles using the roads for the safety of the city. In the event of a regulation which might force us to discontinue our bus service, what preparation is the road department making in case of fire? As surely in the circumstances the present fire trucks will be unsafe on such roads. Also what conveniences do they intend to adopt for the public?

It has been our endeavor in the past to give the public a means of transportation so much needed especially to the residential and those whose business and work take them in the vicinity of Seal Cove, and which we believe has been greatly appreciated by the public, particularly during the bad spells of weather.

We would like to point out this fact, outside of the business proposition on our part, that a means of transportation, especially to a growing city, is an asset of consideration, but, it seems, the object of the present administration of the city is to hinder progress by making it difficult for those who are helping along in that direction.

According Prince George Citizen Ex-City Clerk and Police Commissioner are Charged.

Sensational charges have been laid against two civic officials of Prince George in the persons of ex-city clerk G. R. Fisher and police commissioner Ex-Alderman T. M. Watson. The former was arrested on Saturday last and the latter last Thursday, according to the Prince George Citizen.

Discrepancies totalling a considerable sum were found, which indicated that the city clerk had misappropriated city funds to his own purposes. Ex-City Clerk Fisher is a returned man and was discharged by Mayor Perry shortly after his coming into office this year.

Police Commissioner Watson, who is a member of the commission by virtue of his heading the polls in the 1919 elections for this office, is charged with bribing a police officer, the charge being preferred by Chief Stewart.

## RAISE FOR WATER WORKS EMPLOYEES GIVEN LAST NIGHT

The report of the Board of Works that certain increases in wages to employees of the water department he granted was adopted. The increase granted provides for a raise in salary of Superintendent R. E. Walker from \$176 to \$185. Pipefitters Booth and Gustafson are both to get \$6.24 per day instead of \$6 as heretofore. The crew at Shawatlans are not raised, as their work is nearly through.

Ald. McLennan found fault with the matter of the applicants stating the percentages wanted. This matter should be left with the committee in charge for decision.

Alderman Kerr drew attention to the statement of the application that living costs had gone up 90 per cent since 1914. This was based on the finding of the recent Conciliation Board but was wrong. The cost of living, he maintained, had gone up much more than that.

## Sport Briefs

The appearance of new football players in the city causes much gratification in sport circles especially on account of the quality of playing some of these men have shown. This will promote a better class of playing and a greater interest in the game. The tricks and stunts of the old players are so well known that both players and spectators know pretty well what will happen and how they will perform. The new players are at the same time interesting to their opponents and to those watching the games. It keeps football from being too monotonous and acts as a tonic for the sport.

Dr. A. H. Bayne is by providence decreed a halibut fisherman. He was out over the week-end near Metlakatla trolling for the wary spring salmon when he felt an immense tug on the line. It was undoubtedly something alive for it pulled but not with the jerking and darting of the spring when snared on the hook of a fortunate fisherman. And that fish did pull for all it was worth, just like one would imagine a steady old tug boat would. Anyway the doctor pulled up his line and what did he land but a 100-lb. halibut who had gone astray from the usual fields and had got hungry doing so. It is not known whether the doctor took advantage of the 20c prices and sold the big fish for \$20 or not.

Folks who went up to the Acropolis grounds on Saturday to witness the football game remarked rather cruelly about Prince Rupert when they saw a little snow around the edges of the field and the players weren't any too gratified when they had to step in it either. There are worse places, however, furthest Edmonton. The following is taken from last Thursday's Bulletin: "A visit to the Diamond park is not very encouraging to the fans these days for there is nothing but ice and snow as far as the eye can reach inside of the de-lapidated board fence that surrounds the desolate looking ball park. In places the ice is a foot thick."

## CAPTAIN TROUP SAYS NOT TRYING BOYCOTT

C. P. R. Merely Desires Adequate Remuneration for Carrying the Mails.

A letter from Captain J. W. Troup, manager of C. P. R. Coast Steamships, was read at last night's council meeting and ordered filed. The letter set forth that the C. P. R. did not wish to boycott Prince Rupert in regard to mail service but had to receive adequate remuneration for its services. The decision to drop the matter was made on the information that the G. T. P. would soon be resuming its week end mail carrying service.

C. L. Montpe, who was recently appointed assistant tax commissioner with charge of the whole northern district of British Columbia from Queen Charlotte Islands to the boundary line and north to the Yukon, has opened an office in the Stephens Block adjoining the fisheries office. He will have charge of the collections of the Dominion Government income tax.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

**McQUARRIE IS CONVERTED ON THE FISHERIES**

Now Approves Change Made by Ottawa Government in This District.

"Elimination of the Japanese fishermen from the waters of British Columbia is the aim of the department of marine and fisheries at Ottawa," stated W. G. McQuarrie, member for New Westminster, upon his return from the Dominion capital, to New Westminster, as reported in the Vancouver Province.

"Of course, you understand," Mr. McQuarrie proceeded, "that is something which can not be done quickly. It will take some time, but I am satisfied that is what the department is endeavoring to bring about in as satisfactory a manner as the exigencies of the case will permit."

Mr. McQuarrie was speaking in connection with the regulations recently approved by Hon. Mr. Ballantyne, regulations which he declined to alter at the repeated request of interests from several parts of the Lower Mainland.

**North in Favor.** "The north," said Mr. McQuarrie, "is apparently very much in favor of the new laws. I saw much correspondence at Ottawa bearing on the matter, all approving the regulations and, as a matter of fact, the Prince Rupert Board of Trade passed a resolution of commendation after the text of the laws was made public."

"In reality," the member continued, "it is the north which is chiefly affected. The Fraser River men are not affected, aside from the fact that some of them may go north to fish. Fishermen on the Fraser can not be opposed, I think, for the regulations tend to reduce the number of licenses to be issued Japanese. For 1920 they are restricted to the 1919 quota, the smallest on record."

Mr. McQuarrie quite frankly admits that his attitude in respect to the regulations has undergone a change since he left for the east some weeks ago. He has worked hard to have the voice of the Lower Mainland people heard, but he is now of the opinion that the new rules are not only reasonable and should be tried out this year, but that they are really workable. He does not think they will have the disastrous effect prophesied. He is aware that the cannerymen object, but suggests this opposition is based largely on the proposal to throw cannery license open.

**Forty More Patrols.** He is convinced that adequate steps will be taken to protect the salmon on their way to the spawning beds and to this end forty additional fishery patrol boats will be put into active use this year at a cost of more than \$100,000. In the last analysis, he points out, the new rules gives the officials power to stop fishing at any time deemed essential.

Mr. McQuarrie adds that Hon. Mr. Ballantyne and W. A. Found, superintendent of fisheries, expect to be on the coast this summer and will no doubt be glad to hear evidence as to how the new laws operate. Mr. McQuarrie expects to be on the coast for about a week, his chief object in returning just now being to place his views and the information gleaned at Ottawa before his interested constituents.

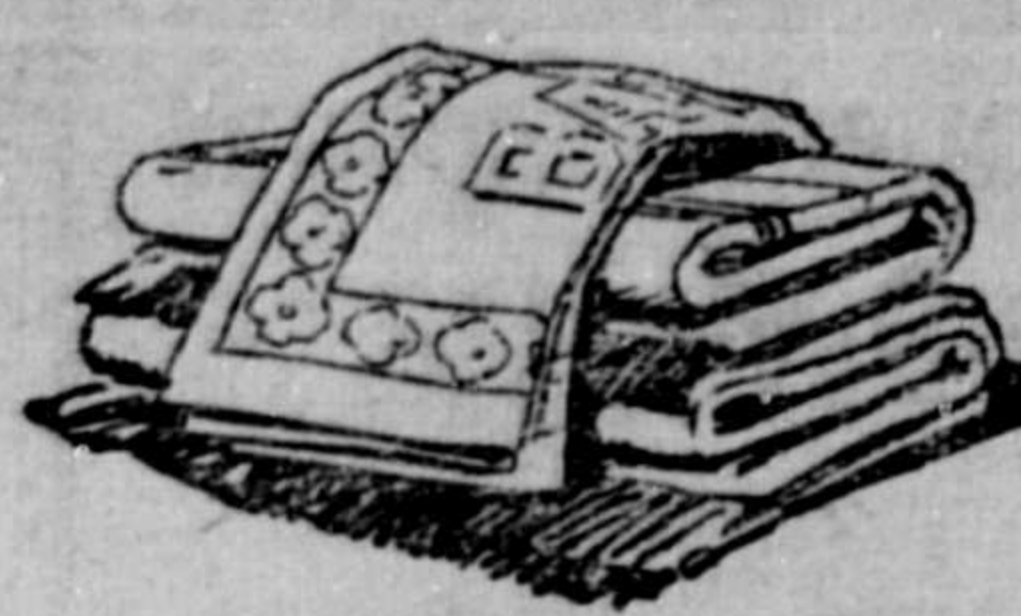
