## Premier Oliver on Public Affairs

### GOOD PUBLICITY FOR PRINCE RUPERT BY THE VICE-PRESIDENT OF THE G.T.P.

#### Head of Government Deals with the Dolly Varden Case

declares Elliott Charges False and Dares man to Come Out in open and make them

#### Makes Appeal to People to Work and Not to Talk

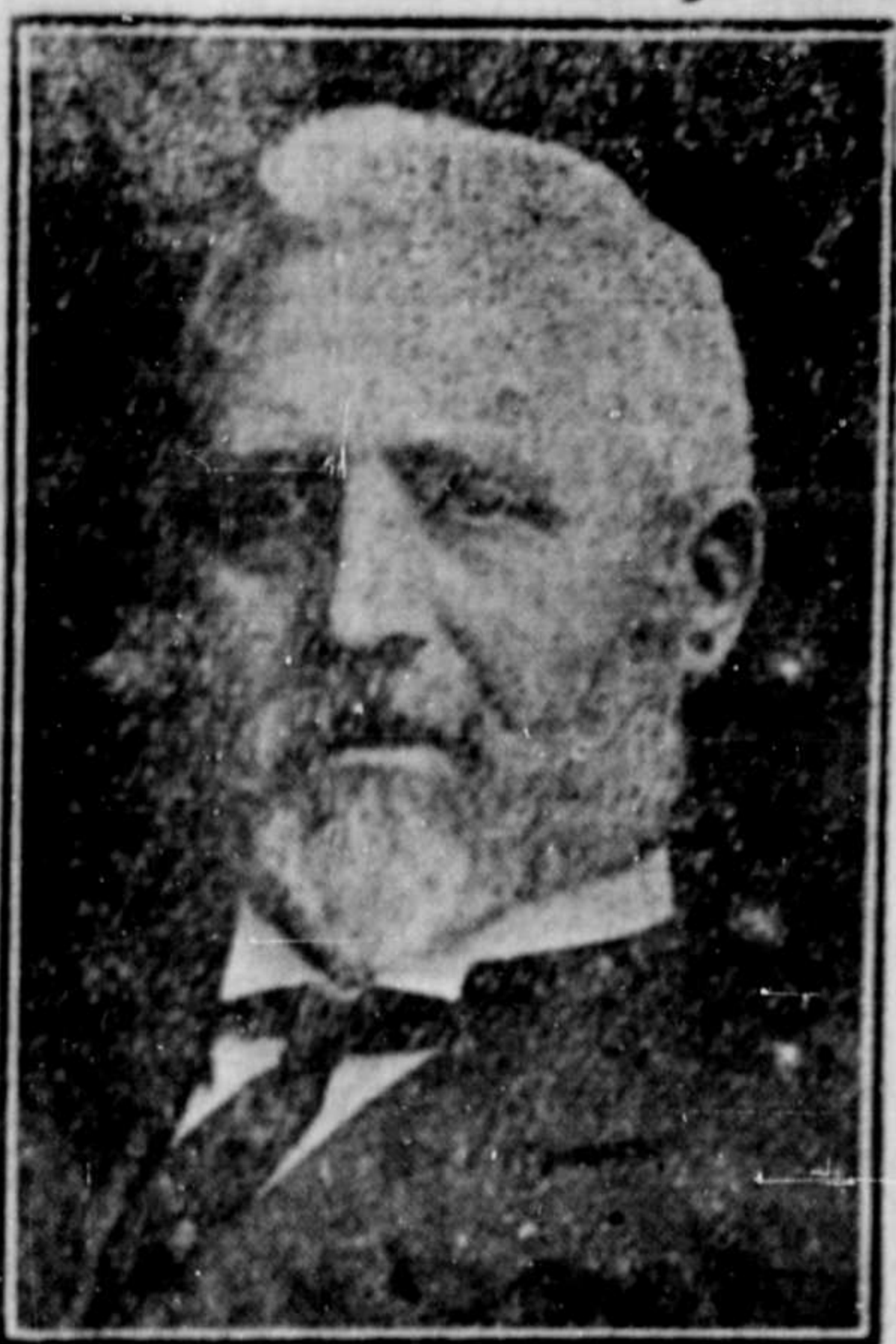
VANCOUVER, May 1.—Premier Oliver declared at a meeting last evening that the courts had no power to deal with the Dolly Varden case. He asserted that they could not throw out an unconstitutional act passed by the Legislature, because the Legislature made the laws. No act was ever passed, however, that was proof against a technicality.

The courts, the Premier said, were to interpret laws, but the Legislature was the supreme court.

Mr. Oliver said that he would deal with the Elliott charges on some future occasion "in my own time and in my own way." He said the charges are absolutely false and he dares the man making them to come out in the open and make them. "I defy anyone to make me guilty of wrong doing. I was never guilty of wrong doing in my public life," declared the Premier amid applause. He asserted it to be a shame that public men who manifestly do their best during these trying days should be distracted from their work by "false and malicious charges."

Same Man Who Dug Ditches.

After a lengthy review of the Dolly Varden case the Premier concluded with an appeal for a serious facing of conditions that prevail. "We must get back to normal. The Government has passed social legislation that means a heavy burden on the people. This problem is for all. The Government is made up of the same man who dug ditches and cleared land for the youth. It is up to you as well as to me to see that the interests of the province are being conducted in a regular, efficient manner. There must be more work and less talk," said the speaker. "We must be more men in the muck and grime and fewer in the cities and broadcloth. We must be true and give a chance to the generation that is to come. The life of this country is in the balance and it is your task to tip the balance the right way."

#### PROPOSALS IN MAYOR'S REPORT

Local Improvement Discussed by Council Committee, Also Trunk Road System Deal With.

At the committee meeting of the city council last night, the mayor's report on local improvement taxation was further considered and some definite proposals were set forward for changes in the system.

As already eight payments have been made by Section 1 ratepayers on local improvement work in that section, it was deemed unfair to change the system and place all local improvement taxes on a 50-50 basis without special consideration for them. Therefore it was proposed to put the whole remainder of the Section 1 local improvement tax on the city as a whole. Already one third of this tax has been paid by Section 1 taxpayers and the remainder is in the neighborhood of \$700,000.

The contingencies arising in the case of the trunk road being made were also considered. If a trunk road is built it is proposed to place 25 per cent of the tax on the property abutting that road in each section, irrespective of the assessed valuation, placing an equal tax on each lot. Another 25 per cent will be placed on all other lots in the section not abutting the road and the remaining 50 per cent will be placed by general debentures on the whole city.

#### JUDGMENT AGAINST UNIVERSITY PROFS.

Court of Investigation Upholds Action of Governors.

WINNIPEG, May 1.—Judgment was given yesterday against the professors of Saskatchewan University in the matter of their dismissal. The judgment was a written document signed by three judges of the King's Bench appointed to investigate the action taken by the Board of Governors in relieving the professors of their positions.

#### Vancouver Airmen Want to Know about Funds of the Air Board of Canada

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

VANCOUVER, May 1.—Alleging incompetence of certain officials of the Air Board of Canada, members of the Air Service Association decided to ask the authorities at Ottawa to conduct a thorough investigation into the conduct of these officials while with the R. A. F. and also subsequent to their accepting positions under the board in the Dominion.

Among the questions asked are what amount of money was expended by the board to date and what proportion of it was used in travelling expenses. The Vancouver flying men also wish to know why officers of the Board made "Cook's Tours" to the aerial exhibitions in Chicago and New York last January and March respectively.

Lieut.-Col. J. A. Scott of the Air Board is at present in British Columbia in connection with the issuing of certificates to pilots and, according to officials of the Air Service Association, their action is the answer to his inquiry why airmen of the province were not applying for certificates.

#### CRIMINALS SENTENCED AT ASSIZES

Ten Years for Shooting at Card Game and Five for Running Down With Auto.

TWO ARE LET OUT ON SUSPENDED SENTENCE

All Were Convicted of Manslaughter, Including One War Veteran.

VANCOUVER, May 1.—The criminal assizes closed here yesterday. There were six sentences passed by the trial judge as follows:

Blackie Ford, manslaughter of Andy Groven by shooting at a card game, ten years in the penitentiary.

Cecil Pynn, aged 19, manslaughter of Maud Green, who was fatally injured by Pynn when driving a stolen automobile, five years.

Alfred Simpson and Phillip Schrodt, auto drivers, on manslaughter charges, five years.

Oscar Ross, manslaughter of a man named Champion when drunk in a launch up the coast, suspended sentence.

James Rey Robinson, war veteran, who pleaded guilty to manslaughter, suspended sentence.

#### AMUNDSEN WILL MAKE FURTHER EXPLORATIONS

#### DOMINION LAW FOR HOURS FOR GIRLS

Royal Commission on Unification of Labor Laws to Make Recommendations

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

OTTAWA, May 1.—Dominion-wide application of the principle of a minimum wage and 48 hour week for all women and girls, excepting those engaged in domestic or agricultural employment, is strongly favored by the Royal Commission on the unification of labor laws, at a session held here yesterday.

#### New Tenders to be Called for Morse Creek Bridge

Specifications Changed with a view to a Cheaper Structure to Conform to Amount of Money Available

Meeting in committee as a whole, the City Council last night decided to call for new tenders for the Morse Creek bridge on revised and modified specifications which, it is hoped, will materially reduce the cost of the structure.

By the new plans there will be only one span in the bridge, that over the tracks of the railway. The rest of the bridge will be on bents instead of trusses. Instead of the two sidewalks on either side there will be only one 6-foot sidewalk, although the road will be of the same width—18 feet.

The provision for a portion of the bridge to be built of first grade hemlock instead of fir is also embodied in the new specifications which will be drawn up by the Engineering Department at once. In the meantime the old tenders will be retained but the deposits returned. If the tenders on the new specifications show that a considerable reduction in the cost will be brought about, the original tenders will be discarded.

#### JAPANESE TREATY WITH RUSSIA TO BE SIGNED VERY SOON

TOKYO, May 1.—The War Office announces that the Russo-Japanese agreement will be signed almost immediately. This treaty gives to Japan virtually all the Japanese demands.

#### INDEPENDENT PILOTAGE IS NOW ARRANGED

B. C. Association Formed to Maintain Substations and Possibly Establish Others.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

VANCOUVER, May 1.—The federal government's decision to have free pilotage on the coast has been quickly followed by plans now under way aiming at the formation of an independent body known as the British Columbia Pilotage Association to work along similar lines to the Vancouver Pilotage Authority, which disbanded when the Government recommendation was acted upon. After May 6 all shipowners must make their own pilotage arrangements, Captain Eddie, acting superintendent of pilots, officially advises all concerned.

The new pilotage body is to maintain all sub-stations at Victoria, Nanaimo and other places possibly, but some adjustment of pilotage rates are likely.

Time is the great physician, however, and his work, though slow, is sure.

**Serious Trouble in Mexico.**

There is very serious trouble in Mexico. Not that trouble is a new thing to that much troubled republic. The whole country seems breaking up, and it would not be surprising to see a number of independent states formed, which may eventually join the United States. Sonora has already broken away and formed a government of its own, there is little hope that it will be reconquered.

**Prince Rupert Breaks Into Vancouver.**

A Prince Rupert lady has been honored at Vancouver. Mrs. F. G. Dawson has been appointed one of the vice-presidents of the Provincial Chapter of the Imperial Daughters of the Empire. This body met at Vancouver during the week and the Prince Rupert representative was to the fore with a reply to the address of welcome. Later she was honored by an appointment to office. It is a sign of Prince Rupert's growing importance that the city's representative was recognized.

**VALERA GETS BAD RECEPTION**

Self-Styled President of Irish Republic Caused Near Riot

BIRMINGHAM, Alabama, May 1.—When Eamonn de Valera, self-styled President of the mythical Irish Republic, rose to speak here, he was greeted with mingled applause and shouts of "Throw him out."

He declared that he had heard stories and read newspaper clippings from Birmingham, apparently representing the thoughts of the people of the city, but that the moment he stepped from the train he knew the people had been misrepresented and that only a small minority were opposed to his coming here.

Declaring that he was going to answer some of the charges that had been made against him, the Sinn Feiner launched into a tirade against the "English tyrant," and declared that the opinion that the aims of the Irish Republic were not in accord with those of the United States was wrong, and that persons who held such opinions were in accord with the methods used by England to slowly bring Ireland to her death.

He said that the Irish people were looking to the United States for help and encouragement, and that if there had been no United States there would have been no Irish Republic today.

"We are not asking for United States soldiers to fight for us," he declared. "We are not asking you to say 'Hands off to England; we only ask that you believe in us and in our cause.'"

He declared that Ireland had a right to call upon the United States for aid, because every time in the last 100 years that the United States' flag has been endangered "the true sons of old Ireland were the first to defend it."

A near-riot was caused in the crowded theatre when resolutions were offered that the United States should in the future refrain from assisting Great Britain financially.

**FISHING REGULATIONS ALASKAN TERRITORY**

By an order signed by the Secretary of War April 16 and made public yesterday by Lieut.-Col. J. A. Woodruff, U. S. A., district engineer in Seattle, floating pound nets and fish traps in the navigable waters of Alaska are limited this year to a length of 2,400 feet over all, says the Seattle Times.

Issuance of the order was opposed by Alaska salmon packing concerns, several of which had begun preparing larger traps for the coming season. Colonel Woodruff yesterday sent copies of the War Department's new regulation to the interests affected. It follows:

Regulations approved March 15, 1916, to regulate fishing in navigable waters of Alaska amended by the Secretary of War, April 16, 1920, by inclusion of following condition:

"That during the calendar year 1920 no floating pound net or fish trap in the navigable waters of Alaska shall exceed twenty-four feet in length over all, nor be constructed and operated in more than 100 feet of water at the outer end of the net or trap at mean high tide, according to the United States tide tables, with the exception that a floating pound net or fish trap may be constructed and operated in a greater depth of water provided the extension measured from the shore line at mean high tide does not exceed 1000 feet over all."

All permits already granted for the present season which do not conform to the amended regulations will be revoked. Interested parties are informed that the additional condition is limited to the calendar year 1920 and that public hearings will be held at designated times and places to determine the advisability of continuing or modifying this condition.

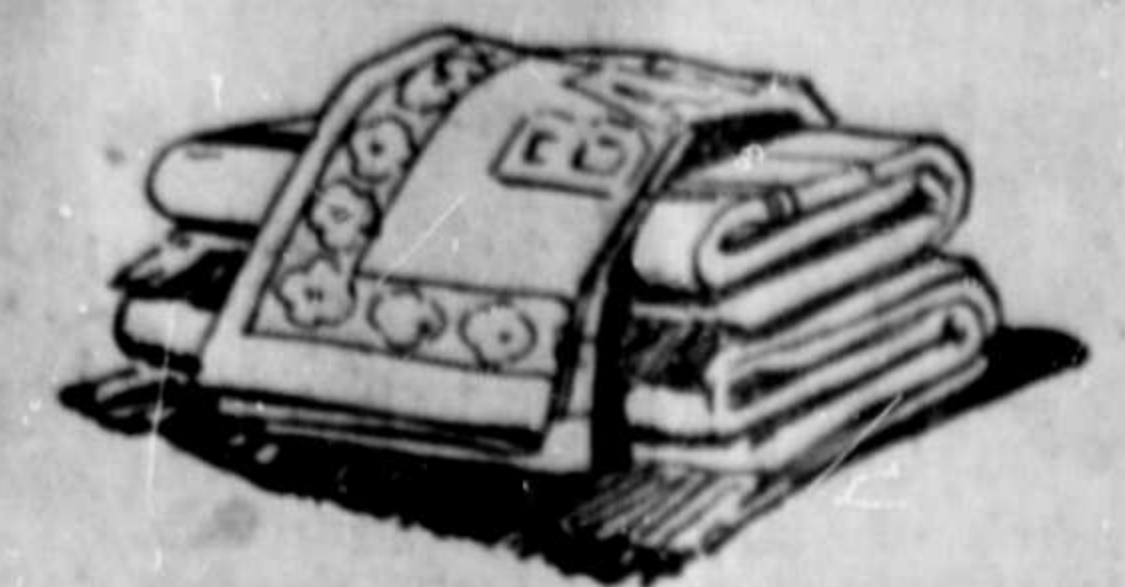

**SECRETARY ON STRIKE AT THE DOLLY VARDEN**

Says Company Plans a Modern Camp But Difficult to Get Lumber.

VANCOUVER, May 1.—Referring to the Dolly Varden strike, L. R. Scott, secretary for the company, today reviewed the question of wages and the conditions under which the men live at the mine, as well as the conditions asked for. He laid emphasis on the fact that the strike was engineered by the One Big Union and that difficulty was experienced in obtaining lumber and labor.

Mr. Scott said that the working season was only six or seven months and consequently labor for construction work was difficult to obtain. The company was planning to make the camp the most comfortable and modern in the province, but it could not be done at once, especially in view of the difficulties being encountered.

**OPERATORS AND GUILD AGREEING**

Arrangements Made by C.P.R. and Union; with G.T.P. Soon

VANCOUVER, May 1.—The scale of wages and conditions agreed to between the Canadian Merchant Service Guild and operators of vessels in British Columbia waters has been made public. The arrangements date from last November, although negotiations have been going forward ever since and an almost complete agreement is reported.

The Canadian Pacific Coast Service and the Union Steamship Company have signed an agreement while certain details are being discussed between the Guild and the Grand Trunk Coast Service. The terms are the outcome of the investigation by a Royal Commission in Vancouver last year. The Yukon Lake and River vessels are covered as well as boats on B.C. inland waters. No arrangement has been arrived at in the case of Canadian deep sea vessels.

No agreements have been signed with tugboat operators, but a scale is being paid according to officials of the Guild almost 100 per cent higher by Vancouver towing firms.
