## Aid Returned Men to Hike to Hills

### WILSTER LEADER SAYS PROPAGANDA CAUSE OF TROUBLE IN THREE COUNTRIES

#### Carson Charges that Irish Propaganda from New York Agitators Desirous Not of Helping Ireland, but of Destroying British Empire; Trouble Similar to Egypt and India

LONDON, May 21.—In the House of Commons yesterday, Sir Edward Carson said there was ample evidence that the Irish disorders were due to the same propaganda as that in Egypt and India. It was directed from New York. The agitators, said the Ulster leader, were desirous, not to help Ireland, but to destroy the British Empire.

Most of the funds coming from America were probably of German origin.

#### LICENSE FEE ON BEER BARS IN VANCOUVER

Will Have to Pay Fee of \$500 and No Bar Maids to Be Allowed.

Will Have to Pay Fee of \$500 and No Bar Maids to Be Allowed.

VANCOUVER, May 21.—The city council has decided to charge a license fee of \$500 on near beer bars and similar places.

It is further proposed that bartenders shall pay a license of \$5 and that barmaids be banned.

All bars in future are to close at midnight and cabarets at 1 a. m. except on Saturdays when they will close at midnight. No person under 21 years of age is to be permitted to enter a near beer bar.

#### Returned Soldier Prospectors to be Grubstaked Free

#### Fifty Men to be Sent Out by Provincial Government; Expenses Returnable Only if Mine Worked or Sold

Arrangements are being made by the Provincial Government to send out fifty returned soldier prospectors this summer, paying their expenses but giving them all the return from what they find. The fifty men are being chosen from the different mining districts, according to population. While because of her comparatively small population Prince Rupert will send out only two men, most of the men sent from Vancouver, New Westminster and Victoria will come to this district, so that it stands to benefit more than any other part of the country. Should there be more prospectors here than can be sent, they will apply through either of the other districts.

The men will go out in twos, one being an experienced man and the other a man anxious to learn.

While nothing is definitely settled, the general plan is agreed upon and any returned soldier wishing to take advantage of the offer should at once get in touch with the local district mining engineer, George Clothier. The following is the detail of the scheme as at present proposed:

#### The Scheme.

The present need is for some prospectors in the hills, and the kind of training prospectors need, required to more nearly approach practical working conditions. Prospectors in real life do not go out in parties of ten under the control of any person; they are a very independent lot of men; the independence of the life is its very charm to them; are used to act on their own judgment and ready to stand the consequences for better or for worse. They go out separately or in pairs, seldom more than partners.

The point desired is to offer good substantial assistance to the prospector who really desires to prospect for the chance of what mineral he may find.

With these points in view, Hon. Wm. Sloan, Minister of Mines, has tentatively suggested a scheme only roughly outlined in the following:

The object aimed at in this proposed scheme is to encourage prospecting in districts selected on the advice of Resident Engineers of the Department of Mines; and, secondly, to create new prospectors by giving them a season's instruction in the school of practical experience under exact working conditions and under the guidance of an experienced prospector.

In extension of the present proposed scheme it would be intended to institute during the following winter a series of lectures by the various Resident Engineers, bearing on the technical (continued on Page Four.)

#### FREE MILLING GOLD QUARTZ MORIESBY ISD.

George Clothier Reports Some Fair Quartz Containing Native Gold.

#### PROPERTY WORKED BY ISLAND OWNERS

Free milling gold property on west coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands has just been examined by George Clothier, district engineer, who returned on Wednesday from a visit to the islands. Mr. Clothier says that there is some fair quartz containing native gold but further development is necessary to prove the average content. The native gold can be seen in the rock in situ.

The property is situated thirty miles south of Skidegate on the west coast of Moresby Island, just north of Tassoo Harbor. It is being worked by Messrs. Wiggs, Jones and McTear of Queen Charlotte City.

#### LUMBERMEN MEET TODAY

#### WHEAT BOARD WAS DISCUSSED IN COMMONS

#### H. H. Stephens Charges That the Farmers Made Profit of 211 per cent.

OTTAWA, May 21.—During the budget debate yesterday, H. H. Stephens referred to the abolition of the wheat board. He said the farmers handling grain made 211 per cent profit on elevator operations.

The progressives, while attacking protection, insist on the control of wheat through the board and the stop of all gambling in futures. In Alberta and Saskatchewan the elevators were full of wheat throughout the winter, they declared, and the wheat board was paying the storage.

In discussing the budget, D. D. MacKenzie declared that the budget taxes were on the poor as well as the rich.

In reply to a query as to whether the House would sit on May 24 the Government had reached no decision, it was announced.

#### EXPECT TO SECURE CREWS NEXT WEEK

#### Venture Will Take Supplies to Skeena River and Naas.

VANCOUVER, May 21.—Current reports here last night indicated that the seaman's strike was breaking and officials expressed the opinion that by next week there would be no difficulty in securing crews.

The Venture expects to get away with supplies for Skeena River and Naas points.

Nels Ludwison failed to appear in the police court this morning in search of a gas leak, so his \$20 bail was estimated.

#### Tonopah Belmont Company Purchases Valuable Mine Adjoining at Surf Inlet

VANCOUVER, May 21.—Glyde A. Heller, president of the Tonopah Belmont Development Co., with George H. Garrey, consulting geologist, both of Philadelphia, left last night on the Prince George for the north en route to Surf Inlet. The company which has been operating the Belmont mines there for some time announces that it has just purchased the Primrose Royal property nearby. It has held an option for years with Hon. W. Pugsley, Lieut.-Governor of New Brunswick.

Mr. Heller announces that his company plans carrying out development work on the property on a large scale this year. It is a gold bearing ore carrying from two to three per cent copper.

#### GASOLINE STATION RATIONS CUSTOMERS

#### Shortage at Spokane Causes Cut in Amount Supplied to Pleasure Cars.

SPOKANE, May 21.—The independent gasoline station here has had its supply cut in half and is rationing its customers to only a gallon a day for pleasure cars, commencing today.

#### DAYLIGHT SAVING

#### Vancouver Decides to Legalize It Commencing Sunday Next.

VANCOUVER, May 21.—The City Council has decided to legalize daylight saving here effective at midnight on Sunday next and to end on September 18.

#### LOOKED FOR GAS WITH OPEN LIGHT

OTTAWA, May 21.—Edward Bernier, who carried a light into his cellar in search of a gas leak, was found dead a little later. His wife is ill.

#### PORT CLEMENTS LUMBER SOLD

#### Sum Realized by Sheriff Was \$3,950 at Sale Yesterday.

At the sheriff's sale held yesterday at Port Clements when 195,000 feet of lumber were auctioned off in the action of Harry Plaster et al against the Port Clements Box and Lumber Co., the Masset Inlet Lumber Co., Ltd., and the Edmonton Lumber Exchange, Ltd., the sum realized was \$3,950. The purchaser was a local Port Clements man.

#### PERSIA APPEALS AGAINST BOLSHIEVIKI

#### Thirteen Warships are Threatening Enzeli Harbor.

LONDON, May 21.—Persia is in trouble. She is appealing to the League of Nations for help against the Bolsheviki. She states that thirteen Bolsheviki warships are threatening Enzeli Harbor.

#### PRINCE GEORGE BRINGING MANY PEOPLE NORTH

#### Scores Seeking Passage Were Turned Away Before Her Departure from Vancouver Last Night.

VANCOUVER, May 21.—Scores of persons seeking passage for the north on the Prince George last night had to be turned away from the Grand Trunk Pacific offices. Only first class tickets were sold and then sleeping accommodation was not guaranteed. The vessel will call on her north-bound run at Ocean Falls, Swanson Bay, Prince Rupert, Anyox and Stewart.

Among passengers on the steamer are W. A. Williams, general superintendent of the Granby plant at Anyox; C. W. Thomas, chief accountant, and R. R. Wilson, of the Cassidy mines.

**NURSES' HOME IS DISCUSSED**  
 J. B. Roerig and D. G. Stewart  
 Think that Hon. T. D. Pattullo  
 Not Giving Matter the  
 Support Due.

At last night's Hospital Board meeting a lengthy letter written by J. B. Roerig, chairman of the special committee for the raising of \$20,000 funds for the building of a nurses' home, to Hon. T. D. Pattullo and the minister's answer was read. The tone of the letter would indicate that Mr. Roerig considered that Mr. Pattullo had dealt with the matter in an indifferent manner in not giving a promise to the board as to funds forthcoming from the government. The disappointment to D. G. Stewart, president of the board, in the lack of support was also dealt with at length. In his reply the minister set forth his position, stating that he had the best interests of the hospital in mind but that he could not make a promise of a monetary grant on his own authority.

Following the reading of the letter considerable discussion ensued, Mr. Roerig stating that in view of the attitude of Mr. Pattullo he felt that the only thing to do was to abandon the campaign. It was hopeless to raise \$20,000 in Prince Rupert but had the government given a grant anywhere near what had been asked, he would have been glad to go ahead. He was hopelessly discouraged and could not now undertake the campaign. He intimated that he would bring in a resolution on the matter at the next regular meeting of the board.

President Stewart agreed with Mr. Roerig. Mr. Pattullo had not seemed to give the matter a receptive ear and was not giving it the support it should get. A delegation to Victoria was suggested and a general discussion as to the revenue derived by the government in the district, and the appropriations made to it was entered into. The matter will come up at the next meeting.

**Queen Charlotte Mining Possibilities.**  
 Queen Charlotte Islands are again coming to the fore from a mining point of view. The news published today of the development of a free milling quartz property on the west coast and the interest being taken in the east coast by the Guggenheim, Japanese and Ontario people all add to the possibilities of the place from a mining point of view.

Besides that there is the oil boring work, which has been temporarily stopped by the strike but which will proceed as soon as supplies can be obtained.

We are in the habit of looking at the Queen Charlottes as purely a lumbering and fishing proposition, but it is not at all unlikely that mining and farming will loom much larger within the next few years.

**Fish Traps at Naas River.**  
 The building of large numbers of fish traps at the approach to the Naas River by American fishing interests is something that will eventually have to be taken up by an international commission. Similar action at the approach to the Fraser was the cause of the ruin of that great river from a fishing point of view. If the fish are caught without restriction on their way to the Naas, there will soon be no salmon there.

The Naas has been a constant source of supply for canned salmon for many years, but with the increase in the number of traps, especially on the American side, it will be only a matter of a few years before the supply will dwindle.

**Strike Settlement at Alice Arm.**  
 The settlement of the strike at Alice Arm makes possible the continuation of work on the Dolly Varden. This follows the settlement of the fight for possession of the mine which has been going on for some time. With the danger of litigation gone and with the strike settled, there is nothing to prevent a very prosperous season at the Arm with a very large amount of development work on many of the properties in the district.

**Surf Inlet Again to Fore.**  
 It had been feared that the Surf Inlet mines might shut down before long owing to the ore having been worked out. This danger has been set aside by the purchase of the adjoining property by the Tonopah Belmont Company, and which it is understood will be worked and will supply the concentrator.

While there has not been much business between this port and Surf Inlet, owing to the lack of transportation, there is every possibility that with the advent of the Morgan lumber camps to that place, and with the added stimulus to mining given by the acquisition of the new property, something will be done to link the place up with Prince Rupert and bring some of the business to this place. It is not very far away and should be tributary to this port.

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

### RETURNED SOLDIER PROSPECTORS TO BE GRUBSTAKED FREE

(Continued From Page One.)

and the theoretic aspect of prospecting.

The indirect benefits to be gained therefrom by the province are considered sufficient to justify the expenditure required.

**25 Parties.**  
It would be proposed this season to put out twenty-five parties, each party to consist of two returned men who have been overseas. The leader to be an experienced prospector who would be in charge, and the second man a man who desires to learn prospecting.

Those selected would have to have a doctor's certificate as to physical fitness for the work. They should be vouched for as to character and willingness to work by responsible parties, and, if possible, should be recommended by one of the returned soldiers' organizations.

**Government Provision.**  
These prospectors would be obliged to undertake to spend a definitely stated time specified by the Department of Mines, actually in the field, and at the close of the season and so often as the Department of Mines may require would be obliged to make report by affidavit giving time, places, dates, and nature of the work on which they were engaged, together with such other information as may be required of them as to the nature of the country traversed and mineral formations, etc.

The Government would undertake to provide camp equipment consisting of tent, fly, groundsheet, blankets, cooking utensils, and tools and incidentals, which at the end of contract would become the property of the prospector, or in lieu of such equipment the government would contribute \$50 towards the purchase of some; the prospectors to supply their own personal equipment.

Further, the Government to make an allowance, uniform for all the province, of \$1.50 for food and other expenses, etc., to each man for each day in the field, payable monthly or as might be arranged.

At the end of the season men who had served the full term of their contract undertaking, properly attested to, would be allowed, to the experienced prospector the sum of \$125 and to the inexperienced man \$100. In exceptional cases the Resident Engineer might remit a portion of the contract time.

Further, transportation to the nearest point on transportation lines, including pack train or boats, would be paid by the Government to men going in and coming out to starting point. So as to bring amounts expended on transportation within reasonable limits, the Government reserves discretionary right with regard to men desiring to go to districts very distant from their starting point, in which case the Government might offer to pay a portion only of such transportation costs.

**Free Certificates.**  
The Government will provide each man with a free miner's certificate.

The services of Resident Engineers in the districts in which the prospectors are employed, and of the assay laboratories and other branches of the Department of Mines, would be available for assistance and advice to these prospectors.

All recording fees, assessment work, etc., to be paid for by the stakers, exactly the same as an ordinary prospector, and as set out in the "Mineral Act."

The following is a tentative proposal of any claims that might be staked:  
Any claims staked by such prospectors shall belong equally to the two partners, and be so recorded in the Record Office of the district.  
There shall be recorded a first charge on behalf of the Government on such claim or claims equal in amount to sums advanced with interest at 6 per cent per annum, computed annually. It shall be payable to the Minister of Mines and shall be a first and paramount charge upon the claims in the right of the Province of British Columbia, payable 10 per cent on the output of the mine or from the mine if sold.

### Sport Briefs

#### Vanderhoof Baseball

Vanderhoof baseball fans are very enthusiastic about pushing the ball game ahead in that town. Teams in the Mapes and Lakes districts have also been organized so the railway town couldn't fall down. The club at Vanderhoof already has fifteen players and the business men are being approached for subscriptions. The secretary has been instructed to purchase uniforms, the colors being grey with blue trimmings. The players are now practising and fast getting into shape. The first game was played last Saturday between Vanderhoof and the Lakes.

#### Interior League

Work has commenced at Prince George getting Duchess Park levelled off for a baseball diamond. A grandstand and bleachers are being built, with a capacity of 750 persons. The work is being carried out by the Prince George Amateur Athletic Association. There will be two baseball and two football teams at Prince George and fixtures are to be arranged with the baseball teams of Vanderhoof, McBride and Smithers which, it is expected, will prove of much interest. Baseball uniforms and equipment are expected to reach Prince George immediately.

#### Sailor King's Son

There was a king in days gone by who told the waves to lie down, but His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales does no such thing. In fact, the higher they splash, the better he seems to like it, according to all the reports that have been coming over the cables from Hawaii and Australia. Almost all the illustrated papers are carrying cuts of the Prince in the briny waves at some part of the world or other. He has probably inherited his love of the sea honestly from his sailor father.

#### Overtime Games.

Uncle Wilbert Robinson, the Baltimore butcher and boss of the Brooklyn baseballers, is the long distance king of the majors. The tendency of the Robins to go any distance after a ball game has made them the prize marathons of the year and has run them into two world's records. With the help of the Braves they set a new mark of 26 innings and also hung up a new record of 67 innings in four days. Forty-three extra inning games so far in the big leagues have given the fans a generous allotment of bargain bills. Brooklyn has engaged in six extra inning games this year for a total of ninety innings. The St. Louis Cardinals have also gone through six long sessions but only for 64 innings. The Cubs and Braves have played in a quartette, the White Sox, Pirates, Red Sox and Athletics have engaged in three, the Tigers, the Reds and the Phils in two each and Washington, the Yanks, Cleveland and the Giants in one each. Two Browns alone haven't been forced to do overtime.

Roadwork has commenced between the New Hazelton station and the Silver Standard Mine. The whole length of the road is to be graded and put in shape for heavy traffic this summer.

### IKEDA MINE IS FINANCED

Japanese Capital Said to be Interested in Property and Development Will Commence.

It is reported here that the Ikeda mine near Jedway on Queen Charlotte Island is to be further developed and a concentrating plant installed. Ikeda, the original owner of the property, has succeeded, it is said, in interesting Japanese capital in the project and the new company will take it over and operate it.

The Ikeda mine has shipped at various times quantities of high-grade copper ore but in getting it out a quantity of low grade had to be removed. The result is that there is a quantity of ore on the dump and a good deal more in sight. It is estimated that this low grade will run from two to four per cent copper. With an oil concentrator this can be successfully shipped at a profit.

# Lumber Mills Make Usk A Prosperous Community

## Four in Active Operation and Big Power Plant to be Installed in Autumn

USK, B. C., May 21.—Usk with its station about 107 miles from Prince Rupert is at present in the rather unfortunate state of having all industry tied up on account of the strike by the mill workers. However, prospects are now very bright for an early settlement and the consequent resumption of cutting. At present there are between 300 and 360 residents. Most of the population are dependent upon the four sawmills in the vicinity with a few ranchers and railroad men.

The hotel is operated by Chas. Durham, an old-timer of the district who has been in this part of the country since 1904, but it is only recently that he moved here and opened a hotel and pool-room. The general store is kept by Lee Bethurem. A government telegraph office is also installed as well as the regular railroad requirements. Many shacks and cabins line the side of the tracks where the men have residence, but they are now vacant. The small school house has been well furnished with an average attendance of some twenty pupils who are graded as high as entrance class. At the present time the youngsters are eagerly looking forward to the 24th of May, when the school board is going to give them a picnic in real style.

**Kleanza Company.**  
The Kleanza Company are carrying on very extensive operations here and have a large building program on hand which will take some two years to complete. The small saw mill which is being built on the railroad side of the river is expected to start cutting in the beginning of next week and will furnish the lumber for the larger mill across the Skeena. When the mills get successfully under way the output will amount to nearly 100,000 feet per day. At the mill across the river enough electric power will be developed from the stream to run an aerial tram across to the railroad track where a spur will be laid down and the lumber immediately transferred to cars for shipment. The matter of the installation of the tram service is only being delayed by getting legislation through proper channels to allow the building of a tower on this side of the Skeena. As the timber is being cleared off, the land is being sub-divided into small plots, which will give ready access to prospective settlers.

**Further Development.**  
Still further developments will be carried on by the company when they commence on the limits on Kleanza creek. No work will be done on the large dam which will furnish hydro-electric power until the low water in the fall. The logs will easily be taken out for this third big mill and can be floated down stream for sawing. The timber is of fine quality in this district and well grained finishing lumber will be one of the first and best products of the undertaking.

Other mills in the vicinity of Usk are just as prosperous and great expectations are held out for a busy summer and autumn. Kenney Bros., with their site in Usk have a capacity of 15,000 ft., whilst the Hanson & Allen mill about three miles to the east of the townsite are turning out 25,000 feet daily. A little to the west is the sawmill of the Kitselas Lumber Co., which has now been turning out for some time an average of about 20,000 ft. daily.

**Mining.**  
With the rapid disappearance of the snow from the lower hills there are many prospectors and interested mining men in the district. Only recently the Kitselas Copper Mountain Mining Co. installed much improved machinery at the Cordillera mine which is situated about a mile to the west and is only a few hundred yards from the railroad track. Individual mining men are also contemplating further improvements before the season runs out. With the completion of the new ferry a great tract of land will be opened for new comers which is much more suitable than the ground on the railroad side of the river. A bridge has also been promised and pressure is being brought to bear from many quarters but the outcome is still rather a doubtful one.

Tenders were opened at the meeting of the Hospital Board last night for the installation of an electrical alarm system at the hospital and were referred to the House Committee. The tenders were as follows: George Waddell, \$670; Parkin & Wand, \$614.50, and Pattinson & Ling, \$602.

The place where the drilling is taking place is two miles south of Lawn Hill and a mile and a quarter northerly from the wireless station.
