Harding Likely Republican Nominee

INTERESTING SPEECHES MADE AT BOARD OF TRADE BANQUET YESTERDAY

No Candidate Yet Chosen by the Republicans at Chicago

After All Night Session and Several Ballots This Morning Change Take Place in Line Up of Men

CHICAGO, June 12.—Four ballots failed to secure the necessary majority last night at the big Republican convention now in session here, to choose a candidate for the forthcoming campaign for the election which is to take place next November. This is the first time in 32 years that a convention has passed three ballots without making a choice. It is the seventh convention since Lincoln's time when more than one ballot was required. An adjournment took place at 2 a. m. at which time Wood, Lowden and Johnson were leading the fifteen nominees.

Morning Session.
CHICAGO, June 12.—(Noon).—On the fifth ballot this morning Wood, Lowden and Johnson led.

The first important change took place when Dr. Butler of New York released 88 delegates, putting Wood in second place. Harding has been chosen as the party chief's dark horse to break the deadlock.

On the sixth ballot the votes cast were as follows: Wood, 24; 1-2; Lowden, 311 1-2; Johnson, 110; Harding, 89; Sproule, 71; Coolidge, 28; Hoover, 5; Butler, 4; Knox, 1; Kellog, 1; Poin-dexter, 15; Dupont, 4; Lafollette, 24; Watson, 3; Ward, 3.

CHICAGO, June 12.—(1 p. m.)—Eight ballots have been taken and no one nominated so far. Senator Harding of Ohio has pushed Johnson from third place. Betting is strong on Harding.

Provincial Pensions will be Payable for July Next

VANCOUVER, June 12.—Pensions to widows and deserted wives will be paid almost immediately, according to the plan laid down in the provincial legislation recently passed. George F. Pyke, superintendent of neglected children, said this morning he was positive the mothers' payments would be made for July. Application forms will be available about June 25 and may be secured from Government agents and provincial police offices. The pensions are payable to widows and deserted wives, wives of penal prisoners, or those incapable of supporting their children.

SHOT SITTING IN HIS CHAIR

Death of J. B. Elwell Baffles the Police of New York.

NEW YORK, June 12.—The police are baffled over the death of J. B. Elwell, an international authority on whist and racing stable owner, who was found in his home after a theatrical party dying from a gunshot wound in his head and sitting in an armchair facing the street window. There was no sign of a weapon near and the man's evening clothes were carefully folded and placed on the back of a chair.

FOUND DEAD IN HIS BUNK

After Being Helped Home From His Work, Murdoch S. McLeod Expired Before Doctor Arrives.

The death occurred this morning shortly after 8 o'clock of Murdoch S. McLeod, watchman at the Charlotte Island Spruce Products Mill.

About 8 this morning when coming to work at the dry dock, Robert Blance noticed the old man making his way homeward, seemingly with difficulty. He gave him assistance to his cabin, 1005 Ambrose Avenue, and notified the police immediately. Warden Bailey and Dr. J. P. Cade proceeded to the scene and on their arrival there found McLeod lying dead in his bunk.

Inquiry has brought out the information that the deceased had been ailing for some time but neglected to call medical assistance. Yesterday morning he had difficulty going home and he complained while at work last night.

Mr. McLeod was well on in years and was the owner of a ranch on Porcher Island. His son, Norman McLeod, lives at Anxox. The son has been notified of his father's demise. A small hand hymn book found by the dead man bore the following words: "Mr. Murdoch S. McLeod, Selkirk, Man. Home address, Indian River, Whycoconagh, Cape Breton, Nova Scotia." The remains are resting at the parlors of the B. C. Undertakers.

BOLSHIES MUST LEAVE PERSIA

Withdrawal From that Country is One of Trade Resumption Conditions.

LONDON, June 12.—One of the conditions of the resumption of British trade with Russia under the negotiations conducted with them by Premier Lloyd George, is that the Bolshies must withdraw from Persia. Great Britain has taken a great interest in Persia on account of its nearness to India and the negotiations just concluded will have an important effect on that country.

Future of Prince Rupert with Herring and Cod

"Everybody in Canada appreciates the position of Prince Rupert as the premier fishing port of the Dominion. I believe in the future of the port, but it will not be because of its halibut and salmon. Its future will be built up on two species of fish, the cod and the herring. The time will come when, instead of waiting for the herring to come in, the boats will go out after them. The off-shore herring are preferable to those caught inshore. They will be packed in barrels and shipped to all the countries of the world.

"For the cod fishing industry, Prince Rupert is the closest port to the great banks of the Behring Sea and she will benefit accordingly." — Captain F. W. Wallace, secretary of Dominion Fisheries Association and Editor of Canadian Fisherman.

Equipment Goes North for the Dolly Varden Railway

Twenty Steel Cars and Three Locomotives being sent to Mine to insure steady shipments going out

A barge load of new steel cars, part of a shipment of twenty new ones being taken to Alice Arm for the Dolly Varden Railway, were passed on Thursday by the Prince Rupert when coming south from Anxox. There is also a shipment of three locomotives going to the same place for use on the railway. It is thought that with the heavier metal and the new equipment the railway will be in a position to make regular shipments of ore and to keep running practically all winter.

The work of extending the railway to the Wolf mine has also commenced and the surveyors are on the ground laying out the work. It is understood that the contract for grading has already been let. The Wolf is three miles farther up the river than the Dolly Varden and is said to be just as rich as the other. On the townsite at Alice Arm everything is building up steadily and the place is becoming very busy.

Fish Conservation Theme of Addresses

Guests Appreciate Entertainment Given Them Here and say Nice Things about the City and People

Conservation and exploitation were the themes discussed at the luncheon given by the Board of Trade yesterday at the Hotel Central to the visiting fisherymen from the east. President Parker occupied the place of honor at the table and among those beside him were the speakers, J. A. Poulhos, vice-president of the Canadian Fisheries Association; Capt. F. W. Wallace, secretary, and Messrs. Conlon, Connor, W. E. Williams, vice-president of the Board of Trade, and Mayor McClymont. There were over fifty present and the luncheon, served under the personal supervision of Mrs. Black, was an excellent one.

The guests were welcomed by the Mayor who mentioned the importance of the fishing industry and spoke of Prince Rupert as the fishing metropolis where he hoped the next convention of the Association would be held. Mr. Poulhos said that before coming here they had been entertained at Vancouver and had been told there that they would have time to rest when they arrived at Prince Rupert. In this respect they had been disappointed for nothing of the kind had occurred. There had been a big demonstration at Vancouver which they had all appreciated, but here, while their welcome had not been on such a big scale or so demonstrative, there was some character in it and, on behalf of himself and the others he tendered the Prince Rupert people their sincere thanks.

Appreciated City.
Speaking of the city, Mr. Poulhos said there was a neatness and cleanliness about the place seldom seen. The buildings were substantial and the place bore all the earmarks of a place of importance. He had visited the plant of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. which was one of the best, if not the best organized in the world. They had also seen the up-to-date cannery at Sunnyside and they appreciated the way they had been entertained there.

Prince Rupert, Mr. Poulhos said, was the largest fish producing centre in Canada. It was in close proximity to the best fishing grounds. The asset was a big one and it was the duty of those living here to see that the fisheries were exploited in such a manner as to be beneficial both in the present and the future. POND SYSTEM IN HATCHERIES

VANCOUVER, June 12.—Greater use of the pond system in salmon hatcheries was favored at a meeting here of officials of the Fisheries Department with Superintendent Boid of the Department of Fish Culture at Ottawa. The question of hatcheries is one that has been under discussion for some time past, both among officials and in the press, the allegation having been made, especially by canners, that the hatcheries were of little use.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

DOMESTIC WORK IS COMPULSORY

School Board Makes Decision Regarding Girls of First and Second Years High School.

After considerable discussion by the School Board last night, it was decided to make domestic science a compulsory part of the school curriculum for the first and second years of high school, two periods per week to be devoted to it if necessary. The decision was the outcome of a full investigation of the matter of high school girls not attending the classes regularly, as reported by Miss Marcellus at the previous meeting of the School Board. Principal Brady had been called to the meeting to go into the matter and he was present last night.

Principal in Favor. Mr. Brady explained that he himself was in favor of domestic science for the girls, but the school board had not made it compulsory. It was his view, based on the reports of the mothers, that too much domestic science homework was given. He did not think that domestic science homework should be given to conflict with the girls' music and their high school homework.

Miss Marcellus then gave her side of the question, maintaining that with only one period a week for the high school girls it was impossible to train them in both household science and domestic art without homework. At that, the homework was not heavy and would not entail more than half an hour a week.

Unanimous Support. The members of the board seemed unanimous in their support of Miss Marcellus and the work she was carrying on. Dr. W. T. Kergin, chairman, stated that as far as he was concerned domestic science was more important to the girls than either music or Latin and there was no reason why they should not have homework in it, even if it was at the expense of those subjects. The other members of the board were in line behind the chairman and added their voice in favor of domestic science.

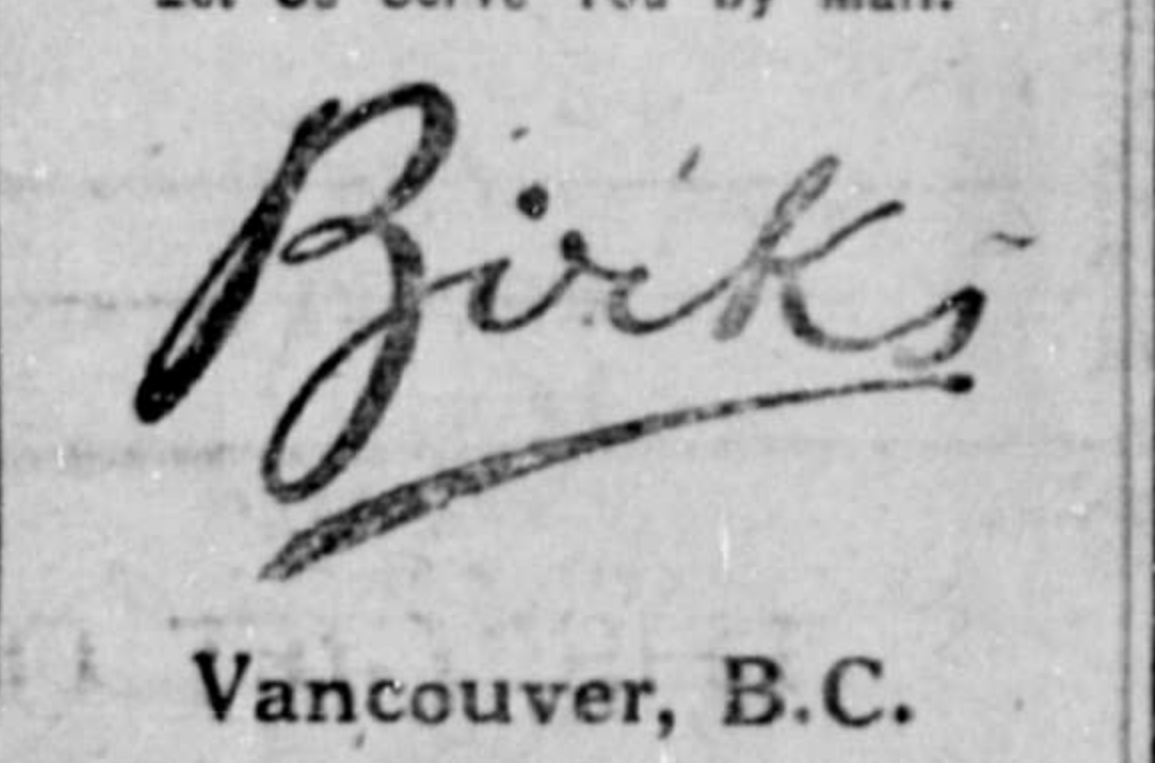

FISH CONSERVATION THEME OF ADDRESSES

(Continued From Page One.)

and they were trying in Vancouver to find means of replenishing it. He did not see much relief for the future, however.

Wealthiest River.

The Skeena, the speaker said, was the most productive and wealthiest river on the coast and its future was in the hands of the people here. They should consider it a duty to exploit it in such a manner that it would be conserved for future generations.

Speaking of the halibut fisheries, Mr. Poulhios told of the depletion of the banks in the east where at one time the fish was abundant, but from which the American fishing fleets had taken all the halibut. They had been allowed to rest and now they were producing again. It was not wise to depend too much on legislation for there was a maze of legislation to protect the oyster beds of the Atlantic coast and yet the oyster fisheries had been ruined. Thirty years ago the production of these had been enormous. Restrictions and rules had been put into effect but the beds had been completely ruined in spite of restrictions. This was bad for the community to work toward the welfare of the fishing industry and all try to improve it and get the best possible results. The different interests should meet on common ground and secure legislation for the benefit of the fisheries at large.

Supply Important.

Mr. Poulhios urged that there be a campaign of publicity to induce people to use more fish. He had been responsible for the National Fish Day, which was instituted with this object in view. The great problem with food, however, was not consumption but supply. He was inclined to take with a grain of salt the talk of increased production which had been going on of late. He asked all to do their share in helping to conserve the fish in such a way that they would produce the largest amount of food without being destroyed.

Board Views.

W. E. Williams spoke of the aims of the Board of Trade in regard to the fisheries. He said it was surprising that the legislators who dealt with the fisheries here were sixty per cent men who had never been west of the Great Lakes and ninety per cent who had never crossed the Rocky Mountains. Men who assumed the responsibilities of legislation, he thought, should visit the different parts of the country so that they might be able to vote intelligently.

Mr. Williams said that the aim of the Board was to conserve and to build up, and they hoped to get the rest of Canada to help them, because the supply of fish was important to all. The people here were not kickers but they agitated for redresses, which was quite another thing. To do that was good citizenship. This was the greatest halibut port in the world and they hoped to make it the greatest salmon port. He spoke of the close season for halibut and of the difference with the canners in the past over open fishing and the cannery monopoly. What they wanted now was the right to use gas boats on the river in order that the better class of white fishermen might be induced to follow the salmon fishing business. He urged the protection of the spawning grounds and local administrative control of the fisheries, with the chief administrative offices here.

Plenty of Fish.

Mr. Conlon spoke of the bright prospects of the town, of the welcome they had received and of the desire of the Ottawa departments to co-operate with the people on this coast. There was plenty of fish in the sea but the problem was to put it in the homes of the consumers. The fish belonged to the whole people and they were bound to conserve it for the whole people. He urged marketing the fish in such a manner that repeat orders would come.

Mr. Connor spoke humorously of the weather being better here than at Vancouver, of the hospitality of the people here, where the citizens were princes. The gathering of the Board at that luncheon would be a credit, he said, to a town ten times the size. Concluding, the president of the Board of Trade thanked the visitors for their addresses and the gathering dispersed.

WILL CUT OUT DUPLICATION OF RAILWAYS

Combinations to be Made in Services of Grand Trunk and the Canadian National; Express Companies Join.

OTTAWA, June 11.—Hon. J. D. Reid, minister of railways, has announced the re-ordination of the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Canadian National Railways. Important changes will soon be made, including the consolidation of dual offices at various points where both roads touch. The Canadian and National Express companies will also be consolidated. Passenger services will also be combined, calling for a daily run between Toronto, Winnipeg, Montreal and Sudbury to connect with the Canadian National trains for Vancouver and the Grand Trunk Pacific trains to Prince Rupert.

TORIC GROUP IS BONDED

Alice Arm Property Taken by Vancouver Syndicate for \$110,000.

That the Toric group of claims has been bonded to a Vancouver syndicate, is the news brought from Alice Arm by A. C. Garde, who has been into that part of the country inspecting mining properties. The price to be paid is \$110,000 and a substantial first payment is said to have been made.

The Toric is farther up the river on the opposite side from the Dolly Varden.

NEGROES MAY JOIN INTERNATIONAL UNION

After Stormy Session Montreal Convention Decides to Admit Them

IRON INDUSTRY IS SUPPORTED

Smithers Miners and Prospectors Association Passes Resolution Favoring Development.

The Smithers Miners' and Prospectors' Association has endorsed the Copper River iron development. A letter dealing with the matter has been received by the commissioner of the Board of Trade as follows:

"The members of this Association have followed with great interest the campaign of publicity being carried on by the Prince Rupert Board of Trade for the establishment of an iron and steel industry to develop the resources of this part of British Columbia. Among the more than one hundred members of this Association which includes almost every miner and prospector from Hazelton to Houston, there are many who have prospected on one or both forks of the Copper River and know from personal observation that the iron ore and coal deposits reported to be in that region are actually there.

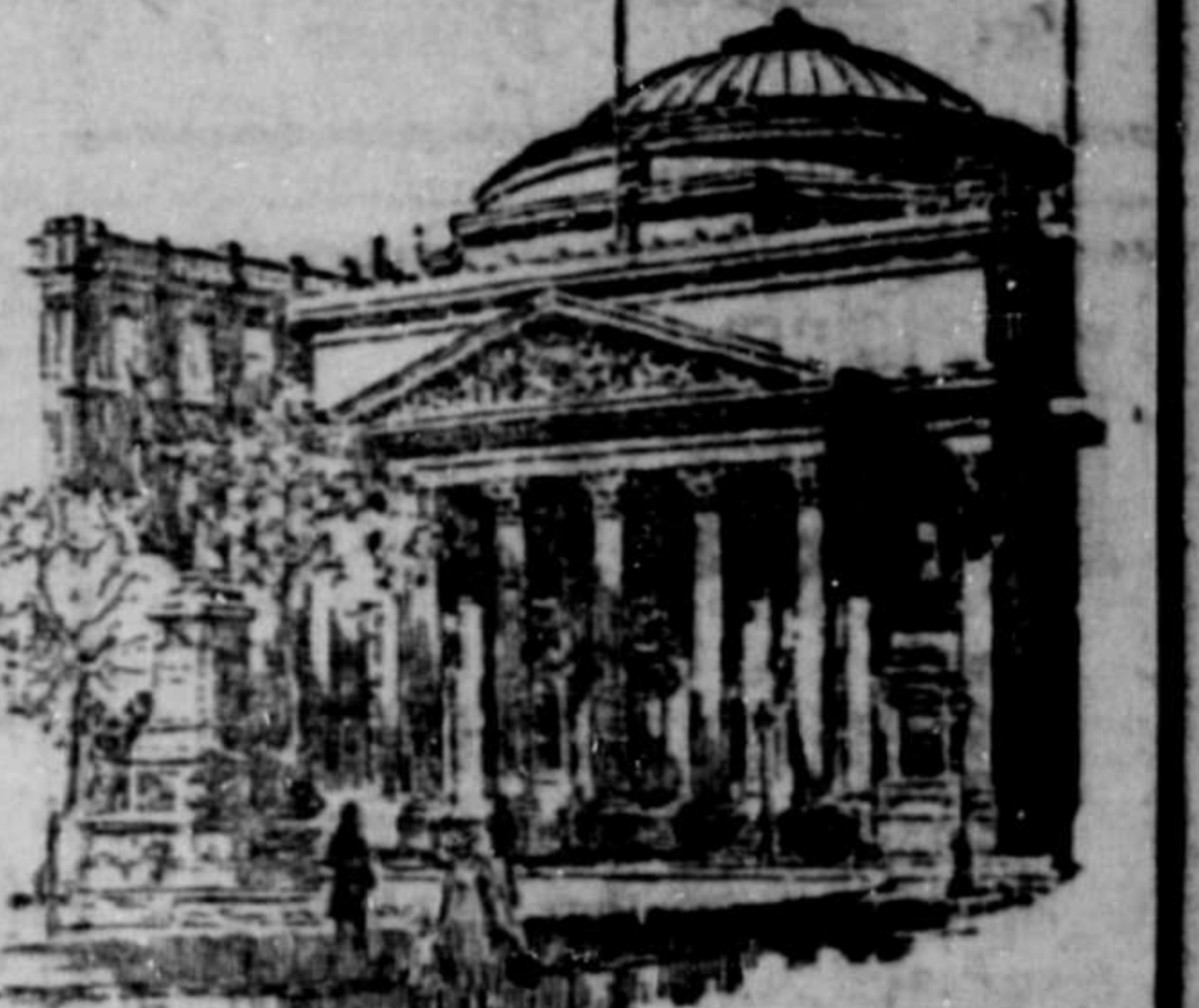

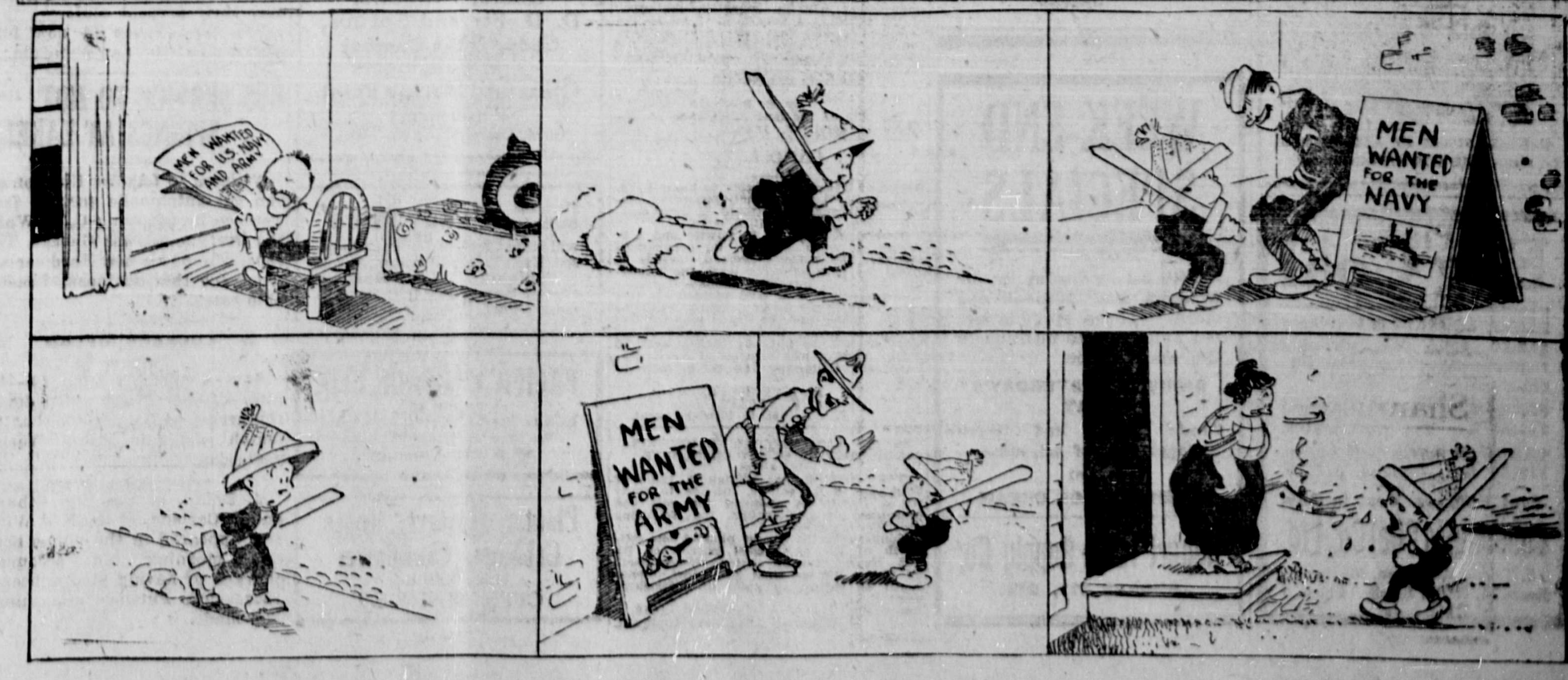

MIXED BATHING IS MENACE TO EMPIRE SAYS A COUNCILLOR

LONDON, June 10.—"Hun-Britons are being doomed to lives dreeds, possibly thousands, of usefess celibacy through the infamous institution of mixed bathing." This was a remark of Councillor Donald Clark, of Tombridge, Kent, opposing the council's motion to permit mixed bathing in the public swimming pools.

"It is not Puritanical nor jesting," Councillor Clark said, "but ardent, imperialistic, patriotic girl, dazzling in the ballroom, becomes vulgarized with her hair straggling over her eyes like a wet terrier. Such a damp fright is a disillusion to any young man. He would recoil with horror."

Mr. Clark made no reference to men's failure to stand the beauty test in bathing attire. He declared that Brighton and other resorts which were permitting mixed bathing were sources of decadence and a menace to England and the empire.

"Women's beauty," he said, "is essential to the marriage stability of the nation, and progress of the world." In spite of Mr. Clark's formidable objection the council approved mixed bathing.
