SANDY HOOK, July 20.—With Captain Burton still at the helm, the Shamrock was the first across the starting line today, sailing at 12:15. After a short lead the Resolute, however, took her.

Granby Deny Report Island Mine Strike

Reason for Shut Down at Cassidy's Siding because Anyox Bunkers Overflowing; Market Coke Locally

VANCOUVER, July 20.—The Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting and Power Company denies the report that the Cassidy coal mine on Vancouver Island is closed on account of a strike.

The reason for the present suspension of operations at the island is that the Anyox coke bunkers are overflowing and no coal can be handled there at present, the supply being well ahead. The mines will reopen tomorrow.

It is planned to sell the surplus of the Anyox coke production locally.

FOOTBALL MATTERS WERE TAKEN UP AT MEETING LAST NIGHT

The Dominion Day cap tie final protest of the Grand Trunk football team was dismissed at the meeting of the committees of the football league last evening. The grounds for dismissal were that the points upon which the protest was entered were entirely matters of the referee's decision. The Grand Trunk objected to the first goal made by the Callies and the penalty granted against Ed. Ross. During the discussion the delegates from the two teams concerned namely the Callies and the Grand Trunks, left the room.

A letter from the Anyox football team regarding inter-city games was read and action was taken in as far as appointing a ways and means committee who will make up appropriations for games to be played here and also at Anyox. The matter of expenses will be important and Messrs. Warrior, W. C. Orchard and F. Davies will report the probable costs at a later meeting.

TAXES COMING IN RAPIDLY

City Treasurer Reports that 1920 Collections are Highly Satisfactory Under New System.

According to a report received at last night's council meeting from the city treasurer, the collection of the city's taxes this year has exceeded all expectations and the great success is attributed, in a large way, to the combining of the local improvement and general taxation for collection at the same time and notification on the same sheet. It is expected that the records of last year, which were themselves good, will be beaten this year.

Out of a general tax levy this year of \$254,216.18 there has been already collected \$177,360.87 or 69.76 per cent. Last year the levy was \$175,696.54 and the collections \$121,285.23 or 69.03 per cent collection. This year, therefore, exceeds last year's general taxation collection record by 736 per cent. Local improvement collection, so far this year, shows an increase of 106.103 per cent over last year.

MATSQUI DYKE BROKE THROUGH

Twenty Thousand Acres at Sumas is Under Water.

NEW WESTMINSTER, July 20.—The Matsqui dyke broke this morning flooding a large area of farms and doing much damage to crops and property. An area of twenty thousand acres is under water near Sumas. The Fraser river is reported to be lowering in several places.

JURORS AFRAID TO SERVE AT INQUEST

Sinn Feiners Threaten Those who Come to Investigate Deaths of Raid at Cork.

CORK, July 20.—On account of threats made by Sinn Feiners, the inquest over the victims of yesterday's raids here has been postponed. The jurors failed to put in an appearance.

At the police court this morning the case of J. Markonich, charged with wearing a returned soldier's button without proper rights, has been further adjourned for two days.

AMERICANS LOOKING HERE

Large Tracts of Timber in North Being Sought by United States Interests—Pulp Mill

Negotiations have been further advanced in connection with the transfer of large tracts of timber to American interests in Northern British Columbia, though nothing definite has as yet been done. It is anticipated, however, that it is only a matter of time before something tangible results. It is improbable that the installation of a pulp mill will be the outcome of these negotiations that have been going on for some considerable time.

American interests are looking more and more to this province for timber and there is a hurry to get it before there is any change in the government of the United States. Some logs have been sent over the border recently for the making of shingles, but the consignments were comparatively small in comparison with the demand that exists for raw material. The fact that there have been shipments of logs to show that there must be an over-supply in the province, this must be taken in connection that logs have sagged in price in the last 30 or 40 days.

WHITE SLAVER ARRESTED

Johnson, Pugilist, Crosses From Mexico—Fled Seven Years Ago.

LA JUAN, Mexico, July 20.—A Johnson, the former world champion, has crossed the border states where he has been arrested for white slavery. He fled in 1913 when sentenced under the Mann Act.

ANGELES HAS ANOTHER EARTHQUAKE

LOS ANGELES, July 20.—Another slight earthquake shook the city here last night but no damage was done.

Commit Grammars To Bonfire.

What is this? "English grammar as it is now taught should be dropped entirely from our schools. A child need never parse nor diagram an English sentence, conjugate an English verb, nor decline an English noun. Indeed it would do little harm if all the English grammars adapted for use in elementary schools were to be committed to a bonfire."

And so this article in The North American Review continues to denounce English grammar as an unscientific, illogical inflexible dictum which forces children to decline nouns in cases which do not exist, to conjugate verbs in tenses, moods and voices with nouns when agreement is neither necessary nor possible. The writer is Mr. Walter Guest Kellogg, an Ogdensburg lawyer, a graduate of Columbia University, where he was senior poet of his class, and a member of the Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York. And he is not alone in his views, for he says: "In New York State the truth was seen years ago, but in practise it has been only half realized. Much less time is now spent on English grammar, but we are still devoting too much daylight to it. The syllabus prepared by the Department of Education recommends that no formal grammar be taught until the sixth grade is attained, but one wonders why it is still permitted to be taught at all."

Who Will Teach The Teacher?

English grammar is violated unconsciously with distressing frequency, but no such deliberate attack upon it has been heard since the days of Jack Cade, the English rebel, who thus denounced the Lord Say: "Thou hast most traitorously corrupted the youth of the realm in erecting a Grammar School. It will be proved to thy face that thou hast men about thee that usually talk of a noun and a verb and such abominable words as no Christian ear can endure to hear." A few years previously one of the prelates at the Council of Constance objected to the grammar of Sigismund I., who retorted: "I am the Roman Emperor, and I am above grammar." But we are not all Roman Emperors, and the followers of Jack Cade seems to be increasing. Bad English is continually offending not only on the streets and in other places, but in advertisements, prospectuses, and similar business publications. Mr. Kellogg admits that "cultural and commercial opportunity" depends in great part upon one's knowledge of his mother tongue, and that first and foremost the work of the school is to be centred upon attaining a correct use of idiomatic English. "The teacher," he says, "is the crux of the problem," but who will teach the teacher if grammars are committed to a bonfire? — Toronto Globe.

SIX HUNDRED TONS OF SCOTCH LIQUOR

Within the next few days many Vancouver householders will have the well-known grand and glorious feeling as they look the cellar door.

The reason lies in the advent of the Harrison direct liner Crown of Toledo, which arrived Friday from the United Kingdom.

The big freighter was coaling at Nanaimo yesterday.

The Crown of Toledo brings 800 tons of freight and 75 per cent of it is wet goods—cases and cases and tons upon tons of liquor for thirsty British Columbia.

Most of it was loaded at Glasgow and consists of the famed essence of the grains of that land. Prominent on the Toledo's manifest are several shipments of settlers' effects, the goods and chattels of folk who have come to British Columbia during the past year.

The local offices of Balfour, Guthrie & Co., coast agents for the line, expect word of the departure from Liverpool of the steamer Crown of Galicia. She was due to clear for the Pacific coast on July 5 and is expected toward the end of August.

NEW COIN COMPELS CHANGING MACHINES

Stamp Selling, Weighing and Gum Selling Pillars all have to be altered

"Of what use is a cent anyway. It can't buy anything nowadays. This is the way the public views the humble copper in these days of high prices. Yet the cent can still purchase something, and not even the alteration of the half-dollar, aristocrat of our coinage, will cause as much commotion as the new cent piece, just now making its first appearance in Toronto.

The coming of the new cent piece exactly the same size as the United States cent is going to cost dealers along certain lines a lot of money. It means thousands of dollars' expense, a certain amount of inconvenience to the public and possibly a good many extra dollars flowing into the Government coffers from Customs duties.

The postal pillar boxes will all have to be altered to fit the new coin. W. E. Lemon, Postmaster for Toronto, stated last night that arrangements had already been discussed for this. The postal boxes are put in by the Dominion of Canada Postage Stamp Vending Company, and they will have to make the alterations. These alterations will mean the taking out of the machinery which operates the automatic sale of stamps and the boxes will probably be out of commission, as far as selling stamps are concerned, for a few days.

Change Weighing Pillars

The Canadian Fairbanks-Morse Company have many weighing machines located in drug stores and other places throughout Canada. These machines are Canadian-made, being manufactured at Sherbrooke, Quebec. An official of the company stated last night that they would very probably be collected, sent back to Sherbrooke and new attachments to fit the new Canadian cent installed. This will cost a large figure.

Another gentleman, connected with a company which supplies gum-vending machines, figured that these machines would be collected and sent back to the factory. As many of these machines have been manufactured in the United States new machines will be probably brought across the line to replace them, the American cent now being the same size as the new Canadian copper. The duty on these machines is high.

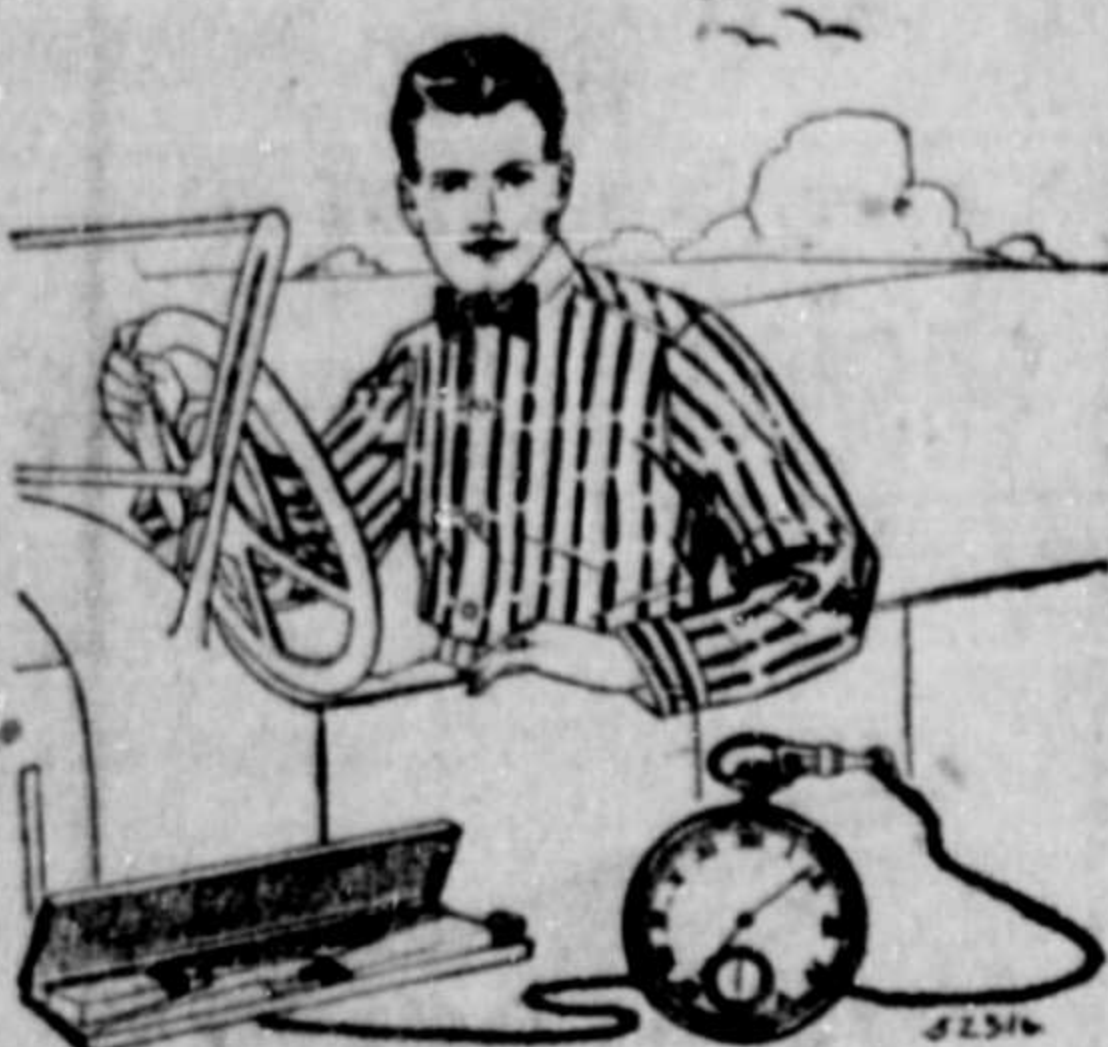

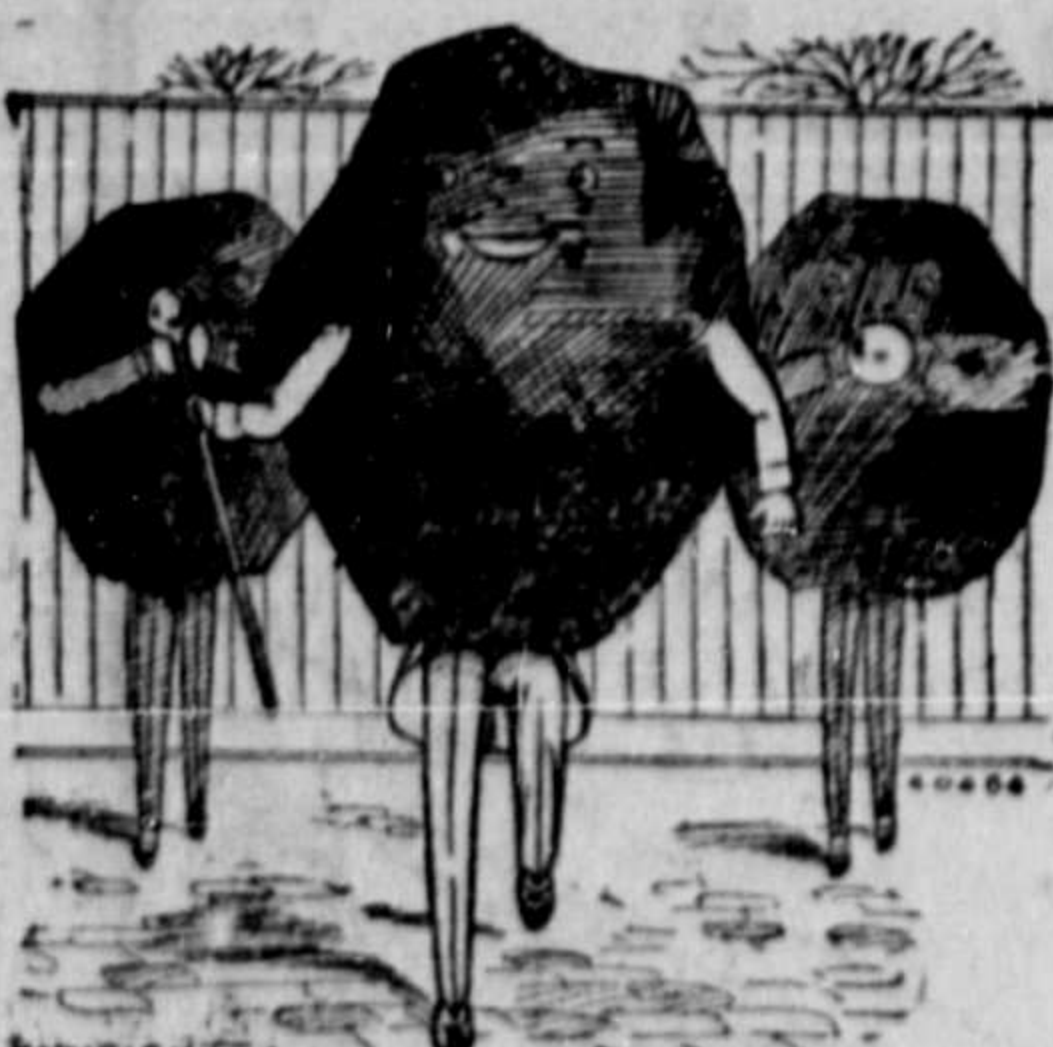

WANT CLEMENCY FOR DOOMED MOTHER

He added that since the birth in prison of the twin children to Marie Gagnon, the women of the United States, as well as many thousands of women in Canada, are strongly averse to the hanging.

Mrs. Gagnon was condemned to hang next October for brutal and inhuman treatment of her step-daughter, extending over a period of months, which resulted in the latter's death.
