Fish Car Shortage To Be Relieved

EIGHTY MILLION BUSHELS GRAIN MAY BE SHIPPED BY WAY OF VANCOUVER

Refrigerator Cars Coming From American Express Co.

Expected to Arrive in about Two Weeks to aid in carrying Halibut to Market in Eastern States

At the Fish Exchange this morning considerable excitement was evidenced over the good news that probably within two weeks American railway refrigerator cars will be coming to Prince Rupert in order to help with the transportation of the fish from this port. At the present time the Canadian Express companies are conferring with the express companies of the United States and plans for the definite arrangements will soon be known. It is expected that within two weeks the new rolling stock ought to start arriving. About 25 cars have been promised and with such material assistance the local companies will be able to do a much greater business and it will also benefit the fishermen, for the price of the fish will be kept up and there will be less selling for freezing purposes.

Some time ago Seattle's fish trade was cramped by a car shortage but the tension has been lifted down there and they are already having cars to spare now. It will mean great things for this port in the very near future for much of the best fishing is well into the fall.

TRUCK COLLIDES WITH STREET CAR

Driver of Truck and Chinese Boy Badly Injured.

VANCOUVER, August 7.—Harold Goldwell, a Ford truck driver, had his skull fractured and a Chinese boy aged four loses a leg, both being probably fatally injured as the result of a collision between the truck and a street car this afternoon.

The boy was sitting on a toy wagon eating an apple when he was crushed against a lamp standard.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 7.—(Noon). The Chinese boy who was injured in the auto smash yesterday died. Caldwell is still unconscious. The motor man who was driving the street car has been charged with manslaughter and is out on \$20,000 bail.

AWSON MAN KILLED WHEN CAR JUMPED

Bandy, Pioneer Hotelman of North, Meets Horrible Death.

AWSON, Aug. 7.—Dell Bandy, pioneer hotel man, was killed instantly when the automobile in which he was driving jumped over a creek bridge road. He was in the car and there were passengers of the accident. The car was dashed out on the creek, but the car made a somersault and is little damaged. It is believed that Andy must have fallen asleep at the wheel.

NAVY LEAGUE REORGANIZED

Officers Elected for Coming Year; C. V. Evitt to Father Naval Brigade.

At the reorganization meeting of the Prince Rupert and northern British Columbia district branch of the Navy League held in the Court House last evening, J. F. Maguire was elected chairman. Before accepting the chair Mr. Maguire expressed how closely he held the movement at heart. It was not the first time that he had served on just such an organization and with the help of the others he felt that the Navy League would readily flourish in this city.

Percy Tinker was appointed secretary-treasurer. The other executive members elected were Mrs. H. L. Roberson, Mrs. A. T. Parkin, L. M. deGex and Major J. H. McMullin. Mrs. Roberson will be convener of the educational committee and will carry on the work of arranging competitions in the schools and distributing literature amongst the youngsters.

Other two members of the league are ex-officio executive members. They are C. V. Evitt who will look after the Naval Brigade and Capt. McGoskrie who will instruct the youths in the nautical elements. Both men, it is thought, will be able to serve very satisfactorily in these capacities.

Departure Delayed Until Today—Given Gold Medal by City of Nome.

NOME, Aug. 7.—Roald Amundsen, who is setting out on a long expedition to locate the North Pole, postponed his departure until today. The delay was caused in slowing supplies.

Yesterday Amundsen was presented with a gold medal by the City Council here in recognition of his services to science. A public reception was held and addresses made.

Another Steamship Line Will Ply to this Coast by Way of Panama Canal

Holland American in conjunction with Royal Mail Steam Packet to send Big Freighters as far as Vancouver

VANCOUVER, August 7.—Commencing September 30, the Holland-American Steamship Co. in conjunction with the Royal Mail Steam Packet of London, England, will inaugurate a steamship service to this coast. Leaving Rotterdam and Antwerp, the boats will call at London and then sail for San Francisco and come north as far as Seattle and Vancouver.

The vessels to be used are 12,000 ton freighters with refrigerator space for fruit and fish.

DUNSMUIR HAD SMALL ESTATE

Amount Filing for Succession Duty Given as \$3,597,000.

VICTORIA, Aug. 7.—The Dunsmuir estate filing for succession duty gives the gross amount as \$3,597,000 with debts amounting to \$265,000.

It is stated that \$764,749 was transferred to the children last February. A revaluation of the estate is likely to swell the amount considerably.

Alberta's Grain Out by Vancouver

Greater Part of This Year's Crop to go West instead of East; Amount Estimated is 80,000,000 Bushels

WINNIPEG, August 7.—Captain Acheson, general agricultural agent, in an interview here stated that the bulk of Alberta's banner crop will be routed west instead of east this season. It will go by way of Vancouver and the Panama Canal to Liverpool.

The amount estimated to be shipped by way of this coast is set at 80,000,000 bushels.

VANCOUVER, August 7.—A report has been received here to the effect that a large part of the grain crop of Alberta will this year be shipped from this port. The Dominion Government elevators here have never been used to any very large extent, but now it seems as if Vancouver is to become a grain port.

A rather novel feature was introduced last evening in the serving of ice cream and cake during the dances. Instead of having a special time set apart for the refreshments the boys were on deck to serve during both the first and second halves of the program. A flashlight photo was taken of the gathering.

WELL KNOWN NURSE DIES AT VANCOUVER

Miss Hope McLeod Was Formerly Acting Matron Here.

Word has been received in the city of the death of Miss Hope McLeod of the nursing staff of the Vancouver General Hospital. Miss McLeod will be remembered by her many friends in Prince Rupert as the acting matron at the local institution following the resignation of Miss Carmichael two years ago.

After returning to Vancouver from this city Miss McLeod suffered with diabetes to which she has finally succumbed. Miss McLeod was with the graduating class of 1918 at the Vancouver General Hospital and was liked by all her class mates. While in Prince Rupert she won the sympathetic support of all the nurses, here at that time. Little is known here of her immediate relatives, but she leaves a mother and sister and brother to mourn the loss of one who was doing splendid work in her profession.

RED ADVANCE IS STOPPED

Proposal to Send Delegates to Winnetka to Negotiate Armistice Accepted.

WARSAW, August 7.—Polish resistance is stiffening and the advance of the Reds has been halted.

Terms of peace have been sent to the Soviet Government accepting the proposal to send delegates to Minsk to negotiate a simultaneous armistice with a view to peace.

In Poland thousands of people are praying on the hilltops for deliverance against the invaders.

BIG DROP IN GRAIN RATES

Indications are That a Rate War May Develop.

VANCOUVER, August 7.—The first shot against the Jones Bill to help the American mercantile marine against foreign competitors is a sensational reduction in Pacific freights. The U. S. Shipping Board set a rate of \$28 a ton for grain. The British and Japanese cut the rate to \$26 today. The U. S. rate dropped to \$20.

There are indications of a rate war.

MILITARY IN CHARGE

Soldiers Ride on Cars at Denver to Protect Against the Strikers.

DENVER, August 7.—The military are in charge here following the riots of yesterday. An order has been issued that all strike breakers be disarmed. Soldiers are riding on the street cars in order to protect them against the strikers.

WEST FRANKFORT, Ill., Aug. 7.—A raid on the foreign quarters here led to the death of five persons and many homes are burning.

Cow Bay Question Should be Settled.

The Cow Bay question undoubtedly should be settled soon and the status of everyone made clear. Recently Captain Freeman asked the Board of Trade to recommend that floats be built on the waterfront between the old Hazelton and the Imperial Oil property. It is found that this land belongs to the railway company and may be transferred to the Provincial Government or somebody else.

Elaborate plans have been drawn for improvements to the provincial docks. It is Cow Bay that is holding it up.

The Cow Bay bridge is anything but a credit to the city as it at present stands. It is a smelly place and something should be done to improve it. It is tied up, however.

It has been pointed out that the level crossing to the provincial dock might be put in without closing Cow Bay. There is plenty of space, apparently, for a road where the present road crosses.

The joint committee of the Board of Trade and City Council will be able to gather data in regard to all the proposals and not only make recommendations but will be able to give reasons for those recommendations which may clear the matter up. There is a lot of ignorance locally in regard to the status of the different controlling bodies and if the committee does no more than show the public just where everybody stands, it will have done a service.

Boys' Naval Brigade Is to be Formed.

A Boys' Naval Brigade is to be formed here under the direction of C. V. Evitt. This will be good news to a good many of the boys who have been looking forward to the time when they could get into uniforms. The use of the Nancy Jane will add zest to the work and make it much more attractive than otherwise it would be.

Mr. Evitt is particularly well qualified for the work of commanding the brigade and Capt. McCoskrie should make an admirable instructor in nautical matters. There will be no difficulty in enlisting a good corps here and its success depends on the organization and the support it gets.

Skeena Wonder At Terrace.

The Michaud Brothers have been experimenting in their garden in the production of new berries. The News has heard something of their work before, but now a correspondent says that some of the new berries are on view in one of the shop windows at Terrace.

There is so much to be done by helping nature, both in the field and garden and also in the animal kingdom, that the wonder is that more has not been accomplished along these lines. If a better berry has been produced by the Michauds that is suited to the climate of the northern sections of the country, they will have benefitted the world. We shall look with interest on any further developments along these lines.

ALBERTA CROPS

Hon. Geo. P. Smith says he Never Saw them Better in Central Alberta

EDMONTON, Aug. 7.—"I have been in this country for twenty years and I have never seen better crops than I saw through the Camrose, Vegreville and neighboring districts during the past two or three weeks," said the Hon. Geo. P. Smith, minister of education, last night, following his return to the city from an extended tour of a number of districts in central Alberta. "Every place I went the crop is abundant and there has been no damage. Some of the fields are turning golden. The spirit of optimism which I found and the appearance of the farm forecasts prosperity."

During the past three weeks Mr. Smith has been touring the Camrose, Vegreville and neighboring districts holding public meetings at which he has explained the policy and work of the department of education. Altogether Mr. Smith addressed twenty meetings and in every case found the people of the district deeply interested in educational matters. He brought the trip to a conclusion on Monday with the opening of a new two-roomed school in the Ruthenian district about twenty-five miles north of Vegreville.

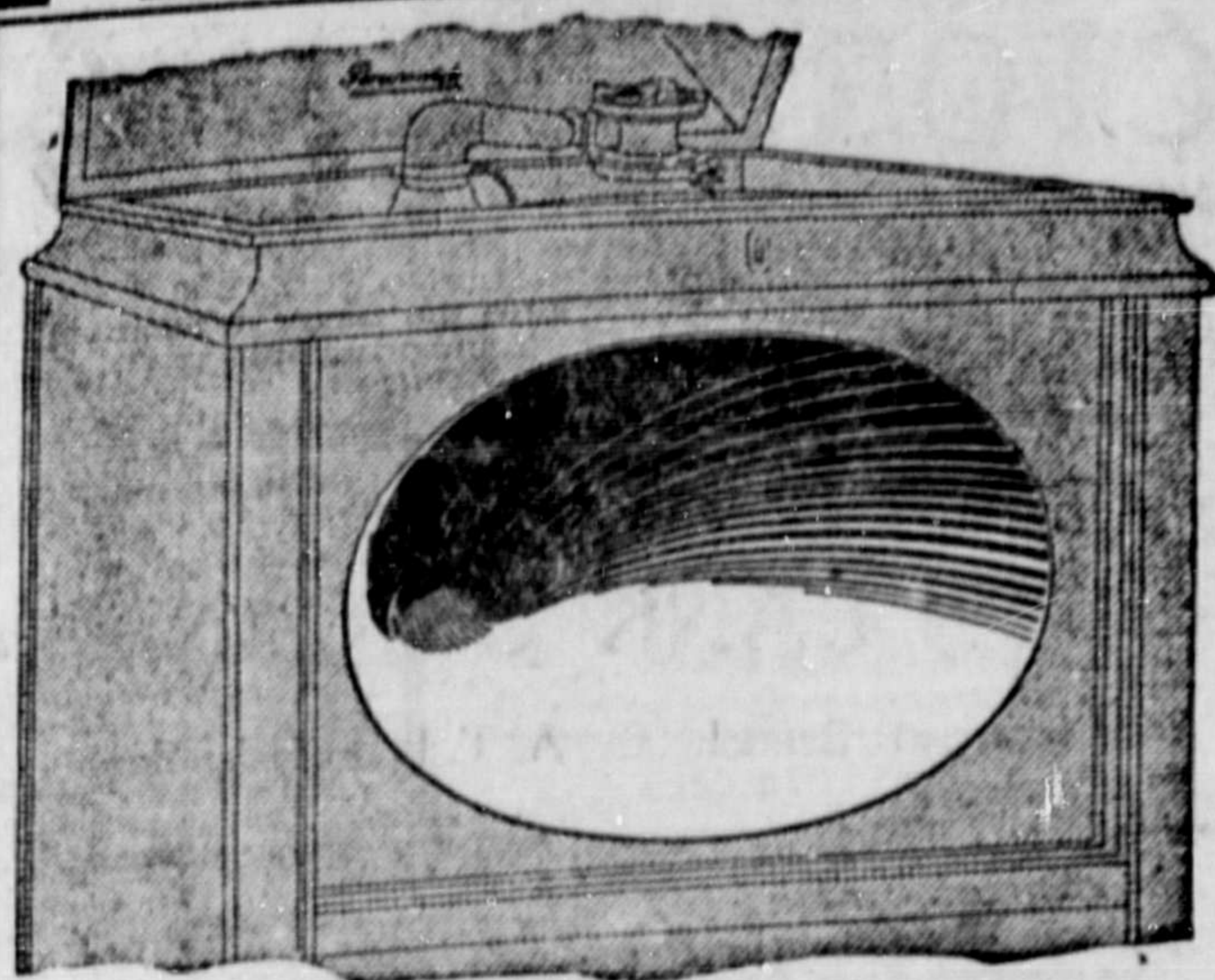

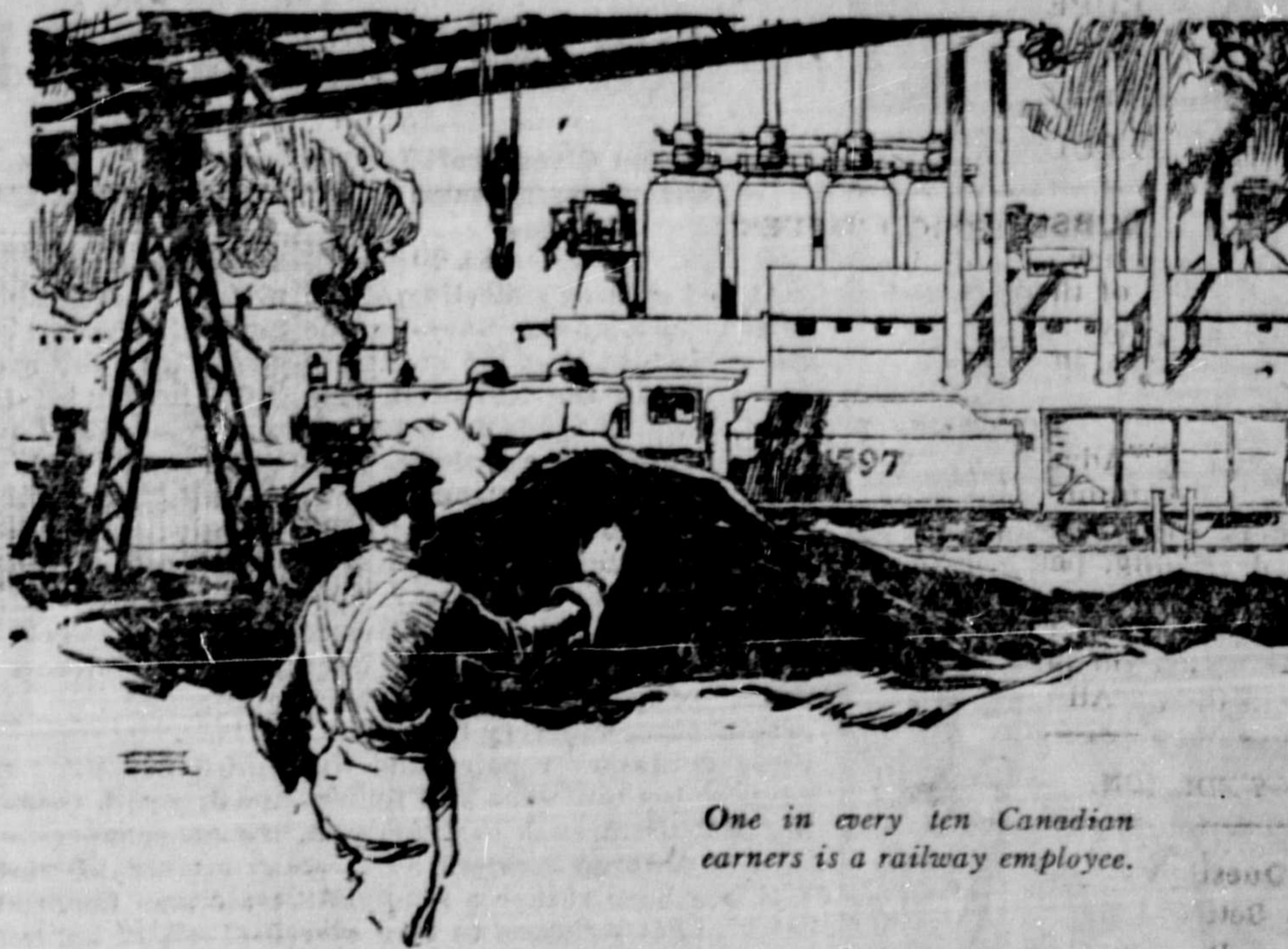

NANCY JANE FOR THE BOYS

Major Gibson Gives Craft for the Use of Boys' Naval Brigade.

At last evening's meeting of the local branch of the Navy League it was decided that the matter of estimates for the formation of a Boys' Naval Brigade here be left in the hands of the new executive and Lieut. Helmsing. Major Gibson has kindly consented to let the local branch have the use of the "Nancy Jane." This is just the style of boat that will suit the work for the boys but she needs fixing up. The provincial organization will very likely make these necessary repairs and will advance ten uniforms and following that the branch can carry on.

It has been rather a stumbling block to get someone to take over the nautical instruction but the matter was smoothed out last evening when Capt. McGoskie offered his services. He is just the style of man required to give the boys a few tips on seamanship as he has had a wide experience "before the mast." C. V. Eviatt will have charge of the boys otherwise and the services of a man with such a ready executive ability will quickly bring the brigade into its own.

Before it was finally decided to go ahead with the organization Lieut. Helmsing explained how fortunately Prince Rupert was situated for a first class naval brigade. The water and boats were here and vessels of all sizes come into the harbor. If a person took a stroll down to the drydock ships could be seen in the course of construction. The parents should not think that the brigade was to train up fighters. Although the Navy League came into existence during the war it is not a war time measure, but has really absorbed the Sailors' Institute and other such benefit organizations. It was to help the mercantile marine that better trained boys should be able to take their places on British ships and thus eliminate from the crews aliens and Orientals.

KILL AMUSEMENT TAX.

MOVING PICTURE MAN IS IN TOWN

Starts Work Directly on His Arrival at the Dock.

Prince Rupert has a moving picture photographer here in the person of Wm. Fox who is associated with the exhibits and publicity bureau of the Department of Trade and Commerce at Ottawa. Mr. Fox arrived on the Prince George this morning and leaves tonight for Stewart and upon his return will visit Anyox. Two or three days will be spent here next week when various points of interest will be photographed.

This morning as the train pulled out Mr. Fox was right on the job with G. A. McNeill and the passengers were "shot" from a number of angles. This big train was taken as it moved out, first as it approached and then after it went by. The local young ladies on the observation car were all smiles for the camera man.

PREMIER AT PEACE RIVER

Went Up on Same Train With Mr. Bowser.

Hon. John Oliver, premier of British Columbia, was in the city Monday morning on his way to the Pouce Coupe country, where he will look into the railway situation, says the Edmonton Bulletin. The settlers there have been pressing upon the government the need of transportation for their crops there, and both the premier and the leader of the opposition, W. J. Bowser, went north on the Monday train.

At present the only outlet from the Pouce Coupe country is to Grande Prairie in the summer, and in the winter they can come in over the Edmonton, Dunvegan & B. C. railroad grade to Spirit River, which cuts down the trail to about sixty miles. It is close to a hundred miles overland to Grande Prairie, and that is counting from the nearest edge of settlement. There is no way of getting in from British Columbia at all, and the people are pressing for the extension of the Pacific Great Eastern.

A great number of soldier settlers have come into the Pouce Coupe country this year, settling in a regular colony across the Outknife river. A great deal of stock has gone in during the past couple of years also, the natural grass in that country being eminently suited for the production of the finest beef, and all of these factors force the settlers to press for railway communication with the outside world.

Premier Oliver was in consultation with Premier Chas. Stewart at the Parliament buildings Monday morning, but neither spoke of the plans. In fact, Mr. Oliver said that he did not have anything definite to say until he saw the people and looked into conditions for himself.

GREEKS TO OCCUPY CONSTANTINOPLE

ROME, August 7.—It is reported here that the Allies have given the Greeks authority to occupy Constantinople.

COW BAY IS DISCUSSED AT BOARD MEETING

Joint Committee of Council and
Board of Trade to
Report.

The Board of Trade at its meet-
ing last night decided to ask the
City Council to appoint a com-
mittee to meet a committee of the
Board and to take up the whole
matter of the Cow Bay difference
and try to arrive at an under-
standing. President Parker will
appoint the Board committee and
the mayor is to be asked to ap-
point an equal number from the
council. This committee to go
thoroughly into the various propo-
sals which have been made with
a view to a settlement.

The question of a level cross-
ing to the provincial government
docks, and the suggested transfer
of the properties at Cow Bay with
a view to developing the water-
front adjoining the Boat Club and
possibly the closing of the bay
will all be gone into and recom-
mendations made.

Action was brought about fol-
lowing the report from the chair-
man of the Port Committee who
sent in a written report although
he was not present in person. The
report said:

Docks for Small Boats.

"Replying to your letter of July
7th regarding resolution passed
at the last monthly meeting rela-
tive to wharf facilities for small
craft, with particular reference to
securing temporary space be-
tween the 'Hazelton' and the Im-
perial Oil Dock, would say:

"Your committee has gone into
this matter and find—owing to the
City holding up the Cow Bay
proposition that the water front-
age referred to is in such an un-
settled state that no progress can
be made. Further they are of the
opinion that if the facilities for
the fishing fleet are gone on with
at Seal Cove; that ample provi-
sion can be made at the floats now
installed between the government
dock and Cow Bay for the moor-
ing of small boats having traffic
to and from this port. These fa-
cilities would probably have to be
changed or further improved to
suit the conditions of the traffic
that would be required of them.

"We would suggest that a letter
be written to the City Council
asking them what their intention
is in regard to the Cow Bay front-
age."

Good Plans.

President Parker said he had
seen the plans for the develop-
ment of the docks and they were
very reasonable. They provided
for a level crossing at Cow Bay,
practically at the same place that
the road now crossed. It would
make the docks much more ready
of access and at a better grade
than the present approach.

G. W. Nickerson suggested that
the matter should be settled at
once and moved a resolution to
the effect that committees from
the Board and the City Council
confer in regard to it.

the house, but did not do so. Now
that people here were purchasing
a lot of sawdust from Montreal
the company should have to do
its part.

The secretary was instructed
to write the Commissioners to
that effect, Mr. deGex to aid in
drafting the letter.

In the city police court this

had been slightly inebriated and
while feeling good threw the bi-
cycle over a fence at Fulton St.

in and this morning he was fined

CLAIM VICTORY OVER BOLSHIES

Reds Fleeing From Gen. Wrangle
—4,000 Captured.

CONSTANTINOPLE, August 7.
—The Reds are fleeing from Gen-
eral Wrangle who claims a vic-
tory over the Bolsheviki. He re-
ports the capture of 4,000 pris-
oners in a recent action.

FELL FROM BICYCLE, DIED SOON AFTER

Detective Succumbs on Way to
Hospital at Edmonton.

EDMONTON, August 7.—Harry
Yule, a detective in the service of
the International agency, died
suddenly Tuesday morning while
being taken to the Misericordia
hospital, where he was being con-
veyed after having been picked up
in an unconscious condition on
118th street.

Mr. Yule, it appears, was riding
on a bicycle along 118th street
about nine o'clock, when he was
seen to fall from the wheel by M.
Hunnalls who immediately went
to his assistance, and finding him
insensible, phoned for Howard and
McLride's ambulance. On the way
to the hospital he recovered con-
sciousness and was able to give
his name and the address of his
place of business. Again he lapsed
into unconsciousness and died be-
fore reaching the hospital.

Dr. D. A. McGibbon viewed the
body and gave it as his opinion
that death was due to apoplexy.

Coroner Dr. Harry Smith was
called and gave instructions to
detective John Watson to make
an investigation but it is not
thought likely that an inquest
will be ordered.

Deceased was a single man,
aged about 45 years. He lived at
the Collier Hotel and has been in
the city a number of years.

ENOCH ARDEN STORY IN MODERN LIFE

KANSAS CITY, August 7.—A war version of Enoch Arden, with a different ending, was written into the records of Judge C. A. Burney's court today, with Eugene E. Peel in the role of Philip Ray.

Back in 1914, according to Peel, there was an Annie Lee living at Carthage, Mo. Her name was Esther Warren. She had two suitors. Besides Peel, there was Henry Curtis. Curtis won in the courtship. He married Esther in August, 1914, and Peel came to Kansas City to be away from the remembrance.

Then came the world war, and tore Curtis away from his bride. In 1915 he went with the Canadian Expeditionary Forces to Belgium. From the battle of Mons came word to Esther of her husband's death.

Peel learned of the widowhood of his former sweetheart and renewed his courtship. On September 19, 1916, Peel and Esther were wed. They came to Kansas City to live.

In June, 1919, Curtis came home. Months in a hospital, delirious and unable to tell his identity, marks of identification lost, was his explanation for his long absence. He had been gassed and listed as dead in action.
