## Russian Situation Improves Slightly

### ATTEMPT TO CAPTURE BANDITS ENDS IN DEATH OF ONE AND TWO POLICEMEN

#### Blockade of Russian Ports Is Once More Effective

Quiet Delegation in London promises Armistice will Become Effective Tonight; Preparations for Military Measures

#### Two Police Constables and Bandit Killed in Gun Fight

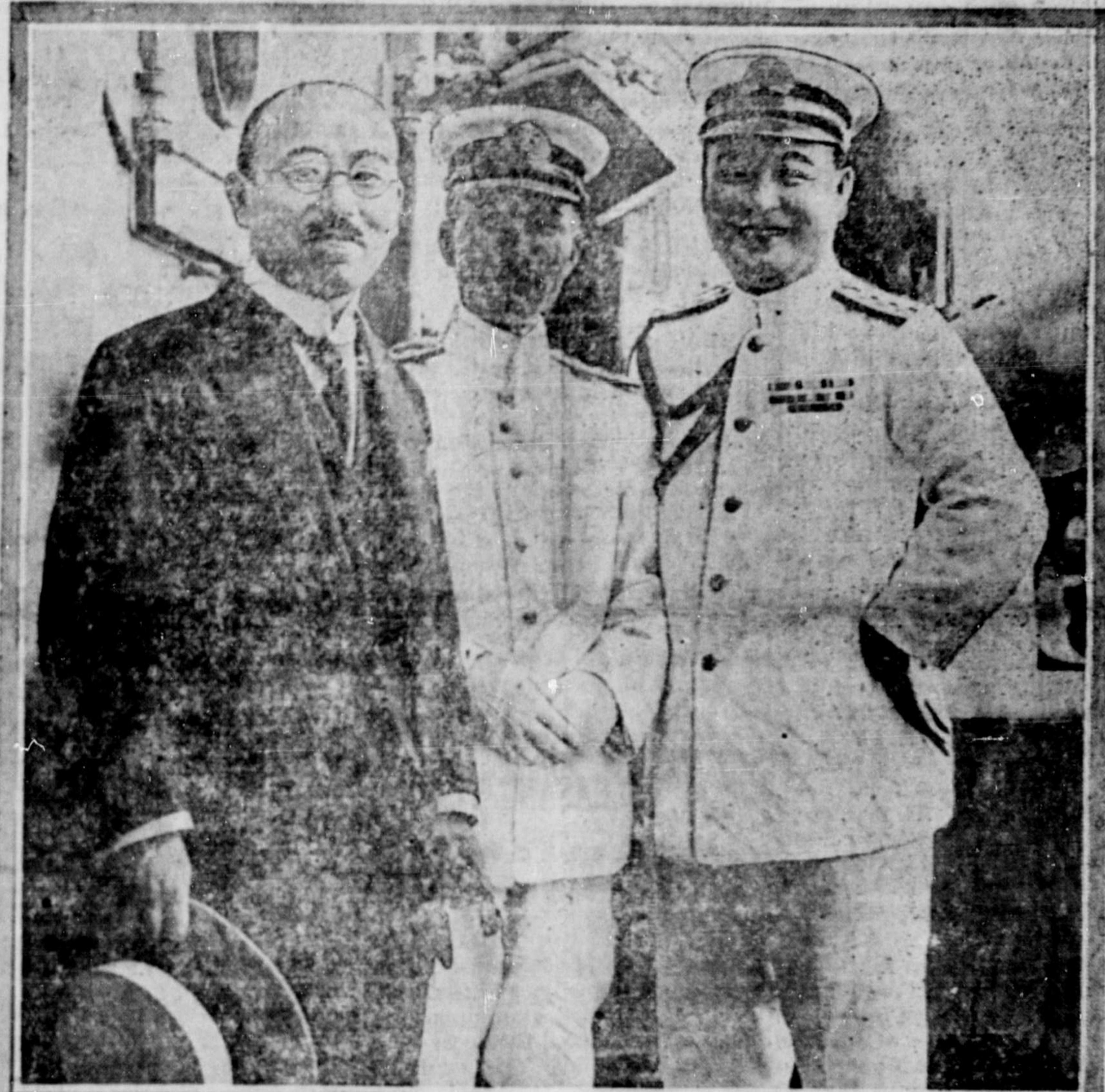
Two Men Escaped at Frank but Bloodhounds are en route from Seattle to run them down; Fourteen Holes shot in Usher

ARSAW, August 9.—The Reds are reported only sixty miles away from here.

THE, England, August 9.—The Bolsheviks having refused their demand to conclude a ten days' truce with Poland, the British and French premiers are in consultation today with a view to the Poles. The Russian blockade has become effective and it is hoped by this means to bring the Reds to time. The military chiefs are also in consultation with a view to Poland by the use of Military measures.

ONDON, August 9.—The Soviet delegation here in a conference message says that Russia is ready to grant Poland an armistice commencing tonight.

#### WILLIAM OGLE IS ARRESTED

Murderer of Dodds Was Arrested on Ranch at Quesnel When Taken by Police.

#### WAS UNABLE TO PUT UP FIGHT

PRINCE GEORGE, Aug. 9.—William Ogle, alleged murderer of Thomas Dodds near Prince George, was arrested on Saturday when working on Macdonell's ranch. He was taken to Provincial Constable McDonald before he had time to put up a fight. He will be taken to Prince George where he will have a preliminary trial before the magistrate.

#### INDIGNANT CHARGES

Commission Assured no Force Withheld and Press Always Welcome.

The session of the Police Commission this morning questioned the charge against a man named Ogle who had been arrested during the past week which was dismissed. The statements had been made by Policeman McDonald who had been allowed to give evidence that the reporter had been present during the hearing. The case of Ogle's explanation that he had been consented to all that was on the charge sheet so there was no need of putting evidence in the box as this was the only evidence for the prosecution. The turning out of the reporter this was entirely as at any time if any press representatives did not wish to be there they were free to come and get information from him. #### ADMIRAL RODMAN VISITED PORT

Was Entertained Last Night by U. S. Consul—Called on Mayor.

#### SEIZED LIQUOR AT SASKATCHEWAN TOWN

\$41,000 Worth of Fiery Liquid Taken and Men Arrested

#### FOUR DROWN AT OTTAWA SATURDAY

OTTAWA, Aug. 9.—There were four deaths from drowning here over the weekend. W. Charette, 40 years of age, and A. Gagne, 29, were drowned in sight of the rest of the family. The other casualties were A. Joannis, 48 years of age, and C. Williams.

#### WARSHIPS FOR THE BLACK SEA

Three Leave Malta for Constantinople

MALTA, Aug. 9.—Three British warships have started to Constantinople probably to participate in the blockade of Russian ports following the refusal of the Bolsheviks to stop fighting in Poland.

#### WATERFRONT VERY BUSY

Nine Craft in Port in Addition to Many Fishing Boats.

There were no less than nine vessels in port at one time on Saturday and the waterfront presented a very busy scene. #### Was Committed for Trial in Police Court Today

John Karkle Confessed to having Taken Articles and Money from Cigar Store and Grocery

In the police court before Magistrate McMordie this morning John Karkle was committed for trial on the two charges of breaking into and stealing from the premises of the Prince Rupert billiard parlor and cigar store and from the Prince Rupert Table Supply. The accused who has confessed to the police will likely come before Judge Young this afternoon and if he then pleads guilty, sentence will probably be passed at once. The arrest of Karkle on Saturday afternoon and the consequent finding of the tobacco pouches, etc., at his home has cleared up the mystery of the robbery of two weeks ago.

BELLEVUE, Alta, August 9.—At a point close to the B. C. boundary mounted police constable Usher, provincial constable Bailey and Alberta Bassoff, the bandit, were all killed on Saturday afternoon in a gun fight. The police officers surprised the Sentinel train robbers eating in a restaurant on Saturday afternoon. Earlier the bandits had been driven from cover and had failed in an attempt to buy bread at Coleman. They moved next in the direction of Bellevue and were getting a meal there when the police dropped on them.

"Hands up," demanded the police. The order was answered by a fusillade, the fatalities occurring in the street outside.

Arloff and a companion were wounded but escaped to Turtle Mountain with a large posse in pursuit.

Bassoff while dying shot fourteen holes through Constable Usher, while Arloff and Akroff escaped among the debris and rocks at the scene of the landslide at Frank.

PORCUPINE NOT A PLEASANT VISITOR

Threw Quills About Cabin of Boat Says Captain Roe.

Capt. P. S. Roe, of the Okanagan Lake Boat Co., had the most interesting passenger on his boat this morning, says the Summerland Review. He boarded the ferry here this morning, and making himself rather objectionable as a passenger, he was put ashore at Trout Creek Point.

Capt. Roe had run up to the C. P. R. wharf at a very early hour this morning, and was stretched out on a seat in the cabin, awaiting the arrival of W. R. Shields, whom he was to take across the lake, when, hearing a noise outside the cabin, he looked out of the window and saw a big, fat porcupine on the deck.

Capt. Roe says that his passenger definitely answered the disputed question as to whether a porcupine could project its offensive weapons, or release them only on contact. He says that by a shake or quiver quills were thrown some distance, and driven into the walls of the cabin.

After demonstrations of this nature, the animal was taken prisoner, and later in the morning put ashore at Trout Creek Point, Capt. Roe having been told, upon enquiry, that it was illegal to destroy him.

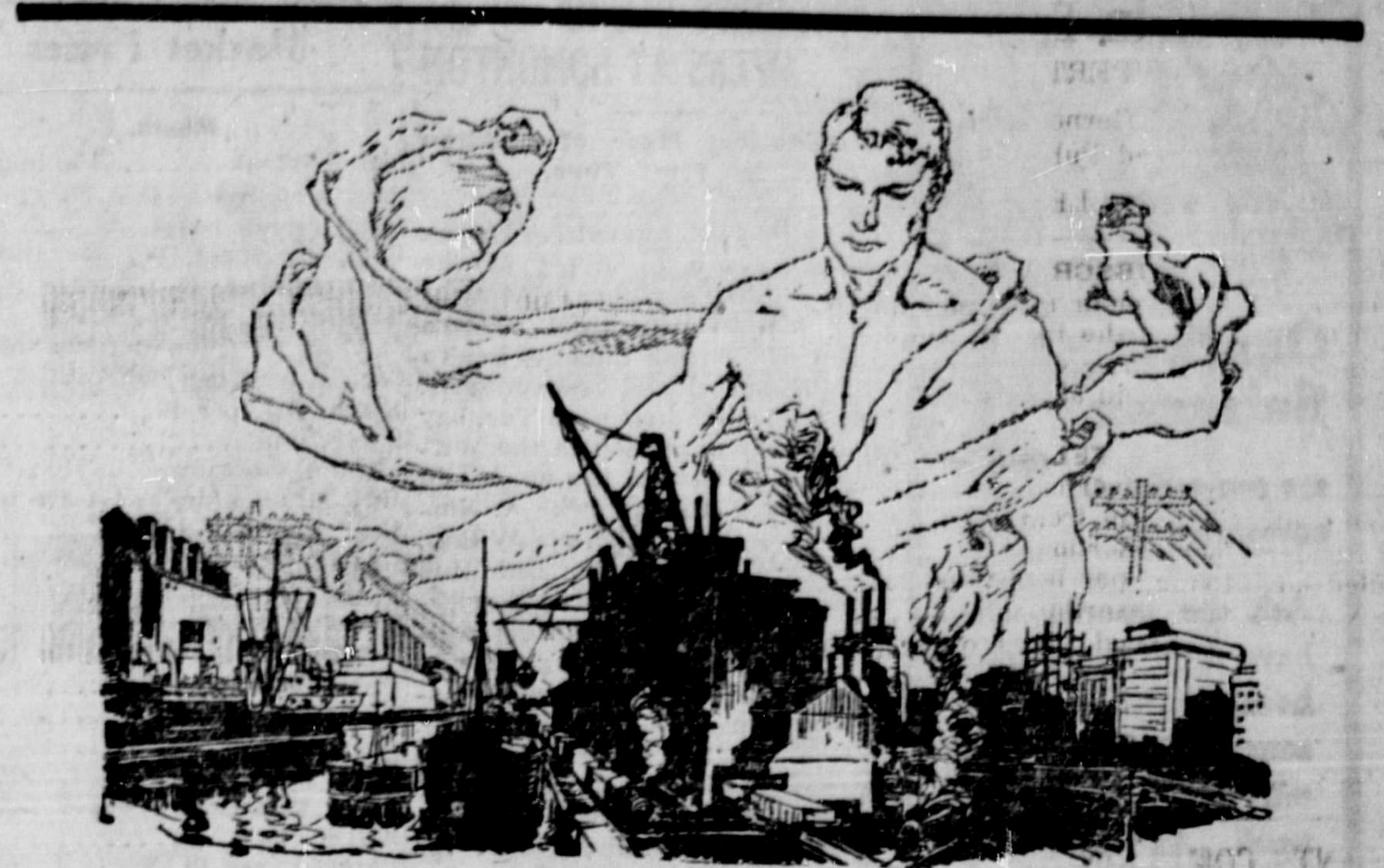

**CHILDREN'S CLINIC OPENS AT EDMONTON**

Examinations Made of Children for First Time.

EDMONTON, August 7.—Eleven children were examined at the first children's clinic in connection with the new child welfare policy of the department of health of the provincial government. The clinics are held each Tuesday and Friday afternoon in the Williamson block and the nurses in charge are Miss Blanche A. Emerson and Miss Minnie Wilkin, both graduates of the Hamilton General Hospital. Miss Emerson took a course in infant welfare work and for three years was connected with the babies' dispensary in Hamilton. Dr. D.B. Lietch was the doctor in charge on Friday and Dr. Follinsbee on Tuesday.

At the first clinic, five of the eleven were of pre-school age, five were babies and one child was of school age; an exception was made of the latter as she was from Bon Accord where there is no school inspection. Of the eleven, three needed dental attention badly, five were cases of malnutrition due to improper feeding, and the others required minor operations. The nurses will follow up these cases during the week and see that the instructions are carried out at home. All are requested to report back to the clinics or be referred to their family physicians.

**NO "TRAIL OF '98" FOR THE WANDERERS' CLUB**

At the meeting of the Police Commission this morning an application was received from the Wanderers' Club to run an entertainment to be known as the "Trail of '98." This entertainment was to be given for the purpose of raising club funds. Among the features proposed were wheels of fortune, chuck-a-luck, craps, cards, etc.

### CAR FERRY TO ALASKA POINTS

Quite Feasible, Says Representative of G. T. P.

The establishment of a car ferry service between Prince Rupert, B. C., and points in South-eastern Alaska is being seriously considered by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company as a means of getting a portion of Alaskan freight consignments routed over its lines, especially car load lots, says the Alaska Daily Empire. Its interest in this matter was manifested recently in a letter to the Forest Service, excerpts from which recently appeared in the Ketchikan Chronicle.

The company's experience with the recently established ferry car service out of Prince Rupert operating 112 miles to Swanson Bay in order to accommodate the Whalen Pulp and Paper Company has inclined it to view similar projects favorably. Referring to an Alaskan service along the same lines, representatives of the company write:

"The installation of a car ferry slip dock at Ketchikan, Alaska, could, we understand, be easily accomplished and navigation would be safe between that point and Prince Rupert, B. C., a distance of 93 miles. The channel between Prince Rupert and Ketchikan is protected practically all of the way by islands, which form a natural breakwater, thus ensuring safe operation of a car ferry; and the same remarks apply with equal force to other points in Southeastern Alaska.

"In answer to your question as to whether a car ferry service appeals to us as feasible under present conditions, we beg to reply in the affirmative, provided slip dock facilities are installed and such industries located and in operation as to make it an object to the railway to inaugurate the service."

### EXALTED RULER OF ELKS VISITS CITY

Joe Morris, of Vancouver, to Spend End of This Week Here

It was a gay day for the local Elks yesterday, for Joe Morris, Grand Exalted Ruler, arrived in the city on the train for the east. On the trip he is accompanied by Mrs. Morris, and up to last night had enjoyed the trip immensely. The distinguished visitor belongs to No. 4 Lodge, in Vancouver, and this is his first trip to this city in his present capacity.

Mr. and Mrs. Morris were met at the train by a large number of the local members of the lodge. Following a short time spent in the city the visitors left for Anxox, and will return to Prince Rupert on Thursday night. They will then visit during the rest of the week here where an excellent program of entertainments has been arranged by the committee in charge.

### NUMBER OF BIDS FOR PROVINCIAL LOAN

Government Secures Loan of \$3,000,000 at 98.91, Payment 6 per cent.

British Columbia bond houses secured the \$3,000,000 provincial loan, bids for which were recently called by Hon. John Hart, minister of finance. The lowest bid was a joint offer submitted by the British American Bond Corporation, Limited; Messrs. Gillespie, Hart & Todd, of Victoria, and the Royal Financial Corporation, of Vancouver. The bid accepted by the Government figures out at a rate of 98.91 for the whole issue of five-year six per cent bonds. The same concerns submitted another bid for 99.07 for one-half the full amount of issue, but it was deemed advisable to dispose of the entire flotation at the lower figure above.

In all seven bids were received. The other bids were as follows: Wood, Gundy and Co., Dominion Securities Company and A. E. Ames & Company, all of Toronto, together with Halsey, Stewart & Company, of Chicago, at 98.59 for \$1,500,000. John E. Price & Co., Carsten & Earles, and Ferris & Hargrove, all of Seattle, bid 99 for \$1,700,000 of the issue. The Canadian Bond Corporation, Ltd., of Toronto, bid for \$1,000,444 in New York funds for delivery in New York. The Canadian Bank of Commerce bid on behalf of W. A. MacKenzie & Co., the First National Company and Aegillius Jarvis & Company, a syndicate represented by the local firm of R. P. Clark & Company, the price offered being 99.25 for \$1,500,000. This latter bid was rejected by the minister of finance on the ground that it called for the government purchasing New York

funds at a thirteen per cent premium and, he states, the government is not inclined to trade in exchange fluctuations. The National Bond Corporation bid for \$1,000,000 at 98.75.

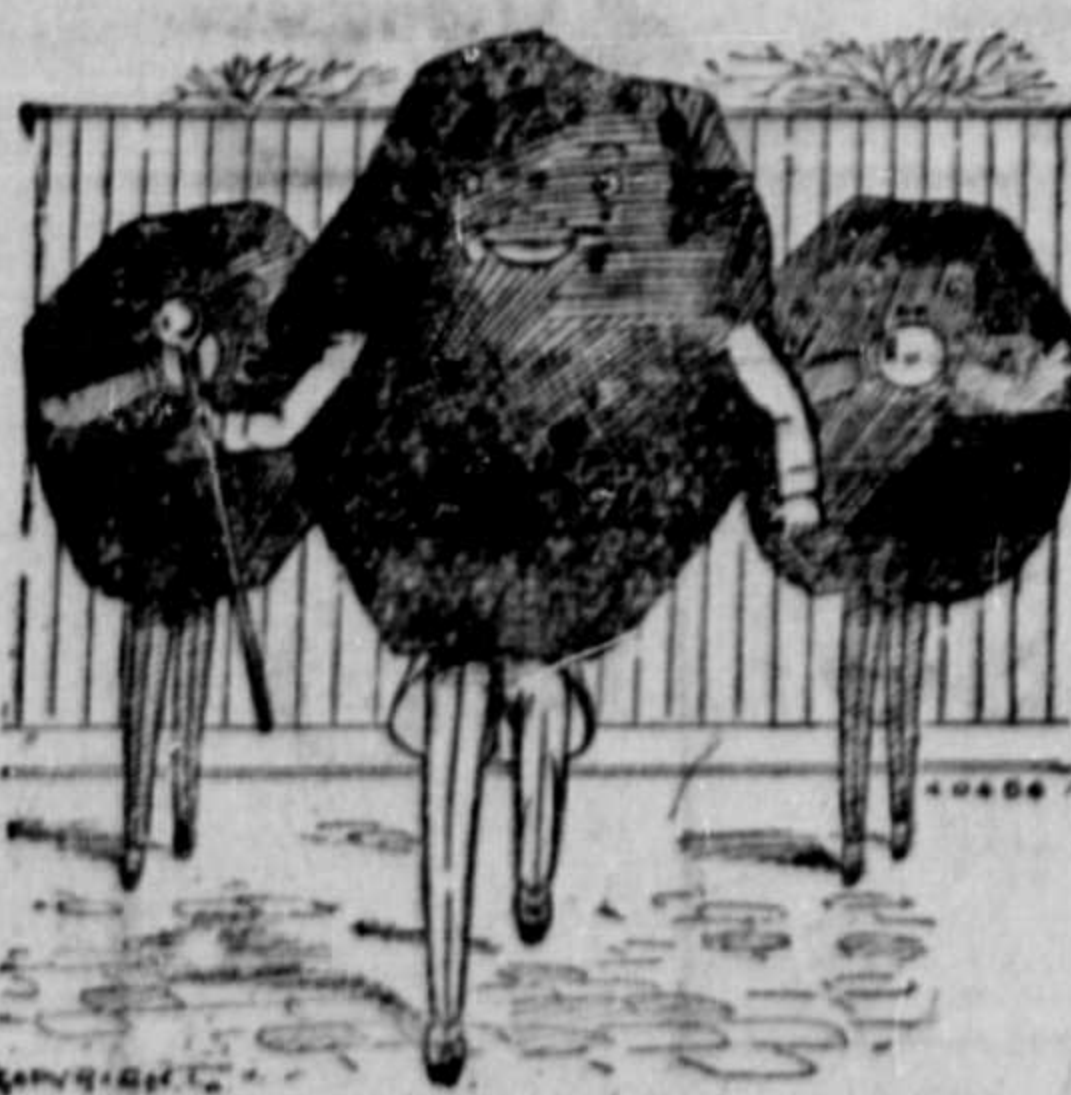

### FORMS CIVIC LEAGUE TO ENFORCE THE LAW

Ketchikan Has New Organization For Special Work.

Ketchikan now has a fully organized Civic League, whose purpose is to see that the law is enforced, says the Chronicle of last Friday. The organization was completed at a meeting held at the Red Men's hall last night. The original name, "The League to Enforce the Law," was changed to the simpler one, "The Civic League." Rev. Falkoner and Mrs. Edith C. Schell, elected president and secretary, respectively, at a former meeting, will continue in the same capacities. Mrs. Loris Barker was elected treasurer, Carl Foss vice-president last night. The meeting was addressed by Delegate Geo. B. Grigsby and Chaplain W. A. Hopkins of the destroyer flotilla.

Chaplain Hopkins is a witty and forceful speaker, who has had thrilling experiences on sea and land. During and since the war he has been in every port on the Atlantic coast and the large ports on the Pacific. He has also crossed the continent.

He spoke of the efficiency of federal officers in capturing booze, especially in California cities, and mentioned that any vehicle transporting booze is subject to confiscation by federal authorities.

Delegate George Grigsby being present was invited to address the meeting. Mr. Grigsby said the Volstead Act is not self executing; that it must depend upon public sentiment for its enforcement. He did not know how far it is violated here. He called the enforcement of a federal law by federal officers in Ketchikan "a purely local issue."

### NEXT SENATE BOUND TO BE BONE DRY

No Chance of Change in United States for Many Years.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—Prohibition leaders here are jubilant over the prospects that the next Senate will be "bone dry."

They are not worrying over Presidential candidates nor even about the complexion of the House, though they are preparing to wage an intensive fight in every state to maintain the overwhelming "dry" majority in the lower branch of Congress.

Their jubilation is the result of a careful check of the Senate situation, which was just completed yesterday.

Without counting doubtful senators—using as a basis of calculation only those whose attitude on the prohibition question is definitely known—we have in the ranks of those who are not up for re-election this year within eight votes of enough to keep the wets from winning," declared Dr. E. C. Dinwiddie. Dr. Dinwiddie has just retired as legislative superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League to become chairman of the American executive committee arranging for the fifteenth International Congress Against Alcohol, which meets in Washington December 21-27.

Sure of Eight More.

"In other words," Dr. Dinwiddie explains, "the number of sure dry votes among the holdovers makes it necessary for us to win only eight of the thirty-two senators to be elected in November. There is no doubt that many more than eight of the thirty-two seats to be filled will be occupied by "dry" senators. A majority of the senators standing for re-election are "dry" and their opponents in a majority of cases are "dry."

### MUCH RAIN FELL LAST WEEK IN KETCHIKAN

The Ketchikan Alaska Chronicle of Thursday last says:

"According to measurements of the power house of the Citizens' Light, Power and Water Company, the rainfall from 6 o'clock Wednesday night was 7.10 inches. This is the highest in three years, the record having been made in November, 1917, when 7.14 inches of rain fell in twenty-four hours.

"The record may be broken today, however, if the fall continues throughout the day, for at noon today, or in eighteen hours, the rainfall was six inches. Yesterday at noon for the preceding eighteen hours it was only five inches."
