



# Russian Situation Improves Slightly

## ATTEMPT TO CAPTURE BANDITS ENDS IN DEATH OF ONE AND TWO POLICEMEN

### Blockade of Russian Ports Is Once More Effective

Soviet Delegation in London promises Armistice will Become Effective Tonight; Preparations for Military Measures

WARSAW, August 9.—The Reds are reported only sixty miles away from here.

THE, England, August 9.—The Bolsheviks having refused Poland's demand to conclude a ten days' truce with Poland, the British and French premiers are in consultation today with a view to ending the Poles. The Russian blockade has become effective and is hoped by this means to bring the Reds to terms.

British military chiefs are also in consultation with a view to ending the Poles by the use of Military measures.

LONDON, August 9.—The Soviet delegation here in a communiqué message says that Russia is ready to grant Poland an armistice commencing tonight.

### LIAM OGLE ADMIRAL RODMAN IS ARRESTED VISITED PORT

Murderer of Dodds Was Entertained Last Night by U. S. Consul—Called on Mayor.

SED UNABLE TO PUT UP FIGHT

Yesterday the U. S. destroyer "Sinclair" Capt. Smith, with Admiral Rodman and staff aboard, dropped anchor in the harbor and remained until early this morning when she continued her voyage south from Alaska, and will call at Victoria en route.

American Consul E. A. Wakefield went aboard and with Admiral Rodman called on the mayor and the call was later returned.

In the evening Admiral Rodman and staff and his nephew, W. Rodman, called on the consul and Mrs. Wakefield and were entertained there throughout the evening.



## Two Police Constables and Bandit Killed in Gun Fight

Two Men Escaped at Frank but Bloodhounds are en route from Seattle to run them down; Fourteen Holes shot in Usher

BELLEVUE, Alta, August 9.—At a point close to the B. C. boundary mounted police constable Usher, provincial constable Bailey and Alberta Bassoff, the bandit, were all killed on Saturday afternoon in a gun fight. The police officers surprised the Sentinel train robbers eating in a restaurant on Saturday afternoon. Earlier the bandits had been driven from cover and had failed in an attempt to buy bread at Coleman. They moved next in the direction of Bellevue and were getting a meal there when the police dropped on them.

"Hands up," demanded the police.

The order was answered by a fusilade, the fatalities occurring in the street outside.

Arloff and a companion were wounded but escaped to Turtle Mountain with a large posse in pursuit.

Bassoff while dying shot fourteen holes through Constable Usher, while Arloff and Akroff escaped among the debris and rocks at the scene of the landslide at Frank.

Police bloodhounds are en route from Seattle and it is expected that there will be no difficulty in running down the bandits now at large.

## PORCUPINE NOT A PLEASANT VISITOR

Threw Quills About Cabin of Boat  
Says Captain Roe.

Capt. P. S. Roe, of the Okanagan Lake Boat Co., had a most interesting passenger on his boat this morning, says the Summerland Review. He boarded the ferry here this morning, and making himself rather objectionable as a passenger, he was put ashore at Trout Creek Point.

Capt. Roe had run up to the C. P. R. wharf at a very early hour this morning, and was stretched out on a seat in the cabin, awaiting the arrival of W. R. Shields, whom he was to take across the lake, when, hearing a noise outside the cabin, he looked out of the window and saw a big, fat porcupine on the deck. Capt. Roe was disposed to let his uninvited guest enjoy a ride and leave the boat at his leisure, but later, when he became dissatisfied with his surroundings and showed his resentment by throwing his sharp-pointed quills about the cabin, and on other parts of the boat, his attitude changed.

Capt. Roe says that his passenger definitely answered the disputed question as to whether a porcupine could project its offensive weapons, or release them only on contact. He says that by a shake or quiver quills were thrown some distance, and driven into the walls of the cabin.

After demonstrations of this nature, the animal was taken prisoner, and later in the morning put ashore at Trout Creek Point, Capt. Roe having been told, upon enquiry, that it was illegal to destroy him.

The work of widening and improving the walk to the Salt Lake has been commenced by the Public Works department of the Provincial Government. Before completing the permanent walk one of the bad grades is being eliminated so that there will be no danger for old or young even on damp and slippery days.

## CHILDREN'S CLINIC OPENS AT EDMONTON

Examinations Made of Children  
for First Time.

EDMONTON, August 7.—Eleven children were examined at the first children's clinic in connection with the new child welfare policy of the department of health of the provincial government. The clinics are held each Tuesday and Friday afternoon in the Williamson block and the nurses in charge are Miss Blanche A. Emerson and Miss Minnie Wilkin, both graduates of the Hamilton General Hospital. Miss Emerson took a course in infant welfare work and for three years was connected with the babies' dispensary in Hamilton. Dr. D. B. Litch was the doctor in charge on Friday and Dr. Follinsbee on Tuesday.

At the first clinic, five of the eleven were of pre-school age, five were babies and one child was of school age; an exception was made of the latter as she was from Bon Accord where there is no school inspection. Of the eleven, three needed dental attention badly, five were cases of malnutrition due to improper feeding, and the others required minor operations. The nurses will follow up these cases during the week and see that the instructions are carried out at home. All are requested to report back to the clinics or be referred to their family physicians.



## CAR FERRY TO ALASKA POINTS

Quite Feasible, Says Representative of G. T. P.

The establishment of a car ferry service between Prince Rupert, B. C., and points in Southeastern Alaska is being seriously considered by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company as a means of getting a portion of Alaskan freight consignments routed over its lines, especially car load lots, says the Alaska Daily Empire. Its interest in this matter was manifested recently in a letter to the Forest Service, excerpts from which recently appeared in the Ketchikan Chronicle.

The company's experience with the recently established ferry car service out of Prince Rupert operating 112 miles to Swanson Bay in order to accommodate the Whalen Pulp and Paper Company has inclined it to view similar projects favorably. Referring to an Alaskan service along the same lines, representatives of the company write:

"The installation of a car ferry slip dock at Ketchikan, Alaska, could, we understand, be easily accomplished and navigation would be safe between that point and Prince Rupert, B. C., a distance of 93 miles. The channel between Prince Rupert and Ketchikan is protected practically all of the way by islands, which form a natural breakwater, thus ensuring safe operation of a car ferry; and the same remarks apply with equal force to other points in Southeastern Alaska."

"In answer to your question as to whether a car ferry service appeals to us as feasible under present conditions, we beg to reply in the affirmative, provided slip dock facilities are installed and such industries located and in operation as to make it an object to the railway to inaugurate the service."

## EXALTED RULER OF ELKS VISITS CITY

## NUMBER OF BIDS FOR PROVINCIAL LOAN

Government Secures Loan of \$3,000,000 at 98.91, Payment 6 per cent.

British Columbian bond houses secured the \$3,000,000 provincial loan, bids for which were recently called by Hon. John Hart, minister of finance. The lowest bid was a joint offer submitted by the British American Bond Corporation, Limited; Messrs. Gillespie, Hart & Todd, of Victoria, and the Royal Financial Corporation, of Vancouver. The bid accepted by the Government figures out at a rate of 98.91 for the whole issue of five-year six per cent bonds. The same concerns submitted another bid for 99.07 for one-half the full amount of issue, but it was deemed advisable to dispose of the entire flotation at the lower figure above.

In all seven bids were received. The other bids were as follows: Wood, Gundy and Co., Dominion Securities Company and A. E. Ames & Company, all of Toronto, together with Halsey, Stewart & Company, of Chicago, at 98.59 for \$1,500,000; John E. Price & Co., Carsten & Earles, and Ferris & Hargrove, all of Seattle, bid 99 for \$1,700,000 of the issue. The Canadian Bond Corporation, Ltd., of Toronto, bid for \$1,000,444 in New York funds for delivery in New York. The Canadian Bank of Commerce bid on behalf of W. A. MacKenzie & Co., the First National Company and Aegilius Jarvis & Company, a syndicate represented by the local firm of R. P. Clark & Company, the price offered being 99.25 for \$1,500,000. This latter bid was rejected by the minister of finance on the ground that it called for the government purchasing New York

funds at a thirteen per cent premium and, he states, the government is not inclined to trade in exchange fluctuations. The National Bond Corporation bid for \$1,000,000 at 98.75.

Bathing at Salt Lake and picnicking on the beaches in the neighborhood were the chief amusements yesterday. The water at the lake was unusually warm and a few people bathed in the sea and declared it "not so bad."

### Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land to be \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land produced.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished; but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and setting out trees up to 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, before receiving his grant, cause to be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided application for improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and for 5 years.

Failure to make improvements in 5 years, and improvements of \$100 per annum, and 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he has a permanent residence with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Grazing areas not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residence and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stampage.

Natural gas areas now inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons who are pre-emptors and serving with His Majesty's Forces.

The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended for one year from the death of such person, or for one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by the pre-emptor or pre-emptee recorded after June 24, 1918.

Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1918, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldier's pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enrollment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown Lands to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, or fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchaser is the holder of original parcels, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

### GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range districts, under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits may be based on numbers ranged; priority for settled owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Permits partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers up to ten head.



Their jubilation is the result of a careful check of the Senate situation, which was just completed yesterday.

There is no doubt that many more than eight of the thirty-two senators to be filled will be occupied by 'dry' senators. A majority of the senators standing for re-election are 'dry' and their opponents in a majority of cases are 'dry'."
