There Will be
Continuation of Work.

There are many stories going the rounds as to the future activities at our shipyard and many of these stories are, doubtless, exaggerated and others are just reports of plans formulating. If the plans are not carried out to the dot nobody will be surprised. The one thing that local people are concerned in is that this valuable industry which has meant so much to this town in the past twelve months will not be discontinued when the ships now under construction are completed. It matters little as to the number of ships or their kind as long as the plant is kept running at capacity. There seems little doubt, what with the developments of the past week as they have been announced, that the Prince Rupert yard will be kept running for some years to come and that is what people want to be sure of.

Will Mean
Growth of City.

This shipyard has meant much to the city and if the extensions to the yards that are now proposed are carried out and a thousand or more men come here it will mean still more and the prosperity of the city will be further solidified. The addition of a thousand workers to the city will bring, directly or indirectly, an increase of population of perhaps two or three thousand souls. Rupert's population is now placed conservatively at seven thousand five hundred so it would seem safe to predict that within a very few months there will be a population of over ten thousand even if the extension to the shipbuilding industry is the only new development and no one thinks that it will be.

Business Will
Also Improve.

The new ocean dock will be employing a large number of men all winter, the provincial government court house will probably be started and there is a possibility that something may come forth on station construction. These will all employ a good many workers and when their work on these places is done there will be other building work in the city. All will support a good many people and the people in their turn will support various businesses. This will mean either the expansion of present businesses or the coming in of fresh blood, either of which will have its building effect on the city. From all appearances it would seem that the city is due for a period of healthy and permanent development.

Housing Condition
Is Serious.

While speaking of the growth of the city in population there is one fact that strikes the mind of any person. That fact is that if we are going to have more people in this city we must have places to put them. In all the American and Canadian cities there prevails a great shortage of houses and Prince Rupert is no exception. Even now any new family arriving in town has to search and search for housing accommodation. The only solution for this house question seems to be the establishment of building societies or the further extension of the existing housing scheme so that people of ordinary means might be assisted in building. The building of houses for rent under present conditions is not a profitable business and that is why no houses are being built for this purpose. Something, however, must be done and the problem is one of moment, one that should be taken up by the municipal authorities in the interest of the development of the city.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

**MANY SHOCKS STIR
RESIDENT KLUANE
MINING SECTION**

WHITEHORSE, Y.T., August 27.—An earthquake of unusual severity, lasting all of one night and part of the next day, during which there were from 40 to 50 distinct shocks is reported by Billy Armstrong, an old-timer of the Yukon, who arrived here last week. The disturbance took place in the Kluane district.

Billy has traveled in his wanderings since boyhood all through South America and is a pioneer of the great white Northland, in each of which regions earthquakes of more or less severity are of common occurrence, but he says that on July 7, while camped at the junction of Calden and Lake Creeks, in the Kluane district, he had the most exciting and longest-drawn-out shaking up he has ever experienced in his life.

The manifestation of the disturbance continued throughout an entire night and part of the next day. There were between 40 and 50 distinct earth tremors immediately following each of which there was a sharp report as though from an explosion of some gaseous matter that had long been pent up in subterranean depths.

While the tremblers were in progress the earth undulated like the waves of the sea, the trees swayed and bent as though controlled by an irresistible force, the tops of the brush swept the surface of the ground, the waters of the creeks and rivers broke in wild disorder over the low-lying banks and the placid lakes were turned into seething, tumultuous wastes, in whose cold embrace no animate thing could be engulfed and hope to escape with life.

**TROTSKY TAKES HOLD
OF BOLSHEVIK ARMY**

General Tuchatschewski is Relieved of Command and Dictator Supplants Him

WARSAW, August 28.—General Tuchatschewski has been relieved of the post of commander in chief of the Bolshevik army and Leon Trotsky has taken the job. The Poles now have 80,000 Bolshevik prisoners.



PAPER CLOTHES

Suits Being Imported into England from Germany

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28—Paper suits made in Germany have been introduced in vast quantities into England as a means of combating the high cost of clothing and have proved both economical and durable.

This was the substance of a dispatch received by the Department of Commerce from the American Chamber of Commerce in London. The dispatch says in part:

"These ready-made suits are cut in English styles and are said to be of the best class of paper texture. They can be forwarded from Germany at a thousand for 120 pounds sterling f.o.b. and are being sold retail at 2s. 6d. to 10s. 6d. a suit. Last month 40,000 of these suits were imported by a firm of transport agents from Germany via Holland and another consignment of 5,000 is on the way. Further consignments are expected to arrive at frequent intervals."

"A large number of the suits have been reexported to India and South America, where they have been found ideal clothing for tropical climates. Some merchants in London are of the opinion that, in view of the present high price of clothing, there are wide possibilities in paper suits, especially in the industrial districts, if they could be cut more in the English style and to English tastes."

"The agents who are dealing in these suits state that by buying under the present rate of exchange it is possible for a man to purchase a new suit once a week, and that over a period of twelve months the entire cost would be less than the price of one West End suit."

"To give householders and concerns using blankets an opportunity to secure Regulation Army Blankets at a nominal price, and to those who were disappointed because our last supply failed to suffice, we have secured another shipment, part of which will be available for Prince Rupert and districts."

"As long as this supply lasts, we will ship to any point in B.C., delivery charges prepaid."

These blankets were ordered for the use of the Canadian and Imperial Forces and are in good condition.
