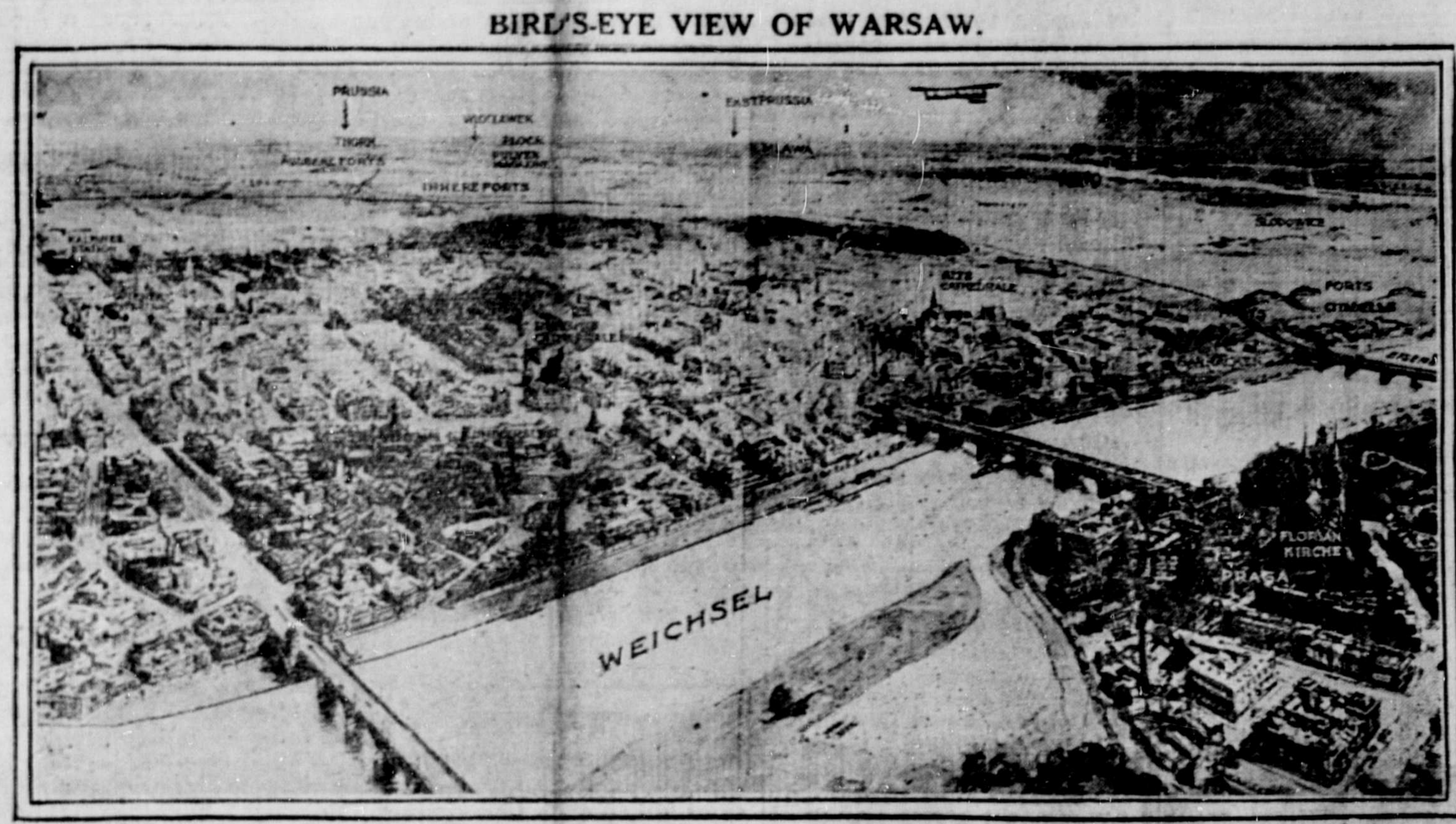

DUBLIN, August 28.—The jailed hunger strikers have been transferred to a private hospital in Cork. The mayor's appeal to the King for their release has been unavailing.

Longshoremen Quit Demanding Releases

Reported in New York that Freight Handlers on British Boats have been Induced to Stop Work; Lloyd George Firm

NEW YORK, August 28.—Irish agitators have induced thousands of longshoremen working on British ships to quit work. They want Terrence McSweeney, the lord mayor of Cork, released. Archbishop Mannix is to pay a visit to Ireland.

London, August 28.—Premier Lloyd George, who is at Lucerne, Switzerland, is firm against the release of Lord Mayor McSweeney and the other hunger strikers who are now in jail. He has been deluged with appeals.

Dundalk, August 28.—Two sales girls and a salesman were burned to death in incendiary fires that were set to Protestant stores.

MAIL SERVICE FOR ISLANDS

Direct Service From Vancouver Will be Improvement Over Trans-shipment From Prince Rupert.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 28.—It has been announced here that the Queen Charlotte Islands are to have a direct mail service from here commencing September 5, when the Prince John sails north. Thereafter there will be a fortnightly service. At present the reshipment of mails from Prince Rupert is said to be causing delays.

MOOSE MINE DEAL IS NOW CONFIRMED

Report in News Last Week Receives Confirmation—Further Details.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 28.—Advices reaching here state that the Moose mine at Alice Arm has been bonded from D. W. Cameron by W. R. Ross, ex-minister of lands, and associates through the agency of W. C. Ross, the son of Mr. Ross. The figure involved is \$165,000.

CHINESE CONSUL TO BE HERE ON MONDAY

Vancouver, Aug. 28.—Koliang Yih, Chinese consul here, leaves tonight on the Princess Mary for a holiday to Alaska. Returning he will leave the vessel at Prince Rupert and proceed east on the Grand Trunk Pacific to visit the Peace River country and Jasper Park.

BIG LOT OF MUNITIONS DESTROYED BY ALLIES

LONDON, August 28.—Munitions and hydroplanes valued at \$2,000,000 confiscated by the Allies have been destroyed by 4,000 workers.

General Hospital Charges Are Substantially Raised

Increase Accepted by Hospital Board at Last Night's Meeting means Institution should now Break Even; Charges Payable in Advance

At a meeting of the Hospital Board last evening a general advance in rates at the General Hospital was decided upon on the recommendation of the finance committee, the report of which was submitted by D. G. McRae, the chairman. In introducing his report Mr. McRae drew attention to the fact that the hospital had been continually losing ground for some months on account of the generally increasing costs. Recently the nursing staff has been augmented and improvements made to the building that have run into a large sum of money. The limit of appropriations had been, it was felt, reached as far as the provincial government and city were concerned, and it was not deemed advisable to incur a big debt by continuing the present way.

Since Prince Rupert was about the only place that had not increased its rates since the commencement of the war, it was now recommended to do so. The proposed raise in rates would place the institution on a break-even basis.

New Schedule. The following increases were embodied in the report that was passed:

Main public wards, from the present rate of \$2 to \$2.50 per day; semi-private wards, \$3 to \$3.50 per day; rooms 3 and 5, \$22.50 to \$25 per week; room 9, \$25 to \$27.50 per week; the best room, \$25 to \$35 per week, and all others an advance of \$5 per week. These ward and room charges are to be paid in advance and at the first of every week each patient will be presented with a bill for the coming week. All dressings and medicines are to be charged for at retail rates on the discretion of the matron, but simple antiseptics and laxatives are to be given free.

It was also embodied in the original report to make a \$5 charge for the case room but this was thrown out by the meeting. "A man with a family has enough penalties to pay now without being subjected to any more," said W. E. Williams.

The secretary has been instructed to write to the Vancouver General Hospital and ascertain as to the charges for the use of the X-ray machine there.

CUNNINGHAM'S RESIGNATION IS ANNOUNCED

Chief Inspector of Dominion Fisheries Leaves Department after Thirty-eight Years Valuable Service

VANCOUVER, August 28.—Lieutenant-Colonel F. H. Cunningham, chief inspector of Dominion Fisheries on the Pacific Coast, has resigned his position, the resignation to become effective after December 31.

The resignation was announced by Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Minister of Marine and Fisheries and Naval Affairs, at a conference with the parkers. Mr. Cunningham has been with the Dominion Fisheries Department for thirty-eight years and he has always been praised for his wisdom, fairness and tact. No successor has yet been named.

VANCOUVER, August 28.—Col. C. W. Peck, member for Skeena, is mentioned in gossip as the successor to F. H. Cunningham, chief inspector of fisheries. Hon. C. C. Ballantyne has had Mr. Cunningham's resignation for some time.

WELSFORD IS NEW DIRECTOR

Will Succeed E. H. Beasley as Managing Director of Union Steamship Co.—Barnsley is Manager.

VANCOUVER, August 28.—A. Welsford, of Liverpool, the son of J. H. Welsford, who controls the company, is to be the managing director of the Union Steamship Company resident in Vancouver in succession to the late E. H. Beasley. Mr. Welsford is now in Vancouver but is returning to England and will assume his post on January 1.

John Barnsley, who was assistant to Mr. Beasley, has been named the new manager.

GERMANY FLOODS BRITAIN WITH TOYS

LONDON, August 28.—At a meeting of the Incorporated Association of British Toy Manufacturers and Wholesalers, held at the offices of the London Chamber of Commerce, W. H. Nicholls said that, in view of a promise made by Sir Auckland Geddes when President of the Board of Trade to a deputation from the association last September, that it could be shown that there was a serious irruption of German toys into this country, he would consider the advisability of reducing or stopping their importation altogether, he had obtained from the Statistical Department of the Board of Trade figures relating to the importation of toys generally from January of this year to the end of May. These showed that during the five months we had imported nearly 550,000 worth of toys from Germany alone, and only about 290,000 from all other countries. If such a large quantity had come over during the slackest period of the year, what would be the figures for the whole 12 months? The association had asked Sir Robert Horne to receive a deputation to invite him to carry out his predecessor's promise, but he had declined.

STEWART FIRM IN LITIGATION

Stewart Mercantile Co. is Defendant in Insolvency Action; Petition Against G. E. Austin.

VANCOUVER, August 28.—The first petition to be filed in Vancouver under the new Bankruptcy Act of the Dominion government was that of the Vancouver Creamery against the Stewart Mercantile Co. on Saturday morning, asking that they be declared insolvent.

The Credit Men's Association has been named as trustee. A petition is also filed against Guy Edward Austin claiming that he conveyed stock and goods of that company without complying with the Sales Act. The appointment of a receiver is also asked.

The hearing will be before Justice Murphy on Sept. 9. Frank Pearce of Port Clements arrived from the south by the Grand Trunk boat this morning.

There Will be Continuation of Work.

There are many stories going the rounds as to the future activities at our shipyard and many of these stories are, doubtless, exaggerated and others are just reports of plans formulating. If the plans are not carried out to the dot nobody will be surprised. The one thing that local people are concerned in is that this valuable industry which has meant so much to this town in the past twelve months will not be discontinued when the ships now under construction are completed. It matters little as to the number of ships or their kind as long as the plant is kept running at capacity. There seems little doubt, what with the developments of the past week as they have been announced, that the Prince Rupert yard will be kept running for some years to come and that is what people want to be sure of.

Will Mean Growth of City.

This shipyard has meant much to the city and if the extensions to the yards that are now proposed are carried out and a thousand or more men come here it will mean still more and the prosperity of the city will be further solidified. The addition of a thousand workers to the city will bring, directly or indirectly, an increase of population of perhaps two or three thousand souls. Rupert's population is now placed conservatively at seven thousand five hundred so it would seem safe to predict that within a very few months there will be a population of over ten thousand even if the extension to the shipbuilding industry is the only new development and no one thinks that it will be.

Business Will Also Improve.

The new ocean dock will be employing a large number of men all winter, the provincial government court house will probably be started and there is a possibility that something may come forth on station construction. These will all employ a good many workers and when their work on these places is done there will be other building work in the city. All will support a good many people and the people in their turn will support various businesses. This will mean either the expansion of present businesses or the coming in of fresh blood, either of which will have its building effect on the city. From all appearances it would seem that the city is due for a period of healthy and permanent development.

Housing Condition Is Serious.

While speaking of the growth of the city in population there is one fact that strikes the mind of any person. That fact is that if we are going to have more people in this city we must have places to put them. In all the American and Canadian cities there prevails a great shortage of houses and Prince Rupert is no exception. Even now any new family arriving in town has to search and search for housing accommodation. The only solution for this house question seems to be the establishment of building societies or the further extension of the existing housing scheme so that people of ordinary means might be assisted in building. The building of houses for rent under present conditions is not a profitable business and that is why no houses are being built for this purpose. Something, however, must be done and the problem is one of moment, one that should be taken up by the municipal authorities in the interest of the development of the city.

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than at Port Simpson.

FIGURES ON THE NEW VOTERS' LIST

Although Increase Generally in Province, Prince Rupert, Omineca and Prince George Have Less Names.

Returns from every district except one, Atlin, bring the total number of registrations on the new provincial voters' list up to 202,017 and it is expected that the complete list will have 45,000 names over that of 1919.

The figures for Prince Rupert are 5,061 for 1920 as against 5,147 in 1919. Omineca has 1,449 which is 62 less than 1919. Fort George has 2,724, four less than 1919.

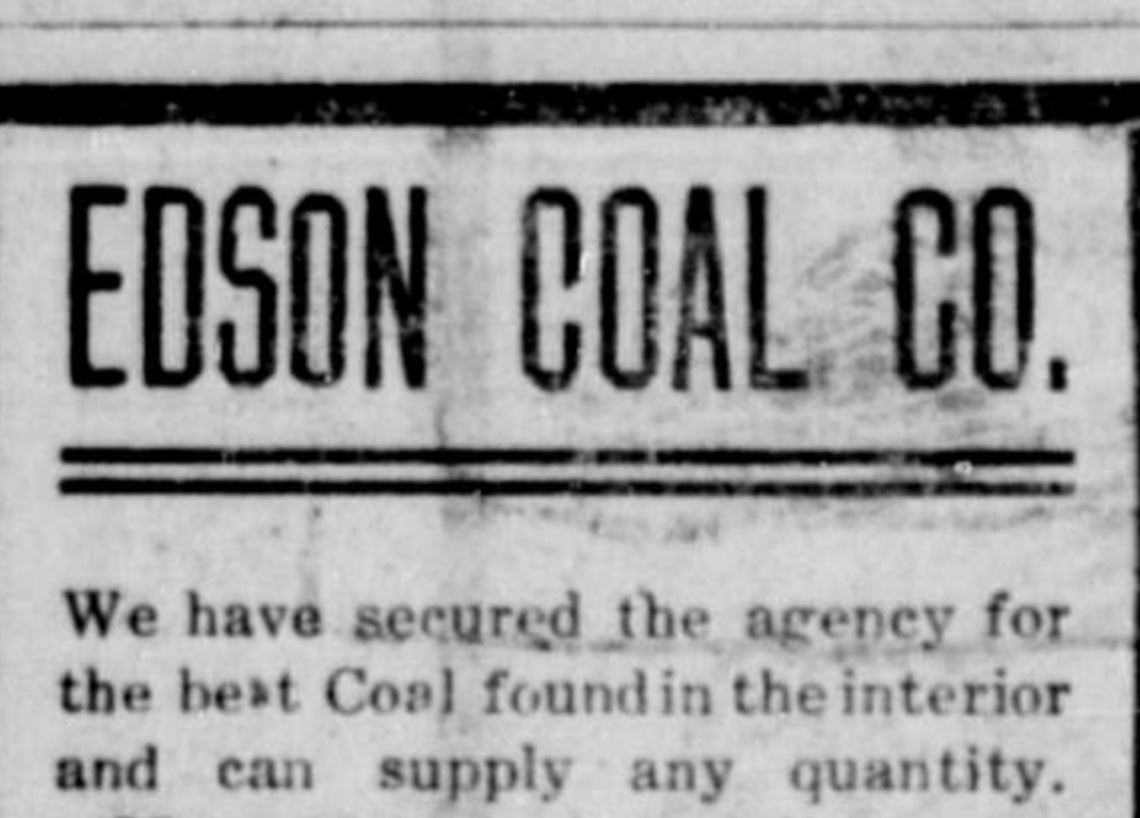

KLONDYKE GOLD OUTPUT FALLS

Due to Dry Season all Camps had

MANY SHOCKS STIR RESIDENT KLUANE MINING SECTION

WHITEHORSE, Y.T., August 27.—
An earthquake of unusual se-
verity, lasting all of one night
and part of the next day, during
which there were from 40 to 50
distinct shocks is reported by
Billy Armstrong, an old-timer of
the Yukon, who arrived here last
week. The disturbance took place
in the Klunane district.

Billy has traveled in his wan-
derings since boyhood all through
South America and is a pioneer
of the great white Northland, in
each of which regions earth-
quakes of more or less severity
are of common occurrence, but he
says that on July 7, while camped
at the junction of Calden and Lake
Creeks, in the Klunane district, he
had the most exciting and long-
est-drawn-out shaking up he has
ever experienced in his life.

The manifestation of the dis-
turbance continued throughout
an entire night and part of the
next day. There were between 40
and 50 distinct earth tremors im-
mediately following each of which
there was a sharp report as
though from an explosion of some
gaseous matter that had long
been pent up in subterranean
depths.

While the tremblers were in
progress the earth undulated like
the waves of the sea, the trees
swayed and bent as though con-
trolled by an irresistible force,
the tops of the brush swept the
surface of the ground, the waters
of the creeks and rivers broke in
wild disorder over the low-lying
banks and the placid lakes were
turned into seething, tumultuous
wastes, in whose cold embrace no
animate thing could be engulfed
and hope to escape with life.

TROTSKY TAKES HOLD OF BOLSHEVIK ARMY

General Tuchatschewski is Re-
lieved of Command and Dic-
tator Supplants Him

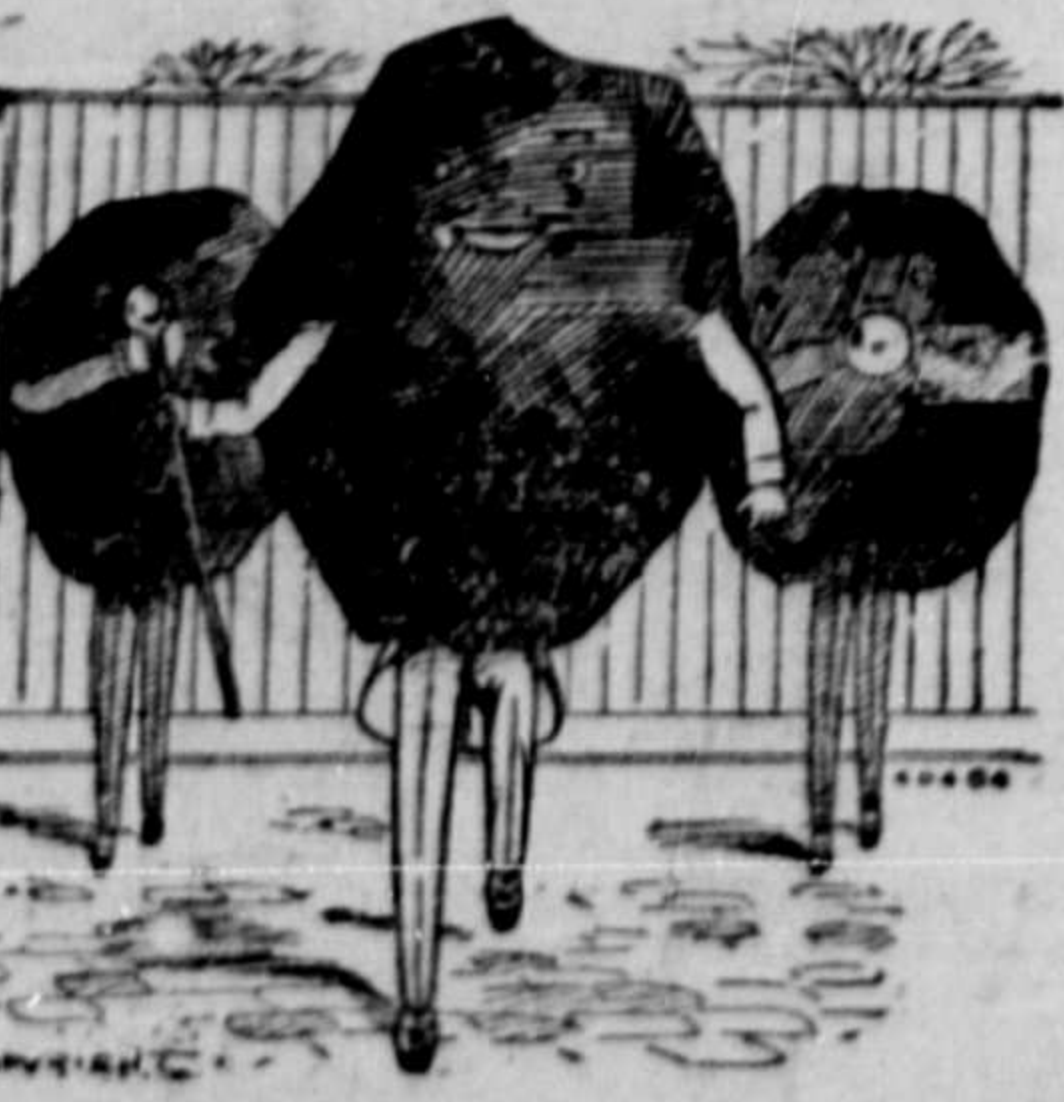

PAPER CLOTHES

Suits Being Imported into England from Germany

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28—Paper suits made in Germany have been introduced in vast quantities into England as a means of combating the high cost of clothing and have proved both economical and durable.

This was the substance of a dispatch received by the Department of Commerce from the American Chamber of Commerce in London. The dispatch says in part:

"These ready-made suits are cut in English styles and are said to be of the best class of paper texture. They can be forwarded from Germany at a thousand for 120 pounds sterling f.o.b. and are being sold retail at 2s. 6d. to 10s. 6d. a suit. Last month 40,000 of these suits were imported by a firm of transport agents from Germany via Holland and another consignment of 5,000 is on the way. Further consignments are expected to arrive at frequent intervals.

"A large number of the suits have been reexported to India and South America, where they have been found ideal clothing for tropical climes. Some merchants in London are of the opinion that, in view of the present high price of clothing, there are wide possibilities in paper suits, especially in the industrial districts, if they could be cut more in the English style and to English tastes.

"The agents who are dealing in these suits state that by buying under the present rate of exchange it is possible for a man to purchase a new suit once a week, and that over a period of twelve months the entire cost would be less than the price of one West End suit."
