Fifty Cents a Nip Paid for Liquor

SUPERINTENDENT PILLSBURY UNDERSTANDS CONTRACTS ALREADY SIGNED

Sugar Prices are Moving Downward
 of a Dollar a Hundred Pounds
 ay over Saturday; Decline said
 to be Caused by Increasing
 Supply

PRINCE RUPERT, August 30.—The downward slide of the price continued today, and it is now a dollar a hundred pounds over Saturday. The prices quoted here are \$21 for the and \$20 for yellow, wholesale, the same retailing at 23c, and 22c a pound.

Bank Destroyed at Imperial Oil Refinery

Several thousand dollars' worth of the result of a fierce blaze at a large oil tank at the plant here. The tank was destroyed. Efforts were made to save the forty adjoining tanks but were unsuccessful. For eight hours the firefighters were on duty. The estimated loss given by the company is \$50,000, cost of the tank and 3,500 gallons of naphtha. The cause of the fire is supposed to have been the result of electrical equipment. The refinery is near Port Moody and is the location of the refining of Imperial Oil Company in British Columbia.

TT PROVES NO FISH CARS ARE IN SIGHT

Four carloads of fish were bought up at yesterday's fish sale against the arrival of cars that came in during last night. This fish will be shipped east by time freight. In the meantime, no more cars are reported and all those in the yards have been filled.

Third Offenders Go to Jail if Found Guilty of Selling

Interesting Evidence given this morning in connection with recent Arrests under Prohibition Act

This morning saw a busy session at the police court which was still continuing well after the noon hour when the case of Kenneth McKay, charged with selling liquor, was being heard. Since Saturday morning when McKay, Thomas Black, Olsen and George Carlson were released on account of improper arrests, new summonses had been issued and these all appeared this morning again. Olsen and Black, charged again, pleaded not guilty and were remanded until September 3, and the magistrate took occasion to mention that if these third offenders were found guilty they would serve a year in prison. George Carlson was not served with a summons for the simple reason that he cannot be found.

The Jack Miller trial was commenced this morning and Detectives Money and Smith gave evidence as to having gone to the New Windsor Cabaret alleged to be Miller's place, and buying liquor direct from Jack Miller himself during the absence of the regular bartender and alleged partner in the business, George Carlson.

Fifty Cents a Nip.
 The only kind of drinks he had bought had been hard liquor and the nips were small. Fifty cents a nip was the price paid, according to the testimony of Detective Smith.

McKay Case.
 The Kenneth McKay case was an interesting one and some spicy evidence was forthcoming as to the conduct of affairs about the Royal Hotel where the accused is bartender. This is a second offence charge for McKay. Detective William Smith was the first witness in the box. "On August 20 about 10:30 in the evening Money and I entered the Royal bar and I bought a drink of beer. I paid for the drink and asked the accused for 'Dad,' that

is, Mr. Corley, Sr., and I was told that he was in bed. Asked by the accused what I wanted I said 'Scotch,' and was told that it would be fixed up in a few minutes.

Wanted Scotch.
 "The accused served two men at the bar with drinks and then went out the door towards the Citizens' Club and came back in a few minutes saying that it was all right. 'Bud' Corley entered here and asked 'What do you want, Ken?' and was answered 'Scotch.' Mr. Corley then went out and returned in about five or six minutes with a bottle in his hip pocket which he placed in the sink or cooler under the tray of the bar. He covered the bottle and then left the bar. After another drink with Money accused took the bottle from the sink, wrapped it up in a newspaper and handed it to us. I paid \$7 for it and we took it down to the Prince Rupert Hotel where we marked it." The exhibit of Wilson's Scotch Liqueur was identified by the witness and the defence admitted that it was intoxicating liquor.

Cross Examination.
 Witness was then subjected to a stiff cross-examination by Mr. Patmore which was chiefly characterized by an attempt to undermine the integrity of the witness's evidence. In the course of this examination the commission of the witness in the city was outlined.

Start Tankers Soon As Steel Available

Pillsbury Thinks may Secure Some from Sydney, C.B; Understands Contract is Already Signed

VANCOUVER, August 30.—J. H. Pillsbury, superintendent of Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Co., is returning north tonight after conferring with Newman Erb in regard to the contracts for the shipyard at Prince Rupert.

Interviewed here, Mr. Pillsbury said: "We shall start the five tankers as soon as we get the steel." Steel was scarce, he said, but probably they would get enough from Sydney, Cape Breton.

Mr. Pillsbury says he understands the tanker contract is actually signed. He is doubtful, however, if Prince Rupert could handle for some time even a portion of the order of fifty-eight ships rumored to be placed in Canadian yards.

Newman Erb left on Saturday for the east, stopping off at Lake Louise to confer with C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine, in connection with the shipbuilding contracts.

LATE DOCTOR LARGE BEING BURIED TODAY

Many Attend Obsèques at Port Simpson—Memorial Service Last Night.

The remains of the late Dr. R. W. Large, of Port Simpson, were taken to the Indian village on the Chelohsin last evening, the same steamer taking over a number of Prince Rupert residents who are to be present to pay their last respects at the funeral today. This morning Indian Agent C. C. Perry took over his boat, the Leila, with an additional number of mourners. Dr. Thompson Ferrier, head of the Methodist Missions from Brandon, and Dr. S. Large, brother of the deceased, from Cleveland, Ohio, arrived by last night's train to be present at the funeral and have proceeded to Port Simpson.

Last night an impressive memorial service was held in the Methodist Church in this city. Rev. T. H. Nuttall presided and addresses were given by Dr. Thompson Ferrier, Dr. H. C. Wrinch, of Hazelton, and Mr. Hilliard, representative of the General Mission Board of Toronto, all testifying to the worth of the deceased. A special musical program was also given in which were Mrs. Bennett, E. V. Ling and a male quartette gave vocal selections.

Taking part in today's services at Port Simpson are Dr. Thompson Ferrier, Dr. H. C. Wrinch, of Hazelton, Dr. J. S. Spencer, and Rev. T. H. Nuttall.

NEW ROADS IN THIS DISTRICT

Alice Arm and Port Clements to Get Needed Improvement At Once.

Before leaving for the interior this morning, Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands and representative for this district and acting representative for Atlin district, announced that it had been decided by the Government to proceed at once with the new road at Alice Arm connecting the town with a wharf to be built by the Dominion Government.

The Dominion has been postponing the building of the wharf on the plea that the province was not building the road. Now the bluff is called and the Public Works Department of the Provincial Government is going ahead no matter whether the Dominion does its part or not. This will be good news for the people of Alice Arm.

Another announcement made this morning was that work would commence at once on the road from Port Clements to Tel-el on Graham Island. This is fourteen miles long and is an important work.

STEWART MAN WAS BADLY INJURED

Fell Long Distance, but was Found and Carried to Hospital

Andy Archie, part owner of the Prince John and other mining claims at Stewart, is at present at the hospital at that town following a bad fall which nearly cost him his life. He fell over a sheer cliff 30 ft. and rolled about one hundred feet to the river's edge where a log saved him.

The Mounted Police, aided by Sid Chalmers, Jack Stanier and Danny Hume, rescued him after he was discovered by his partner, James H. Nesbitt. They carried him to the Stewart Hospital.

AUTO RACERS WERE BURNED TO DEATH

SIX VACANCIES IN THE SENATE

Many Names are Mentioned as Probable Selections to Upper House.

TORONTO, August 30.—With the death of Senator J. M. Douglas at Tantalus, Sask., there are six senatorial vacancies to fill—two in Ontario and one each in British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Nova Scotia, says the Toronto Globe. The Ontario senators are expected to be selected from among three men: Hon. J. D. Reid, ministers of railways and canals; W. R. Smyth, ex-member for East Algoma, and Hon. T. W. Crothers, ex-minister of labor. The British Columbia senatorship will be filled—it is anticipated—by either the Hon. R. F. Green, M.P., and ex-member of the McBride administration, or C. W. Peck, V.C., M.P. Alberta's vacancy may be filled by either "Jimmy" Douglas, member for Strathcona, or W. A. Buchanan, M.P., who still remains a member of the Government party, though he took an independent stand on the Budget. In Saskatchewan, where a vacancy has just been created by the death of Senator Douglas, no name stands out prominently, although the applicants are reported to be "too numerous to mention." Out of Nova Scotia the Senate will get, according to loud rumors, either Hector McInnes, K.C., ex-M.P.P., or John Stanfield, ex-member for Colchester.

"but they were to get all those handling liquor in this city. I was not directed to the Royal Hotel and I did not know they were carrying liquor until I bought a bottle from 'Dad' in the basement a couple of days before this. I couldn't get liquor at the Savoy when I tried, neither could I get it at the Prince Rupert. At Black's Hotel I was told that they didn't do business with two men. I didn't go back to those places when I had been refused once. I was just getting acquainted for a while and did not do any actual work. To get my evidence it was necessary for me to mix up and act foolishly at times. I might say that I was told just yesterday a friend of mine was offered several hundred dollars to swear that I offered to give him whiskey. I had to get a line up on the liquor, find where it was, and who was selling it." "Do you mean to tell me," asked Mr. Patmore, "that your visits down the line were for that purpose?" "I do." "Oh, tell it to Sweeney." "I would if he were here," reiterated the detective, "and he is a good Irishman, too." Before adjournment was made by Magistrate McMordie until tomorrow morning Detective Money, Sergeant Adams and the accused himself were heard. McKay has been released on \$1,000 bail.

ALASKA BOATS ARE BACK TO TEN-DAY WINTER SCHEDULE

The Princess Mary arrived from the south at noon today and left shortly after for Alaskan points, making the last weekly trip of the Canadian Pacific tourist schedule. From now on a ten-day service will be maintained throughout the winter. This service will be inaugurated by the Princess Alice next Monday when she arrives from the south and will be maintained throughout September by the same vessel which will be replaced in October by the Princess Mary which vessel will run all winter.

CLAIMS HE CAN CHANGE SEX OF BARNYARD FOWL

PARIS, Aug. 30.—Although he has not succeeded thus far in obtaining eggs from roosters, Prof. Pezard, who is taking part in the congress of psychologists at the Sorbonne, says that after fifteen years of experiments with fowls he has obtained miraculous results, which prove that it is not impossible to change at will the sex of the barnyard fowl. Prof. Pezard's revelations soon will be presented before the French Academy of Sciences. Meanwhile he refuses to divulge details of his experiments and has warned his conferees against fantastic hypotheses, as there is nothing available yet to prove that the inversion of the human sex is logical.

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson. The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

INTEREST TAKEN IN ALICE ARM MINES

Work Starting on Several Properties—Esperanza Reported to be Bonded.

ALICE ARM, August 30.—The same interests that bonded the Moose group have been investigating the Esperanza group close to town here. This is a high-grade native and ruby silver and argentine prospect and some rich stuff has been taken out. A quantity of the ore is now lying on the side of the railway awaiting shipment to the smelter at Tacoma. Work is starting on the Silver-tip extension owned by Wolverton, Hammond and Brugky. Practically nothing has yet been done on this property yet, but the surface showings are said to be very similar to the Dolly Varden and are very extensive.

The curious thing about the Dolly Varden and other properties in that neighborhood is that the surface showings do not give any results. Not until the capping is removed does the silver ore carry any values. The La Rose Co. is about to start work. This property is about eight miles up the Kitsault river on the west side.

PREMIER ON DOLLY VARDEN LEGISLATION

Speaks to Large Meeting at Alice Arm and also Receives Representations.

ALICE ARM, August 30.—To a crowded meeting in the school house here Premier Oliver explained to the people the various steps in the Dolly Varden complications, which were finally straightened out at the last session of the Legislature.

In discussing the Dolly Varden question, Premier Oliver explained that in 1914 L. W. Patmore went to the Legislature and asked authority for the building of the railway from Alice Arm to the Dolly Varden mine up the Kitsault river.

The contract for building the line was let to the Taylor Engineering Co. on a "cost plus" basis and the sum of \$270,000 was spent on the road, by the summer of 1918, when the Taylor Engineering Co., failing to get the necessary funds to carry on from the mining company, assigned for the benefit of its creditors.

The Provincial Government was asked to step into protect the workmen whose wages were outstanding. No action was taken by the government until the time for completing the road had expired and the rights of the company had also expired.

A good deal of money was spent, not only in paying out the former owners and the debts accrued, but in completing the line. Everything went well until R. J. Cromie of the Sun and R. T. Elliott of Victoria, went to the original owners of the mine and offered to intervene.

They did not succeed at Ottawa so they went to the law courts. The Legislature intercepted this action by confirming Taylor in possession of the mine and railway, thus carrying out the legislation formerly passed and giving all the rights to the Taylor Company.
