Miners' Strike is Practically Ended

PLENDID RECORD HAS BEEN MADE BY THE PROVINCIAL ADMINISTRATION

Pattullo Makes Statement of the Government Policy

deals with general features and also with those that refer particularly to Prince Rupert and surrounding district

Hon. T. D. Pattullo has issued the following address to the members of the Prince Rupert Electoral District:
Ladies and gentlemen,—It is now approximately four years since you elected to office your present administration in charge of our provincial government. The character of that administration is now so clearly defined and, I think, sufficiently understood by the people at large that it seems only right and proper that the government should submit itself to the judgment of the people for the purpose of giving the people an opportunity to say whether they generally approve of the purposes and policies which are trying to be accomplished. I would like briefly to review, by generalization, the general governmental situation as it appears to me.

Let me recall that your present administration came into office at a time when conditions were from toward a boom in speculative exploitation had been through. The province was in debt, with huge deficits of immediate current revenue to meet and no money in the treasury to meet them.

Then, too, the great war was in the trying anxiety of the conditions arising from which are well known to you.

Financial Conditions
The thing that the Government was the obvious thing, to put its financial house in order and re-establish the province, which had been depreciated in financial value. This was accomplished by revenue and expenditure on current account, and increased taxation.

Timber
In respect of our timber resources, working in conjunction with those engaged in the industry, the Government has carried out a forward policy. We are constantly studying market conditions and, through our timber export department, have been of great assistance to the industry.

We also offer special inducement to the establishment of pulp and paper industries, and I am glad to say that there are several projects well under way. The establishment of a pulp and paper industry entails a very heavy investment and necessarily takes some little time, but there is no doubt whatever that some of the projects now under way will go through to successful completion.

Water
With respect to water power, one of the main uses to which water power development can be put is in the pulp and paper industry; but, apart from this industry, there are several projects under way at the present time, notably the Bridge River power project, the promoters of which are spending a large sum of money, which will eventually run into many millions of dollars.

One of the most vital issues facing Prince Rupert at the present time is water power. A number of projects have been under consideration looking to the establishment of a pulp industry and development of power on waters adjacent to Prince Rupert, and I have assured those interested of the sympathetic

VANCOUVER, October 28.—Dr. Underhill, medical health officer, said in an address last night that the real slums of the city were probably in the west end and not in Chinatown. In some houses as many as eight families lived.

Sheriff Shirley's house on Fulton Street was recently robbed of some tools and yesterday Warden Bailey apprehended the culprit. It was a lad of only four and a half years.

BOWSER OPENS HIS CAMPAIGN

Tries to Make Capital out of Dual Election and Government Control

MILNER, Oct. 27.—At the opening of the Conservative campaign during a meeting here, W. J. Bowser, charged Premier Oliver with putting the country to needless expense in having two elections so close to each other. He tried to make capital out of the fact that there was as yet no liquor bill drafted and gave as his opinion that none would be drafted until after the election.

DOLLY VARDEN ORE IS PROVED

Diamond Drill Shows that the Rich Ore Extends Downwards Far Below Present Workings.

Recent arrivals from Alice Arm tell of the strike of good ore in the Dolly Varden mine, word of which was received recently. They say that it is the same vein as farther up, the value of the find being chiefly in proving that the ore has good depth. The drill hole was run in horizontally from the tunnel on the five hundred foot level and at a little over thirty feet the ore was struck. It was much the same class of ore as is found higher in the vein.

The drill was also turned downwards and proved that the vein has still greater depth. As a result, preparations are being made to drive another tunnel at about the level of the railway, which is something like 700 feet from the highest level of the mine. The recent proof of the extent of the ore insures Alice Arm being a permanent mining camp for many years to come, even if no further mines are discovered and worked.

A. E. Foreman, chief engineer of the public works department at Victoria, has resigned to become associated with a Vancouver company.

UNION JACK WAS BURNED

Several Hundred People at New York Make Demonstration Against Woman.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—Several hundred people solemnly burned the Union Jack here as a protest against the display of the British emblem by Mrs. William Sarrier. The British flag was displayed by the woman while her neighbors unfurled the flag of the Irish republic.

LONDON, October 28.—The miners' strike is settled contingent on a ballot of the miners which will be taken immediately. Frank Hodges and members of the miners' executive announced the terms agreed on with the Government and which the executive are submitting for a ballot with a recommendation of acceptance as a temporary measure until a national wage board has been appointed to deal with this and other wage questions.

SEND BAGGAGE AND MAIL FROM RUPERT SOUTH TO VANCOUVER

SWANSON BAY, Oct. 28.—Fifty men are engaged on the salvage of the Prince Rupert and her baggage and mail. The baggage and mail will be sent south tomorrow on the Prince George and sorted there.

Immediately everything is out of the ship, efforts will be concentrated on the building of a cofferdam which will extend 30 feet above the upper decks of the vessel and will form an outer hull and will be kept on until she reaches the drydock.

ALL RUPERT RETURNS IN

Returning Officer Mortimer will Now Have ReCount and Announce Final Result

With the arrival this morning of James Thomas from Ocean Falls, Swanson Bay and Smith Sound, the last of the ballot boxes for Prince Rupert district in the recent prohibition plebiscite have been returned and as soon as things are sorted out and in shape Returning Officer Mortimer will commence the recount and the announcement of the final result for this district will be made. During the past day or so James Neville arrived from the northern Queen Charlottes, E. Rosang from the southern end and Harry Watson from Surf Inlet. The late returns make little difference to the general wet result.

Mr. Mortimer also reports a great number of absentee Prince Rupert votes coming in from all over the province, among which are New Westminster, Vancouver, Victoria, Nanaimo, Allenby and Copper Mountain.

Murderers to be Hanged on January 17th Next

Joseph Scanlon and Michael Molyneaux to pay penalty of crime of killing man for his money

VANCOUVER, October 28.—Joseph Scanlon and Michael Molyneaux were last night sentenced by Judge Gregory to be hanged on January 27 for the murder of Daniel Morrison at the Columbia Hotel on May 17. They were found guilty by a jury at the assizes court held here.

Witnesses testified that Morrison, who had brought a large sum of money with him, which had been subscribed by the people of Campbell River, had been badly beaten and kicked, dying in agony the next day.

Asked if they had anything to say, Scanlon said: "I do not ask for leniency or mercy in being sentenced for a crime I did not commit." Molyneaux said: "I don't ask for leniency. I have done nothing."

There was an impressive scene in court as the judge wearing the black cap said it was his duty to sentence each of the prisoners to hang by the neck.

South Polar Expedition Leaves Norfolk Tomorrow

Biggest Expedition of its kind to Visit Polar Regions; Four Ships, over Hundred Men and several Planes

NEW YORK, October 28.—The British Imperial Polar expedition, under the command of John I. Cope, the veteran Antarctic explorer, sails from Norfolk, Va., tomorrow, Friday, for the South Pole. This is the biggest expedition yet which has ever set out for the frozen Polar regions. It consists of four ships, thirty dogs, several aeroplanes and over a hundred men.

SEVEN PLACES IN THE SENATE TO BE FILLED

Local Member Outlines Work.
 Hon. T. D. Pattullo has given in this number of the Daily News an outline of the work accomplished by the Oliver Government and also something of what they expect to do. They came into existence at a time when the condition in the province was at its lowest ebb. They have fought against tremendous odds and have brought the province through those difficult times to a place where they can now resume normal expansion. Up to the present they have been unable to borrow money for new work. It took them all the time paying off the old debts. Now things are changing.
 We take it that no one claims the Oliver Government has been a perfect institution or that it has carried out all the wishes of the people. There are many problems to solve yet, and the ordinary person does not understand all the difficulties. In all governments too there has to be a give and take policy. All do not see alike. The problems are thrashed out in caucus or in executive council and the proceedings are not published in the press. No one knows how hard our own local member, for instance, has fought for some of the reforms which he thinks should be brought about. He has done a good deal but there is more to do. We suggest the caption "Let Pattullo finish his work." He has started well. He is just beginning to get for us the much needed local improvements, and if he is re-elected he will doubtless see that they are carried out. He is no carpet-bagger. He has his interests here, although in carrying out his duties as minister of lands he has to live in Victoria.

Study Carefully All Platforms.
 We suggest to readers of the Daily News that they carefully study all the platforms and pledges that are put before them and also consider the calibre of the men and their records. We shall do our best to point out from time to time, in a reasonable spirit, without unnecessary personalities, some of the features of the present campaign. We ask them also to study the personality of the men who are offering themselves for election. Another thing to remember, and a very important one, is what policy will be supported by each candidate should he be elected. What leader will be followed? We have all seen what has happened to the lone voice in the Legislature. It has done nothing and got nowhere.

This is an age of co-operation and organization. When a group of people with somewhat similar opinions organize to carry out a policy, that group becomes a party. They soon are labelled, if they stand for anything.
 The Liberal party is an organized section of the country banded together to carry out certain definite policies. It is the party of progress. The opposing party is labelled Conservative. It stands for marking time, for holding on in the old way. There are Socialists and Laborites and Farmers, but when it comes to lining up in the Legislature the members will have to adopt the leadership of either Mr. Oliver or Mr. Bowser and will be either for the Government or against it. They will be members of the Government party or the opposition.
 In this district, Hon. T. D. Pattullo is a member of the Oliver Government. He is one of the leaders of Liberalism and he will support Premier John Oliver. We believe that the interests of the province and of the Prince Rupert district can best be served by returning Mr. Pattullo again as the representative of the district.

 Mr. Bowler proposed the toast to the ladies--absent. This was acknowledged by P. H. Linzey.

 The toast of the hobos who wish to be homeless was proposed by Mr. Rose and acknowledged by D. Linzey.



PATTULLO MAKES STATEMENT OF THE GOVERNMENT POLICY

consideration of the Government. It is to be hoped that their plans may definitely mature.

Mining

As is well known, assistance is given to mining through the construction of roads and trails to legitimate prospects. Also through our district engineers, who render very valuable services, especially to the small prospector. Much attention has recently been paid to the possibility of the establishment of an iron and steel industry, and the Minister of Mines has assured me that next summer an exploratory party will be sent to the Copper River district on the Skeena River, where preliminary reports are of a most favorable character.

Oil

During the past two years we have had parties out in the Peace River country investigating geological conditions. Two parties were out this year and have just returned. The results of their work are of a most satisfactory character and warrant further prosecution of the work next year. Should oil eventually be found in commercial quantities, it is not difficult to imagine its tremendous importance.

Department of Industries

This department was originated primarily for the benefit of returned soldiers. Approximately a million dollars have already been loaned out, almost entirely to returned soldiers, and has resulted in the establishment of a considerable number of new industries.

Road Policy

In respect of roads, we are adopting a very comprehensive policy whereby there will eventually be a trunk road from Prince Rupert to Prince George and to Vancouver. This will naturally take some time to work out, but it is proposed from time to time to link up the various roads where there is now a break. At the same time we must meet the requirements of settlement conditions, not only by maintaining present necessary roads, but by building new roads for incoming settlers.

Social Legislation

The foregoing is merely a skeleton outline, but is indicative of the general trend of govern-

mental activity, looking to the development of our natural resources. Having put our financial house in order, and having taken action looking to the development of our resources, the third step which was deemed essential was to take care of the social or home life of our people. In this respect we have passed legislation of a high order. It is not possible herein to enumerate the various Acts in detail, but I will illustrate by mentioning one or two, such, for instance, as the Mothers' Pensions and Minimum Wage bills. We also passed bills providing for the 8-hour day in certain industries and the present Provincial government is definitely committed to the general principle of the 8-hour day. The establishment by the present administration of a Labor Department has, I think, been of much benefit to labor and to the province as a whole. Altogether, since your present administration took office, over four hundred bills have passed the Legislature. Some of them, of course, are of a minor character, but many of them are of very major importance. Any elector who desires further information in respect of these measures can, on application, receive a synopsis of these bills.

Aid to Soldiers

I think that no other province of the Dominion of Canada has done more in recognition of the obligation owing to the returned soldier than has the province of British Columbia. In our land policy we give a rebate of \$500.00 to British Columbia returned soldiers. In our Better Housing Act we give a rebate of \$300.00. Preference in employment has been given in all lines of endeavor under the Government. The Department of Industries was established especially for the benefit of returned soldiers. Several large land projects were undertaken for their particular benefit. A quarter of a million dollars has been voted in each of the past two years to give aid to any needy cases that may exist, while interest and penalties have been waived in connection with the acquirement of our natural resources by returned soldiers. In short, there is no field of endeavor in which special consideration has not been given to the welfare of returned soldiers by the Government of this province.

Elections Act

This Act has been especially designed to safeguard the will of the people. The Act is so framed that the voters' list will always be a clean list. No deposit is required of any candidate today. I myself personally insisted on the elimination of the deposit clause. It is in the hands of the people themselves to give the freest possible expression of their wishes and elect such men to office as they deem will best conduct their affairs.

Liquor Referendum

It will be the duty of a new Legislature to give expression by legislative enactment to the views of the people as expressed in the recent plebiscite. It is, of course, obviously impossible to suggest at this time the details of what the measure should be, though a statement will shortly be made by the Prime Minister, setting forth the views of the Government in general principle. It is clear, however, to all right thinking men that the measure to be put upon the statute books must make for decency and sobriety. No one can interpret the verdict of October 20 as one in favor of loose license and the men whom the people elect to office must see to it that the new measure is so framed as to make both for the moral and physical welfare of our people. PATTULLO MAKES STATEMENT OF THE GOVERNMENT POLICY

(Continued from page 4)

policy, we have done three outstanding things: We have put our financial house in order. We have tried to make conditions favorable for the development of our natural resources. And we have tried to improve the conditions affecting our home life.

Prince Rupert Electoral District.

In the foregoing I have briefly outlined general governmental policy. I would like to specialize somewhat as to the Prince Rupert Electoral District. I believe that the Prince Rupert Electoral District has greatly profited by the general forward policy of the Government, notably in respect of its land policy. There can be no doubt that the reason that Prince Rupert is now enjoying the prosperity which it is enjoying is due to the development of the natural resources tributary to the city—fishing, mining, agriculture and timber.

General Appropriation.

In respect of appropriations for the district, I would like to draw the attention of the electors to a number of matters. The annual appropriation for the Prince Rupert Electoral District for roads, bridges, etc., has been as generous as for any other electoral district, and in respect of actual amount has always ranked with the highest.

Prince Rupert.

In Prince Rupert city, accommodation in a small way was provided at Cow Bay for the mosquito fleet, and the Provincial Government stands ready, as it has stood ready, to donate waterfront at Seal Cove for accommodation of the fishing and mosquito fleets if the Dominion Government will erect the necessary wharf and buildings. A large amount has been carried in the estimates for the improvement of the McBride Street wharf, and if the Cow Bay situation can be adjusted on a proper basis, the Government waterfront will be an exceedingly valuable asset to the industrial life of the city. With this question properly adjusted, the Provincial Government will grant to the city what is known as Waterfront Block "A" for city purposes. The Government has pledged itself to a vote of \$6,000 for the Section 2 bridge; \$60,000 for the high school; while tenders are also being called for the erection of a suitable government building on Market Place. The plans have already been approved by the local authorities and meet with general approval. The contract will be let forthwith and the work proceeded with without delay. This new building will approximate \$100,000. Prince Rupert has also received \$100,000 from the Better Housing fund, which is considerably more than its quota according to population.

Queen Charlotte Islands.

Other portions of the Electoral District of Prince Rupert also have received the most careful consideration. Work is already commencing for the construction of the road from Port Clements to Tl-oel. This, with the completion of the road from Skidegate to Queen Charlotte City will give a trunk road from Queen Charlotte City to Port Clements and will be a most valuable factor in the development of the Queen Charlotte Islands.

Terrace.

At Terrace an amount is carried in the estimates to make a

start on the Skeena bridge, but I do not think that there is yet unanimity of opinion as to the exact location where the bridge should go, but this situation will be brought to a head as rapidly as possible. Recently I understood that plans are under way for the development by the owners thereof of the Hot Springs at Lakelse, Lakelse Lake is undoubtedly one of the beauty spots of British Columbia, and it is proposed to survey a much shorter route from Terrace to the lake and to maintain a first class motor road.

Bella Coola.

In the Bella Coola country, our grazing commissioner recently made a trip through to the head of the valley, with a view to ascertaining the character of the country. His report is of a most favorable nature, and I propose, if the opportunity is given me, to endeavor to secure an appropriation at the next sitting of the Legislature to begin work on the construction of a road into the interior.

At other points throughout the province an endeavor has been made to meet legitimate requirements with the means at our disposal.

There is no time when I have not kept to the fore the possibilities of Northern British Columbia in the Legislature, in the press, and upon the public platform. The resources of Northern British Columbia are better known today than they ever were and as member for this district I think I may share some responsibility for this. For example, in an address before the Victoria Board of Trade, I suggested that the members of the Boards of Trade of Vancouver and Victoria should visit the various parts of the province, with a view to understanding conditions. This course was pursued by the Boards of Trade and I think with much benefit to all concerned.

Larger Representation.

In conclusion let me say that no part of the province is undergoing more rapid development than is Northern British Columbia; its activities are becoming increasingly important, and if the opportunity is mine, it is my intention to insist in the next Legislature that a larger representation shall be given to Northern British Columbia than we have at present. While I honestly believe that everything that we could have done, under the circumstances, has been done, yet numbers always count, and if we can secure increased representation in the House, we are bound to be that much more effective.

Confidence in Government.

Election day is on December 1. Having been over all parts of this province many times during the past four years, I am in a position to state that each year there has been evidence of increasing confidence in the Oliver administration, and I have not the slightest doubt that on December 1 the people will vote for the continuance of the conduct of affairs by the present administration.



Synopsis of the

Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3.50.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and not timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim to another person.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 1 year are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record same for pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be homesteaded, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 100 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are or shall be payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 25, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of money accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Ordinance, Oct. 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers raised; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Fees, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, to be fixed.

FLYING ROUTES ARE NUMEROUS

Another 7,000 Miles to be Added Next Spring in Europe

LONDON, Oct. 28.—Transport by air in Europe is now being developed energetically, thanks largely to the encouragement afforded by the pioneer services between London and the Continent. Commercial flying of a demonstration character has now taken place over approximately 6,000 miles of European air routes, and is being conducted regularly, in the form of daily or twice or three times weekly services, over a number of these initial routes. Plans are also in hand and should mature by next spring, and in some cases earlier, for roughly another 7,000 miles of main and inter-connecting routes. When these extensions are operating, and traffic calls for a more regular service on some of the routes already on tentative existence, we shall have 13,000 miles of European airways engaged in the transport of passengers, mails and goods.

One now looks to the realization, in the near future, of the dream of a really commercial day-and-night airway extending right through Europe from London to Constantinople. Important links in the chain exist already. The 250-mile section between London and Paris is not only working admirably, but is attracting a steadily increasing volume of traffic. The French authorities have just opened up another 250 miles stage between Paris and Strasbourg. The next section, Strasbourg-Munich, is promised before the end of the year. French experts say they are also confident, now, that the remaining extensions, which are expected to run via Vienna, Budapest, Bukarest and Belgrade, so as to tap large centres of population, will at any rate be in partial operation by next summer. When this route is equipped fully, passengers who leave London after dinner one night should have travelled 2,000 miles by air, and actually reached Constantinople, by about dinner-time on the following evening.

The recently opened route between London and Copenhagen, via Amsterdam, will, it is calculated, by next spring permit air travellers between London and Copenhagen, and also those between London and Berlin, who "change" at Bremen, to complete their journey during the course of a day's flying.
