## COLONEL PECK IS ASKED TO REMAIN AT OTTAWA

## PRIEST IS KIDNAPPED IN IRELAND AND FOUR MEN SHOT TRYING TO ESCAPE

### Board of Trade Discusses Condition at the Drydock

Bankruptcy proceedings will commence on Thursday unless assurances received from Ottawa regarding the payment of accounts

### Long Telegram is Sent to Col. Peck at Ottawa

Member asked to remain there until some settlement is arrived at; other matters dealt with

If some definite action is not taken to prevent it on or before Thursday proceedings will be instituted to force the local shipyard into bankruptcy. This will enable a reorganization and the completion of the ships. In the meantime the Board of Trade has wired Colonel Peck in regard to this and a number of other matters. The telegram reads:

"Erb has wired Vancouver and Prince Rupert creditors offering to pay immediately all accounts of \$100 or less and other accounts one third cash and the balance out of the government's next two payments. We have replied accepting the offer providing all wage claims are paid immediately and the balance as suggested, provided the Government undertakes paying creditors direct out of future payments. Wish you would see whether department is behind Erb in this or if it is another false alarm. We have no confidence in Erb. The Vancouver creditors are bound to listen to Erb and are holding up bankruptcy proceedings. Unless something definite is forthcoming immediately we think bankruptcy should be proceeded with. Wire your opinion to interviewing authorities. Request you remain in Ottawa until something definite regarding drydock. Travler Caruthers left for South today. Please see the Minister of Justice and try to have Atlin and Prince Rupert made a bankruptcy division under the Bankruptcy Act. Chief Justice Hunter will recommend Judge Young for the same. This work cannot be economically or conveniently handled at Vancouver. This should be arranged as quickly as possible. Refrigerator Cars. Please ascertain from Mr. Hanna when new express refrigerator cars will be available. We also request you to use your influence with Hanna to have the Railway opposition to the level crossing at Gow Bay withdrawn. The different sections of the telegram were added after each subject had been discussed by the council of the Board. A telegram was read from Colonel Peck in regard to the dock in which he said: 'Warren is urging headquarters to keep repair work going in meantime. Urge Johnston and other owners to wait until Monday before sending any work from Prince Rupert. Leaving for Toronto tonight.' It was pointed out by Mr. Patmore that already a Vancouver firm was pushing its claim against the drydock company and if nothing was heard from Ottawa his local clients would commence bankruptcy proceedings on Thursday.

### JAPANESE ARE PROTECTED IN THIS PROVINCE

Action of Provincial Government Declared Ultra Vires by Appeal Court.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 17.—The Provincial Government's legislation to prevent the employment of Japanese under logging or timber licenses is declared ultra vires by the Court of Appeal. Briefly the Canadian-Japanese treaty of 1913 is supreme and the Provincial Government is thus unable to stipulate "no Japanese" in its public works contracts.

### NEWTON HAD POOR MEETING AT TERRACE

Less Than Fifty in Audience. Told What He Did as Mayor.

TERRACE, Nov. 17.—S. M. Newton held a meeting here last night with John Kirkaldy in the chair. In spite of the fact that the meeting was well advertised for two days, it was but poorly attended, less than fifty people were in the audience.

Mr. Newton told what he had done as mayor of Prince Rupert and dilated on the extravagance of the Government. He credited the Rattenbury Land Co. with the increase in population of the province, pledged himself to exert every effort to get a bridge at Terrace if elected, and advocated the expenditure of 70 per cent of the total revenue of the province in the four northern constituencies.

Community Plan. The speaker promised opposition to the present Government, but co-operation with any coalition government so long as they did not that he wanted them to do for him. He advocated land settlement on the community plan with the government clearing the land and supplying the roads to the same before they were opened for settlement.

No specific charges were made against the Government except an unnecessary increase in the expenditures and the use of the money collected in the north to develop the south. No convincing arguments were used and there was no enthusiasm in the audience. He was given a good hearing and at the close some questions were asked and answered.

### MARFISH AGAIN IS DISCUSSED

Ottawa Government Seems Determined to Send Little Vessel South.

MATTER TAKEN UP WITH COLONEL PECK

The matter of the repairs to the fisheries cruiser Marfish was taken up at the Board of Trade meeting yesterday. A telegram from Colonel Peck was read as follows:

"Re Marfish, the argument of the department here is that she can lay up in fresh water and without the expense of a watchman. Would it not be possible to haul her out on Digby Island ways and be under public works watchman or some other watchman. Wire urgently on this so that I can meet argument."

### Local Suggestions.

The reply sent by the local board was as follows:

"Expense of running the Marfish to Westminster and return at least \$1,000. In addition, her machinery will be dismantled and must be reassembled in spring. If taken south the crew must be engaged two months earlier than she remains here. The Marfish has been in fresh water two-thirds of this season and her hull is not foul. She could lay alongside the wharf here during winter for repairs and later be taken out and copperpainted. Fresh water is available at Silver Creek with covering dolphins. A watchman would be needed at most three months. Department might consider building a cradle for her at the Marine Station."

GENEVA, November 17.—At the League of Nations assembly Lord Cecil, representative of Great Britain, will put up a fight for no secrecy at the meetings of the League.

### Four Shot When Trying To Escape from Escort

Father Griffin of Bushy Park, Galway, is Kidnapped by Persons Unknown; General Condition of Ireland Improves

WHITEGATE, County Clare, Ireland, November 17.—Four of the six men arrested under the Restoration Act were shot dead when trying to escape from an escort, according to an official report.

DUBLIN, November 17.—Father Griffin, curate of Bushy Park, Galway, was kidnapped from his residence by persons unknown.

While the general condition of Ireland is much improved, there are a good many individual cases of lawbreaking which are being dealt with under the new powers granted.

### TWO PRISONERS ARE RECOVERED

Harry Ross and Steve Wintonaik Recaptured at Haysport After Day's "Hike."

Harry Ross and Steve Wintonaik, escaped prisoners from the city jail, were brought back to the city by the provincial police boat Sylvania this morning at 11 o'clock and now the officers are out in search of Joe Verino and Joe Aurioi, the two others who escaped jail yesterday morning at the same time as Ross and Wintonaik. The two latter were recaptured at 12:45 last night in a shack at Haysport by Sergeant Adams and Constable Campbell of the city force.

As soon as the police learned yesterday morning of the escape, search parties were organized travelling both east and west. Sergeant Adams and Constable Campbell took a launch to Port Edward only to learn that their men had passed before their arrival for they had been seen at Kain and Inverness. Going by foot along the track these officers followed up and got further word at Cassiar, Sunnyside and Soek-eye that Ross and Wintonaik had been seen passing. They arrived at Haysport at midnight and after having a meal picked up the two prisoners in a shack where they had been seen to go.

### Were Tired Out.

Both the men were tired out and Ross admitted that he could not have travelled much farther. Piled up inside the door of the shack where they were captured were a stack of tin cans to give the alarm if anyone attempted to enter. The officers had no difficulty in making the arrest. The Myfynwy with Warden Bailly and Constables Ackroyd, Dryden, and Saint reached Haysport about four this morning and brought in the searchers and prisoners.

Now the efforts of the police are directed towards the capture of Verino and Aurioi. They are known to have started out in the direction of the cold storage and were seen between town and that point but that is the last that was seen of them. It is thought that they might attempt to get back to his home, Metlakalla.

### Fobbery at Seal Cove.

Last night at 9 o'clock the robbery of a rifle, revolver, a sack of flour and a sack of oatmeal was reported to the police by a man named Dawson who lives at the east end of Eleventh Avenue. The police suspect that Verino and Aurioi might have had something to do with this affair. It is believed that they are travelling together.

### Wreck Inquiry is Resumed Today

Captain Nicholson said Captains were never reprimanded for being late; rather have ships late than on rocks

VANCOUVER, November 17.—The Prince Rupert wreck inquiry was resumed this morning. Chief engineer Cochrane and other witnesses are arriving tonight on the Prince Albert. Capt. McKenzie was examined on Monday's evidence.

He stood by what he said on former occasions and stated that the last order given to the helmsman, Burke, was not replied to as customary.

Capt. Nicholson testified that in his opinion the helmsman was at fault. He had made an error in steering but the captain gave the orders correctly. G. T. P. captains were never reprimanded for late arrivals. He would "sooner have the ships late than on the rocks," he said.

Replying to the commissioner, Captain McKenzie said he did not check the compass after the accident because he was too busy attending to the passengers.

### COMPLETE P.G.E. PEACE RIVER BY SEPTEMBER IS FOR PERRY

Premier Oliver Advocates Taking Over of Line by Canadian National.

Recent Arrival Says Liberal Candidate is Solid in that Part of Country.

VICTORIA, Nov. 17.—Premier Oliver in a speech here said that the P. G. E. would reach Prince George by September of next year bringing the total cost by that time to \$37,000,000. The annual cost of maintenance was \$2,500,000. As this line was chiefly valuable to Alberta and Saskatchewan, it should be absorbed by the Canadian National Railways.

A recent arrival in Prince Rupert from Pouce Coupe and other Peace River points say that Perry is the man for the people of the Peace River. He will get most of the support from that section and he confidently expects he will be elected for the Prince George constituency.

Has Minister of Lands Been a Success?

Anyone travelling throughout British Columbia finds that the general opinion of the people is there never has been a minister of lands who has administered his office as well as has Pattullo. Take the matter of lumber. He put northern B. C. on the map insofar as the lumber business is concerned. True there is a slump just now owing to the drop in prices and the action of the Dominion Government in raising the freight rates, but that is only temporary.

It was in connection with aeroplane spruce production that Mr. Pattullo first made a mark. He forced owners to sell their timber for use in the war and established an industry in this part of the province which has had most far-reaching results. From now on the lumber industry will be one of the basic industries of the place. This was well expressed by Vice-President Hays of the Canadian National Railways when he was here recently.

Pulp and Paper Production in North.

In the matter of pulp and paper production, not only are these industries already operating successfully down the coast, but negotiations are under way for several more industries of a similar nature, one of which is to be at Kitimat and another in this neighborhood, particulars of which cannot be given just now. The waterpowers have all been surveyed and particulars in regard to limits and other details furnished, something which was never done by former administrations.

Lands Opened For Settlers.

An attempt is being made to show that the present Government is not responsible for the settling up of the lands, but that it has been done by private companies. This is very wide of the mark. The Raittenbury Lands and similar organizations have been forced to act through the pressure put on them by the Land Settlement Board and everyone knows the results in the Bulkley and Nechako valleys and adjacent districts. The minister of lands is the first efficient minister of his department. He has used energy combined with commonsense, the two requirements in addition to common honesty, which are necessary for the work. He is not spectacular but he does the work and gets results.

Mining News

Princess Royal Island Recent mineral discoveries on Princess Royal Island have caused excitement and it is anticipated that considerable development will soon be under way. Claims that were staked last July and August when the rush first began have far exceeded expectations and mining engineers who have inspected the properties have reported very favorably on them. Several options have been offered, but the discoverers have preferred to carry on themselves rather than accept them. Old prospectors who know the coast say that there are showings there more favorable than that at the original Surf Inlet mine. The first strike was made by D. Gordola and D. Koski and other well-known Swanson Bay citizens have staked.

Roseland Wants Mill Roseland, at one time British Columbia's leader in metalliferous production, still remains quiet, with a few men working at the various consolidated properties and a crew of leasers at the Velvet, several miles down the Great Northern from town. Roseland's hope for the near future centres very largely upon action taken by the Trail Consolidated with regard to the construction of a mill for the handling of the lower grade ores from the camp. Plans are already said to be well advanced in this end and the Heinze ranch below Roseland and above Trail is the likely site. On account of the high costs it is unlikely the big firm will start work immediately on this project.

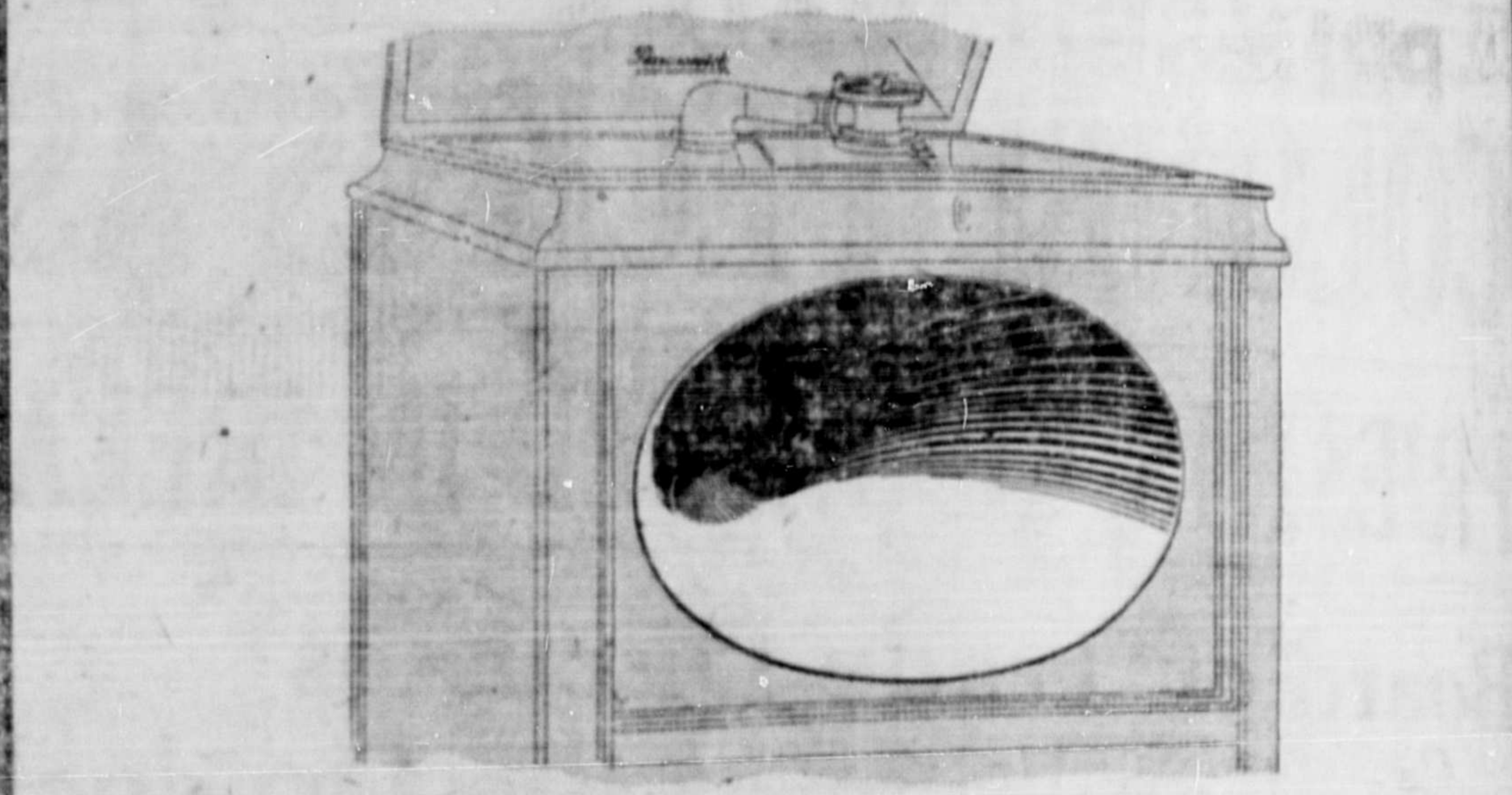

### KETCHIKAN MEN ARE SHOT AT FOR DEER

**Bullet Punctured Clothing of One and Burned Skin as it Passed**

KETCHIKAN, Nov. 17.—The first near hunting tragedy of the season in Southeastern Alaska occurred on Sunday when P. F. Snow of Ketchikan had his clothing punctured and the skin on his left leg burned by a bullet, fired by a man who had mistaken Snow for a deer.

In company with J. C. Shawyer and the latter's son Chester, Mr. Snow left Ketchikan on the gas boat Keetla. The party went to Eagle Island, north of here and were on the trail of three deer.

They heard a low whistling sound similar to that caused when a blade of grass is held between the fingers and blown on. They thought it was caused by the movement of the branches of a tree. It was not like the deer call, which is made in somewhat the same way.

Suddenly a shot rang out and Chester Shawyer let out a yell to the others, asking what they were up to. He dropped to the ground as he yelled. When the others came up to him he pointed to a tree nearby where a bullet had struck.

**Through Trousers**

A few seconds later another shot was fired. This time Snow was the target. He was facing the direction from which the bullet. It passed between his legs as he was taking a step. His right trouser leg was cut in two places, but the bullet did not touch the skin. It then cut through his left trouser leg, burning the skin in passing. His underwear was also cut in three places.

The three hunters lost no time in getting under cover, after which they located the man who fired the shots. He was described as being a very large man, dirty in appearance and with bloodshot eyes. They did not ask his name. He said that he had given the "deer call" and as he was not answered he concluded that the moving objects he had seen were deer. Asked if he knew there were three real deer in the vicinity he said he did not. He claimed to have a gas boat in one of the bays on the island.

Mr. Shawyer said that a member of a hunting party he had taken to Eagle Island a few weeks ago also reported he had been shot at.

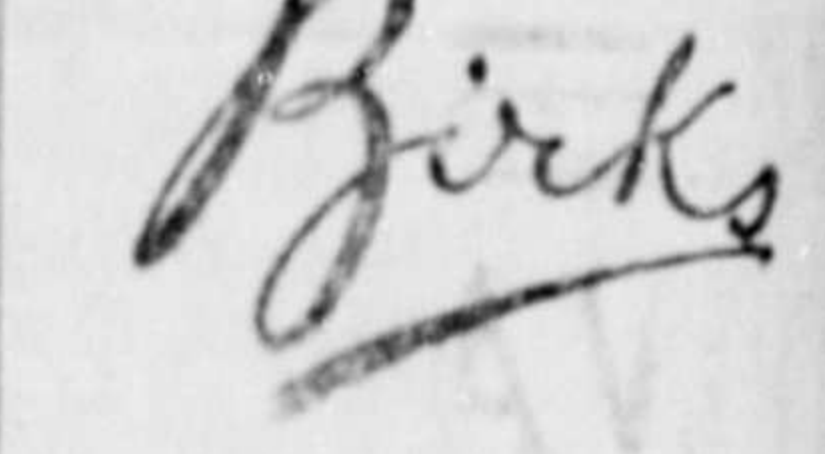

## HILL RESIGNS FROM POLICE COMMISSION

Will Not Remain on Board Because no Prosecutions for Raffles.

"I am through and wish to resign. I will send the resignation into the mayor." These were the final words of Police Commissioner Hill at the special meeting of the police commission held last evening to go into the matter of the \$100 raffle conducted by the Catholic Church at the recent bazaar. At the previous meeting of the commission Mr. Hill said that he would have action instituted against the church for this illegal proceeding or quit in the attempt.

Since the matter came up Commissioner Myhill-Jones has been opposed to prosecution on the grounds that the church did not have sufficient notice of the illegality of the affair. The matter was laid over for a week to allow the mayor to look into it and arrive at a decision. Last evening Mayor McClymont stated that while he did not agree with Commissioner Jones that notice should be given, he would not, however, be a party to the prosecution of any religious, charitable or patriotic institution. He had even heard that the \$100 had not been paid over. This did not seem to be generally accepted, however.

There was about an hour's discussion on the question, each commissioner remaining firm on his stand. Commissioner Hill stated at the end of the meeting that his resignation would come into effect at once.
