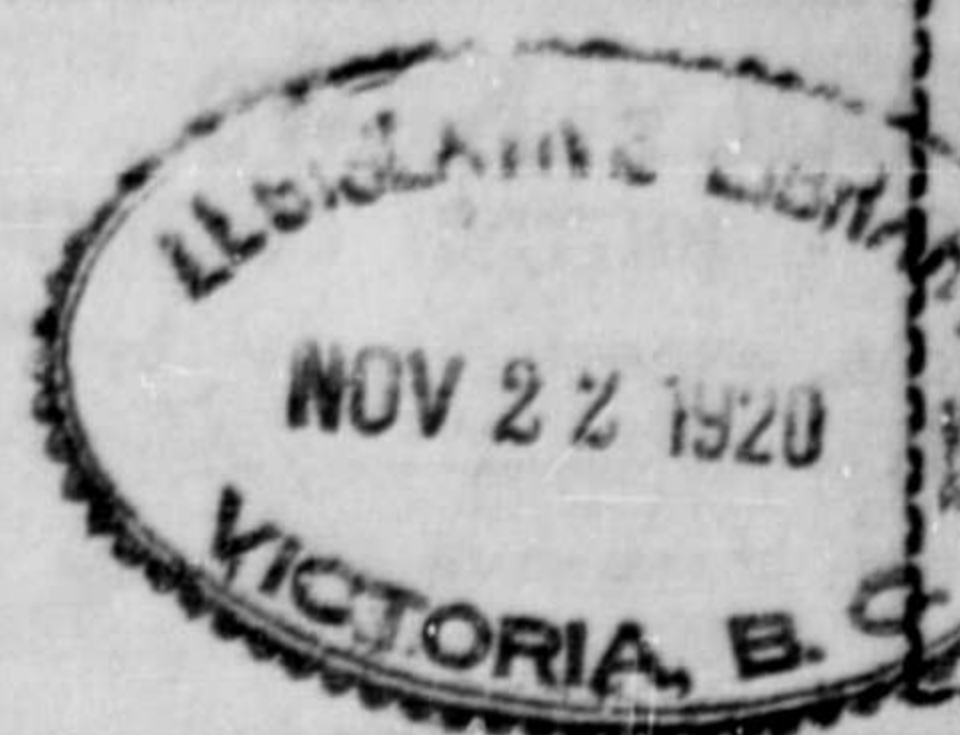

INCONSISTENCY OF W. J. BOWSER CLEARLY SHOWN

INVESTIGATION INTO WRECK OF PRINCE RUPERT CONTINUES AT VANCOUVER

Mrs. Ralph Smith Lands Whiz Bang in Bowser Political Camp

Produces sworn evidence that leader of opposition employing stenographer at \$25 a month salary; dramatic scene at meeting

VANCOUVER, November 18.—Mrs. Ralph Smith landed a whiz-bang in the Bowser camp last night when she told of the employment of a stenographer at a monthly salary of twenty-five dollars. Her statement was received with applause, ejaculations and the remark of a member of the audience, "You got him on the heel of the shoe."

Mrs. Smith backed up her attack by waving a sworn statement of the stenographer showing that the statement she made was absolutely true.

Mrs. Smith was dealing with the working out of the minimum wage bill and the statement by Mr. Bowser that the provisions of the act were being ignored by many employers. It was a dramatic scene and it took the audience by storm.

CONDITION AT SHIPYARD IS UNCHANGED

Expected Action of the Shipping Company, Bankruptcy Proceedings Delayed.

The shipbuilding situation at the yard is unchanged today. Mr. Patmore, who is acting for the local creditors, has received a letter asking him to delay bankruptcy proceedings, and these are being postponed today, although they begin any day. In the meantime the sale of part of the machinery is advertised.

It seems that there are some deposits amounting to \$162,000 deposited by Erb with the shipping company, which it is expected to release and with which work may proceed. An effort is being made to induce the bonding company to do this, but no answer has as yet been received in regard to it.

OUR MILLION VANCOUVER DOCK

Contract for Construction Let to Northern Construction Co. and J. W. Stewart.

OTTAWA, Nov. 18.—A contract has been signed for the building of a wharf and the Ballantyne wharf at Vancouver by the Northern Construction Co. and J. W. Stewart. The amount of the contract is approximately \$4,000,000.

GOOD WORK OF WAR VETERANS

Through Their Efforts Much is Done to Relieve Dry Dock Workers

NOW ASK \$1,000 FROM THE FEDERAL FUND

There has been \$1,000 disbursed by the local Great War Veterans' Association and \$4,970 by the Soldiers' Aid Commission of the provincial government to relieve immediate distress among returned soldiers due to the recent dry dock closing, according to a report submitted at the meeting of the Great War Veterans' Association held last evening. This has been of great help in specially urgent cases, but much more money is needed and now it has been decided to raise \$1,000 on the Victory Bonds held by the Association to further carry out the work.

Last week the secretary of the association, wired to Col. C. W. Peck, M.P., asking him to try to secure a loan of \$25,000 from the Federal Emergency Fund. As yet this wire is unanswered, but the Association is hoping for the granting of the request. This would clear up in good shape any possible suffering among returned soldiers or other overseas men and their dependants.

VERINO AND AURIOL ARE RECAPTURED

Detachment Headed by Sergeant Adams, who Personally Made Re-arrest, Brought Them in.

CAN ESCAPE FROM JAIL WITH JUST CAN-OPENER

Joe Verino and Joe Auriol, the two remaining fugitives from the city lock-up, were retaken this morning at 9:15 by a detachment of city police headed by Sergeant Adams who personally made the capture on the side of the mountain west of the pipe line and back of Eleventh Avenue. Recovering these two concludes the two days' chase for the four prisoners who escaped on Tuesday morning from the city jail and all four are now safely behind the bars awaiting trial for the new offences which they will have to face.

Sergeant Adams, Warden Bailey and Constables McGlinchy, Campbell, Logan, McDonald, Leck and Ackroyd spent yesterday afternoon in the search in the east end of town but obtained no trace until they were coming home at dusk last evening when they detected a cloud of smoke rising from the bush on the mountain side. At that time an attempt was made to investigate but it was too dark.

Capture Effected
At 7 o'clock this morning the search was instituted in the same direction and the first trace was found when Verino and Auriol were seen at a distance through a pair of field glasses. Their location was made still easier by the sound of their chopping wood for the morning fire. With Warden Bailey and Constables McGlinchy and Logan covering their men from the surrounding bushes, Sergeant Adams caught them unawares in their shelter behind a stump where they were about to cook their morning meal. It was 9:15 when the handcuffs were clamped on their wrists and by 10 o'clock they were back again in the city lock-up.

Auriol and Verino admit having broken into the shack of Mr. Dawson at the end of Eleventh Avenue. The revolver which was stolen was found fully loaded on Auriol's person and the rifle was lying on the ground. The sack of flour was found, as well as nine chickens, all plucked and dressed. The latter the men admit having stolen from the Chinese ranch at the end of Eleventh Avenue. They had no chance to use their weapons on account of the surprising manner in which the officer came up on them. Verino seemed surprised at his capture and said that the smoke was the only thing that gave them away.

Easy to Escape
Speaking of the escape of the prisoners, the police stated this morning that the city council was asked over a year ago by the city engineer and the chief of police to have the whole wall surrounding

the jail rooms changed into concrete. This action seems to have been delayed, however, and the police do not hold themselves for the escape. To use their own expression, "a prisoner needs only a can-opener to escape under present conditions." The manner in which these captures were made so quickly reflects a good deal of credit on the energy of the searchers.

JOIN BOLSHEVICS
Ten Thousand of Wrangell's Troops Go Over to Enemy.

LONDON, Nov. 18.—Ten thousand troops from Wrangell's defeated army have joined the Bolsheviks and are establishing soviet committees in Sebastopol and elsewhere in the Crimea.

Lord Minto, who owns 3,000 acres in the West known as the Minto Ranch, recently returned to Scotland and reports that his shorthorn cattle and Oxford sheep which he imported from Scotland are doing well. He will not return to his ranch until next April.

SALMON PACK OF PROVINCE

Value of Catch for 1920 was \$13,307,719—Details Given Out by Cannerymen.

VANCOUVER, November 18.—A statement issued by the salmon cannerymen for the year 1920 shows that the salmon pack of the province is valued at \$13,307,719. The total pack for the year amounted to 1,177,047 cases against the 1919 pack of 1,393,156 and the 1918 pack of 1,616,157, or the 1915 pack of 1,133,381.

District totals are as follows: Fraser River, 432,860 cases. Skeena River, 334,392 cases. Rivers Inlet, 152,828 cases. Naas River, 81,153 cases. Vancouver Island except Nootka—77,402 cases. Outlying districts, 398,412. Total, 1,177,047 cases.

The reports say that the bulk of the pinkies and chums are still unsold, these fish not being in demand on the Canadian market.

BUTCHART BUYS

Part Owner of Dolly Varden Mine Purchases Auxiliary Schooner.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 18.—The auxiliary schooner Laura Whalen, which is owned here, has been purchased by R. F. Butchart, president of the Vancouver Portland Cement Co. of Victoria, and one of the owners of the Dolly Varden mine. The vessel is one of a number of schooners built during the early days of the war at Vancouver and Victoria.

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Captain Mackenzie Regarded Highly

Captain Nicholson speaks appreciatively of well known skipper; third Officer should have been in wheelhouse

VANCOUVER, November 18.—At the wreck inquiry, which was continued yesterday afternoon before Capt. McPherson and two assessors, Capt. Nicholson continued his evidence. He said that Capt. Mackenzie was regarded highly by shipping men. He denied that the lifeboats were not swung out.

When the schedules for the steamers were arranged the captains were called into conference and no pressure was put on them to keep the schedule times. From Vancouver to Prince Rupert at an average speed of 13.56 knots, not allowing for stops, the trip could be made in thirty-eight and a half hours.

"With stops it would be necessary to steam fourteen knots," observed Commissioner McPherson.

Assessor Park commented on the absence of the third officer from the wheelhouse. The chief officer should have seen he was there.

Capt. Mackenzie also said Burke, the wheelman, told him he (Burke) did not repeat the last order from the bridge as was customary. Burke also telling the captain, he said, that he had seen land ahead.

OMINECA WENT THREE TO ONE AGAINST DRYS

Final Results of Count Throughout Province Except Atlin Give Majority 54,741.

VICTORIA, November 19.—It is officially announced that government control had a majority of 34,947 votes in the whole province except Atlin, where the difficulties of transportation have delayed the returns. The vote for government control was 89,688 and for prohibition 54,741, rejected ballots, 1,637. Of the 200,892 registered voters 146,066 voted.

The only districts that voted dry were Chilliwack and Richmond while in Slokan prohibition was lost by only one vote. The totals include the vote in Prince Rupert, where the numbers were for prohibition, 975, and for Government control, 1,714, giving a majority against of 739.

In Omineca the vote stood 199 for prohibition and 643 for government control, or a majority of 444.

Playground Wanted
For the Children.

Now that the Market Place will no longer be available for baseball games, it is time to look around and decide on a new place for the boys to play. The new building will not be welcomed by the youngsters for they have had a lot of enjoyment from the use of the level grounds at the northerly end of Second Avenue. Now some other place must be found for them or they will have to go without a playground.

There is a school site between Eighth and Ninth avenues south of McBride and there is a flat park reserve on the opposite side of the bridge from McClymont Park, which could be levelled and drained more easily than any other site. This would make a good football ground as there would be an absence of protruding rocks. Some steps should be taken at once if the youngsters are to have a playground next spring and summer.

People Not Keen
On Politics.

The people are not very keen on politics at this election. They are well satisfied at the way the business of the country has been conducted and the result is that there is little pep in the meetings. There is nothing against the present Government, the only alternative being a reversion to Bowserism, something that the people certainly do not favor.

It will be a pity if the people do not take an interest in the candidates and their policies, particularly with a view to evolving new policies or improving on old ones. It is a calamity to any country to have the Government left to a few politicians. Such action tends to deterioration. We welcome criticism and welcome new suggestions. We want the best Government we can possibly get.

The people are to be the judges as to who will represent them. They ought to meet the candidates from whom they are to choose. They want to hear all sides of every question discussed and then make their choice of the men and the policies. Both are factors.

Platform No Good
Without Ability.

Anyone can draw up a platform or get one drawn up by a lawyer or some other clever person. The average independent candidate has a little pet platform, all his own, over which he gloats and which he constantly waves before the people for their endorsement. The difficulty is that even if the candidate were elected, there would be no possible chance of the platform being converted into legislation. It is simply the personal view of the candidate and has no backing from the rest of the province.

When a widespread party, such as the Liberal party, puts forward a platform, it has behind it the endorsement of the members of the party throughout the province. There is much more probability of such a platform being carried into effect. There is something behind it. Suppose every candidate was an independent. Each of the forty-seven would go to Victoria with forty-seven different platforms. The result would be chaos. There would be little harmony and little beneficial legislation. In order to get results there must be cohesion.

In Position to
Carry Legislation.

The Oliver Government, of which Mr. Pattullo is a member, is a cohesive body led by an able and honest man. It is in a position to carry out legislation in the interests of the community. It has made a good beginning under most adverse circumstances. It is now asking the electors for an endorsement of the policy they have pursued and everything points to the probability of that endorsement being given. In this constituency it would be a calamity for the Government to be returned and our member of it defeated. We do not think such a thing will happen, but elections are always uncertain until the ballots are counted. Anyone who is interested in good government by responsible men should leave no stone unturned to see that the right man is returned on December 1.

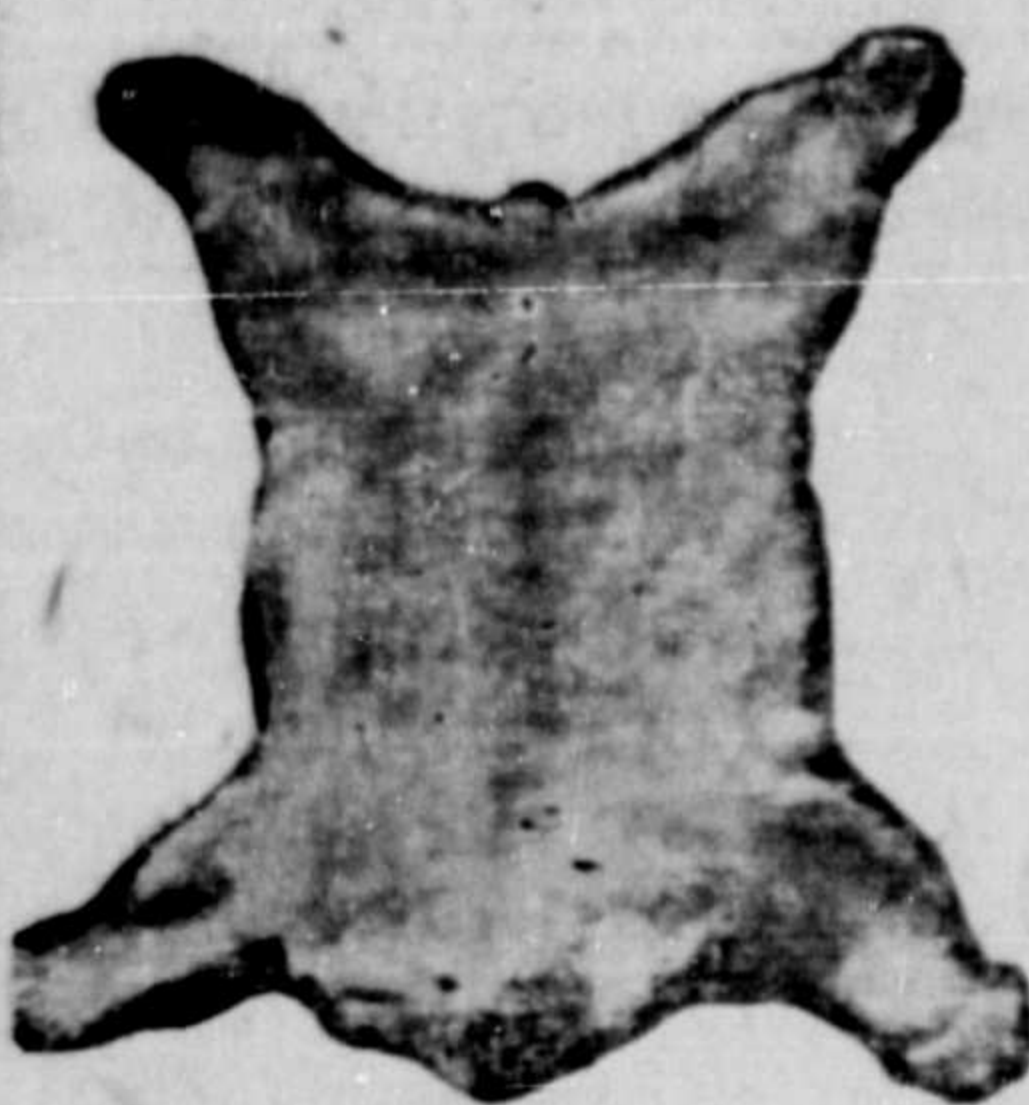

"GO TO IT, SAM," SAID MCKAY

Discarded Candidate Explains Why
He Threw Down Burrough After
Moving Resolution.

PAT DALY SPEAKS IN HIS OWN INTERESTS

Sad Array of Empty Benches Does
Not Daunt Newton
Supporters.

That there should be more practical men in the Legislature than there are at present was the opinion expressed last night by Pat Daly at the meeting called in the interests of the People's Independent Candidate S. M. Newton at Carpenters' hall last night. There were two speakers, Pat Daly and T. Ross McKay, the former a candidate for the Atlin constituency and the latter the man who moved to make the nomination of J. H. Burroughs unanimous at the labor convention, but who has now switched to the Newton camp. There were 35 people present but the sad array of empty benches did not seem to daunt the supporters of the People's Independent candidate for they applauded any of the slashing sallies of the speakers and listened attentively to the discourses. C. O. Rowe presided.

Daly Speaks.
Mr. Daly spoke rather in support of his own candidature than that of Mr. Newton. He had a number of schemes which he thought should be carried out among them being a suggestion that the Government should put pupils through the high school, that they should take over the coast transportation and make the fares lower. He favored the closed shop in labor matters in order to make strikes shorter, and if elected he offered to leave his resignation in the hands of the people. He said the betting was strong on Daly and spoke humorously of a meeting held in his own constituency at which Kerin made a speech in which there was nothing worth answering.

Mr. Daly said if Mr. Oliver was elected by a small majority he, Daly, would get all the independents together in the interests of the country. He said he knew the merits of a prospector's property and he looked for a better time in Stewart next year and he wanted Prince Rupert people to co-operate with them.

Weighed Candidates.
T. Ross McKay explained why he had deserted the labor ticket and was supporting S. M. Newton. He had weighed the various candidates in the balance. He had moved the resolution to make the nomination of Burroughs unanimous. He did not exactly know how it all happened. He had thought the convention was to decide between himself and Newton, but while they were fighting for it, the other had slipped in and grabbed the bone. He was of opinion that the cards were stacked.

Mr. McKay said the function of a trade union as he understood it was to improve the conditions of

labor. Mr. Burroughs declared he was not interested in that. What was he interested in then? He did not see how the O. B. U. improved the condition of the loggers, as they claimed, if they were not interested in the condition. The O. B. U. had not yet had to fight the hard battles of labor as the international had done.

Quiet and Docile.
Mr. McKay said he knew nothing of Capt. Formby except that if elected he would prove a quiet, docile follower of Bowser.

The speaker then went on to dilate on the greatness of W. L. MacKenzie King whose book he had read. The provincial Liberal party he considered had wandered away from Liberalism and should be condemned. Mr. Pattullo got into power to right things, but admitted he had not done it. He told of the ups and downs of the Ocean Falls paper concern and said the present company had lived up to the letter of the law and had built a good mill. He had not, however, heard anything of late about the timber leases which the Government was expected to quash.

Mr. McKay criticised the Government for things they had not done and for things they claimed they had done. He said after going over all the candidates he came to the conclusion that there was nothing left but to support Newton and he had said: "Go to it, Sam. I wish you success this time."

Premier Oliver Deals With Provincial Finance

Shows how Bowser plunged people into debt and left clean up for present administration; Incriminating Documents

VICTORIA, Nov. 18.—In the course of an optimistic fighting speech at Oak Bay Premier Oliver said:

"Mr. Bowser says that we have increased taxation. The Conservative Government of which Mr. Bowser was a member in 1912 collected \$360,000 through the poll tax. But at that time with an election coming on they cancelled it. When we took office we had to reimpose it and double the tax on personal property.

"But the whole proceeds of the poll tax, the personal property tax and the real property tax does not meet the annual deficit on the Pacific Great Eastern, a liability left us by the late Government.

"The Conservatives say that we have increased the debt of the Province by \$15,000,000," the Premier went on. "Why this is only a few dollars more than we have borrowed for the P.G.E. to carry on this liability the Conservatives left us.

"The Conservative campaign booklet says that the Liberals during their term of office have spent only a little over \$3,000,000 on public works while the Conservatives spent over \$14,000,000. Where did they get their money from? During their last six years of office they spent \$19,810,000. They did not spend that amount of money on all the roads of B.C. during the same time. So you have this position that they had deficits aggregating more than all the money they spent on all the roads in B.C. during the same six years.

"During the same six years they sold public lands of this Province and received \$11,000,000. What did they do with this money. They built court houses and jails all over the country. During 1914 they spent \$190,000 for special constables, \$160,000 for transport and keep of prisoners, \$747,000 in the administration of justice.

Stripped Files of Documents
"The Conservative campaign booklet says the Conservatives are out to restore the credit of the Province to where it was in 1916. Mr. Bowser says let us forget the past and look to the future. I met him on the same platform at Pouce Coupe and he said that the people don't want post mortems. I replied to him that if they were like those of Mr. Bowser's Government, nobody would want them."

The Premier repeated his assertion that after the Bowser Government had been defeated in 1916, it hung on to office for two and one-half months, while its members were busy stripping the files of incriminating documents.

"It is true that they removed public documents from the official files during this time," the Premier continued. "Isn't that a serious statement to make?"

Will Not Return Papers
"Before Mr. Bowser left office as Premier he took with him public papers to his house. I brought the matter up in the Legislature and the Legislature passed a resolution ordering Mr. Bowser to bring back those papers. Mr. Bowser said that they were private papers. But I pro-

duced the vouchers to show that these papers were public documents and paid for by this Province. To this day Mr. Bowser has not returned these papers.

You can search the history of any Parliament in the world and you will not find a parallel to this. However, they did not strip the files quite clean as we have letters from bond houses pointing out to the Government the unsatisfactory condition of its finances.

Revenue Dwindled to Half
"In 1912 they had a revenue of \$12,500,000," the Premier continued. "And they spent \$15,500,000. They had a deficit that year of over \$3,000,000.

"Next year the revenue was between \$10,000,000 and \$11,000,000 and they spent nearly \$16,000,000, leaving a deficit of over \$5,000,000.

"And under their administration a revenue of over \$12,500,000 in 1912 had dropped to \$6,291,000 in 1915.

"If I would tell you that with a shrinkage of revenue to one-half, the finances of the Province could be in a safe condition you know that I would not be telling you the truth.

Found Many Non-Taxpayers
"Out of the millions that Mr. Bowser says we have borrowed, \$14,000,000 is for the P.G.E. and \$4,000,000 to pay the deficit left when they left office.

"When we took office the Hon. Ralph Smith and then the Hon. John Hart got to work as tax collectors. They found that some of the people of Victoria had not paid an income tax in eighteen years.

"At the end of our first year of office, our revenue was up to over \$8,000,000. At the end of the second year it was up to over \$10,000,000 and at the end of the third year it was up to \$13,750,000."

They were caught in a storm and their small boat was driven shoreward and as they could not land, were forced to take refuge on a small exposed rock, where they remained for 36 hours before Gus Michael's boat "John M." picked them up.

CICOTTE TO TURN STATES EVIDENCE

CHICAGO, Nov. 17.—Eddie Cicotte of the White Sox, whose confessions resulted in indictments in connection with the world's series of baseball games at the end of the year 1919, will turn state evidence when the men are tried. His only sentence will be banishment from organized baseball.

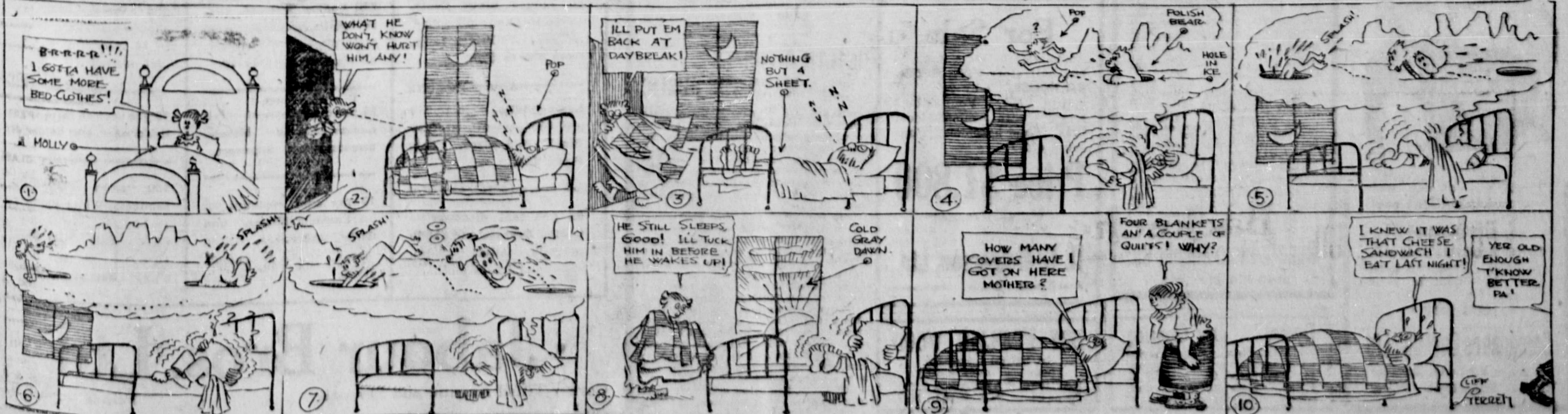
