MONTREAL (CP)—Quebec's rough-and-tumble political scene last night blossomed into violence at the climax of voting in the hotly-contested though one-sided general election. Montreal and Levis were trou-

ble centres. Shots were fired and clubs and bottles swung in Monreal committee rooms.

Troops were called out to disperse a mob of 500 in Levis where Reynold Belanger gained a seat for the Liberals from Union Nationale.

Earlier, police turned firehoses on the mob demonstrating against the Liberal victory, but failed to disperse it.



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Better Than A Rabbit

COMETHING much better than a rabbit must be I pulled out of the hat when Democrats gather in Chicago next week to pick a U.S. presidential candidate.

Although the Republicans almost killed themselves doing it, what they finally produced was definitely no rabbit. In Dwight Eisenhower they have unquestionably the strongest presidential aspirant of either party since Franklin Roosevelt. On the basis of first tries, in fact, the Republican nominee appears even stronger than Roosevelt as the late president was not so well known nationally when he first ran in 1932.

In the Democrats' favor is a traditionally strong labor vote, a well-oiled political machine and a certain amount of confusion in the Republican ranks caused by the division between Eisenhower and Taft followers which represents a basic difference in foreign policy.

Among factors against the Democrats must be included the law of averages which is almost bound to start working on a party that has been in power for twenty years. But more important perhaps is the lack so far of an outstanding candidate.
