American Capital in Canada

IS AMERICAN capital running too much of Canada's business? This is a question which many are asking with

increasing concern in the face of growing U.S. investments in this country which are now valued at more than seven billion dollars.

Those who are alarmed by the inrush of American money observe it is so concentrated in some sectors that, for example, three-quarters of our base metals manufacturing and two-thirds of our oil industry are controlled from the U.S.A.

In the current issue of Saturday Night magazine the American financial invasion is examined and the conclusion is reached that, when the expanding Canadian economy as a whole is taken into account, the situation is not so threatening as it seems at first glance. Indeed, Canadians now control more of their own country's business than they did before the war.

In 1939 the portion of Canadian business under foreign control was 38 per cent. By the end of 1951 the figure was reduced to 32 per cent.

Most of the reduction was due to the large-scale repatriation of British-held stock. Although the percentage increase of American holdings in Canadian industry offset this to some extent, this has only gone from 22 per cent in 1939 to 25 per cent in 1951.

To have one-quarter of our business in American hands may still strike many in this country as cause for alarm Yet the fact must be faced that Canadians would have been unwilling, or unable, to gamble the large sums necessary for some of the major developments now underway.

So before we endeavor to say whether Americans are running more than their reasonable share of our business, we must answer this question: should we let it be done by American capital, or not have it done at all?

Primary cause of race prejudices is ignorance. We fear what we do not know and distrust what we do not understand. Lack of conformity to group standards, differences in thought, expressions and customs, all foster suspicion and hatred.

'Ghost Writer' of Presidential Letters Resigns After 17 Years

WASHINGTON (AP)-William D. (Bill) Hassett, chief "ghost writer" of presidential letters for 17 years, resigned his post as a White House sccretary yesterday.

Hassett, 71, wrote more than 300,000 letters over the signature of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt and President Truman.

Intimates said the secretary had the knack of writing "no" so engagingly it virtually turned disappointment into happiness. He is one of the last figures of the early "New Deal" regime,

having joined Roosevelt as an assistant White House press secretary in 1935 after a lengthy career as a newspaper man.







is your pest action? With a balanced and weak hand you pass and let partner take himself out. Holding a five card suit, even in a hand with only about one-half honor trick, it is usually best to show that suit. Partner should not take this as a free bid.

You should come in with a bid even on a four-card suit D-None and with a fairly weak hand, when your suit is next above the suit bid by the enemy. The reason is that such a bid takes up no bidding space.
