RUSSIAN OFFENSIVE STARTS IN EARNEST

TEN THOUSAND PRISONERS TAKEN IN THE FIRST GREAT ONWARD MOVEMENT

FIGHTING IS REPORTED ON ALL FRONTS

The Drive on Lens is Continued With Unabated Vigor—The Russian Offensive Now Becomes a Fact.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, July 3.—The drive south and west of Lens continues with unabated vigor. During the night the British troops operating in the region of East Reservoir Hill, supported by cannonade of great intensity, pushed forward seven hundred yards beyond the point reached on Thursday. German counter attacks continue this morning, where the Canadians are battling forward on the southwest. Floods along the Souchez river, resulting from the debris of the blown up bridges, are slightly retarding the advance.

Dominion Day was celebrated at noon yesterday by a triple salvo from all the guns on the Canadian front. During June, the British have captured 8,686 Huns. The British raided the German trenches to the east of Bargicourt and captured prisoners.

French Front.
Paris, July 3.—East of Cerny, only local fighting is reported. In the region east of Rheims, our first lines were violently bombarded. Strong surprise attacks were made by the enemy east of La Pompelle, and serious losses were caused to the attackers. The French troops counter attacked the German line along the Milles Road, and recaptured the lost ground. The immense numbers of enemy bodies found denoted the tremendous sacrifices of life made by the Germans during the last week's offensive.

Russian Front.
Petrograd, July 3.—The Russian offensive in East Galicia resulted in the capture of the village of Koniuchy, and other strongly fortified positions southwest of Brezany. Ten thousand prisoners were taken.

A German Report.
Berlin, July 3.—The Russian troops in the eastern theatre opened a heavy attack on the Stripa front. The Russians stormed the German positions along a front of eighteen and a half miles, but met with heavy losses and were forced to retire.

Italian Front.
Rome, July 3.—The Austrians unsuccessfully assaulted the Italian positions on Lake Garda-Iedo, and sustained enormous losses.

ANTI-CONSCRIPTION MEETING BROKEN UP

Winnipeg, July 3.—An anti-conscription meeting called for the City Hall Square yesterday afternoon was broken up by returned soldiers. The chairman, Alderman Queen, had his clothing torn from his back and police intervention alone averted a riot. Several arrests have been made.

TO COMMEMORATE CONFEDERATION

Captain McNeill was chairman, and after the opening exercises of praise and prayer, Fred Peters, Esq., K. C., delivered a most interesting address on Confederation. Mr. Peters was peculiarly fitted for such a subject as his actual first hand knowledge goes back to that time, and in his youth, Mr. Peters had had actual conversation with such men as Sir John A. MacDonald.

Mr. Peters had nothing but praise for the great leader, Sir John A. MacDonald, who did everything boldly. He was a man who, having made up his mind to do a thing, did it. His dream was to see Canada a great nation, with the boundless prairies and the wild land beyond the Rockies brought under development. He showed the foresight of the man, who, when the British Columbians asked for a wagon road, gave them a railroad, which was the beginning of the C. P. R. Mr. Peters told the graphic story of Confederation from its initial stages until its final accomplishment in a most splendid manner. The many comparative newcomers to Canada, who listened, and to whom Confederation was but a name, learnt a lot, and how the Canada of today was the result of the foresight, hard work and faith of the great statesmen of fifty years ago. It was with regret that Mr. Peters' address came to a close.

As an event in Prince Rupert, his speech will long be remembered, as there are few who know the facts at first hand so well, or who could tell them in such an inspiring way.

Music was provided by Mrs. Bay and Messrs. McMillan and Harvey, which, together with the singing of "Oh Canada," by Mr. J. T. Davey, added interest to the occasion. The Westholme Theatre was kindly lent for the occasion, for which thanks are due.

WEDDING BELLS

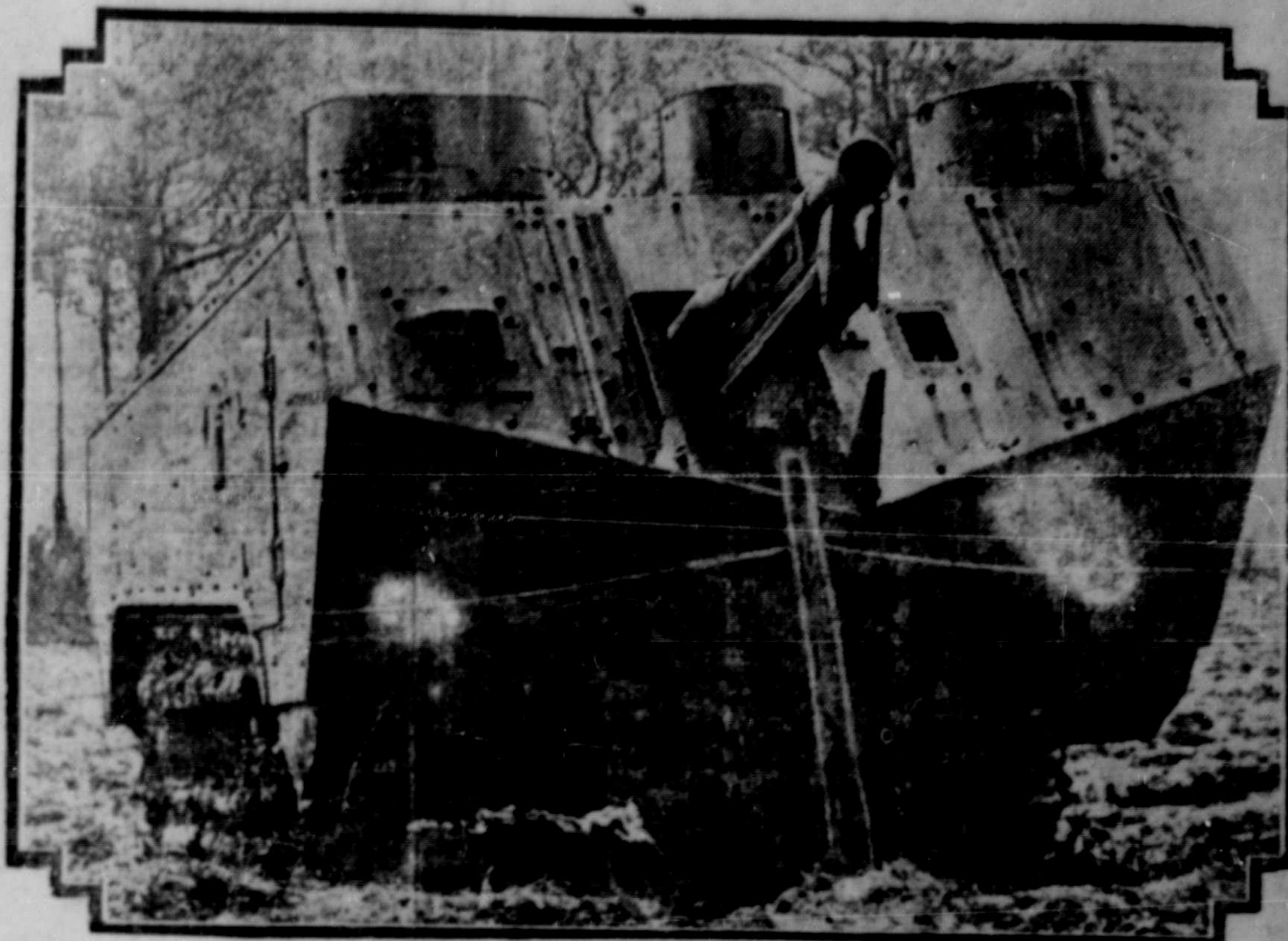

JUDGMENT GIVEN IN MINING CASE

In the case of M. P. Olsen v. The Molybdenum Mining and Reduction Company, which was heard before Mr. Justice Morrison at the High Court here last week, judgment has now been delivered. The case excited a great deal of interest among mining men of the district and the judgment of Mr. Justice Morrison is as follows:—"At this juncture, I do not deem it necessary to go into the evidence, as I have, on the run of the whole case generally, come to the clear conclusion that the plaintiff, who is a young energetic, moving person, leaped into the midst of the defendant company's grounds, whilst they were expending money in an attempt at serious development.

"As to the Hallay incident particularly, I am of the opinion that what was done by the plaintiff was an evasion of the spirit and letter of the Mineral Act. The action is dismissed; and I find that the Molly, one fraction, is a valid and subsisting mineral claim and that the defendant is the owner and entitled to the certificate of improvement as sought."

GENERAL NEWS ITEMS

THE CONSCRIPTION BILL LEAVES RICH MEN FREE

Ottawa, June 27.—There may be two opinions about what the Borden Government intends to do with the stuffed club called conscription. The machinery of delay and appeal is so elaborate that it almost defeats the alleged object of the Military Service Act—namely, the prompt reinforcement of the Canadian soldiers at the front.

If a conscript doesn't want to go he can string his protest along through three tribunals, the last being a central appeal judge, who will hold court at Ottawa. If the method works out as it does in ordinary civil cases where the parties fight it out right up to the Privy Council it may be for years, and it may be forever, before the reluctant conscript marches away to the war. In fact, the war may be over before his case is settled.

These artful provisions for procrastination would seem to show that the Borden Government is about as earnest for genuine conscription as it war for national service via the registration cards. What the Government is mainly concerned in winning is not the war, but an election. Confirmed pessimists say that the Government will pass conscription, have an election and, if they come back, forget all about it. This looks like carrying subterfuge a step too far and one doubts if any Government could be so deceitful. But there is no doubt that conscription is just as much a party manoeuvre as it is a national issue, if not more so. One of its prime objects is to pinch Quebec's tail so that the rest of Canada may mark, learn, and digest inwardly.

Quebec's tail, by the way, is composed of Henri Bourassa and Armand Lavergne, the chief allies of the Borden Government in the French province. It is a remarkable tale—this one I am telling—when the tail is pinched it howls. This is a strange thing for a tail to do. Not since Balaam's ass spoke have such prodigies happened. The conscription bill has been delayed on one excuse or another so that the tail-pinching could get into the newspapers.

Conscription would have a more

impartial aspect if a millionaire cabinet would sacrifice some of its bonds on the altar of patriotism instead of the children it lacks to send to the war. It would look more impartial, too, if it were not a lop-sided conscription which leaves money, industry, energy, talent and morals untouched. If a sentiment exists against conscription of men it has its root in the feeling that the last thing the Borden Government wants to do is to help the men at the front.

Conscription as it stands in the Military Service Act, today, is simply a means of putting the poor man under duress, while leaving the rich man free to continue his pillage. The predatory interests which put the Borden Government in office in 1914 are behind the Borden Government today. It is a safe guess that the Borden Government will do nothing to hurt their friends. On the contrary, they will do everything to give them another turn at the trough. And while Big Business plants its whole four feet in the will of the Borden Government will wave the flag to divert attention. The people of Canada will do well to watch the hocus-pocus that goes on under the old flag.

Waiving the question of consulting the people first and passing conscription afterwards—in short a referendum—which would be the democratic way of doing things, Premier Borden's conscription is defective because it thinks of the soldiers as all in the fighting line in France. What about the soldiers who are in the fighting line here at home—the soldiers of toil? In this war the soldiers may be divided into two classes—the soldiers who dare and the soldiers who bear. The soldiers who dare are over in France—their quality is courage.

The soldiers who bear are here in Canada—their quality is fortitude. In peace we would say that one quality was as good as another, but war may have given them different values. At all events the soldiers who bear have a tough fight. It is they who must bear the assaults of the food exploiters. It is they who realize that the high cost of living and giving their families enough to eat is as bitter a struggle as anything that goes on in Europe.

For the soldiers of toil, the soldiers who stay at home and



bear the chief burden of war by way of a forty per cent. tariff on the necessities of life, for the patient masses who send their sons, husbands, fathers, sweet-hearts to the war, Premier Borden's conscription bill does nothing whatever. The United States, when it adopts conscription of life, follows it up with the logical sequel—conscription of the means of living. The United States has already appointed a food dictator with wide powers and is now about to regulate exports with a view to the proper nourishment of the workers at home. Although Premier Borden's conscription bill has been on tapis six weeks now, not a thing has been done to relieve the food situation.

On the contrary the Borden Government has categorically refused to relieve it. Since the conscription bill was first announced by the Borden Government the following things have happened which go to show that the unfortunate consumer is to be skinned alive to the end of the chapter:

(1) The Minister of Labor went through the staple articles of food explaining that in each case the price was reasonable and that

nothing could be done to reduce it. Potatoes in food-straitened England cost \$2.25 a bag. In Canada they are \$4.25 a bag. A four pound loaf made of Canadian flour that has paid freight across the ocean costs 23 cents in England. A three pound loaf costs 24 cents in Canada. Mr. Crothers says nothing can be done about it.

(2) The Minister of Finance, speaking for the Government, has rejected resolutions to reduce the tariff, to increase the British Preference, to take off the duty on agricultural implements.

(3) The Government hints at a curtailed franchise and open voting. The Junkers are not all in Germany.

(4) Bacon is now fifty-two cents a pound, and Joseph Wesley Flavell has been made a baronet.—H. F. Gadsby.
