## AIR RAIDS BY BOTH GERMANS AND BRITISH

### HARWICH AND BRUGES ARE BOMBED—QUIETNESS PREVAILS ON WESTERN FRONT

#### BRITISH MAKE AIR RAID ON BRUGES CITY

**Important German Military Station is Bombed With Good Results—Artillery is Very Active.**

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, July 5.—Our aeroplanes on Tuesday morning bombed the docks at Bruges. Several tons of explosives were dropped with good results. Bruges is one of the important military posts of the Germans in Belgium and being the central point of the network of canals in northwest Flanders, has quite extensive docks. It is also a town of considerable manufacturing importance.

**British Front.**  
There is nothing to report from the front, except considerable artillery activity on both sides at numerous points.

**French Front.**  
Paris, July 5.—Extremely violent fighting has been in progress throughout the night in the Aisne region which resulted in the rout of the attacking Germans with heavy losses.

**Russian Front.**  
Petrograd, July 5.—During the fighting on Sunday and Monday, 200 officers, 18,000 men, 29 big guns, and thirty-three machine guns were captured by the Russian troops. In the streets of Petrograd, pro-war and pro-Kerensky demonstrations headed by Russian and French officers, including a number of wounded Russian soldiers, are taking place. For the first time, the Russian national flag is seen. It decorates the pictures of Brusiloff and Kerensky. At the front fraternizing with the enemy has entirely ceased. The slightest attempt to leave the trenches is immediately stopped with artillery fire from the rear.

**Revenge.**  
Paris, July 5.—According to prisoners captured by the French troops at Morthomme, the German Crown Prince is bent upon taking revenge for last year's crushing defeats at Verdun.

**U. S. Airmen.**  
The Lafayette Aviation Corps, which is composed of Americans, will shortly be transferred from the French to the United States army.

**RECRUITING**  
(Special to The Daily News.)  
Ottawa, July 5.—During the month of June, 5,750 men have enlisted in Canada, of which 298 came from British Columbia. The total enlistment in Canada since the beginning of the war is now 423,859 men.

#### BRITAIN AND FRANCE CELEBRATE THE 'FOURTH'

London, July 5.—By order of the King, the Stars and Stripes were flying from the Victoria Tower of the Houses of Parliament in Westminster yesterday, and all Government buildings, alongside the Union Jack. A great celebration of the natal day of the United States was held by the Londoners.

Paris, July 5.—The streets of Paris were ablaze with the colors of the United States yesterday. The French capital went wild in celebration of the "Glorious Fourth." The arrival of United States troops was the cause of great rejoicing.

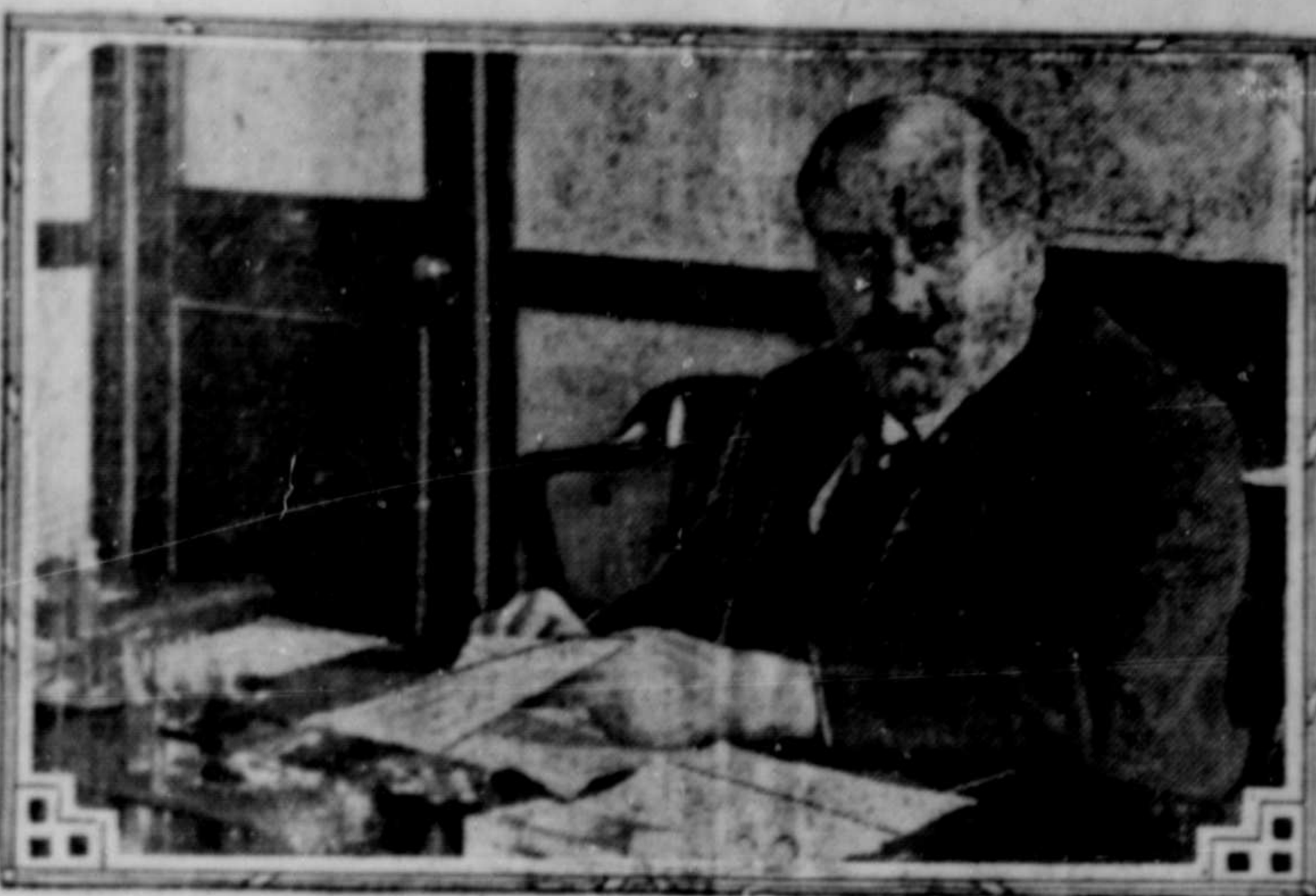

#### TIN SCARCITY MEANS SHORT SALMON PACK

Seattle, July 4.—Authorities here estimated that the salmon pack of the Pacific northwest for the present season is estimated at 8,000,000 cases, of which 3,600,000 cases will be of the higher grades. That is all the salmon that can be packed for there is no further tin supply available.

The United States government has made inquiries whether any of the pack is likely to go into the hands of speculators, and is also arranging to purchase salmon for the army somewhat below the market price.

Of the pack it is roughly estimated 3,750,000 cases will come from Alaska, 3,000,000 from Puget Sound and the rest from the Columbia river and British Columbia.

#### GETTING BRITISH RECRUITS IN U. S.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Chicago, Ill., July 5.—Lieut. Col. J. S. Dennis, who for so many years has been assistant to Lord Shaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and is now Chief Commissioner of the Department of Colonization and Development of that company, has been loaned to General White, commanding the British-Canadian Recruiting Commission in the United States, to assist in obtaining British and Canadian recruits for the army. Col. Dennis is taking over the command of the western portion of the United States, with headquarters at Chicago, and it is intended to begin an active campaign to give all British and Canadian citizens of military age, residents in the western United States, an opportunity of joining the army and doing their bit to assist in winning the war.

#### THE CONFERENCE RE WAR PRISONERS

The Hague, July 5.—Lord Norton, head of the British delegation which has been holding conferences with the German delegation, and discussing the improvement of prison conditions between Germany and Britain, declined to make any definite statement as to the result of the meetings, except that so far, they are generally satisfactory.

#### PRISON FOR FOOD RIOTERS IN GERMANY

Copenhagen, July 5.—Long terms of imprisonment have been imposed on the food rioters who participated in the troubles at Dusseldorf recently.

#### PUEBLO MINES WILL BE REOPENED SOON

Returning to Skagway after an extended visit to Whitehorse and Atlin, Mr. F. F. W. Lowie, C. P. R. general agent, reports that both places are very prosperous.

He says that the Pueblo mines will be reopened within the next few weeks and that some of the men are already on the job.

An examination is being made at the present time to ascertain whether the mine can be opened through the old shaft, or whether it will be best to sink a new one. The Pueblo mine has been closed since the accident which happened there several months ago and in which nine men lost their lives through being buried in a cave-in.

Mr. Lowie reports that the weather in the Atlin section has been beautiful and that the mining operators in that section are experiencing one of their most successful seasons.

#### STEWART NOTES

Owing to the increasing business, the launch Narbethong is now making two trips a week between Prince Rupert and Stewart, instead of once a week as formerly.

Mr. R. K. Neill, who is developing the Bush property on Salmon river, has returned from the south with mining supplies, including a gasoline engine and a blower for ventilating the mine. Drifting on the ore shoot encountered two months ago is being continued with satisfactory results.

Several hundred ft. of rails and dump cars arrived for the equipment of the Tonkin property at Fish Creek.

A party of mining engineers arrived to inspect the E. and F. group, and the Rufus group on the Upper Bear River. They represent San Francisco interests.

Mr. W. H. Magee has resumed work for the season on the North Fork Basin group, on Marmot river.

#### U. S. TRANSPORTS ATTACKED BY SUBS.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Washington, July 5.—The war has been brought home to the people of the United States by the fact that the transports carrying the troops to France have been attacked by German submarines. Destroyers, convoying the troopships, attacked the U-boats and beat them off. One German submarine was sunk by the gunfire of the convoy. It is considered certain that the news of the expedition was revealed by spies. The forces were landed in France without the loss of man or ship.

#### CHURCH CO-OPERATION

The business which took Dr. Grant up to New Hazelton last week adumbrates important changes in the policy of the churches. Dr. Grant was chairman of a committee consisting of representatives from the Presbyterian and the Methodist Churches between Alberta and Prince Rupert, along the line of the G. T. P. Their business was to mark out for each church the spheres in which they shall work exclusively in the territory named. It is the beginning of a great co-operative scheme, which is being brought into force in view of the coming union of these two great institutions.

By this means, overlapping will be obviated, and a more thorough and extensive usefulness can be obtained from the organization of each church. Instead of having two separate and distinct churches with their different organizations operating where one would be sufficient, as is prevalent in the older settled communities, by the co-operation of both churches, greater efficiency will be made possible.

#### GREEK TROOPS LOYAL

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Athens, July 5.—The Greek troops have affirmed their loyalty to Venizelos. The new premier is hailed on all sides as the savior of Greece from the devil's pact between Germany and Constantine. Serbia expresses elation at the happy turn of events.

#### CIVIL WAR FOR CHINA

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, July 5.—President Li Yuan Huan has escaped. It is said that the deposed republican leader has sought safety in one of the entente legations in Peking. The troops of the republican army in the south are all ready for battle. They have refused to support the new monarchy.

#### ANOTHER AIR RAID OVER ENGLAND

**Harwich Bombed for Few Minutes Suffers Casualties—Mun Machines Driven Off by British Guns.**

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, July 5.—A fleet of twelve German aeroplanes appeared over the town of Harwich, on the Essex coast yesterday and dropped twelve or fourteen bombs. The raid only lasted for a few minutes and no attempt was made by the enemy aeroplanes to penetrate inland. British aeroplanes immediately attacked the invaders and the British anti-aircraft guns made good practice. Eight persons were killed and twenty-two injured by the exploding bombs. Harwich is a shipping port of some importance, and before the war was the centre of a large Continental trade.

#### SHIPPING LOSSES

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, July 5.—During last week, as the result of the continued submarine campaign, fifteen vessels over 1600 tons were lost.

#### THE ENEMY NERVOUS

#### QUESTIONS BEFORE FISHERIES COMMISSION

Ottawa, July 4.—The fisheries commission, consisting of Messrs. W. Sanford Evans, Fred James, Toronto, and H. B. Thomson, will investigate three main questions: 1st, the continuation of boat rating in fisheries district No. 2, particularly whether motor boats are to be allowed in salmon fishing; 2nd, whether any additional canneries are to be allowed in district No. 2; 3rd, whether there should be a prohibition of the export of salmon in fresh state as well as sockeye salmon as now. This inquiry applies to all of British Columbia.

**THE STEAM ROLLER**

The information received from Petrograd of the great success that the Russians are winning in Galicia will be regarded as very welcome news. It was over this same country that the Russians made their great triumphal progress about two years ago and now the same thing will be expected of them. This time, they will be in an infinitely better condition to maintain their gains when they have made them than in the previous campaign, when lack of artillery ammunition compelled their retreat. Now the Russian soldiers will be animated with a totally different spirit. Instead of fighting for the Czar, and the Czar's Russia, he will now fight for himself and his own country. The artillery and ammunition which was poured into Vladivostok, Archangel and other Russian ports during the first two years of the war, and was allowed to lie there instead of being sent to the front will be fully utilized now. If notwithstanding all the handicaps of the previous campaign, the Russian armies were able to make such headway against the enemy, the logical conclusion is that nowadays, better armed, and animated with a spirit of victory, equal success will be gained. No longer can Russia be said to be fighting with one hand tied.

The activity in Galicia which has had such a successful result, is also evidenced in Turkish Caucasasia, where the Grand Duke Nicholas won signal victories at Trebizond and Erzeroum. This threatened advance in Caucasasia will naturally relieve the Turkish opposition in Mesopotamia and in Palestine, and with a co-ordinated movement and a combined pressure on these points, the Turks would be in a bad way. The position of their allies, the Germans on the western front is no better than at the other parts of the front of the Central Empires. Without being unduly optimistic it may be taken that the prospects for the enemy were never poorer from the point of view of the Allies.

Notwithstanding that even yet, geographically, Germany has got really what she was fighting for, her grasp of the occupied territories is slipping, and is also the adhesion of her accomplices. The German element in Austria has always been numerically in the minority, although it is inconceivable that with the example of Russia before their eyes, such turbulent people as the Czechs in Bohemia, and the Magyars in Hungary will tolerate the dominion of a beaten Prussia.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

Two years ago the Premier declared that all the resources of the Dominion would be consecrated to the winning of the war. But even yet, the Dominion has not been organized on a war basis at all. This war is not alone a war of armies, but a war of nations, which is apparently difficult of realization at Ottawa. All the resources of the Dominion consist of a great deal more than man power.

The Hon. W. J. Hanna, Canada's Food Controller, has issued a statement to the Canadian people, wherein is pointed out that a food shortage exists in other parts of the world and that the people of Canada will have to govern themselves accordingly. An appeal is hardly enough, Mr. Hanna ought to be clothed with powers as sweeping as those of the American Food Controller. Otherwise the situation is being trifled with. And these powers ought to be exercised impartially. The food situation for the working people is becoming so serious that it will have to be dealt with in an organized way.

The inspired German Press is breaking the news gently to the German people, preparing them for another winter under war conditions. On the other hand, the same newspapers are forbidden to tell of the landing of United States troops in France. The German people must not be unduly depressed. Another winter of war is bad enough.

# A NEW METHOD OF GROWING POTATOES

As the result of the following article on growing potatoes, dozens of Fernie people are experimenting with cribs. The city jail staff have built one at the rear of the city hall.

Forty-two bushels of potatoes in the season of 1916 from a plot of ground only eight feet square, or an equivalent of over 28,000 bushels to the acre of ground space used, was the astonishing feat of R. E. Hendricks, a resident of Kansas City, Mo.

This sensational achievement was made possible by the use of an entirely new and original method, which when generally introduced, promises not only to revolutionize the potato growing industry throughout the world, but to solve the problem of an unending source of cheap food supply for the nations of the earth.

Like all great discoveries, Mr. Hendricks' method of raising potatoes is founded on such simple elemental principles that one wonders why someone didn't "think of it before." He has often watched the potato pile in the cellar bin, which every spring sent out its shoots through every possible crack and crevice. Sometimes these sprouts would crawl out along the floor for a distance of seven feet in order to reach the light. From this beginning he conceived the idea that if this pile was removed out into the open and given soil and fertilizer with proper conditions of light and moisture, that the potatoes would grow and reproduce their kind.

Three years ago he built what he called a "potato pen," which was nothing more or less than a huge potato hill, the sides of which were supported by a loosely constructed enclosure, built after the fashion of an old rail fence. Within this enclosure, only 8 x 8 feet in size, he planted his potatoes in thin layers of dirt and manure, piling one layer on another until the pen was eight feet high. The "potato pen" became a mound of green. He had found that his potatoes not only grew better than they did in the cellar, but that at digging time he was able to harvest forty bushels of as fine potatoes as are grown anywhere. The following year he secured thirty-two bushels in the same sized pen, and last year the astonishing total of forty-two bushels.—Fernie Free Press.

**WAR PRICES**

A list was recently published in the New York Times showing what the steps were taken by the United States Government in order to protect the people from exploitation by "war prices." It will be remembered at the beginning of the war how nearly everything purchased by the Canadian Government rose in price. With prices still rising in Canada, which the people have to pay, and a benign Government looking on, this list is quite interesting. It is as follows:

1. Reduction by Bernard Baruch of the Advisory Board of the Council of National Defence of the price of copper from 32 to 16 cents a pound.

2. Refusal of Secretary Daniels to sanction the payment of \$2.95 a ton for coal, as recommended by Francis Peabody of the Coal Production Committee, and insistence that they must deliver coal at \$2.25 a ton.

3. Reduction of oil prices by Secretary Daniels, under power to commandeer, from \$1.85 a barrel to 85 cents.

4. Threat by Daniels which induced steel concerns to agree to furnish steel for warships at \$65 a ton.

5. Refusal by William Denman, President of the Shipping Board, to sign contracts for steel for merchant ships at \$95 a ton, leading
