BRITISH AEROPLANES BUSY ON HUN LINES

GERMAN TRENCHES SUCCESSFULLY RAIDED AND MANY PRISONERS ARE TAKEN

BRITISH MAKE RAIDS ON HUN AERODROMES

Tons of Bombs are Dropped on Aerodromes at Ghistelles and Nieumunster — Troop Train Attacked.

London, July 6.—British naval aeroplanes dropped tons of bombs on the German aerodromes at Ghistelles, and on the seaplane sheds at Nieumunster. The attack was successfully carried out notwithstanding the enemy machines and the anti-aircraft guns of the Germans. A moving troop train near Jearren was also bombed and brought to a standstill.

French Front.

Paris, July 6.—The French troops continue holding the positions in the Champagne district recently captured from the Germans notwithstanding the repeated counter attacks, which have been repulsed easily. These attacks were made in a half hearted manner. Four hundred big shells were fired against the city of Rheims.

Russian Front.

Petrograd, July 6.—The Austro-German forces in Galicia attacked the Russian advanced positions east of Brezany. The attack was broken up by the Russian artillery fire.

Italian Front.

Rome, July 6.—The Italian batteries on the Asiago plateau shelled marching Austrian columns heavily, and caused many casualties in the ranks. In the Gorizia region, raids were made effectively on the enemy lines.

British Official.

London, July 6.—Southeast of Holbeke the British troops made an advance of six hundred yards. Raids were made at Wiertje and at Lieuport and many prisoners were taken.

DEVELOPING THE ROCHER DE BOULE

The Rocher de Boule Copper Company has now driven the low level tunnel about 3600 feet without striking the ore-body for which it has been searching. A slight variation in the pitch might throw it a considerable distance from the point at which it has been expected the tunnel would encounter it. Either that or the ore-body may not extend to that depth, in which case the outlook for mining on Rocher de Boule Mountain would not be as favorable for deep development—a condition only too common in new districts. The management is still hopeful of achieving satisfactory results. Some geologists, who have examined the field characterize the veins as contraction fissures, in which case they would not be expected to have great depth; while the government experts class them as true fissure veins, with every promise of deep mineralization. The Rocher de Boule low level tunnel will prove who is right—E. A. Hagen in the "Province."

"MITTEL EUROPA" IS ADVOCATED BY HUN

Berlin, via London.—Dr. Friedrich Naumann, member of the Reichstag and author of a well known book on Central Europe, is circulating a sort of manifesto wherein the two central European Kaisers are called upon to proclaim at once the existence of a federated European power. He says it is not a thing of the future, but is already here.

"Central Europe," he adds, "is actually ready, lacking only the organs for movement and action. All talk about drawing closer together may cease, because the convergence has already taken place, although it has not yet found expression in treaties and paragraphs. It is time to end the general debate and come to action. Why is not that done? Why are we missing the wonderful historic opportunity? Why do not the two Kaisers act? Why do not the three Prime Ministers act for our general staffs? Are they, perhaps, opposed to 'Central Europe'? Not at all, but one fritters away one's forces in preparations and solutions of problems of second and third rank. Each one is waiting for the other to reach the principal goal. Why, for instance, have not the general principles of the future common military organization been laid down and signed by the two Kaisers long ago? Do they think this would be done as well after the war? Or is it in consideration for our overworked generals?"

"It is time the two Kaisers should proclaim Central Europe. Details can be adjusted later, but the foundation must be laid now. What use are our statesmen if they forget this historical work?"

The allied economical associations meeting in Budapest have closed their negotiations. It was decided that the principal task for an economical association of Germany and Austria-Hungary was to agree on a common trade and traffic policy, and to make common preparation for a transition period from war to peace.

POLES AGREE ON NATIONAL DEMANDS

Berlin, via London, July 4.—The German newspapers publish a telegram from Warsaw saying that the National Party has agreed on the following demands: "First, an independent Polish nation, with monarchical constitution, a strong government, and the two-chamber system of people's representation on a broad democratic basis. "Second, the energetic development of the Polish state system, even during the war, especially the creation of a strong army, with the cadres of the Polish legions as a base, such an army being one of the fundamental conditions for further development. "Third, Polish representation at the peace negotiations. "Fourth, the recognition of the principle that the Polish Government and army can be created within the Polish border lines, and any attempt to create them outside shall firmly be opposed. "Fifthly, as a way out of the present situation, it would seem advisable to create at once a regent's council, consisting of three persons, who will take over the business of the Polish state until a final settlement of the head of the Polish nation, also the creation of a new state council, which shall serve as an executive organ until the regular people's representation is convened."

THE STETTIN STRIKE BROKEN BY THREATS

Copenhagen, July 5.—The German authorities have broken the recent strike at the shipyards in Stettin by the same means that they used to crush the April strike. They threatened to muster the strikers as soldiers and subject them to punishment meted out to mutineers unless the men resumed work.

A quiet wedding was solemnized this morning in the St. Andrew's Church, when Miss McCroskie and Dr. J. S. Brown were united. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Canon Rix and only the immediate friends of the bride and bridegroom were present.

Dr. and Mrs. Brown left later on the steamer for Anyox. They are both well known and popular members of this community and hearty congratulations will be accorded them by their many friends.

SIR ARTHUR CURRIE

Major General Sir Arthur W. Currie, K. C., M. G., C. B., who has succeeded Sir Julian Byng as commander of the Canadian forces in France. He is 42 years old and was born in Napperton, Middlesex county, Ontario. He entered on his military career in 1897 as a private. In 1904 General Currie married Miss Chatsworth-Musters, of Victoria. Lady Currie is now in England. General Currie is a liberal, an Anglican, and a member of the Masonic order.

PROVINCIAL POLICE TO BE REORGANIZED

Victoria, July 5.—An entire reorganization of the provincial police and game warden departments involving the grouping together of these two branches of the service, the establishment of a mounted police section and the uniforming of all provincial policemen is a plan now being given consideration by Hon. J. W. deB. Farris, attorney-general.

The minister has not yet reached any definite decision with regard to the scheme but appears to consider that it has many good points and after careful investigation if it is found to meet conditions he will probably take steps to bring the changes into effect by the end of the year. The idea is said to be one originating with the minister himself and was impressed upon him after an examination of the work of the two departments in the field.

NEWS-ADVERTISER AND THE SUN TO COMBINE

Vancouver, July 3.—That an amalgamation will be arranged shortly between the Vancouver Sun and the Vancouver News-Advertiser, so that only one morning paper will appear in Vancouver, was the intimation made by George E. Macdonald this morning on his return from the East.

"Details of the deal are still under process of settlement, but it can be announced that between now and September 1st the Sun will absorb the older morning paper," said Mr. Macdonald, who is one of the principal directors of the Sun as well as being prominent in the Liberal party. Negotiations for the combination of the papers have been proceeding for some time, for not only Mr. Macdonald, but Mr. Wade, of the Sun, and Mr. Matson, of the News-Advertiser, have been in Ottawa and other eastern cities in connection with the matter. It is understood that the combined paper will continue along the general lines of the Sun's policy.

"I think there is no question but that Sir Robert Borden's party will be defeated at the polls," said Mr. Macdonald when asked regarding the chances of a general election.

BRAZIL WILL WAR AGAINST GERMANY

London.—Reuter's Agency learns from an authoritative source that the decision of Brazil to revoke her neutrality in the war between the United States and Germany, a phase which is especially interesting, means the existence of a state of war with Germany. The German campaign against Brazil's merchant ships no longer left any room for doubt that there was already virtually a state of war. The Brazilian Government and people have all along sympathized with the Allies, but decided to maintain neutrality until they were forced out of it. Nevertheless the whole of Brazil will welcome the change that Germany has compelled. It may be regarded as certain that Brazil like the United States, will go into the war with all her resources of men and power. This is clear from the naval and military bill introduced into Parliament by the Vice-President of the Senate. As a first step Brazil has seized 42 fine German ships now in her harbors. So far as is known these vessels, which are mainly just of the tonnage most required at this juncture, are practically undamaged and will be immediately placed at the disposal of the Allies. With her population of 28,000,000, Brazil can soon raise an additional army which should prove of considerable assistance in the European theatres of war.

Senator Nilo Pecanha, the Minister for Foreign Affairs, has sent to the Brazilian Legations for transmission to the governments to which they are accredited a note communicating the sanction of President Wenceslas Braz to the revocation of neutrality, and thus confirming the traditional friendship and the identity of political views uniting Brazil to the United States in defence of the vital interests of America and of international law. Brazil, the note proceeds, neither now nor ever, cherished warlike ambitions.

If she constantly abstained from showing any partiality in the European conflict, she could not persist in her indifference once the United States were drawn into a disinterested struggle on behalf of international law and Germany extended the most violent methods of war without distinction to Brazil and other neutrals.—Press Association War Special.

PRINCE RUPPRECHT ON BRITISH ATTACKS

Amsterdam.—The Bavarian Crown Prince, addressing the 35th East Prussian Division, which had to sustain the first British assaults on the Arras front, said: "You have arrested the assault of greatly superior enemy forces. In successful counter-attack you have repulsed the enemy wherever he advanced, and by your courage you have contributed to the failure of the renewed attempt of the British to break through our front. The enemy is now making his last efforts. He must finish the fight, because he cannot stand it any longer owing to his losses, and owing to the distress in England caused by our heroic submarines. We will and shall hold on and be victorious. Thanks to his abundance of ammunition, which has been supplied to him from all parts of the world, the enemy has been able to destroy our trenches and penetrate them here and there, but this does not mean that we are conquered."

COALITION GOVERNMENT AT OTTAWA?

Montreal Paper States Plans are Well Advanced for Contemplated Reorganization of the Cabinet.

Montreal, July 5.—The Montreal Star prints the following special despatch from its Ottawa correspondent:

"It is understood that plans are well advanced for the contemplated reorganization of the Dominion cabinet along the lines of union government. Sir Robert Borden has been dealing with the matter and there is reason to believe that a number of Liberals are prepared to accept portfolios to aid in passing conscription and whatever other measures conducive to the winning of the war.

From Outside. "The new cabinet reorganization will in all probability include a direct representation of labor and of western grain growers.

"The situation seems to be that the premier knows those he can get. It is for him to decide whom he wants and when their services should be available. Whether they will be from the Liberals or the house is doubtful. Some of these are likely to be included. But if tentative plans be given effect to, the most of the new blood will be secured from outside parliament.

"It is improbable there will be any conclusive action until after the division on the second reading of the compulsory service bill. After that, however, developments are likely. The decision rests in the hands of the premier, who has not yet indicated upon whom he may call or just at what stage it will be done.

Liberal Representatives. "Any new member of the cabinet, drawn from the ranks of the Liberal party will, of course, be representative of that large element of the party which favors conscription and will subscribe to a policy of prosecuting Canadian participation in the war without reference to politics or political considerations.

"Any change in the ministry will exercise some effect on the general situation. When coalition with the Liberals in an official sense was planned, one of the features of the proposition was an appeal to the country prior to the enforcement of conscription. It seems very probable that if a union is now effected, the same course may be followed, and the people consulted with reference to it.

"Should this be done, then the session would be appreciably shortened. In any event, something is underway and likely to come to a head almost any time."

AND STILL RISING

The most self evident arraignment of the Dominion Government says the Vancouver Sun, in its complete failure to exercise any control over the cost of living is made by the figures from the government's own publication, the Labor Gazette, which shows how the cost of the necessities of life has increased since the so-called regulations were put in force in November, 1916.

In July, 1914, just before the war began, the index figure of the labor department showing wholesale prices stood at 134.6. In November of 1916, when the government passed its control regulations the index figure was 198.4. In February, 1917, when the regulations had been in force four months it stood at 217.3, and was moving upward with more momentum than before.

In July, 1914, the estimated cost of a weekly budget of food for an average Canadian family was \$7.42. In November, 1916, when the new regulations went into force, it was \$9.81. In February, 1917, after four months' operation of the regulations it had risen to \$10.46 and was still going up.

In July of 1914 the weekly cost of living for a Canadian family of average size was \$14.16, including coal, fuel, rent, etc. In November, 1916, when the government passed its new regulations, it was \$16.30. In February, 1917, after four months of their operation, it had increased to \$16.78, and was still climbing rapidly.

It is a striking indictment of the government that while every other nation taking part in the war, and many neutral nations, have taken extreme action to prevent undue advances in the cost of living, the Dominion government has taken and maintained through the war the surprising position that wringing abnormal profits out of the consumers is the sacred privilege of the friends of the government and that the middleman must not be interfered with.

The government's regulations provided for an intricate

series of enquiries in which the jurisdiction of the municipalities, the provincial attorneys-general, and the federal authorities are entangled hopelessly. Penalties are provided in cases where proof is adduced of abnormal price advances due to combines, price fixing by wholesalers, hoarding of supplies, or any other advancement of prices by artificial means. But the machinery provided for proving these things is so cumbersome and difficult to operate that it is very difficult, if not impossible, to obtain proof. Responsibility for instituting proceedings rests finally with the government. In those cases when, even in the event of proof being completely established, it is considered politically inexpedient to press the prosecution, it is within the power of the government to conceal the proof, and dispense with the prosecution.

The public will be forced to conclude from the total lack of results from the regulations embodied in the order-in-council passed in November, 1916, that it was only a pretext at taking some action to deal with the high cost of living.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

China's experiment with a Republican form of government is now going to be the cause of further trouble in the Celestial Empire. The republicans of the south do not appear to be going to stand for the new emperor, and are all lined up ready for battle. Chang Haun, the military dictator, who has set up the boy emperor, is a soldier of some renown in China, and hitherto has taken no cognizance of the Republican parliament. Whether a parliament of his own appointing which he promises, would have any more control over him may be imagined.

The German Crown Prince, according to the testimony of prisoners taken by the French troops recently, is bent upon revenge for the crushing defeats inflicted upon his last year at Verdun. He apparently has the idea that he can yet retrieve the reputation he lost, but, of course, some people would say that he never had any

reputation to lose, at Verdun or elsewhere.

Brazil has taken over the patrolling of her coasts to ward off attacks by German submarines, thus relieving the warships of the United States for duty elsewhere. Thus the scope of the war enlarges. The recent action of Brazil in taking over and using the forty interned German merchant vessels will also be of great assistance at this juncture. Germany has not got a friend left.

For the first time since the war began, the weekly report of the Imperial Bank of Germany shows a decrease of the amount of gold in hand. This is the last admission that would be expected from the authorities, and it can only be taken that the financial structure of Germany is beginning to get shaky. The value of the mark is away down, and before long, the lack of silver bullets will play an important part in the collapse of the Central Empires.

A meeting of the Board of Investigation will be held at the Court-house at Prince Rupert on Wednesday, the 25th day of July, 1917, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

At these meetings all statements of claim to water privileges under Acts passed before the 12th day of March, 1909, on any of these streams, all objections thereto, and the plans prepared for the use of the said Board, will then be open for inspection.

All persons interested are entitled to examine these, and to file objections thereto in writing if they deem fit.

Objections will be heard forthwith if the party objected to has received sufficient notice of the objection.

CLOSED TOWNS MUST BE OPENED TO PUBLIC

The existence of what are known as company or closed towns in the province at several points where large industrial enterprises are being carried on has long been a source of serious objection, but nothing was ever done by the late Government to meet the situation.

Since coming into office the Minister of Lands, Hon. T. D. Pattullo, has taken this matter up, and he was able to make recommendations to the Executive Council which will put an end to these towns as "closed towns." Under the laws which call for the vesting of a one-fourth interest in the province of any lands used as townsites the companies owning the towns such as Anxox, Ocean Falls, Powell River are being called upon to comply with the law in this regard.

It is not anticipated that any objections will be raised by the companies to this; in fact, the law is against them, and they cannot do anything but comply. Some of them have notified the minister that they have no objection to vesting the one-fourth required by law in the province, and state that they have not done so because no demand was ever made upon them to do so.

There is no question that these towns are well maintained, and that health and other conditions are unexceptionable, but it is not thought good policy that large communities should exist in the province which are virtual feudal castles, into which no one is permitted to penetrate unless the company is willing. For instance, labor union officials may be kept out, and candidates of political parties have trouble getting a hearing unless they receive the consent of the owners of the town to their appearance there. In other ways the companies are very autocratic in the management of their towns. At Anxox, for instance, men have been refused permission to land on the wharf, and even when they have been allowed to get into the town they have been made to feel in various ways that they are interlopers. Merchants cannot go in and do business, as the company is the Pook Bah of the place.

With the compliance with the law by these town-owners this state of things will cease to exist. It will not imply any hardship on the companies to do so, but will give freedom of entry and all merchants will be enabled to do business.—Victoria Times.

FOOD CONTROLLER HAS WIDE POWERS

London, July 5.—The Official Gazette publishes an order-in-council conferring upon Baron Rhondda, the food controller, identical powers under the Defence of the Realm Act with those already possessed by the admiralty and army council and the ministry of munitions for requisitioning supplies and controlling prices. Baron Rhondda will now be able to requisition the whole or part of the output of any factory, paying prices therefor based on the cost of production, with the addition of a pro-war rate of profit, regardless of the prices ruling in the open market.

While we should not be too optimistic regarding the food situation, for we can not tell what the morrow will bring forth, there is no fear at present that the Germans will force England to start compulsory rationing. Baron Rhondda added that the voluntary rationing system was working admirably and the crops of the country were doing well.

BRITISH ARTILLERY HELP THE ITALIANS

Milan.—Now that the presence of ten British batteries on the Italian front has been officially announced, the reception extended to the gunners when they passed through here need no longer be kept secret. The scene was one of wild enthusiasm, which recalled to old people the thrilling entry of the French after the campaign of 1859 against the Austrians which liberated Lombardy. The whole population turned out to welcome and honor the military representatives of Italy's ally. The officers and the gun carriages had flowers thrown on them, while the gunners were presented with cigars, cigarettes, post-cards, and other gifts. Many of the crowd endeavored to express their feelings in broken English, while all showed by their gestures and enthusiasm that fraternal spirit with which they were animated. The streets were decorated with British flags, and the crowd cheered the British troops with cries of "Long Live Great Britain! Welcome to our Allies!"
