GERMAN PLANES MAKE AIR RAID ON LONDON

FRENCH AIRMEN MAKE AN EXTENSIVE SERIES OF AIR RAIDS ON GERMAN TOWNS

ANOTHER GERMAN AIR RAID OVER THE CITY OF LONDON

TWENTY HUN PLANES APPEAR OVER LONDON ON SATURDAY MORNING AND DROP BOMBS—THIRTY-SEVEN KILLED AND ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-ONE INJURED—FOUR ENEMY MACHINES DOWN

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, July 9.—The greatest number of German aeroplanes, which ever yet has attacked London, appeared over the city on Saturday morning at 9:30 a.m. The attacking squadron flew very low, at about one thousand feet over the houses, and held their bombs until they were over the heart of the city. The anti-aircraft guns immediately got into action, and the British machines immediately rose to the attack. The enemy squadron did not lose any time after dropping their

bombs, but made straight off for home, closely pursued by the British machines. Four of the enemy machines were brought down by the British airmen. Considerable damage was done to the central part of the city, and thirty-seven people were killed and one hundred and forty-one were injured. This is a smaller number of casualties than on the previous raid, on account of the people taking shelter immediately the first Hun machine was sighted and the gunfire was heard.

THESE RUMORS RE COALITION

Ottawa, June 29.—All last week coalition rumors filled the air. They were received in various moods by the persons chiefly concerned. The great opposition to the movement came from the ranks of the Conservatives themselves.

A coalition, of course, lets a certain number of Cabinet ministers out and it is conceivable that they were not warm toward the project. For instance the Hon. Bob Rogers could hardly be expected to take it lying down. The Minister of Elections couldn't see anything in a coalition for him. More than that he couldn't see himself in any coalition that would be acceptable to the Liberal party. So his powerful influence was against it.

Coalition, by the way, is another of Premier Borden's well kept secrets. It is common talk now that he hid selective conscription in his bosom until he got home—didn't even confide it to Messrs. Rogers and Hazen on the boat coming over—and then sprang it on a flabbergasted public without an hour's notice. It was real news to his colleagues when they heard it fall from his lips at the end of a speech on the Imperial Conference in which he dittoed everything that Sir Wilfrid had said years ago.

Similarly he kept coalition to himself. He did not tell, as Foxy Quiller would say, his humble but inferior associates where the axe was going to fall and this naturally drew those who expected to get it in the neck into an alliance of self-preservation which had its influence on events.

In fact Premier Borden's attitude toward his shuddering colleagues and his shuddering colleagues' attitude toward Premier Borden remind one of the old fable of the farmer and the chickens. Having decided to slay a few of them he called them together in the backyard and asked "Which of you wants to be killed?" "None of us want to be killed."

replied one firm old Plymouth Rock, who acted as spokesman.

"You wander from the point," said the farmer. That was what Premier Borden's threatened colleagues kept doing. They kept wandering from the point of danger. The wandered so often and so vigorously that it had a decided effect on Premier Borden's plastic purpose.

It is said that Premier Borden has strange ideas about a coalition. One idea is that the leader of the Opposition should have little choice in the matter beyond assenting to the Liberal members Premier Borden selects as acceptable material for his cabinet. Another idea is that the Liberals chosen should be as near like Tories as possible. And still another idea is that a coalition, instead of being fifty-fifty, should be more like sixty-forty. These are naturally hard ideas to get over.

Another element in the Conservative ranks which was hostile to coalition was that dark force Henri Bourassa. Bourassa's paper Devoir could not live six months without government pap. It is inconceivable that a coalition government would go on handing out nourishment to this seditious spreader. The present situation suits Bourassa and Lavergne only too well. They thrive on the agitation which a party manoeuvre—such as selective conscription—creates in Quebec. They preach Quebec for Quebec and not Quebec for Canada and Canada for Quebec, so that any movement which tends to line Quebec up

Youthful Married Men to be Called in the First Classes, As Youth is Necessary to Efficiency.

This amendment makes all young married men subject to the call before the older single men. THIRTY-MILE BATTLE FRONT IN GALICIA

The Russians are Pushing Their Offensive on With Great Force—Much Activity in Air on West.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, July 9.—A battle is raging with great force on a front extending to thirty miles in Galicia. General Brusiloff is forcing the pace, and is driving his way towards Lemberg.

British Front.
London, July 9.—After a heavy bombardment, the enemy attempted a raid on our trenches to the east of Loos, which was repulsed with loss. There was much aerial fighting yesterday, chiefly on the front between Lens and Ypres. Eight hostile machines were brought down and five were driven away. Five of our machines are missing.

French Front.
Paris, July 9.—Our artillery was particularly active in the Cerny Ailers region, Hill 304, L'Homme Mort, and south of Moronvilliers near the Rhone-Rhin Canal and Carpach wood. Yesterday in the course of bombarding an aeroplane attack in the Nancy region, several bombs fell on a hospital, killing three persons.

Berlin Report.
Berlin, July 9.—Increased activity of artillery has been noticed on the Franco-Belgian front in Arlois and Champagne sectors. Attacks have been made by the Russians in East Galicia as far north as the Zlochoff tar-nopol railway between Batkow and Zwyzyn, and at Brzey and in the Stanislaw region.

Women's Battalion.
Petrograd, July 9.—Under the command of Mademoiselle Vera Butchareff, the women's battalion fully armed and equipped for war as infantry, left today for the front.

Greece at War.
London, July 9.—Turkey is now at war with Greece. The Turkish Government has deported all Greeks and confiscated their property.

FRENCH MAKE REPRISALS ON GERMANY

Eighty-four French Aeroplanes Raid Far Into Interior of Germany—Cause Great Destruction.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, July 9.—On the night of July 6, eighty-four of our machines took the air, on an excursion over the enemy's lines and into Germany, on a series of raids. Several of these raids had as their object towns situated very far into the interior of the enemy territory and were in reprisal for the bombardments against our open towns. Eleven of our aeroplanes flew over Treves and showered on that town 2,650 kilos of bombs. Seven fires broke out, one being of great violence in the central station. Six other machines bombarded Ludwigs-hafen, doing considerable damage. Among other important buildings, Badische Aniline was devoured by flames.

Another of our aeroplanes pushed as far as Essen and dropped projectiles on the buildings of the Krupp factory. Military installations in the environs of Coblenz, Hirson Station, the railroad west of Pflzburg, and Thionville were likewise bombarded. Another series of operations over the enemy lines gave excellent results. Fire was seen to have broken out at the station at Dund sur Meuse. The municipal depot exploded at Bantheville. The railroad station at Machault and establishments at Cauroy were also burned. 30,455 kilos of explosives were used. Two of our aeroplanes have not returned.

HAZELTON MINING NOTES

Things are looking brighter at the Rocher de Boule mine now than they have for a long time. It looks now very promising for the fond hopes of the company and of all interested in the district being realized.

Last week we reported that the company had started to drift in the long tunnel on a couple of stringers that appeared at about the point Supt. Williams had estimated the vein would be cut. A few rounds of holes demonstrated that there was very much more ore than the stringers contained and each day the vein is looking better. Next week it is hoped that sufficient progress will have been made to prove beyond a doubt the existence of the vein with the same high grade contents at the depth of 1200 feet.

While to the layman the tunnel on the lower level did not appear to offer much encouragement the superintendent never lost faith in the property, but kept going ahead as if driving on ore.

M. J. Sutherland came up from the Golden Wonder group the first of the week with samples to be assayed. The Golden Wonder consists of three claims on the Rocher de Boule mountain, situated between the Comeau property and Tramville. The surface (Continued on Page four.)

MONARCHY OR REPUBLIC

The restoration of the Manchu dynasty is not going to be permitted to pass unchallenged in China. Already the armies of the populous southern provinces are converging upon Peking. They are prepared and organized for the coming fray. A reversion to the rule of reaction involved in the reestablishment of the emperor will not be tolerated by them. It is important to note that the leaders in the southern provinces of China, which are by far the richest, and the most populous, are young men who have received and assimilated a Western education. They have been educated in European and American universities, and instructed in the forms of Occidental government. Doubtless they will finally be successful. Modern methods, ability and knowledge of the West hand in hand with the wisdom of the East will count for success in China as everywhere else.

Yuan Shi Kai, the first president of the republic, established by Dr. Sun Yat Sen, just a little before his departure from this world, aspired to the throne himself. He publicly had it announced that he was going to ascend onto the Imperial Throne, and from President of the Republic of China, he intended only changing his name to that of Emperor. But the call from the beyond, from his ancestors, came before this consummation. Some of his erstwhile republican friends are said to have brought the message to him.

The first edict of the new Emperor is frankly reactionary. Such modern innovations as representative government, and the criminal and the civil codes are to be abolished. Queues are to be legalized, which, from a Chinese point of view, means that they are to become compulsory. All China is to revert back to its original state of exclusiveness. But the younger and more educated generation of the southern provinces will not have it so. Their armies to the number of fifty thousand are marching on Peking, just to see how much truth there is in this edict, and whether the Emperor has suf-

ficient force behind him to enforce his edict. The latest dispatch stated that he had only three thousand soldiers to oppose the fifty thousand from the south, so at that rate, it would seem as if the republican form of government would come back. But China is a land of surprises to the Westerner.

This sudden interruption of the republic is only one incident in the age-long struggle between the forces of democratic progress and those of reaction which in varying forms is going on all over the world.

The sudden change in recent years from an age-long form of government extending back thousands and thousands of years, to that of a full-blown republic must have caused a jar and a disorganization throughout the Empire. No nation unaccustomed to a representative form of government can enter all at once into the full enjoyment of its privileges. The democratic republicanism of France and the United States is the outcome of hundreds of years of political education, but in spite of the lack of this, real and substantial progress was being made in China.

If the other powers will keep outside and let the Chinese settle their affairs for themselves, the situation will become stable all the sooner.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

A German dispatch to Amsterdam says that the authorities at Berlin are convinced that there is no truth in the reports of the landing of large forces of United States troops in France. "Seeing is believing," is an old saying, and it is safe to say that the Germans will see them soon enough to convince them that there is no doubt about it. The German people must not be allowed to learn of this great accession of strength to the Entente nations' armies. They must not be allowed to become discouraged too much. They are hungry enough as it is.

In the greatest offensive put on since the abortive attack on Verdun more than a year ago, the Germans have once more been thrown back. This attack was in-

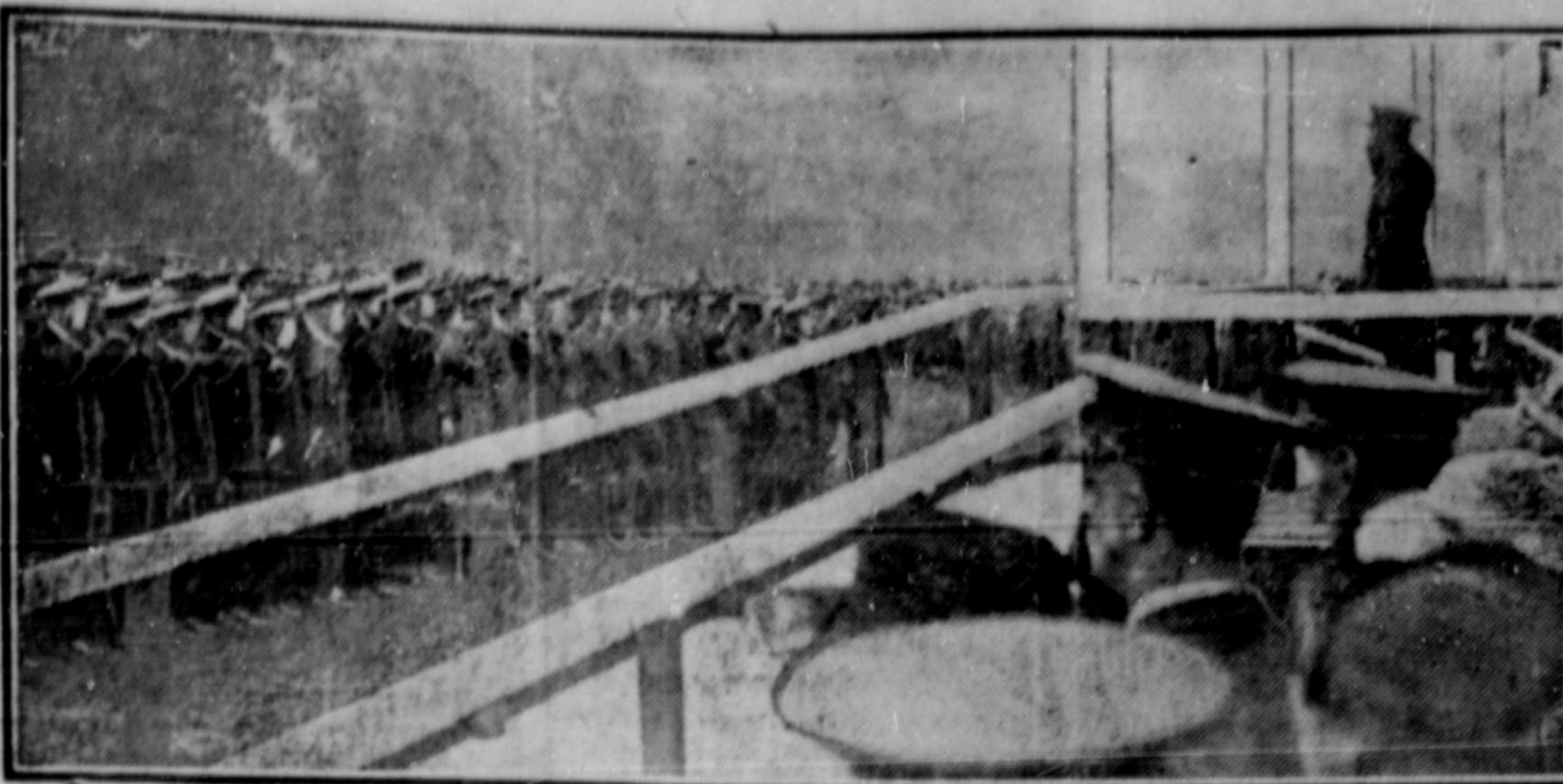

THESE RUMORS RE COALITION

against the rest of Canada finds a welcome from this precious pair. It helps them in their struggle to wrest Quebec from Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who has been a life-long champion of union and harmony.

Naturally Bourassa and Lavergne are opposed to any arrangement that would cut off their supplies or stop their mouths. They were quick enough to start demonstrating, may, indeed, have done so on orders from Ottawa, but they would have demonstrated anyway. It is their bread and butter. As matters stand they are at liberty to do and say what they please. The Government which now seeks to put selective conscription into force is the same crowd that went to bed with Bourassa and Lavergne in 1911, and this is what comes of it.

The Borden Government is, at this moment spending something over a million dollars a day and naturally the people who handle the patronage of this vast sum are unwilling to surrender their prerogatives to a coalition government which would handle all this money on a strictly non-partisan basis. The patronage dispensers naturally set up a great howl, as did also the various powers behind the throne, the kings in the wings, so to speak—the Bacon, Egg, Meat, Sugar, Wheat and other Kings—who don't want the Borden Government to disappear before they have looted the last dollar out of the crisis. Rumor has it that they soon showed the Premier how little a premier is his own man when he has no backbone.

Another section of the Conservative party was actuated by a sense of shame. "What right," they asked, "have we to invite the Liberals into a coalition now at the fag end of the hunt? Why didn't we do it at the start and share the responsibilities together? It's sheer nerve, now that we're away in the hole, to ask them to jump in with us." And there may be something in that.

A point which has not escaped observers is that at all the anti-conscription meetings banners have appeared having the legend, "We want cheaper food." If the government wants a hint as to the proper policy these banners proclaim it aloud. The sentiment is placarded everywhere so that he who runs may read—food first, men afterwards. The government has got off with the wrong foot.

The feeling against conscription is not confined to Quebec. It is to be found everywhere through Canada. It is strongest among the labor organizations, on which it would bear hardest. It is not so much a feeling against conscription as a feeling of anger and resentment against a government that has the nerve to commandeer life without first commandeering the means of living. So far the food proposals of the government are a pure farce. Such of them as have seen print help the consumer not a jot and hurt the food manipulator not a tittle. Indeed with one cold storage king, and him the greatest of all—in their very midst, one understands how his tribe is the last the Borden Government wants to hurt.

The workingman simply will not march away to war and leave his loved ones behind to be looted by the food pirates. To sweeten the country toward conscription, the food problem should have been settled first.

Meanwhile Mr. J. W. Flavelle by his various activities in feeding the army is said to be netting a million dollars every two weeks.

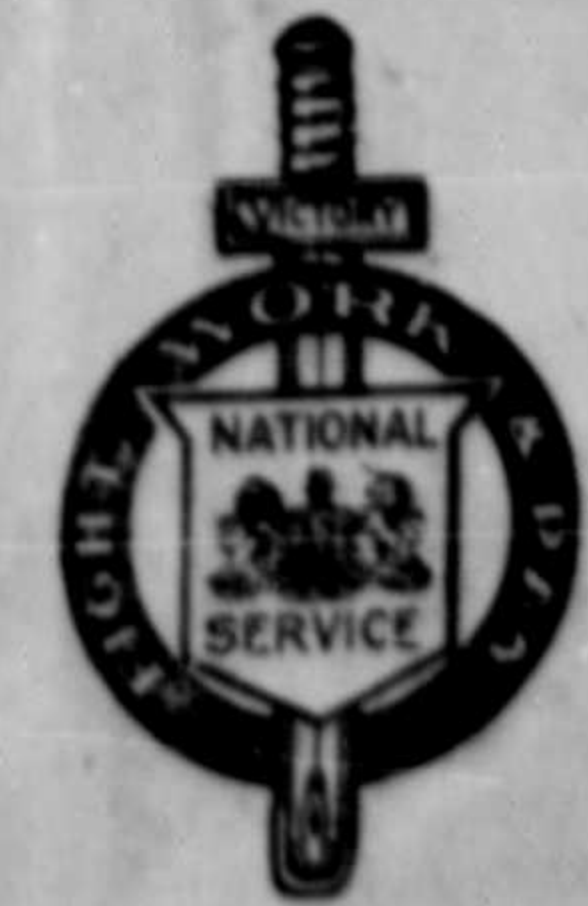
