GREAT CONFERENCE TO BE HELD IN BERLIN

NEUTRAL AMBASSADORS AND MINISTERS ARE INVITED BY EMPEROR WILLIAM

GERMANY EXPECTED THIS WEEK TO STATE PEACE TERMS

NEUTRAL AMBASSADORS AND MINISTERS INVITED TO CONFERENCE IN BERLIN WITH EMPEROR WILLIAM—COUNCIL OF WAR IS HELD AT SAME TIME—KING OF SPAIN EXPECTED TO ATTEND

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, July 10.—According to reports reaching Rotterdam from Berlin, the Emperor William has invited the neutral ambassadors and ministers to a conference on Saturday. Hindenburg and Ludendorff have arrived in Berlin also for a council of war with the Emperor. By way of The Hague last night, rumors were heard that the King of Spain may be invited by the Central Powers to the big war council, which is calculated to have very far-reaching results. The primary objects of Alphonso's invitation is taken to be the opening of mediation negotiations. The German minister at The Hague has also been summoned to Berlin.

Chancellor's Statement.
The expected statement of Germany's new peace terms by the Chancellor this week promise sweeping results, which may be

startling in the extreme. The Kaiser has been conferring with the Austrian Emperor, and the war chiefs of Austria and Germany have returned to Berlin presumably to be present at the conference.
Today the Chancellor, Bethmann-Hollweg, is scheduled to discuss Germany's war aims, and this week may produce the test of the Chancellor's power. This is because of the fact that the Socialists state they are going to exact the declaration that he support the "No annexation, no indemnity" programme. Besides the immediate war problems, the Socialists have opened a congress for the introduction of a parliamentary system. They feel that they are growing in strength and that the time is come when they must make themselves heard in Germany.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CITY DEPTS.

The annual report of the City of Prince Rupert was published recently. A CLOSE SEASON FOR HALIBUT

Regarding the question of a close season being applied to halibut fishing, the following from a recent issue of the Vancouver Province may be of interest:

Halibut fishing companies here expect that the Canadian and American Governments will shortly reach an agreement for a close season on the halibut banks of the Pacific coast, to cover two or three months each year, and to run for an extended term of years. It has been proposed that December, January and February be the close season months, and there is a possibility, still somewhat indefinite, that the restrictions upon halibut fishing will go into force this year.

Representations have been made to Ottawa by the fishing companies taking halibut, asking for a close season in order to protect the industry. American companies also approached Washington. The United States Government has already announced its willingness to comply with the request provided that Canada would do the same. At Ottawa the department showed some desire to set a close season which would cover two or three years and would vary with the different halibut banks. The halibut interests promptly objected, however, on the score that the industry would be disrupted and with varying seasons on the bank halibut fishing could not be economically carried out. Up to the present the Dominion department has not yet taken any definite action, but it is expected will fall into line with the Washington proposals, which are in accord with those made by the companies, both Canadian and Amer-

BRITISH FEEL DISGRACED BY AIR RAIDS

Bitter Comments are Made by the London Press and the Possibilities of More Raids Foretold.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, July 10.—Britain's pride has been outraged by the latest air raid made by the Germans. The feeling of her "splendid isolation," and invulnerability to attack has been shocked by the destruction wrought last Saturday. The London morning newspapers bitterly comment upon the situation. They declare the country is disgraced and demand the removal of the officers responsible for permitting the approach of the enemy machines. Gloomy forecasts are made of what the Germans might do if they were given rein. Reprisals are favored and fears are expressed of further onslaughts.

It is pointed out that while no noticeable difference in the quantity of halibut on the banks will be obtained for several years, such a season, if continued for an extended period, will eventually have the effect of restoring the halibut banks to their original condition and will keep them in that state.

In addition the industry will be benefitted, it is claimed, as winter fishing is expensive, the fish are not in extra good condition, as that is their spawning time, and the winter market is uncertain. A three-months' closed season will tend to stabilize market conditions, it is believed.

RUSSIANS ARE SUCCESSFUL ONCE AGAIN

In Galicia More Than Seven Thousand Prisoners Taken and Many Guns—Pursuit by Cossacks.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, July 10.—The Russian troops have captured several more villages west of Stanislaw in Galicia. More than seven thousand prisoners have been taken, also a large number of guns of various sizes. The Russian cavalry, largely made up of Cossack regiments, are pursuing the retreating enemy, and have taken further numbers of guns. The pursuit has now reached the Lufka river. According to semi-official reports, the Russian offensive is spreading to the north and south of Halicz in Eastern Galicia. Halicz is the key to Lemberg.

German Report.
Berlin, July 10.—In a renewal of their attack at Stanislaw south of Halicz yesterday, the Russians gained ground. The Russians who attacked in Eastern Galicia were brought to a standstill by the German reserves after the Russians had pressed the defenders back in the direction of the wooded heights of Czarnylas.

The French trenches on a front of about two miles on the Aisne front have been captured by the Germans, who took 800 prisoners.

French Front.
Paris, July 10.—Another attack in strong force was made by the Germans last night on the Aisne front in the region of the Chemin des Dames between Rovette and Chevregny ridge. The attack was repulsed.

British Front.
London, July 10.—A successful raid was made by us last night southeast of Hargicourt. Prisoners captured numbered 35. A hostile raiding party was repulsed near Loos.

Mesopotamia.
Petrograd, July 10.—The Russians have evacuated three villages on the Mesopotamia border.

FOR REGULATION OF ROOMING HOUSES

At the city council meeting last night, a new bylaw for the regulation of rooming, boarding and lodging houses was considered. The council went into committee of the whole to consider the bylaw. Ald. Dybhavn in the chair. The bylaw was read clause by clause by the city clerk, who explained that this bylaw was of a tentative nature. Powers had only recently been conferred enabling the municipality to pass such a bylaw.

There was considerable discussion over clause 8 which was to the effect that no person who within a year had been the keeper of a house of ill fame or a disorderly house, or was a bad character.

The bylaw called for the investigation by a committee of the council into the antecedents of such applicants. It was explained by the city clerk that five applications had been received for rooming house licences from those who prior to the 1st of July would not have lived in Section one. The same line of business being chosen by each of the five was remarkable.

Ald. Nelson was not in accord with this last clause, and he would have liked the investigation committee dropped, but Ald. McClymont and McRae thought that this was the crux of the whole bylaw, and finally the bylaw was passed.

MILITARY SERVICE

Although the Military Service Bill still in Parliament, has passed its second reading, the question as to whether it will be enforced throughout Canada by the present Government or whether an appeal will be made to the country, as indicated by the negotiations regarding the formation of a coalition government, remains to be answered. The marked aversion of Quebec of the measure is also a cause for anxiety. In this connection, the Vancouver Sun asks:

Now that the bill has passed its second reading by a good majority, the next move on the part of the government will be awaited with interest and anxiety. Will an administration which has all along pandered to the Nationalist, anti-British vote, make a complete volte face and declare war on Henri Bourassa and his Nationalist following? Will a government which has made no effort to repress the disloyal and seditious utterances of the Bourassas and Lavergnes, who have been busy for years preaching disloyalty and rebellion, not only with its connivance, but with the moral backing and financial assistance, take a patriotic stand and suppress these arch enemies of British connection? Will a feeble administration which feared to carry on a campaign of enlistment in Quebec by peaceful means, adopt the policy of coercion which the passage of the conscription bill makes possible? It is one thing to carry a measure through parliament, but quite another to put it into effect.

If we are capable of making a fairly safe prediction based upon political conditions, and the well known character of Sir Robert Borden, and his equally familiar methods, there will be no serious attempts to enforce the provisions of the bill, so far, at least, as Quebec is concerned. Straws point the current, but there have been much more substantial indications of the direction of the tide. The Hon. Mr. Seigny, who until office came his way, was a red-eyed Nationalist of the most anti-British type, has hastened to excuse his vote for the bill,

by stating that it will fall very lightly on Quebec. The Hon. Mr. Meighen, solicitor-general, has declared that the exemption clauses in the measure have been drawn expressly for the purpose of relieving the farmers' sons of the French-Canadian province. Conservative organs, like the Winnipeg Telegram, through which the Hon. Robert Rogers speaks, are already engaged in blaming Sir Sam Hughes for non-enlistment in Quebec, and advise caution and consideration before attempting to enforce enlistment there.

Hon. Mr. Rogers, it is true, is not at present in charge of his department, but remains a member of the cabinet, and sits to the right of his leader. His opinions are Sir Robert Borden's, or it might be more correct to say that Sir Robert Borden's opinions are supplied to him ready-made by Mr. Rogers. What more complete evidence of his personal ascendancy over his leader can be required than is afforded by the fact that despite his disgrace, he was able to force his way to the king's table, and has been able to arrange for his retrial by judges of his own choosing on evidence to be heard and considered in camera? Finally, it is understood that the bill, although approved by parliament, is not to come into force until Sir Robert Borden chooses to have it proclaimed. When will that be? Will the notoriously irresolute and invertebrate leader of a moribund government, whose career has been one of feeble vacillation in the face of even trifling obstacles, measure up to the situation with which Canada is now faced? We take leave to doubt it.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The short dispatch received yesterday to the effect that the Emperor of China has abdicated for a second time points to the conclusion that the Dictator, Chang Esun, was slightly out in his calculations, when he made his "coup d'etat." He apparently forgot that the republican and democratic sentiment had taken such a strong hold over the majority of the factions into which

China has been divided during the last four years, since the republic was first instituted. This feeling was so strong that each faction forgot its differences, and all presented an unbroken front against the reimposition of the ancient system, represented by the Manchu. The awakening of China has been spoken of with something like dread by some of the contemporary writers. It might be so regarded under an autocrat like the Kaiser Wilhelm, but democratic China need not be feared in any quarter more than any other republic.

In a really democratic country, the government of the people has been said to be by the people for the people. Where there is to be found government of the people by a section of the people for a certain small class of people, that is not democratic government. Canada is said to be a democratic country. She is al-

At these meetings all statements of claim to water privileges under Acts passed before the 12th day of March, 1909, on any of these streams, all objections thereto, and the plans prepared for the use of the said Board, will then be open for inspection.

All persons interested are entitled to examine these, and to file objections thereto in writing if they deem fit.

BOATING ACCIDENT ON THE NAAS RIVER

Aiyansh, Naas River, B. C., July 8.—Yesterday the canyon at GIL WINKSIQU, was the scene of a "near thing" in the tragedy line. The mail (motor) boat Ella, Capt. G. Brown, on its usual weekly trip up-river, had as passengers Mr. and Mrs. Dan Bartholomew, Mr. Frank Hoeft and the new fire warden for the upper Naas. Mr. and Mrs. Dan were on their honeymoon trip, and were heading praiseworthy for their new home and the simple life at Hoeft's ranch on the Seaks, and had chartered Brown's boat to take them up from Granby for this purpose.

The crew of the boat consisted of three men and two youths, all Indians, and no difficulty was anticipated in navigating the canyon. But the water was rising rapidly in the river at the rate of two inches per hour or more, and when this is the case the best "reader" finds his conclusions frequently falsified. In the canyon there is a neutral streak of water, if one has the eye of faith to see it, between Charydis and Scylla, which is navigable with the aid of a level-headed steersman and a good towing rope; but when the water is rising rapidly this neutral streak suffers from an unruly eruption of "boils." The Ella was doing well in this neutral water and taking no notice of the ordinary boils, when the water actually heaved up beneath her and swept her into the smoking whirlpool of Charydis. The towing rope snapped like a thread as the men tried to secure it to a tree, and away went the plucky little boat into the thunder and foam of the abyss. The bottom was torn away by the rocks like old paper from the wall of a room, leaving only the in-

side floor. She submerged considerably, heeled over on her side, righted herself again, and then gave herself up to the merciless deportation of the tyrant element. Nobody on board lost their head, no one squealed, "mercy kama-rad!" Mrs. Dan sat in the cabin with the water above her waist—not a whimper out of her. After she got out of the cabin she was swept off her feet entirely and outside the boat, but her husband's strong right hand grabbed her and held her while he clung with the other hand to a rail on the deck-house. Three times the boat went under in the course of half a mile, and then Samuel Weesakes came to the rescue, himself and wife in their canoe. This rescue business was really fine, not only were the passengers saved, but all the freight, with the exception of Dan's plough and a trunk, was all got ashore. They even tried to tow the derelict, and, indeed, they did manage so to influence the direction of her drifting that when she did sink, she went to rest in a place where the receding waters will leave her dry in the fall; and so Brown may recover his engines.

The party are now under cover at Gwinoha in an Indian house, and it is most sincerely hoped by all in the valley that this experience will not throw a wet blanket over the glamor of the simple life at which our friends were arriving.

Most of the farmers report a good hay crop this year, although some of the old meadows are not as good as expected. Haying will not likely start much before the end of the month.

Wm. Thompson expects his family here in a few days. He also expects his father and brother here about the same time to take up land if they can get located. They have a lot of cattle, horses and a complete farming outfit.

Walter Willisroff completed the new bridge over the creek at Thirty-nine Mile on Wednesday, and it is understood that he is to move his gang onto the Jefferson-Dockrill road where a couple of bridges are to be put in. The construction of the road is to be undertaken at an early date, according to local reports.

John Roberts came out from Babine Lake this week and intends to take a team in with him when he returns. He lives there alone and is endeavoring to cut a farm out of the virgin forest. A good deal of success has been achieved as he now has thirty acres under crop.

It is estimated that the potato acreage of the province will be increased 80 per cent. this year. Last year the production was 85,000 tons.

Geo. J. Hess, of Jackfish Lake, Sask., was in town the first of the week. He was looking for land on which to locate with his family. Like all others seeking land he found all the desirable land in the hands of unknown speculators. He was forced to return to the prairie.

Fred Heal was in town last Saturday. He and his sons have over fifteen hundred acres on Tye lake that is equal to the best in the north and in time will be one of the show places in the Bulkley Valley. This year the Heals have 250 acres in grain and hay and the crops are very promising. This spring they also added fifty head of good-grade beef animals to their herd, mostly heifers and this will give them an excellent foundation on which to build up a herd in keeping with their acreage.—Omineca Herald.
