HUNS MAKE ANOTHER TRY FOR DUNKIRK

BIG BATTLE IS IN PROGRESS ON THE BELGIAN COAST--FIRING HEARD IN LONDON

RUSSIANS WIN IMPORTANT SUCCESSES IN GALICIA

THE CAPTURE OF TOWN OF HALICZ OPENS WAY TO LEMBERG AND PRESAGES A GREAT RETIREMENT BY GERMANS--RUSSIANS NOW AT THE CARPATHIANS--10,000 PRISONERS

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, July 12.—In three days' fighting around Dolina, we captured more than 150 officers, ten thousand men, eighty guns and a large quantity of other war material. Our troops are now operating in the foothills of the Carpathians and are contending for a pass which the railroad runs through into Hungary. Good progress is being made westwards and the enemy is being driven up the pass.

The Fall of Halicz.

The town of Halicz has been captured by our troops, and with

the fall of the town even the most cautious critics are now converted into the belief in the Russian offensive. General Kerailoff reported yesterday fresh progress west of Stanislaw in combatting the enemy's stubborn resistance, finally driving him to the River Lomnica, which joins the Dniester northwest of Halicz. The fall of Halicz presages a great retirement of the enemy, as the captured stronghold formed the key to Lemberg, the capital of Galicia. The Cossacks are pursuing the Austrians on a front of twenty miles.

DROWNING ACCIDENT ON PORTLAND CANAL

In saving a little boy who had fallen overboard from the Nar-bathing on Sunday last near Maple Bay on the Portland Canal, Mr. Jacob Jarvis, a well known old timer of Stewart, lost his life. The boy was drawing a bucket of water and was pulled overboard. Mr. Jarvis saw the accident and plunged over the side. The boy was picked up none the worse, but his rescuer disappeared.

GEORGE R. PATTULLO GOING TO THE FRONT

George R. Pattullo, the well-known Canadian writer, whose short stories and articles are familiar to all readers of the Saturday Evening Post, is leaving shortly for the Old Country, as special correspondent of that magazine.

Mr. Pattullo has recently been taking an officer's course at one of the United States army training schools and will receive a commission with the American forces which are to operate with the other allies against the enemy in France. Some interesting articles on the experiences of the forces may be expected from him during the remainder of the war.

Mr. Pattullo is a brother of Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, whom he resembles greatly in appearance and energetic disposition, as well as in newspaper ability.

There are three other members of the Pattullo family serving their country at present. Capt. J. B. Pattullo, a Vancouver lawyer, went over with the 72nd Seaforth Highlanders, and is now in France. A younger brother, Lieut. Andrew Pattullo, went from Winnipeg with the Winnipeg Artillery. A sister, Mrs. Bowie, has been doing work behind the lines while her husband, Dr. Bowie, is with one of the Canadian field hospitals.

Recently Mrs. Bowie was in Folkstone seeing her children during one of the German air raids, and bombs were dropped around them from thirteen of the enemy's Halberstadts, the latest type of machine used by the Germans, capable of travelling 120 miles an hour and of climbing twenty thousand feet.

CHANGES IN GERMAN CABINET SETTLED

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, July 12.—The German Chancellor Bethmann-Hollweg has decided to fill the vacancies in the German cabinet with certain members of the Reichstag and will create a new ministry of labor to which post a Socialist will be appointed. The retirement of Ministers Hefferich and Zimmermann were gazetted on Tuesday. The Junkers still control Germany.

Dispatches indicate the increased tension in Berlin through the Socialists' attempts at reforms and to pledge the Government to a policy of no annexations. The Junkerites are exhibiting growing strength. A compromise based upon the idea of Germany fighting a defensive war, is expected, the agreement being effected by the fight for peace aims, while the demand of the reformers for electoral changes will be quieted by the replacement of a number of Prussian state ministers by Liberals.

Party Differences.
Zurich, July 12.—The full meeting of the Reichstag scheduled for today has been postponed on account of "party differences."

MORE RUMORS OF A COALITION GOVT.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, July 12.—Many more rumors are going around about the forming of a coalition government. It is said that all the pro-conscriptionist element will be included. To secure a stable administration, it is thought in Ontario that a Union Government is the only way. Vacancies in the Senate will be filled before the vote is taken on the Military Service Bill.

UP-TO-DATE METHODS AT THE EMPRESS HOTEL

The Empress Hotel is the first one in the city to have a thoroughly up-to-date electric range installed in their restaurant kitchen. The range is heated entirely by electricity, thus obviating all the dust and smuts inseparable from the use of a coal-burning range. Also it ensures more exactitude in cooking of all kinds by its uniform and easily-regulated supply of heat. Chef George Regles is enthusiastic over his new implement, and knows how to handle it to the best advantage.

GERMANS MAKE GREAT EFFORT ON THE YSER

On the Belgian Coast Attempt is Made to Break through British Lines to Get Dunkirk or To Calais.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, July 12.—The enemy penetrated the British positions in Belgium on a front of fourteen hundred yards to a depth of six hundred yards. In their advance, the Germans reached the right bank of the Yser near the sea. This sector has been isolated by the destruction of the bridges across the Yser. One of the heaviest big gun duels of the war raged yesterday on the Belgian coast. The sounds of the firing were heard in London from six in the morning till midnight. In the London suburbs, tremors like a slight earthquake were felt. The battle is still in progress.

Berlin Report.
A Berlin wireless dispatch claims more than twelve hundred and fifty prisoners captured. Dunkirk is the objective, the Calais. An enemy attack further south failed. The British counter attack forced the invader back to his original positions.

GERMANS GO BARE-FOOT

Washington, July 11.—The State Department has received a cablegram announcing that the city council of Zittau, Germany, is urging the entire population to go barefooted in order to harden their feet to be prepared for the winter ordeal, when there will be no shoes. The pupils of Wuerzburger started the shoeless style on June 28.

Another message says that 60 per cent. of the milk cows in many districts have been killed for meat, so there is a great shortage of dairy products.

The German Government is selling the former homes of dispossessed Frenchmen in Alsace-Lorraine.

BRITISH MAKE AIR RAID ON TURK CAPITAL

Successful Attack From the Air Damages Battle Cruiser Goeben—Direct Hit On War Office.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 12.—The British aviators made a daring and entirely successful attack on Constantinople. The Turkish fleet in the Golden Horn was bombed and the Turkish war office buildings were also attacked. The former German battle cruiser Goeben, which escaped out of the Mediterranean through the Dardanelles at the beginning of the war was damaged. Bombs made direct hits from the height of eight hundred feet on the war ships. The enemy gunners were flabbergasted and the attackers returned unscathed from the raid. A direct hit was also made on the War Office building in Constantinople and much damage was done.

French Front.
Paris, July 12.—German raids were repulsed around Sarineul in Champagne. On the left bank of the Meuse, fighting is active. In the Woevre, north of Flirey, the Germans were thrown back in sharp fighting.

For Muddling.
London, July 12.—The British Government took active steps today to punish those of its officials responsible for the failure of the first Mesopotamia expedition. Bonar Law announced that the officials concerned ceased their Governmental functions pending the report of the new enquiry.

U. S. Fleet Welcomed.
Monte Video, July 12.—The United States fleet was accorded an enthusiastic welcome on its arrival here.

Sinn Feiner Elected.
London, July 12.—Professor Edward de Valera, the Dublin University Sinn Feiner, recently released from prison, has been elected to Parliament from East Clare. He will take the seat in the House of Commons made vacant by the death of William Redmond.

STRIKE IN TORONTO

Toronto, July 12.—Sixteen hundred street car employees strike and demand higher wages. All street traffic is paralysed.

UNACCEPTABLE

"The formula of peace without annexations is unacceptable to us." These are the words of the German Chancellor in his speech on Monday. Germany can win "if she holds out." After three years of war, the like of which the world has never seen before, such is the opinion of the German Government, as expressed by the Chancellor.

Now that a definite statement has been made by the Chancellor—his last speech on the subject was so delightfully vague, that the members of the Reichstag could not make head nor tail of it—but now having declared that the purpose of the Kaiser is unchanged, the German people may understand where they are heading for and what to expect.

No peace without annexations may be taken to mean that the pre-war boundaries would not suit her. The speech of the Chancellor may be regarded as so much bluff, and nothing else. The day will come when the Chancellor will have to eat his own words. Although it is a very unwise thing to prophecy what annexations and rearrangements of frontiers will take place after the war, changes are certain to be made; and instead of annexing territory, Germany will be bound to lose some. Alsace-Lorraine, Poland, and Silesia-Holstein are bound to be matters of discussion among the Allies, and with Germany beaten on the field, it is said to be questionable whether Bavaria, Saxony and Hanover will remain under the dominion of Prussia discredited.

"Germany will win, if she holds out," says the Chancellor. The word "if" in this sentence means everything. With not a friend left in the civilized world—even her ally Austria is kicking—the chances of Germany winning are so remote as to be negligible. On the west, on the east and on the south, the Allies are daily making progress and pressing her legions back foot by foot, and are daily taking toll of the fighting forces of Germany. With her finances exhausted, her commerce swept from the seas, and her high seas fleet snuggling

safe in the Kiel Canal, afraid to show themselves outside of their minefields, yet the Chancellor can say "Germany will win—if she holds out." That is the question. Can Germany hold out?

The press dispatch says that the reports do not specify how the Chancellor's speech was received. That it will not be received by the Socialists, who are increasing in strength in Germany rapidly in spite of or because of war conditions, with any degree of pleasure is certain. It will show to them that the Junkers still control the destinies of the state. The Socialist party in Germany has been becoming increasingly bold of late, and are only dimly beginning to perceive the possibilities of their strength. This speech will forever dispose also of the idea of a separate peace with Russia. No annexations and no indemnities was the cry of the new Russia. Russia will be convinced now that their war aims and those of Germany are diametrically opposed. Russia, which in the midst of a life and death struggle, took time to overthrow the reactionaries within her borders, will fight all the better against a government which declares for that which she had to get rid of.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The British Government raised \$2,865,000,000 by taxation in the past twelve months. The greater part of it came from profits and dividends. The greater part of Canada's national revenue is taken from wages, says the Toronto Globe. "From him that hath not, shall be taken away even that which he hath." Canada has been said to be a democratic country, where equality of opportunity is greater than in Great Britain. The wage earners have certainly got a greater opportunity to pay most of the taxes. The equality of opportunity to pay his just proportion is denied him that has most to pay with.

The striking Liberal victory in Saskatchewan is a reminder to the Montreal Herald of the progress which Liberalism has been making in the provincial arena in Canada during the past few years.

At these meetings all statements of claim to water privileges under Acts passed before the 12th day of March, 1909, on any of these streams, all objections thereto, and the plans prepared for the use of the said Board, will then be open for inspection.

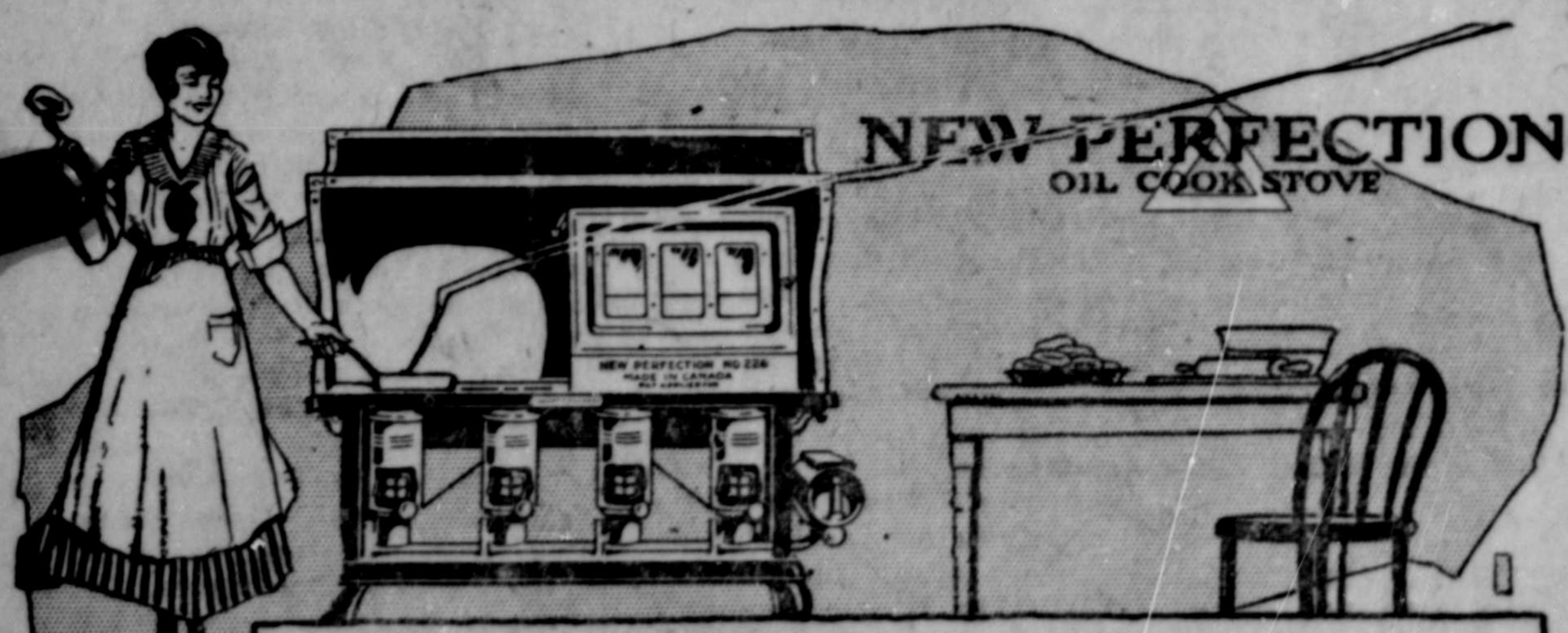

SWISS HAVE TO CHOOSE BETWEEN CORN OR COAL

Berne, July 10.—The Swiss "Freie Zeitung" says: "After one unsuccessful attempt, a second ruthless submarine campaign was announced, but Switzerland did nothing effective, even when it was haughtily declared in the German Reichstag that it served neutrals right if their shipping and trade were destroyed; for that would oblige neutrals energetically to force Britain to make peace. Although since then the submarine campaign has caused great damage to the Entente, yet on the other hand it developed into a direct catastrophe for neutrals. It has not only brought us less near the end of the war, but has delayed the coming of peace more than ever."

"The questions that are being asked in Switzerland today are: 'Corn or coal? Groceries or iron?' We strongly hope Switzerland will choose rightly, but above all to keep the population from starving. Whoever (in the face of the daily diminution of German food supplies) should not to himself ask the following question, should easily know the answer. How long will Germany be in a position to deliver us coal and iron? Even last winter, Germany failed to deliver all the coal she had promised to send us. In Germany there is need both of labor and material; their output is being used more and more towards providing for the war. In the near future Germany will in any case not be able to deliver any of the promised goods."

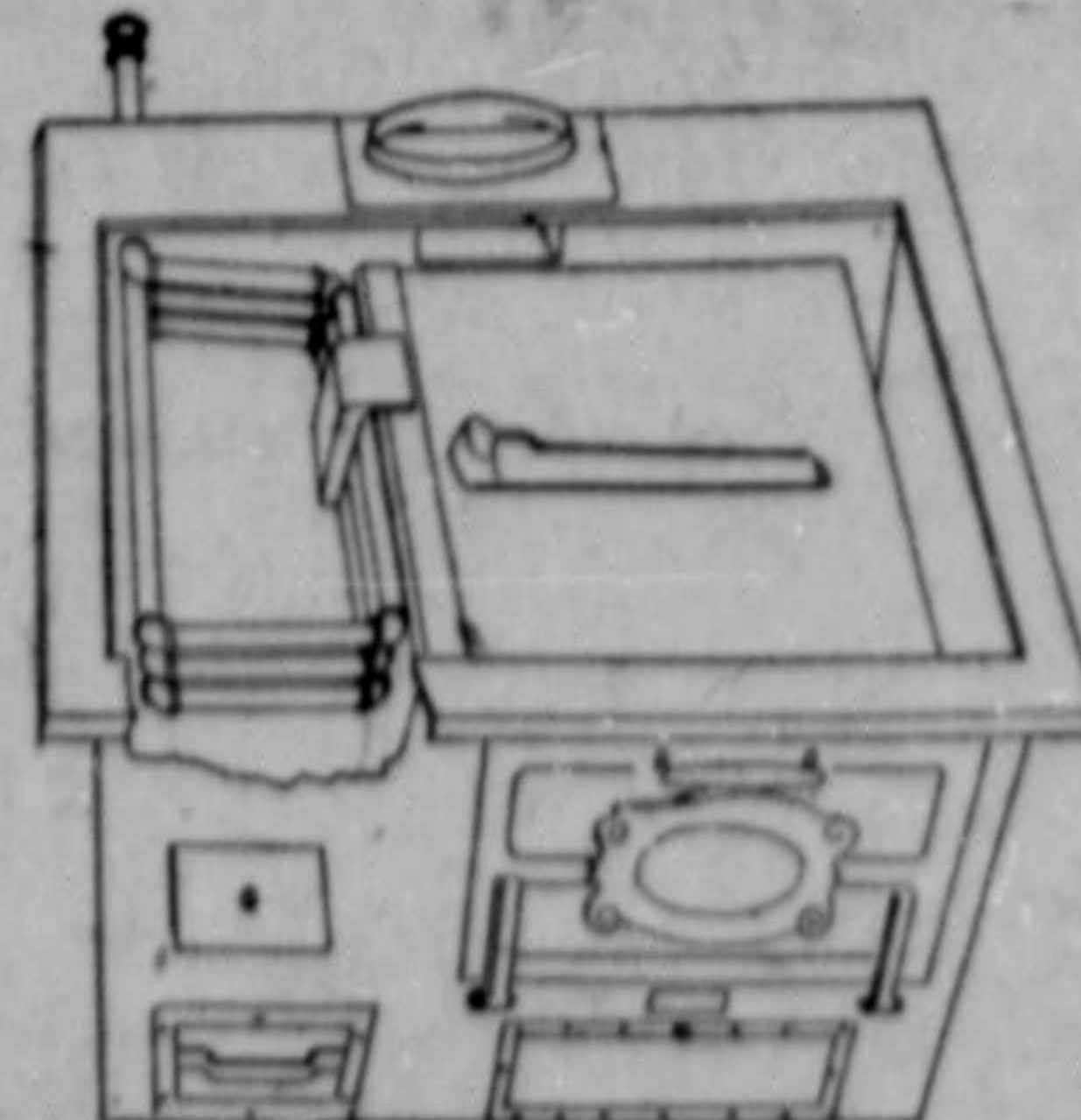
