

## RUSSIANS ARE STILL GOING AHEAD STRONG

ON A FRONT OF FIFTY MILES, BRUSILOFF'S DRIVE IS SWEEPING THE ENEMY BACK

## RUSSIANS CONTINUE TO SMASH THE GERMAN RESISTANCE

IMPORTANT PROGRESS MADE ON WAY TO LEMBERG—DRIVING GERMAN BACK ON A FIFTY-MILE FRONT—ROUMANIAN ARMY BEGINS THEIR OFFENSIVE—GREAT AIR AIR ACTIVITY ON WESTERN FRONT

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, July 14.—The Northern army of General Brusiloff captured important heights on the road to Lemberg. The Russians are fighting furiously and are steadily advancing along a fifty-mile front from Halez to the foothills of the Carpathians. The crossings of the Lomnica River have been captured and two villages on the other side. The Roumanians are hammering the Austro-Germans operating against the Roumanian line.

## More Prisoners.

In the course of the battles in Eastern Galicia on Wednesday, the Russians captured ten officers and eight hundred and fifty men, also took five heavy guns and ten machine guns. The Huns are desperate over the Slav advance, and are pouring in new food for propaganda to stem Russia's war effort. Superlative efforts are being made to induce its foe to quit the offensive. Insidious arguments are being relayed through the Socialists in Stockholm. Petrograd, however, continues jubilant. The soldiers chafe at the delays.

## British Front.

London, July 14.—A successful raid was made by the British to the south of Ypres. The regular of German raids in two localities is reported. Fourteen German aeroplanes were brought down on Thursday by gunfire. Seventeen others were seen to be uncontrollable. Nine British machines were lost.

## French Front.

Paris, July 14.—Violent artillery fighting is in progress to the southeast of St. Quentin. Sixteen hundred shells were fired into Rheims. Lieutenant Thaw, of the Lafayette Escadrille, downed his eighth plane today. The Pittsburgh aviator killed both the German pilot and observer. Sergeant Campbell, of Chicago, landed safely behind his own lines with half his machine gone.

## I. W. W. ACTIVE

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, July 14.—The ramifications of the industrial disturbances and plots are causing grave concern in the United States. The Government is determined to stamp out the menace. It is thought that the Germans are financing the I. W. W. plots.

San Francisco, July 13.—The action of the I. W. W. rouses the country to a white heat. Sheriffs are preparing to meet those deported from Bisbee. Home guards are being organized. A great feeling of unrest is prevalent in several western states.

## BACON MAKES FIVE MILLION IN PROFITS

High Cost of Living Commissioner Says Firm of Sir Joseph Flavell Headed Big Bacon Combine.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, July 14.—Revelations of millions made by some of the packing houses in Canada during the last two years since the spectacular rise in prices are given in the report just presented to the Minister of Labor by O'Connor, the High Cost of Living Commissioner. A profit of five millions last year on bacon is declared to be the share of the company headed by Sir Joseph Flavell, the chief of the Munitions Board. The other big company which shared the most part of the bacon monopoly is Mathews Blackwell, Ltd., which cleaned up nearly a million and a half.

## MILITARY SERVICE BILL THROUGH COMMITTEE

It is expected that one hundred thousand men will be got from class one. The new grouping makes a vast difference in the calling of conscripts. At the first call, all single men from 20 to 34 must report for duty.

## REPUBLICANS CAPTURE THE CITY OF PEKIN

General Chang Hsun's Troops Surrender in the Temple of Heaven—Great Fires Break Out.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Tientsin, July 14.—Republican headquarters report three thousand troops of General Chang Hsun, the monarchist leader, surrendered in the Temple of Heaven after a fight of two hours. Chang took refuge in the Dutch legation. The fighting continues in the Forbidden City with the remnant of Hsun's forces. A large fire is raging in the city.

## DERNBERG WANTS MUN COLONIES RESTORED

Copenhagen, July 13.—Dr. Bernhard Dernberg, who for a time directed German propaganda in the United States, and who left New York in May, 1915, gave his ideas on the necessary conditions of peace during an address at a convention of the Radical party of Schleswig-Holstein. Dr. Dernberg rejected the idea of the annexation of Belgium, though unopposed to the partition between Flemings and Walloons, and to the exaction of guarantees to prevent another power obtaining a greater influence there than Germany.

Dr. Dernberg said the annexation of parts of France, like the Longwy and Briey ore fields, was not desired, although corrections of the frontier found necessary by the military authorities for military purposes did not exclude the question of concessions in Alsace-Lorraine, in Dr. Dernberg's mind, while the conditions to be demanded in the East depended upon the developments in Russia.

The former Colonial Secretary advanced as a concluding demand the restoration of all German colonies, with such additions as contemplated in the Anglo-German negotiations of 1914, and the abandonment by the Entente of the program of the Paris Economic Conference.

## PROHIBITION IN ALBERTA NOW

Edmonton, July 13.—Prohibition under the amended act is in full force in Alberta now.

The new amendments to the liquor act were scheduled to become effective, but three days of grace were given the dealers and mail order houses in which they might close up business. Beginning with today the new regulations are effective in toto. Under the amended act, as now in force, it is not permissible for any person in Alberta to keep liquor, in excess of one quart of spirits and two gallons of malt. This automatically rules out everything in the way of warehouses and commission firms, and the several establishments in the city that were doing business under the former system have closed their doors accordingly.

It is also a provision of the new act that there shall be no advertising of any description in the interests of any kind of liquor. This applies not only to newspaper advertising, but to the display of electric signs, bill posting, or circularizing by mail, the law expressly stipulating that there shall be no attempt to advertise liquor within the Province in any way or form.

## RUMORS OF THE KAISER'S ABDICATION

The Crown Prince to Get Go-by and Prince Joachim Stated as Next Emperor—Strike in Reichstag.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 14.—A dispatch to the Morning Post from Amsterdam says that rumors are current that the Emperor William has abdicated in favor of his son, Prince Joachim. The rumors are unconfirmed and must be taken with reserve.

## Reichstag on Strike.

Copenhagen, July 13.—The Reichstag is on strike and has suspended all work until the situation is cleared up. Hindenburg and Ludendorff have been summoned to a conference by the Kaiser. The crisis is evidently the result of the demand for reforms.

## Want Hollweg Back.

Amsterdam, July 13.—Dispatches have been received from Berlin which indicate increasing unrest at the capital over the continued lack of any settlement being reached in the Reichstag situation. Bernstorff has been reported to be picked to succeed Zimmerman. The indications are that the Kaiser cannot do without Hollweg. Austria has come forward with a plea for the Chancellor's continuance. A compromise may be forced through the Reichstag tomorrow. American military men think the "crisis" to be merely the shifting of men.

## GENERAL NEWS ITEMS

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 14.—The food ministry takes control of the entire 1917 crop of potatoes, wheat, barley, oats and rye.

In the last air raid on London, two German bombers were killed. The statues of the Kaiser and Bismark, and the German Club were also destroyed by an indiscriminate bomb.

The Sinn Fein policy is openly anti-British. Its programme can never be accepted by any serious Irishman.

Berlin, July 14.—Bank clerks here today set an example of patriotic self-sacrifice. To aid the movement for the economy of leather, the clerks discarded their shoes.

Regina, July 14.—The North-West Mounted Police may not be used for military purposes, if at all. This announcement was made by Commissioner Perry on his return from the East.

## BARE LIVING

The acting Commissioner of the High Cost of Living Commission finds that "prices are not justifiable," considering the stocks of beef, ham, bacon, mutton and lamb. This will verify the suspicion which has been at the back of the minds of most people for quite a long time now. The Commissioner says that these prices should forthwith decline. Which is all very well in its way. Very many other things "should" take place, but unfortunately, they don't. Even a recommendation from the High Cost of Living Commission will not cause the price of food stuffs to decline unless some further action compelling such a result is taken. Such a step would hardly be for the Borden Government to take, when its friends are the chief parties interested in the keeping of prices at a high level. And what would the Borden Government do without its own particular friends? On its merits alone, the Borden Government stands condemned. It has permitted the workers of Canada, and the dependents of the soldiers at the front to be held up on the prices of the very necessities of life. That one fact is sufficient to condemn any administration. The bulk of the people have been exploited. In order to subsist, they have had to pay prices for food which the Government Commission finds "not justifiable." On this score alone, by withholding protection from the people at large against the rapacity of the food barons, the Borden Government's continuance in office in the eyes of the majority of the people is no longer justifiable. "The law of supply and demand cannot be regulated," said a Minister recently. Which means that nothing can be expected.

Mr. W. J. Hanna, the Food Controller, says that the consumption of wheat, beef and bacon in the Dominion must be reduced by one third in order that Canada may meet the need of the Allies. Possibly this is one way of regulating the law of supply and demand. By decreasing the demand at home to allow a greater quan-

tity for export can hardly be expected to reduce prices in Canada. The demand still exists, but the supply is to be diverted abroad. Maximum prices, based upon pre-war conditions with due allowance being made for increased cost of production now, have been fixed by other governments to the great relief of their people. Such inflicted no hardship upon the producers, and allowed fairness as if something of the kind will be absolutely necessary in Canada, if the present strain is not to reach breaking point. The tardy appointment of a Food Controller may help the situation somewhat, provided that he has the powers necessary to control. If the appointment is not an abortion, Mr. Hanna must have the power to control the food situation thoroughly, even although high officials in the state are interested in the production of foodstuffs.

The situation calls for fearless and bold action. And immediately.

## NOTES AND COMMENTS

It is childish to blame Laurier for what is going on in Quebec or for a solitary item in the fearful record of blundering, incompetent, supine leadership with which this Dominion has been afflicted during the last three years. When the war broke out, Sir Robert Borden at once should have invited the co-operation of the Leader of the Opposition and his followers as the Government of every other belligerent did to its political opponents. Instead of doing so, the Canadian Government sought to make the war a party political opportunity, and three times was on the verge of springing a party election.—The Victoria Times.

The scope of aerial raids is extending. The Celestial Air Service, consisting of one aviator, has been bombing Peking, and generally making things lively in that ancient city. Before General Changhsun got shut up in Peking, the opposing forces had a great battle at Fang Tang. The Chinese reports were of great slaughter, but foreign observers declare that

noise and din were much greater than the casualties, and not more than ten accidents happened on either side. The remarkable strength of the Republican forces shows how strong the democratic sentiment has become in the East. The belief of the Chinese in the Divine right of the Son of Heaven, as they called their Emperor once, has given place. China can teach Germany something after all.

Poor old Hollweg's bombastic speech reported on Monday, wherein he stated that he considered it his duty to remain Chancellor "for the protection of the Fatherland," apparently did not get him anywhere. He has evidently reconsidered his opinion as to the necessity of its protection. It will be a difficult matter for the Kaiser to get a better apologist for his royal arrogance than Bethman-Hollweg was.

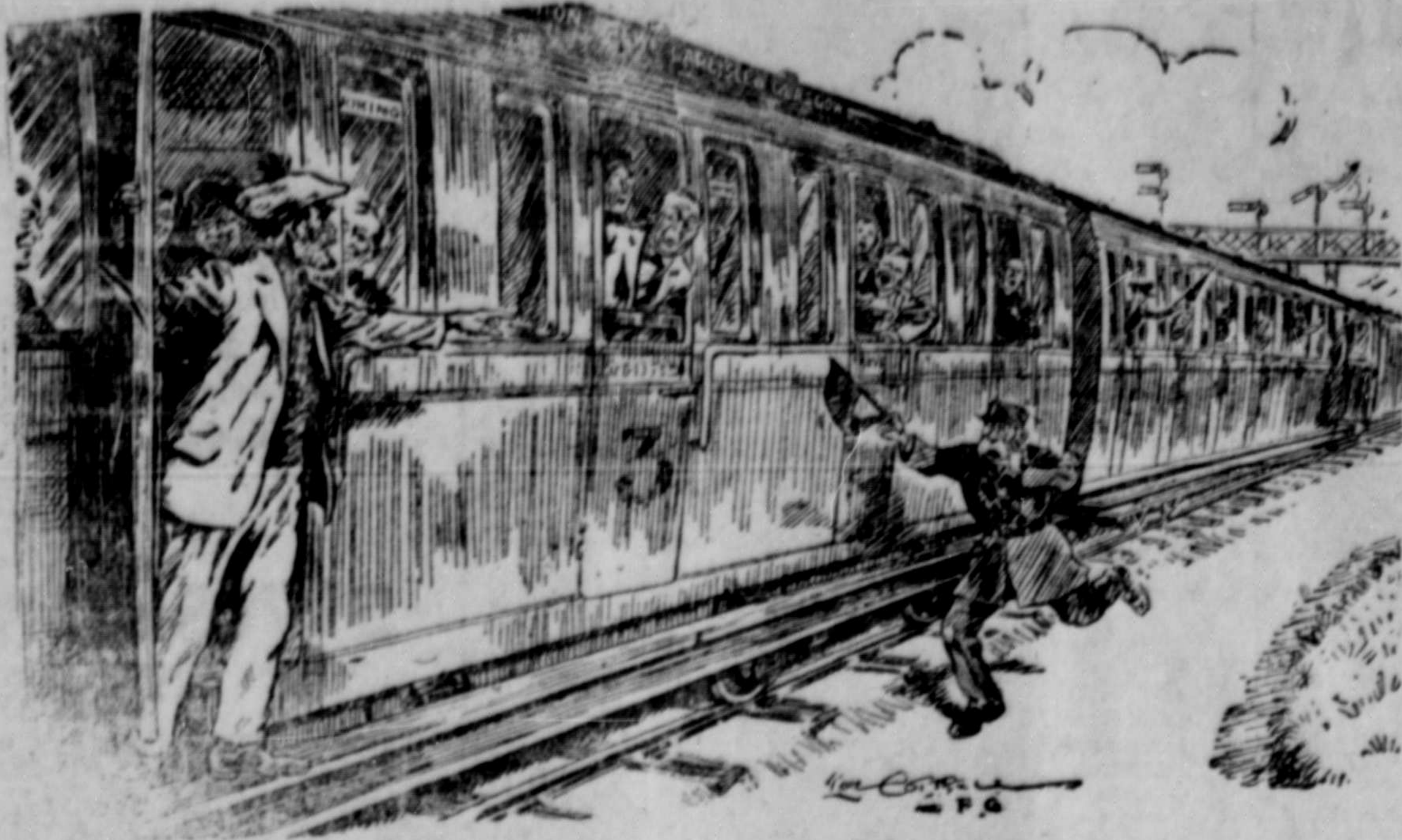

"The uniform 'e wore was nothin' much before an' rather less than 'alf o' that be'ind."—So wrote Kipling of Gunga Din. It was equally true of the Canadian Artillery on the day the British launched their great offensive in the salient. The guns incessantly belched lead on the enemy lines with never a moment of rest for the crews. The war had entered another critical day.

## COALITION IS A FORLORN HOPE

Ottawa, July 13.—Sir Robert Borden's efforts to induce at least two or three prominent Liberals to enter the Cabinet on the conscription issue have borne no fruit yet, and it is understood that he has now almost abandoned hope of strengthening his political position for the coming election by this medium. It is stated that nearly a dozen Liberals, both within and without Parliament, have been approached, either directly or through "mediators." The conditions are such, however, that no Liberal of any standing has consented to cast his lot with the Government as at present constituted, and any real coalition or non-party administration now is apparently a forlorn hope.

The arrival of Hartley Dewart, M. P. P., of Toronto, in Ottawa today, following the visit of Mr. N. W. Rowell last week, again revived gossip in Parliamentary circles in connection with the possible inclusion of one or other of these Ontario Liberals in Sir Robert Borden's prospective union government. As far as can be learned, however, there is no prospect of either Mr. Rowell or Mr. Dewart accepting office in the present Conservative Administration.

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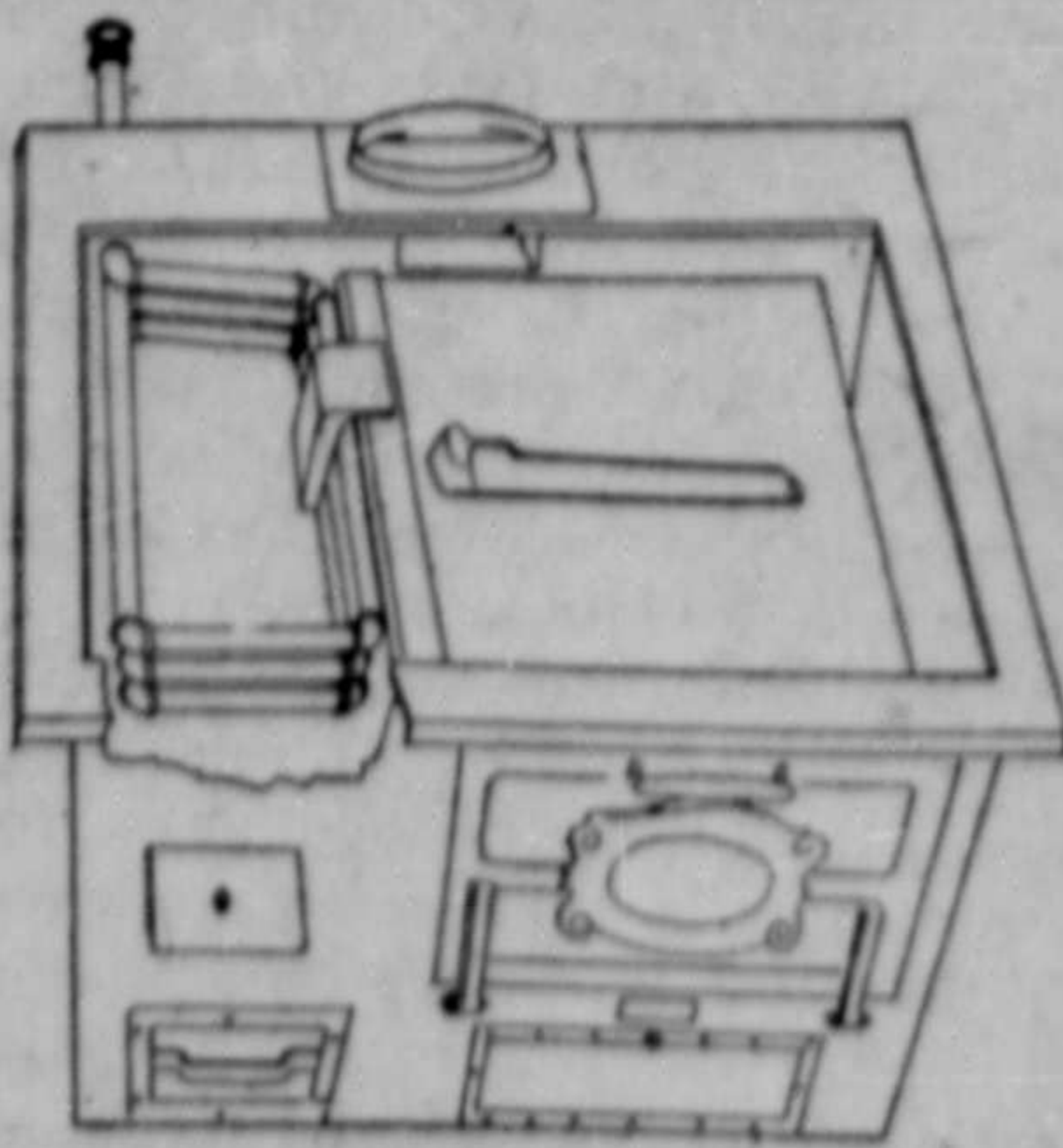
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
