POLITICAL TURMOIL CONVULSES GERMANY

PRUSSIAN WAR MINISTER ALSO RESIGNS --- FURTHER DEVELOPMENTS EXPECTED

ANOTHER THOUSAND PRISONERS TAKEN BY THE RUSSIAN ARMY

IN EASTERN GALICIA RUSSIANS CONTINUE THEIR VICTORIOUS ADVANCE AND SHATTER AUSTRO-GERMAN LINES—ALL THE ENEMY COUNTER ATTACKS REPULSED—THE DRIVE SLOWS DOWN

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, July 16.—Russia's victorious troops made a further advance in Eastern Galicia, where the Austro-German lines were shattered by Korniloff's drive. The Russians captured the village of Novica, southwest of Kalusz. Two German counter attacks in an attempt to dislodge the Russians from Kalusz were repulsed. Elsewhere on the Russo-Galician front the situation is unchanged. Apparently the Russians have paused to gather their forces for a further drive. Germany reports considerable activity at the northern end of the line near Dvinsk and Smorgen. The Russian statement contains nothing indicative of an offensive in that section in prospect.

Make Deserters Fight.

The wives of Russian soldiers, particularly in Central Russia, drag their deserting spouses back to the conscription bureau.

London, July 16.—The French and British armies on the western front are still idle except for local operations. Stiff fighting occurred on Friday night in Belgium near Lembaertzyde. Berlin announces that the British attack broke down with heavy losses. The British reports say that the Germans made a fruitless attack in that sector. Heavy artillery fighting is in progress near St. Quentin and between Craonne and Coucy with indications of the renewal of the bitter struggle for vantage points on the Aisne front.

Italian Front.

Rome, July 16.—Great artillery activity exists between the Adige and Astrico. On the remainder of the front our guns disturbed the enemy movements. There has been considerable aerial activity throughout the day.

Berlin Report.

Berlin, July 16.—In the west there has been a lively firing engagement throughout the day on the western front, particularly in Western Champagne. In the east on account of a cold rain prevailing, there has been little fighting activity south of the Dniester. Only local Russian attacks which have all been repulsed.

The King and Queen.

London, July 16.—The King has returned from his fourth visit to the front. On this occasion he was accompanied by the Queen.

The Fortunate Dead.

The spectre of hunger is stalking through Germany. "The dead are indeed fortunate," says one neutral writer, regarding the appalling conditions prevailing in the city of Berlin.

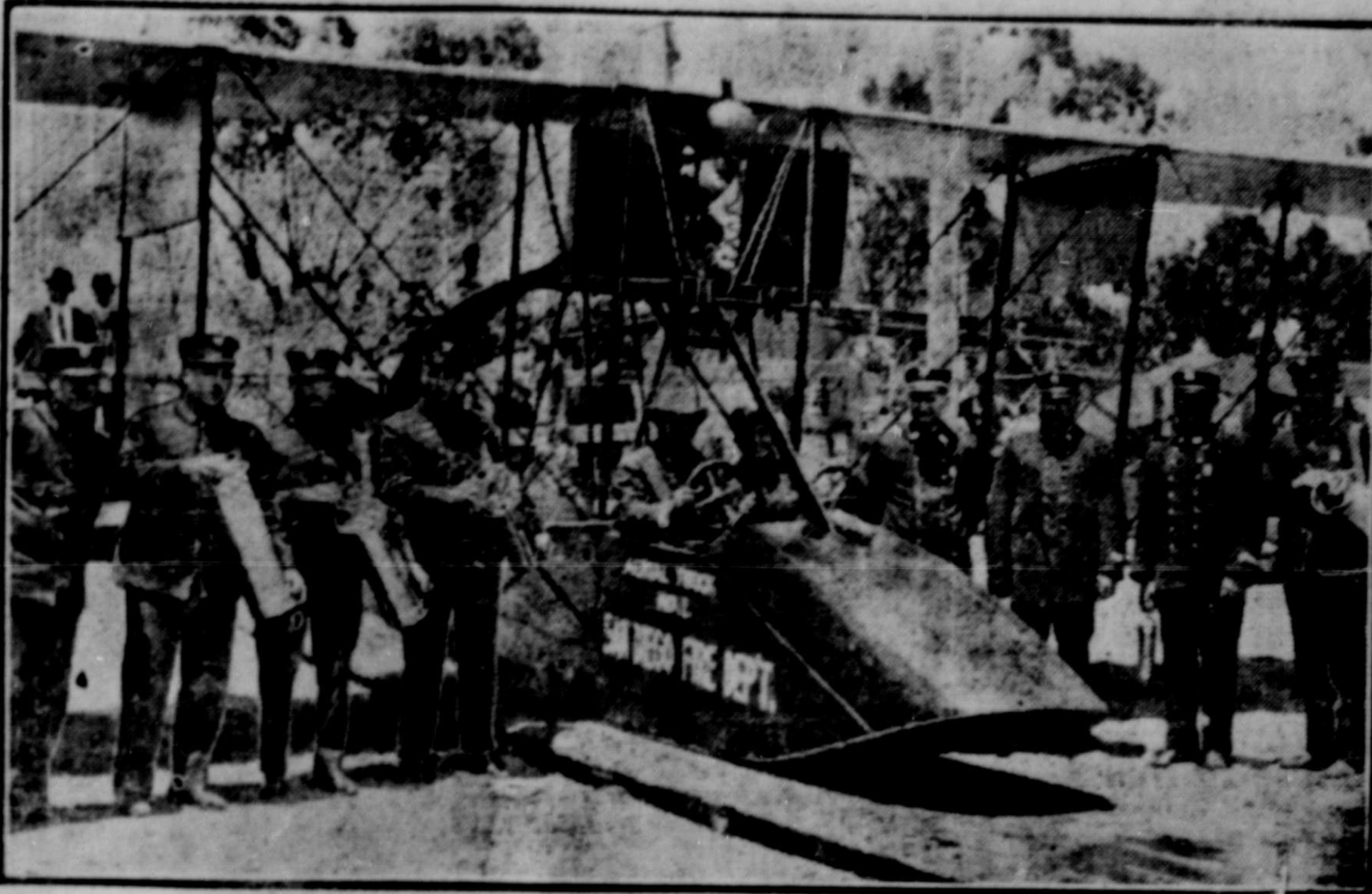

J. W. FLAVELLE DENIES TRUTH OF REPORT FROM H. C. OF L. COMMISSION

The following telegram has been sent by the president of the William Davies Co., Limited, to Sir Robert Borden, prime minister for Canada, with respect to a statement published by the Department of Labor concerning the business of the Wm. Davies Co., Ltd., July 13, 1917.

"Sir Robert Borden, P. C. K., C. M. G., prime minister, Ottawa:—The statements given to the press by the department of Labor and which appear in the morning papers covering the business of the William Davies Co. are grotesquely untruthful, both in the mass and in detail. They evidence a curious admixture of ignorance and malice. I deeply regret the injustice of this attack. I regret it naturally on personal grounds, but even more on public grounds. Bitterness and anger and suspicion are being stirred up against public men, against labor and capital and corporation which, in many instances, have no better support than flippant impudence and ignorance. The pity of it is that this case is that an authorization statement was available and was not consulted. The Department of Finance is furnished with a balance sheet and the profit and loss sheet annually of each firm in Canada, given under the provision of the business tax measure. The statement of the William Davies Co. is and must continue to be furnished to the Department of Finance. These statements are not only audited on behalf of the company but are verified by the accountant of the Department of Finance and are final in authority. The Department of Labor could have consulted these statements and could have procured such further information as they might have desired by application to the general manager of the company and could thus have avoided the grave injustice of an attack based upon absurdly untruthful statements. During its entire history, the William Davies Company has sought for no trade advantage or profit other than could be secured through diligence and attention to its business. If such volume of business has been secured in contrast to others, it has been secured in open competition, free from combination or arrangement or undertaking with other packers or merchants. The company offered to the Imperial authorities at different periods since the outbreak of war to operate to its capacity in bacon products, canned meat products and pork and bean products on a cost and percentage basis, but each time the offer was declined; first for bacon and later for canned meats and pork and beans. The Imperial authorities expressed the desire to purchase in the open market. All army purchases of bacon are made in London. All army purchases of canned meats and pork and beans are made in Canada. Both are made in open and untrammelled competition with the world. The world during the period of the war is confined to the United States and Argentine, Canada, Australia and New Zealand. If it were wrong to secure a share of this and other

Tientsin, China, July 16.—At daybreak the Republican troops began bombarding the Temple of Heaven, wherein were the headquarters of General Chang Hsun, the commander of the Monarchial forces. The attackers are within a quarter of a mile of the legation quarter of the city. It is believed that the besieged forces will be annihilated before they cease fighting.

BIG COPPER STRIKE AT ROCHER DE BOULE

A big strike of ore was made this week on the Rocher de Boule. Reports emanating from reliable sources are to the effect that while working on No. 1 tunnel, a six-foot body of ore was encountered carrying about 5 feet of very rich copper at 180-foot level. The vein has been traced over thirty feet and contains a high percentage of pay ore, and is one of the biggest strikes ever made on the property. The management is highly delighted with the discovery and will reorganize its plant and reconstruct its tramway, to facilitate shipments, which will be commenced without delay. Quite a flurry and a sharp rise in the price of the small amount of Rocher de Boule stock on the market was experienced on the Vancouver exchange when the news reached there of the strike. An added impetus has been given to the mining game on the mountain and faith in quality and quantity of its ore bodies has been rekindled.—The Omineca Miner.

GEORGE CLOTHIER IS MINERAL SURVEYOR

On Wednesday afternoon Geo. A. Clothier received a wire from the Hon. Wm. Sloan, minister of mines, notifying him of his appointment as mineral surveyor in district number one, and requesting him to report for duty at the earliest possible date. George left on Friday morning for Prince Rupert en route to Victoria. In making this appointment the minister of mines has been well advised. Mr. Clothier has been in the north for many years and was in the southern part of the province before that. He is well known as an operator and an engineer. He also possesses all the qualifications for the successful performance of his duties. Mr. Clothier's many friends in this district extend congratulations. —Omineca Herald.

THOUSAND MEN WANTED FOR TEN MONTHS' WORK

Pittsburg, July 16.—The Westinghouse Company are seeking for a thousand men who are willing to sign an agreement to enter a new plant for the manufacture of war munitions by a secret process. They will require to be imprisoned for the whole ten months and all communication from the outside will be shut off. It is believed that the plant will turn out in large quantities one of the latest inventions of Edison.

EXCITING FIRE ON BEACH PLACE

On Saturday afternoon, there was an alarm of fire from the west end of the city. The fire department were soon on the scene, when they found that the building in danger was the two-story dwelling on Beach Place, belonging to the Anglican Synod. The fire had taken a good hold of the roof, which was blazing furiously. It had evidently been caused by a spark landing on the dry shingles, which the strong breeze prevailing had fanned into a blaze. Both flats were occupied, one tenant having moved in only the day previous.

Fortunately, all the furniture belonging to the tenants was got out safely, and soon the department had the outbreak under control. The height of the roof from the ground caused a little difficulty, but that was overcome. The building was one of the oldest in the city. It was the old church building, which used to be located on Rupert Road, in the old days, and was moved to its present location. The loss is covered by insurance.

SHIPS SUNK

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 16.—The British transport Armadale, 6,153 tons gross, was sunk in the Atlantic on June 27. Six soldiers were killed.

The British battleship Vanguard, 19,250 tons, blew up from an internal explosion. Over seven hundred of the ship's complement perished.

POLITICAL UPHEAVAL IN GERMANY

Hollweg's Successor is Bureau-ocrat of Old Type—Prussian War Minister Resigns—Peace Clamor.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 16.—A great political turmoil has been convulsing Germany ever since Russia's first startling success. The resumption of the offensive has culminated for the present in the resignation of Bethman-Hollweg, the Chancellor, but all indications serve to show that his resignation is far from being the last act of the drama. It is but the beginning of far-reaching developments which are bound to affect the fabric of the German Empire and will have a momentous consequence upon the progress of the war. Dr. George Michael is succeeding Hollweg. He is a Bureau-ocrat of the old type, whose appointment can be scarcely regarded as promising much in the direction of the Parliamentarization of Germany.

War Minister Resigns.

The Tagliche Rundschau says that Hollweg's resignation has been accepted. General von Stein, the Prussian Minister of War, who has been a bitter opponent of peace without annexations and indemnities, has resigned. The peace clamor is growing throughout Germany and Austria. The rumor that the Kaiser has abdicated in favor of his son Joachim is not believed.

The latest is that the Kaiser may use drastic measures to overcome the obstructions of the conservatives in the Prussian Diet, if they hold up the reforms he is seeking for the people.

OMAHA FIRM WANTS RUPERT'S DRIED FISH

The following letter was received by the American Consul from a business house in Omaha, as a result of a report forwarded to Washington in relation to a new factory for preserving fish, and based on an article which appeared in a local paper. It is an indication of what could be depended on so far as a market is concerned, once the factory is established, provided of course it is prepared to supply the fish required.

"Dear Sir:—We understand that there is a new factory going in to preserve fish in Prince Rupert and that there is a large quantity of fish taken by fishing vessels and thrown back into the sea as unmarketable.

"Would the people who are building this plant be willing to take these unmarketable fish; dry them so they are safe for shipment, and export the dried fish to this country in a ground form and sacked?"

"We would be willing to take the entire product if we could get it at a fair price and could know what the character of the raw material would be."

BLACK DIAMONDS

Among other things which demand great consideration because of the high price at the present time is coal. The people of Prince Rupert have got to pay \$12 per ton just now. This high level of price is being attained, not in the winter time, when there is a great demand, but in midsummer, the warmest part of the whole year, when less coal is being used. It is a cause of great concern to the people at large, because as the demand increases as the weather grows colder, there will be then every excuse for the further raising of the price. When we have to pay \$12 per ton now, we may well wonder what we may have to pay when the snow is on the ground. To examine the price of coal at present and dissecting it, is the way to find out where the added cost comes in. We find that the cost of coal at the pithead right now is (per ton) \$5.50

These are charges about which there can hardly be any dispute. Their verification is easy. In addition to this, there is the merchant's overhead charges to be added, consisting of office expense, telephone, bad debts and so forth, which, when added on will leave a smaller margin of net profit. Even with a municipal coal yard, it is difficult to see how this price would be lowered at the present time. It is possible that a little might come from the difference between the long ton the merchant buys and the short ton he sells, but this is said to be absorbed by the screening of the coal, and the selling of the slack at a lower price, which is a reasonable assumption. The probe seems to require to go further back. What about the price at the pithead?

Only a few days ago, the United States Government was reported to have got action on the mine owners over there, whereby they reduced their price from \$1 to \$1.50 a ton. Is it not possible that similar action could be taken by the

government in Canada? The Canadian mine owner is in no harder case than his brother in the United States.

There is as good an argument for the government producing the coal at cost as there is of a municipality selling it at cost. The latter without the former would still leave the people at the mercy of the mine owners, who are alleged to be responsible for this last rise in the price. The fact must be faced that State ownership of the necessities of life is a doctrine which is making great headway as a direct outcome of the situation arising from the war. There is no use tackling it from the wrong end. A start ought to be made at the source. Only a few years ago, such a statement would have been dismissed as rank Socialism. The test made of this doctrine through its application in Great Britain, where vested interests were hedged round and protected more than in almost any other country, has proved that this so-called Socialism was very practical politics. It would seem that what is good in war time ought to be equally good in times of peace afterwards.

The war is costing Great Britain over \$25,000 a minute. What is it costing you? Are you giving your savings to the nation? Canada is paying hundreds of millions annually to maintain its divisions in the firing line to give Britain the munitions credits it desires, to insure the conduct of the war in a manner worthy of the Dominion. Are you helping? The country needs every dollar you can spare. It can use it for national purposes. The Government is urging you to exercise every possible economy. The National Service Board is urging investment in War Savings Certificates. Have you invested in them? Are you still indulging in luxuries? Are you eating peace meals or war meals? Are you taking every possible measure for the utilization and prevention of waste? Have you cut your expenditures to the minimum? If you cannot answer in the affirmative to these questions, you are not doing your utmost to win the

THE FISHERIES COMMISSION

The citizens of Prince Rupert and particularly the independent fishermen engaged in salmon fishing should know that a Fisheries Commission has been appointed by the Dominion Government to investigate fishing conditions in District No. 2, which is the District tributary to Prince Rupert.

After the Prince Rupert delegation had gone to Ottawa and the Government had revised the fishery regulations, upon notice of this revision the British Columbia Salmon Cannery Association petitioned the Fishery Department at Ottawa against the going into effect of those revised regulations and requested the Government to appoint a small commission of independent men to investigate the whole fishing industry and before which both the cannery and fisherman could give evidence. That commission has now been appointed and consists of three members, and it will probably sit at Prince Rupert in the near future and every fisherman who is in favor of the revisions obtained this year should be on hand to give evidence and to see that no report is sent in by this commission recommending the repeal of those concessions.

The B. C. Cannery Association contends:

(a) That with the exception of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company all the head offices of the canning industry are located in Vancouver, Victoria and New Westminster.

(b) That there are too many canneries in the Skeena river, Naas river, Rivers Inlet and other points where canneries are now located, compared with the number of fishing boats permitted. That to limit the number of fishing boats and not to limit the number of canneries is unfair discrimination against the cannerymen. That in the interest of national economy the canneries already built should be running to full capacity before other cannery licences are issued or permitted. They oppose strenuously any contemplated increase in the number of canneries in District number 2.

(c) They claim that there are very few independent fishermen, if any, in District No. 2. That practically all fishermen in this district obtain their boats, nets, houses and supplies of every description from the cannerymen and that salmon canneries are situated far from any land suitable for permanent homes or little farms. They claim that very few, if any, independent fishermen have answered the country's call although every cannery has lost many of its best employees and suggest that the reason is that these fishermen are foreign born and not in sympathy with the Allies.

(d) They oppose the introduction of motor boats because they claim the canneries would have to pay for them at a very great expense and argue that this expenditure should not be forced upon them in times of war.

(e) They protest against the use of food salmon for halibut bait, which they characterize as inferior fish and protest against any invasion of the canneries' right to use for their own purposes the salmon which they have secured.

It is not hard to understand why this monopoly which has made so much money out of this public resource should strive to keep its strangle hold on all the (continued on Page Four.)

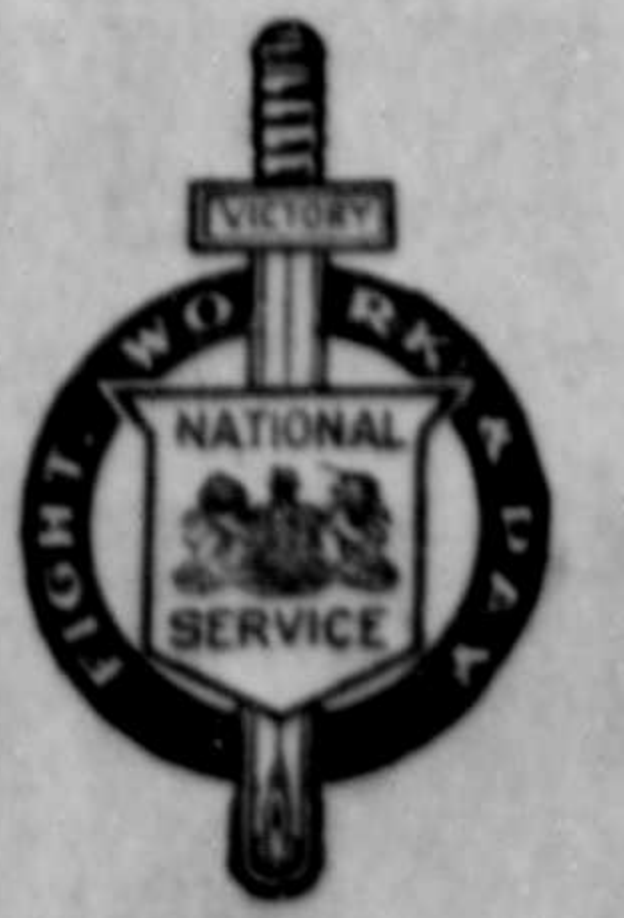

salmon in District No. 2 for their own purposes, and at their own price. It, however, must be apparent to the citizens of Prince Rupert generally that the salmon industry should be on the same basis as the logging industry or the mining industry. The raw materials belong to the country and there should be no restrictions imposed other than such as are necessary to keep up the supply of raw material. It is not a democratic principle to preclude any person from engaging in any proper industry. There should be no attached licences granted to canneries. There should be no limit on the number of canneries. Any British subject wishing to fish in British waters should be entitled to do so subject to such regulations as may be passed by an efficient fisheries administration for the purpose of seeing that the fish are not depleted, and men should be entitled in these waters to use motor boats, as many of these people have homes and ranches on Porcher Island and elsewhere and can go and come from their homes to the fishing grounds in these boats, and can deliver their catches to the cannery paying the highest price.

I believe the citizens of Prince Rupert and the independent fishermen will not tamely permit these rights to be denied them and now is the time to safeguard what you have secured for I have tried to make plain to you that the cannery interests are seeking to hog this plum. If you want them to have it, just keep sitting on the fence. A good man is always ready to fight for his rights; for that is the way our liberties were won.




