

## DOMINION ELECTION EXPECTED THIS FALL

### LOCAL RAIDS CONTINUE ON WESTERN FRONT -- VIGOROUS RUSSIAN OFFENSIVE

#### ELECTION NOW SAID TO BE A CERTAINTY

Political Situation in Ottawa Has Reached a Crisis and an Election This Fall is Very Probable.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Ottawa, July 18.—The political situation here has now reached a crisis, and a Dominion election, probably coming in October, is a certainty, according to reliable sources of information. Both the Liberals and the Conservatives held important caucuses yesterday, but without attaining and definite results. The attitude of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, MacDonald and other Liberals indicates that although they have a different view of the method of introducing the Military Service Bill, the Liberal party is still undivided.

**Extension.**  
The conscription bill will likely be passed by the House this afternoon, and the new franchise bill tomorrow. When these bills are through, the resolution for the extension of the life of Parliament comes up. It is expected that there will be sufficient opposition to this as to make a general election possible.

**Coalition.**  
St. John, Newfoundland, July 18.—A Coalition Government will rule in Newfoundland. The cabinet has been enlarged and the portfolios are equally distributed among representatives of the different parties.

#### SHIPPING BOARD TO SPEND \$750,000,000

Washington, July 17.—The government shipbuilding programme was given a big impetus by an executive order of President Wilson today placing with the United States shipping board the power to commandeer and to spend the \$750,000,000 emergency fleet appropriation.  
Chairman William Denman of the board, who announced receipt of the order, indicated that it was a victory for the wooden ship programme. General George Goethals had hoped to be designated sole authority over the spending of the money, but he was generally regarded as opposed to a large wooden fleet.

#### THE IRISH CONVENTION

Dublin, July 18.—The National convention will assemble on July 15th in the Regent House of Trinity College. The Chief Secretary of Ireland, Mr. H. E. Duke, will preside until the convention chooses its own chairman.

#### REICHSTAG REVOLT GOES ON UNCHECKED

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, July 18.—The Berliner Tageblatt comments bitterly on the method of appointing the new Chancellor, and expresses bitter disappointment with the result of Germany's struggle for parliamentary reform. The peace protagonists will present their proposals on Thursday and will demand their acceptance by Dr. Michaelis, the new Chancellor, before agreeing to co-operate with him. Count von Bernstorff has been appointed German minister to Copenhagen in place of Count Brockdorff Rantzau. The latter may replace Zimmerman as Foreign Secretary. Count von Roeder, the finance minister, replaces Helfferich as Secretary of the Interior. Herr Wahnschaffe, the chief of the Imperial Chancellery, has resigned. The German Crown Prince has returned to the western front.

**Vatican for Peace.**  
Amsterdam, July 18.—The Vatican backs Erzberger in his demand for peace proposals. The movement is shaking the whole fabric of the German Empire. Erzberger is a famous diplomat, and is responsible for the avalanche of public resentment against Prussianism. He was the confidential adviser of Hollweg, and he easily established close relations with the Vatican in Rome. He has worked very skillfully, and forced the Kaiser into a position where compromise was the only way out.

#### DEPORTED BELGIANS INHUMANLY TREATED

Havre, July 17.—The Belgian Government has received from various sources evidence which accords in every detail proving that deported Belgian civilians are subjected systematically to mistreatment to bring them to forced labor for the German army.  
A form of cruelty practiced upon the deported to force them to work is the "supplice of the tank" or a severe application of the Turkish bath. Several witnesses have confirmed this fact, among them the son of a manufacturer of the region of Antwerp, who with several of his comrades was shut up in a small room heated to a very high temperature. There was only one room in the place for them to stand erect, and so crowded they were scarcely able to turn. They were left twenty-four hours. Then they were led to a factory in the neighborhood where they were asked if they would go to work. Upon their refusal they were taken to a field under military escort, divested of their overcoats, shoes, scarfs and hats or caps and exposed in a snowstorm an entire day and night with nothing to eat or drink and under the absolute prohibition to not make the slightest movement. Some of them lost consciousness after a few hours of this exposure and all of them were taken to the hospital the following day.  
A number of witnesses call attention to the fact that frequently groups of deported men have been the subject of a simulated execution, sometimes by a firing squad and sometimes by machine guns, in order to overcome their resistance and impress their comrades.  
Although there is no definite news of the settlement of the strike of the deckhands on the coasting vessels, it was noticed that there were more men at work on the boats on their arrival this morning.

London, July 18.—At a meeting of the Privy Council held today, King George announced that the new name of the Royal House and family will be "the House of Windsor." The German titles by which they were previously known were of "Saxe-Coburg and Gotha" and these will now be dropped.

#### RUSSIAN RESIGNATIONS

Petrograd, July 18.—Three Russian ministers—of Finance, Education and Interior—have resigned as the result of an effort of the Ukraine to establish a separate government. The cabinet is holding a secret session, trying to avert a crisis.

#### DEMANDS REMOVAL OF DUTIES ON FOOD

Ottawa, July 17.—In the Senate Senator Gilmore called the attention of the government to the request of the Canadian food controller that Canadians should eat a third less wheat, beef and bacon, so that a greater quantity of these articles would be available for export and that more food of a perishable nature should be consumed in Canada to save the beef, bacon and wheat.

He said the government would make it easier for the people if they removed the tax on food-stuffs entering this country from the United States. He said that the government could charge to the feeding of troops at the front any loss of revenue that would result from the removal of duty on food entering Canada.

Senator Landry said that the proposal involved a change in the policy of the government; that any reply to it should be well considered.

Sir James Loughheed stated that he would call the attention of the government to the question.

#### CZAR'S INVESTMENT

Petrograd, July 17.—Former Emperor Nicholas has appealed to the Provisional Government to allow him and the members of his family to acquire stock in the "Loan of Freedom."  
The former Emperor announces that the amount of their investment in the loan depends upon whether the Russian state intends to support his family.  
He adds that of his own property he possesses now only 900,000 roubles, about \$450,000, his wife one million roubles, and his heir, Alexief, 1,500,000, his daughter, Olga, 3,000,000 and his other daughters between 1,000,000 and 2,000,000 roubles.

#### THE REPORT OF THE H. C. L. COMMISSIONER

Ottawa, July 17.—The report of Commissioner O'Connor on storage plants of the Dominion was one of the chief sources of discussion in the corridors of parliament today. That portion of the report dealing with the high margins upon bacon especially by the William Davies Co., of which Sir Joseph Flavelle, chairman of the Imperial Munitions Board, is head, has come in for some pretty strong comment.

The Ottawa Journal, the government organ at the capital, has a strong editorial on the report tonight. "At a time," it says, "when high prices are compelling many people to go practically meatless, and when the food controller is appealing to Canadians to cut down their consumption of bacon by one-third, everybody will want to know how it comes that any firm in this country is being enabled to take such a heavy toll of profit out of this article of food. The report reveals a state of things that seems incredible and that certainly calls for prompt and sharp investigation."

**Will Not Stand for It.**  
"The people of Canada are neither Socialists nor anarchists, they do not believe in penalizing enterprise, nor interfering with legitimate profit. Neither, however, are they in a mood just at present to be robbed or to have Britain and her allies robbed by the exploitation of food, and the sooner the food controller or the government gives the public some definite information in regard to this most extraordinary report, the better it will be for everybody concerned."

Mr. O'Connor says:—"In my judgment an unjustifiable profit is being derived from bacon, the sales of which by cold storage companies have increased more than twelve-fold since 1913. The tremendous increase in turnover ought to have resulted, notwithstanding in creased costs in doing business, in a reduction of gross profit instead of an increase and I venture to predict an examination of the books of the companies whose names I shall supply for the purpose, will so establish."

Mr. O'Connor's figures have been challenged both by the Wm. Davies company and the Matthews Blackwell company.

**P. Burns Limited.**  
Mr. Crothers was asked if he had any remarks to make.

"I have every confidence in Mr. O'Connor," was his reply.

Some of the further disclosures of the commissioner are interesting. P. Burns, Ltd., of Calgary, bought 200,000 dozen eggs at six cents a dozen under the market price on the date purchased. The farmers lost on that deal. The firm put the eggs in cold storage and then sold them at ten cents a dozen advance on the price of the day of purchase. The eggs were sold, however, at only one cent advance on the market price on the day of actual sale. But the Burns firm made 16 cents a dozen on the eggs. The consumer suffered, and Mr. O'Connor made this remark:  
"It is not illegal, but it is not respectable."

#### RUSSIA STILL ON OFFENSIVE IN GALICIA

On An Eight Hundred Mile Front Everything is Running Smoothly and Vast Forces Ready.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Petrograd, July 18.—The Russians are continuing a vigorous offensive in Galicia. All the other groups of the Empire's vast forces are apparently ready to spring into activity at the various points on their eight hundred-mile front. Everything appears to be running smoothly.

**Kalusz Evacuated.**  
The army under General Korniloff have evacuated the town of Kalusz in Eastern Galicia, but have secured the crossing of the river Lomnica. The enemy were driven from the village of Novica.

**British Front.**  
London, July 18.—We gained ground slightly during the night to the northwest of Wirenemon. In the Nieupoort sector, our raiding party encountered a large force of the enemy in front of the German positions. After a sharp fight the enemy were driven in.

**German Ships Sunk.**  
Four German ships have been sunk by British destroyers in the North Sea. Four were captured, three stranded and three were forced to return to Rotterdam. The captured range from 1,495 to 1,088 tons gross.

**French Front.**  
Paris, July 18.—The Germans made a strong attack on the French positions in the vicinity of Teton. Their attack was repulsed, and a great number were left dead.

#### HOUSEHOLD WASTE

Those of Great Britain are not and in Canada there is even less household economy than in Great Britain. It is estimated that the average English family spent 25 per cent too much on foodstuffs before the war. The percentage was certainly not lower in the Dominion. Since August, 1914, that waste in expenditure has largely declined but a British writer was forced to say eighteen months after the beginning of hostilities that "the amount of waste which most English households still tolerate is at once the wonder and despair of all visitors who come to us from thrifter countries."

NATIONAL UNITY

Never before in the history of the British Empire and of the Dominion of Canada has there been a greater need of concerted action in all lines of national activity nor a more imperative call for unity in all parts of this vast country.

Viewing the situation from this remote corner of British Columbia, we frankly confess our inability to understand how the persistent attacks which are being hurled by the residents of one province against the residents of another province can in any way produce results which will advance the cause of harmony and unity. At this distance it appears to us that it might be worth while if certain Toronto newspapers would just let up for a while on Quebec and allow the resentment and the hostility to settle down a little. Almost as soon as war broke out, Quebec was assailed for alleged disloyalty and attacks have followed daily for the last three years.

The Toronto paper that six years ago in the reciprocity election of 1911 published a fake lodge notice advertising a meeting of the "Wilfrid Laurier Orange Lodge" of Toronto, so that this ad. could be and was commented upon by the newspapers of the province of Quebec can hardly be expected to be accepted as an authority on what is upright, true and loyal to the best interests of Canada. We would like to see a truce to this internal strife and an attempt made to attain by force of reason and mutual confidence that which can never be reached by bitter attack.

Conscription is now the law of the land, and will apply impartially to all parts of Canada. Quebec may find the enforcement of conscription a great deal less irksome if some of the newspapers of Ontario take day or two off and give Quebec a chance to show what she can do.

The Methodist minister, who was sent to Quebec in charge of recruiting possibly secured many recruits there as a Jesuit priest would have secured in Toronto, had one been sent there for that purpose. Too much energy along a certain line of action in On-

tario is equally dangerous as the lack of energy along another line in Quebec.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Premier has brought into his resolution of which he gave notice some time ago for the extension of the life of the present Parliament for another year. The Borden Government has forfeited the confidence of the majority of the voters in the Dominion, and they are well aware of that fact, hence they do not view with any degree of pleasure their chances at a general election. The ordinary life of Parliament was up a year ago, but with the consent of the Opposition, and in special circumstances, the provisions of the British North America Act were abrogated and one year's extension was granted. But again? Not likely!

As a specimen of how the sentiment of the people have changed, and also of the boys overseas it was stated in Parliament the other day, that a Conservative colonel had taken over with him a regiment of 1,100 good Conservatives. But when he left them there to come over here, they were 1,100 opponents of the present government. The colonel himself said so.

Do the present government deserve an extension? Have they done anything to prevent the dependents of the soldiers overseas being mulcted in excess prices for food stuffs out of their separation allowances? Have they placed the burden of the war cost fairly on all classes of the community? The wage earner and the house wife know. And they both have votes now.

Twenty-two thousand aeroplanes for which the bill passed in the House in Washington should be virtually able to smother the German air service. The great number of machines engaged in war service now makes one wonder what commercial use they will be put to after the war. The idea of a weekend trip to Europe may not be so far-fetched after all.

An ex-minister in the Austrian House declares that Austria-Hungary ought to break their alliance with Germany. This

statement caused an uproar. Austria, of course, is a German State and before the rise of Prussia used to be the head of the German Confederation. There would not be, so much uproar in the Bohemian House, if there were one, nor in the Hungarian. Nor yet the Bulgarian nor Turkish. What the minority thinks today, the majority think tomorrow.

The quietness which has prevailed on the British front for the last few days may be taken to be ominous for Germany. Nothing but local raids have been reported for some time now. With most of the points of vantage on the western front in the hands of the Allies, the German High Command will be guessing where the next blow will fall.

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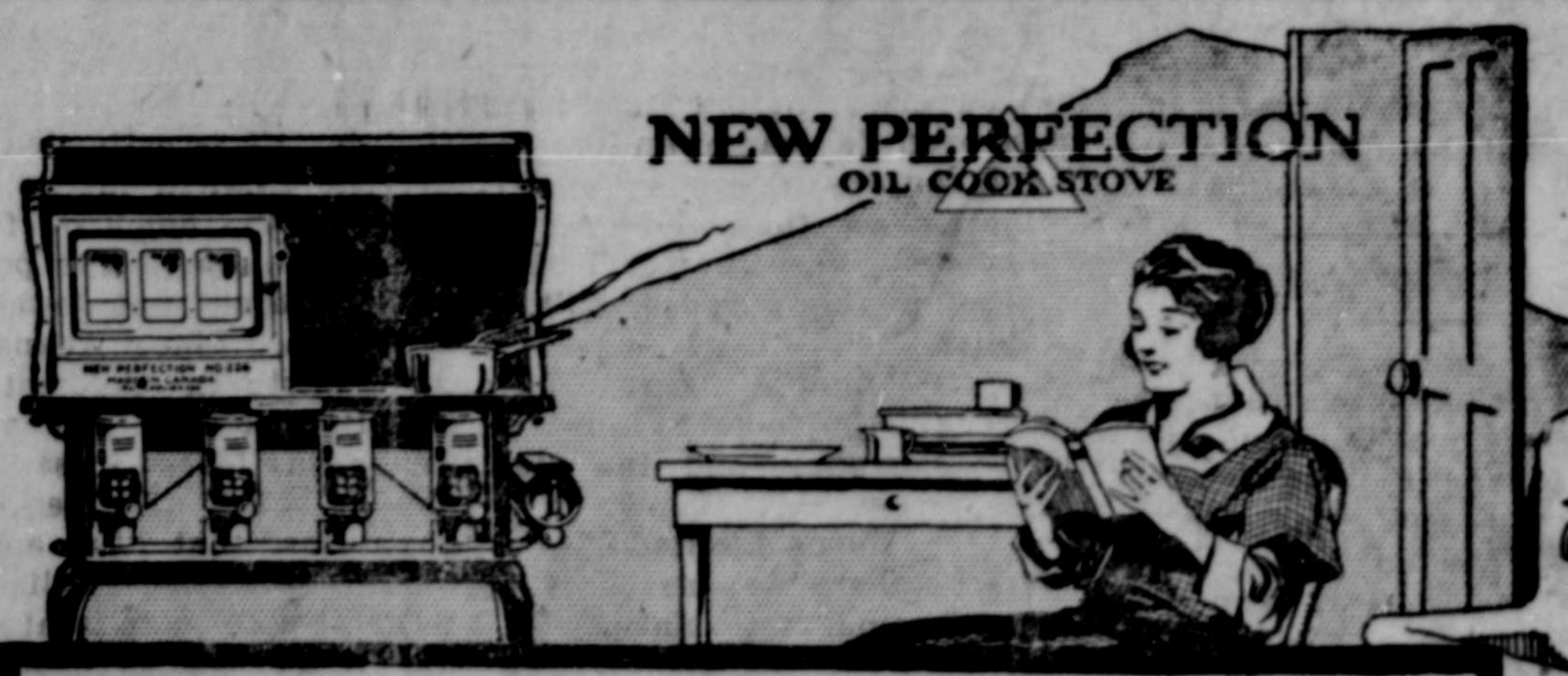

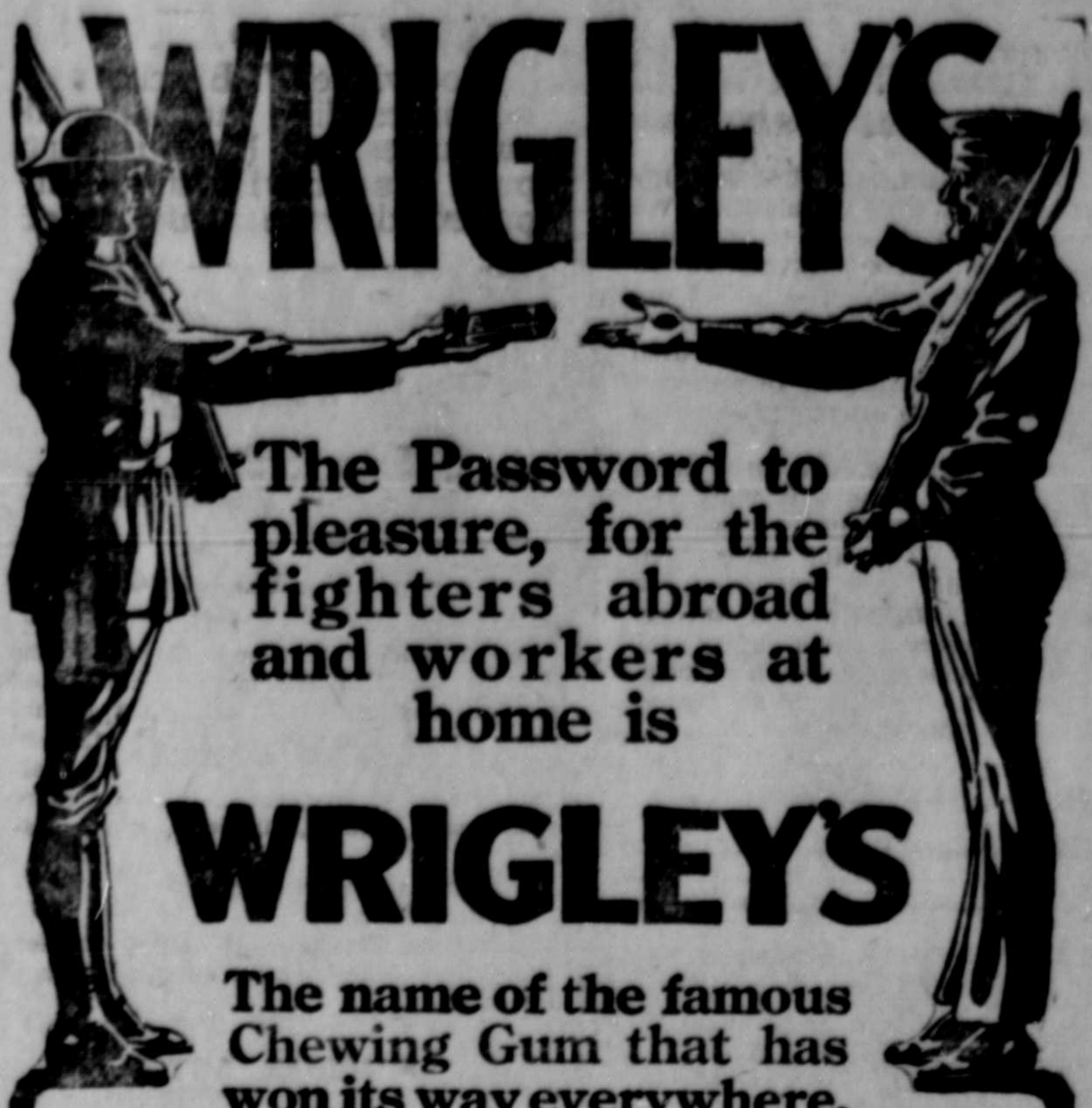

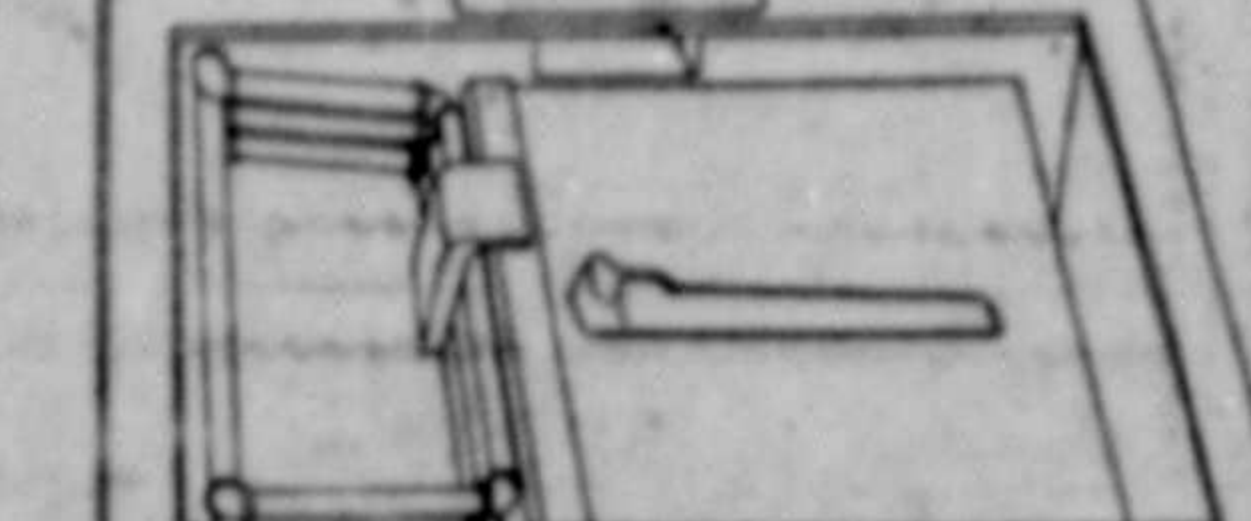
