THE VOTE FOR EXTENSION NOT UNANIMOUS

FIGHTING FURIOUS ON VERDUN FRONT AND NIEUPOORT -- ACTIONS IN GALICIA

THE CROWN PRINCE IS STILL HAMMERING AT VERDUN LINE

SEVERAL COUNTER ATTACKS MADE DURING NIGHT BY THE GERMANS FAIL AND ATTACKING WAVES LOST HEAVILY -- TO THE NORTH THE BRITISH FRONT IS AGAIN LIVELY -- RUSSIANS FIGHTING HARD

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, July 19.—After heavy shelling, the Germans counter-attacked several times during the night on the Verdun sector, but failed to regain a particle of the ground captured by the French yesterday. The Germans bombarded the Verdun positions violently through the night, before they sent their attacking waves against the new line formed by General Petain's men. The enemy lost heavily, and gained nothing. A violent artillery battle is in progress around Cerny. In the Argonne, German raids were repulsed. The Crown Prince is again back where he started more than a year ago, when he set out to try to take Verdun.

The official Gazette in recording the deed for which Major MacDowell won the Victoria Cross says: "This officer, by his initiative and courage, with the assistance of two others, was enabled in the face of great difficulties, to capture two machine guns, besides two officers and 75 men, though wounded in the hand. He continued for five days to hold the position until relieved by his battalion."

HOME RULE IN RUSSIA

Petrograd, July 19.—Russia is in the throes of a "Home Rule" fight which today assumed an importance second only to the war. This is the direct cause of the split in the Russian cabinet. Ukraine, Finland, and Kronstadt, are each seeking home rule, but not independence. The movement is likely to spread to other parts of the country, where a similar agitation has been in progress for some time.

SING IS COY

NEW CHANCELLOR TO DECLARE HIS POLICY

(Special to The Daily News.)
Amsterdam, July 19.—The Reichstag has been summoned for today. Munich newspapers say that the Chancellor's declaration in the Reichstag will be for peace on the general lines of the last resolution. It is expected that Rudenorf will become the military director of Germany. In other quarters it is thought that the new German Chancellor is unlikely to advance any change from the policy of Hollweg. He is more likely to appeal for domestic unity as a warning to the entente. The Socialists are still talking of reforms and peace formula. Count Reventlow thinks that Bernstorff is impossible as foreign minister.

CITY OF DUSSELDORF IN A STATE OF SIEGE

(Special to The Daily News.)
Copenhagen, July 19.—Advices received from Dusseldorf say that a state of siege exists there, as a result of prolonged food riots. Sentences averaging eighteen months were inflicted upon one hundred and eighty-five people, after the troops had cleared the streets and "pacified" the city.

At Bielefeld, the centre of the Westphalian linen industry twelve thousand workmen attended a meeting and adopted a resolution demanding peace without annexations or indemnities. They asked the Reichstag only to support a government making unequivocal declarations along these lines.

FISH ARRIVALS

Yesterday's arrivals of halibut fishing boats were the Sterling M. with 25,000 pounds, and the Cora with 12,000 pounds. The price realized was 10% cents. The Panama also came in with 35,000 pounds, but left later for Seattle. The Alliance also came in with 27,000 lbs. salmon from Hippo Island. Today's arrivals are the Aurora with 9,000 lbs.; Elfin, 9,000; Stranger, 11,000; Mars, 20,000; Agnes B., 12,000; Joe Baker, 14,000; Mermaid, 2,000; Soya, 7,000; Norman, 16,000. Bidding was still in progress at time of writing.

CHANGES IN THE BRITISH CABINET

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, July 19.—Sir Edward Carson has relinquished his post as First Lord of the Admiralty. He has joined the war cabinet without a portfolio. Sir Eric Campbell Geddes, recently director of munitions supply department, will be his successor. Winston Churchill succeeds Dr. Addison as minister of munitions. Dr. Addison will become minister without portfolio, of reconstruction. Edwin Samuel Montague is made Secretary of State for India.

RUSSIAN DECREE WILL HELP JEWS

New York, July 18.—"Of great importance to millions of Jews throughout the world," says the New York Herald, "is an announcement by the Russian Provisional Government that the religious restrictions under the old autocracy have been repealed. All those laws which have made the lot of the Jews so burdensome have been sought out and not a single one of them left in force under the new decree."

"The text of the Governmental decree, received by the American Jewish Chronicle and published in that paper, is in part: "Being conclusively convinced that in a free country all questions should be of equality before the law, and that the conscience of the people cannot be reconciled with limitations on the rights of citizens based on their religion and origin, the Provisional Government decrees: All existing legal restrictions upon the rights of Russian citizens in connection with this or that fact, religious, teaching or nationality, are revoked."

"Paragraph ten of the decree says: "This decree shall be in force from the date of its publication."

GERMANS DEPORT POLES

Copenhagen, July 18.—According to news reaching here from Germany, Polish members of the Reichstag have interpellated von Bethmann-Hollweg about the deportation of thousands of Polish men and women to Germany, where they are compelled to labor. The interpellation says this proceeding, which in the case of the Belgians is generally recognized as contrary to international law, continues, and now troops are employed forcibly to drag victims from their homes.

GOOD PROSPECTS FOR THE INTERIOR COUNTRY

Mr. F. H. Mobley, M. L. A., has just returned from a trip through the interior of the province and reports conditions very favorable for a bumper crop through the Bulkley and Nechaco Valleys. The Vanderhoof district is particularly promising for all classes of products, wheat, oats, barley and potatoes are all looking fine. Owing to the shortage of crops in this section last year seed grain and potatoes were very scarce and there were many expressions of gratitude toward the Government for having assisted the farmers in the way of supplying seed last spring.

A great many new settlers are coming into the country and general activity is in evidence all over.

Beyond Prince George and eastward along the line of the Grand Trunk great activity is shown in the timber industries. At Giscome a very large mill is just nearing completion and between there and the Alberta boundary there are ten or a dozen more sawmills either operating or under construction and as the present demand for lumber is great, a nice margin of profit is realized and no trouble experienced in disposing of the output. Owing to a shortage of suitable labor many of the mills are not able to run and operate to their fullest capacity.

FINANCIAL RECRUITS

The Canadian Divisions have their firing, support and reserve lines in France. Their financial line is in Canada. It needs recruits. It is a commonplace statement that the war will not be won on the battlefields alone. The whole resources of the Allies are essential to victory. The whole resources of the Dominion must be utilized for the war if the country is to be worthy of the men who have fought for it in the bloody salient, on the Somme and at Vimy Ridge. The National Service Board is calling you to the financial line. The monetary burdens of the Dominion are increasing every day. Your assistance is necessary. The men in the firing trenches are fighting for you. You are needed in the financial trenches to fight for them. The Dominion needs your dollars. It offers you a safe and attractive investment by the purchase of War Savings Certificates. You cannot plead that there is no form of national service open to you. Your financial duty is imperative. Your savings are needed by your country.

MAJORITY FOR EXTENSION VERY SMALL

Only a Majority of Twenty Passed The Resolution for an Extension of the Life of Parliament.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, July 19.—The vote on the resolution of the Premier for another year's extension of the life of Parliament was taken yesterday. With one hundred and forty-four members present, the majority for an extension was but twenty. An election in the near future is now certain as the Premier would only look to London to have the provisions of the British North America Act abrogated again with a unanimous House behind him.

Mr. Geo. P. Graham was anxious to make big incomes pay bigger shares. Sir Wilfrid Laurier quoted the Hon. Robert Rogers who said that an election was necessary. The election is not likely to take place before the middle of November, as many important legislative acts will probably be squared away before the cabinet will leave the capital to go on the hustings. All the indications point to the introduction of an income tax soon.

FOOD CONTROLLER MAY NOW GET POWER TO ACT

Ottawa, July 18.—The Ottawa Journal-Press, dealing with the report presented by W. F. O'Connor on the cold storage conditions in Canada and the enormous profits made by two packing companies, says that in all probability drastic action will be taken in connection with the matter.

"It is understood," says the paper, "that action will be taken to demand for the public treasury the immense profits made out of the war work of the country when soldiers and civilians had to be fed. Following the report made by Mr. O'Connor on Wednesday that in certain articles of food the huge supplies held in cold storage plants were unjustifiable, there is little doubt that Parliament will not be allowed to dissolve before the impossibility of the like happening again will be provided for."

In parliamentary circles it is believed that Mr. Hanna, Dominion Food Controller, will be given authority, if he does not already possess it, to deal effectively with the situation as revealed in Mr. O'Connor's report.

GERMANY LAYS OUT HER COAL STEAMERS

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, July 19.—The allegation is made by certain Dutch newspapers that the encounter on Monday between British and German merchantmen occurred in part in Dutch territorial waters. This statement is generally discredited here in naval circles. No official report has yet been received.

REVELATIONS

The report of the cost of living commissioner has produced a great wave of disgust all over the country. Everyone knows that the price of foodstuffs has gone away up out of proportion to the costs of production. The farmer who produces the food in the first place did not get the increase. This report shows that the profits of the two leading companies in the food combine in the one article of bacon alone in the year 1916 totalled \$6,500,000; \$5,000,000 for the one and \$1,500,000 for the other.

Those two companies handled 140,000,000 pounds out of the 151,000,000 pounds sold by all the cold storage dealers in Canada, the business of the Flavell company alone accounting for 100,000,000 lbs. The total Canadian export of bacon was 169,000,000 pounds, to which the company headed by Sir Joseph Flavell contributed 95,000,000 lbs. The margin of profit was 5.05 cents per pound, an increase of 1.38 cents per pound, or nearly 38 per cent. over the profit of 1915, which in the case of this company alone in that year amounted to \$2,200,000. The Flavell company operates eighty stores and the other one to which special reference is made, forty.

It is hardly necessary to say that the enormous increase in the bacon business of these two companies from 1914 to 1916 was due to war orders. In 1914 their output in this commodity was 23,000,000 lbs., the profits averaging a little over three cents per pound. This jumped to 90,000,000 lbs. in 1915, when the margin of profit was 3.67 cents. In the next year, as already stated, the business amounted to 140,000,000 pounds, with an equally large increase in the price.

The commissioner points out that there is no evidence of correspondingly increased storage or other costs. "Possibly," he says, "no more striking example of a monopoly of any one commodity can be cited from the records of any country supplying the Allies with food." It is a clear case of food profiteering on a gigantic scale; of greed fatten-

ing on the agony of the country for the cause of which brave men are dying and suffering on the battlefield in thousands.

But bacon is only one of numerous commodities controlled by this combine. According to the cost of living commissioner the trust also made a good thing out of eggs. We may assume that it lost nothing on any of its other products. The bacon figures show that it is not troubled by qualms of conscience. It would be doubly interesting and instructive to learn what its aggregate profits were, what it actually made out of the dire emergency of the country in which it flourishes and its allies.

"And how much did the treasury of Canada receive out of those millions of super-profits?" is very pertinently asked by the Victoria Times. "How much did that war tax of Sir Thomas White's take from the company of his friend and political ally, that staunch bulwark of Toronto Toryism, Sir Joseph Flavell?"

It continues: "W. S. Middleboro, one of the Ontario members, read a list in Parliament the other day to show how 'drastically' the finance minister was dealing with profiteers, so drastically, in fact, that he feared the Government's course might injure our poor, little 'infant industries.' He showed that the company of which Sir Joseph Flavell is the head contributed \$109,000 from its profits for the year ending March, 1915, and said that on that basis the company in 1917 would pay \$265,485. Think of it! A little over a quarter of a million dollars out of a profit which in bacon alone was \$5,000,000 in the year 1916!

"A more striking example of a monopoly of any one commodity cannot be cited from the records of any country supplying the Allies with food," says the Commissioner. What reproach and humiliation are embodied in that revelation, what a stigma upon this country's reputation, already tarnished before the world by uncontrolled greed and corruption! Do these food speculators and war profiteers know



what is meant by the call to sacrifice? Have they no soul above profits? Has gross materialism deadened them altogether to the instincts of true patriotism? And what of the Government? It was placed in power by the interests in which Sir Joseph Flavell and his confederates are the shining lights. Sir Thomas White is the special champion of trusts and combines. What relief can be expected from those politicians who, even while they talked glibly of National Service, thrift and economy, higher patriotism and so forth, must have known of the orgy of profiteering that was going on, for through their influence the meat combine entered upon its picnic? Was it for this that the head of the meat trust was made Chairman of the Munitions Board and then a baronet?

U. S. HAVE A NEW TYPE OF SUPPLY SHIP

Paris, July 17.—The special correspondent of "Le Journal," who has paid a visit to one of the first American vessels of a new type which have just arrived at a French port, writes:—The "J" is not, properly speaking, a ship of war. Our Allies have baptised the type "full ship," and its construction is due to the belief that it is indispensable for squadrons far from their base to be accompanied by vessels capable of furnishing them, when at sea, before, during, and after a battle, with all the supplies they need—life-saving apparatus, food, coal, and parts for repairs. Their powerful wireless telegraph installation enables them to send out long-distance calls. The means of propulsion is a novelty, and very considerable speed can be obtained. Their strong armament renders them capable of defending themselves vigorously against a sudden attack. On deck are numerous electric cranes pivoting on turntables, permitting of the speediest loading or unloading of stores or war material.—Reuter.

BONAR LAW TELLS OF SHIPPING PROFITS

In a recent discussion in the British House of Commons on the clauses of the Finance Bill, raising the excess profits duty to 80 per cent, and differentiating against shipping, Mr. Bonar Law, while attributing no blame whatever to shipowners, mentioned as proof of their enormous profits his own experience. He had invested £8,110 in 15 different shipping companies under the management of seven different owners. A 5 per cent profit, which he would have been glad to get in ordinary times, would have given him £405. He actually received £3624 for 1915 and £3,847 for 1916 after excess profits had been paid. One of these steamers had been sunk. He had £300 in it, and after these handsome dividends he had received £1,000 in compensation.

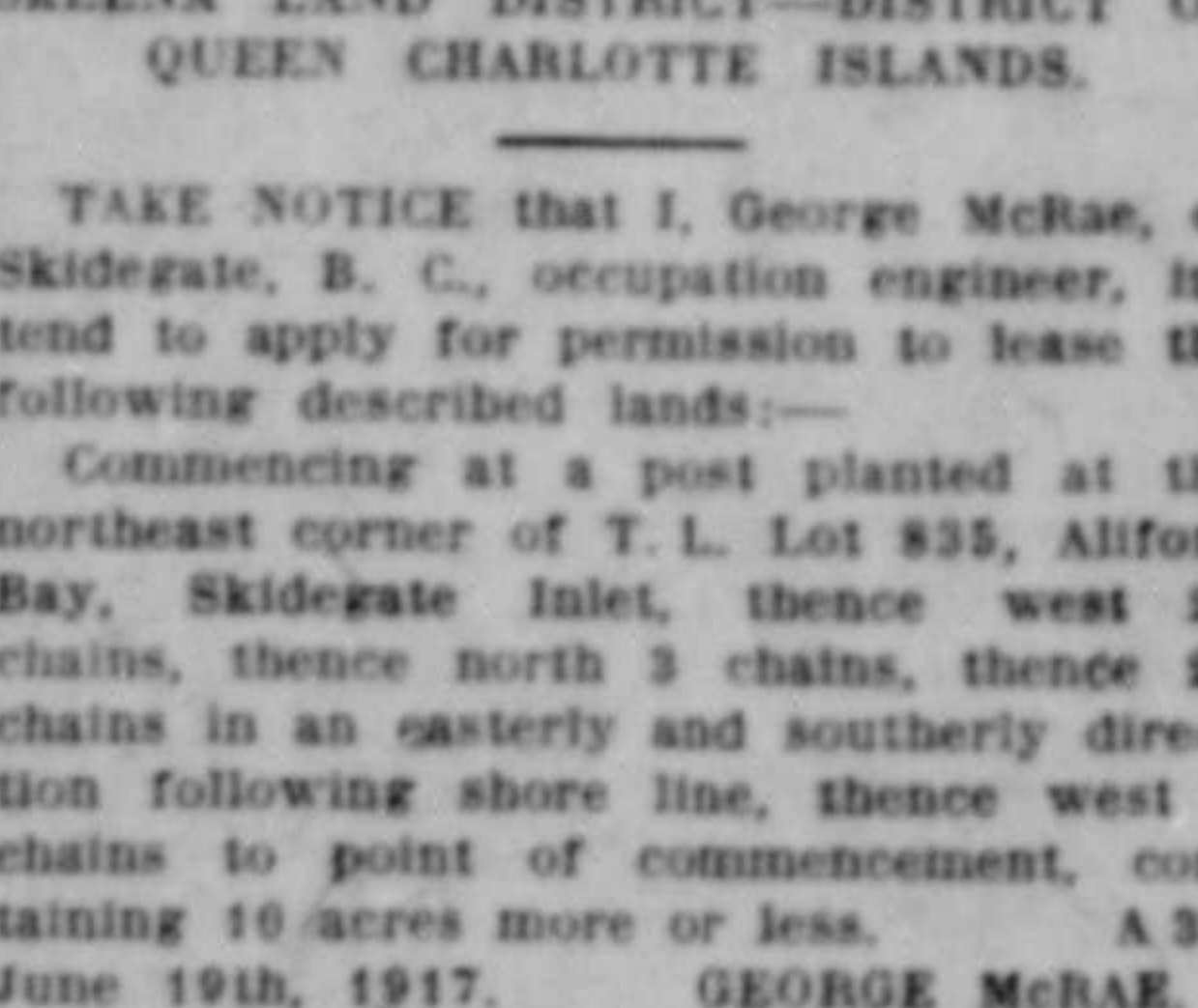
