CHANCELLOR MAKES LAST PEACE OFFER

"TRUSTS IN GOD AND GERMAN MIGHT"---GERMANY DESIRES PEACE AS A VICTOR

RUSSIANS DISCUSS OBEYING WHILE GERMANS ADVANCE

EXTREMISTS AMONG THE RUSSIAN TROOPS HOLD MEETING ON THE FRONT LINE TO DISCUSS OBEYING OF ORDERS WHILE AUSTRO-GERMAN FORCES ADVANCE AND CAPTURE THEIR POSITIONS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Berlin, July 21.—We pushed forward through three strong zones of Russian defences between the Sereth and the Zlota Lipa rivers in Galicia. We took a few thousand prisoners. The Russians are retreating in great disorder.

The Reason.

Petrograd, July 21.—Our failure to hold the enemy in Galicia was due to the Extremist detachments holding a meeting at the front, and discussing whether orders should be obeyed or not.

Quiet Restored.

Washington, July 21.—Dispatches from Petrograd state that quiet has now been restored in Petrograd. The Cabinet will be reconstructed on the same basis as before the crisis.

French Official.

Paris, July 21.—The Germans made a general attack last night on the whole sector of the Aisne front from Craonne to Vaux-clerc. The French troops withstood the shock and maintained their positions everywhere.

British Front.

London, July 21.—Both British and German reports agree on the extent of the artillery activity in northern Flanders. The sound of guns is plainly audible in London. Possible developments in that section are looked for by many. The British are firing six shells for the Germans' one.

French Front.

The French success on Hill 304 turned out to be a veritable body blow. The Germans launched a strategic attack south of St. Quentin, gaining a foothold on half a mile along Erulin les Tous Tente.

Mesopotamia.

British operations meet with further success. An advance of twelve miles up the Euphrates was made, during the last ten days.

HUNS FORCED VAULTS AND STOLE THE MONEY

Geneva, July 19.—A French lawyer who is interned at Geneva, received news today through an indirect route from a banker friend at St. Quentin, to the effect the Germans recently forced the safes of all the banks in St. Quentin and stole the contents in money, notes and scrip and even the private account books which were sent to Germany.

The operation was carried out before the eyes of the bank directors and employees, who refused to open the safes.

There were two cases at the police court this morning. One drunk was fined \$15 and another man was fined \$5 for fighting.

London, July 20.—During the King's recent visit to Vimy Ridge, says the Times' correspondent, what most engaged his attention were the scattered graves with which the ridge is dotted. Whenever a cross marked the resting place of a soldier, the King went to inspect it.

Before one grave "to an unknown Canadian," he stood for a minute. "It is hard that any one of these fellows—should be unknown," he said. "The world ought to know every one of them."

More than once he expressed appreciation of the careful and reverent way the dead are buried.

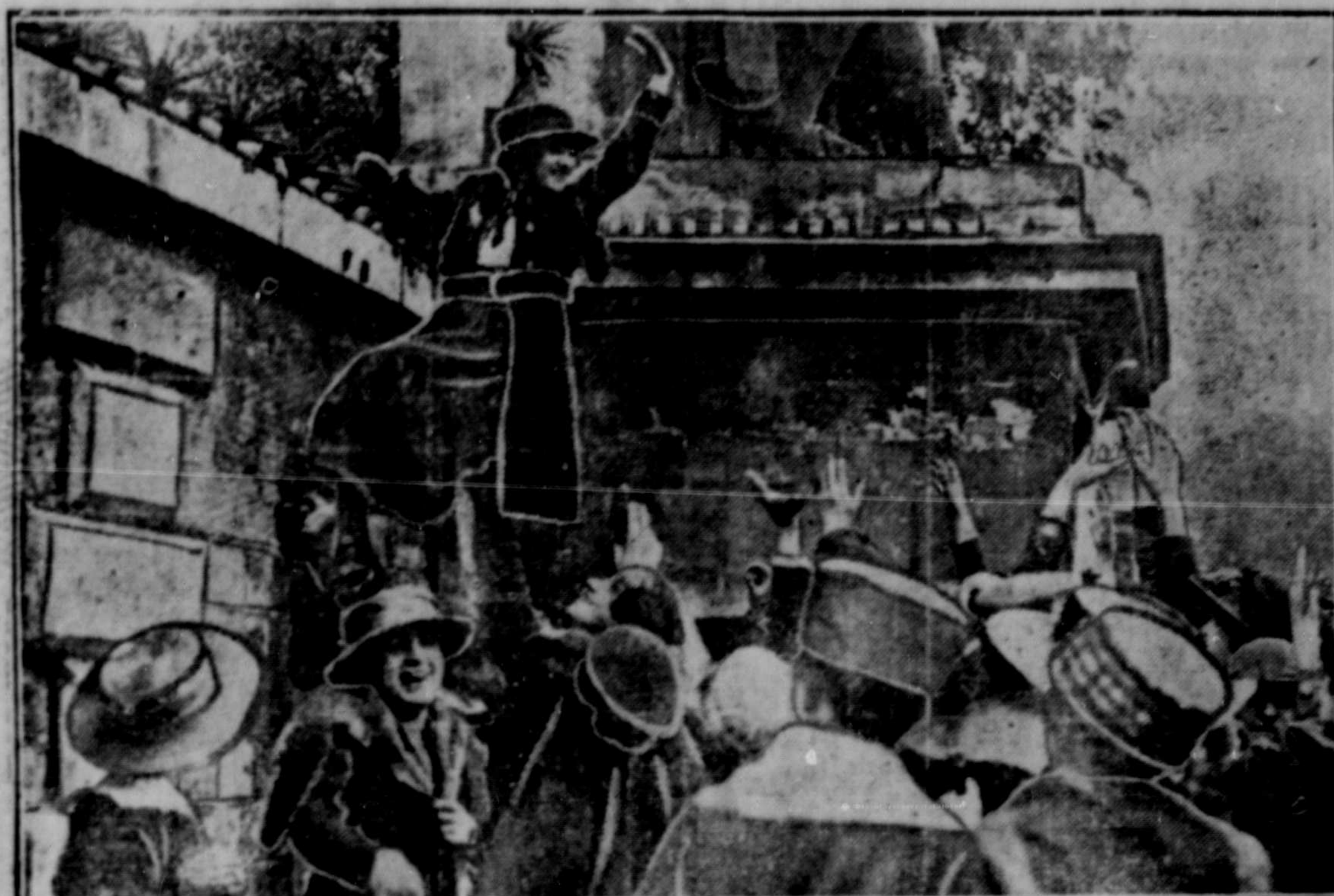

Five thousand of them walked out. Women tailors, glove makers, and even bank clerks took part.

WILL THEY CONSIDER THE PACIFIC RED COD?

Ottawa, July 20.—Practical steps are being taken by Hon. W. J. Hanna, Food Controller, to relieve the food shortage of Great Britain and our allies and to increase the food supplies of the Dominion.

A special committee, national in scope, has been appointed to deal with the Canadian fish problem. Its first business will be to report on the feasibility of providing an ample supply of fresh-water fish at reasonable prices, while giving legitimate returns to the fishermen.

The subject will be carefully considered and plans properly matured before action is taken. As the committee goes farther afield in its work it may add to its numbers. The initial members are: Mr. G. Frank Beer and Mr. R. Y. Eaton of Toronto, and Mr. F. S. Wiley of Port Arthur. Each man is possessed of special qualifications for the work. Mr. Beer has given much attention to social questions, and has been active in improving living conditions. As a close student of political economy he has devoted much time to the fish problem. He is Chairman of the Toronto Housing Commission and Secretary of the Toronto & Hamilton Highway Commission on unemployment, appointed by the Ontario Government.

Mr. R. Y. Eaton, who is a member of the firm of The T. Eaton Company, Limited, Toronto, is an expert on transportation rates and storage problems generally. He has practical knowledge of the problems that will be involved in marketing fish.

Mr. F. S. Wiley is a practical fisherman. He has been engaged all his life in the business, and is familiar with the whole process of the fish industry from the standpoint of the fisherman and the handler.

THE DRAWING FOR THE UNITED STATES ARMY

MINING DEVELOPMENT ON LEGATE CREEK

Now that the snow is getting off, development work on several of the properties is under way, the results to date being most encouraging. Bell, Moore & McCarty have exposed the lead on their "M & M" group the entire distance of three claims, averaging in width from one to one and a half feet, and for a short distance widening out to seven feet. This is a high-grade silver-lead property, located about a year ago, and from which several assays have shown it to carry silver around 250 ounces per ton. Jack Burns has been at work on his "Jumbo" claim, which has a fine chalcopyrite showing. As soon as the snow is sufficiently gone from his Rountop claim he is going to do development work. This latter is a high-grade copper-silver-lead ore from which assays have been obtained around \$300 per ton.

Brown, Jones & Jensen are preparing to work on their Pacific Group, a high-grade silver lead from which they hope to ship very shortly.

Whitmore & Orr are busy on their M. & K. Group and report things looking exceedingly well. The government have now completed the trail from Pacific to the forks of Legate creek, a distance of about fourteen miles, and it is now in fine shape for packing over.

THE FISHING RIGHTS OF THE INDIANS

It is hard to conceive of any greater abuse of powers that are now exercised by the Dominion Government through the Fisheries Department in connection with the Indian. At the present time no Indian has the right to hold a license to fish except an attached license through some cannery, and the only place that these Indians can fish for themselves is on a few Indian reserves. Surely all people the Indian should be entitled to fish where he likes, subject to proper regulations for the protection of the fish, and should be entitled to sell his fish to the highest bidder. At the present time these people who deserve so much consideration at our hands are placed in the position of being bound like slaves to canneries who procure from Ottawa the licenses under which they exercise this unreasonable power.

RUSSIAN SOLDIERS EAGER TO FIGHT

London, July 20.—The correspondent of the London Times at headquarters of the southwestern Russian armies cables via Petrograd:

"The most gratifying feature has been the failure of the Germans to checkmate the strength of the Russian army and dispose their forces successfully. The enemy's high command unquestionably is below the usual high water mark."

"The Russian plan has revealed the intensity of the operations west of Tarnopol, which apparently centred upon the capture of Brzezany, Konieczny woods and a substantial flank movement on our right. The operations in the forests are such that the troops, whose discipline has been shaken by the revolutionary movement, are handicapped in an unexpected fashion. The men are too eager. They do not obey the command to stay and outmanoeuvre their flanking supports. When the Germans countered we lost ground which we had quickly gained. This happened in the Brzezany wood and the wood northwest of Kohulp. The enormous majority of the troops, however, behaved with the greatest gallantry. The self-sacrificing example of the commanding officers and subalterns greatly inspired the men. The delegates of the army's committees heroically march at the head of the attacking waves."

"Our success has so greatly stimulated the ardor of the troops in the rear that large reinforcements are coming up to continue the good work."

"The Germans appear much alarmed. They are rushing reserves to one point after another, and are transferring some from France. A soldier among those taken prisoner by a machine gun section declared he had left Arras last Thursday morning and arrived here on Friday night, going straight into action."

"All the Austrian positions are exceedingly strong, with concrete machine gun emplacements. Our artillery has done efficient work."

THE CHANCELLOR WANTS AN HONORABLE PEACE

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 21.—In the Reichstag, the new Chancellor, Dr. Michaelis, said that Germany would not continue the war a day longer if she could secure an honorable peace. He stated that the intervention of the United States was not considered with any serious concern by the Government. Germany still pinned their faith to the U-boats, and implicitly believed that they will yet master the situation.

The Reichstag adjusted the majority of the parties on the peace resolution by 215 to 116. Seventeen members not voting. This resolution declares against indemnities, and says annexations are incompatible with a durable international peace.

The Last Offer.

Amsterdam, July 21.—"Germany will not make another peace offer. The peace she desires to conclude is that of victor, and it is the Allies who must hereafter make overtures to end the war." This was the challenge flung to the world by the new Chancellor in his maiden speech yesterday. "We cannot again offer peace. If our enemies abandon their lust of conquest and their aims of subjugation, and wish to negotiate, we will listen honestly and be ready for peace. Until then we must hold our, calmly, patiently, and courageously."

Not Concerned.

"We are not seriously concerned in America's intervention in France. England is scarcely able to feed and supply her own army without influencing her military and economic situation."

The Chancellor made a vigorous defence of the German policy of unlimited submarine warfare, declaring it lawful and justifiable, since it was a measure to shorten the war, and because it was in reprisal for England's illegal blockade. He paid a high compliment to Hollweg. "When the history of the war is told, all will appreciate what Hollweg's chancellorship meant for the enemy."

The Chancellor expressed realization of the tasks confronting him. He said he had taken office "trusting in God and German might." "Our aims first are the territory of the Fatherland to be inviolable. We cannot parley with an enemy demanding parts of our Empire. If we make a peace, we must be assured that our frontiers will be made secure for all time."

Peace.

"Peace must build a foundation for a lasting reconciliation of the nations, and must prevent them from plunging into further enmity, through economic blockades. It must provide safeguards that a league of our opponents does not develop into a economic offensive against us."

"You cannot expect me, after only five days in office, to express my views exhaustively and finally on questions of internal policy."

He approved of the Imperial rescript for the Prussian franchise reform.

Scheidtmann, speaking immediately following Dr. Michaelis, complained of the Chancellor's vague words as to internal affairs. He was opposed to the submarine policy, declaring that it did more harm than good.

FISHERIES

At the enquiry held in Vancouver, when the Royal Commission appointed by the Dominion Government were making their enquiry the other day, regret was expressed by Professor Prince, who is one of the Commissioners, that greater attention was not given to the many other varieties of fish which abound on this coast. The marketing of these numerous kinds has been neglected, while halibut and salmon have practically been the only two varieties which the people engaged in the trade would handle. The professor voiced his fear that there might be a danger of halibut and salmon being fished out.

The neglect of these other edible fishes, such as black cod, red cod, flounders, etc., to put in mildly, in times like these is little short of criminal. Foodstuffs all over the world at the present moment is scarce. And consequently high in price. Were a greater supply of fish available all over Canada, the first effect would be to lower the demand for beef and other meat products. Which, in turn, would tend to lessen the price.

The Fishery Exploration officer's report for last year carries the observation that "the generality of the people not engaged in the fishing industry no doubt are under the impression that no other fish save halibut and salmon exist on the Pacific coast." He characterized as "wastefulness" the casting back into the water the thousands of tons of these fine varieties which the fishermen cannot dispose of, particularly at a time when people in Vancouver were being fed by public subscription.

More particularly at the present time, it would seem as if the fisheries of British Columbia ought to play a greater part in the supplying of foodstuffs for the people of the Dominion. These foodstuffs are here, and being wasted absolutely in huge quantities. Our fisheries are an asset to the Dominion, and a vital one, and with foodstuffs generally high in price as at present, it is a matter for

Government intervention to see that such waste stops.

Economy is the watchword which the Government is passing on to the housewives of Canada, yet this great waste has been going on for years. The full facts are contained in the report of the Fishery Exploration officer, and are in the possession of the Government. This report was published. If the Government are going to practice what they preach, it is high time that they took cognizance of the facts as they are.

This is a case of public need, and the utilization of this food need not injure in any way the already established fishing industry. To the contrary.

Now that Professor Prince has taken notice of the conditions it is possible that more may come of the matter. Whether such a matter would come under the scope of this commission is hard to say, as its appointment is primarily to investigate into the regulations. But whether or not, a report from them might reach the Food Controller.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The spirit of democracy has taken a firm hold in Russia. Even now in the midst of war, three of her provinces are seeking for "Home Rule." The people of Finland, of the Ukraine, and of Kronstadt want to govern themselves. They contend that the country is too large to be administered directly from the capital. They may yet call themselves the "United States of Russia."

The appointment of Dr. Addison as the Minister of Reconstruction in Great Britain marks another addition to the British Cabinet. In the transition period from the state of war to the conditions of peace, very many problems will come up to the Minister of Reconstruction. The reabsorption of the millions of fighting men back again into civil life can not be accomplished all at once. In the first place, the industries are largely employing women, for work hitherto done by the men. A great number of these women will want to remain on at the work they have got accustomed to. If so, they cannot be dis-



placed. And men who have been at the front for three years at a shilling a day, cannot be too well situated to tide themselves over any extended period without work. This will be the great problem for the new minister to solve and there will be many more arising out of it.

German workmen to the number of twelve thousand passed a resolution lately demanding peace without annexations or indemnities. This may be taken to be the attitude of the majority of the working men in Germany, judging from the reports from various other parts of that country. Such an idea is at direct variance with that of the late Chancellor, who spoke for the Cabinet and Kaiser.

HOW, INDEED?

Zurich, July 19.—"How are we to obtain peace," demanded Herr Praschek in the Austrian Reichsrat, "if we cling to the German side? Must we continue to sacrifice our interests to the expansion of Germany? Must we continue to submit to the German militarism that has drawn us into this war?"

The speaker declared that Czech deputies had been imprisoned for attempting to bring about an alliance of Austria with Russia and France, and added that if they were to be stigmatized as traitors, then all Czechs who believed similarly should be so stigmatized.

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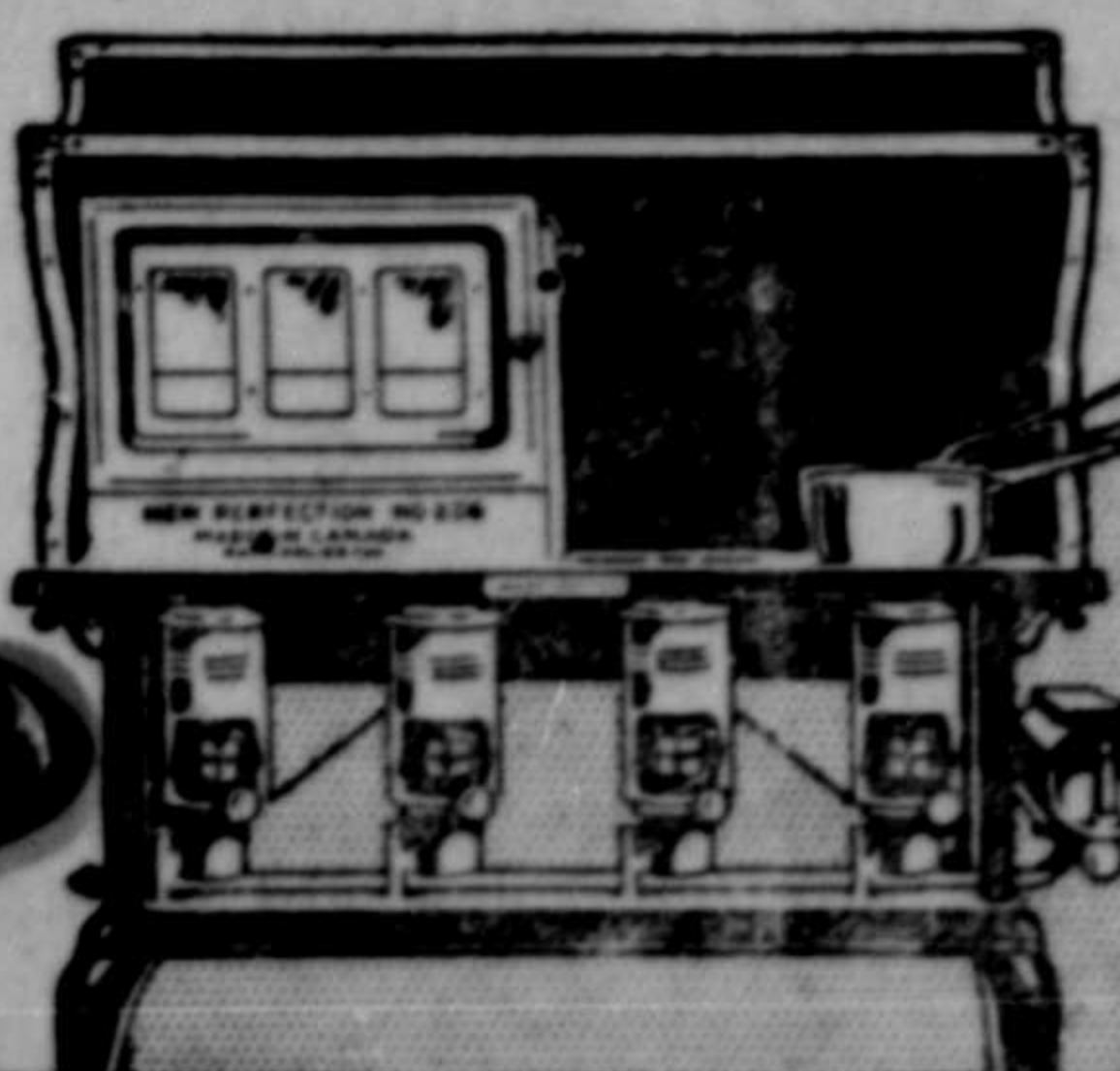

GERMAN TORPEDO SUPPLY WEAKENING

Washington, July 19.—There is reason to believe that the German torpedo supply is weakening, says a statement issued at the headquarters of the Navy League here.

The increasing frequency with which press dispatches report merchant ships as successfully dodging German torpedoes, says the statement, suggests to the technically trained mind that the German torpedo is deteriorating in speed, and hence in accuracy of fire at long range.

At the outset, the statement continues, the Germans were extremely careful to conserve their torpedoes. Merchant ships were sunk by gunfire whenever possible. But the arming of merchant ships and the constant improvement in the Allies' system of defence against submarine attack has driven the submarine under the water and they are now forced to use torpedoes in almost every attack. The increase in the number of submarines has further added to the strain upon the German stock of torpedoes.

U-Boat Warfare Weakens.
An analysis of reports on submarine attacks now indicates that this unprecedented expenditure of torpedoes is beginning to tell upon the effectiveness of the U-boat warfare. The Germans are pressing their submarine campaign with all possible vigor and the number of attacks on merchant ships appears to be increasing. Also the zone of submarine operations is constantly widening. Yet this increased fury with which the U-boat warfare is being waged has failed to increase the number of merchant ships sunk. The Germans apparently are being forced to constantly greater efforts to maintain their average of sinkings and even so are slipping back slightly.

The explanation of this offered by certain naval experts here is that the Germans are being so pressed for time in the construction of torpedoes that they can no longer maintain their speed and their accuracy of fire. It is estimated that the German torpedo has lost nearly ten knots in speed from the standard torpedo used at the outset of the war.

Short of Materials.
It takes, normally, six months to construct a torpedo and costs thousands of dollars. There also is a chance of Germany running short of some material essential in their manufacture. Whether this has occurred is not known, but the conclusion has been reached that the individual German torpedo is losing in efficiency.
