## HOUSE PASSES THE MILITARY SERVICE BILL

### PRELIMINARY BOMBARDMENT FOR BRITISH OFFENSIVE IS NOW IN PROGRESS

#### RUSSIANS IN RETREAT THROUGHOUT GALICIA

**GERMANS LACKING IN MEN AND DARE NOT PUSH RETIRING RUSSIANS TOO HARD—EXPECTED BRITISH OFFENSIVE NOW STARTED BY TREMENDOUS BOMBARDMENT—GERMANS ATTACK FRENCH**

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, July 26.—Brusiloff's forces are retreating and the shaken armies of the new democracy are falling back rapidly. The retrograde movement covers practically the entire front in Galicia, but it is expected that the Russian reserves may halt the Germans. All look to Kerensky to save the country from complete disaster. The Germans are lacking in men. The attackers fear to push the Russians too hard as the troops are required on the western front, where the enemy apprehends a forceful stroke by the Allies. The Russians have launched a great fire in their magazines at Tarnopol to prevent them falling into the hands of the Germans.

#### Fighting Women.

The Russian Women's Battalion was in action at the front at Novo yesterday and is reported to have been successful. The battalion suffered some losses, the extent of which is as yet unknown.

#### British Front.

London, July 26.—The opening of the great British offensive has been heralded for days by intense artillery actions extending from the River Scarpe to the Channel coast, is now believed to be at hand. An official announcement from Berlin is that the duel of great guns has reached an intensity never before paralleled since the war began. This is taken to indicate that the British are at last making preparations for the big thrust, which it is believed has been hastened in order to save the Russians from complete collapse.

#### French Front.

Paris, July 26.—French troops have flung back powerful assaults last night against California Plateau. This is the sixth successive night in which the Germans have tried to batter their way through the Chemin des Dames line. Around Hurbise and Cornillet and in the region of Alsace north of Aspach the Germans made raids, which were fruitless. Artillery actions are in progress on the left bank of the Rhine.

#### War Conference.

General Pershing and General Staff visited the front yesterday. The Allied leaders are holding a war conference in Paris. British, French, Italian and American representatives are attending.

#### The Kaiser.

Copenhagen, July 26.—The Kaiser is on the Galician front, witnessed a battle on the plain of the Sereth. Hindenburg has

admitted the lack of men is retarding the German activity in Galicia. The submarine campaign is disappointing to the Germans. The generally expected belief that England would have been starved out quickly has been nullified.

#### Protests.

Paris, July 26.—Serbia and Roumania have protested against the present allies allowing them only consultative powers at the conference in Paris. They insist on being allowed to full membership, especially since the subject to be discussed is so vital to them.

#### GERMANY FIGURED ON SUPPLIES FROM THE U. S.

London, July 25.—That high German command has based its calculations on food supplies which America has been sending to neutrals became known, according to the Daily Mail, through the famous speech of Herr Erzberger, head of the Catholic party in the Reichstag, made before a secret session of that body. The newspapers referred to this address as a "bombshell." Herr Erzberger remarked that although America's entry into the war was important, owing to the extent to which Germany was dependent on the neutrals for food and other supplies.

#### America's Decree.

He said that America had decreed that she would not permit exports to neutrals as long as these neutrals exported to Germany. Consequently Herr Erzberger said, Germany would very shortly lose its source of supply. The terrible fact, he said, had to be faced that the military authorities had entirely figured on these supplies and that nobody in authority could find an answer or give any idea from where these supplies are to come from.

#### BRITISH PARLIAMENT VOTES MORE MONEY

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 26.—The big war credit has been voted by the House of Commons. Bonar Law asks for and gets £650,000,000. This brings the total sum Great Britain has voted for the war up to £5,292,000,000. Advances to Allies and to the Dominions exceeds £1,000,000,000.

The steam tug Dola under Capt. Verge left Atli Inlet yesterday morning for Swanson Bay towing a Davis raft of 800,000 feet of logs from the Kelley Logging Co. The raft is 300 feet long, 90 feet wide and draws 25 feet of water. The Dola is a powerful tug and the weight of the raft may be imagined by the fact that the speed of the tow is said to be only one and a half knots an hour.

#### ATTACHED LICENSES TO SALMON CANNERIES

The Dominion Government has said that after 1917 there shall be no more attached licenses in District No. 2. The fishery regulations provide for 850 fishing licenses on the Skeena river. In 1915 there were 675 attached licenses, that is these attached fishermen procured their fishing licenses through a particular cannery and had to fish for that cannery only. Of these 128 were Indians, 547 Japs and in addition there were 250 white independent or unattached fishermen. Of the 245 independent license holders, 42 owned their outfits complete and were financially as well as politically free and independent of the cannery. In 1916 there were 189 attached Indians, 541 attached Japs and 138 white independents. Of the independents, 48 were absolutely independent of the cannery. This year there are 731 attached licenses issued and 105 independent licenses issued. Further particulars are not yet available.

In 1916 the B. C. Cannery Association fixed the price of sockeye on the Fraser at 40c each. Later this price was raised to 50c. This was entirely voluntary on the part of the cannery comprising the association, as sockeye cannot be exported in an uncaned condition from British Columbia. It is contended that 50c was too much for these fish and it has been suggested that the price was so fixed by a few of the wealthy cannery owners, who also owned canneries in the north, for the purpose of freezing out the weaker competitors. This device unfortunately is not new or unheard of in Canadian industries.

After the price was so boosted and last year being one of the lean years on the Fraser, the pack being considerably less than one half that of the previous year, which was also a lean year, some of the powerful canneries who owned several cannery plants, closed down nearly all their plants and bought very few fish. In these cases these cannery owners also owned plants on the Skeena river, to which they looked for their profit. To mention one company and which by the way is in no respect different from some of the other companies, but is mentioned merely by way of example, the A. B. C. Packing Company Limited held six canneries on the Fraser last year. They operated only two and packed only 4,167 cases.

#### THIRD READING OF THE CONSCRIPTION BILL

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, July 26.—The third reading of the Military Service Bill was passed in the House of Commons by a majority of fifty-eight. There have been no changes since the second reading. It is expected that the bill will have a close call in the Senate.

It was apparent that this company did not wish to buy many fish at 50c each. On the Skeena this company last year operated two canneries and packed 30,915 cases. Why? Because on the Skeena this company had 130 attached licenses and had an even break for a share in the catch of the independent fishermen. These attached fishermen received for their catch on the Skeena 15c each, while the independent men on the Fraser got 50c each. The fish are equal in size and quality. The independent fishermen on the Skeena were paid by this company 22½c each for sockeye. The independent men on the Skeena did not receive a fair price for their fish because they had to compete with the attached slave labor and the attached men got less than a decent slave's allowance.

The cost of the fresh fish per case, reckoning 13 fish to the case, is, on the Skeena, at 15c each, \$1.95, and on the Fraser, at 50c each, \$6.50. The difference in profit is \$4.55.

We hear a contention that some of the canneries on the Fraser last year lost money. That is possible as the entire catch of all salmon was 106,440 cases. The catch for 1915 was 289,199 cases and in the big year 1913 it was 732,059 cases. But on the other hand it is contended that some of the Fraser canneries just about broke even or made a little profit, so it may be that with the ordinary catch 50c per sockeye on the Fraser was not too much, as the expense of operating a cannery for a half catch is very much greater than when operating it for a full catch. On the Skeena, however, by reason of the better pack the cannery would reduce its operating expenses per case.

#### THE INVESTIGATION RE FISHING REGULATIONS

The Royal Commission appointed by the Dominion Government to investigate into the fishery regulations met this morning at the city hall at 10 o'clock. The commissioners were Mr. W. Sandford Evans, Mr. H. B. Thomson, and Mr. Fred T. James. The secretary of the Commission was Mr. Renwick, late deputy minister of lands. Mr. W. A. Found, superintendent of the Dominion Fisheries at Ottawa, Mr. Cunningham, of New Westminster, and Mr. J. T. C. Williams, of Prince Rupert, were among the officials present.

Mr. Sandford Evans, chairman of the Commission, in opening the proceedings, said that the Commission was prepared and glad to hear evidence from anyone interested in the fishing industry, and that while the scope of the Commission did not include some of the aspects of the fishing industry in the north, still they would be pleased to have all circumstances stated fully.

Mayor McCaffery on behalf of the city of Prince Rupert, welcomed the Commission, and said that there were many things which ought to be presented to the Government, but not being a practical fisherman, nor yet a canneryman, he would not care to testify, but would later present some things on behalf of the city. Ald. Montgomery, as chairman of the fisheries committee of the city council, would give evidence.

Ald. Montgomery being duly sworn, in his evidence showed that when the cannery industry started in this north country, there were no white fishermen here. They had to be brought from the south, and the regulations were made under that condition. Ald. Montgomery went very fully into the matter, and showed that under the altered conditions, the regulations should no longer exist. He took objection to the system of attached licenses as it worked a hardship upon the citizens. He stated that the cannery men contracted for Jap fishermen, hereby not giving a white man a chance to fish for the canneries. The white fishermen agreed among themselves on the price they would pay, which on the Skeena was less than half that paid on the Fraser. He produced a copy of the minutes of a meeting of the canners, in support of his contention.

He argued in favor of independent licenses, and stated that the 600 or 700 trolling licenses issued, showed that under proper conditions, these men would, between early spring salmon season and the late coho fishing, go into the rivers for the sockeye run. He stated that under the present system, the salmon cannery industry has been of no benefit to this city nor to the northern country.

Alderman Montgomery's evidence was not included.

## PATRIOTISM AND PROFITS

Recently an appeal was issued to the business men of the United States by President Wilson. This is so applicable to the present state of affairs in Canada that some of the President's words will bear reproducing. He said:

"A just price must, of course be paid for everything the Government buys. By a just price I mean a price which will sustain the industries concerned in a high state of efficiency, provide a living for those who conduct them, enable them to pay good wages, and make possible the expansions of their enterprises which will from time to time become necessary as the stupendous undertakings of this great war develop. We could not wisely or reasonably do less than pay such prices. They are necessary for the maintenance and development of industry, and the maintenance and development of industry are necessary for the great task we have in hand."

"Patriotism leaves profits out of the question. In these days of our supreme trial, when we are sending hundreds of thousands of our young men across the seas to serve a great cause, no true man who stays behind to work for them and sustain them by his labor will ask himself what he is personally going to make out of that labor. No true patriot will permit himself to take toll of their heroism in money or seek to grow rich by the shedding of their blood. He will give as freely and with as unstinted self-sacrifice as they. When they are giving their lives will he not give at least his money?"

"I hear it insisted that more than a just price, more than a price that will sustain our industries, must be paid; that it is necessary to pay very liberal and unusual profits in order to stimulate production; that nothing but pecuniary rewards will do—rewards paid in money and not in the mere liberation of the world."

"I take it for granted that those who argue thus do not stop to think what that means. Do they mean that you must be paid, must be bribed, to make your contribution, a contribution that costs you neither

a drop of blood nor a tear, when the whole world is in travail and men everywhere depend upon and call to you to bring them out of bondage and make the world a fit place to live in again amidst peace and justice? Do they mean that you will exact a price, drive a bargain with the men who are enduring the agony of this war on the battlefields, in the trenches, amidst the lurking dangers of the sea, or with the bereaved women and pitiful children, before you will come forward to do your duty and give some part of your life, in easy peaceful fashion, for the things we are fighting for, the things we have pledged our fortunes, our lives, our sacred honor, to vindicate and defend—liberty and justice and fair dealing and the peace of nations?"

This appeal of President Wilson's is one which the great proportion of the people will agree with. But there is another class of people—we have them in Canada and it is also evident from the President's words that they exist across the line—to whom their country's need is their opportunity. Patriotism applies only to them as represented by the four personal pronouns, I, me, my, mine. Business in time of peace is only changed in war time—to them—as an opportunity to make greater gain. And which in Canada has been taken every advantage of.

To this class of people, such an appeal as this will fall on deaf ears. The remedy lies with the State itself. What the profiteers will not give willingly, the State has the power to take.

high cost of living experts to investigate canned salmon on the Skeena.

In 1915 the canners on the Skeena paid their attached license only 12½¢ per sockeye. Is it any wonder that the better class of white fishermen will not compete against this attached slave fishing labor for as long as the majority of the salmon fishermen in District No. 2 tied to the canners the canneries will prefer to pay one-third what the fish is worth and put up two-thirds of a pack, rather than pay all the fish is worth and put up a full pack, and if he can pay one-third what the fish is worth and put up a full pack it is so much more real velvet.

This system of attached licenses is the most contemptible regulation that has ever been imposed in a reputed free country since slavery was abolished and when taken along with the further government regulation pre- (Continued on page three.)

venting the building of other can-  
neries in District No. 2, it com-  
pletes the doctrine of the Divine  
Right of the canners to all the  
salmon that God placed in this  
district. They alone can can.  
This is some monopoly, if they  
had nothing else, but to prevent  
one cannery from competing  
against the other on the open  
market for the fish the govern-  
ment has said "We will give No.  
1 Cannery fifty slaves, and No. 2  
Cannery 75 slaves (because No. 2  
Cannery has a larger floor) and  
each of these canneries shall en-  
joy the fruits of their own slaves."  
The only necessary link to com-  
plete the chain of absolute slav-  
ery is supplied by the economic  
whip which compels Mr. Jap and  
Mr. Indian to catch fish in order  
to live. This is sure some sys-  
tem. The Grits planted it; the  
Tories watered it, and God and  
the fishermen gave the canners  
the increase. But now that the  
present government has said "it  
is a vile system and shall end  
with 1917, it is difficult to under-  
stand why any association of re-  
spectable citizens such as the B.  
C. Canners' Association doubtless  
is, should fight to have it con-  
tinued. Apparently they do not  
like emancipation.

There can be no reason why the  
salmon industry should not be  
handled as the halibut industry  
is on an open competitive market.  
Any person should be entitled to  
can salmon, and if he has not got  
sufficient money to operate a can-  
nery he should be entitled to catch  
fish, subject to proper regulations  
for the protection of the industry.

## THE FISHERY INVESTIGATION

There are several points of im-  
portance to be noted in regard to  
this commission.

1. It has been appointed at the  
instance of the British Columbia  
Canners' Association.

2. It is appointed to investigate  
the salmon fisheries only.

3. Its jurisdiction is limited to  
investigating salmon conditions  
and the financial conditions in  
District No. 2.

Inasmuch as this investigation  
is limited to District No. 2, why  
all this blare of trumpets and  
taking of evidence in New West-  
minster, Vancouver and at other  
points outside of District No. 2?  
Why all this hard luck talk of  
loss of money on the Fraser where  
they have three lean years and  
one fat year, and where the sal-  
mon have been exterminated by  
both American and Canadian  
fishermen, where the spawning  
grounds have been cut off by mill  
dams, railway rock slides, etc.,  
and where no adequate spawning  
grounds or hatcheries have been  
provided.

The canners of the south have  
sowed to the wind and are reap-  
ing the whirlwind, but why should  
District No. 2 be made the goat?  
Wherein is Northern British Co-  
lumbia responsible for the mis-  
deeds on the Fraser?

Surely it is logical to expect  
this commission to confine its  
energies to the investigation of  
the matters for which it has been  
appointed and devote its attention  
exclusively to District No. 2.

On the Skeena and generally  
throughout District No. 2, can-  
neries have been profitable—we  
content unreasonably so—and  
have heretofore enjoyed unrea-  
sonable protection at the hands  
of the government. The Grits  
handed them a very lucious plum  
by limiting cannery licenses and  
granting attached fishing licenses  
to each cannery. The Conserva-  
tives have permitted them to en-  
joy these fruits unmolested until  
the year 1918.

If these cannerymen have a tale  
of woe to unfold in regard to con-  
ditions in District No. 2, we will  
all be pleased to listen, but we  
should not be obliged to travel  
outside this district to hear these  
complaints. The issues should be  
tried where they arose. This is  
a good British principle and we  
respectfully request this commis-  
sion to confine its hearings to  
District No. 2. On the trial of  
cannery conditions in District No.  
2, it is manifestly improper to  
adduce evidence in connection  
with the prodigal brother on the  
Fraser—that is another question  
and we may look for another com-  
mission to deal with that matter,  
sometime hence. One thing at a  
time is a very sane rule.—W. E.
