ALLIES' DRIVE IN FLANDERS BEGINS FINE

RUSSIANS ARE FIGHTING FIERCELY --- GOOD PROGRESS MADE BY ROUMANIANS

THIRTY SQUARE MILES OF FLANDERS RECAPTURED

THIRTY THOUSAND PRISONERS AND THIRTY SQUARE MILES OF TERRITORY ARE FIRST FRUITS OF JOINT OFFENSIVE ON WESTERN FRONT—TORRENTIAL RAINS HAMPER THE ADVANCE

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Aug. 2.—Thirty square miles of territory and probably more than five thousand prisoners have been captured during the first twenty-four hours of the great allied drive in Flanders. At some points, the Allies have penetrated into the German lines for a distance of three miles. A deluge of torrential rain has turned the historic mud of Flanders into a sticky ooze, which has greatly hampered the advance today.

Gains Consolidated.
General Haig reports all the gains have been consolidated during the night, and all the German counter attacks have been repulsed. The French report contains a similar statement. No offensive fighting has been reported today so far, except minor operations south of Ypres and

Comines, where the British troops have improved their positions.

The Biggest Yet.
The battle of Flanders is believed to be the biggest of the war and it may last for weeks or months. The artillery positions have been moved forward, notwithstanding the weather and transport conditions, and are still throwing fear and demoralization into the German positions. Military observers say that the Germans may soon be cleared out of French and Belgian Flanders.

French Front.
Paris, August 2.—After several days of artillery preparation the Germans this morning attacked the positions on the left bank of the Meuse, which the French captured on July 17. The Germans were only able to reach certain advance elements of the French first line trenches. On the Aisne, throughout the entire front artillery fire is continued.

THE CONVENTION OF THE WESTERN LIBERALS

Winnipeg, August 2.—The presidents of the four western provinces will be the first speakers at the big convention of western Liberals to be held here next week. Arrangements have been made in Winnipeg for the entertainment of two thousand Liberals. Some criticism of Sir Clifford Sifton has been appearing before the convention. The nomination of western candidates has been postponed.

U. S. WILL TALK PEACE WHEN GERMANY BEATEN

Washington, August 2.—The United States will talk specific terms of peace only when Germany is beaten. This decision of the government is the same as that of the allied democracies who are now entering upon the fourth year of the world struggle.

Prohibition.
Nation-wide prohibition will be voted on today. The senators are limited to ten minute speeches in the debate.

NO SUPPORT FROM THE POPE FOR GERMAN PEACE

(Special to The Daily News.)
Rome, August 2.—The Pope is not supporting any peace plans for which the German Catholic party or its leader Erzberger are agitating. The Holy Father is striving for a "just and Christian peace," but not through any agencies of others.

GOING AHEAD WITH NEW FISH PACKING PLANT

Mr. R. C. Lowry, of New Westminster, who arrived in the city yesterday morning from the south, is actively engaged in having a start made with the erection of the wharf and buildings necessary for the new plant, which his company intends building on the waterfront near to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company's location at Seal Cove. Piles will be driven and in a few weeks, it is hoped that the work will be advanced far enough for the installing of the plant, which is practically ready for shipment to Prince Rupert.

This plant will handle fish by a sterilizing process which as yet has not been extensively applied on this coast. No ice will be used in the packing of the fish at all. They will be sterilized in successive immersions in brine at different low temperatures, by which process the fresh flavor of the fish is retained, and the fish will remain as fresh at the end of two weeks as the day they were sterilized.

Other classes of fish will be taken care of besides halibut, of which there is a sufficiency in these waters.

THE NEW SAWMILL AT SEAL COVE

Work is progressing rapidly at the site of the new sawmill at Seal Cove. A great change has been made in the appearance of the ground since the work started. The forms are being filled with concrete for the buildings, and before long, many more men will be at work. The cookhouse was opened yesterday for the camp, and an office has been established.

From now on, the number of men employed will be increased as the development extends, and many of the men whose homes and families are in Prince Rupert, and who have been compelled to leave town for other places to obtain work, will have an opportunity of obtaining employment in their own town.

Mr. E. F. Doby, who is building the mill, is optimistic regarding the progress made. His boilers and other equipment are on the way from Vancouver, and before long, the hum of industry at Seal Cove will be greatly increased.

HOSPITAL SHIP ASHORE

(Special to The Daily News.)
Halifax, August 2.—A hospital ship from England, laden with nearly six hundred wounded and sick Canadians, went ashore on the Chebucto Head, outside the harbor today. The vessel is resting easily in a smooth sea.

WORK OF THE RETURNED SOLDIERS' COMMISSION

From an employment point of view, the return recently made to the provincial secretary by the secretary of the Returned Soldiers' Commission, reveals a very satisfactory state of affairs. Reports received from all parts of the province from the local committees speak of the heartiest co-operation on the part of the employers of labor.

The report shows that the total number of men on the commissioner's records is 1,919. Of this number, 708 men are at present undergoing treatment at the convalescent hospitals and sanatoria operated by the Military Hospitals Commission in the province.

Employment.
Civil employment has been provided for 623 men, which shows the good service which has been rendered by the local employment bureau, acting as sub-committees of the commission throughout the province. It is to be noted that the committee has only five unfilled applications for employment. In this connection, it is stated that some 1,300 positions have been provided from time to time for applicants to the employment committee. It will be readily understood that the number of positions would always be greater than the number of men provided with employment. The commission's efforts are not confined to securing only one position for each applicant. The first one available may not prove suitable, and in every case the committee endeavors to meet the wishes of the applicants as far as possible.

A list of the positions provided by the commission includes practically every trade followed in the province. Of the 623 men employed at the date of the return, it is noted that 154 are employees of the federal government, and 63 of the provincial government.

More Applications.
The report shows that although only five applications are yet unfilled, this does not necessarily mean that these are the only returned soldiers in the province unemployed. There may be more from whom applications may, and no doubt will, be received from time to time. The work of the commission is to endeavor to provide employment for those returned men who apply through the local committees for assistance in that connection.

RUSSIAN ARMY HOLDING ON IN BUKOWINA

Austro-German Advance is Being Strenuously Opposed by Russian Troops—Win For Rumanians.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, Aug. 2.—The Russian troops are holding the enemy at arms length in the Bukowina, and are putting up a strong resistance for the defence of Cernowitz. The Russian troops in this sector are well disciplined and the strength of their resistance is increasing. The further advance of the Austro-German forces is being strenuously opposed and meantime has been brought to a standstill. No further ground has been given up to the enemy, notwithstanding their superior strength.

Germans Beat.
Over five thousand prisoners have been captured by the Rumanian troops operating between the Casin and the Putna valleys. They broke the German front to a considerable depth over a wide area. Important captures were also made of guns and munitions and other war material. Ninety-eight guns of large calibre have already been counted.

CONDITIONS ARE GOOD IN OMINECA DISTRICT

From a mining and agricultural standpoint, the conditions in the interior look splendid. Mr. A. M. Manson, M.P.P., who has just returned from a trip up the line as far east as Houston, is enthusiastic about the upper country.

In some parts, the hay crop is a little light, but the other crops are fully up to the Bulkley valley's best. The principal trouble in the meantime is the shortage of labor. Quite a lot of extra assistance is required, which so far is not in sight. The same fact applies to the mines, while the new government road which is being constructed in the direction of the Jefferson-Dockrill property up the Telkwa river and to the Cronin property is demanding every available man.

In the country to the north the farmers are exceptionally well pleased with the outlook for the wheat crop, and all grain and root crops are showing up well.

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HANGED FOR SLANDERING THE U.S. ARMY

Member of I. W. W. Forcibly Removed From His Lodgings in Butte by Masked Men and Hanged.

Butte, Montana, Aug. 2.—Frank Little, one of the members of the executive of the I. W. W., recently referred in a speech here to the soldiers of the United States as "Uncle Sam's scabs in uniform." As the outcome of this ill-considered speech, the lodging house in which he resided was entered early this morning by a band of masked men, who forcibly removed him to the outskirts of the city, where they hanged him to a railroad trestle.

NEWS FROM OTTAWA

Ottawa, August 2.—The nation must line up for economy in food, otherwise Canada will face starvation this winter, says the Hon. W. J. Hanna, the Food Controller. **Before Conscription.**
Senator Bostock disclosed his attitude in the Senate today in a speech answering the Sifton letter. He wants an election before the application of the Military Service Bill. He believes that the people should be consulted over legislation of a radical nature. He quoted Mr. Balfour in his contention for a referendum, but asks his fellow senators to vote in accordance with their feelings.

THE CRITICS OF SIR WILFRID

The editorials of The Globe and the Manitoba Free Press on the question of Conscription are being widely quoted by the Borden-Rogers press, says the Vancouver Sun, as reflecting what are or should be, the views of all true Liberals. Government journals are always very confident, it continues, what the policy of the Liberal party should be, and invariably they are equally convinced that it should coincide with that of their own party for the time being. In this they impose a heavy task upon Liberalism. Only a few weeks ago both Sir Robert Borden and his director of national service, Mr. Bennett, were pronounced in their declarations against conscription of any kind. If Liberals must adjust their views to the ever-changing opinions of these gentlemen they will have to exhibit considerable agility.

It is quite true that both the Globe and Free Press have recently condemned Sir Wilfrid Laurier's contention that an expiring government, a defunct government, in fact, should not adopt so serious a policy as enforced enlistment without first referring the question to the people. For this Sir Wilfrid Laurier has been denounced by both those journals, though just what difference there can be in consulting the people by a general election rather than a referendum it is hard to see. There is a great political advantage, of course, because an election on a patriotic issue can be used by Sir Robert Borden for the advantages which his party might get out of it. The whole war situation has been used by the party in power for the same purposes since the war began.

Whatever the rest of us may have to say on the conscription issue, it does not lie with any member of the government to reproach Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Not long ago, as we have said, the Borden government and every member of it held and preached opinions identical with those of the Liberal leader. They had preached those views since the beginning of the war in the fall of 1914, and it was with their approval and support that Sir Wilfrid Laurier adopted the attitude to which he has continued to adhere. He at any rate has shown firmness and decision where the

government has been changeable, shifting and fickle.

Nor is the position of the Globe and Free Press much more satisfactory than that of Sir Robert Borden and his unstable following. The Globe is the dean of Liberalism in Canada, and the Free Press has long been unrivalled as an exponent of Liberalism in the west. Great weight invariably attaches to the editorial utterances of these two Liberal journals, and for that reason, if for no other, if their judgment is to be accepted as sound and reliable, if their pronouncements are to have the effect of reading the venerable chief of Liberalism out of the leadership of his party, they must at any rate be consistent at the very least.

Has the Globe forgotten its weighty pronouncement on conscription on June 15, 1916? It then delivered what appeared to be its ultimatum on conscription in these words:

"No responsible Canadian statesman to whom the representative of the crown could turn as a possible premier would take office to enforce compulsory military service in the Dominion. Sir Robert Borden would not do it. Nor Sir Wilfrid Laurier. No man of eminence in either party would attempt what the recognized party leaders know and admit cannot be done. There are not less than three million people out of a total population of about eight millions in the Dominion who would resent fiercely the application to the men of military age among them of a law compelling enlistment for service in a European war."

On the same day the Free Press said editorially:

"Before there can be conscription in a democratic country there must be a social and military organization sufficiently perfected to direct and apply the forces thus brought into play and a public opinion all but unanimous as to the necessity for action so drastic. We have neither of these precedent conditions in Canada; nor is there the slightest likelihood that we shall secure them before the close of the war."

"Here in Canada conscription is out of the question. Where there is a sentiment in favor of some such action—as in Toronto—it is not required; while in those sections in Canada where recruiting is at a minimum conscription could only be enforced if all the men recruited from the rest of Canada were put on the job."

No; for the purpose of this war, only volunteers will go from Canada. Those who should go but will not must settle the matter with their own consciences, later they will pay for their cowardice, selfishness or indifference. There is a law of compensation in these matters.

Tried by the same tests as Sir Robert Borden, the Globe and Free Press have exhibited the same lack of ripened judgment and stable conviction. And yet they claim the right to dismiss from the leadership of Liberalism the one man who has remained true to the principles which they themselves presented. An explanation of this change of attitude is due to the Canadian people, and especially to the Liberal party.

The Sun has never hesitated in its advocacy of every measure that is necessary to win the war. We have realized the difficulties of a policy of conscription which would include Quebec just as the statesmen of Great Britain have been sensible of the same difficulties with regard to Ireland, with the result that they have refrained from applying coercion to that portion of Great Britain. Is Sir Wilfrid Laurier to be reproached

COLLAPSE OF MARK IN SWITZERLAND

London—Financial circles, says the London "Evening Standard," are watching with interest the present rapid and irregular decline of the mark.

During the present month the German rates of exchange on Zurich, Christiania, Copenhagen, Stockholm and Amsterdam have fallen seriously and without exception.

The course of the Swiss exchange is particularly to be observed, for Switzerland is the Hindenburg line of German finance. In the first week of July the rate of exchange on Zurich was never below 75. By July 11 it stood at 65.50. It should be noted that the par of exchange is 123.44 francs to 100 marks, and that the mark in Zurich is now only about one-half its normal value.

The collapse in Switzerland has synchronized with a less serious collapse in the other neutral capitals.

Cause of Decline.

One reason for this decline is Germany's diminishing power to find the necessary exports with which to pay for the imports which she is obtaining from neutral countries. It is more and more difficult for Germany to find coal and iron from Holland or Switzerland with which to pay for Dutch produce or for Swiss munitions, and the balance has to be made up in hard cash; but the prevailing reason for the sharp fall during the present month is probably due more than anything else to the closing of Germany's best market for financial facilities and credit of all kinds. Germany can no longer obtain the florins or crowns necessary for the discharge of her debts through New York. Credits and transfers can no longer be arranged with America by wirelessly.

We may reasonably expect the position to grow steadily worse in the coming months. Switzerland is the barometer of German credit, and the layman in finance cannot do better than watch the Swiss rate and draw his conclusions from that. The German authorities control their exchange transactions in Switzerland very thoroughly, and when the position goes against them in Zurich we may infer that German credit is seriously imperilled.

because he has followed the example of the mother of parliaments? Because he has advocated the policy of Australia? We have always favored conscription, but without forgetting the caution exercised by Great Britain, or the insistence of Australia upon democratic methods, and the submission of a referendum. It is now understood that pending the results of a general election the Borden government will make no attempt at coercion. Could there be a more striking vindication of the position that Sir Wilfrid Laurier took when he insisted that the people of Canada should have a voice in determining on a policy of such serious moment to the Dominion? Sir Robert Borden and his followers as well as the Globe and Free Press have all along declared in favor of these views as exhibiting the only true statesmanship. They were eminently right a few weeks or months ago. Are they now eminently unwise and wrong?
