## MUD STILL RETARDS INFANTRY OPERATION

### FRENCH AND BRITISH REPULSE GERMAN ATTACKS---RUSSIANS ARE RETREATING

#### THE BRITISH CONSOLIDATE THEIR GAINS

Still Prevents Much Infantry Action, But Artillery is Still Pounding the German Line.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, August 4.—The fighting on the British front is as much against the sea of mud as against the enemy. The British troops are still consolidating their gains by local attacks today. While the weather has slightly improved, massed infantry actions are practically out of the question. The concentrated British artillery is still pounding the German line. Early this morning counter attacks by picked German forces were thrown back on several points along the front. Julian has been recaptured, which the British troops had temporarily to retire. At Holbeke, sanguinary fighting was engaged in. Prisoners to the number of 6,122 altogether have been captured.

#### Moving Back.

Reports from Holland declare the Germans are moving their headquarters in Flanders further west.

#### Aeroplanes Lost.

According to official communications 420 aeroplanes were lost on the western front during the month of July. Of this number the Germans lost 291.

The Kaiser has despatched messages to Hindenburg at the conclusion of the third year of the war.

#### French Front.

Paris, August 4.—The troops of the German Crown Prince after an intense artillery bombardment last night, delivered several violent attacks against the French positions near Cerny in the Aisne region, which were all repulsed. Bad weather continues on the Belgian front.

#### Italian Front.

Rome, August 4.—Large squadrons of Italian aeroplanes yesterday effectively bombarded the aerodrome and military works at Pola, the chief naval station in Austria-Hungary.

#### INCOME TAX PROTECTS THE PROFITEERS

Ottawa, August 3.—For the past six weeks the government has kept the eyes of parliament and the public upon the question of conscription. Ever since the prime minister made his momentous announcement in May last to the effect that compulsory military service must be resorted to in order to fill the gaps of the troops at the front, the sins of the government itself have been forgotten and the conscription issue and that alone has occupied the attention of the country. Graft investigations which were under way at the beginning of the session were laid over and the public accounts committee has been dormant. The government bade the people fix their eyes on something far above such sordid considerations; "win the war."

The diversion has been fairly successful, but now that the first stages of the conscription bill have been passed and a respite has been offered while the senate is preparing to tackle the measure the eyes of legislators and the people have had an opportunity of withdrawing themselves from the heavens to the earth. In the interval they have perceived several things. They have perceived in the first place that while the government was pleading for a union government in the commons, it was filling vacancies with partisans who will have in many cases, the opportunity of voting twice on the conscription measure.

**Soldiers' Dependents Mulcted**  
While the government was declaring that the first consideration was to send men to the firing line and that no time must be lost in so doing, an official of the labor department brought down a report which, if it meant anything, meant that the dependents of the soldiers who have already gone were being mulcted of their small allowances by profiteers in the necessities of life, who remained comfortably at home to grow rich. That report accused two cold storage companies of profiteering. Government action might have been expected at once. But while the eyes of the people were fixed on the heavens, a further commission was appointed and a further investigation will be held before any decision is reached.

**Higher in Canada.**  
The commission met in Toronto this morning, but adjourned for a fortnight on account of the heat. That same heat, however, did not deter Liberal members in their rooms today from undertaking an onslaught upon a commission whose only purpose could be to delay the day of judgment for the profiteers and force the consuming public to continue to pay higher prices in Canada for commodities produced here than are being paid for the same commodities in England after they have crossed three thousand miles of submarine infested ocean.

**Protecting Profiteers.**  
Liberal members who voted for conscription of men also voted for conscription of wealth. The minister of finance brought down an income tax, but now that legislators have brought down their eyes from the heavens, it appears that here again the government has been looking after the profiteers. At the end of the present year, the income tax is to be substituted for the excess profit tax, and after that, companies which under the latter measure were forced to pay as high as seventy-five per cent toward the Dominion treasury, would only be compelled to pay four per cent. #### LIEUT. VALIQUET DIED ON SERVICE

Word has been received in town of the death of Lieut. E. A. Valiquet, late of the district engineer's office of the department of public works, Prince Rupert. Lieutenant Valiquet had many friends in this city who will regret to learn of his death. He went overseas in September, 1916, after qualifying for a commission the previous spring. He first enlisted here in the fall of 1915, and was in the trenches only five weeks, when he received wounds which caused his death.

The father of Lieut. Valiquet is a superintending engineer in the department of public works, and has other three sons in the army. Dr. M. U. Valiquet has been in France with the Army Medical Corps since 1915, Captain L. G. Valiquet is taking a special course at Bedford, England, and J. P. Valiquet is at present training at Kingston.

#### FIRST THINGS FIRST

Stratford, Ont., Aug. 3.—Having failed to induce any large number of men to go on farms for harvest, Chairman H. W. Strudley of the local branch of the Organization of Resources Committee, decided today to close his own plant, the Imperial Rattan Factory for at least one week, thus releasing the employees, who will be paid by the proprietor the difference between their wages in the factory and those offered by farmers. A proposal has also been made to close the banks and stores one or two afternoons each week and send the clerks to the country. Warden Oliver Harris stated today that crop prospects were never better in Perth. Spring wheat is over five feet high in Fullarton, and hay is a very heavy yield.

#### MANY EXEMPTIONS IN UNITED STATES

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, Aug. 4.—More than seventy-five per cent. of the Americans called up for the National Army examinations claim exemptions, according to press reports received from all parts of the country today.

The disqualifications for physical disability vary considerably, running much higher in the big cities than in the towns free from congestion. Most of the exemption claims are based on the plea of "dependents."

#### THE RUSSIAN RETIREMENT CONTINUING

Kimpolung and Cernowitz Both are Evacuated by Russians—Fighting Now is on Russian Soil.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, August 4.—Kimpolung, in southern Bukovina, has been evacuated by the Russians. Russian troops are now engaged with the Austro-German forces on the River Bystriza between the Rivers Dniester and Pruth. The Russian retirement is continuing.

#### Cernowitz Taken.

Berlin, August 4.—Cernowitz, the capital of Bukovina, has been captured by the Teutonic forces.

#### An Understanding.

Amsterdam, August 4.—Russia and Austria are "on verge of an understanding," according to a declaration attributed to President Huysman, of the International Socialist Bureau.

#### An Interview.

The Emperor Charles of Austria had an interview with the new German Chancellor, Dr. Michaelis on Thursday.

#### Supplies.

Zurich, August 4.—The Central Powers expect to draw hundreds of carloads of cereals from the occupied territory in Roumania.

#### The Balkans.

Washington, August 4.—Big offensive operations are expected to be started in the Balkans against the Teutons soon. According to positive information received here, Germany had possession of Austria's ultimatum to Serbia three years ago, fourteen hours before it was delivered to Belgrade.

#### Will Take Shipping.

The commandeering of shipping now under construction in this country will begin immediately.

**REAL NATIONAL SERVICE**

Returning to Australia via Canada from the Imperial Conference in London, Sir Joseph Ward, the former Prime Minister of New Zealand, delivered an address to the people in Winnipeg, wherein he emphasized that with the conscription of man power, the complete organization of the resources of the country should also be undertaken. As an illustration of a nation organized for war, his own country offers an excellent illustration. Under the control of a strong national government, all the resources of the state have been mobilized and complete national service is in operation. There is conscription not only for the fighting men, but for all the other necessary work.

A thorough-going and proper national service is as great a necessity for Canada as it is for New Zealand. The necessity is as great and the possibilities of its successful operation are equally apparent. As far as the conditions will permit, both Britain and France have adopted the same system. One of the first necessities will be an inventory of all the human and material resources visible in the Dominion. The present census figures are seven years old, and in a country like this, it is impossible to conjecture how near correct these seven year old figures are. Without proper information it will be impossible to carry out any extensive programme without risking serious disorganization and disorder.

It was pointed out very pertinently by Sir Joseph Ward during his address that whatever a belligerent does in the war, whether in sending men to the fighting front, or producing munitions, must be part of a larger programme based upon complete national organization. All functions ought to be co-ordinated and co-related. In sending men to the front, due regard must be given to the essential interests at home, without which no army can be maintained. "The policy which furnishes men for our fighting ranks, must be accompanied by a policy which not only clothes, feeds and equips the soldiers but sup-

plies the needs of the people at home, who represent 75 per cent of the country's strength."

In connection with the sending of reinforcements to the front, it must be borne in mind that whether the number be 100,000 or 200,000, any ten or twenty thousand men cannot be spared. This fact was brought home to the British authorities, who had to bring back thousands of men from the front, skilled men, who could best serve their country at home in the factories, mines and workshops. Across the line they took cognizance of this fact, and hand-picked their overseas effectives. The United States Government did not rely upon a seven year old census.

For instance, a dispatch yesterday said that fifty thousand men would be required for this year's harvesting operations. Does the government know whether sufficient men will be available for this most important work? Does it know where they are to be found without delay? It does not. Food is scarce the world over and it is important that not a bushel of grain be lost. In addition there are other food producing activities to attend to, and many important activities to be kept in operation. But there has been no mobilization of the human resources to safeguard these vital factors, while at the same time, the country keeps its ranks filled at the front.

Without a complete inventory of the resources, both human and material, which are available, the government is courting national demoralization. "For a nation to wage war successfully all its services must be rooted in a common organization, each being a unit in one vast machine and each performing its necessary task without conflicting with any of the others." But a complete knowledge of what has to be organized is necessary first.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

The Food Controller recommends two meatless days a week to be instituted in Canada. To those so far away from the centre of fighting this will tend to bring home the fact that Canada is at

war. Which is sometimes inclined to be overlooked.

Senator Edwards of Ottawa is reported to have declared in the Senate that Canada has offered too many men, presumably in proportion to her population, to an overseas. Most people are of the opinion that Canada can yet spare some and would have many more to spare were the country organized on a war basis. Cut out the needless occupations, which those "permanently rejected" or over military age or returned soldiers could undertake, and there will be another division for the front.

Russia shows signs of having "come back." At some points, an offensive has actually been started against the Germans. If Russia finds herself before it is too late, she may yet play a great part in crumpling up the Central Powers.

Nothing has been heard of the Sultan, nor Ferdinand of Bulgaria for some time now. Possibly they will be chewing the bitter cud and ruminating upon what might have been.

"My" an eastern visitor was heard to exclaim the other day, "I never thought Prince Rupert was like this. They tell us all sorts of things about it back there. Why, it's a city." So it is, too.

The proposal of the government to take over the control of the C. N. R. marks another step towards the ultimate state ownership of all public utilities. Transportation is of vital importance in a continent like North America, but no more vital than food, soap, boots, and coal. The same law which underlies the government of the people by the people for the people applies in the production of the necessities of life. These at present are produced by

the people and primarily for the people, but for private gain. Everything tends to show that this inverted order will soon be corrected, and the production of the necessities will be for the people in the first place, and for profit secondarily.

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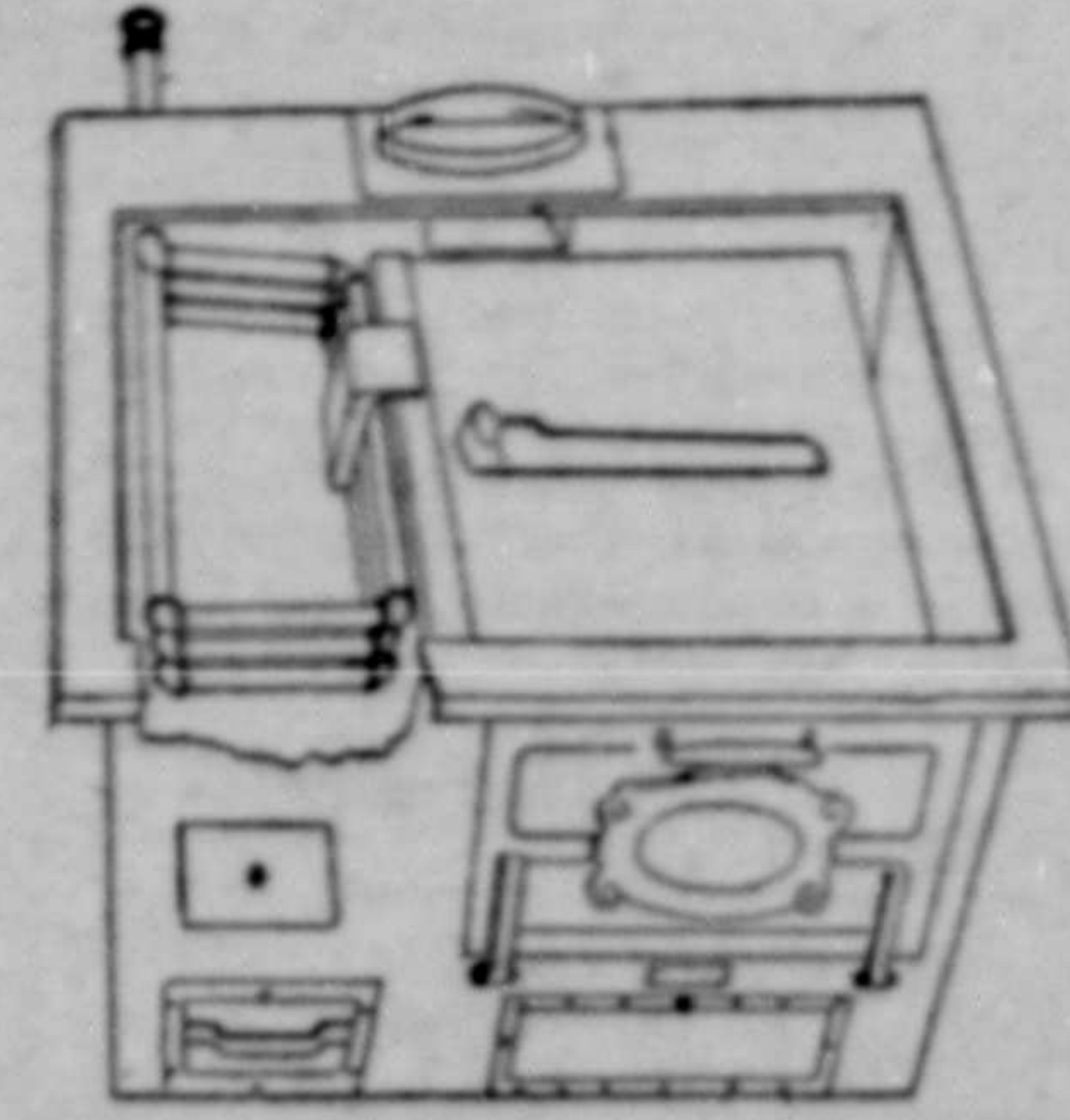

## THE PIONEER OF CANADA'S RAILWAYS

A few days ago a letter was sent to the Canadian press by Mr. A. W. Smithers, chairman of the London board of directors of the Grand Trunk Railway of Canada, in which he pointed out what in his opinion were rather unfair strictures regarding the Grand Trunk Railway Company, contained in the recent majority report of the Royal Commission appointed to investigate into the situation of the railways in Canada. The Journal of Commerce in Montreal, discussing the stand taken by Chairman Smithers in his letter, acquiesces with the fairness of his point of view. Notwithstanding all that has been said of what the Grand Trunk has done and has not done—for the Grand Trunk like every other corporation has received much criticism—the fact remains that this pioneer railway company of Canada has performed a very large and important duty in the development of Canada.

It points out that were it necessary to show the benefit which has arisen from the operations of this company, to Canada on the one hand, and to the investors in the company on the other hand, it would be undeniable that the greater gainer was the Dominion.

The present troubles of the Grand Trunk, the Journal of Commerce adds, have arisen, not from the operation of its original system, but from the burden which it so courageously assumed in the scheme of a transcontinental railway.

During the discussion of this project in the Dominion Parliament, it was often treated as one in which the Grand Trunk Railway Company were receiving great favors at the hands of the people of Canada. It is well that the public should be kept in mind of this fact, when it is so plainly apparent that instead of the company receiving favors beneficial to it, it had particularly severe conditions imposed upon it. There can be no doubt that when the arrangement was entered into fourteen years ago, very heavy responsibilities were laid upon the company, which instead of being a gain, were rather a loss.

Concluding its comment, the Journal of Commerce is of the opinion that there need be no fear in the minds of the directors of the company that the Canadian people will be unmindful of the great services, no matter what railway policy may be adopted, which the Grand Trunk Railway Company has rendered to Canada.

### FISHERIES COMMISSION

The Dominion Fisheries Commission, Messrs. Sanford Evans (chairman), and H. B. Thompson and F. T. James, are due to arrive back in Vancouver to resume their sittings on the British Columbia salmon fishing industry next Monday, according to word received at the offices of the British Columbia Salmon Cannery's Association. The members of the commission have for the past two weeks been making a thorough investigation into the coast fisheries, visiting plants and canneries on the fisheries protection vessel Malaspina, and securing expressions of opinion from both cannery and fisherman on both questions of whether motor boats shall be allowed to operate in District No. 2 or not.

In their initial sittings in Vancouver the commissioners sought more for general than detailed information, but before leaving for the north stated that by the time they arrived back here they would be ready for statistics showing the financial workings of the industry. There has been no intimation whether or not the investigation will be confined to the salmon export and motor boat questions, as originally intended, or will be extended to cover the whole fishing industry of the province, as is earnestly desired by all those connected with the fisheries.
