KERENSKY REMAINS PREMIER FOR RUSSIA

SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN THE GERMAN MINISTRY -- NEW FOREIGN SECRETARY

RESIGNATION OF PRUSSIAN MINISTRY

Secretary Zimmermann
Minister of Finance
Among Others Resign
Portfolios.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Berlin, August 7.—Five ministers of State, including Foreign Minister Zimmermann, and four Secretaries of State, among which are Minister of Finance Lentze, and Minister of the Interior von Lobell, have resigned their portfolios. Dr. von Kuhlmann, the German Ambassador to Turkey, is elected as the successor of Zimmermann to the Foreign Secretaryship.

Peace and Friendship.

The Hague, August 7.—Commenting upon the appointment of Kuhlmann as successor to Zimmermann as Foreign Secretary of the German Empire, one newspaper here says that the new minister has always been a vigorous opponent of the policy of submarine warfare. He was also a disciple of a policy of doing everything possible to avoid the further alienation of Great Britain. He believed that after the war, friendship between Great Britain and the British Empire would be absolutely necessary to Germany. The same newspaper also expresses the opinion that the Foreign Secretaryship will do the most to bring about an understanding with Great Britain at the earliest possible moment.

NEWS FROM WINNIPEG

(Special to The Daily News.)

Winnipeg, Aug. 7.—A rumor current here is to the effect that the Prairie Liberals are against Sir Wilfrid Laurier. A compromise with the Borden Government is said to be favored by many delegates. The British Columbia contingent is supporting Sir Wilfrid. The hope has been expressed that the West will be solid for conservatism.

CHINA JOINS ALLIES

(Special to The Daily News.)

Peking, August 7.—A dispatch dated Friday states that the cabinet approved of China's declaration of war against Germany and Austria. The decision now only requires the presidential signature. The president is reported to be perfectly agreeable. The proclamation is likely to be made at an early date.

HON. T.D. PATTULLO GOING TO WINNIPEG

Victoria, August 6.—"Yes, I am leaving this evening," remarked the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, when asked as to whether it was his intention to be present at the great Liberal Convention to be held in Winnipeg this week. The Minister had just returned from a tour of the dry belt, where he had gone to see for himself some of the problems of irrigation falling within the jurisdiction of his department.

"I am sorry to say that I have no confidence in the capacity of the present Federal administration to carry out the measures necessary. The Federal Government," continued the Minister, "has played an extremely partisan part in a big national crisis, and has given woeful evidence of its incapacity properly to meet the emergency of the hour. The power of the nation first and foremost, individually and collectively, must be used to the utmost in the winning of the war."

"Just as soon as the British Empire found itself again called upon to defend the small nation in 1914, which, of course, meant that upon Canada lay a like responsibility, I declared without hesitation at that time my desire to see all our resources conscripted to national service for the purpose of winning the war, an opinion I reiterated from the floor of the House at the last session of the Legislature," recounted Hon. Mr. Pattullo.

The Minister declared with emphasis that the question has been foisted with long enough, and worse, it was still being foisted with. "The situation is not being met," declared the Minister of Lands. "The whole nation should be put to service in the national cause. Each individual might easily be placed in the particular niche he is best qualified to fill. It is only by such a process that the complete energy of the Dominion can be mobilized with anything like proper effect."

"Then again," he proceeded, "the entire wealth of the nation should be placed at the disposal of the national Government. Profits and prices should most certainly be subjected to regulation on such a basis that every available source of national revenue may be taxed in proportion to its limit of ability to contribute to the treasury."

DISSOLUTION OF HOUSE IS LOOKED FOR SOON

Ottawa, August 7.—Parliament may prorogue on August 18. An early dissolution or prorogation is rumored in the corridors of the House. The third reading of the conscription bill is looked for in the Senate this week. The lower house will devote its energies to polishing off legislative ends.

END NOT YET



DEATH OF SIR RICHARD M'BRIDE, AGENT GENERAL OF B. C. IN LONDON

Word has been received here in town of the death of Sir Richard McBride, the agent general of British Columbia in Great Britain. Sir Richard had been very seriously ill for some considerable time, before his demise, suffering from Bright's disease, and had been practically blind.

Born in 1870, in New Westminster, he was educated in the public and high schools there and took his degree in Dalhousie University in 1890. He was called to the Bar in 1892, and succeeded in entering the Provincial House in 1898 as member for Dewdney. In 1900 he was Minister of Mines, in 1902 was leader of the Opposition, and since the first of June, 1903, was Prime Minister of British Columbia, until about two years ago, when he went to London as Agent General of this province.

A man of engaging personality, and exceeding charm of speech, as well as undoubted ability, the success of his career was rapid and remarkable. He was a cabinet Minister at the age of thirty, and a young man of thirty-three years, was Premier. He took hold of affairs in British Columbia when they were at a low ebb in the province, and taking advantage of that "tide in the affairs of men" it led him on to fortune. His personal popularity was universal, and his geniality and bonhomie won for him hosts of friends of all shades of political opinion.

When the news arrived at the great Liberal convention at Winnipeg last night, Premier Brewster paid a glowing tribute to the many sterling qualities of the man. British Columbia will mourn the loss of one of her great sons.

BELGIAN CAVALRY CAPTURE U-BOAT

Paris, August 6.—The German submarine that ran ashore on the French coast, west of Calais, on Thursday, was not destroyed when its crew set fire to the gasoline tank, but was captured by a troop of Belgian cavalry, according to a despatch from Calais.

The stranded submarine was first sighted by a customs officer. He called upon some Belgian horsemen who were exercising nearby, to come to his help. They rode down the beach, the message reports, surrounded the U-boat and made prisoners of the crew.

GENERAL NEWS ITEMS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Athens, August 7.—King Alexander took the oath of office today amid great pomp and ceremony.

Copenhagen—Captain Perseus, the German naval expert, says that the British fleet cannot be beaten. He tells his readers that no naval offensive will be undertaken by Germany.

Dr. Michaelis, the Chancellor, has returned to Berlin from Vienna. He will have a conference with the Kaiser tomorrow.

SAYS BRITISH WILL WORK WITH HUNS

Amsterdam, August 3.—Philip Heineken, Director of the North German Lloyd Steamship Line, says, in an annual report of the company, that the British will be compelled to collaborate with the Germans whether or not they like it, but that until this stage is reached German industry, trade and shipping will undergo a hard struggle. Herr Heineken believes that on account of the diminution of tonnage, due to the submarine war, high freight rates will prevail for two or three years after the war, with consequent benefit to shipping interests. He predicts that for a time Germany will find it necessary to restrict imports to highly important articles, such as grain and other foodstuffs.

Herr Heineken is of the opinion that if the German government will give its assistance in this difficult period the ground lost during the war will be re-won.

The North German Lloyd and the Hamburg-American Line, at the request of the German government, says the report, have opened offices in Poland to enable residents of occupied territory to join their families in America. The offices are at Warsaw, Kovna and Myslowitz. Several hundred persons emigrate from Poland each month. The steamship companies, Herr Heineken says, derive no profit from this work, which is done only in the interest of patriotism. The steamship companies deliver the immigrants to steamships in Holland.

The management of twenty camps for war prisoners has been taken over by the North German Lloyd. The Bremerhaven workshops of the company, Herr Heineken adds, are busy turning out war materials for the government.

AUSTRALIAN RECRUITS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Sydney, N. S. W., August 7.—The cry for recruits is becoming sharper and more insistent every day. The returned soldiers are re-enlisting all over Australia. They are shaming the shirkers and re-answering the call of the Empire.

FRENCH GOVERNMENT AS LEGAL GUARDIAN

Paris, August 6.—The Chamber of Deputies, by a unanimous vote, adopted the bill which has already passed the senate, known as "The Wards of the Nation." The bill provides that the state shall assume the position of legal guardian of all French war orphans. A committee will be nominated in each department to which the clergy as well as others, will be eligible, to take charge of the orphans and to act as far as possible as fathers.

It is estimated the plan will cost the state one billion francs a year.

OTTAWA WANTS CIVIC COAL YARD

Toronto, Aug. 6.—After hearing argument on the application of the Corporation of Ottawa for permission to issue debentures to the amount of \$100,000 to purchase coal and \$60,000 for buildings in connection with the establishment of a civic fuel yard, the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board reserved judgment.

GERMANS MAKE HARD ATTACKS IN FLANDERS

Hollebeke After Tremendous Bombardment Again Attacked by the German Troops Unsuccessfully.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, August 7.—Hollebeke, a Belgian town to the southeast of Ypres, which was the scene of a tremendous bombardment early yesterday morning, was again the object of a German counter attack last night. The enemy forces were repulsed by the British artillery fire with great losses.

French Front.

Paris, August 7.—Several very strong attacks made by the enemy at different parts of the French line were repulsed. Severe losses were inflicted. The situation in Belgium is unchanged.

Berlin Report.

Berlin, August 7.—Attacks by the British on the Ypres and Menin Road were repulsed. The Canadians have moved forward their line on a thousand-yard front at Lens.

Russian Front.

Petrograd, August 7.—The Russian troops are prepared for battle between the Dniester and the Pruth rivers.

KERENSKY IS PREMIER AND MINISTER OF WAR

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, August 7.—The new Russian cabinet has been chosen. Kerensky is Premier and also Minister of War and Marine, under the regime agreed upon. All factions have declared for unity. The Constitutional Democrats have swung into line behind Kerensky's rule.

LUMBER FOR THE CITY

At the meeting of the city council held last evening, Ald. McClymont intimated that the city is practically out of lumber. The trial order for forty thousand feet of Hemlock which was placed with Queen Charlotte Island Mills, is still lying there on the wharf, owing to it not being convenient for the Grand Trunk steamer to bring it in, and as a result, the city is suffering.

Ald. McClymont said that by co-operation with other people, it would be possible to land fire here, wharfage paid, for \$19 per thousand. By this means the city would save the difference between \$19 and \$23. The special lumber committee was continued in office with power to purchase up to 150,000 feet.

POLITICS

That the country is not at all satisfied with the findings of the McLeod-Tellier Commission, which investigated into the report of Mr. Justice Galt on the charges of jobbery and graft in Manitoba during the regime of the Hon. Robert Rogers there, as minister of public works, is evidenced throughout the country. Neither Liberals nor Conservatives have any reason to be proud of this latest coat of whitewash. As the Toronto Globe says:

The report of the McLeod-Tellier Commission will not satisfy public opinion, or alter its estimate of Mr. Rogers. The country's verdict on the man and his methods had been rendered years before Justice Galt put the judicial seal on it.

Take only one of the charges against him, and that not the most serious. As Minister of Public Works for Manitoba he personally invited a contractor to add \$8,700 to a tender for work for the Manitoba Government. A few days afterwards the contractor was asked by an agent of the Conservative party for a subscription to the Federal election fund, and contributed \$7,500. Mr. Justice Galt found a direct connection between the two incidents. Mr. Rogers was the "organizer of victory" in that election, and was rewarded with a portfolio in the Borden Government. But even assuming that the two transactions merely synchronized—as Sir Thos. White would say—was Mr. Rogers' offence any less grave? If a Cabinet Minister can with impunity solicit contractors to raise their own tenders for public works, there is no protection for the public treasury and no limit to official rascality. Everyone knows that such a thing would not be tolerated in private business.

Honest Conservatives are asking what is the sinister secret of Mr. Rogers' hold on Sir Robert Borden. Why did the Prime Minister choose him as a colleague at the Imperial Conference, when he was under the shadow of the Galt report? Why did the Prime Minister grant him the unprecedented

favor of creating a specially-selected whitewashing tribunal? Why did the Prime Minister show such indecent haste in restoring Mr. Rogers to his departmental duties before Parliament had even time to read the whitewashing report? The answers to these questions are contained in the reasons for Mr. Rogers' inclusion in the Cabinet six years ago. He was taken in because of his record in Manitoba as the creator of the most efficient and unscrupulous party machine in Canada. The machine came to grief when it lost its master hand, but the master has continued to practise his underground arts at Ottawa. Either he has made himself indispensable to the Administration or he knows too much about it.

The Manitoba Government will be justified in ignoring the McLeod-Tellier Commission and its finding, and in resenting the slur thrown on Mr. Justice Galt, and, through him, on the whole Judiciary of the province. To all intents and purposes the Quebec tribunal was selected to try the judge, not the politician. The report is fulsome in its "exonerations" of Mr. Rogers and insulting in its references to Justice Galt. It even finds an excuse for Mr. Rogers' tenderness toward the contractor. It says the poor man would have lost money if he had held to his original figure. If so, how much did he make after being held up for the party campaign fund? And how many contractors doing private work are begged to charge more than they ask? Of course in the two transactions—the giving of \$8,700 to the contractor by Mr. Rogers and the recovery of \$7,500 for the party exchequer—the McLeod-Tellier Commission sees only one of those coincidences of which innocent and good and great men like the Minister of Public Works are sometimes the victims.

Conservatives who are concerned for the good name of the party and the honor of public life will regret Mr. Rogers' reinstatement. They hoped the Government would be permanently rid of him. The Prime

Minister knows that no national Government can be formed with Rogers as a member. But there will be rejoicing in the class whose interest in politics is purely selfish, and who admire Mr. Rogers because they profit or hope to profit by his methods.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

An income tax of four per cent. is to replace the present excess profits tax which is from 25 to 75 per cent. on all above 7 per cent. This is government of the people for the profiteers. Maybe another Minister of Finance may object to four per cent. though.

Last week a member of the I. W. W. who called the United States soldiers "scabs" was taken from his lodgings and hanged. Apropos of this, a remark was heard on the street lately "A lamp post, a rope and a food profiteer in close propinquity would bring down food prices quicker than anything." But this is a law abiding country, even when the profiteers make the laws.

One of the most surprising deeds of cavalry in this war happened only recently, notwithstanding all that has been said about cavalry being useless in modern warfare. They captured a submarine. There have been many surprises since the war began, but this is certainly the most novel event.



A recommendation that a bylaw be introduced to borrow \$10,000 for watermain extension in twenty year 6 per cent, serial bonds was brought to the council meeting last night from the finance committee. This, it was explained, was made necessary by the development of the east end of the city. The Emerson sawmill and the new fish plant both require service, and even now, householders out there had an insufficient pressure. It was agreed to hold the matter over for one week.

FOOD CONSERVATION

"Our paramount duty is to save food for export," such is the declaration of Hon. W. J. Hanna, Canada's food controller.
