GREAT EXECUTION AMONG GERMAN PLANES

FRENCH RAIDS AND COUNTER ATTACKS ON WESTERN FRONT—ITALIANS ATTACK

GREAT AERIAL ACTIVITY ON WEST FRONT

British Bring Down Thirty Enemy
Machines—French Also Cause
Destruction Among the
Enemy Aircraft.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, August 20.—General
reports no major actions in
the infantry fighting in the Ypres
region. German attacks in the
northwest of Lens have been re-
pulsed. Thirty German aero-
planes have been brought down
by the British aviators, eighteen
of which were driven down out of
control. The British lost twelve
machines.

Stormed Trenches.
On the Somme front, the Brit-
ish stormed the German trenches
in the neighborhood of Guillemont
farm. Raiding parties also
succeeded in entering the Ger-
man positions southwest of Hav-
incourt, inflicting heavy casual-
ties on the enemy and taking many
prisoners. A casualty clearing
station behind the British lines
was bombed by a Hun aeroplane,
killing ten German prisoners.

French Front.
Paris, Aug. 20.—French troops
have completed their conquest of
the enemy territory south of the
Jansbeke river, and the Breen-
ke river. Two strong German
regiments, Les Lillas and Mondovi
arm, which have held out against
all attacks since the beginning of
the allied offensive on Thursday,
have now capitulated.

His Fifty-Second.
Guy Meyer, the famous French
aviator, brought down his fifty-
second enemy aeroplane on Satur-
day. In the region north of
Nancy, German aeroplanes drop-
ped bombs, without inflicting any
casualties. Yesterday seven Ger-
man aeroplanes and a captive
balloon were brought down by our
pilots. Eight other German planes
were forced to land behind the
German lines badly damaged.

In Dutch.
The Hague, August 20.—Two
German aeroplanes, each carrying
three men landed near Winscho-
ten today. One was brought down
in flames, and the other was shot
down by Dutch soldiers. The oc-
cupants of both machines were
uninjured.

At Lens.
London, Aug. 20.—The Crown
Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria con-
tinues to hurl his counter attacks
against the positions captured by
the Canadians in their recent of-
fensive in the region of Lens. The
Germans have always been driven
back with very heavy losses.

TREMENDOUS EXPLOSION IN POWDER PLANT

Powder Factory Employing Five
Thousand Men and Women in
Quebec Blown up—Twenty
Five Believed Killed.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Montreal, August 20.—A tre-
mendous explosion wrecked the
plant and buildings of the powder
factory belonging to Messrs Curtis
and Harvey, the big powder man-
ufacturers. The plant was situ-
ated at Rigaud, in Quebec province
and it is believed that twenty-five
persons have lost their lives. The
buildings are still blazing, and a
search for the bodies is impos-
sible. Five thousand men and
women were employed when the
explosion occurred. It has been
reported that the company's of-
ficials had been warned that the
plant would be blown up, and that
several threats of that character
had been received and ignored. An
official stated however, that he
was satisfied that the explosion
was caused by fire, which had
started from overheated machin-
ery, and was really accidental.

THE FOOD EMBARGO

(Special to The Daily News.)
The Hague, Aug. 20.—A com-
mission from The Netherlands to
the United States has left Holland
en route for New York. They will
discuss with the United States
Government questions arising
from the embargo placed upon
food exports to neutral countries,
which is affecting Holland severe-
ly.

Western Liberals' Platform

The following is the resolution which was moved by Dr.
D. B. Neely, Humboldt, Sask., seconded by Capt. C. S. Reilly,
Calgary, and carried at the Winnipeg Liberal Convention:—

"In this war for the defence of democratic civilization
against military despotism, the conditions call for the putting
forth by each allied belligerent of its full power as the only
assurance of victory; in times of peril the entire resources
of the country, moral and material, man power and wealth
are justly disposable by the state for the preservation of its
national liberties.

"The imperative duty of the people of Canada today in
regard to the war is its continued and vigorous prosecution;
"1. By conferring with the British government for the
purpose of definitely ascertaining the scope and character
of all the service that can best be rendered by Canada in the
conduct of the war;

"2. By the maintenance in unimpaired strength at the
front of our fighting forces and the taking of all steps neces-
sary to secure required reinforcements for the Canadian
contingent.

"3. By organizing the production of our other con tribu-
tions to the war such as food, munitions, and other war
necessities, upon lines of the greatest efficiency;

"4. By the complete extinction of profiteering in all busi-
ness having to do with munitions and the necessities of life,
if necessary by the nationalization of these industries or by
the adaptation of the British system of controlled establish-
ments;

"5. By the recovery for the public treasury of undue
profits obtained since the beginning of the war by the ex-
ploitation of the interests of the people for the present re-
quirements of the state.

"6. By the application of a combined system of sharply
graduated taxation upon incomes and excess profits which
shall insure that every citizen shall bear his or her share
of the war burden according to his or her means.

"7. By thoroughly organizing the nation and carrying
out this programme by whatever means may be necessary for
its accomplishment."

ALLIED SEAMEN WILL MIND HUN MURDERERS

London, August 20.—The atti-
tude of allied and neutral seamen
towards German seamen because
of the brutality and inhumanity
shown by the Germans during the
war will be considered here at a
meeting of the Seamen's Inter-
national Conference. Delegates
will be present from Norway, Swe-
den, Denmark, Holland, France,
Italy, and probably Russia. It is
said that the object of the con-
ference is to consider crimes com-
mitted by commanders and crews
of submarines, and to pass a
resolution on the conduct of J.
Havelock Wilson, President of the
International Seamen's Union,
who, in a statement last Saturday,
said the Sailors and Firemen's
Union was fully determined to
stick to its guns and refuse to
carry peace delegates abroad.

The prospectus of the meeting
says the delegates also will con-
sider "what shall be our attitude
toward German seamen after the
war unless they cease their pre-
sent murderous tactics."

The first session of the con-
ference was held on Saturday,
when it was proposed that all
Germans shall be forever debar-
red from sailing on British ships.

with 6,000 lbs.

THE ALL AIR ROUTE ROUND THE EMPIRE

London.—The annual report of
the Aerial League of the British
Empire, which has as its object
the preparation of an impartial
analysis of Great Britain's aerial
position compared generally with
that of other countries, states
that the League anticipated that
it would be called upon to assist
in the development of aviation
for commercial and other pur-
poses after the war in connection
with the Civil Aerial transport
Committee. The Committee has
embarked on a scheme for acquir-
ing areas for landing grounds and
the provision of aerodromes and
directing towers along well de-
fined aerial routes at various im-
portant centres throughout the
United Kingdom. These areas had
been selected on the recommenda-
tion of a committee of officers
from the Air Departments of the
Admiralty and War Office, which
had been formed for the purpose
of dealing with that specific un-
dertaking. This committee of
officers had expressed its full ap-
proval of the League's scheme.
The actual site of the landing
ground in each respective area, it
is reported, will be selected by
the Aerial League in conjunction
with the experts appointed by the
Air Departments, and wireless
telegraphic apparatus will be in-
stalled within convenient distance
in such positions as will not en-
danger aviators on landing. The
landing grounds, which will be as
near as possible to large towns,
will be placed at the service of all
aviators on reasonable terms, and
each will be managed by a local
committee in direct affiliation with
the League.

In an interview the hon. secre-
tary, Mr. Alexander H. Varnier,
said: "As a result of the League's
activities agencies have been es-
tablished at various strategic
points in different parts of the
Empire with the object of ringing
the globe within an aerial route.
Among the places may be men-
tioned Singapore, North Borneo,
Norfolk Island, and even at the
Victoria Falls, Central Africa."

ITALIANS ARE ON OFFENSIVE ON WIDE FRONT

Fighting With Extreme Bitterness
In Progress on Front of
Thirty-Seven Miles
on the Isonzo.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Vienna, August 20.—The Italian
troops have begun a heavy off-
ensive against the Austrians in the
Isonzo region. The fighting com-
menced with great fury and is
still in progress, extending on a
front of thirty-seven miles. Ex-
treme bitterness is being dis-
played on both sides.

Russian Front.
Petrograd, Aug. 20.—The Ger-
mans attacked the Russian posi-
tions near Stakhovey on the Wilna
front and were beaten back with
great losses. Continuous and con-
centrated attacks were made on
the Russo-Romanian front by
the Austro-German forces, which
were all successfully repelled.

The Pope's Peace Note.
Copenhagen, August 20.—It is
reported that the sentiment of the
members of the Reichstag main
committee, which meets on Tues-
day for the first time since the
recent cabinet changes, is in
favor of the discussion of the
Pope's peace note.

Re Hospital Ships.
Madrid, August 20.—The Ger-
man Military Attache here has
handed to the Spanish Govern-
ment the Kaiser's definite accept-
ance of the conditions under
which hospital ships are to be
protected from the attacks of
submarines. Under this agree-
ment, a neutral commissioner is
to be carried upon each hospital
ship, to guarantee that it trans-
ports only sick and wounded.

BARON COCHIN RESIGNS

ELECTIONS

At the present moment there are about twenty-five vacant chairs in the Dominion House of Commons in Ottawa. These vacancies have arisen from various causes—death, loss of seats on account of graft, profiteering and corrupt practices, acceptance of vacancies in the Senate, and so forth—and of course, in the meantime, these various constituencies are unrepresented in the Dominion Parliament. Many of the supporters of the present Borden Government have been elevated to permanent places in the Upper Chamber, but never a by-election has been held since the beginning of the war. To even take a chance upon the continuous disapproval of the present Government by the electors, which undoubtedly would have happened, was far too risky a thing.

According to the terms of Confederation, representation of the people in the Dominion House is governed by the population of the different provinces. As far back as 1911, when the last census was taken, it was found that the increase in population in the four Western provinces of Manitoba, Alberta, Saskatchewan and British Columbia since 1901 was so great that a redistribution of seats giving them the relative representation which was their right, was a necessity. Altogether, twenty more seats on the basis of population, would have to be provided for the Western Provinces, in order that they might be equally represented in the councils of the Dominion. That was the state of affairs discovered in the year 1911, and since that time, the four Western Provinces have been short of just that number of votes in the House of Commons.

True, a measure providing for the redistribution of seats was passed by the Government, but it has never been given effect to yet, owing to certain circumstances, which are still familiar to those who have taken an interest in Parliamentary procedure in the Dominion since that time. So between the vacancies that have

occurred in the House, and the under-representation of the West, the House of Commons is about forty-five votes short of what it ought to be.

The Borden Government has now a majority in the House, but so fearful it was of the continuance of that majority, it dared not risk bringing it down. The Minister of Elections keeps his ear fairly close to the ground. So from the point of view of the Government, it would have been an unwise thing for their own safety to have filled up the vacancies. Of course, it did not matter that the people in these particular constituencies were disenfranchised in the meantime. Such considerations weigh lightly with the reactionaries. They are the more concerned for their own continuance in office than that the will of the people should be even consulted.

If the Borden Government felt that it possessed the confidence of the people, it would have seen to it that these vacancies were filled up at the earliest possible moment. The principles of democracy demand such action. But no! The principles of Democracy may be all very well as "good electioneering," but when it comes down to cases, the Borden Government takes another thought. Why imperil their existence for the mere principles of democracy? They were too busy winning the war to permit of such distraction as a by-election.

To win the war is the first consideration, but that is not incompatible with the holding of an election. Take the example of the Mother of Parliaments. Great Britain has an equal interest in winning the war as has Canada, but there, whenever a vacancy occurs in the British House of Commons, an election is held immediately, and every constituency is fully represented. The late Premier Asquith himself tested the confidence of the people in his administration, when he ran in a by-election nearly two years ago. And only last week, Premier Lloyd George intimated that if the Labor men showed their dissatisfaction with his administration by their action,

he was prepared to appeal to the country. But the war will be won, just the same.

The Borden Government is well aware that it has forfeited the confidence of the people of Canada. It has been found out. That is the reason of its desire for another extension of the life of Parliament. Another year in power would look good to them right now, because they know well that the electors of Canada would give them no extension. With representation equalized by the election of the twenty new members from the Western Provinces, and the filling of the twenty-five vacant seats, they are fearful of the result. And from their record of the past six years, they may well be fearful.

HON. T. D. PATTULLO ON CONSCRIPTION

Victoria, Aug. 17.—"The unanimity of viewpoint at the Winnipeg Convention was so marked as to leave no room for doubt as to the attitude of mind of Western Canada upon the problems confronting us," said the Hon. T. D. Pattullo to a press representative here. "We must show ourselves big enough to accomplish two great purposes. The first of these purposes is to win the war, and the second one is properly and adequately to take care of the internal economy of Canada. In other words, we must win the war and at the same time preserve internal unity."

"Those who give no thought to internal conditions," continued the Minister, "but blindly rush to the single solution of coercion, in which they are encouraged by the profiteers who are holding Canada in thrall, are unconsciously doing the Empire and the cause of freedom and justice a poor service."

"The Liberal party is in favor of conscription of all our resources for the winning of the war, including man-power," went on Mr. Pattullo, "but it is in favor of the intelligent application of measures to this end and not a super-hysterical application. This is the time for sensible men to hold their heads. All our material resources must be marshalled in every form to the service of the state, including also the regulation of wages and prices."

Unequal Burdens.

Passing on to the economic conditions now prevailing in the Dominion, the Minister of Lands continued: "The purchasing power of the dollar is every day diminishing, while the rich are getting richer and the poor becoming poorer. From present indications before the war is over the interest on Canada's debt will be as large or larger than the ordinary revenue. Who is to pay this debt and provide the amounts necessary to carry on? The mass of the people will owe the money to a few of the people, and the masses, though seemingly able to come and go, will as truly be economic slaves as were the negroes in the south actual chattels."

Away With Theories.

"It won't do," went on the minister. "I wish to reiterate what I have several times stated, that no man has the right to a single dollar of abnormal profits from the operations of the war. All the superprofits must be taken by the state for the liquidation of our national indebtedness. The will and welfare of the people as a whole must be supreme. In this epochal time, those who fight, and those dependent upon those who fight, must be thoroughly and adequately provided for. All others must give time and service and wealth for the benefit of all. This aspect must not remain a nebulous theory; it must be put into actual practice. We must have a government with the will and the foresight to do."

"The citadel of privilege is tottering and those in command," concluded Mr. Pattullo, "are seeking to deceive by loud shoutings of lip loyalty designed to mislead the unthinking, but the intelligent understanding is now aroused, and nothing will satisfy but the sovereign will and good of all the people shall and must be paramount."

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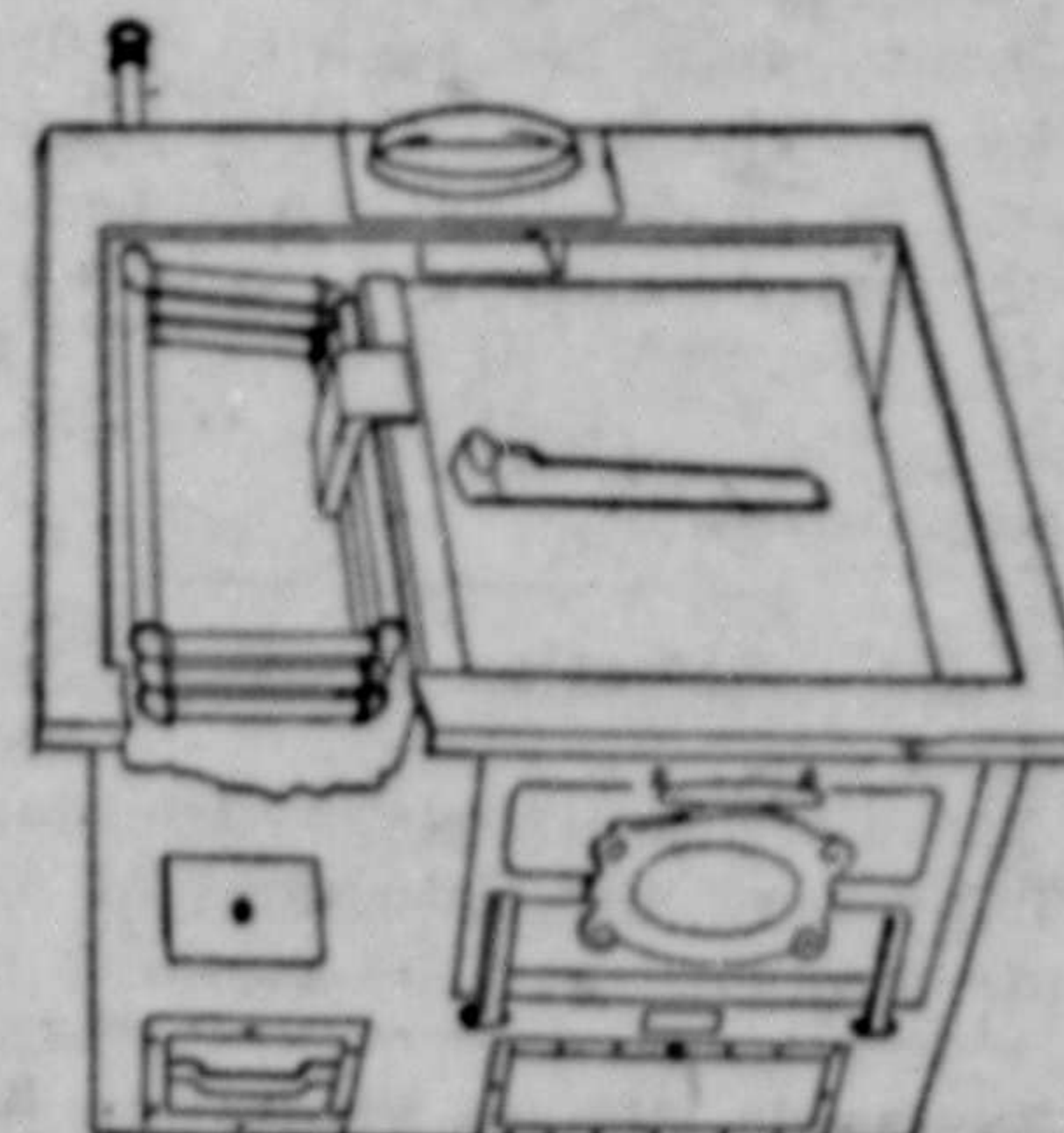
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
