ITALY DELIVERS ANOTHER SMASHING BLOW

NEW POSITIONS OF THE AUSTRIANS ARE STORMED--FRENCH CAPTURE HILL 304

AUSTRIANS' NEW POSITIONS ARE ALSO CAPTURED

Many More Prisoners Captured by Italians--Violent Counter Attacks Broken up and Guns Taken.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Rome, August 25.—The battle on the Isonzo front is still in progress. Sixty guns have been captured from the enemy. General Cadorna's army is continuing to fiercely assail the Austro-German forces. Yesterday the Italians stormed the new Austrian positions. Violent counter attacks were made by the enemy to recover his lost ground, but his attacks were broken up and a further large number of Austrian-Hungarian prisoners were taken. More than twenty thousand prisoners have been captured since the offensive started. Immense quantities of munitions have also been taken.

HUN RAIDERS BOMB HOSPITAL AT RAMSGATE

Notwithstanding Huge Red Cross Signs, Chatham House Wards Were Reduced to Matchwood and Scrap.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, August 24.—Chatham House at Ramsgate, used as the Canadian Military Hospital, with the adjoining Townley Castle, was bombed in the air raid on Wednesday, when ten German raiding machines appeared over the Kent coast. A huge Red Cross was spread on the ground to indicate the character of the building and such could not have failed to have been visible from the air. Notwithstanding this, bombs were dropped direct on the buildings used as hospitals, two wards being reduced to matchwood and scrap iron. One invalided soldier was killed and a number of others injured.

THE AUSTRIANS PREPARING TO QUIT TRIESTE

State Archives and Objects of Art are Being Forwarded to Vienna for Greater Security.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, August 24.—Information has been received that the Austrians for weeks past have been preparing to evacuate Trieste. All the state archives and the most valuable objects of art in the museums, libraries and churches have been removed and sent to Vienna, where it is considered they will have greater security. The Italian inhabitants of the city have been subjected to a ruthless reign of terror.

Russian Front.

London, August 25.—The Allies eyes today are turned to Russia. Germany is driving powerfully towards Riga. A number of dispatches from Petrograd admit considerable advance. The possibility of the Government moving from Petrograd to Moscow has been suggested. Petrograd is less than a hundred miles from Riga. The absence of official information respecting the Russian activities is causing considerable discussion.

No Mention.

Petrograd, August 25.—The Russian official statement makes no mention of the fighting in the Riga front. On the Rumanian front the Austrian attacks have been repulsed.

The Arch Enemy.

Copenhagen, August 25.—"England, the arch enemy of Germany, must be beaten at whatever cost" is what the Emperor William told his troops while on a visit to Flanders on Wednesday.

THE REORGANIZATION OF BORDEN'S CABINET

Ottawa, August 22.—This week is expected to be one of the most interesting of the present session of Parliament and may be historic in the annals of the country. Several events of importance are looked for, and one already has taken place—the retirement of Hon. Robert Rogers. One of the incidents is the granting of the Royal sanction to the Conscription Bill. This is the final step required to make a law of what is as yet a bill. Such sanction would put the Government in a position to organize exemption tribunals and call out the first classes of conscripts. While many feel that there will be no calling out of men under conscription until after the pending general election, all agree there will be no delay in obtaining the Royal sanction for the bill, because as soon as the measure has been assented to certain provisions will take effect. There has been a somewhat lively criticism going on in various Canadian publications, particularly Le Devoir, the Journal of Henri Bourassa, and this will have to be greatly modified or stopped altogether. The conscription bill provides a fine and imprisonment for those uttering teachings of disobedience to the measure.

New Cabinet.

It is regarded as a certainty that before the week is out Sir Robert Borden will announce the details of the government reorganization he has been working upon since the session began. His first effort to strengthen his Government by eliminating dead wood and taking in live men commenced with the coalition offer Sir Robert made to Sir Wilfrid Laurier directly after his announcement of conscription. Ever since that time there has been no let-up in the efforts of the administration to get certain men whom they desire to accept portfolios. The latch string is still out for such men as F. B. Carvell, F. F. Pardee, N. W. Rowell, Hon. J. A. Calder and Hon. A. B. Hudson, but none of them are willing to come in on the terms offered. The great stumbling block has been Hon. Robert Rogers. Now Mr. Rogers is gone. Since Sir Clifford Sifton has taken charge of Cabinet reorganization, events have moved more quickly. He is not so particular as to the men he gets. All that (Continued on Page four.)

U. S. EXTENDS FURTHER CREDIT TO RUSSIA

(Special to The Daily News.)
Washington, August 25.—The United States Government today extended a further credit of a hundred million dollars to Russia. This is Secretary McAdoo's answer to the gloomy rumors of fear for a Russian collapse, which has created a feeling of unrest and a lack of confidence in this country. Russia's credit is now \$275,000,000.
The Government's shipbuilding programme calls for a total of 1,270 ships of 7,969,000 tonnage. This was revealed today when a request was made for a new billion dollar appropriation.

HUNGARIANS HAVE A NEW PREMIER

Stockholm, Aug. 25.—The appointment of Dr. Alexander Wekerle to be the new Hungarian premier marks a step of the utmost importance towards the real democratization and complete independence from both Austria and Germany. The new premier is one of the most popular Hungarian statesmen, and is noted for his democratic spirit.

CONCRETE SHIP IS LAUNCHED IN NORWAY

Christiania, August 25.—The first Norwegian iron and concrete vessel has been launched at the Posgrun Cement Works in the presence of Prime Minister Knudsen.

FRENCH TROOPS GAIN ALL THEIR OBJECTIVES

Are Now Masters of All Important Points on the Verdun Front Heavy Fighting Still Continuing.

London, Aug. 25.—Heavy fighting took place during the night to the south of Lens, where the Canadian troops captured more trenches from the enemy. Fierce encounters also took place along the Ypres-Menin road. The British troops also hold the German trenches immediately northwest of the bitterly disputed Green Cassier. The Portuguese troops repulsed German raiders at two points in the region of La Basse.

French Front.

Paris, August 25.—The French troops made an attack this morning on the left bank of the Meuse between Avocourt Wood and Dead Man's Hill. The French gained all their objectives, advancing to an average depth of two kilometres. The French troops are now masters of all important points on the Verdun front. The famous Hill 304 has been taken from the forces of the Crown Prince and is now firmly in the possession of the French.

Berlin Admits It.

Berlin, August 25.—The evacuation by the Germans of Hill 304, the famous stronghold on the Verdun front, is announced here officially.

DR. DYDE LECTURES ON SHAKESPEARE

A very large and appreciative audience listened to the Rev. Dr. Dyde in the Presbyterian Church Hall last night. "An evening with Shakespeare" was the subject of the evening. The Rev. Dr. Dyde acted the part of many of the well known characters of the great playwright, and explained the whys and wherefores of their actions. As Hamlet, Richard III. and Macbeth, Dr. Dyde excelled, and other characters were also portrayed. These recitals were very much enjoyed, and the short talks given in between by the lecturer showed him to be a keen student of the works of Shakespeare.

As a mirror of the times in which he lived, Shakespeare's plays form a medium without which the times of Queen Elizabeth would be very much less known.

The story of Shakespeare told last evening will prove to be a greater incentive to the reading of the plays. There was also a short musical programme to which Miss Speer, of Vancouver, who is visiting the city, and the Misses Stephen contributed.

ROGERS'S RETIREMENT

Mr. Rogers's retirement from the cabinet has a farce-comedy accompaniment quite in accord with the political stage-play in which he has been the central figure during the last few months. He has resigned, he says, because he has lost patience with the Government. Its dilatoriness in enforcing the compulsory service law and other necessary measures became intolerable to him. He has discovered—after three years—that it is inept and irresolute and he cannot have anything more to do with it. In point of fact Mr. Rogers's indictment is true, but considering the source from which it emanates the rich humor of it will find general appreciation. The abandonment of the Government by the late Minister of Public Works because he does not like its ways is a spectacle for the gods.

Mr. Rogers resigned to escape dismissal. Strong influences were operating against him. His domination over the Premier was unquestionably strong, but that of other elements and the pressure of circumstances were stronger. First it was recognized that he was a political liability, instead of a political asset, and had been so ever since the people of Manitoba destroyed his machine. Secondly, it was realized that as long as he was a member of the Government it was useless to attempt to form what would even remotely resemble a union ministry. It was this second consideration, in all probability, which fortified the hand of Sir Clifford Sifton into whose arms Sir Robert Borden has thrown himself and Mr. Rogers, seeing the handwriting on the wall, now resigns to save what little prestige remains to him. Several days ago Ottawa dispatches foreshadowed his retirement with that of a number of his colleagues.

Mr. Rogers is a type of politician which has had its day. His methods were patterned on the Tammany model, that order of "practical politics" against which the public conscience has been thoroughly roused wherever it has flourished. The unscrupulous ma-

chine in Manitoba, the wreck of which involved the death, under a cloud, of one minister, and the narrow escape from the penitentiary of others, besides the imprisonment of a prominent contractor, was the product of Mr. Rogers's political methods. He never should have been taken into the Dominion cabinet. Sir Robert Borden was warned privately and publicly against any such course but, as usual, capitulated to the influences—notably the Mackenzie & Mann interests—which sponsored the claims of the Manitoba politician.

Once in the ministry Rogers soon made himself the virtual master of it and his influence was paramount up to within a few weeks ago, when he was whitewashed by special process on the Galt findings. His colleagues now realize that he is a broken reed; that the methods of "practical politics" are of no avail for the solution of the grave problems which confront this Dominion and that, indeed, they make for "confusion worse confounded." The disappearance of his influence from the Government in itself is a good thing for the country, provided it be permanent. Whether the Prime Minister will be strong enough to turn it to the best advantage remains to be seen. If, however, the suppression of Rogers and ward politics means the elevation of Sifton and government by the big interests, the outlook will not have been bettered.—Victoria Times.

MORE GUNS NEEDED

Guns and more guns are needed in France. American officers inspecting the British front have been impressed with the great necessity for artillery. Men, money and munitions have been the three great factors in the war. Canada has given splendidly of all three but there must be more giving if the record of the country is to be maintained. Expenditures will increase. Half a billion dollars have already been added to the national debt. It is estimated that the war will cost nearly \$2,000,000 a day this year. The financial resources of the country must be mobilized if the burden

FOOD SITUATION IN GERMANY IS VERY BAD

Amsterdam.—The German press is again paying considerable attention to the Fatherland's economic condition, and the general impression gathered from various articles is that the state of affairs is exceedingly bad in many ways. There appears to have been a re-erudescence of war profiteering, and the Socialist papers are protesting vigorously at the rising prices for such things as fruit and vegetables at a time when prices should have been falling.

Extraordinary confusion appears to prevail with regard to the distribution of vegetables. The "Hamburger Echo" points out that there is in Berlin a bureau employing 700 officials to supervise this distribution. It works in conjunction with branches all over the country, and there are everywhere bodies to control prices. The organization, says the journal, is all that is admirable, only it does not provide vegetables. In Berlin vegetables appear to be obtained either by pure chance or by payment of exorbitant prices, and complaints appear in every issue of every paper. The whole ponderous organization is incapable of securing the bringing of supplies to market or of preventing producers selling their produce secretly at high prices to those who can afford to pay. Thus producers are making enormous profits, and ordinary people can have nothing.

Complaints about bread are rife. The "Taegliche Rundschau" for example, prints a letter from a resident in the Wilmsdorf suburb of Berlin, in which it is stated that he has been for two weeks without bread, as what he obtained was mouldy.

Coal is exceedingly scarce. Munich reports that it is practically without household supplies. Krefeld's supplies are immediately to be reduced by two-thirds. Most cities will soon be placed under severe rationing both as regards coal and gas.

The Dusseldorf authorities have prohibited street lighting till the middle of September. Only on particularly dark nights, and if there is gas to spare, will street lamps be lit between eleven and one. The lighting of shop windows will not be allowed. The three Bavarian Universities and the technical high school will be closed from October 1 till February 2 to effect a saving in the coal supply.

Such are a few examples of the state of affairs, and they are typical of very many more reported from all over the country.

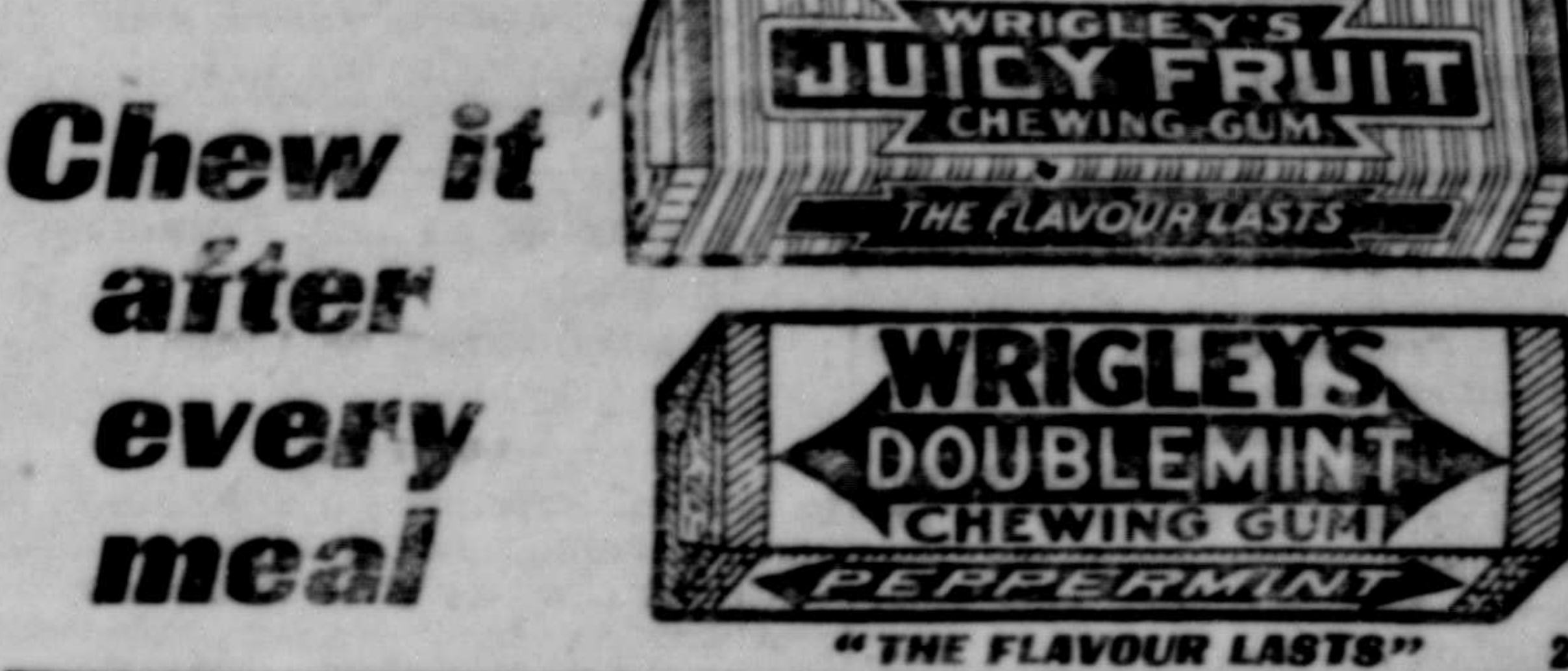
