BRITISH ATTACKS RESUMED ON ST. QUENTIN

FIERCE FIGHTING IS GENERAL ON ALL FRONTS — ITALIAN SUCCESS CONTINUES

THREE GREAT DRIVES MADE AGAINST TEUTONIC LINES

OFFENSIVE RESUMED BY BRITISH AND FRENCH. BOTH FRONTS ARE ADVANCED—ITALIAN DRIVE CONTINUES UNINTERRUPTEDLY—STUPENDOUS CASUALTIES INFLICTED UPON AUSTRIANS

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Aug. 28.—Three great drives are being made against the Teutonic lines on three different fronts today. The British and French have resumed their offensive, while Italy continues her fierce drive uninterrupted. In one week the Italians have taken approximately ninety square miles of Austrian territory, and upon twenty-five thousand Austrian prisoners, a vast store of guns, munitions and supplies, and have inflicted stupendous casualties upon the enemy which are estimated at seventy-five thousand.

French Front.
Paris, August 28.—The French troops, changing their point of attack from the left bank of the Meuse to the right, struck another blow at the German defences out of Verdun. The initial shock carried the French nearly a mile forward on a two-mile front, capturing eleven hundred prisoners. The efforts of the German Crown Prince to maintain an offensive on the Aisne front has resulted in complete failure.

British Front.
London, August 28.—The British drove successfully against the German positions north of St. Quentin, in a sector where there has been little fighting in the last two months. Powerfully fortified posts on the Hindenburg line were stormed and taken, and the British front advanced half a mile on a mile front. Southeast of Langemarck, near Ypres, an attack was also carried out successfully.

Canadian Losses.
Ottawa, August 28.—As the result of the heavy fighting on the Canadian front, over a thousand casualties have been reported over the weekend.

CITY'S BANKING ACCOUNT CHANGED

At the meeting of the city council held last evening, a report was read from the finance committee regarding the city's banking account, and recommending that it be transferred from the Bank of Montreal to the Royal Bank of Canada. A report from the city treasurer was read giving the grounds on which the committee had based their recommendation. This report showed that in the matter of exchange it was possible that the city might save money by making the change. The city treasurer entered fully into the details whereby this might be effected.

Ald. Nelson, speaking as chairman of the finance committee, explained that the city had received a favorable offer from Spitzer, Roerig & Co., of Toledo, who disposed of the city's bonds, which in the matter of exchange alone would be advantageous to the city. Nevertheless, it was considered that so long as the chartered banks of Canada were available, the acceptance of this offer was not considered advisable. The Bank of Montreal had been approached with a view to their giving the city better terms, but they could not see their way clear, therefore, he favored making this change, which he had every reason to believe would be more advantageous to the city. He pointed out that among banking institutions, it was not etiquette to go after each other's business, and that, therefore, the banks would not tender on such a subject.

Ald. McClymont did not see why the other banks could not be approached on this subject. It might be better to take them all into consideration, when the best one might be selected in the city's interests. With this in view, he moved that the matter be deferred for a week. Ald. McRae seconded his amendment, being in complete agreement with Ald. McClymont.

Ald. Dybbavn was in favor of effecting a change. He regarded (Continued on Page four.)

BORDEN AS LEADER IS UNACCEPTABLE TO THE WESTERN MEN

Coalition Negotiations Fall Down on Question of Premiership —The West Will Not Have Borden.

Ottawa, August 22.—Coalition negotiations have got down to this: It isn't a question so much of who shall go in as it is a question of who shall be leader. After three days conferring on the matter, western members have departed for home without having given any answer to the offers made to them. It is stated that some sort of unanimity was obtained as to a cabinet slate, but similar unanimity was lacking when it came to the question of who shall be the head of it. Western men contend that it cannot be Borden. They expressed this opinion pretty plainly. Conservative members thereupon gently suggested that Sir Thomas White might do. To this also they offered quite strong objections. Sir Thomas has been too long connected with the big interests. He was a Liberal once, but changed his politics with the noble eighteen of Toronto on reciprocity.

Suggest Mr. Carvell.
Who then would the western men suggest? The western men, it is stated, consulted briefly and came back with the name "Carvell." That spoiled the whole thing. Hon. Arthur Meighen, it is said, at once raised vociferous objection, and other Conservative members present also opposed the suggestion. This is significant. Mr. Carvell is the man to whom more than anyone else is due the credit for any improvements in military organization the government has ever inaugurated. It was he who drove two profiteering members of the government out of office in 1915. It was he who exposed the shell and fuse scandals, as a result of which the whole organization of (continued on Page Four.)

THE REPORT FROM THE COUNCIL COMMITTEE

The report from the council sitting in committee of the whole of Thursday evening, the 23rd inst., was presented to the regular meeting of the council last evening. In connection of the supply of steel pipe for the water main extension to Seal Cove made necessary by the industrial activity there, quotations were received from various firms and it was agreed that the lowest tender be accepted.

In the matter of the increases of pay, it was recommended that the rates for the men working on the watermains extension be increased from 45c to 50c per hour; that J. N. Morrison and A. B. Love be restored to their previous rate of \$150 per month; R. A. Walker to \$140 per month; the foreman at Shawatians and the operators to \$150 and \$125 respectively; the city engineer to \$160; that J. Joy and R. Bury receive an increase of \$5.00 per month.

The committee report was adopted. A report was also read from Mr. T. C. Duncan, superintendent of utilities, regarding the light department linemen. As the increase asked by these men to \$5.75 for an eight-hour day was not granted, they had left the city's employ. The superintendent understood that the other two linemen were also prepared to quit, unless they received an increase. In view of the approaching bad weather, it was considered inadvisable to let them go, and they were willing to compromise the matter in accepting \$5.50. It was also recommended that S. V. Cox be granted an increase from 45c to 50c per hour.

This report was adopted.

INCORPORATION OF NEW ICE AND COLD STORAGE CO.

Word was received by the mayor this morning from Captain J. J. Logan to the effect that the Prince Rupert Ice and Cold Storage Company was incorporated today. The plans and specifications have been completed, and Captain Logan himself expects to arrive in the city immediately. The work of the erection of the buildings for the new plant will be proceeded with on the site leased, which is just across Cow Bay, and will be a great addition to the fishing industry.

FISH ARRIVALS

Yesterday, the Corona brought in 12,000 lbs. halibut; the Dolphin 13,000; the Helgeland, 86,000, and the Doreen, 4,000 lbs. Price attained to the height of 14c per lb. which yesterday constituted a record for car lots. Today, however, that record was surpassed when the price realized was 15 1/4 cents. Last March, for small less than carlots, 17 1/2 cents per lb. was paid, but for larger carlot quantities, today's price is the highest on record. The boats in today are the Alliance No. 1 with 10,000 lbs.; Guildford, 5,000; Unity 5,000; Maude, 7,000, and the Chief Skugaid, 5,000 lbs. for the Cold Storage Co.

ON THE RUSSIAN FRONT ACTIVITY IS NOTICEABLE

German Advance on Riga is Apparently Halted—Russians Successful in Caucasus and Roumania.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, Aug. 28.—A German offensive is apparently being prepared for in the Baranovici region midway between the Minsk and Pinsk marshes. The hostile artillery has developed a fire of the greatest intensity in that sector, and the German aviators are looking over the Russian lines in large numbers.

In the direction of Vladimir-Volynski in lower Volhynia, the enemy infantry attempted an offensive, but was smothered under the Russian barrage fire.

On the Roumanian front, the Russo-Roumanian forces retook the heights and positions north-west of Soveia. Mackenzen's army in the Kokshani district is unable to advance against the strengthened defending line.

In the Caucasus region, the Russian success continues. The Turks have been expelled from the Sheikhiya mountain line, west of Ushnia and driven into the valley of the Budari Sheikhiya river.

Riga Front.
London, August 28.—The Teuton advance upon Riga has apparently been halted, as all reference to this region has been omitted from both Berlin and Petrograd official statements for two days.

Bulgarian Ideals.
Copenhagen, August 28.—The annexation of large amounts of territory will be insisted upon by Bulgaria, according to an interview with Premier Radisloff. The premier is also quoted as saying that the formation of a large Imperial Federation of Middle Europe might soon be expected.

The Moscow Conference.
Moscow, August 28.—Russia will maintain her democracy at all costs. She intends to use the weapon of the old regime against those who would have the old autocracy back again and overthrow the new freedom. So Premier Kezensky declared in a speech at the conference yesterday.

Famine in Germany.
New York, Aug. 28.—Germany is on the edge of famine, and cannot last until the spring, declare people who left there recently. It is said to be impossible to get a square meal in the country. Conditions are also very serious in Holland and Scandinavia.

PROCRUSTINATION

Some days ago, Mr. Fred Pardee moved in the Dominion Parliament an amendment to the Income Tax Bill providing that a much larger tax be paid on big incomes. The amendment, of course, had special application to large incomes being harvested from the war, as these are the only incomes being enhanced at this time. It was ruled out of order by the speaker, but before this was done, an illuminating debate developed, the official objections to the proposals of Mr. Pardee being particularly suggestive. The stock argument used by Sir Thomas White and his colleagues every time somebody advocates a fair levy on war profits and incomes, was that if this were done, it would reduce the contributions to the Patriotic Fund and other public funds. The answer to this is so obvious that the argument must strike everybody as the weakest kind of special pleading.

"If those who are making millions out of the war," apropos this very subject is remarked by the Victoria Times, "contributed their fair share to the state the Government would have ample funds not only to look after the Patriotic Fund, as it should do, but to increase the pension scale and discharge other pressing obligations which are now being ignored. The present income tax legislation, in the words of Duncan Ross, member for West Middlesex, is 'a millionaires' relief act,' a twin to the measure, also introduced by Sir Thomas White, for the relief of Mackenzie & Mann.

"During the debate the finance Minister took occasion to correct the report that the proposed income tax would take the place of the war profits tax. He said that he intended to introduce another war profits measure 'next year.' Why 'next year?' Why not make the necessary provision now? The war may be over next year and super-profits a thing of the past. In that case Sir Thomas would have a fine, fat excuse for sparing the big interests, of whom he is the champion and apologist in Council and Parliament. As Mr.

Ross said in the debate, the people want action, not promises and professions. 'Not long ago,' he added, 'we heard a wealthy man, addressing a public gathering, exclaim, 'to hell with profits—to the hell where they belong!' Yet this man is willing to take five million dollars in a year for himself and his company. It is our duty to make wealth—not in a cruel way, but in a reasonable way—meet its war obligations. What sacrifice is dollars compared with that of the widow who sacrifices three sons on the altar of her country?'

In the matter of the tariff, the same regard for the big interests is displayed. To make any revision at this present time would disrupt business in the Dominion. This means, of course, to revise the tariff downward. The Government had no objection to take any chance of business disruption in their revision of the tariff in 1915, when they increased it 5 and 7 1/2 per cent. The tariff which are so high in Canada do not yield such a great revenue to the Dominion, but they serve the purpose of making the consumers in Canada pay just that customs duty extra to the manufacturers.

The tender solicitude which the Borden Government is in the habit of showing to the big interests can not be said in any way to be in the interests of the people of Canada as a whole. The Borden Government have consistently refused to regard Canada representatively in these matters, and it will soon be up to the people of Canada to declare whether they wish to have this state of affairs continued.

TREAT ORES AT HOME

Melbourne, Australia, Aug. 28.—The chairman of the Sydney Metal Exchange states that the policy of the federal government with regard to metals is that all minerals produced in Australia will in future be treated in Australia.

An exchange similar to the London Metal Exchange is to be created, and instead of metals being sold to London they will be sold to Sydney and Melbourne. Efforts are being made to in-



duce Premier Hughes to fix a standard price for copper for three years.

The government has made arrangements fixing the price of zinc for ten years.

Regarding rare metals, Mr. Hughes has submitted a plan to the producers whereby the government will contract to take over the whole of the tungsten production at the world's current prices.

BARBECUE AT TELKWA ON LABOR DAY, SEPT. 3

There promises to be some busy and exciting time at Telkwa a week from today. A big gathering is looked for from all over the northern part of the province on the occasion of the Labor Day celebration there. No effort has been spared in the making of the arrangements for a day's enjoyment of the first class.

In order to feed the assembled multitude, they are going to roast an ox right on the field in the open air. They used to do this hundreds of years ago on the village greens in Merrie England. That was before the food restrictions came into force. Roast mutton and roast pork will lend variety to the fare, and lots of new baked bread and tea and coffee ad libitum. There is always plenty to eat and drink at a barbecue.

The proceedings will start at ten o'clock in the morning with a stock sale. The sale will be by auction. Horses, cattle, sheep and pigs will be offered, and in fact, everything that the farmers and ranchers have to dispose of. Cattle are even being driven in from Terrace, about 140 miles away.

After the roast ox has been discussed and the cooks complimented, the Prince Rupert team and the Telkwa team will dispute for supremacy in baseball, and after that the horse racing starts, and will be continued for the balance of the afternoon. There will be great interest taken in this part of the programme. There will be classes for ponies, and races for the Indians. There is some good horseflesh in the interior country and keen interest will be shown in their performances. There will be other sports of various kinds and the celebration will end in the evening with a dance.

It is proposed to run a special train from Prince Rupert at specially cheap fares, leaving here at midnight on Saturday, and arriving back again at 7 a.m. on Tuesday. Sleeping cars will be attached so that every comfort consistent with railway travelling may be obtained. If you are going, better tell the G. T. P. ticket agent at once so that the Company may make arrangements to run two trains if necessary.

This is a fine opportunity to see what the interior country is like, and will be largely taken advantage of by the people of Prince Rupert.
