## EARL GREY, LATE GOVERNOR-GENERAL, DEAD

### ITALIANS STILL SMASHING AHEAD-- LOCAL ATTACKS ONLY ON WESTERN FRONT

#### BAD WEATHER RETARDS WAR OPERATIONS IN FLANDERS

MAJOR OPERATIONS ARE SUSPENDED BY THE SEA OF MUD-- LOCAL ATTACKS AND RAIDS CONTINUE-- ITALIAN ARTILLERY CANNOT KEEP PACE WITH INFANTRY ADVANCE-- MORE PRISONERS TAKEN

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, Aug. 30.—The stormy weather on the western front is retarding major operations. It is impossible to co-ordinate the movements of large bodies of troops on account of the sea of mud, which causes great delay in movements. The weather is still stormy and rainy. During the night, the British carried out successful raids northeast of Guzeaucourt, and southwest of Hulloch. A few prisoners were captured.

**French Front.**  
Paris, Aug. 30.—Heavy artillery fighting on the Verdun and Aisne fronts is the only French activity reported yesterday.

**Italian Front.**  
Rome, August 30.—Desperate fighting between the Italians and Austrians on the Bainizza plateau is progressing uninterruptedly. The Bainizza Plateau is now virtually the centre of the Isonzo fighting. The Italian troops are within striking distance of powerfully fortified positions, where the Austrians are making a stand, and are tenaciously defending. On the other sectors, the Italians' great offensive has paused temporarily today. The Italian forces have advanced so rapidly that the heavy artillery has been unable to keep pace with the infantry. Over a thousand additional prisoners were captured yesterday.

**Russian Front.**  
Petrograd, Aug. 30.—In southern Moldavia, the Russians are continuing to evacuate their positions, enabling the Germans to materially strengthen their defence lines. A whole Russian division yesterday abandoned its position in the Volhynia and fled in disorder.

London, August 30.—Earl Grey, who was Governor-General of Canada from 1904 to 1911, died at 6 o'clock yesterday morning at Howick House in Northumberlandshire after a long illness.

**May Be Accepted.**

Reports from Germany have led observers here to believe that the Central Empires and their allies will not reject the peace proposals of the Pope.

#### GENERAL NEWS ITEMS

Paris, August 30.—Capt. Lauremi, the Italian aviator, has established a new world record for long distance flying. He flew for nine hundred miles without stopping.

Stockholm—Swedish industrial and business circles are stirred greatly over an export tax of 25 kroner per ton, which Germany has imposed upon all coal shipments to Sweden.

Rome—Monseigneur Kennedy, rector of the American College at Rome, has died after a long illness.

Amsterdam—The Burgomaster Hamout, in the province of Limburg in Belgium, has been sentenced to death by the German authorities. He was charged with helping Belgians to escape into Holland.

Buenos Ayres—The danger of a break in the Argentine-German relations was apparently removed yesterday afternoon by the receipt of a satisfactory note from Berlin.

Regina—The two Eskimo, who were charged with murdering missionaries, have been sentenced to life imprisonment on Herschel Island.

Macdonald, president of the Trades and Labor Council, who arrived later, the meeting was called to order by Mr. W. E. Thompson. The discussion was a very lively one on the question of wages and it was decided that the men all join the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers, with the intention of sticking together until a living wage was obtained. To that end, a special committee was appointed consisting of Messrs. Hancq, Fraser and McLellan, who will work with Messrs. Rose, Thompson and Jefferson.

#### PROGRESS OF THE NEW FISH PLANT

The development of the waterfront around Seal Cove is the most noticeable at the present moment. On this side of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company's large plant, quite a change has been made in the appearance of the waterfront. The work of pouring concrete for the piers which will support the new structure is under way. All the piers are now under construction except two, the foundations for which are just about ready. The piling is all ready and it is expected to arrive in the harbor at any time now. It would have been here by this time, had a tug been available. The piling is being got from the Lagoon at Smith Island and is all hemlock. Just immediately the piling is in the harbor, they will be driven for the construction of the necessary wharf.

Mr. Lowry, who has been supervising the construction work, will leave for the south very soon to arrange for the arrival of the machinery and plant as soon as the wharf is ready to unload it. Mr. Lowry is well satisfied with the manner in which the work is progressing, although they had to go down further than was expected to get a firm foundation. The construction of the wharf and the necessary buildings will be expedited, and the new plant will be in operation at the earliest possible moment.

It is expected that this new process of packing fish in a brine glaze will assist materially in developing a trade in those classes of fish which are not handled at present to the fullest extent.

#### THE PROBLEM BEFORE THE RUSSIAN PEOPLE

Moscow, August 30.—At the conference being held here, the great problem before the meeting is to restore the discipline of the army. The troops are completely poisoned by ill-considered doctrines, which have split the people into two camps. The officers are now the martyrs. The soldiers look on while their leaders go bravely to face the enemy and certain death.

#### BIG ROCK SLIDE AT KAIEN, MILE 5

Word was hastily brought to town last night of a serious rock slide on the railroad track about five miles from town. It is reported that over a hundred tons of rock and debris slid down and forced the track from its bed, blocking it to a depth of almost twenty feet. A gang of men are busy removing the obstruction on the track, which the railroad company will be anxious to have clear to permit of the train getting past tomorrow morning. It is fortunate today that there are no passenger trains either in or out.

#### DIED FROM PLEURISY

At the Prince Rupert General Hospital this morning, Nicholas Bragovich, a Serbian, died of Pleurisy. He had been working at Alice Arm on the construction of the new railroad there and was admitted to the hospital on the 8th inst. He has no relatives here, and his burial will be looked after by his countrymen here.

#### BORDEN WOULD LET FOSTER BE PREMIER

Ottawa, August 30.—At a party caucus held here, it is reported that Sir Robert Borden disclosed his willingness to resign the leadership of the Conservative party, but the caucus would not hear of any other chief but him. He offered to vacate his office in favor of Sir George Foster. The meeting pledged its continuance of its loyal support to Sir Robert.

**War Profits.**  
To meet the radical movement for greater taxation of war profits the Senate Finance Committee today agreed to amendments carrying the war profits taxes to more than thirty-three per cent in place of the present provisions.

**Military Service.**  
Montreal, August 30.—Under the Military Service Act, the penalties are severe. From one to five years' imprisonment may be inflicted upon persons resisting the operations of the Act, or persuading others to resist or impede it.

#### CHINESE TAKE OVER GERMANY'S BANK

London, Aug. 28.—The Chinese Government, a Reuter despatch from Peking says, is arranging for the prompt liquidation of the German Asiatic Bank. Five officials of the Foreign Office have been appointed to take over the accounts and cash here and in the Shanghai, Canton, Tientsin and Hankow branches.

Chinese troops have seized Austrian concessions in Tientsin, according to an Exchange Telegraph despatch, and German and Austrian shipping is being seized at Canton, Amoy, Swatow, Shanghai and Nanking. The vessels include several small warships.

The Rev. Dr. E. M. Keirstead, Professor of Systematic Theology at McMaster University, Toronto, will speak at the Baptist Church tonight. The subject will be "The Church as a making place of Character."

**CONSCRIPTION**

The Military Service Bill has been signed by the Governor-General. Conscription is now become the law in Canada insofar as it makes military service compulsory, upon the able bodied manhood of the Dominion. But although this law is now upon the statute books of Canada, it has still to be put into force, which will be at the pleasure of the Government. In the fullness of time, when they see fit, this new law will be made effective. According to statements made in the House during the debate previous to the passing of the bill, the matter was then considered an urgent one. The Government could not wait till a referendum was taken, to show whether the principle of conscription was approved of by a free people. The urgency for more recruits to reinforce the firing line was too great. Therefore, the enforcing of the provisions of this Military Service Act may be looked for in the immediate future. According to the necessities of the overseas battalions, as indicated during the debate on the bill, the enforcing of the provisions of the bill would seem to be necessary at once. If the urgency is as was then stated it has in no whit decreased since the time it was discussed in Parliament.

Having adopted the principle of conscription, as applied to the greatest resource which the nation possesses, which is its manhood, the application of the same principle to the other resources of the country would seem to be equally necessary. In fact, it cannot be gainsaid. It is only reasonable, that in demanding the sacrifice of time, and the risk of life from one section of the community, a share of sacrifice should also be borne by the remainder of the community. Very many people have materially benefited through the operation of the war. There are men in Canada today who are very much richer since the war began than they ever were before. These men may be useless from a purely military point of view. They may not be called upon to risk their lives in France, or in any other battlefield. They

have made money, and are still making money through the munitioning and the provisioning of the armies who do the fighting. While no sacrifice can equal that which the soldier in the trenches risks every day, it would only be fair that something ought to be demanded from those that remain at home.

The Government will conscript the life of the young manhood of the nation. It would only be reasonable that it would conscript the wealth of the nation as well. The one is equally necessary as the other. The man who has volunteered and the man who is conscripted has a right to expect that the man who has done neither will not shirk his share of the national sacrifice. Compulsion has been imposed on the men of Canada to fight for the country. The compulsory sacrifice of superfluous wealth should be demanded, as well from those who have more than they require.

If there is any consistency about the Borden Government, it will apply the principle of conscription which it has adopted to the total resources of the nation. The people of Canada will demand it.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

With epidemics of disease scourging her people, no soap to wash with, hunger stalking through the land, and, worst of all, no tobacco to soothe their ragged nerves, the German must nowadays wonder whether world conquest is after all worth while.

The sledge-hammer blows of the Italians seem to be sinking peaceful ideas into the head of the Emperor Karl of Austria.

Emperor William now says that the prize of the war is the German people's freedom to live, freedom at sea and freedom at home. Anyone who has been in Germany before the war would realize what "freedom" existed there, and the Kaiser has decisively shown what the German freedom of the seas would mean to the rest of the world.

The Ottawa Citizen points out that "the intelligent political forecaster is he who sees that the party which first meets the rea-



sonable standards of the West in fiscal and economic matters is the party which will control the destinies of the Dominion during the next quarter century." Wise words! What did the Borden Government ever do for the West? We know what they did not do for Prince Rupert.

That the Government of British Columbia is fully alive to the necessity of this northern part of the province is displayed by the action of the Premier and his ministers in making a personal tour of the country and seeing for themselves just what the conditions are up here. The Premier intends going right through to the Peace River country, and some definite programme will doubtless be formulated for the expansion of business and the development of the potential wealth of the north.
