PREMIER AND MINISTERS COME TO THE CITY

GREAT STORM IN EUROPE---FIGHTING IS SUSPENDED---CROPS RUINED IN BRITAIN

GREAT STORM IN EUROPE STOPS FIGHTING AND RUINS CROPS

EVERY LOCALITY IN BRITAIN SUFFERS FROM THE GALE---GREAT DAMAGE DONE, PARTICULARLY TO STANDING CROPS---OPERATIONS AT FRONT HAMPERED---GERMANS REINFORCE FRONTIER

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Aug 31.—Great storms of wind and rain have been common all over northern Europe for the past two days. Great damage has been done, and every locality in England has suffered more or less. The excessive rainfall has caused flooding in several areas and all previous estimates of the wheat crops must be thrown away. The standing crops in many places have been ruined.

British Front.
On the western front, further British operations have been hampered by the tremendous rain-falls today. Hostilities have been practically suspended all along the line.

French Front.
Paris, August 31.—German attacks last night on the Verdun front were completely repulsed. In the Champagne country, the French troops penetrated the German trenches, taking many prisoners and machine guns.

Belgian Front.
London, August 31.—The Germans are forcing the northern frontier of Belgium near the bay of the Scheldt and at the village of Santuliet. Large guns have been located on strong concrete supports. The number of reserve troops in the fortified positions near Antwerp increases daily. It is now estimated that the Germans have around fifty thousand reserves at this point.

Italian Front.
Rome, August 31.—Italy's victorious offensive reached its second and most important stage today, having attained the practical dominance of the Bainsizza Plateau. General Cadorna's troops have begun a vast flanking movement northward, with Tolmino as the immediate objective of the drive.

The Austrians made severe counter attacks against the new Italian positions on the front above Gorizia, which were everywhere repulsed. San Gabriele has been partly taken by the Italians.

Petain Decorated.
Verdun, August 31.—President Poincare personally presented to

day to General Petain, the French Commander-in-Chief, the Grand Cross of the Legion of Honor.

A Celebration.
Amsterdam, August 31.—The Germans celebrated the third anniversary of the battle of Tannenberg widely all over the country. Hindenburg and Ludendorff were lauded for the Russian defeat on August 29, 1914.

SEAL COVE SAWMILL FAST TAKING SHAPE

To the average visitor to Seal Cove, there has been apparent during the last ten days or so an increasing rate of progress in the construction of the new sawmill there. The framework of the lower story has all been completed and the upper story is well under way and will soon be ready for the roof. Since the buildings have begun to take shape, the progress has been appreciable to the passer by. Two scow loads of material have arrived this week, consisting of four boilers, with 140,000 bricks to build them into position, besides tons of iron and nails for the buildings. Some idea of the amount of work which has been done may be realized when it is understood that the two million feet of lumber which came up on scows only a couple of months ago from the Hastings Mills has practically all been handled and placed in position.

Mr. T. F. Doby who is supervising the construction of the mill intends leaving for the south this week to see to the shipment of another lot of machinery. Just so soon as the roof is finished, the work of installing the mill machinery will be proceeded with. There is still some little excavating to do before the concrete foundations for the boilers can be laid, but this will not take long now. Concrete is now being poured for the foundations of the piers which will support the buildings on the water edge. Mr. Doby is quite satisfied with the manner in which the work has progressed so far.

"THE FRIENDS OF IRISH FREEDOM" IN NEW YORK

TROUBLOUS TIMES STILL IN RUSSIA

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, August 31.—A large proportion of the Russian regiments in the Folkhania region on the Roumanian front left their trenches and retired yesterday.

The Moscow Conference.
The conference of the delegates has concluded here. At the conclusion of the conference, Premier Kerensky announced that the partial re-establishment of the death penalty was a necessary measure of army discipline for the country's salvation. The last Russian communication indicates the possibility of a rule of blood and iron being commenced on account of the changed attitude of the troops near Fokshani.

The Treason Trial.
According to testimony given yesterday by General Michaelson, at the trial of General Soukhomlinoff, the former Minister of war, for high treason, Germany's military preparation was shown to be also aware that Germany contemplated a declaration of war in 1909, and again in 1913. He swore that he had reported Germany's military activity to the Russian War Office.

Copenhagen, August 31.—Dispatches received here state that it is feared that the Russian fleet may join the Maximalists in re-

ANTI-CONSCRIPTION RIOT IN MONTREAL

(Special to The Daily News.)
Montreal, August 31.—A great parade of six thousand anti-conscriptionists took place last night in Montreal. It was the largest demonstration of anti-conscriptionists which has yet taken place. The police endeavored to disperse the gathering, and were met with a hurricane of bricks and stones. A volley of blank revolver shots were fired by the rioters, who declare they will use ball cartridges tonight if the police dare to interfere with their demonstration.

As a result of the breaking up of last night's meeting four police men were injured, and one civilian was shot. Many received severe bruises from the clubs, bricks, sticks and stones which were indiscriminately used.

PREMIER BREWSTER ARRIVES WITH MINISTERS ON TOUR

ACCOMPANIED BY HON. T. D. PATTULLO, HON. JOHN OLIVER AND PARTY OF MEMBERS AND THEIR LADIES, PREMIER WILL SPEND THE DAY IN THE CITY AND WILL GO ON TOUR OF INTERIOR

Arriving on the Prince George this morning was the Hon. H. C. Brewster, Premier of British Columbia, the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, and the Hon. John Oliver, Minister of Agriculture and Railways, and Mrs. Oliver, Speaker Weart, accompanied by Mrs. Weart, and Mr. E. Barrow member for Chilliwack. Accompanying the ministerial party were Dean Klink, of the Faculty of Agriculture of the University of British Columbia, and Mr. J. E. Umbach, surveyor-general. The weather was propitious, and as the vessel steamed in, Prince Rupert looked at its best.

The distinguished visitors were met at the wharf by the mayor, representing the city, members of the Board of Trade, Mr. F. H. Mobley, M.P.P., and Mr. A. M. Manson, M.P.P. Automobiles were in readiness and the Ministers were taken on the rounds of the city from Seal Cove to Section two. During

the afternoon, they will enjoy the pleasures of a trip on the "Wal-rondo" to points of interest in the vicinity of the harbor.

In the evening, there will be a public meeting held in the Empress Theatre at 8 o'clock, when addresses will be given by the Premier, the Hon. John Oliver, Hon. T. D. Pattullo, O. H. Nelson, and others. This meeting will be of a non-political character. The welfare of British Columbia generally and of this northern portion particularly, and the development of its vast potential riches is a much more important matter.

Early tomorrow our visitors will proceed on a tour of the interior. They will visit Hazelton, and will go as far as the Peace River country. The practical knowledge of Dean Klink and the Surveyor-General will be available for the formation of a constructive policy of development of these vast unpopulated areas.

PREPARING TO BUILD NEW GOLD STORAGE

Captain J. J. Logan, of the Prince Rupert Ice and Gold Storage Company, which was duly incorporated this morning, arrived in the city this morning. Captain Logan is optimistic regarding the project and has come north to obtain estimates for the construction of the plant. The site chosen is just across the entrance to Cow Bay and is an ideal one for this purpose. The machinery for the new plant is practically ready for shipment here, and it is expected that it will arrive just as soon as the necessary wharf is constructed to permit of it being unloaded on the spot where it is required.

Captain Logan will remain in the city for some little time getting things under way and it is hoped to start on the construction work at the earliest possible moment.

HOME TO ROOST

With regard to the position of affairs in Canada today, and especially having the situation of Nationalist Quebec in mind, their objection to the conscription proposals of the Borden Government, and the Premier's reading of the Nationalists out of his party in the House of Commons the other day, the Toronto Globe in a recent issue points out how this unfortunate position of affairs, as brought about by the Nationalists in Quebec, is the outcome of the action of the Premier and his colleagues taken six years ago.

"The mills of the gods grind slowly" but their wheels never cease. How small they grind in the politics of Canada, the Globe says, "was illustrated in the House of Commons when Sir Robert read a skillfully worded declaration denying that there is now some connection or collusion, and that my supporters and friends are, in fact, encouraging the Nationalist party in the course which they are adopting."

Here are the very words of his denial:

"I desire to make most emphatic, unreserved and comprehensive denial of this statement. There is not and never will be any connection or collusion whatever between my friends and supporters and those of the Nationalist party of Quebec."

The man who wrote that "denial" may be an artist with words. The Prime Minister, his colleagues, and his supporters may be beguiled by its cleverness. But does he, do they, or does any intelligent person imagine, for one silly moment, that this studied manipulation of the tenses of verbs in 1917 can blot out or obscure the ugly truth of immutable facts that date back to 1911? Of course he can now stand up in Parliament and deny that "there is now" that "is now" is of the very essence of his denial. Of course he can swear, by all the gods at once, that "there is not and never will be"—that cautious "is not and never will be" is the whole scope and compass of

his loud-spoken but utterly compromising declaration.

"Now," forsooth! What difference can denial "now" make, when the damage to Canada's unity, to Canada's integrity, to Canada's loyalty was done by Bourassa and the Nationalists in 1911?

It is quite proper, quite becoming, and altogether fitting that the Prime Minister of Canada should "now" say:

"I regard the attitude of the Nationalist party of Quebec in this war as unpatriotic, and I consider that it is the first duty of myself and my friends to assist in defeating that party;" but that attitude is no more "unpatriotic" today than it was in 1911, when it was recognized by Mr. Borden in its campaign of anti-British Nationalism, or when it was rewarded by him with choice Cabinet portfolios for Bourassa's nominees. They say nothing now that they did not say then, and said repeatedly, with great plainness of speech, and in Borden's very presence. The "Nationalist party," against whom he now declaims, would never have had national significance, or national power for harm, or national opportunity for the weakness and disgrace and peril to the Canadian nation, had Premier Borden not, openly and deliberately denied his "duty" as leader of the Conservative party in Canada, and flagrantly and recklessly betrayed his trust as Prime Minister in a British Dominion.

The Globe says today what it said in 1911, scores of times in front-page prominence with editorial emphasis. The campaign was a Bourassa-Borden cabal. It was a Bourassa-Lavergne undertaking. It was a Nationalist-Tory triumph. The profits of that whole disloyal adventure went to Borden's political advantage. They helped to make him premier. They secured for him whatever of party power was in the early years of his Premiership. His repudiation of the Nationalist party "now" does not wipe out, either for him, or for his associates, or for the Canadian people, the piled-up humiliation, discord and peril which now menace the nation.

inevitable and inexorable retribution. The chickens of 1911 are coming home in 1917. And the end of their desperate coming is not yet. Please God this illbred and long-nursed disloyalty, which has brought such confusion and heartbreak to Canada and the Empire, may not bring civil war. But whatever comes will be the logical and inflexible outcome of what, through the past half dozen years, went before. Nemesis has been on the trail of the Prime Minister. It had to come. Here it is.

And Nemesis, while it may be slow of foot, never is fooled or dodged, and, while it may seem to be delayed, it never is put by. Here it is. What a Premier soweth that shall he also reap.

But, by the unerring reach of the organic law of national life, Canada also is involved in this retribution which Nemesis brings to the Prime Minister.
