GERMANS ARE FIERCELY ATTACKING RIGA

ITALIANS MAKING GOOD PROGRESS--CAPTURE PRISONERS SOUTH CARSO REGION

GERMANS ARE REPULSED IN MOLDAVIA

Germans Suffer Very Heavy Losses—Roumanian Schools Closed—Sanguinary Battles on This Front.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 1.—The great battle which has lasted a fortnight on the western and south-western front of Moldavia is one of the most sanguinary of the great war.

It is evident that the Roumanians are paying a heavy price, but the German losses are incomparably heavier than those of the Roumanians and Russians.

The Roumanian schools have been closed by the Central Powers, thus pursuing their well known policy of denationalizing the conquered territory.

Petrograd, Sept. 1.—The Russians and Roumanians repulsed with heavy losses to the enemy repeated attacks in the region of Cona. Southwest of Lake Maroz intense fusillades are reported.

Germans After Riga.

London, Sept. 1.—The land attacks by the Germans in an endeavor to smash through the Russian lines and capture Riga have resulted in failure. The Germans are believed to be preparing a combined land and sea offensive as torpedo boats, destroyers, submarines, mine-sweepers and aeroplanes are being assembled.

REV. CHAS. SING IN THE CITY

ANTI-CONSCRIPTIONIST RIOTS IN MONTREAL

(Special to The Daily News.)

Montreal, Sept. 1.—Wild disorders in which many persons were injured, including four policemen, were again enacted last night before a parade of anti-conscriptionists was broken up and dispersed. Two Canadian officers back from the front were jeered at and threatened with violence, and almost suffered molestation at the hands of the mob.

The Minister of Justice is watching events. Mayor Martin will stop the revolutionary talk and parades. He has ordered the arrest of one agitator on sight, and declares irresponsible boys are to blame for trouble. Windows at the home of Hon. Seigny were smashed.

TELEGRAPH BRIEFS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Copenhagen, Sept. 1.—Friendship for Germany is vanishing in Poland. The Polish Council of State has dissolved because it ventured to present an ultimatum to the German government on military questions. The idea of a Polish kingdom may be abandoned.

Edmonton.—The street railway motormen and conductors went on strike in a demand for higher wages.

Rome.—The Pope is bitterly disappointed with President Wilson's reply to his peace note. His Holiness plans to issue a further note on peace.

Christiania.—Three German spies have been convicted at Bergen for supplying information to submarines regarding the sailing time of vessels which were later torpedoed.

Stockholm.—Public sentiment in Russia continues to react unfavorably toward the Pope's peace proposals. Russian people are convinced the proposal bears the sign "made in Germany."

Washington.—Plans are now being formulated on the greatest scale yet attempted during the war for an immense offensive on all fronts in Europe next spring.

Rome.—America is to be strafed next, according to information coming here from Germany. Diplomats here look for an intense U-boat activity against the Allies. The Germans are furious over the non-success of the Pope's peace plan.

Ottawa.—The C. N. R. Bill has finally been disposed of under the closure rule, in the Commons at 2 o'clock this morning.

The fourth war loan of a hundred to a hundred and fifty million will probably be floated in October.

TRIESTE NOW THREATENED BY ITALIANS

Campaigns Delayed by Heavy Rain—German Raid Repulsed at Lens—Casualties on French Front.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 1.—None of the three big campaigns now in progress on the western front have again gotten into full swing. The weather conditions have not yet been suitable for continuation of the offensive. On the Italian front General Cadorna in his drive for Trieste continues energetically and perhaps his drive is the most spectacular of the current operations. The activity here displayed is more pronounced than either Petain or Haig manifest in their respective fields at Verdun and at Arras in Flanders.

On the front below Lens, General Haig reports the repulse of a German raid five miles to the southeast of the city. No mention is made of the activities of the British in this sector.

French Front.

General Petain's report indicates the possibility of a speedy renewal of the infantry battle at Verdun. Artillery on both sides of the Meuse are actively busy bombarding the German lines.

The fighting in the Flanders offensive for the past month has cost Great Britain 60,233 casualties, in killed, wounded and missing.

THE MAKING PLACE OF CHARACTER

On Thursday evening, a very appreciative audience listened attentively to the Rev. Dr. E. M. Keirstead, who is Professor of Theology at McMaster University, Toronto. In opening, Dr. Keirstead made reference to the inspirational character of the natural environment of this province and the suggestive nature of the natural resources in this new country. As the making place of character, he showed that in the matter of ideals, environment, social relationships, religious atmosphere, quest of knowledge, etc., the Church was a great force, making for the better interpretation of these subjects.

Dr. Keirstead is a forceful speaker and held his audience attentive with his clear argument.

RESTAURANT KEEPERS WILL CONSERVE MEATS

In the Royal Hotel Cafe last evening, there was a meeting of the local restaurant men and many important steps were taken in regard to the recent order-in-council of the serving of meats, fresh pork, fowl, etc., may be served. From 5 to 10 in the evening only roast beef and steaks may be served. This arrangement shows that bacon and ham and beef can be served only once per day.

Tuesdays and Fridays are the meatless days, when no ham, bacon, nor beef may be served. However, this does not stop the serving of mutton, fowl, fish, etc., on these days. It appears, therefore, that the action of the Privy Council has only been to conserve the bacon and beef which may be shipped to the soldiers overseas. All public eating places which serve over twenty-five meals per day will come under these restrictions which will go into effect immediately.

Placards are being printed which will be placed in a conspicuous place in the restaurants and will impress upon all the fact of the necessity for tightening our belts in order to help those who have greater need.

LABOR DAY SPORTS

On Monday the holiday will be appropriately celebrated at the local recreation park. The Trades and Labor Council have been busily engaged in providing a programme of sports which should attract a large gathering. A large amount of prize money is available for the contestants, \$300 having been provided.

Races of all kinds will be witnessed and a general novel and interesting programme will be carried out. Of special interest may be mentioned the tug-of-war for which a prize of \$20 is given. The winners of this are eligible for another contest with the fishermen and the winners of this event receive \$40.

The local committee having in hand the celebration are deserving of great praise for the arrangement of such an attractive programme.

Miss Kenny, formerly of the civic telephone staff, left for the south this morning. Miss Kenny is a candidate in "The World's" great prize contest and will be actively employed in the south in an endeavor to win the grand prize. Her many friends wish her success.

PREMIER AND MINISTERS DISCUSS DEVELOPMENT

REASON OF VISITORS TO OBTAIN FIRST HAND KNOWLEDGE OF CONDITIONS IN NORTHERN BRITISH COLUMBIA LEGISLATION FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF LANDS ALONG G. T. P. FORESHADOWED

A large number of the citizens of Prince Rupert gathered in the Empress Theatre last evening to welcome the Premier, the Hon. H. C. Brewster, the Hon. John Oliver, Minister of Agriculture, the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, and the other members of the Legislature, who had arrived in the city on their tour of the north country. In opening the proceedings, His Worship the Mayor welcomed the ministerial party, the more so on account of their mission "with the greatest possibilities in the fishing industry of any port on the Pacific; with the greatest undeveloped mineral belt on the American continent, and the second greatest standing spruce forest," said the mayor, "if we can succeed in bringing these matters home to the ministers and they realize these things as we do, when they are making appropriations for the different parts of the province they will have accomplished good by coming here."

In proof of the non-political nature of the meeting the mayor called upon Ald. O. H. Nelson.

Alderman Nelson.

Alderman Nelson gracefully welcomed the distinguished visitors and gave a racy speech. His friendship for the Premier was one which political opposition had not broken. "We in the north, here," said Ald. Nelson, "are ready at all times to stand inspection from the outside." He thought that if the representative men from the south came up oftener and saw for themselves what was here it would be better for the country.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo.

The Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, our own member, spoke shortly. "In order to legislate wisely and prudently," said Mr. Pattullo, "it is necessary that the ministers visit the different parts of the province." Northern B. C. had the greatest potential resources of the whole of British Columbia. This visit was to look them over and to see in what way and manner they could be settled and developed. The best thing to be done for the city of Prince Rupert was to develop the country back of it. Mr. Pattullo gave the credit for bringing the party together and making this visit to the north possible, to Mr. A. M. Manson, M. P. P. for Omineca.

Hon. John Oliver.

The Hon. John Oliver, Minister of Agriculture and Railways, who spoke next found it hard to keep away from matters political. He showed the difficult position of the present ministry with regard to finance. With a revenue of five and a half millions less than in 1913, the financial obligations of the province were millions more than then. The people have a right to know such things and ministers have a right to tell them else the conditions cannot be fairly judged. Until the province gets down to a state of economic productivity, present conditions will not improve. Industries, pro-

duction, payrolls and agricultural development were required. The minister stated that the agricultural development of the country tributary to Prince Rupert was one of the objects of this visit. The next session of the Legislature he thought would see legislation which would materially assist in the development of the lands along the line of the G.T.P. "You have put us in office," said the minister, "and charged us with the duty, now give us your sympathy. Every man in the Government is doing his best, and we have a right to ask you to give us your sympathetic co-operation in the big task."

Premier Brewster.

The Premier, on rising to speak, spoke a word of appreciation of the hospitality extended to him and his party. First-hand knowledge of conditions was the cause of this trip, so that subjects which demand legislation might be dealt with intelligently. The people of the north had a right to be optimistic, the Premier considered. He paid a tribute to one whose ashes are now coming across the ocean to be buried in his native country, Sir Richard McBride, whose genial, affable nature he admired exceedingly.

Premier Brewster spoke at some length upon the necessity for the development of the natural resources of the country. Fisheries, minerals and forestry require to be supplemented by more agriculture. He referred to the many problems which will have to be confronted within the next few years, upon the successful conclusion of the war. For the greater happiness of the people of the province, greater production and greater development of industries was necessary.

He paid a compliment to Prince Rupert in telling them in no undecided tones that as Minister of Lands, their member had "made good."

Mr. Speaker Weart gave a bright speech and the meeting was closed by the singing of the National Anthem.

THE PREMIER'S VISIT

One of the results of the visit of Premier Brewster and his colleagues, the Hon. John Oliver, Minister of Agriculture, and the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, and the other members that will be looked for will be the quickened interest of the Government of the Province in the development of the great riches of this northern part of British Columbia. The real extent of the natural wealth of this northern country is as yet unknown. There are large tracts of the interior which have not yet even been prospected, and a greater part which has been prospected, but not thoroughly. Nor have the agricultural possibilities of the north even been appreciated. With the opening up of the country by means of railroads and easier transportation, it will happen in the very near future that the rate of progress up here in the north will be accelerated.

The tour of the Premier and his ministers through the interior is being taken to see at first hand and to gain some impression of the possibilities of this land which is as yet undeveloped. To this end the practical knowledge of Dean Klink, of the Faculty of Agriculture in the University of British Columbia, and of Mr. J. E. Unbach, Surveyor-General, will stand the ministerial party in good stead. The time is close at hand when these reserve spaces of the country will have to be brought into greater use. These fertile lands which at present bear nothing but wild grasses and bush, and provide a happy hunting ground for sportsmen will have to be made more productive. Increased settlement is what the province of British Columbia requires. It is recognized by the members of the Cabinet that at no time in the history of British Columbia has the need been greater for more agricultural population than it is today. A greater agricultural population means a greater production of food stuffs. And right now food stuffs are notoriously scarce all the world over.

Immigration—of real settlers—is a desirable thing, and with a thoroughly practical system

of community settlement, organized on the proper lines, which this fair province has never heretofore enjoyed, there is no reason why British Columbia should not stand in the forefront, both from an agricultural and a stock raising point of view. With a policy of some system and common sense backed with practical and technical knowledge, there is no reason why much greater things should not be realized from this land which a good God has given us.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

On the Italian front, the offensive had to be paused to enable the artillery to keep up with the infantry. On the western front, the offensive is retarded by stormy weather. On the Russian front, the offensive is stopped by the Russians running away. The Germans should be thankful for small mercies.

Yesterday was the first meatless day in Prince Rupert restaurants. Tuesdays and Fridays no beef nor bacon must be served and only at one meal on other days. The regulations do not mention mutton nor pork, but these commodities are both dearer and scarcer than beef. Those who do not like fish and cannot afford mutton will now have something to "beef" about. The gourmands will be seriously considering whether life is worth living these days. "Eat as little as possible," say the regulations. "Beefless days and boozeless nights" will be a poor prospect for the winter for them.

President Wilson will not discuss peace with the present German Government. The decision for peace must come from the German people, not their rulers. A German democracy might declare for peace, but not the Kaiser's clique, until they are decisively discredited.

The throes of regeneration through which Russia is passing at the present time are having their due effect upon the remainder of the world. As the French revolution made a profound impression upon the peoples of the eighteenth century, and made for progress in other countries with-



out the ebullition of revolution, so the Russian revolution will quicken the spirit of democracy throughout the world.

LABOR MEN TO MEET IN CONVENTION

Vancouver, August 28.—Delegates representing labor unions from all over British Columbia have been summoned to meet here on Labor Day, September 3, to discuss conscription and other matters affecting the interests of the union labor.

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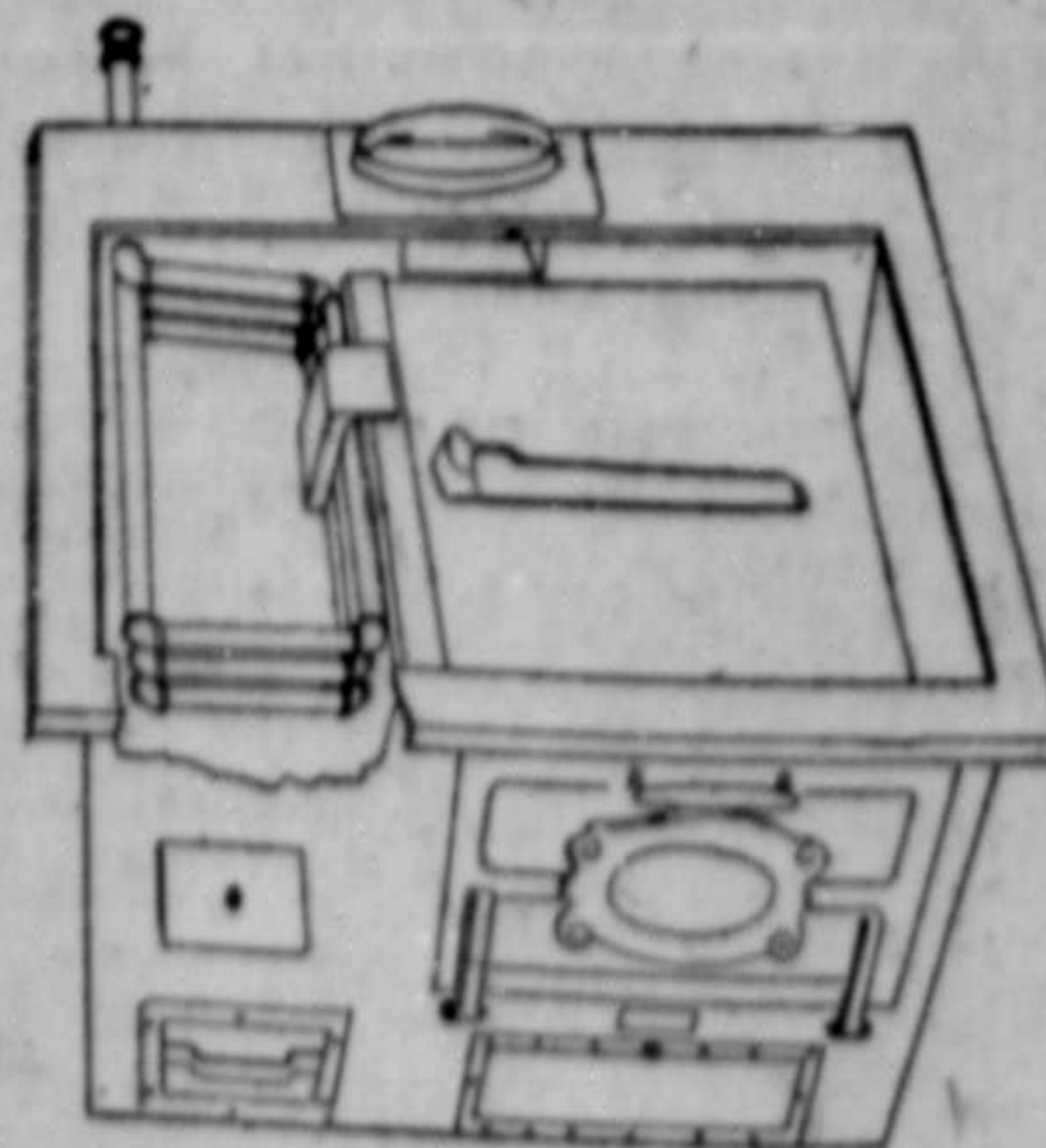
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
