

NEW GAS REGULATIONS CUT DOWN THE SUPPLY

Copenhagen, August 28 .- New gas regulations have been issued in Berlin which virtually put the ordinary consumers of gas on half rations from now on, The new orders are made necessary because of the inability of the gas works to obtain a supply of coal. Similar measures are impending throughout the Empire.

The announcement of the new orders unloosed a general storm of indignation. The Berlin newspapers demand to know how home life will be possible with the household supply of coal so greatly reduced.

According to the newspapers the minimum hot water supply in homes is limited to certain hours three days a week, and the use of alcohol and kerosene for cooking purposes is prohibited. No substitute lighting methods are available. Indications are that the outburst of indignation is not unwelcome to the Imperial Commissioner of Gas and Electricity and the municipalities who charge that coal is being kept at the mines in order to manufacture briquettes. The lectures on modes of preserving fruits and vegetables are suspended "because no way is known of cooking or pre-I serving without fire."

CANADIANS STARVED BY THE GERMANS

Montreal, Aug. 28 .- A shocking story of the brutality of the Germans towards their prisoners has been brought to Montreal by Lance-Corporal M. E. F. Kittredge 13th Battalion, who, at his fourth attempt at escape made his way into Holland after seven nights' travel through Germany, with little food. Kittredge makes an NOTICE that the Grand Trunk urgent appeal for supplies to-be sent the men in captivity, declaring that without packages from most home they can not survive.

"Our men are dying from starvation at the rate of five to eight every day, and without parcels they can not be saved," Kittredge is quoted as stating in an interview. The Russian prisoners, he said, confirming previous reports, fare the worst.

Corporal Kittredge escaped last spring after spending nineteen months as a prisoner. He wa captured during the Second Battle

of Ypres.

Send your parcels to the boys in Germany or they will die. The parcels get through all right. This is the most important and west strongest message I can give you," The capacity Kittredge said.






