CONSCRIPTION PROCLAMATION TO BE SOON

THIRD AEROPLANE ATTACK ON LONDON-DISTRICT CAUSES MANY CASUALTIES

THIRD ATTACK BY AEROPLANES ON LONDON CITY

Hidden in clouds at Great Height, German Aviators Rain Bombs on City Below, Killing and Injuring 73.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Sept. 6.—A large squadron of German aeroplanes crossed the southeast coast last night and again attacked the Thames district. This is the third attack in three days. From a high altitude, the enemy planes rained bombs on the city below, killing eleven people and injuring sixty-two others. It is reported that the material damage was not extensive.

The air raid on Monday over Sheerness and Chatham was the most destructive in its toll of human life in England yet experienced since the great attack on June 13th. The raiding squadrons were heavily shelled both going and coming, and it is reported that one enemy machine was brought down at Sheerness. The German squadron had the advantage of a bright moonlight night, with a slight obscuring haze. The London papers are beginning to ask questions regarding the continuance of the raiding.

Scarborough Bombarded.
A German submarine suddenly appeared before the town of Scarborough on the Yorkshire coast and opened fire. The attack took place last night and three were killed and five injured. The material damage was slight. The submarine finally submerged.

UNITED STATES' NEW ARMY

Washington, Sept. 6.—The first of the National Army went into uniform today. The groups of recruits poured into four cantonments today, being the first five per cent. quota of the draft army.

CLASS ONE IN UNIFORM BY 27TH OF NOVEMBER

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, Sept. 6.—The first class recruits under the Conscription Act will be called shortly. Unmarried men from 20 to 34 will be affected first. All must report for service or apply for exemption. Under the provisions of the Act, all those making themselves useful in any way to increase the agricultural production of the country will be exempted. Exemption will also be given to certain classes of skilled mechanics.

By 27th November.
On the 29th of August, Sir Robert Borden told the War Veterans that by the 27th November conscripts would be in uniform. The press are informed that the Proclamation as required by the Act will be issued shortly. This proclamation will call out all unmarried men of the first class between 22 and 34 years of age. This will include widowers with no children.
To Upset the Act.
Reports from Montreal of a move to upset the Military Service Act in court on the grounds of the irregular Royal assent are not causing any uneasiness in official circles here. It is not anticipated that any such move will have much success.

BRITISH SHIPS SUNK

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Sept. 6.—Twenty-three British ships were sunk last week, eighteen of which were of more than sixteen hundred tons.

At Seal Cove the new sawmill is now having the roof put on and the construction work is being pushed ahead rapidly. It is expected that sawing will be in progress within the next few months. At the new fish plant also at Seal Cove, the piledriver is on the job, driving piles for the wharf. Seal Cove is the busiest place in town at the present moment.

SENATE MAY DEFEAT PURCHASE OF THE C. N. R.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, Sept. 6.—In the Senate, there are signs that there is danger of the defeat of the measure brought in by the Government for the State purchase of the C. N. R. The Conservative members of the Senate met in caucus today to discuss the situation. The Quebec members in the Upper Chamber are showing signs of opposition. They are taking exception to the large amount of the public money which is being paid under this act for "worthless stock."

EXPECT MORE CHANGES IN BRITISH CABINET

London, Sept. 6.—A writer in the London newspapers predicts a reshuffling of the Government portfolios, and expects that there will be a shaking up in the cabinet. Mr. Asquith, the writer says, is gaining greater strength in the House of Commons, while on the other hand, Premier Lloyd George is alleged to be losing prestige.

ANOTHER ORE SHOOT AT ROCHE DE BOULE

"As soon as we can get things shaped up we propose to start a thousand-foot raise on the No. 4 vein," said Manager Williams of the Roche de Boule this week. "This raise will be from the 1200 foot level to connect with the shaft at the 500 foot level. From the raise the vein can then be explored by drifts every couple of hundred feet."
On the No. 2 vein at 1000 foot level a second shoot of ore has been struck. It is three feet in width and besides a high percentage of copper it runs high in silver. About sixty tons of ore per day is being shipped and it is considered that the ore is richer even than the first shoot.
The scarcity of labor has handicapped operations considerably but considering all things the manager is well satisfied.—Omineca Herald.

RUSSIANS LEFT RIGA IN GOOD DISCIPLINE

Retreat is Continued Along the Coast—Refugees Arrive at Petrograd—Air Raids in Belgium.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, Sept. 6.—The Russian troops are continuing to retreat along the coast of the Gulf of Riga towards the northeast. They have crossed the River Aa in Livonia. The Russian troops operating in an easterly direction from Riga have retired to Segevo, Lemburg and Detzichubrai.

The Retirement.
The first refugees to reach the capital from Riga tell dramatic stories of the fighting and the bombardment of the city. Suffocating gas shells were fired upon the civil population that was left in the town. Zeppelins also aided the enemy artillery in bombing operations. They tell of the hostile ships which bombarded the city from the sea as being submarines, which were heavily armed. The Women's fighting Battalion fought desperately to stem the tide of the advancing Huns, and have made a name for themselves. The retirement is said to have been carried out under perfect discipline.

British Front.
London, Sept. 6.—British troops repulsed raids in the neighborhood of Armentieres, while the Portuguese troops beat back the German raiders successfully, who were engaged on a similar excursion. In the neighborhood of Lens, the enemy artillery is also very active.

Bombing Raids.
British airmen dropped many tons of bombs and caused large fires in the German bases in Belgium. During the attack on the docks at Bruges, direct hits were made, causing explosions and large fires.

Italian Front.
Rome, Sept. 6.—Our troops have captured Monte Gabrielle after severe fighting, thus clearing the way considerably in the direction of Trieste. The successful air raid by the Italian Aviators against Pola on Monday evening is believed to foreshadow a great naval offensive against the Austrian fleet. This fleet and an army of one hundred thousand men has been locked up by the allied naval forces operating in the Gulf of Trieste.

French Front.
Paris, Sept. 6.—The Germans made severe attacks last night on the Aisne and Champagne fronts. Both attacks were repulsed without great difficulty. On both banks of the Meuse, violent artillery fighting occurred throughout the night. In upper Alsace petrol engagements are reported in the region of Seppois.

Berlin Report.
Berlin, Sept. 6.—Duennamuende on the Riga front was evacuated yesterday by the Russians. We have captured the town. The heavy coastal guns there fell undamaged into the hands of the Germans.

THE INTERIOR

As the result of the visit paid by a large number of the Prince Rupert people to Telkwa in the Bulkley Valley during this weekend, and the more so from the visit which the Premier and his ministers are paying to Central British Columbia, the potentialities of the interior country, which lies tributary to the line of the G.T.P., will in a great measure become better known. There are many people in Prince Rupert who have never been more than a few miles from the coast, and to many of those who took advantage of the weekend excursion to Telkwa, the Omineca country has been a revelation. Only a relatively small portion of the land in the interior is as yet under cultivation, and that not too far from the railroad. Those of the visitors who paid any attention to the crops, and to the stock in the district would see for themselves what the land is capable of producing. But the great trouble for years past is that suitable locations have been impossible to obtain within measurable distance of the railway. Time and time again have intending settlers come into this central portion of the province from the prairie lands in the east and across the border. They have brought their whole outfit with them; farm machinery, stock, horses, household goods, wives and families. And time and time again they had to go away again. The land was there. They wanted the land. It was uncultivated and uncleared. These people were prepared to do both. They had in many cases money to spend, but could not dispose of it as they wanted to do. Land hungry and they could not satisfy their hunger.

Legally, nothing could be done about the matter. The intending settlers could come, or they could go away if they liked, but they could not get suitable holdings. The Government in past years had allowed large blocks running to the thousands of acres to become alienated. That is, they

had permitted persons or companies to step in and register their titles to these large tracts as the owners thereof. In many cases, the price paid was but a nominal one, and the taxes did not amount to much. These people did not nor have they now any intention of cultivating their land, nor for using it for any purpose whatever. It suits them to hold it, and wait till their property becomes enhanced in price owing to the development carried out by others. They will sell out at many times what they originally paid for it. The bona fide settler who wants the land to make a living for himself and to provide food for the rest of the community has to pay through the nose, or else go without the land he wants.

Blocks of land running to fifty thousand acres held in this manner are common within a few hundred miles of Prince Rupert. And, naturally, these wise speculators have in most instances picked up the choicest portions. This is one of the problems confronting the Government of this day. It is imperative that something be done to relieve the situation. It is intolerable that in times like these more particularly with a world scarcity of food stuffs, the man who is willing and able to produce food is to be denied the opportunity.

What Central British Columbia requires and for that matter what the whole of Western Canada needs, British Columbia in particular, is a greater influx of settlers, who will make the present waste spaces blossom. The time is at hand when some of our pre-conceived notions as to the rights of the individual will require some considerable overhauling. The right of the individual or company to withhold land from cultivation when production is needed is one which cannot morally be defended. The time will come when no man will have a prescriptive right to more land than he can handle. If he cannot or will not produce he will have to give place to some one who will.

KHYEX SAWMILL TO START UP AGAIN

The Pacific Lumber & Trading Co., of Vancouver, has acquired the Khyex sawmill at the mouth of the Khyex river and will resume operations at the earliest possible date. A scow load of material is now on the way up from Vancouver. The capacity of the mill will be increased to 75,000 feet per day and around a hundred men will be employed. The lumber will chiefly be shipped to the prairies. W. F. Boyer, formerly of Smithers, will be in charge of the mill and is now on the ground.—Omineca Herald.

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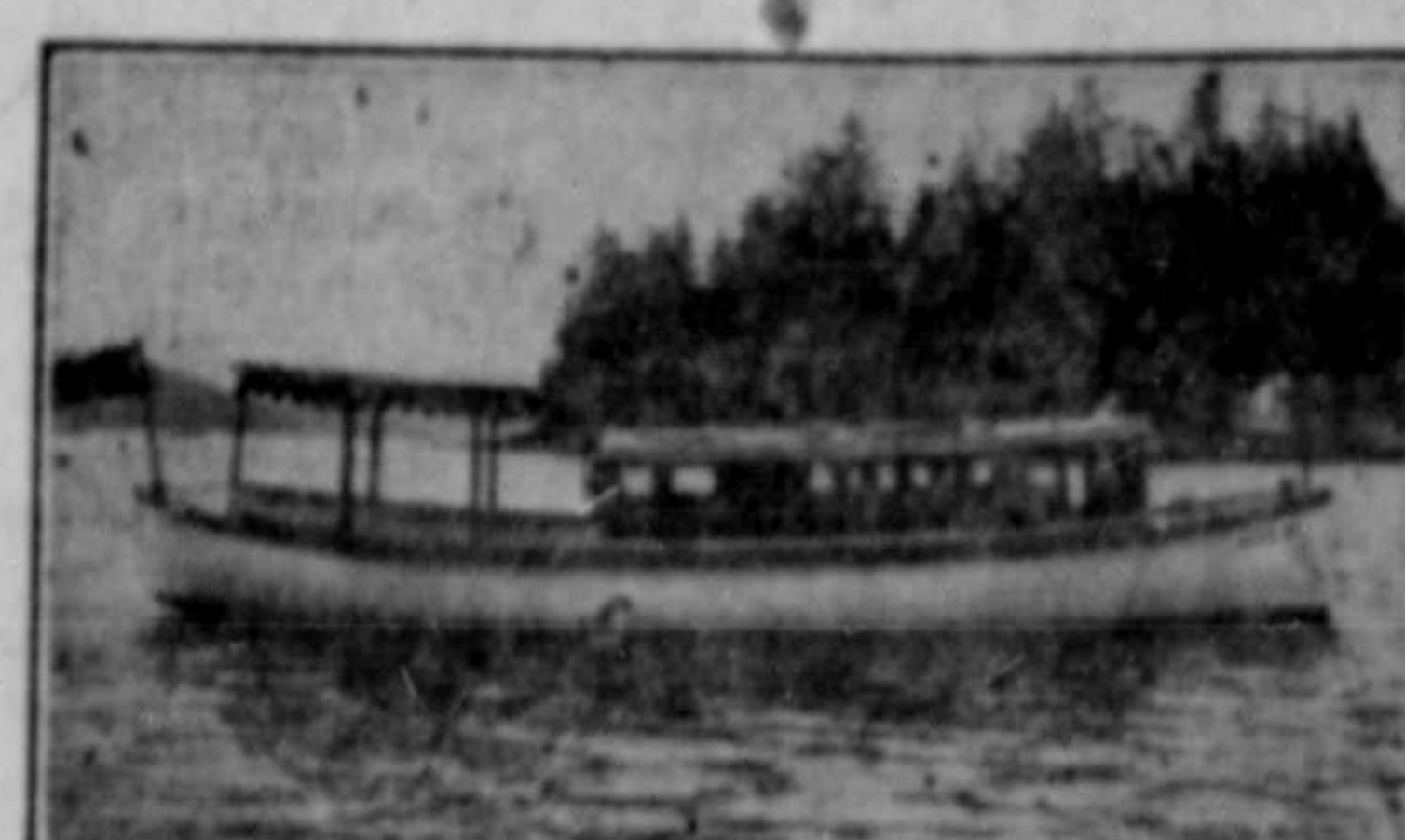

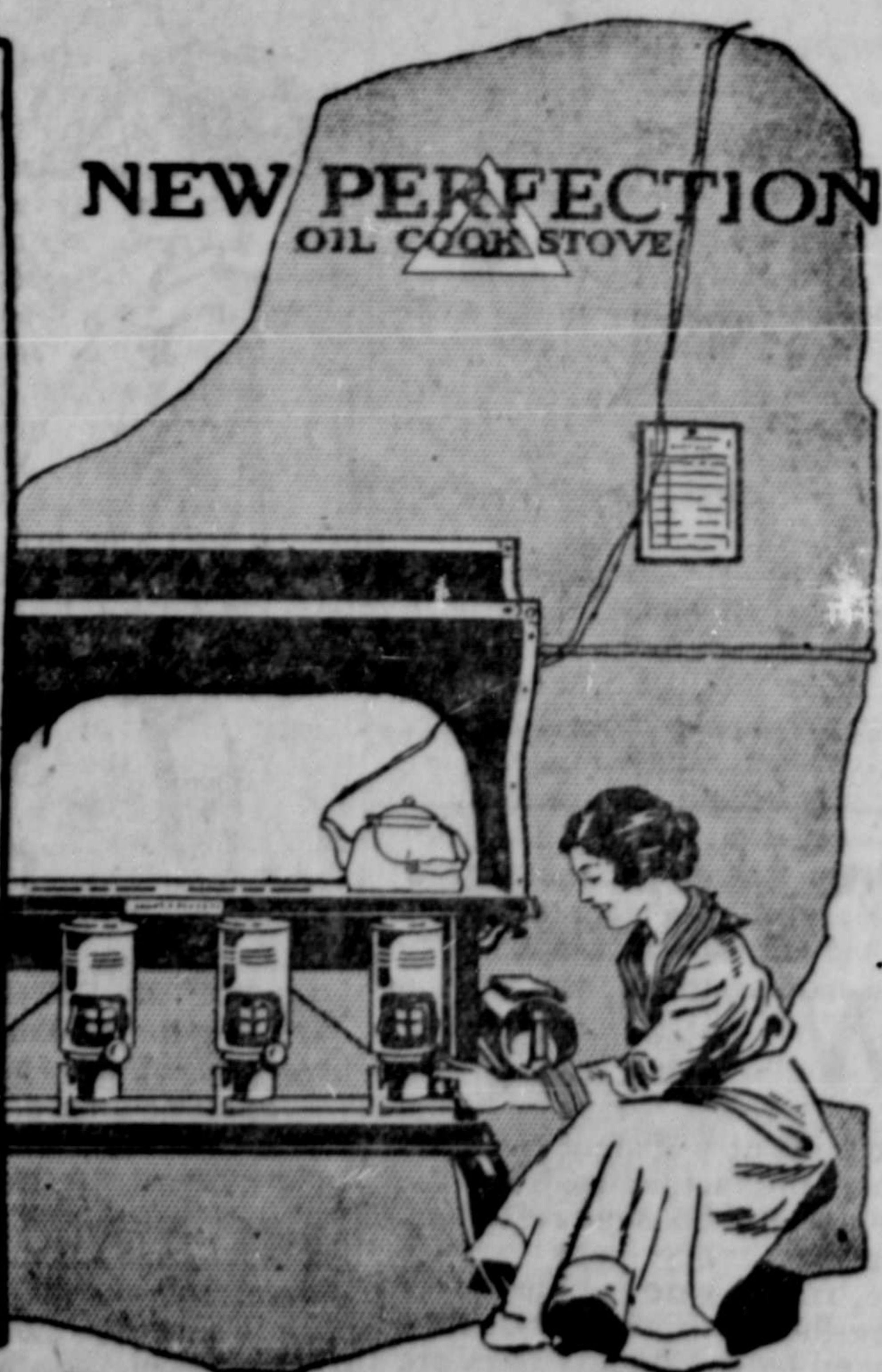

ADMIRAL SCHEER THINKS AMERICANS HARMLESS

Amsterdam, Sept. 5.—Confidence in the effect of unrestricted submarine warfare was expressed by Admiral Riehard Scheer, commander of the German battle fleet, in an interview with the Leipzig Tagblatt, the admiral declared that he expected "everything from it."

"This confidence," he said, "is shared by all our submarine commanders and no difference of opinion exists about it in our navy. It would be a mistake to name a definite date, but I am fully convinced that if the rate of the sinkings continue as at present the day must come when England will recognize that the war does not pay."

Questioned about losses of submarines and as to the anti-submarine methods of the Allies, Admiral Scheer said:

"With almost ideal obstinacy the English miss the mark and so far we have been met only with guns, not mines, and not with anti-submarine appliances, I can confirm the statement recently made regarding our losses which on an average are two or three monthly, and are more than equalled by new construction."

Regarding the support given by the United States to Great Britain Admiral Scheer had this to say:

"I do not underestimate it; neither do I attach too much importance to it. The Americans may make themselves unpleasant by means of increased supplies of aeroplanes and other materials, but they can hardly harm us seriously from a military point of view and they will never become dangerous. They will not be able to turn the scale in favor of the Entente any more than Roumania."

Admiral Scheer expressed his opinion that his submarines will have decided the issue of the war before the United States is ready to send a large army to Europe.

MAKE POTASH FROM KELP AT QUEEN CHARLOTTES

Prior to the outbreak of the war, the world obtained most of its potash supply from Germany. The price was then about \$48 per ton on this Pacific coast. Now the price is between \$150 and \$180, and even at that price the supply is short. To help to overcome this scarcity, the International Chemical Co., Ltd., a concern financed by the National Chemical Co., Ltd., is now completing the installation of the equipment for a potash plant at Paconi, on Cumshewa Inlet on Moresby Island. The old plant which belonged to the Standard Fisheries there has been taken over. New machinery has been added for the recovery of Potash. In addition, the company proposes to extract oils from non-edible fish, and also to make fertilizer from the fish after the oil extraction process.

All the edible fish caught by the company's boats will be placed in its cold storage plant, and sent in weekly shipments to Prince Rupert for packing. Potash, oil, fertilizer and fish will be the four-fold enterprise of this new company.

Some of the most extensive kelp beds are situated on Cumshewa Inlet, where this company have got licences from the government. These kelp beds extend over an area of some ten square miles. The new plant will have a capacity for handling about 1000 tons of wet kelp per day. The cutting of the kelp will start within the next

few weeks. This harvest of the sea is reaped by knives affixed or suspended below scows, which pass over the kelp beds, cutting over the kelp growth as it passes along. The kelp rises to the surface, and is gathered and sent to the potash plant, where by a special process, the potash is recovered.

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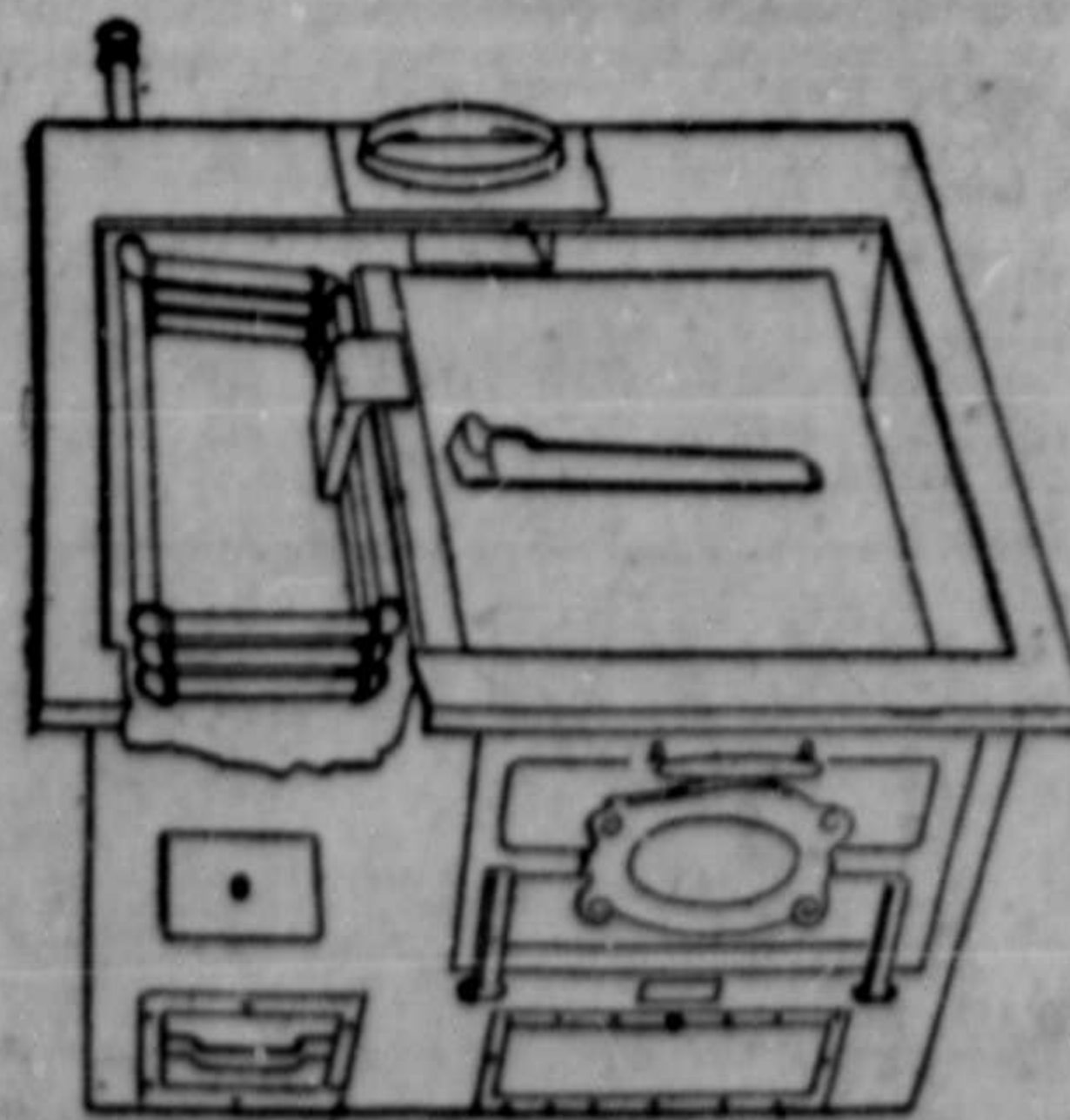
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
