GERMANS ADVANCE SPEEDILY INTO RUSSIA

TERRIFIC FIGHTING ON ITALIAN FRONT FOR THE LAST DEFENCE OF GORIZIA

GERMANS NOW THIRTY MILES EAST OF RIGA

Fears Are Expressed Regarding Possible Fate of Russian Fleet—Alexieff Says Petrograd Safe.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, Sept. 7.—The German forces are advancing beyond Riga at an amazing speed in pursuit of the retreating Russians. They are now thirty miles east of the evacuated seaport.
General Alexieff, the former commander in chief, said today that Petrograd is not threatened by the fall of Riga, but that the greatest danger is on the Roumanian front. The garrison at the capital is in good spirits and full of confidence. The German fleet is said to have reached the Gulf of Riga.

London Fears.
London, Sept. 7.—Grave fears are expressed regarding the possible fate of the Russian fleet, as its safety depends upon the stand being made by the Russian army. Naval experts here express the hope that the Russians will destroy their ships rather than permit their capture. There is no hope that it could win a victory. From dispatches received here it is indicated that the Russian withdrawal is being conducted in an orderly and masterly fashion, to fortified lines further east.

Berlin Report.
Berlin, Sept. 7.—In the Russian retreat from Riga, the German armies captured one hundred and twenty Russian officers, seven thousand five hundred men, one hundred and eighty guns, three hundred machine guns, along with several armored cars and a great quantity of war materials. Along the Dvina River, the German forces have advanced as far as Friederichstadt.

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SAN GABRIELLE RECAPTURED BY AUSTRIANS

Tremendous Fighting Progressing for the Possession of Last Point Dominating the Town of Gorizia.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Rome, Sept. 7.—The desperate battle for the possession of the positions in the district northeast of Gorizia on the Austro-Italian front is continuing. By an extremely violent attack, the Austrians re-occupied Monte San Gabrielle, the last point of the Austrian line remaining in their possession dominating the city of Gorizia. The Italians are fighting valiantly for its recapture. On the Carso Plateau, south of the Brestovizza valley, the Austrians, reinforced by the Bavarian divisions brought from the Russian front, launched fierce attacks against the Italians, but were repulsed.

Five hundred additional prisoners were taken in the fighting at Monte San Gabrielle, and two hundred in the Brestovizza Valley fighting, where the Austrian attacks were broken up.

GREAT SUFFERINGS OF CHILDREN IN SYRIA

New York, Sept. 4.—More than 50,000 children under 12 years of age, all dependent on outside relief for necessities of life, are in Lebanon and an additional 25,000 orphans are in Syria, not including Palestine, according to reports of missionaries from the Near East who recently arrived here. It was asserted by the missionaries that it was extremely doubtful whether many of these children could survive the coming winter if relief does not reach them in a more substantial form than heretofore.

In many instances, the missionaries said, little children, scarcely old enough to feed themselves were found by relief workers living absolutely alone, digging for enough food to keep them alive and often subsisting on grass. The majority of these were girls who had survived due to greater powers of resistance or to having been fed by their brothers, who starved. The Turkish authorities are doing all in their power for the children, and missions and hospitals have been opened in several places in charge of Turkish women. The number of needy children reported, however, is small compared with the number in actual want.

PREPARING FOR AFTER WAR

London, Sept. 5.—It is reported that a scheme for a working fusion of British explosives companies, about which some details have been heard at intervals during the last few weeks, is now nearing completion. It will probably embrace about fifteen companies, thus compressing the entire explosives industry in a huge concern headed by Nobels. The fusion is intended to take care of the situation which will arise when the war ends. At that time, it is expected, the energies now being devoted to munitions will be devoted to manufacture of other and notably of chemical products.

Owing to the thick weather prevailing along the coast, the S. S. Prince Rupert did not berth at the wharf this morning till half past ten.

NEW ARMY WILL BE ON TERRITORIAL BASIS

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, Sept. 7.—The units of the new Canadian army will be organized on a territorial basis, and all recruits will go to regiments from their own district. Arrangements are pending for the return of all unfit soldiers and their wives.

VENIZELOS PLANNED TO ENTER GALLIPOLI

London, Sept. 5.—The Athens correspondent of Reuter's Limited says that the full report of the speech made by Premier Venizelos August 26 throws a new and important light on the Dardanelles campaign and shows that if the plans he contemplated had not been arbitrarily vetoed by Constantine, then king, Serbia might have been saved, Bulgaria forced to keep neutral, and Turkey defeated early in 1915.

At the time he proposed intervention in the war—in February, 1915—Gallipoli was defended by only 6,000 Turks scattered among the different fortresses, with scanty supplies of ammunition.

From the Greek representatives at Constantinople it was learned the Turks were then actually preparing to evacuate the capital, and he declared if his policy had been carried out a Greek army could have been secretly landed in Gallipoli and could have entered Constantinople within a fortnight.

"Thus," said M. Venizelos, "Turkey would have been destroyed, Russia with her food supplies by sea, would have been able to export her grain and so have escaped the offensive of 1916. Bulgaria, seeing Greek and Franco-British armies on her rear, would not have dared to intervene and Germany would have lost the east and the war would have ended one year earlier."

As it was, the Entente Allies undertook the Dardanelles campaign more than a month after the Turks began their defense works at Gallipoli, having, said M. Venizelos, no longer any confidence in Greece.

CITY COUNCIL AND THE OUTSIDE STAFF

A special meeting of the city council was held last night, when the men engaged on the water-works extension were in attendance. At the meeting on Tuesday night, in the absence of Mr. S. D. Macdonald, president of the Trades and Labor Council, a deputation of the men was then accompanied by Mr. W. E. Thompson. In giving a comparative statement of wages paid by the cities on the coast, he mentioned 45c per hour in connection with Vancouver. At last night's meeting official telegrams from the lower coast cities showed that Nanaimo alone paid \$3.30 for an eight-hour day, and all the other cities paid \$3.00, which showed that Mr. Thompson's information was wrong.

In view of the fact that the present work of excavating the ditch is by far the hardest and dirtiest work that there is in the city, it was moved by Ald. Nelson and seconded by Ald. McMeekin, that the men be given a bonus of ten per cent while on this particular job.

Taking into consideration that at present the city has very little work to do, the council was practically unanimous in not raising the standard of wages higher than the present rate of 45c per hour.

POPE PREPARES SECOND PEACE PROPOSALS

Vorwaerts Says Germany Wants no Gain, But Durable Peace—War Predicted to End by the New Year.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Copenhagen, Sept. 7.—According to an authoritative forecast published by Vorwaerts, Germany will tell the Pope that the German people want no gain, either territorial or otherwise, but only a durable peace, guaranteed by international treaties.

Herr von Hydebrand, the German Conservative leader, predicts that the war will not last through another winter, but will be ended by the New Year.

Reports received here from Switzerland say that it has been learned from clerical sources that his Holiness the Pope is preparing a second peace note which will be despatched soon for the consideration of the belligerent powers.

Vital Statistics.
The vital statistics of the city of Berlin published for the months of March, April and May, show a fifty per cent increase in the number of deaths occurring from tuberculosis.

The Tom and Al had 40,000 lbs; Magnhel, 4,000; Dolphin, 17,000; Teddy J., 21,000; Northcape, 9,000; H. and R., 7,000; Mayflower, 8,000; La Paloma, 42,000; Agnes B., 9,000; Ila, 8,000, and the Renell with 13,000 pounds.

Good prices were received, varying from 12 cents to 15 1/2 cents per pound.

This morning the Carruthers came in with 65,000 lbs. halibut and 15,000 lbs. black cod for the Cold Storage Company. The Sitka was also seen coming up the harbor this forenoon for the Cold Storage Co.

RENEWAL OF ACTIVITY IN MACEDONIA

On Both Sides of the Vardar River British Make Violent Bombardment—Chinese to Help Russians.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Sept. 7.—A renewal of activity on the Macedonian front is reported. On both sides of the River Vardar, the British artillery violently bombarded the enemy works. East of Lake Doiran, the Bulgarians attempted two infantry attacks, which were both repulsed.

British Front.
London, Sept. 7.—On the nights of the fourth and fifth, German aircraft dropped bombs on three hospitals. Local fighting and patrol encounters occurred during the night southeast of St. Julien and east of Fleurbaix.

More Canadians Wanted.
Two Canadians were killed at the air raid on London on Tuesday. General Currie says that more men are needed at the front, whether conscripts or volunteers.

French Front.
Paris, Sept. 7.—Violent artillery fire prevails along almost the whole front. German attacks on the Aisne front were repulsed. North of Rheims, the French troops penetrated the enemy first line trenches.

Chinese Troops for Russia.
San Francisco, Sept. 7.—Fifteen thousand picked Chinese troops have been mobilized for transfer through Siberia to the Russian battle front to help the Russians to stem the tide of the German advance. This information arrived here in heavily censored dispatches from Shanghai.

THE G. T. P. HAS NEW GENERAL PASSENGER AGENT

Information has been received that Mr. W. E. Duperow, at present assistant general passenger agent at Winnipeg, has been appointed to be general passenger agent of the Grand Trunk Pacific and Canadian Government Railways with headquarters at Winnipeg.

THE C. N. R. PURCHASE

By means of the purchase last week in the House of Commons in Ottawa, the Government rushed through the bill for the purchase by the State of the undertaking known as the C. N. R. Where they little expected it, however, opposition to this bill has arisen in the Senate. Strong objection was taken to the bill while it was in the House of Commons. Not to the principle of the bill, but to the peculiar wording of the bill itself.

This bill sets up machinery through the operation of which the Mackenzie and Mann interests will receive from the taxpayers of this country millions of dollars for stock which the Drayton-Aeworth Commission, the Government's own commission, declared to be valueless. In 1914, when Parliament was induced to aid the Canadian Northern with a bond guarantee of \$45,000,000, the legislation of the time expressly provided for foreclosure if the company did not meet its obligations. The Canadian people had subsidized the company to the extent of hundreds of millions of dollars; they were opposed to any further aid, and this provision was inserted in the bill at the time to allay outside indignation, as well as to ensure its adoption by Parliament.

Now, instead of foreclosing, the Government proposes to buy Mackenzie and Mann's stock, and employed the closure to ram the measure through parliament. The Senate, of course, is provided for just such an occasion as this. A conservative institution, not in the parliamentary sense of the word, but in its real meaning, was provided in the shape of the Upper Chamber to act as a brake on the doings of the House of Commons. Fulfilling its duties, the Senate would throw this bill out.

The Minister of Finance, Sir Thomas White, is a worthy sponsor for a bill of such a kind as this. The method of its passing through the Commons is in keeping with the methods of the interests which he represents. Sir Thomas owes his appointment as Minister of Finance to those in-

terests in Toronto which during the past six years have exercised such an influence on the fiscal and financial policy of this Government. The financial policy of the Government as controlled by Sir Thomas White has always been in the interests of his friends. The wealthy interests in the country have always controlled the policy of the Government as regards finance. This bill for the relief of Mackenzie and Mann is a specimen. "Milking the public treasury" for its friends is hardly a thing to be proud of in these modern days, even if it is legalized by Act of Parliament. Yet this Government swore to administer the affairs of the country in the public interest.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

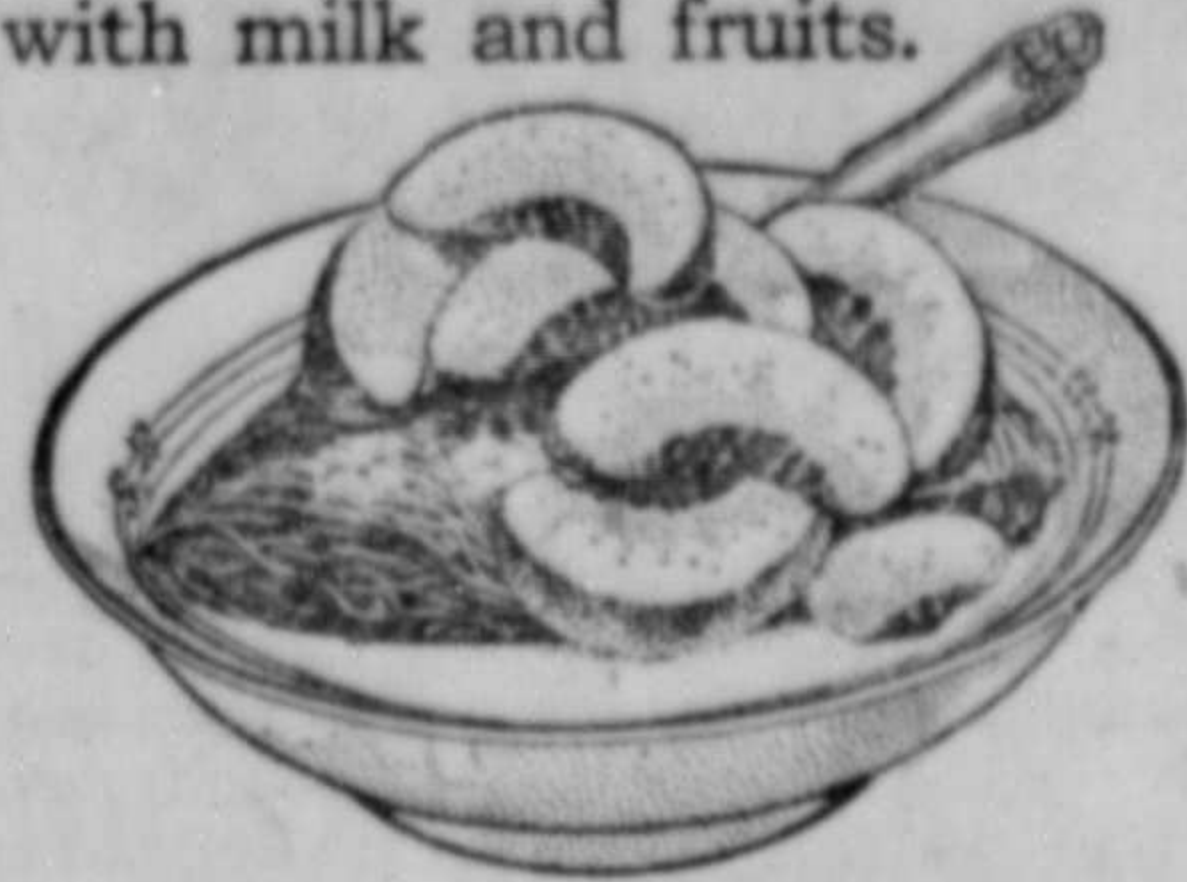
Now that the Thames District has been bombed by German aeroplanes daily for three days and the latest attack made on the city of London itself again, possibly the state of mind of the powers that be over there may come round to consider reprisals. If the Germans understood that every time they bombarded an open British town, open German towns would also be bombarded such action on their part would soon cease. The French Government protected its civilian population in this manner.

The news will be welcome that the Government intends immediate action in the enforcing of the provisions of the Military Service Act. Decisive action and prompt is what is required. "All those making themselves useful in any way to increase agricultural production" are to be exempted. Our pessimist says in this way the Government is encouraging the "back to the land" movement.

The Russians retreating under perfect discipline from Riga, fighting all the time. On this sector, the Women's Battalion performed great feats of valor. It is a pity that every division on the Russian front does not contain a Women's Battalion, so that the Russian man soldier would have something to emulate.

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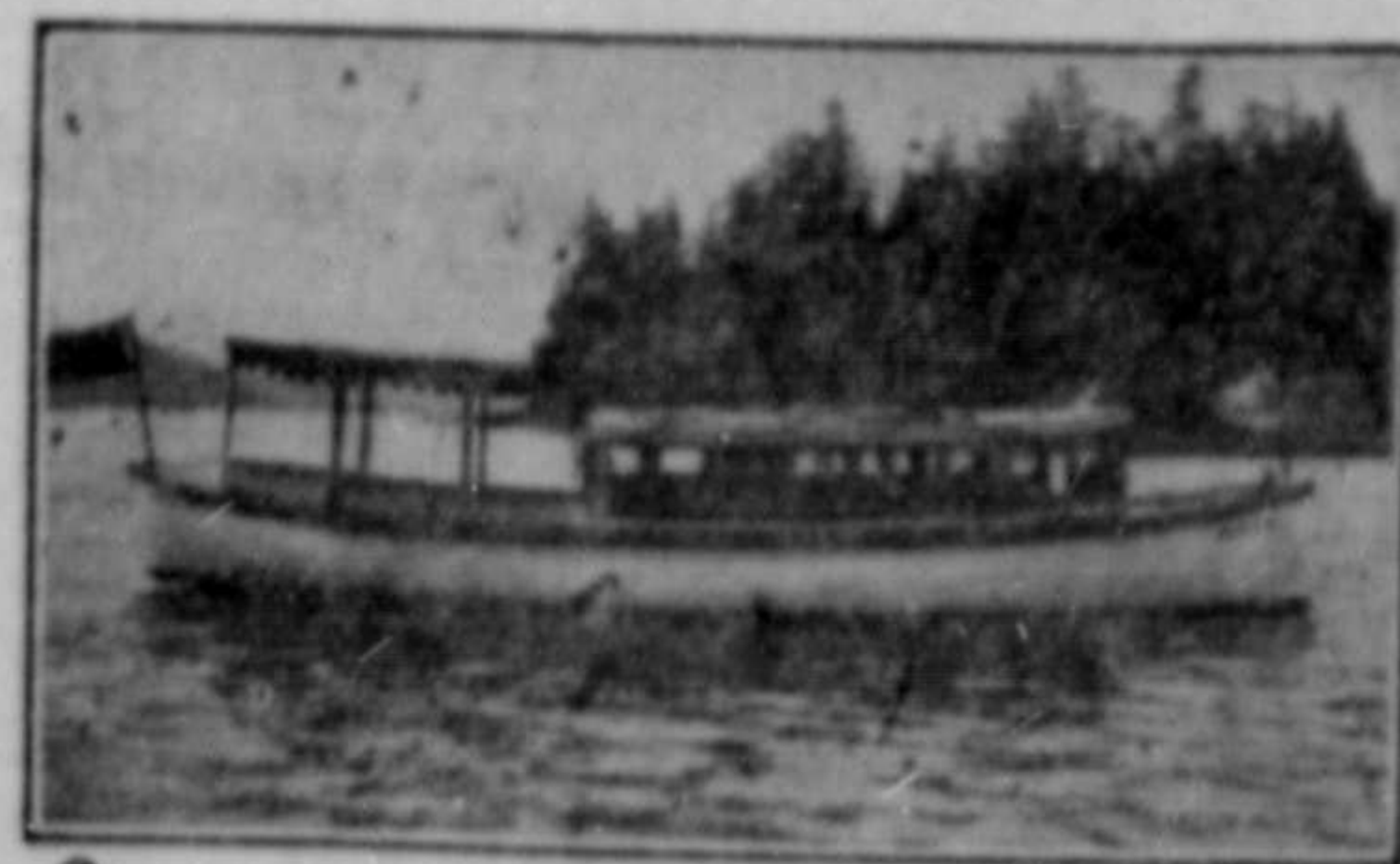

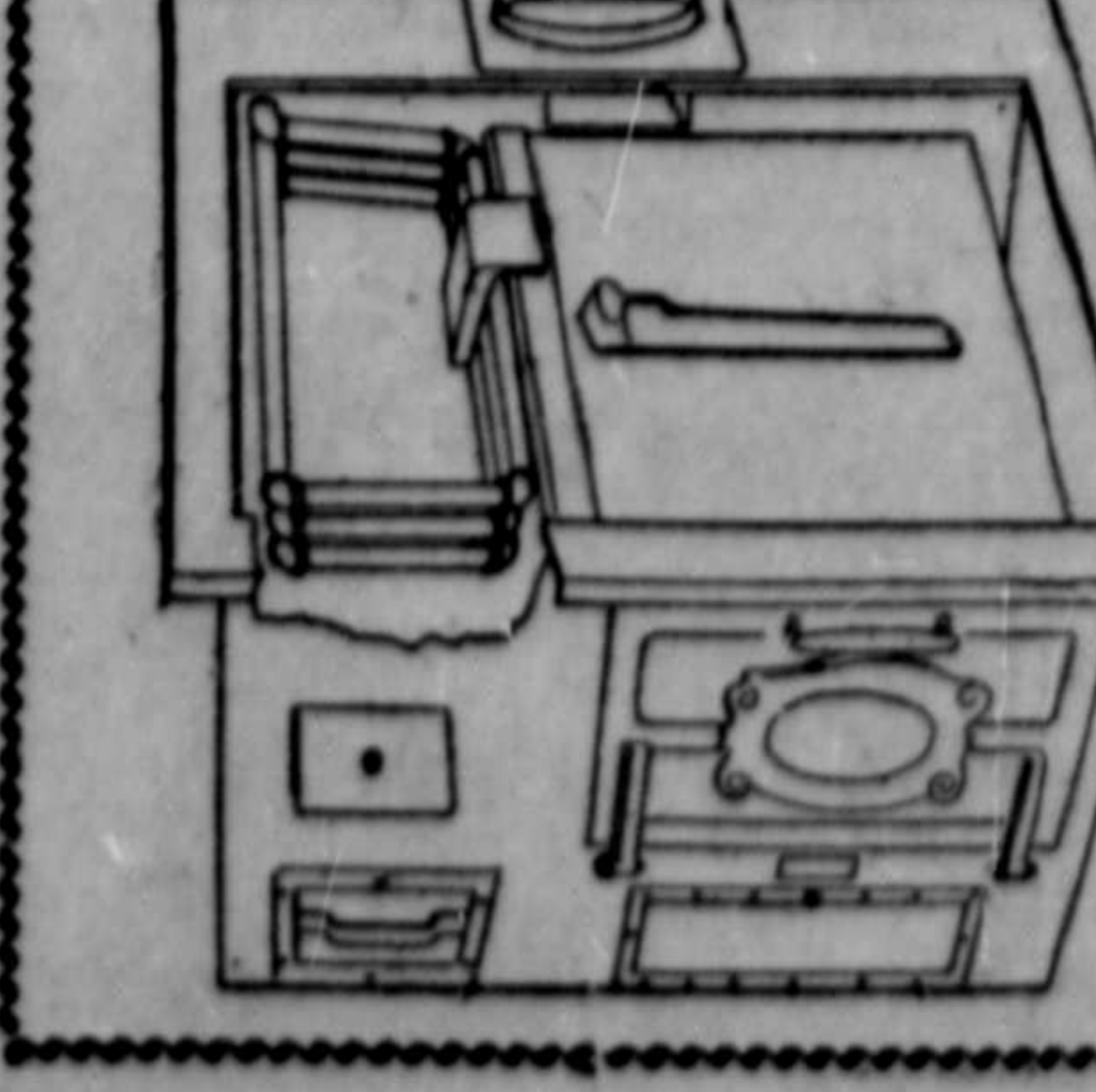
