SWEDEN GIVES INFORMATION TO GERMANY

WASHINGTON MAKES STARTLING DISCLOSURES--GERMAN FLEET IN THE BALTIC

GERMAN NAVY OUT IN BALTIC GOING NORTH

Great Naval Attacks on Russian Coast Towns Expected--Firm Resistance at Riga by the Russians.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Stockholm, Sept. 10.—It is reported that the German naval forces in considerable strength have been observed in the southern Baltic. The fleet is said to be making a northern course. The leading squadron consists of submarines and torpedo boats, with cruiser squadrons following them. It is believed that the German Baltic fleet has been reinforced by part of the High Seas Fleet. Great naval attacks on the Russian coast towns are now expected.

It is considered impossible for the German fleet to attack St. Petersburg on account of the strength of the defences at Reval and Kronstadt.

Firm Resistance.
Petrograd, Sept. 10.—The encouraging feature of the Riga situation is the seeming firmness of the Russian resistance. The German pursuit appears to be slowing up and in military circles it is not anticipated that the enemy will risk any further penetration of Russian territory. On the Dvinsk sector, the Germans have been unable to make any impression on the Russian defence. According to information received the spirit of the troops at Dvinsk is much more favorable than on the other fronts.

French Front.
Paris, Sept. 10.—The French forces have resumed the offensive on the Verdun sector on a front of twenty miles. The Germans violently counter attacked the new French positions taken recently on this sector. Their attacks were made in force, and after a hard struggle, the positions remained intact. The losses suffered by the enemy were severe. North of the Bois Le Chaume the enemy also attacked our new positions. Four separate attacks were made, which were all repulsed.

British Ships Sunk.
London, Sept. 10.—The British ship Turakina, 8,492 tons, the Daphne, 8,000 tons, and the Midsex of 7,264 tons, have been sunk by German submarines.

FOOD CONTROL ACT IS NOW EFFECTIVE IN U.S.

(Special to The Daily News.)
New York, Sept. 10.—The Food Control Act is now effective in the United States. It came into force on Sunday evening. The prohibition of the manufacture of whisky will have a vital effect on the supply of grain, and will release a large quantity which may be used for food. It is estimated that forty per cent of the grain distributed goes into whisky. This prohibition will have an equally vital effect upon the supply of whisky, which may reach an unheard of price before long.

RED CROSS LECTURE GIVEN AT TERRACE

Terrace Sept. 9.—On Saturday evening under the auspices of the Terrace branch of the Red Cross Society, the people of Terrace and vicinity enjoyed the privilege of hearing one of the most inspiring and patriotic lectures that have been delivered in this northern part of British Columbia since the great war began.

The lecturer was G. B. Gordon, director of the Museum of the University of Pennsylvania, brother of Mr. J. K. Gordon of Terrace, and the late and honored Lieut. MacLaren Gordon of the 102nd Battalion.

The lecture was on Canada's duty in this time of war, and the speaker held his large and appreciative audience spellbound, while he traced the underlying facts and features of the war, and the aims of our blood-crazed enemy, in language that could not help but move the feelings of the most indifferent hearer and make him go forth to do his part better than he had ever done it before.

IMPORTANT FINDS IN ALICE ARM DISTRICT

Alderman Casey has returned to town from the Alice Arm district, where he has been engaged for several weeks past in the preliminary development work of his claims there. He is enthusiastic regarding the possibilities of this country. During his work on his claims there, he found another ledge six feet wide, carrying high grade values. He reports several new strikes on the same mountain. Higher up, Messrs. Morley, Colbach and McPhail have come across a big body of ore running from 150 to 200 ounces in silver to the ton. They have run a cross-cut for 100 feet and have not encountered either wall yet.

On the Moose claim, D. W. Cameron has done a lot of work and has a magnificent showing, running from 20 to 60 feet wide. Average samples have been taken which assay over 200 ounces in silver. A good summer's work has also been put in on the Glacier claim, where Messrs. Flint and Smith have got some very good copper showings. The whole district is showing up well.

On the McGraw Mountain on Illiance, Gid Morley, an old time Colorado miner, has struck a body of ore running \$340 to the ton, chiefly in silver. The samples which assayed to this value were taken from a vein four feet wide in a ledge 60 feet in width.

Alderman Casey reports very well of the North Star, adjoining the Dolly Varden group, where Messrs. Pearce, Evidson and Carlson have made a very important discovery during this year's assessment work. They have uncovered a 20-foot ledge showing ruby and native silver, also sulphides, from which average samples assay to 70 ounces.

There have been several hundred claims located up the Kit-sault this year, many of which Alderman Casey says have very promising showings.

A representative from an American company was in the Alice Arm district from Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. He was extremely well pleased with the showings, and took terms and prices of many prospects. He expects to return this fall if conditions will permit.

A meeting was held by many of the prospectors in the district, and they have arranged to send Alderman Casey south to negotiate in connection with some properties that have some very promising showings.

VIENNA STOCK EXCHANGE WILL REMAIN CLOSED

Berlin, Sept. 10.—A Vienna dispatch quotes the Austrian Minister of Finance saying that the Vienna stock exchange will not reopen until the present unsettled conditions are abated. It is said that the reopening of the stock exchange would bring on panicky markets.

THE HON JOHN OLIVER RETURNS FROM OMINECA

Accompanied by Mr. A. M. Manson, M. P. P. for Omineca, and Mr. Barrow, member for Chilliwack, the Hon. John Oliver, minister of agriculture, arrived in the city by last night's train from the east.

Leaving at Burns Lake the special train conveying the Premier and his party to Fort George, Messrs. Oliver, Manson and Barrow made a visit to Francois and Ootcha Lakes and the minister of agriculture was agreeably surprised with what he saw there. "I am more than pleased with my trip," he said last night. "Impressions formed at the time of my former visit were more than confirmed. Continuous to the line of the G. T. P. is undoubtedly the largest area of agricultural land in British Columbia west of the Rocky mountains. Abundant evidence of the fertility of the soil and its adaptability for the production of small fruits, vegetables, hay, grain and live stock were visible in every locality we visited."

An Imperative Necessity.

Prompt measures to populate this country and render it productive are imperatively necessary. Mixed farming, or the production of meats and dairy produce will in my opinion be the prevailing industry for years to come. Plenty of timber for building purposes is available and good log houses and barns are being provided by the settlers. Generally the country is lightly timbered with open areas frequently occurring. I was not looking for minerals but saw some fine specimens, and heard a great deal on the subject. What interested me more was the fact that in several localities deposits of lime and marble were observed.

"Everywhere we were received with the greatest kindness and hospitality. The generosity of the G. T. P. in providing a special train for the parliamentary party was greatly appreciated and it enabled us to examine the country in a more thorough manner than would otherwise have been possible. Mr. Manson is deservedly popular in Omineca District and this visit of enquiry by ministers of the Crown and members of the Legislature brought about by his efforts, added to his popularity."

The Wealth Reservoir.

"The ministers and members from the south," said Mr. A. M. Manson, "I believe are satisfied that Central British Columbia is the great natural reservoir of the province. They are today in a much better position to draft development legislation than heretofore. I feel our land problem will be radically and successfully dealt with next session, and that will mean tremendous things to the province."

"The party did not see more than specimens of our mineral wealth, but it is there as in no other part of British Columbia, if indications count. That will be a profitable field of inquiry for the next parliamentary party."

BORDEN'S RETIRAL EXPECTED SOON

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, Sept. 10.—Sir Robert Borden's retirement from public life is expected to take place at an early date. The Franchise Bill now before the House of Commons is meeting with strenuous opposition. A very strong fight will be waged against the Government's discrimination in the extending of the vote to women, and to the disenfranchising such a large portion of the electorate.

The Home Defence Force.

Montreal, Sept. 10.—An order has been issued at Ottawa ordering the demobilization of all units of the Home Defence Forces. These units will be allowed to transfer into Canadian overseas battalions, otherwise they will become liable to conscription.

BRITISH LABOR WANTS REFORM BY NEW METHODS

Blackpool, England, Sept. 3.—The Trade Union Congress was opened today with a record attendance of 700 delegates, representing more than 3,000,000 workers. John Hill of the Boiler-makers and Shipbuilders' Union, who presided, said, in his opening address, that something more than resolutions were required to obtain reforms, and that "worn-out methods and going cap in hand to Ministers should be buried with the battle-axes and bow and arrows of England of the Plantagenets."

Referring to industrial unrest, which he said had assumed alarming proportions in the workshops this year, he outlined findings of a commission of inquiry to the effect that the Government had broken its pledge regarding industrial conscription, and that men had been compelled to accept unfair conditions under the fear of being compelled to enlist. The Commission found deep in the minds of the workmen the conviction that high prices for food were due to unchecked gambling by middlemen, for which no advance of wages could ever compensate.

As to what the Government was doing, Mr. Hill said that a promise had been given by the new Minister of Munitions, Winston Churchill, and that an important statement had been made by Geo. H. Barnes, Labor representative, on behalf of the War Cabinet, of which he is a member. It would be their duty, Mr. Hill added, to see that the promises were fulfilled, so that the causes of unrest might be removed, and that the working classes might be reunited in the common national effort for international liberty and security.

Mr. Charles Swanson, one of the old timers in the Alice Arm district, is in the city on a visit for a few days. He has been prospecting and mining in Alice Arm for many years.

HUN METHODS EXPOSED BY WASHINGTON

United States Will Likely Break With Sweden, and Argentine May Declare War as Result of News.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Washington, Sept. 10.—Another exposure of a startling nature was made by the Government on Saturday. It has got unquestionable proof that the Swedish Legation in the Argentine has been acting as a secret means of communication between Germans in Buenos Ayres and Berlin. It has transmitted information regarding the sailings of vessels belonging to the Allies, and also directions for their destruction by submarines. The Foreign Office at Stockholm has been acting as a telegraph office for the German Government for the last three years. It has regularly transmitted messages in a German cypher under the guise of Swedish Government messages.

It is considered likely that the United States Government will break off all negotiations with Sweden and that Argentine will join into the war with the Allies directly against the Huns.

Many of the friends of the newly married couple were present, and a jolly time was spent. Both the bride and bridegroom are deservedly popular in the city and they received congratulations all the time till they left on the steamer for the south. They received numerous and costly presents from their well-wishers, and on their return from their honeymoon will take up house at 432 Fifth Avenue.

THE FRANCHISE BILL

The War Time Election Act which is now before the House of Commons is the last important measure which is expected to come up during this session of Parliament. The outstanding features of this bill are three in number. The first is that the female relatives of soldiers are to be enfranchised. The act says nothing regarding any other women in the Dominion. Notwithstanding the fact that five of the provinces of Canada have adopted Woman's Suffrage, while they may vote in Provincial matters, unless they have some immediate relative in uniform, they are to have no say in the electing of the next House of Commons.

This on the face of it, seems to be quite unfair. There are many women in Canada who have no immediate relative in the ranks. They may be active in Red Cross work, or in the making of munitions, which is work of extreme importance to the nation, but they are to be excluded from exercising the franchise. Somehow or other, the Borden Government seems to be afraid of the Canadian women. And well they may, too. If it is good for the wife of a soldier to vote in the coming election, surely her sister, whether married to a civilian or yet a spinster, is as equally entitled to record her judgment at the ballot box.

In the second place, there are over fifty thousand foreigners in Canada who under this bill will become disenfranchised. They have been invited to come to this country, where they would have equal representation in the affairs of the nation with the Canadian born. They came at the direct invitation of the Government of Canada in past years. They have been admitted to the full rights of citizenship. They have become Canadians. They have had a vote. Yet—now they are to lose it. Even keeping in view the fact that this is a time of war, there does not seem to be any particular reason for this restriction, looking at Canada as a whole. They would be asked to record their vote the only way or the other. Either Liberal or Conservative. Conscription is no longer an

issue. It is now the law of the land. According to what Sir Robert Borden himself has said the Conscription law will be enforced before it is likely that the election will take place. The issues which will be judged by the electors at the coming election will be the record of the Borden Government. The question is not whether the war will be won or not. Canada will do her share to that end. The question that troubles the Borden Government is how the foreign element will vote. To remove that doubt, it proposes to cut off from the list of voters on the plea of national precaution apparently, those it is afraid of. It is hard to come to any other reasonable conclusion.

These foreign born citizens of the Dominion are amenable to the law. If they break the law, or become a menace, the law and its officers can deal with them. They are either Canadian citizens or they are not. If they are, then they are entitled to all the privileges of citizenship. If they are not citizens now, their nationalization papers will have to be cancelled. But it is impossible for a modern and democratic Government in a free country to take any such action without some very good reason, and get off with it.

The third feature of the bill is the disenfranchisement of those who are exempt from military service, such as the Mennonites Doukhobours, and other conscientious objectors. Never having undertaken the full obligations of citizenship so far as military service is concerned, there will be less objection taken to their not being permitted its full privileges. Nevertheless, Canada must not, indeed cannot break faith with her foreign born citizens, who are loyally living up to their oath.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

"Come out, 'tis now September. The huntsman's moon's begun." The "frequent gun" that the poet sang about is becoming more and more in evidence. The sportsman and the pot boiler will be combined very largely this season owing to the high prices of meats.

The Indians forecasted a severe winter these past two years by the condition of the deer. When they were well nourished and very fat, more so than usual, at the beginning of the winter, they took this to be a sign of severity of the weather. It came out true, too, these past two years. Special attention will be paid to the condition of the deer this season.

The German aviators are making a pastime of bombing military hospitals in France. There is one hospital on the Verdun front that has had bombs dropped on it several times now. The Hun can always find his way back. It is no accident either, for all hospitals are plainly marked with the Red Cross in huge marks on the ground, that even he who flies may see. Such acts make one more notch on the stock, which Fritz will have to answer for.

The United States War Department's plan is said to be for two million men on active service and in training camps by the end of next June. With this fresh weight thrown in the scale, there can be no hope for a successful finish of the war for Germany. If the rate of wastage the Central Powers are suffering now could be kept up, it will not be long till Germany is compelled from sheer exhaustion to sue for peace. But not so long as there is a chance left. Kaiser Wilhelm apparently sees some chances still.

Herr von Hydebrand, the Conservative leader in the Reichstag, is reported to have predicted that the war will not last through the winter but will be ended by the New Year. He has evidently given up the hope of a victorious Germany.

TAMMANY FIGHTING FOR ITS EXISTENCE

New York, Sept. 5.—A real, old-fashioned humdrum campaign with everybody opposed to Tammany Hall, that ancient bulwark of municipal privilege, taking a slam at it, and new issues in the shape of peace propaganda, are confronting New York City this fall in its quadrennial upheaval to elect a mayor and other government officials.

In fact, the campaign is already on, for the primary laws prevail for the first time this year in a city election, and to get "set" for primary day, September 19, all parties have put their tickets in the field and the slambang has begun.

Reduced to its least common multiple, the main issue is between Tammany and anti-Tammany forces. For eight long, hungry years Tammany has been away from the public treasury and the reform element, termed fusionists because of the coalition of Republicans and Independent Democrats, has pretty thoroughly dug itself in.

Tammany is really in a desperate situation, for another four years on the outside will go far toward putting it permanently out of business as a practical factor in municipal affairs.

Therefore Tammany is fighting to come back.

William R. Hearst will not be a candidate for mayor of New York at the coming election. His refusal to allow his name to appear on the ballot at the coming primaries was filed with the board of elections today, the last day under the law for taking this action. Mr. Hearst had been designated by petition for the nomination of the Democratic ticket.

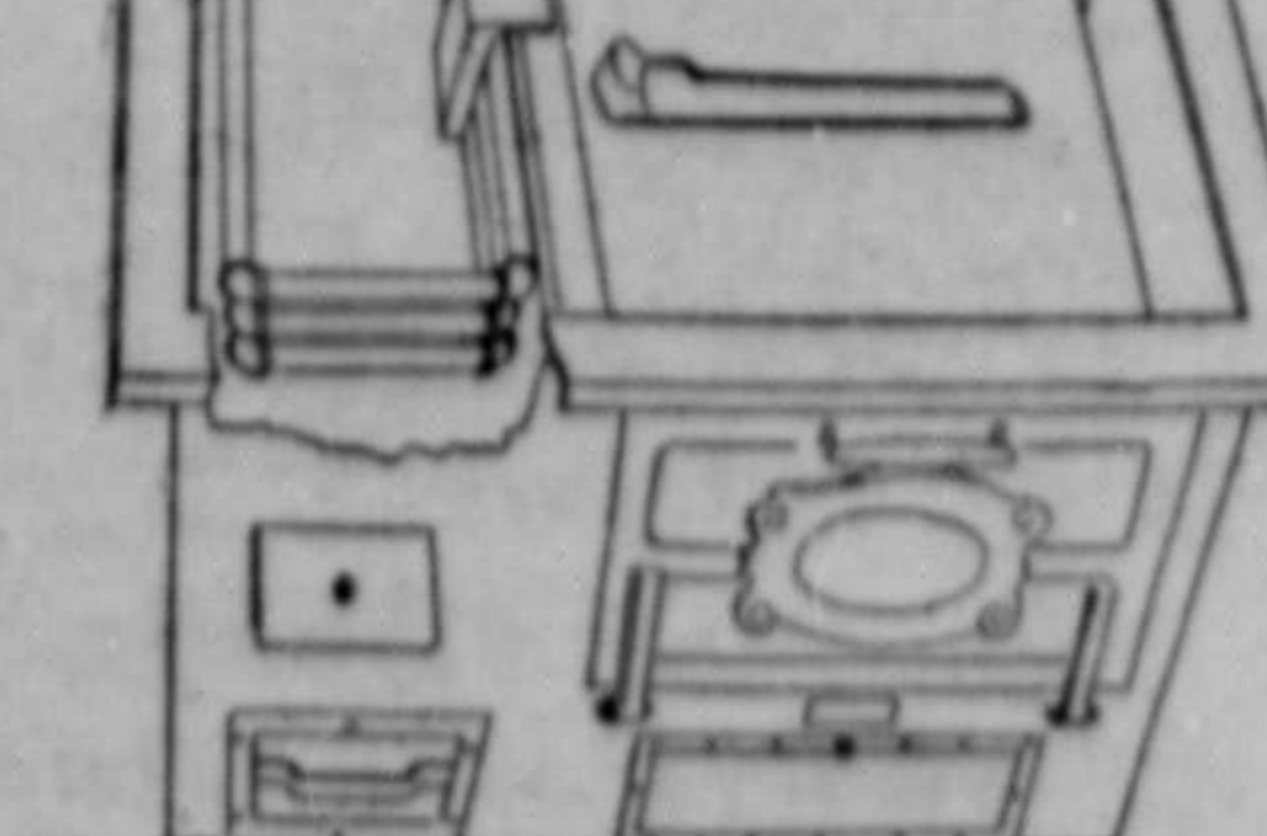
