## KERENSKY BECOMES COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF

### ARGENTINE DEMANDS EXPLANATION FROM HUNS -- MINISTER GETS PASSPORTS

#### KORNILOFF IS APPROACHING PETROGRAD

His Forces are Only Thirty Miles From Capital—Kerensky Now Commander-in-Chief of Russian Armies.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Petrograd, Sept. 13.—Kerensky has assumed the position of Commander-in-Chief of all the Russian armies. This position will be held by him at least until the counter revolution is crushed.

General S. Dnikine and General Valuiel, commanding on the southwest and the western fronts respectively, have joined in with Korniloff, in his demand for the enforcing of military discipline.

**Korniloff's Manifesto.**  
"The Government works with the Huns," declares Korniloff in a manifesto to the Russian people. He says his action is only prompted by the impending ruin of the country. He seeks nothing but the salvation of the Russian people, and he will not betray his country into German slavery. Korniloff's march towards Petrograd continues. His forces are now within thirty miles of the capital city.

**A State of War.**  
The Provisional Government today declared a state of war existing in the town and district of Moscow. Korniloff has been declared a rebel, and along with the other generals who have joined him, will be handed over to the courts of justice. General Alexieff has consented to act as chief of the staff for the armies of the Provisional Government, while Major General Bruyovitch has been appointed Commander-in-Chief of the Russian army in succession to Korniloff.

**A Man of Action.**  
Mr. Leslie Urquhart, the most prominent oil and mining engineer in Russia, has just arrived in London. He says that a military dictatorship is necessary to save Russia. He is confident that the country will pull through. Korniloff, he says, is eminently a man of action, while Kerensky is an honest visionary, but a visionary, notwithstanding his honesty. A separate peace with Germany is the last thing which either party would consider.

Mr. Urquhart, it will be remembered, received recognition at the hands of several European governments for his daring action several years ago whereby he saved the lives of many European women and children during an outbreak of the Kurds in Asia Minor.

#### THE POPE'S PROPOSALS

Rome, Sept. 13.—The Kaiser will reply to the peace proposals as obtained by His Holiness the Pope, but will talk at President Wilson. The United States is to be the target. It is expected that Germany will accept the principle as outlined by the Vatican note.

#### HUN CHARGE D'AFFAIRES GETS HIS PASSPORTS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Buenos Ayres, Sept. 13.—The Argentine Government sent to the German Legation at noon yesterday passports to be delivered to Count Luxburg, the German Charge D'Affaires in Buenos Ayres. The Argentine Foreign Office has sent a communication to the German Foreign Ministry demanding an explanation of Count Luxburg's action in sending secret code messages to Berlin through the Swedish Legation.

#### Anti-German Riots.

Great anti-German demonstrations were made here today by the Argentinos. The German Legation was stoned, and a German newspaper office was burned. Several blocks of German business houses were likewise set on fire. The Government is taking extreme precautions to guard the German Charge D'Affaires from getting into the hands of the mob.

#### Recall Baron Lowen.

Washington, Sept. 13.—The State Department is not content with Sweden's press announcement that she will not let the Argentine incident occur again. It is the opinion here that the recall of Baron Lowen, the Swedish minister, should be forced by Argentina.

#### Sweden Won't.

Stockholm, Sept. 13.—Baron Lowen, the Swedish Minister to the Argentine, will not be recalled according to a statement by Admiral Linmin, Minister of Foreign Affairs.

#### BRITAIN CONTROLS WORLD'S WOOL CLIP

"The announcement that the Imperial Government has purchased the South African wool clip at an advance of 55 per cent. over the prices ruling in the pre-war period of 1913-1914, taken in conjunction with the acquisition for the second year of the Australian and New Zealand clip, possesses more significance than a business transaction on a moderately large scale," says the Glasgow Herald.

"The significance of the transactions in regard to Australasian and South African supplies lies in the fact that through their acquisition the Imperial Government will have control of all wool at two of the principal primary markets of the world. The production of the third primary market—South America—is appreciably less in quantity and quality than in the case of Australasia and South Africa.

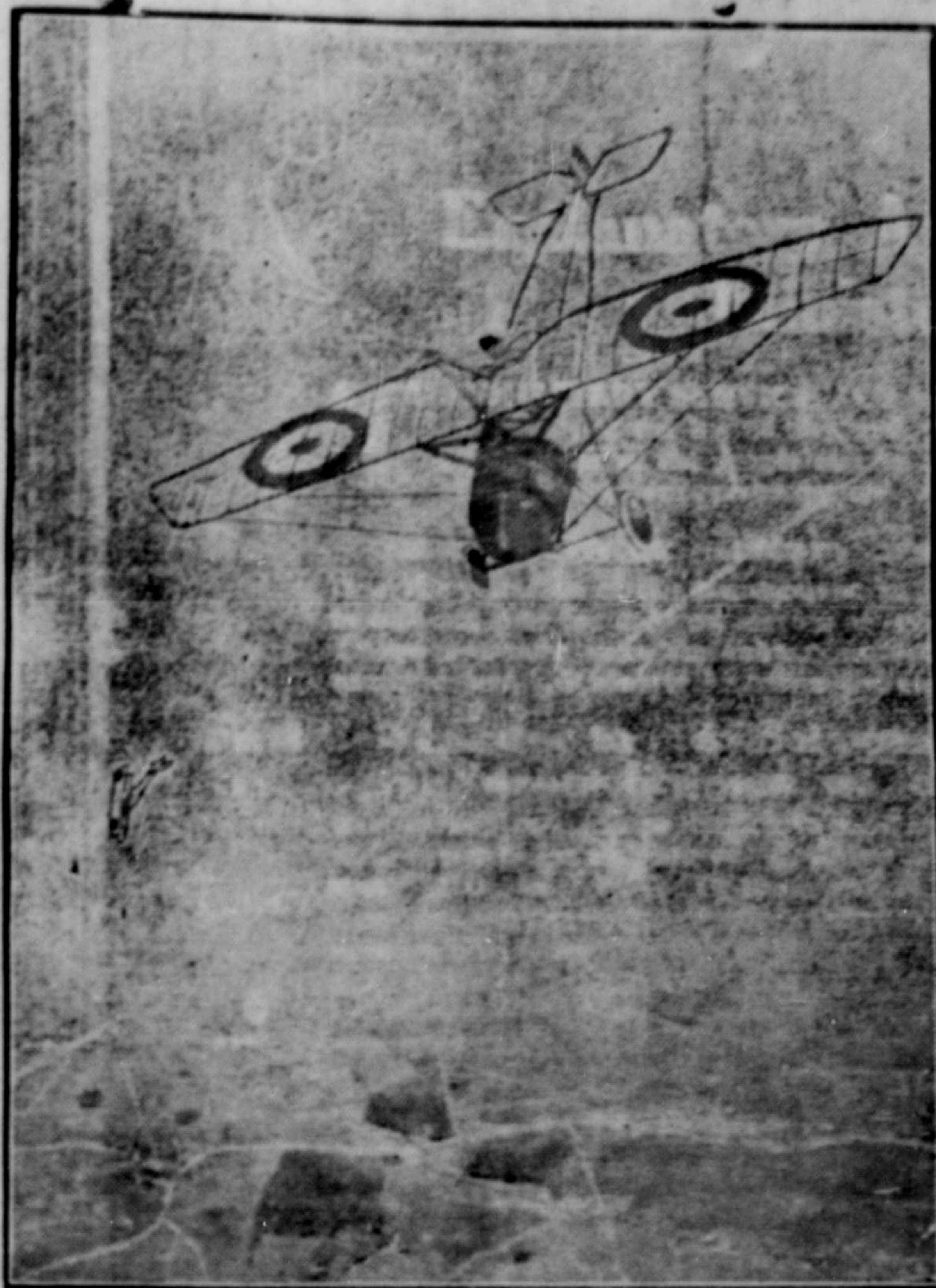
"Government control of wool, which now extends from the raw material to the finished product, is avowedly for the duration of the war—it may be taken for granted, however, that in the case of raw material at any rate the control will necessarily be exercised for some tangible period after hostilities have ceased. The monopoly of the wool supplies of the British Empire is of enormous importance at the present time to the nation and the powers allied with us, and will possess an equal, if not an enhanced, value when the day of peace comes."

#### U. S. SHIP SUNK

Washington, Sept. 13.—The Minchaha, a transport of 16,000 tons, has been sunk by a German submarine. Fifty of the crew were drowned.

#### LITTLE NEWS FROM THE WESTERN FRONT

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 13.—A German assault to the east of Hargicourt was checked by the British troops. Successful raids were carried out near Bullecourt, during which the enemy suffered severe losses.

Paris, Sept. 13.—There is no news from the French front today.

#### CRUISER SOWS BOMBS AND DESTROYS SUBMARINE

An Atlantic Port, Sept. 12.—A story of how a German submarine was sunk by a floating bomb left in the wake of a British cruiser which the submarine was following was told by the captain of a British merchantman arriving here yesterday. His ship had been sunk by the submarine, and the crew was picked up by the cruiser.

When the lookout on the cruiser sighted the periscope the cruiser slackened its speed and allowed the submarine to come near. It was dusk and the bomb was lowered over the side of the cruiser, which then put on all steam and ran straight ahead, while the submarine followed. Soon an explosion blew the U-boat out of the water. The cruiser returned and rescued two German sailors from the sunken submarine.

#### THE EXPLOITERS

Ottawa, Sept. 10.—J. C. Watters, president of the Dominion Trades Congress, denounced the Canadian Northern Railway Stock acquisition Bill as the "most damnable piece of business ever perpetrated by any government," in an address to the Ottawa Allied Trades and Labor Association. He declared that Sir Clifford Sifton, Sir Thomas White, Sir Donald Mann, Sir William Mackenzie and the Canadian Bank of Commerce and banking interests in general had never done anything but exploit the country and were the power behind the Conscription Bill, for the purpose of coercing labor after the war. He said the government dare not enforce the Military Service Bill if labor used its brains.

#### ALTERATIONS IN THE G. T. P. SERVICE

Commencing on the 23rd of September, the winter schedule of the G. T. P. comes into operation. The big steamers "Prince Rupert" and "Prince George" will cut out their trip to Alaska and will ply between Seattle and Anyox only. In the train service, there is an alteration also. The train from the east will arrive Thursday night, instead of Friday as at present, and will leave for the east on Saturdays instead of Friday mornings.

The schedule is as follows:  
S.S. "Prince Rupert" will arrive from the south at 10:30 a.m. on Wednesdays; leave for Anyox at 12 midnight Wednesday; arrive back in Prince Rupert Thursday at 9 p.m. and leave for the south at 12 midnight Thursday, calling at Ocean Falls en route.

S.S. "Prince George" will arrive at 10:30 a.m. Saturdays; leave for Anyox 12 midnight Saturdays; arrive back in Prince Rupert 9 p.m. Sunday and leave for the south 9 a.m. Monday calling at Swanson Bay en route.

Trains will arrive at Prince Rupert on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Sundays at 5:30 p.m. and will leave Prince Rupert 11:30 a.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays.

The S. S. "Prince John" will make fortnightly trips from Prince Rupert to Alaskan ports and fortnightly trips to the Queen Charlotte Islands.

#### THE FRENCH MINISTRY

#### UNION GOVERNMENT AS FAR AWAY AS EVER

Ottawa, Sept. 8.—Now that the alleged stumbling block in the path of union government has been removed, to wit the Hon. Bob Rogers, it transpires that union government is just as far away as ever it was. The real obstacle is the disinclination of those approached by Premier Borden to wrap themselves in a winding sheet, tie weights to their feet and jump overboard. If you don't like that metaphor then think of union government as the drowning man's clutch which drags the rescuer under too. In short nobody is willing to take chances.

Of course Premier Borden does not get too far away from practical considerations even when he is pursuing such a high ideal as union government with a slight sediment of ex-Liberals—if any such can be caught. Bob Rogers goes out of the Cabinet but he remains Minister of Elections. Bob is a good sport. He will play the game and stand by the machine. Daddy's on the engine—don't you be afraid. Bob's reward is coming. While Bob is firing up and getting all black in the process Premier Borden stands out the pure white patriot, all shining like Lohengrin in his quest of the Holy Grail. Somebody in the outfit has to look well and what's the use of being premier, if you don't take the first crack at it?

Similarly Premier Borden did not really lose the Nationalists the other day when he read that letter saying they were "unpatriotic in the present war." He simply left them in the parcel room to be called for later. The Nationalists are not lost for keeps. They are simply gone before. Premier Borden will meet them on the other shore after the next general election. Meanwhile Henri Bourassa's newspaper has increased its size and decreased its subscription rate for the next three months and the question naturally arises from what slush fund the debonaire Henri is deriving his nourishment. Just as in 1911 so now in 1917 Henri has a great nose for the flesh pots at election time.

Another obstacle to union government is the people Premier Borden has working for it—notably Sir Clifford Sifton.

The lessons of history are all against calling in a man like Sir Clifford Sifton to help form a union government. Not to go too far back what happened to the ancient Britons when they invited the Angels and Saxons to drive out the Picts and Scots? Well that's the Sifton idea of union government—the helping hand helps itself to everything. The Conservative party would probably be more afraid of Sir Clifford Sifton than it is if the Winnipeg convention hadn't shown that he was pretty dead. Sir Clifford is, in fact, as dead as Lazarus but he hasn't begun to smell himself yet. He has a pretty little notion of union government—split the West, split Quebec—and then unite afterwards! Something like a lobster shedding a claw and growing another.

Rumor has it that the Government will drop its little plan to pay the Toronto group of looters par fr C. N. R. bonds which they bought in England at forty cents on the dollar. The pledges of the common stock, six hundred thousand shares, all water, will probably have to take it out in water. The little scheme by which Sir Joseph Flavelle's pet bank and a couple of his trust companies were to get \$60,000,000 for their worthless goods, didn't go very far before the Opposition saw through it. #### MINISTER OF MILITIA ISSUES A STATEMENT

Ottawa, Sept. 13.—The Minister of Militia and Defence has issued the following statement:—

The casualties at the front in the Canadian Expeditionary Force for the period August 16 to August 24, 1917, so far reported number seven thousand five hundred and eighty-six. This covers the exceptionally heavy fighting in and around Lens, where the Canadians were heavily engaged. The total recruits for the same period are approximately eight hundred.

#### GRAIN PRICES FIXED

(Special to The Daily News.)

Winnipeg, Sept. 13.—The board of grain supervisors have fixed the prices of grain, which are identical with those set by the United States. No. 1 Manitoba will cost \$2.24; No. 2 Manitoba \$2.15; No. 1 Alberta red winter, \$2.21; No. 2 Alberta red winter, \$2.18; No. 3 Alberta red winter, \$2.15. The prices of other grades of wheat will be fixed as soon as sufficient information about the quality of the new crop is secured by the board.

#### AUSTRIA SUFFERS FROM COAL SHORTAGE

Basel, Switzerland, Sept. 10.—Herr von Hamann, the Austrian Minister of Public Works, startled the Austrian Chamber of Deputies yesterday by giving it as his opinion that the coal crisis had become a vital question for Austria-Hungary, according to Vienna advices today. The situation, declared the Minister, was one which must be faced without optimism and with the utmost seriousness.

In an effort to remedy matters, continued the Minister, 12,000 miners have been brought back to the mines from the front, but during August the authorities had been unable to effect an increase in production because of the under-nourishment of the workers and their consequent inability to work hard or put in long hours. The failure of the men to achieve the desired result was due, not to bad faith, but to impotence, he pointed out, and they must be accorded extra rations, even at the expense of other classes of the population.

After the Ministerial speech had been delivered, the Economic Committee of the Chamber introduced a bill creating a Government monopoly of coal and authorizing the Government to forbid the heating of all places of amusement, except theatres and museums, and to close luxurious hotels.

## THE WOMEN'S VOTE

Women's organizations in various parts of Canada have protested against the provisions on the "War Time Election Act," which discriminates against a large proportion of their sex. "We shall be very much surprised," says the Victoria Times, "if those protests are not echoed in every community in the Dominion, where equal suffrage has been an issue." Continuing, the Times says that the demand for the elimination of the obnoxious clause is not based upon party grounds, for it withholds the franchise from women of both parties who should be permitted to vote. It is based upon common justice, on the right of the women of Canada to recognition of the part they have played in the life of the country, not only in war but in peace.

The argument that this discrimination is justified by the title "War Time Election" is ridiculous as the title itself. The election which is about to be held is not a mere temporary expedient—until the end of the war only. It is not a departure from the constitutional procedure of this country, an experiment in democratic institutions. It is the vindication of the time-honored right of the Canadian people to say whether they are willing to have their business managed for five years more by the men who have been representing them in a Parliament which outlived its normal term a year ago. They will vote with an eye to not only the war but the years which will follow the war and to the solution of those grave domestic problems which will require the country's best ability and wisest statesmanship to avert disaster.

When Sir Robert Borden and Mr. Bennett addressed a public meeting in this city last December they eloquently eulogized the women of Canada for what they had done in the war and for their devotion to all that was best in the nation's life generally. By this they meant not only those women whose sons, fathers or brothers were at the front, but those who had engaged in war work in other ways. In Parliament

a few months ago similar tributes were paid to Canada's womanhood. Now, the very men who uttered those fine, high-sounding phrases are deliberately disfranchising a large proportion of the women they praised so highly in the mistaken idea that by doing so they will gain some political advantage.

Germans and Austrians who became naturalized citizens of Canada prior to 1902 will be permitted to vote. So will Henri Bourassa and Armand Lavergne. So will Tancred Marsil and other agitators. So will the profiteers who are making millions out of the war and contributing next to nothing to the cost. Special facilities will be afforded political officers in England to cast their ballots. But many women, who will not be able to qualify under this law owing to circumstances over which they have no control, women who are rendering splendid service to the country—in many respects services even more important than are rendered by some of the elements now overseas—will be denied the franchise.

Some of the most enthusiastic and unselfish war-workers in this province, who, by the way, had fought for equal suffrage for years before the war, will be discriminated against by the "War-Time Election Act." Incidentally, it will be noted, significantly enough, that newspapers which profess to oppose political manoeuvring in the conduct of the country's business not only carefully refrain from criticizing this ugly specimen of class legislation but actually defend it.

## GERMANY MUST RESTORE FRANCE DESTROYED

Paris, Sept. 11.—France will not compromise on the recovery of Alsace-Lorraine, Premier Ribot said in an address delivered in connection with the celebration of the anniversary of the battle of the Marne. He said France would not consent to diplomatic discussions as to whether the provinces should be restored.

The Premier paid a tribute to the soldiers who fell on the Marne and to the General who led the French armies to victory. He then referred to the French aims in the war.

"France makes pretensions only for the recovery of its own, to regain possession of its provinces, wrenched from it by obvious abuse of force," he said. "Let no one ask France to compromise upon that question. The nation could not do it without betraying the cause of justice."

"What a preface would be given to the peace which it is sought to found upon the rights of peoples if the injustice consummated half a century ago should be consecrated anew."

"The restoration of Alsace and Lorraine is not one of those questions that may be given over to discussion by diplomats. It is the very condition of the establishment of the rights of nations which ought to guarantee peace in the future against fresh violence."

The Premier added that France, in demanding reparation for devastation which it had been made deliberately to suffer, would still be within the role of champion of justice.

"France does not ask that the aggressor be fined," he said, "but that the aggressor be obliged to repair the damage he has done."

# Military Service Act 1917

## Explanatory Announcement by the Minister of Justice

THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT has received the assent of the Governor-General, and is now part of the law of the land. It will be enforced accordingly, and the patriotism and good sense of the people can be relied upon to support it. Resistance to its enforcement, however, by word or act must and will be repressed, as resistance to any other law in force must be.

### Reinforcements Under Military Service Act Immediately Required

It is the intention of the Government immediately to exercise the power which the Act confers, and to call out men for military service in order to provide reinforcements for the Canadian Forces. This is necessary, since the military authorities report that the reserves available or in sight for reinforcement will shortly be exhausted unless this step be taken.

### First Call Limited to Men Between 20 and 34, Who Were Unmarried, or Widowers Without Children, on July 6, 1917

The present call will be limited to men not in the schedule of exceptions, who were unmarried or widowers without children on 6th July, 1917, are at least twenty years of age, and were born on or since 1st January, 1883. Of this class, all those will be entitled to conditional exemption whose services in their present occupations, agricultural, industrial or other, are essential in the national interest, and whose business or domestic responsibilities are such that serious hardships would ensue if their services be required. Conscientious scruples based upon a prohibition of combatant service by the articles of faith of the religious denomination to which men belong will also be respected. The men first required to serve will consequently be those who can be called upon with the least disturbance of the economic and social life of the country.

### Civil Tribunals to Deal with Exemptions

Questions of exemption will be determined, not by the military authorities or by the Government, but by civil tribunals composed of representative men who are familiar with local conditions in the communities in which they serve, who will generally have personal knowledge of the economic and family reasons which those whose cases come before them have had for not volunteering their services, and who will be able sympathetically to estimate the weight and importance of such reasons. Provincial Appellate Tribunals, constituted from the existing judiciary of the respective Provinces, will be provided to correct mistakes made by Local Tribunals, and a Central Appeal Tribunal for the whole of Canada, selected from among the present Judges of the Supreme Court of Canada, will be constituted in order that identical principles may be applied throughout the country. In this way every man may rest assured of the fair and full consideration of his circumstances and the national requirements, both civil and military.

### Proclamation Will Announce the Day

A proclamation will issue calling out the bachelors and widowers referred to, and fixing a day on or before which every man must report for service to the military authorities, unless he has before that day made an application for exemption.

### How to Apply for Exemption

Applications for exemption may be made by written notice on forms which will be available at every post office, and will be transmitted free of postage. They will not, however, be required to be made in this way, but may be presented by the applicants in person to the Exemption Tribunals. The cases of those who have given written notice in advance will have precedence, and appearance in person will therefore be likely to involve considerably more inconvenience and delay to the men concerned, so that it is recommended that advantage be generally taken of the facilities for written application.

### Exemption Tribunals in All Parts of Canada

The Local Exemption Tribunals will be constituted with the least delay possible, consistent with the selection of representative individuals to compose them, and the instruction of the members in their duties. There will be more than one thousand of such Tribunals throughout Canada, each consisting of two members, one of whom will be nominated by a Joint Committee of Parliament, and the other by one of the Judges of the existing courts. Every effort will be made by the wide distribution of Tribunals, and by provision where necessary for their sitting in more than one place, to minimize the inconvenience to which men will be put in obtaining the disposition of their cases. A Registrar will be appointed in each Province, who will be named in the proclamation, and to whom enquiries may be addressed. Each Provincial Registrar will transmit to the appropriate Tribunal the applications for exemption which have been submitted in advance of the sittings, and men who have sent these in will not be required to attend the Tribunals until notified to do so. Other applicants should attend personally on the Tribunal without notice.

### How to Report for Service

Men who do not desire to claim exemption will report to the military authorities for service, either by mail or in person, at any time after the issue of the proclamation. Forms of report by mail will be found in all post offices and, like application for exemption, will be transmitted free of postage.

### Early Report Advantageous

No man who reports for service will, although he may be medically examined and passed as fit, be required to go into camp or join a battalion until after a day fixed by the proclamation sufficiently late to permit of the disposition by the Local Tribunals of most, if not all, of the applications for exemption which may come before them. Thus no advantage will be gained by delaying or disadvantage incurred by prompt report for service on the part of those who do not intend to apply for exemption.

### Facilities for Immediate Medical Examination

Immediately upon the issue of the proclamation, Medical Boards will sit at every mobilization centre for the examination of men who report for service or who, subject to their right within the time limited to apply for exemption, desire to have their physical fitness determined in order to allay any doubt as to their physical condition, or to know definitely and in advance whether there is a possibility of their services being required. Certificates of physical unfitness issued by these Medical Boards will be accepted without any further investigation by Exemption Tribunals when they sit. Men found physically fit who have not reported or service may nevertheless apply for exemption on any of the prescribed grounds, including even their physical condition if dissatisfied with the Medical Board conclusion.

### Notice to Join the Colors

As reinforcements are required notice to report at the nearest mobilization centre will be given from time to time to the men found liable and passed as fit for service. Disobedience of such notice will render the offender liable to punishment, but punishment for failure to report for military service, or to report subsequently for duty when called upon, will be imposed ordinarily by the civil magistrates; offenders, however, will remain liable for the performance of their military duties notwithstanding any civil punishment which may be imposed, and will be liable to military punishment in cases in which civil proceedings are not taken.

### Watch for the Proclamation

Notice of the day appointed for the making of a claim for exemption or for report for military service will be published as widely as possible, but as no personal notice can be given until the individuals called out have so reported themselves or claimed exemption, men possibly concerned are warned to inform themselves with regard to the day fixed since neglect may involve the loss by them, of important privileges and rights.

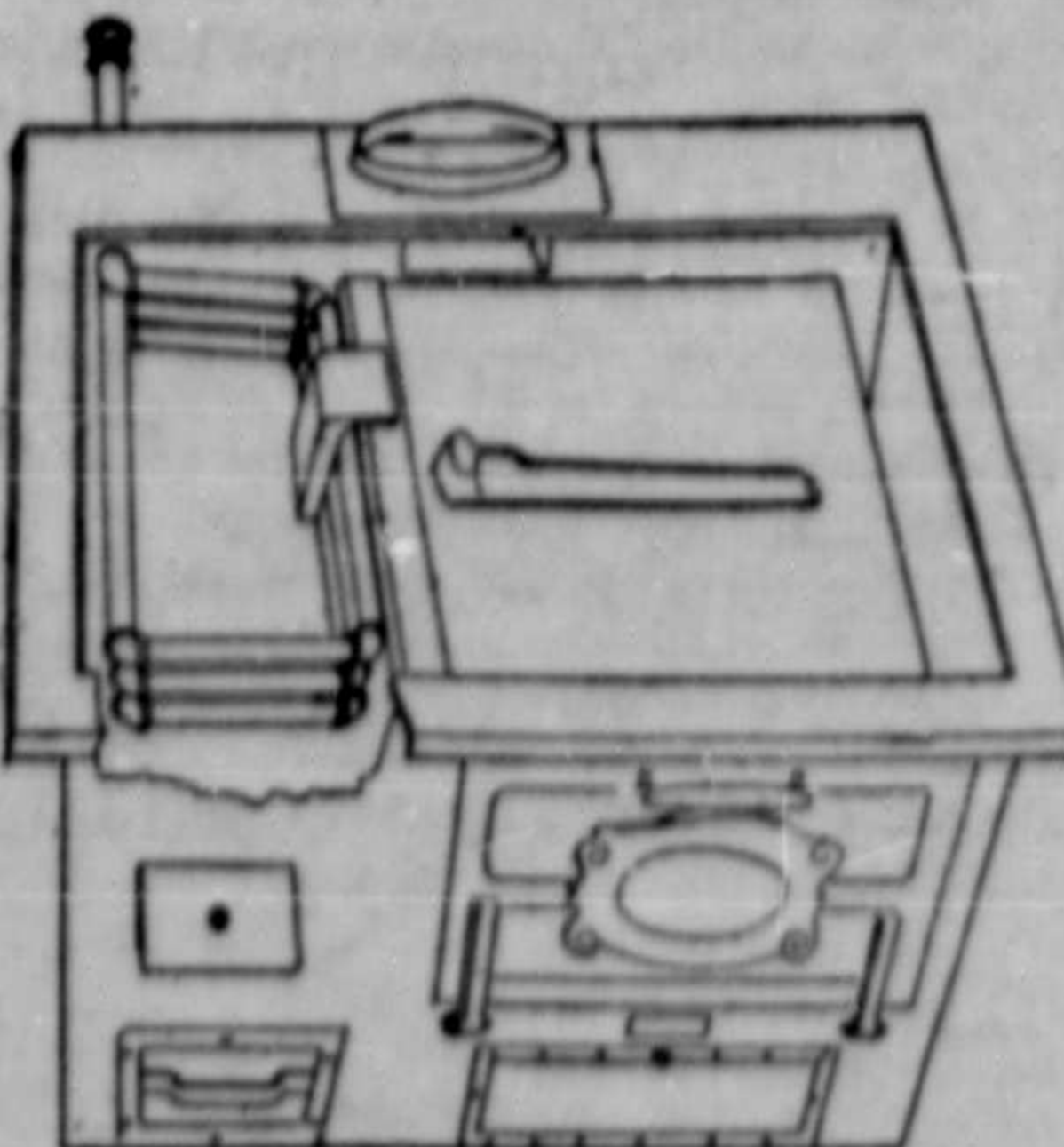

like Sir Thomas White the C. N. R. bill is really raw work.

The Government shows considerable hesitation in enforcing the Military Service Act. By the time this article sees print the Governor-General will have signed the act with his own fair hand and selective conscription will be the law. But I doubt if anything will be done about it right away, unless perhaps in Quebec. The Government doesn't want much to do with conscription until after a general election. All that is expected of the Military Service Act during this season of suspense is a few riots in Quebec, and a few Liberal meetings broken up by returned soldiers in various parts of the country. The idea is to help the voting.

This idea is further carried out in the Military Voters' Act which gives the franchise to the soldiers' wives, mothers, widows and other female relations. To this part of the act there is no objection but the clauses which enable a soldier to choose his voting constituency and incidentally the Government to apply the soldier vote to the weak spots are distinctly vicious. Evidently what the Government relies on is to steal the election somewhere in England. The bill provides that both parties shall have scrutineers but that the Conservative party shall have more. The counting will be done by majority.

If the Franchise Act is as brisk as it threatens to be a loyal Opposition will probably fight it until Parliament expires on October 7th. The hint has gone out that all the aliens are to be disen-
