## SWEDISH MINISTER TO BRITAIN REMOVED

### KORNILOFF'S REVOLT ENDED--RUSSIAN TROOPS DEFEAT ENEMY ON RIGA FRONT

#### GREAT BRITAIN DISMISSES THE SWEDISH MINISTER

Sweden's Reply Regarding Argentine Incident is Unsatisfactory—British Gains in Belgium.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, Sept. 17.—Count A. Wrangel, the Swedish minister to Great Britain has been dismissed by the British Government. The Count left London after a lengthy interview with the Under Secretary of Foreign Affairs. Great Britain is dissatisfied with the Swedish reply regarding the Argentine incident.

**Asks Explanation.**  
Stockholm, Sept. 17.—Sweden realizes the seriousness of the situation caused by the disclosures made by the Washington Government. The transmission of all dispatches to Germany has been stopped, and an explanation has been demanded by Sweden from the German Government. Sweden wishes for the continuance of friendly relations with the United States.

**British Front.**  
London, Sept. 17.—The British troops last night made a slight advance on the Belgian front east of Westhoek, and improved their positions. Near Cherisy, the British penetrated the German positions in raiding operations and destroyed the German defences, capturing 239 prisoners and many guns.

**French Front.**  
Paris, Sept. 17.—The German forces attempted to recapture the French positions near the Inverness Cope, but were repulsed with heavy losses. After last night's battle, the Germans were successfully ejected from a great part of the trenches which they had occupied earlier in the day north of the Gaurieres Wood in the Verdun sector. Two surprise attacks launched by the Germans north of Prosenes in the Champagne region were repulsed by the French.

**Dead or Alive.**  
The German general commanding the Eleventh Reserve Division recently put a price of four hundred marks on the first American soldier brought in, dead or alive.

**Drumfire in Flanders.**  
Berlin, Sept. 17.—The artillery preparations which attained to drumfire intensity this morning on the battlefield in Flanders was followed by a British attack on the German positions at St. Julien. The attack was repulsed and a number of British soldiers were taken prisoner.

#### THE CLOSURE APPLIED TO FRANCHISE BILL

Ottawa, Sept. 12.—The dying days of the present Parliament and of the present Government are witnessing a panicky resort to closure in its most high-handed and almost reckless form. Faced with the possibility of failure to get the franchise bill through both Houses before Parliament dies at midnight on October 6th, Sir Robert Borden has capitulated entirely to Hon. Robert Rogers and the extreme party men. Closure will be invoked all week in the Commons, and operated to the limit, with the least possible delay, regardless of fair play or the necessities of careful consideration of a measure disfranchising many thousands of hitherto free citizens of Canada, enfranchising some four hundred thousand women voters, and with a radical and far-reaching change in the whole Dominion franchise.

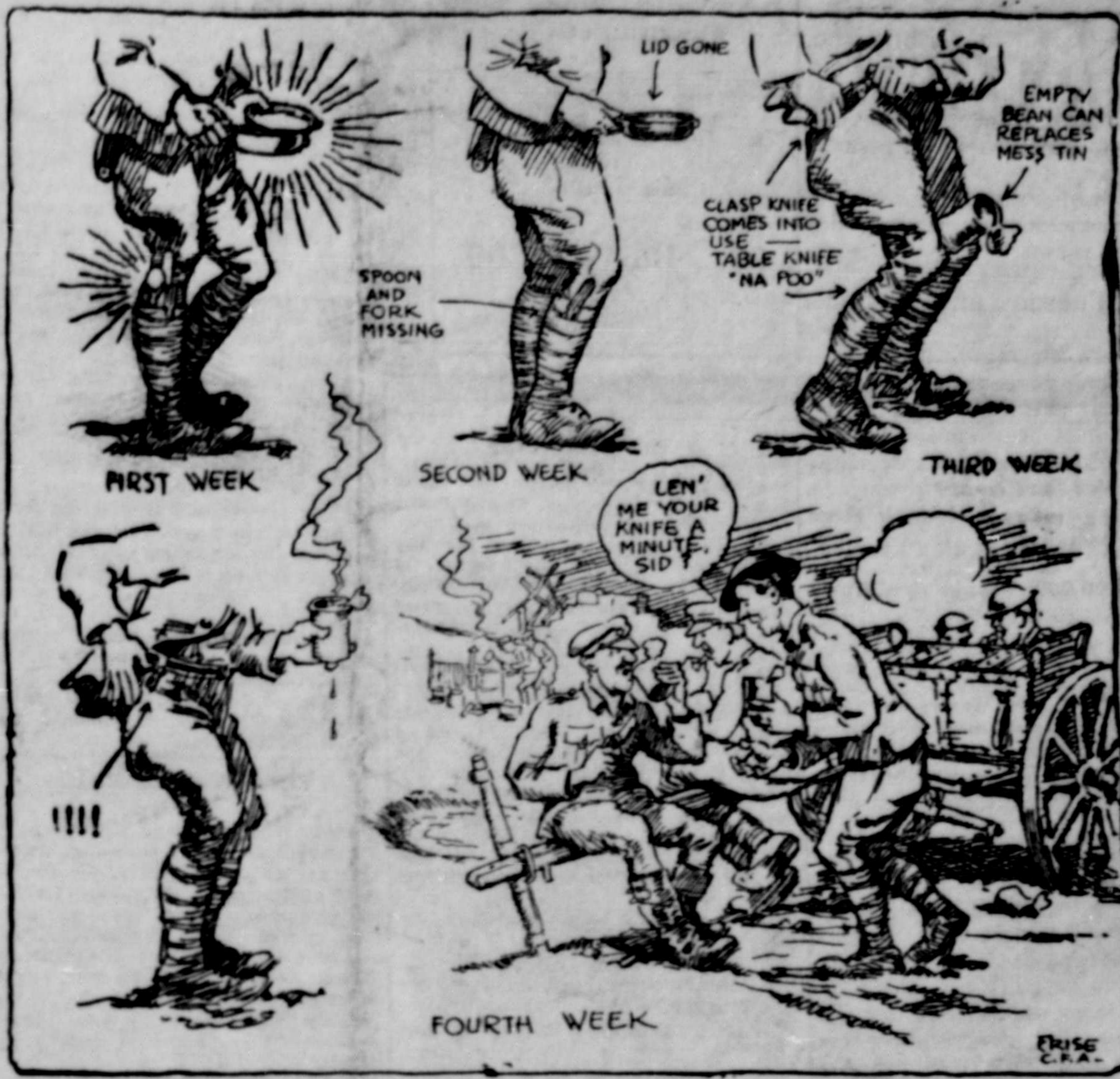
The Government intends to force the bill through the Commons this week, and get it over to the Senate with the least possible delay, so that there may be no chance for a Liberal last stand there which would last out the remaining three weeks of Parliament's life.

**Liberals Admit Hopeless Fight.**  
There is talk even of introducing the closure rule in the Senate in the same arbitrary manner in which it was forced upon the Commons three years ago. The chances are, however, that this will be unnecessary, as Liberals are now admitting that there is practically no hope of successfully combating the brute-force majority. Reliance will be placed in the last resort on the judgment of the people of Canada.

**Desperate Haste.**  
The desperate haste in which the measure is being rushed through is significant of the desperateness of the need. So far as Liberals are concerned, however, reports which are now coming in from various parts of the Dominion are convincing them more and more that the bill, instead of accomplishing the purpose for which it was designated, namely, to insure the defeat of enough Liberal candidates to bring the present administration back into power again, is likely to stir up such a strong feeling in the country as to defeat the ends of its perpetrators. Many Liberal members today declare that they had nothing at all to fear from the votes of the female kin of the soldiers overseas, and that preliminary surveys of this vote indicated that a preponderance of it would go against the Government. Maladministration and the high cost of living are expected to be the deciding factors with this vote. In regard to the foreign vote disfranchised, reports indicate that if anything the bulk of it went for the Government candidates in the 1914 election, and consequently in some constituencies at least the Conservatives are commencing to realize that they have perhaps wiped out their own majorities.

Mr. R. W. Martin, of Salmon river, near Stewart, arrived in the city this morning. He brought with him several samples of ore from his property there, which run over \$200 in gold and silver values to the ton. The samples are at the Hotel Prince Rupert, where great interest is being taken in them. Mr. Martin's mine is about seven miles from the Bush property.

#### GEN. KORNILOFF IS ARRESTED—REVOLT ENDS

Russia is Proclaimed a Republic—New non-Party Cabinet of Five is Formed—Crisis is Averted.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Petrograd, Sept. 17.—General Korniloff is now under arrest and his revolt from the authority of the Provisional Government is now ended. The question of adequate punishment for his offense is exciting public opinion greatly. Premier Kerensky's attempt to form a coalition government has not met with success. The crisis has been temporarily solved by the formation of a cabinet of five, virtually of a non-party character. Kerensky, as president, has issued a manifesto proclaiming the existence of the Russian Republic.

**Russian Success.**  
Petrograd, Sept. 17.—The Russian forces yesterday, after some hard fighting, defeated the German troops on the road to Pskoff on the Riga front. The Russians have occupied the small town of Krnberg, and also the towns of Keilsen and Sisseral, which had previously been held by the Germans.

**German Methods.**  
Washington, Sept. 17.—A Russian prisoner, who has been recently exchanged, says that the German methods employed in the handling of prisoners of war are extremely cruel. He asserts that out of a battalion two thousand strong when taken prisoner, only three hundred and fifty remain. The others have died of starvation, disease and hard treatment.

Vienna, Sept. 17.—Very heavy fighting continues against our positions on Monte San Gabriele east of Gorizia.

#### GRANBY COPPER CO. EARNS \$35 A SHARE

Boston, Sept. 15.—Results of the Granby Consolidated Copper Company for the past fiscal year will be known to stockholders during the coming month, when the annual report for the year ended June 30 last will have been prepared for presentation at the annual meeting in October. It will show earnings of about \$35 per share, against \$9 paid in dividends as compared with \$25 earned in the previous fiscal period.

Construction and improvement expenditures were heavy during the past year, and these will be continued during the present year. It is not improbable that the fiscal year will be changed to end December 31.

The Granby management has rounded up some excellent mines, by no means contiguous, however, or even near each other, as they extend from British Columbia, the site of the original property, into Alaska.

Practically all of these mines are now furnishing ore for the smelters at Anyox, on the waterfront, and Grand Forks, in the interior.

The main ore supply comes from the Hidden Creek mines, which were secured several years ago from Thomas M. Hodens, formerly an active factor in Butte mining affairs. With reserves of over 20,000,000 tons developed in a comparatively small portion of its territory, this mine has become one of the most important in the far northwest. The old property at Phoenix, which ships to the Grand Forks smelter, constitutes the next largest factor in the company's operations, but only under existing high metal prices can it be made to show a profit.

**THE ATTACK ON DEMOCRACY**

The Russian like the American democracy sees its existence threatened by the spirit and organization of Germany. Its gigantic conspiracy against free institutions. Nothing is more generally ridiculed in Germany than the democratic systems of England, America and France.

For the soundness of the British cause it is better that the war opened in 1914 than in 1904. At the earlier date the South African Confederation had not been created as a triumph of Liberal principles. In 1904 Britain was still in the thrall of Toryism, though the stirrings of labor insurrection were already heard. The privileges of wealth and caste, the unreformed House of Lords, the ubiquitous sweatshop, the mass of pauperism, were serious drawbacks to democracy in Britain. Home Rule was described as dead. Then came the meteor years of Campbell-Bannerman, Asquith and Lloyd George, seven years of a political revolution greater than that of 1688. In 1914 Great Britain had the right, having curbed the Lords, taxed the rich, established old-age pensions, inaugurated a great scheme of social reform, projected sweeping changes in the land and educational systems, and passed Home Rule, to stand forward as a real democracy against the assault of the Huns. The same may be said in a less degree of the United States. There a beginning had been made before 1914 of checking the trusts and their debauchery of public men and assemblies, the graded income tax came in through a change in the Federal constitution (1913), and the low-tariff Democratic party held power through a reformer like President Wilson.

In their jibes at the "insecure democracy" of England and America the Germans are a decade behind the time. But if they despise a make-believe democracy, they dislike and assail the real thing. Whatever they may say, it was because democracy was becoming ever more real, and therefore

more potent, that its enemy attacked it in 1914. One reason the Kaiser made this war, probably, on the whole, the main reason, was the fear of the rising tide of radicalism in Germany itself, stimulated by the growing freedom of Latin and Anglo-Saxon countries. The majority of the German people stood, and still stand, behind the constituted Government as a winning concern. They have been taught by school, Church, and Press to hate and fear democracy, examples of graft and inefficiency being assiduously pointed out as the result of self-governing countries of want of organization by a dominant caste. Their idea is that the governing class in Germany has given faithful and competent direction, a national organization which has been successful beyond all dreams in the development of material resources, military power, and intellectual achievement.

There is doubtless a challenge from Germany to the free nations to show that national efficiency need not be sacrificed in any degree under democracy. They have proved this by their adjustment through the individual's free play to the circumstances of the war brought on them by the German bureaucracy.

Germany can no longer despise the power of democracy. With the strength of desperation the Potsdam Government still struggles to destroy the freedom which it still denounces as unreal, but it must perceive that the democracies have become even more genuine than in 1914, developing under stress of danger more equality and yet at the same time a leadership by the best and most capable element. The Germans must see that democracy has grown more self-confident by success, and determined to continue, when peace comes, the gains achieved during the war by the spirit of equality and fraternity. Against the enemy's last frantic effort to achieve the aim of 1914 we are summoning all our strength for no illusion of freedom and right. It is the foe whose system is a reactionary, mediaeval sham of aristocracy. Our freedom is

### LAND OWNERS MUST USE THEIR HOLDINGS

Victoria, Sept. 14.—"The time is fully ripe for legislation to remove the many difficulties which exist and for providing the necessary impetus to a movement which will result in the establishment of prosperous agricultural communities. The difficulties are many and varied, but they can be overcome. The greatest obstacle after all is an artificial one and has been created by allowing the bulk of the most fertile and easily accessible lands to pass into the hands of non-users—and consequently non-producers—an obstacle which will ultimately compel land owners either to bring their holdings under production or to dispose of them at a price which will permit of acquisition."

The foregoing was one of the statements made by Hon. John Oliver, minister of agriculture and railways, who arrived in the city last night from his fourteen-day tour of many of the northern districts on the G. T. P. railway. The minister stated that the existing situation from the agricultural standpoint is one calling for immediate remedial measures, and as a means of achieving the end the government had in view when the Premier arranged the ministerial tour, the first essential must be energy directed to see that non-productive but eminently fertile lands are placed at the disposal of agriculturists who not only know how to farm, but who are eager to obey the Dominion-wide exhortation to produce more.

The second step would be to disseminate the knowledge to the landseeker that acreage was available for his use, and as a final means to an end the provision of roads to make settlement not only profitable, but to ensure success in every particular. Those reforms accomplished, the minister has no hesitation in saying that the desirable establishment of the sort of agricultural community now most needed will follow as a natural consequence.

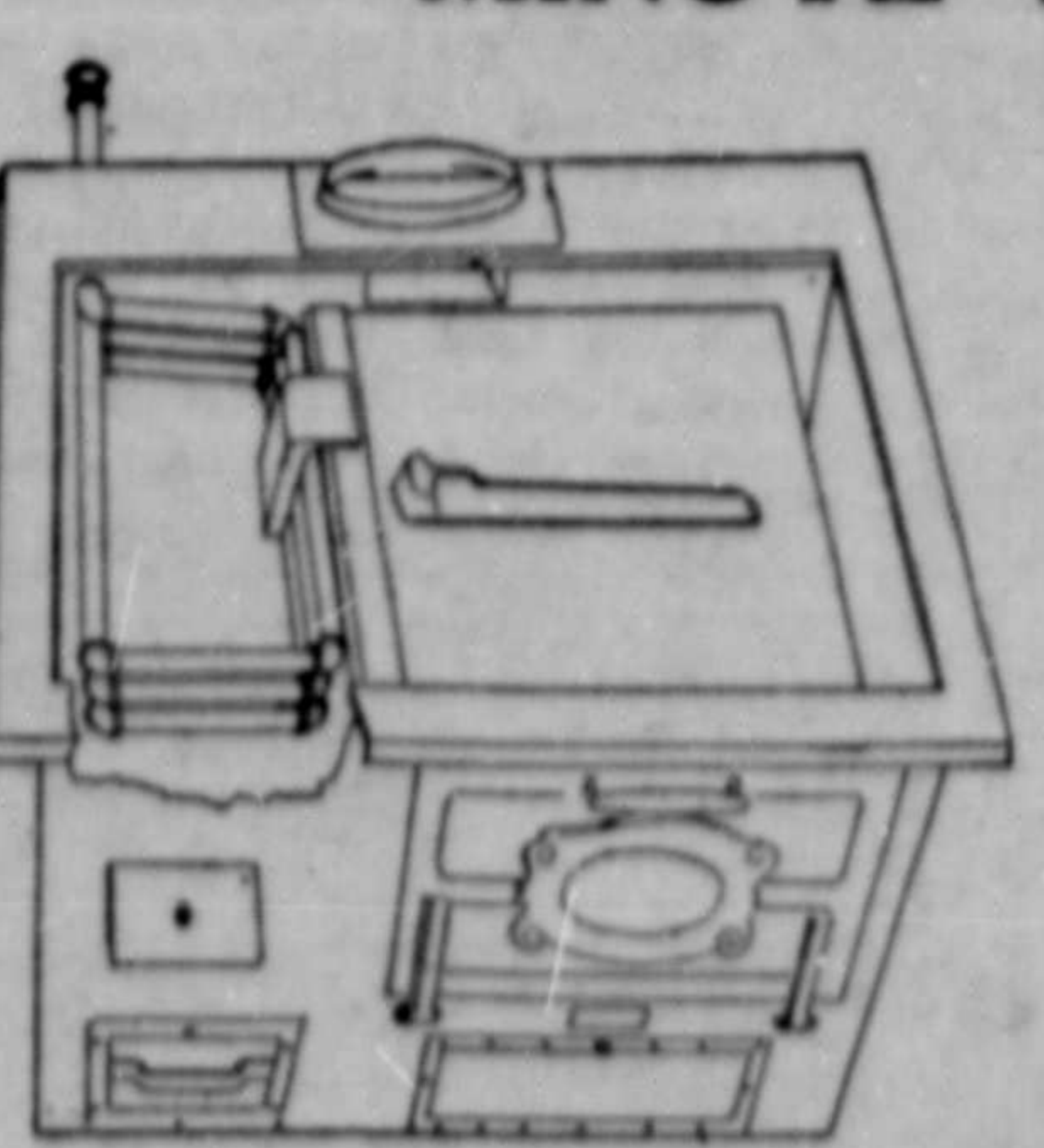
