AEROPLANES ARE ACTIVE ON WEST FRONT

RUSSIANS RECAPTURE LOST GROUND -- GERMANS SEND MORE REINFORCEMENTS

AEROPLANE RAIDS ON THE WEST FRONT

British, French and German Aviators Busy on Bombing Operations—Trench Raids Continue.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, Sept. 18.—British naval aeroplanes on Saturday dropped bombs on German destroyers and trawlers along the Belgian coast, between Ostend and Blankenburgh. Near Zeebrugge, one destroyer was hit and one trawler sunk.

The German aeroplanes dropped fifty bombs behind the British lines, doing slight damage. The British machines dropped 143 bombs on German aerodromes, and fired thousands of rounds from machine guns from an elevation of one hundred feet, putting two thousand German infantrymen to flight. The British aviators brought down six German aeroplanes, five of which were uncontrollable. Several British machines have failed to return.

Trench Raids.
The British troops repulsed with heavy losses to the enemy, attempts on our trenches near Sembray. In the Arras and Comme regions, British troops made successful raids on the German trenches. Many Germans were killed in their dugouts, and prisoners taken. The attacking troops were mostly Scottish regiments. East of Ypres, the hostile artillery showed great activity during the night.

French Front.
Paris, Sept. 18.—On Sunday night, the French aviators dropped 15,000 kilos of projectiles on the enemy establishments. The German artillery fire raged into the French front at several points. A German surprise attack in the Vosges region failed.

CALL GERMAN CITIZENS TO REBUKE PRES. WILSON

(Special to The Daily News.) Berlin, Sept. 18.—Delegates to the convention of the League of German Municipalities have issued a call to the German citizens to rebuke President Wilson for his attempted interference in German domestic affairs by participating actively in the forthcoming war loan.

GEN. ALEXIEFF REORGANIZES RUSSIAN ARMY

Will Cashier Old Generals by Way of a Start—At the Front the Troops Retake Seven Miles of Ground.

(Special to The Daily News.) Washington, Sept. 18.—General Alexieff begins the reorganization of the Russian army. The new commander-in-chief will cashier all the old generals by way of starting his reforms. The government is declared to be all the stronger as the result of the bloodless quelling of General Korniloff's insurrection. At the front, the spirit of the troops is reported to be excellent. Seven miles of ground have been retaken from the enemy in five days. The Germans have been obliged to send more forces to the Russian front, where the defending armies are fulfilling their task of keeping them busy.

A Blessing in Disguise.

Petrograd, Sept. 18.—The German propaganda has been upset by the proclaiming of the Russian Republic. President Kerensky says that the revolt may be a blessing in disguise, as it has brought out a unification in the spirit of all true Russians. The condition of the troops at the various fronts is satisfactory. Kerensky says that he entertains now no vindictive feelings towards General Korniloff.

TRADES AND LABOR CONGRESS CONVENES

(Special to The Daily News.) Ottawa, Sept. 18.—The thirty annual convention of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada opened here this morning. About three hundred delegates were present.

OFFICERS AND MEN ON SAME FOOTING

Washington, Sept. 17.—The same compensation for dependents of officers and enlisted men in death and disability cases was provided in an amendment to the Soldiers and Sailors' Insurance Bill adopted today by the House over the protest of the committee in charge of the measure.

The bill also was amended to increase compensation for all dependents about 15 per cent. The new rates per month adopted were Widows, \$35; one child, \$45; two children, \$52.50, and an additional \$5 for each child up to four.

One motherless child, \$20; two, \$35; three, \$45, and \$10 additional for each child up to five.

A widowed mother would receive \$30 a month and no family allowance would exceed \$75 per month.

Under the original draft of the bill the compensation for officers' dependents might have gone as high as \$200 a month.

CLERICAL WORKERS FORM A NEW UNION

There was an enthusiastic meeting held in the Carpenters' Hall last evening, when the clerical workers in the city decided to form a union. This new union will embrace clerks, stenographers, accountants, and other office workers. Organizer W. E. Thompson presided, Mr. S. D. Macdonald being secretary pro-tem. A short address was delivered by Mr. Thompson on the ideals, purposes and benefits of organized labor, which was very much to the point.

Provisional officers were appointed in Mr. Frank Bowness as president, Mr. H. W. Birch as vice-president, Mr. W. C. Reith as secretary. Petitions were signed up last night to get a charter, and it is expected that there will be a large membership of this new union. This union will appeal to a class of business people, who hitherto have had no organization at all, the lack of which has been a felt want on many occasions. In the present instance, everything looks promising for the success of the new union, which will become affiliated with the Trades and Labor Council of Prince Rupert, and its representatives there will be Mr. E. H. Paterson, Mr. J. Roberts, and Mr. F. T. Bowness. The next meeting of the new union will be held on Tuesday, the 22nd of October, when all members and prospective members will do well to be present.

THE CITY COUNCIL AND WATER POWER

The report from Messrs. Anderson and Warden, of Vancouver, regarding their examination of the power available at Falls river and at Thulme river was presented to the city council last evening. Mr. Anderson, as the result of his preliminary examination, gave a detailed report of the two powers available for the use of the city.

Regarding the Falls river power he comes to the conclusion that under the very best of conditions the revenue producing power would not be more than 12,000 continuous horse-power at the consumers' end of the transmission line. The site of the dam and the power-house is excellent, and the construction of the dam presents no engineering difficulties. The poorest feature of the whole project, however, in Mr. Anderson's opinion, is the length of the transmission line, and the difficult and expensive route over which the line would have to be built. The crossing of the Skeena river and the projected route paralleling the line of the G. T. P. would be a costly one. Mr. Anderson's report recommended an investigation of the ground between the Skeena crossing and Woodward Lake, as an alternative line.

Cost of Plant.

The cost of the complete plant, the report continues, would not be less than \$1,500,000, on which the estimated fixed charges would be:—
Interest on \$1,500,000 @ 5 per cent. \$75,000
Sinking fund to redeem \$1,500,000 in 40 years invested at 3 per cent compound interest 20,000
Operating expenses, maintenance, etc. 40,000
Total annual fixed charge \$135,000

If the rate of interest were higher, and the life of the bonds shorter, then of course the annual fixed charge would be proportionately greater.

AN EPIDEMIC OF RIOTS DISTURB THE AUSTRIANS

The Food Shortage and Italian Successes Cause Grave Troubles—Rioting is Now General.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, Sept. 18.—Austria-Hungary is reported to be finding it increasingly difficult to keep in agreement with Germany. An epidemic of riots and political differences is disturbing the Empire from end to end. The food shortage and the Italian successes add to the general alarm.

The Italian operations in the Balkans indicate a new offensive there, while General Cadorna is winning fresh victories in the Bainsizza Valley. It is his intention to press the advantage home until his troops are beyond Monte San Gabriele.

Thulme River.

Falling into the north arm of Wark Channel, Thulme river offers an alternative power to Falls river. This was visited by Mr. Anderson, but as no records have been kept of the daily flow of the water, nor any surveys made to determine the available storage capacity of reservoir site, the mean daily amount of water that could be generated at this site could not be estimated. The difficulty of building a transmission line from Thulme river to Prince Rupert, and the lack of information concerning the whole scheme makes the value of this scheme an unknown quantity.

Comparing the Falls river project with the Thulme river one, Mr. Anderson had no hesitation in reporting in favor of the Falls river power as the better one of the two for the city.

The report was laid on the council table for one week.

GERMAN NOTE HIGHLY REGRETS ISSUES RAISED

Germany is Obligated to Swedish Government—Argentine Refuses Permission to Wireless Company.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 18.—The German Government has sent a note to Sweden highly regretting the disagreeable issues raised on account of Sweden transmitting telegrams to Germany. The note states that Germany is obliged to the Swedish Government for transmitting the messages, but regrets her representative in the Argentine sent the messages in the phraseology he did. The Swedish Government has ordered that all cipher correspondence be refused.

Serious Situation.

Stockholm, Sept. 18.—Sweden realizes the serious situation created by the recent disclosures at Washington regarding the transmission of messages to Germany and expects to take all steps to make the matter right.

Refuses Permission.

Buenos Aires, Sept. 18.—The Government has withdrawn the permission granted to a German wireless company to attempt to receive messages from the German station at Nauen. Argentine is in the throes of railroad disorders. Many railway bridges have been wrecked.

NO SUBMARINES ON NEW ENGLAND COAST

Washington, Sept. 18.—The Navy Department, after a complete investigation, is satisfied that there is no foundation for the report of hostile submarines operating off the New England coast.

TRUSTS AND CORONETS

"The prostitution of honors," These are the stinging words with which The London Times opens its attack on the British Government for its failure to break with the evil traditions of pre-war days in the creation of titles that reek of the traffic of the market place. The refusal of the Government to promise reform in the method of recommending to the Sovereign the names of men eligible for honors and awards draws from The Times the following trenchant remarks:

"No real answer to the demand for reform was forthcoming in February, 1914, and no promise was given to undertake reform. The reasons are plain. Party men who have risen and thriven under the old system do not wish to disturb the machinery which has served them and which they know how to manipulate. Nobody loves corruption for its own sake, but case-hardened politicians agree with Lord Ribblesdale's view, expressed in the former debate, that the evil has always existed in one form or another, that it is 'not so very terrible,' that there is no use 'tilting at windmills,' and that 'the thing is better, left very much as it is.' That is not the view of the public. They are alive to the scandal."

The question of titles in the United Kingdom is a matter that concerns the British people. The traffic in honors is their business and their shame. No Canadian will seek to interfere in the domestic affairs of the sister nation. That the question has been raised there in definite form gives hope that Democracy is alive to the evils of the class system, and is determined to purge public life of the uncleanness which has been unveiled by the recent debate in the British House. The people of the Dominions, however, are keenly interested in the permanent effects of this great war on the life of the British Isles. It is the earnest desire of those who in distant lands look to the old country and its institutions as the cradle of their liberties and the

background of their civilization that the coming of peace and the destruction of autocracy in Europe will find the British nation ready and willing to take up its appointed task of "making the world safe for Democracy." The world never can be safe for Democracy while honors are sold in the marketplace and the barriers of an upper class remain to shut out the masses of the people from their full heritage of equal citizenship. British statesmen fail to read aright the signs of the times when they dally over one of the fundamentals of the new-world Democracy—that hereditary class distinctions are an abomination to nations that have gone through the fiery furnace of a conflagration that had its origin in the mediaeval doctrine of the divine right of Kings, and of the power of an aristocratic class to forge the weapons of a bloody and inhuman war. As the power and the glory are departing from the class rulers of Britain, why tolerate any longer the unmeaning symbols of class distinctions and privileges that are alien to the spirit of the age?

But we in Canada have a more direct interest in the granting of titles when the British Government, of its own volition, recommends the Sovereign to scatter on the democratic soil of this American continent the noxious seeds of an effete and discredited class system. Canada is not honored by the elevation of her citizens to ranks and titles that cut them off from the main currents of thought and life in their own country, and that turn their eyes eastward to the temples and altars of strange gods that know not Democracy. It leaves scars on the soul of the nation when the King showers his Royal favors on Demetrius, the silversmith, and receives on the steps of the Throne, as men worthy of all honor and as exemplars to their generation, Trust and Monopoly barons on whom American democracy has served notice to quit. The days that lie ahead belong to Democracy. For that great hope Canada is fighting overseas. No barriers of race or class or creed must be set up

to rob the democracies of the world of the full fruition of their new-world aims and desires.—Globe.

POLAND SHUNS YOKE OF TEUTON

London, Sept. 14.—The recent announcement of the resignation of the Polish State Council made it obvious that the situation in Poland was not favorable to Austro-German occupation. From admissions in the German newspapers and from other material available, a special correspondent of The Manchester Guardian shows it to be much worse than appears on the surface. By a manifesto, dated November 5th, 1916, the two Kaisers proclaimed the independence of the Polish State. Among the reasons for the step was that the two Empires wanted to raise a Polish auxiliary army, and being unable to do it by force, expected to master the problem by constituting Poland an independent and allied State, counting particularly on Polish feeling against secular Tsardom. The German press is now admitting that these calculations failed. Though but a few weeks previously hundreds of thousands of Polish citizens had paraded the streets of Warsaw and Lublin in honor of the independent Polish State, the two Kaisers' manifesto was received with baffling coolness and even enmity, and as for volunteers flocking in their thousands to join the colors of the new State, the result was still more disappointing.

The Germans found a way out. The army was to take an oath of fidelity, not only to the Polish State, but also to the Austro-German allies for the duration of the war. Of course, the State Council fell in with the idea, and a fresh appeal was issued for volunteers. This time the Germans might have had more success but for the untoward accident of the Russian revolution, which swept all Poland with a wave of emotion and made everybody regret the separation from the new democratic republic. The revulsion of feeling was unmistakable, there were numerous demonstrations held by the Left party and the manifesto of November shrank to miserable proportions in the universal estimation.

CITY COUNCIL JOTTINGS

At eight o'clock last evening, for the first time for many weeks, the whole of the city council were gathered there in the Council Chamber together, to deal with such matters of the municipality as were worthy of their consideration.

The first matter calling for decision was whether an extra half-holiday should be recommended to the merchants of the city this week on account of the Fair. Between ball games and water sports the attractions on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday afternoons were such that the clerks might not resist them. The pros and cons being discussed, it was decided that Friday afternoon be recommended as a half-holiday. No penalty, however, could be imposed upon those merchants who did keep open.

Then came a report from the public works committee that tenders be called for for the painting with copper paint, of the civic garbage scow, and also for the supply of paint. This being approved, the council then adopted a report from the same committee that Mr. L. Porter be granted \$15 per as sanitary inspector.

New Bylaws.
Ald. Nelson, chairman of the Finance committee, next asked leave to introduce a bylaw for the borrowing of ten thousand dollars, to be expended in water mains extension. The bylaw was read the first time, then the second time, when the council went into committee of the whole to consider the matter.

Ald. Casey presided over the committee's deliberations and as the city clerk read the bylaw, clause by clause, the committee amended and approved. This by-law provided for the issuing of serial bonds to the amount of \$10,000 at 6 per cent interest, repayable in twenty years. Each bond will be for \$500. The committee reported progress to his worship the mayor and it was duly moved and seconded that the bylaw pass.

Ald. Nelson again moved for leave to introduce other bylaws for \$20,000, on which being granted, they were read for the first time and laid over for a week. These debentures will be held by the city meantime unsold.

Ald. Montgomery wanted to know what the \$20,000 worth of debentures were for, why they were to be issued if not being sold, and was politely informed that he would hear all about that in committee. Thereupon he subsided. A little later Ald. Dybbavn wanted to learn some other particulars, and Ald. Montgomery interjected with pleasure that he would also hear all about that in committee.

Water Power.
Then came the report from Mr. Anderson, regarding the developing of the Falls River power on the Oxtail, and the Thulme River power on Wark Channel, which was laid over for one week. The high cost of living committee also informed the council what they had done and learned since the last meeting. The chief thanks they got, however, was to be complimented for their qualifications as politicians; in sidestepping the issue and "passing the buck." "Blow, blow, thou winter wind," etc., one of the committee was heard to ejaculate.

After this, Ald. Casey spoke regarding that dwell in darkness near Bacon Street, and the necessity of better street lighting. On the information that this would be attended to, the council adjourned.
